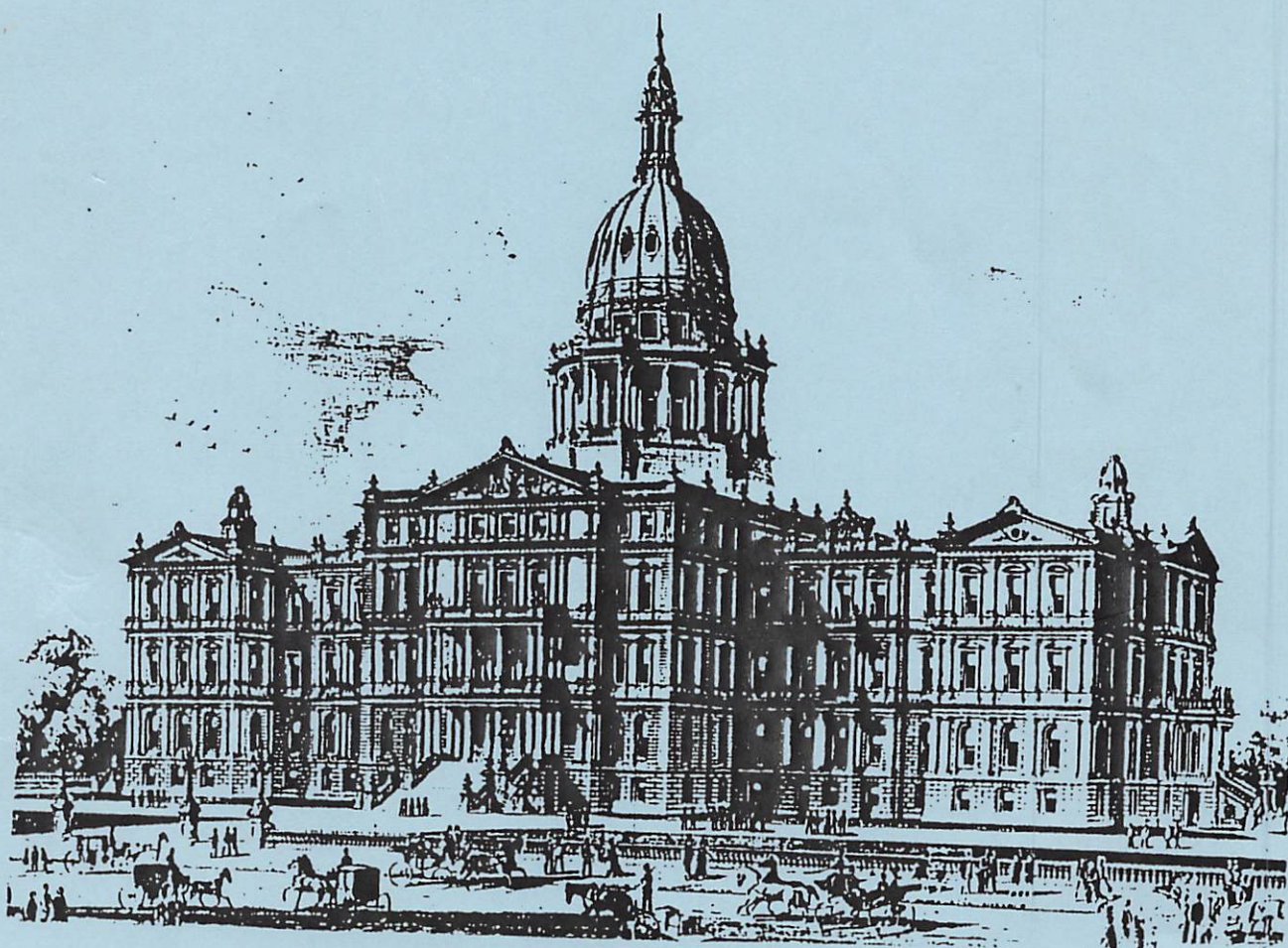

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AN INTERESTING BIT OF HISTORY

BACKWOODSMAN CAPTURED FORT WITHOUT SHOOTING.

The officers of the British fort at Kaskaskia, in Illinois, were giving a dance, and many of the townspeople were there. It was during the Revolutionary War, but the fort at Kaskaskia was on the far western frontier of the colonies. The British felt that there was no danger of any part of the armies of the United Colonies coming that far.

While the music was playing gaily, the door opened quietly and a backwoodsman, in torn and ragged clothes, caked with mud, stepped in. He stood watching the British officers in their fine uniforms as they danced merrily.

An old Indian was sitting by the doorway. He, too, was watching the dancing. Suddenly he looked up and saw the stranger. He gave a loud, piercing yell.

The music stopped. Faces turned white. The officers reached for their swords. But the backwoodsman in the doorway stood quietly smiling. He waved his hand for silence. "There is no danger," he said with dignity. "Go on with your fun. Only remember that you are now dancing under the flag of Virginia, and not that of England."

The backwoodsman was the brave George Rogers Clark, born on November 19th, who had led his men through the forest from Virginia and had surrounded the town while no one knew he was anywhere near. George Rogers Clark and his men captured the northwest country from the British, and secured it for the United States in the Revolutionary War.

DEATH OF A HEROINE

MRS. ROHER, NEE MISS ABIGAIL BECKER - KNOWN TO MANY SAGINAWIANS DEAD

Mrs. Roher, nee Miss Abigail Becker, who is known to many Saginawians and especially the many lake men passed away last week. The Woodstock, Ont., paper in speaking of her said:

"There died on Wednesday at her late home in Walsingham Center, Mrs. Roher, familiarly known as Abigail Becker, the heroine of Long Pointe. She it was who on a cold stormy wintry night in November, 1854, risked her life to save Captain Packett and crew of the three-masted schooner, Conductor, which was wrecked on Long Pointe. For her bravery and untiring efforts in saving the crew the government gave her a farm of one hundred acres, and a purse of one thousand dollars was given her by Buffalo ship owners. The New York Life Saving association decorated her with a handsome gold medal, and with modest pride she displayed the medal up to the very last. She also received letters from our late beloved Queen Victoria, also one from Lord Aberdeen. She leaves a sorrowing husband and family."

**TOWN OF BRIDGEPORT IS ONE OF THE OLDEST IN SAGINAW COUNTY,
FIRST SETTLERS COMING IN 1835 - FORMERLY CASS BEND**

**Organized as Township in 1848 -
Supervisors Ordered Building of Road From Cass Bridge to County Line in 1847.**

Fourteenth of a series of articles in the Saturday News telling of places in the vicinity of Saginaw.

The Town of Bridgeport is one of the oldest in Saginaw County, the first settlers having come to that place about the year 1835, though the exact date is somewhat uncertain. Auri Campbell was the first white man to settle at Bridgeport and he built the first house in the township, a log structure somewhere near the present town, though its exact site is not known. Shortly afterward in 1836 a man named Campbell built the second house.

What is now Bridgeport was first called "The Bend of the Cass: or "Cass Bend," owing to the fact that the Cass river makes a sharp bend at the site of the village on the spot now known as "Cass Bridge." Lilly Cook had started a village which he called "Bridgeport" because of the fact that it was the point where the Flint trail crossed the Cass River. Cook built this village with the intention of making it the chief place in the township and a hotel and post office were established, continuing for a number of years.

A man named Lull had, however, settled at "Cass Bend," the present site of Bridgeport and had also built a hotel which he called the "Bridgeport Center House." His settlement gradually became known at Bridgeport while the other town was called "Cass Bridge."

For 20 years, from 1848 to 1868, there is little information available regarding Bridgeport. All of the records of that time have disappeared, no one knows where, so that only the general outlines of the town's history during that period can be secured.

Bridgeport was organized as a township in 1848, the first election being on April 4 of that year, the ballot box used was a small hand box or trunk, being up to a short time ago, a valued relic owned by the descendants of one of the original settlers of that time.

In 1847 the supervisors ordered the building of a road from the Cass bridge to the county line, and this turnpike, connecting with one already extending to Flint, gave Bridgeport its first road which naturally greatly stimulated its growth.

The first saw mill was built in 1849 and was followed in 1856 by another. About this time there were built a number of shingle mills which for a number of years prospered greatly and Bridgeport shingles became widely known through the state, being of excellent quality and of extremely long life. It is indeed said that there are at the present time houses in Saginaw which have upon their roofs Bridgeport shingles made during these early days of the lumbering.

Salt Well Abandoned.

At one time a salt well was bored in Bridgeport and the indications were that this would prove a great success, brine of excellent quality having been found, but for some reason or other, after the plant for the making of the salt had been completed, the builder abandoned it and no further steps were ever taken to develop this one of the town's natural resources. There has been at various times a story of extensive coal deposits under Bridgeport, but no one ever saw fit to investigate these statements fully and nothing approach active mining operations ever was started.

With the building of the electric line between Flint and Saginaw the town for a time took a new lease of life. The railroad came after many bitter fights and a large power house was built at Bridgeport which brought a number of families to the town. With the completion of the Au Sable project, however, this plant was dismantled and the men left town.

Typical Country Village.

The village of Bridgeport, because of its nearness to Saginaw has for many years been the Mecca of Saginaw people wishing to get away from the city and into the real country. Though so near to Saginaw, being only 6 miles from the city, it is as typical a country village as can be found and this fact combined with the ease with which it can be reached has made it an ideal spot for picnics, many Saginaw people taking advantage of its natural beauties every summer.

The Cass river flows through the town and on the banks of this stream there is to be found much beautiful scenery. During the past few years, however, the cultivation of the land and the general development of the district has somewhat encroached on the former haunts of the picnickers and has in part forced them to seek other places.

Bridgeport is located on the main road between Saginaw to Flint, Genesee avenue, about six miles from Saginaw. It is a town of about 300 inhabitants and has the service of two railroads, the Pere Marquette and the Michigan Railway company's interurban lines.

The proximity of Bridgeport to Saginaw has largely removed the necessity of stores and other business establishments, the residents being accustomed to coming to Saginaw for such goods as they require.

There are a good many retired farmers in the village who have made comfortable competences during their active farming days and they have some excellent residences and form an important part of the population.

ON CAR OF LOGS AND ROLLS
BENEATH WHEELS**

**Pere Marquette Conductor Victim
Of Serious Accident in Yard at Coleman
Yesterday Afternoon**

Richard WIGGLESWORTH of Saginaw, conductor on P M local No 70, running between Saginaw and Ludington, fell beneath a moving freight car in the yard at Coleman yesterday afternoon and had both legs cut off just above the ankles. Just how the accident happened is unknown. He was on a car of logs which were covered with sleet, as it was raining at the time. It is supposed he slipped and lost his balance and probably fell in front of the car

He was removed to a near by doctor's office and given what treatment could be administered. Doubts are entertained as to his recovery, as he seems to be unable to rally from the shock

Richard WIGGLESWORTH lives with his family at 1102 Johnson street. He is well known and liked among local railroad men and the news of his misfortune is received with regret by all.

William MYERS for vagrancy was given a half hour to get out of the city

Mary LIMBACHER was born in the province of Bavaria, Germany, August 17, 1847 and with her grandfather came to America in 1865, settling at once in Saginaw where she had since resided.

She was married to the late Francis ECARIUS in 1866 by the late Pastor EBERHARDT. Mr ECARIUS died June 23, 1903. His widow was the mother of 18 children, ten of whom, five sons and five daughters, survive. They are Mrs Henry BLOHM and Henry ECARIUS of Flint, Mrs H F BALESKY of Birch Run, John ECARIUS of Ann Arbor, Edward ECARIUS of Jackson, August and Will ECARIUS, Mrs Garney LaFLEUR, Mrs Burt CLEMENTS, and Miss Emma ECARIUS OF Saginaw. There are also 22 grandchildren and five great grandchildren..

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett) . If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

**TWO DEAD AND THIRD
RECEIVED INJURIES THAT
MAY BE FATAL**

Smoke Stack Being Erected at Strable
Manufacturing Plant, by Force From Wickes
Bros, Fell Saturday Morning

Edward Popielarz Was Instantly Killed,
Frank Lakony and Tony Schwankowsky
Taken to St Mary's Hospital, Where the
Later Died from Injuries—
Accident Due to Breaking of Cable

Above is the fatality list in a deplorable accident that occurred Saturday morning at the Strable Manufacturing plant, in course of erection on Holland avenue. A smokestack was being installed over the boiler room, and the three men named, employes of Wickes Bros were doing the work. Everything was progressing satisfactorily, and workmen on the ground were watching the work of the men engaged in the erection of the massive pipe when there was a snapping sound heard, one of the guy ropes almost as large as a ship's cable parted, and in an instant, and almost before the men about the grounds could get from under there was a terrible smash, and the mass of iron had fallen, carrying with it the men engaged in the work

Was Instantly Killed

POPIELARZ was instantly killed, his skull and face being horribly battered, and his spine being broken. He was in life a powerful man, and as he laid on the floor of

the office building adjacent to the scene of the accident, he presented a piteous sight

LAKONY and SCHWANKOWSKY were also badly battered; they both bled freely and both were unconscious. Drs Fred W FREEMAN and C W ELLIS, who were quickly summoned by the management, ordered the removal of the men to St Mary's hospital, and while not committing themselves under the hurried conditions to a definite opinion, gave very little hope. It was believed that in each case a fracture of the skull had taken place, and while the men gave signs of life, they were absolutely unconscious

Story of the Accident

According to the story told by witnesses of the tragedy the men working under the direction of SCHWANKOWSKY, a foreman, were inside the big pipe, riveting it in sections as the work of erection progressed. The foreman was outside in a little cage, suspended by ropes and where he could handily superintend the job. At the time of the crash all three men were considerably over 100 feet in the air, and they came down with horrible impact against the earth, being also battered and wounded by the massive iron

There is quite a large force of men engaged in working about the premises, which are situated out on Holland avenue, not far from the Genesee avenue corner, and it is a wonder that more were not killed or injured. It was one of those accidents which happen, as it is said, in "the twinkling of an eye," there was no possibility of escape, and the mercy of the situation was that the men who were not killed outright had relief from suffering in blessed unconsciousness

Officers On Hand At Once

In behalf of the police department Lieut Parker OWEN went at once to the scene of the tragedy, and Coroner CONNERY was also quickly on hand. In the meantime an

immense crowd of spectators had gathered, women and children composing the majority, for the story had spread through the neighborhood that many of those engaged about the works had been killed or injured. Wives and children, mothers and friends, came out in large numbers, and the scene was one not easily to be forgotten, so great was the anxiety and interest manifested. The management and employees of the company did everything in their power to allay anxiety and to give information, so that order was speedily produced out of what threatened in its early stages to be a panic

Of the men little is known, excepting that they were good workmen, experts in their own line, and well liked by those who knew them. LAKONY had been married about two months, and the utmost care was shown in notifying his wife, representatives of Wickes Bros being on hand promptly and seeing to it that the proper parties were sent to the unfortunate man's home to break the news

Coroner's Jury Impanelled

Dr CONNERY impanelled the following jury for the inquest: Walter R RANDALL, Peter C SEYMOUR, G DIEDRICH, Shepard W SHEPARD, P H LEE and Daniel KEPPLER. The jurymen viewed the remains of the dead, and the inquest was adjourned until Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock, to take place at Central police station

Schwankowsky Died

Anthony SCHWANKOWSKY died at St Mary's hospital about 11 o'clock. He never had any possible chance for his life after the accident, as was easily recognized, so terrible were his injuries. He was taken to St Mary's in care of Dr W F ENGLISH, who was first of the city's medical men to arrive upon the scene, and who bound up the man's wounded head before he was carried away in the ambulance

SCHWANKOWSKY was a married man, his home being at 502 Perkins street, Buena Vista. He was only 23 years of age, and was known as an industrious and highly intelligent workingman. His wife, mother and sister were with him at the hour of death, he remaining unconscious from the time of the accident until his passing. Shortly after death had occurred his father-in-law arrived at the hospital and it was with a great deal of difficulty he was convinced the young man was dead

Lakony at Point of Death

Frank LAKONY as last reports was lying at the point of death. He is unconscious, though apparently suffering great agony. LAKONY is a young man also, living on Twelfth street, and has only been in the country since last March. His age is given as 27, and as already stated, he has only been married two months

There is no doubt that the high wind prevailing had its influence in bringing about the regrettable accident. It was noticed on Thanksgiving day by passers-by that the work of erecting the smokestack was in progress, and those unfamiliar with that kind of work shuddered at the apparent risk of life and limb. A great strain existed on the ropes sustaining and supporting the stack, and unquestionably the swaying resulted in finding the weak spot in the guy that parted. It would seem from all that can be learned to have been one of those accidents which, while always deplorable, yet can scarcely be provided against by human precaution

LAKONY STILL LIVES

Third Victim of Saturday's
Accident Shows Slight
Signs of Improvement

Reports from St Mary's hospital Monday afternoon were to the effect that Frank LAKONY, the survivor of the three men so badly hurt by the falling of the big smokestack being erected at the plant of the Strable Manufacturing company on Holland Avenue Saturday morning was still alive. He has partially regained consciousness and there are hopes for his recovery as he shows some slight signs of improvement. An operation was performed on LAKONY Saturday night with a view to relieving pressure on the brain and although the man shows some signs of a bettered condition his recovery is a matter of extreme doubt.

Funeral of Ignatz Popleiarz

Funeral services for the late Ignatz POPIELARZ took place Monday morning at 9 o'clock from Holy Rosary church. Rev Fr LIPINSKI officiating. The church was filled with Polish friends and others, who attended to show their respect and sympathy for their friend who met such untimely fate. The following are those who acted as pallbearers: John PAK, John GOMY, Jack BAK, John PIECZAK, Anton BOCLAN, Anton PIECZAK. The funeral was under the auspices of St Joseph's Polish Benefit society, of which deceased was a member. Interment was made in Calvary cemetery.

Ignatz POPIELARZ was born in Germany July 24th, 1887, and came to Saginaw with his parents fifteen years ago. He was employed at Wickes Bros plant as helper in the boiler shops and had held that position four months. He is survived by his parents, Mr and Mrs Anton POPIELARZ, three sisters, Mrs Peter DUDEWICZ, South Saginaw, and Helen and Tillie, who reside at the family home.

The funeral was one of the largest that has ever been given to a Pole in Saginaw, and the attendance and lovely floral tributes attested where words failed, to the esteem and sympathetic regard which a host of friends and acquaintances had for the deceased

Funeral services for the late Anthony SRAMKOSKI will be held from Holy Rosary church Tuesday at 8 am. Rev Fr LIPINSKI officiating

ACCIDENTAL DEATH WAS THE VERDICT

Given At Inquest Into Deaths
Of Men Killed Saturday
On Holland Avenue

"Accidentally killed" was the verdict rendered Tuesday morning by the coroner's jury, called to inquire into the deaths of Edward POPIELARZ and Anthony SRAMKOWSKI, victims of the accident which occurred Saturday morning at the Strable Manufacturing plant on Holland avenue

From the testimony of witnesses it appeared that the tragedy was due to the fact that the smokestack, swayed by a high wind prevailing, and not sufficiently guyed above, pulled out its supports and the fall occurred

Dr W S CONNERY held the inquest, and the witnesses examined were George F SMITH, James CARNEY and Joseph CONNELLY, who had been working on a scaffold within 25 feet of the stack. They each saw it fall, rushed to get the men out from inside and to give such other help as they could

John GIFFEL worked near the stack and heard some one call, when he turned around

and saw the finish of the fall, also giving such help as he could

A E BRAUN, employed by Wickes Bros, testified that as far as he knew the men employed on the erection of the stack were competent. Harry DERHAMMER gave unimportant evidence

Then the witnesses were recalled and they attributed the cause of the accident to the breaking of a 2x4 scantling, around which the guy, some twenty feet from the ground had been looped in a double loop, the ends passing on to a stake. The men were at work over 40 feet above this guy rope. One witness, CLARK, testified to calling the attention of the foreman to the necessity of placing his main guy, higher up, and had received the reply that he would do so as soon as two additional pieces of the stack were placed in position. Then the verdict as noted was recorded.
