

CERTIFICATE OF DEATH

INSTRUCTIONS TO REGISTRAR—The registered number should be entered immediately upon receipt at your office, and the date of filing in your office and your signature as registrar should be entered at the same time on the face of the certificate in the lower left-hand corner.

Please examine the certificate carefully before making out the permit and call the attention of the undertaker or person in charge of the disposition of the body to any omissions. If any item cannot be obtained, the space should not be left blank nor a meaningless dash be used, but the word "Unknown" should be plainly written. Be particularly careful to see that the place of death is correctly stated. If, out of your jurisdiction, do not register it, but see that it is filed with the registrar where the death occurred. It is not necessary to give the "Special Information," except for death in institutions, etc.

Do not fail to mail all certificates of death filed with you to the Department of State, Lansing, Michigan, on the fourth (4th) day of the following month. Use the stamped return envelope provided for this purpose, and include a Statement Card, properly filled out.

INSTRUCTIONS TO SUB-REGISTRARS—Licensed embalmers, when duly authorized by the Secretary of State to act as subregistrars, may issue permits to themselves for deaths in villages or townships (but not in cities). They must first have the certificates completely and legibly filled out in ink, and must personally file all certificates with the registrars on or before the third day of the following month without fail. The certificates should not be numbered by the subregistrars, but by the registrars who record and transmit as if originally filed with them.

STATEMENT OF OCCUPATION—Precise statement of occupation is very important, so that the relative healthfulness of various pursuits can be known. The question applies to each and every person, irrespective of age. For many occupations a single word or ??rm on the first line will be sufficient, e.g., Farmer or Planter, Physician, Compositor, Architect, Locomotive engineer, Civil engineer, Stationary fireman, etc. But in many cases, especially in industrial employments, it is necessary to know (a) the kind of work and also (b) the nature of the business or industry, and therefore an additional line is provided for the latter statement; it should be used only when needed. As examples: (a) Spinner, (b) Cotton mill; (a) Salesman, (b) Grocery; (a) Foreman, (b) Automobile factory. The material worked on may form part of the second statement. Never return "Laborer," "Foreman," "Manager," "Dealer," etc, without more precise specification, as Day laborer, Farm laborer, Laborer—Coal mine, etc. Women at home, who are engaged in the duties of the household only (not paid Housekeepers who receive a definite salary), may be entered as Housewife, Housework, or At home, and children, not gainfully employed at At school or At Home. Care should be taken to report specifically the occupations of the persons engaged in domestic service for wages, as Servant, Cook, Housemaid, etc. If the occupation has been changed or given up on account of the DISEASE CAUSING DEATH, state occupation at beginning of illness. If retired from business, that fact may be indicated thus: Farmer (retired, 6 yrs). For persons who have no occupation whatever, write None.

STATEMENT OF CAUSE OF DEATH—Name, first, the DISEASE CAUSING DEATH (the primary affection with respect to time and causation), using always the same accepted term for the same disease. Examples: Cerbrospinal fever (the only definite synonym is "Epidemic cerebrospinal meningitis"); Diphtheria (Avoid use of "Croup"); Typhoid fever (never report "Typhoid pneumonia"); Lobar pneumonia; Bronchopneumonia ("Pneumonia," unqualified is

indefinite); Tuberculosis of lungs, meninges, peritonaeum, etc, Carcinoma, Sarcoma, etc of ---(name origin; "Cancer is less definite; avoid use of "Tumor" for malignant neoplasms); Measles; Whooping cough; Chronic valvular heart diseases; Chronic interstitial nephritis, etc. The contributory (secondary or intercurrent) affection need not be stated unless important. Example: Measles (disease causing death), 29 ds; Bronchopneumonia (secondary) 10 ds. Never report mere symptoms or terminal conditions, such as :Asthenia," "Anaemia," (merely symptomatic); :Atrophy, "Collapse," "Coma," "Convulsions," "Debility" (Congenital," "Senile," etc),
"Dropsy," "Exhaustion," "Heart failure," "Haemorrhage," "Inanition," "Marasmus," "Old age,") "Shock," "Uraemia," "Weakness," etc, when a definite disease can be ascertained as the cause. Always qualify all diseases resulting from childbirth or miscarriage as "Puerperal sepitcaemis," "Puerperal Peritonitis." etc. State cause for which surgical operation was undertaken. For VIOLENT DEATHS state MEANS OF INJURY and qualify as ACCIDENTAL, SUICIDAL, or HOMICIDAL, or as probably SUCH, IF IMPOSSIBLE TO DETERMINE DEFINITELY. Examples: Accidental drowning; Struck by railway train—accident; Revolver wound of head homicide; Poisoned by carbolic acid-probably suicide. The nature of the injury as fracture of skull, and consequences (e.g., sepsis, tetanus) may be stated under the head of "Contributory." (Recommendations on statement of cause of death approved by Committee on Nomenclature of the American Medical Association).

NOTE—"Certificates will be returned for additional information which give any of the following diseases, without explanation, as the sole cause of death: Abortion, cellulitis, childbirth, convulsions, haemorrhage, gangrene, gastritis, erysipelas, meningitis, miscarriage, necrosis, peritonitis, phlebitis, pyaemia, septicaemia, tetanus."

THE LAST ROLL CALL

Nelson J. Dunn, 92, last of Saginaw's Civil War veterans, joined his fellow Civil War comrades Sunday morning. He died at his home, 1601 Gratiot. His has been ill for several years.

He was born November 5, 1848 in New York State, a son of the late Marshal F. and Harriett Moon Dunn who moved to Genesee County when he was five. His love of union and patriotism led him to enlist September 28, 1864 at Flint with Michigan's Co. K, 23rd Regiment. He was 15, just shy of his 16th birthday. He saw his first action November 25, 1864 at Columbia, Tennessee, and from then until the end of the war, was in the thick of the battles in Tennessee and North Carolina. It was reported that the Michigan 23rd took part in battles which occurred at critical stages of the war and seems to have borne the brunt of the fighting. Dunn was honorably discharged June 28, 1865.

He had a narrow escape in December 12, 1864, at the battle of Nashville when a bullet pierced his hat and grazed the top of his head. He "never was so frightened in his life." It happened during a night battle and it was "darker than a coal pile." Recovering his hat, he found the bullet had pierced four thicknesses of felt.

After his discharge, he lived in Flint until 1875 when he came to Saginaw. In 1879 he moved to Saginaw Township where for five years he was engaged in logging operations on the Tittabawassee River for A.B. Paine. Later, he was in charge of the Gratiot road toll bridge over the Tittabawassee River. He returned to Saginaw in 1889 and built the house on Gratiot which has been his home since. For a time, Mr. Dunn served as turnkey at the Saginaw County jail and later organized his own baggage and hack company. He then became a bookkeeper for W.L. Case & Co. and worked there for more than 24 years until illness forced his retirement.

Mr. Dunn married Miss Marian H. Harger, October 1, 1873 in Genesee County. She died March 27, 1910. He then married Miss Catherine Louise Scherping, July 16, 1919. He leaves his wife and a sister, Mrs. Lillie Parker, Clio.

His most cherished gift was a flag and standard given him by the N.J. Dunn Women's Relief Corp (WRC) which was organized in his honor four years ago. One of his greatest thrills was being elected sergeant of colors for the Michigan GAR.

Military funeral services will take place at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Case chapel. Spanish-American War veterans will act as honorary pallbearers and active pallbearers will be selected from the ranks of the Saginaw DAV chapter and Saginaw VFW post. Members of N.J. Dunn WRC wearing white, will meet at the chapel at 1:30 p.m.

KELLY SWARTZ EDDY HISTORICAL COLLECTION NOVEMBER 2001

AFRICAN AMERICAN GENEALOGY: A BIBLIOGRAPHY AND GUIDE TO SOURCES by Curt Bryan Witcher.

Mr. Witcher is well known for his involvement in genealogical organizations, and a noted speaker. The sources are arranged by State, giving the African American genealogist knowledge of materials available in their research area. The introduction is helpful for the beginning African American researcher, providing a basic guide to research strategies.

NEWSPAPER DATELINES OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, VOL. 1: APRIL 18, 1775 TO NOVEMBER 1, 1775 by Armand Francis Lucier.

A collection of articles published in various cities and towns, arranged chronologically. This volume covers the battles at Lexington and Concord, followed by the battle of Bunker Hill. It also covers other military affairs up to the siege of St. John's, as well as reports of the meetings of the delegates at the Continental Congress in Philadelphia.

GENEALOGY EXTRACTED FROM FOREST SERVICE COURT CASES IN RABUN COUNTY, GEORGIA by Susan Lewis Koyle.

In 1913 the U.S. Forest Service bought privately owned land to create the Chattahoochee National Forest. This book is a compilation of names, family relationships and other information found in the records of the court proceedings to acquire the land. Invaluable information includes maiden and married names of female family members and addresses of those who have migrated to other states.

THE GRAND RAPIDS ST. ISIDORE'S STORY: A HISTORY WITHIN A HISTORY. A BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE 1897-1997 by Edward Adam Skendzel.

This volume contains over 500 pages of extensive research on the church celebrating its centennial year, as well as ethnic and local neighborhood history of the entire Grand River Valley. Photographs, interviews, journals and family histories make this book invaluable for anyone with an interest in the history of the Catholic Church and families in Grand Rapids neighborhoods. Although there is not a surname index, genealogists with Polish ancestors in the Grand Rapids area will want to look through this intensive study of the church and pioneer Polish residents.



HISPANIC GENEALOGY BOOKS ON REVIEW

DICCIONARIO HERALDICO ESPANOL: APELLIDOS Y NOMBRES PROPIOS by Lander Munoz. 417 pages. Contains at least 30 pages of color plates of coats of arms for Spanish nobility. This book contains the history of many Spanish surnames, some in the new world or has a description of coats of arms for various surnames. The text is in the Spanish language.

DICCIONARIO ETIMOLOGICO COMPARADO DE NOMBRES PROPIOS DE PERSONA by Gutierre Tibon. 252 pages. A listing of first names, many used in Spanish documents are featured in this book. The origin or meaning of these names is also given. Written in Spanish, entries would be easy to translate with the aid of a Spanish-English dictionary.

THE ENCOMENDEROS OF NEW SPAIN 1521-1555 by Robert Himmerich Y Valencia. 348 pages. This book is a look at the practice of granting "encomiendas" to individuals in the early history of New Spain. These grants entitled the recipients to tributes and goods from the native population of an area. This book explains this short-lived practice and gives the biographies of over 500 individual grantees. Tables in back of the book show Spanish origins of these individuals. A bibliography and index are featured. Written in English, this book may be of interest to persons curious about this little-known aspect of new world history.

CENSUS RECORDS FOR LATIN AMERICA AND THE HISPANIC UNITED STATES by Lyman D. Platt. 198 pages. In this book we have a listing of census records available for the genealogist interested in Hispanic geographic areas. A reference number and bibliography where the census records can be found make this resource book easy to use. The geographic areas are arranged by country and province/state. The serious Hispanic researcher traveling to do genealogy would find this book a must for their own bookshelf.

MARRIAGE CONTRACTS, WILLS AND TESTAMENTS OF THE SPAN-ISH COLONIAL PERIOD IN NEW ORLEANS 1770-1804 by Charles R. Maduell, Jr. 38 pages. Although this book covered the Spanish period in New Orleans, the surnames contained in this volume are equally divided between French and Spanish surnames. Information about the types of records, the arrangement and storage of these records is also interesting to the genealogist.

NEW MEXICO PRENUPTIAL INVESTIGATIONS FROM THE ARCHI-VOS HISTORICOS DEL ARZOBISPADO DE DURANGO, 1760-1799 by John B. Colligan, compiler and Rick Hendricks, editor. 160 pages. A wealth of genealogical info is contained within this indexed resource. If you have an ancestor in this book you may find out why these persons were going to marry, if they were related, how long they knew each other, where they met, as well as places of origin and parents. Be aware that genealogical skeletons may come out of the closet if you find ancestors in this book.

MISSING HEIRS

Names of Persons Who at One Time Lived in or Near East Saginaw, and Who Have Been Advertised for to Claim Money or Property

A well known claim lawyer of New York City was in East Saginaw yesterday looking after evidence to establish the claims of certain persons to large fortunes. He has the power to make a large number of people wealthy if he can find any trace of them. Many of them have lived, at one time or another, or may still live, in East Saginaw. In conversation with a reporter of THE COURIER he gave the following names of people who are heirs or otherwise entitled to money or estates, and who are supposed at some time or other to have lived in the Saginaw Valley. Mr James USHER is the man whom New York papers recently stated had in his possession the names and descriptions of 7,000 heirs to unclaimed fortunes and estates. Speaking in reference to the matter he said: "If the needy poor people could be given the benefit of the large sums of money that are awaiting those who cannot be found, some families might have more fuel and better food than they now have when times are hard. Unfortunately this cannot be, and unless the missing heirs are discovered the money will be turned over into the treasuries of already wealthy governments. It is an interesting fact that the number of these cases has of late years been largely on the increase. The streams of travel, directed by the innumerable means of transit, flow constantly in all directions. Thousands upon thousands of men have had a hundred homes in their lifetime and have left no permanent record of their identity in any one place.

The changing of abiding places, the rush and hurry involved in the struggle to make a living, drive away all thought of kith and kin, so that after two or three generations of

a family in this country, it is not unfrequently the case that the members of the fourth generation know absolutely nothing of their ancestors.

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, refering to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transfered to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht-& Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon and was private, the interment taking place at Oakwood cemetary.

Nellie, daughter of Mr and Mrs Herbert COWAN, died yesterday morning of tubercular meningitis, aged 2 years. The funeral will take place at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the residence, 816 Granger street, north.

The 11-years-old son of Anthony PIEMO, residing at 330 Eddy street, fell from a tramway at the mill of C S Bliss & Co, Carrollton, yesterday morning, striking on his head and back with considerable force. He was taken to his home by Mr BLISS and medical assistance summoned. Although his injuries are serious they are not necessarily fatal unless he has suffered internal injuries.

A few days ago Bertha BOHM made complaint before Justice BULGER charging Henry BLOHM with bastardy. The case was settled, however, Wednesday evening by the justice performing the marriage ceremony for the parties.

About 2 o'clock yesterday morning Officer O'HAGEN discovered a fire at the corner of Ames and Bond streets and turned in an alarm from box 125. The fire proved to be in a shed filled with hats (?) situated in rear of John OTTO's residence. Although the shed was in close proximity to three houses, the timely arrival of the fire department prevented its spreading. The damage was about \$40, and the fire is believed to be the work of an incendiary.
