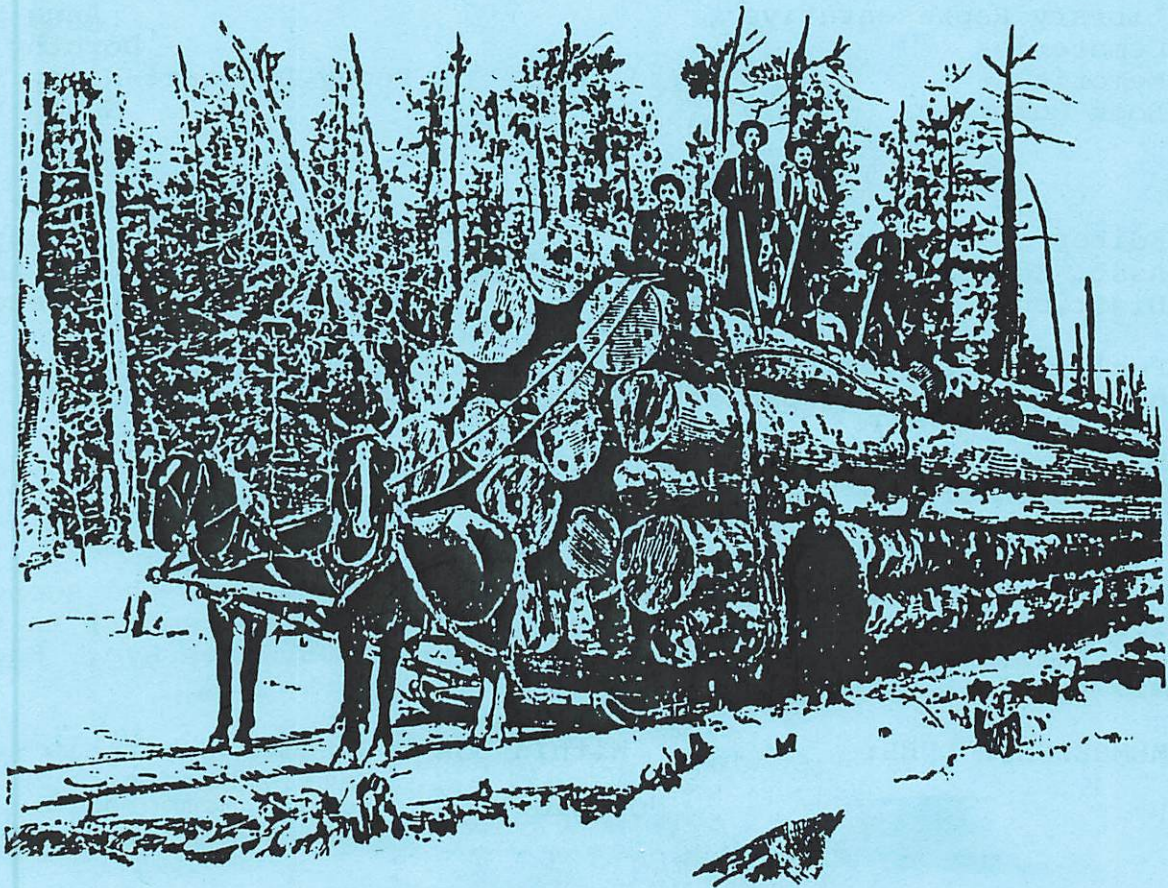

AMERICAN REVOLUTION BOOKS ON REVIEW

REVOLUTIONARY WAR BOUNTY GRANTS AWARDED BY STATE GOVERNMENTS. By Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck. 608 pages. In the introduction of this book the author gives a history of the policies of the various states that gave bounty lands as awards to veterans. The book contains an alphabetical listing of the veterans, and lists the state granting the bounty land, as well as the date and number of acres. The rank of the veteran is also given. A separate index lists the heirs of deceased claimants.

SPAIN'S ARIZONA PATRIOTS IN ITS 1779-1783 WAR WITH ENGLAND DURING THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION. By Granville W. and N. C. Hough. This is the third in a series of studies that explore what the Spanish colonists did to help the American colonies during the American Revolution and why patriot organizations should recognize their service and admit their descendants to such organizations. Lists of families and persons who contributed in the efforts to fight the British during that period are given. Also included are persons who may have made a difference in the colonists fight for independence. A list of book references is included in this work. The fourth part of the series focuses on New Mexico. Texas is studied in part five, and Spanish Louisiana patriots are included in part six.

GENERAL ORDERS, RHODE ISLAND DECEMBER 1776-JANUARY 1778. By Don N. Hagist. 139 pages. This little booklet gives a history of two years during the Revolutionary period of Rhode Island and is based on information taken from orderly books in the British Public Record Office. An appendix gives a list and accounting of British courts martial, while another appendix focuses on the capture of British General Prescott. A five-page index includes names and subjects.

BRUNSWICK TROOPS IN NORTH AMERICA 1776-1783: INDEX OF ALL SOLDIERS WHO REMAINED IN NORTH AMERICA. By Claus Reuter. 94 pages. This book lists in columns the names, place of birth, age or year of birth. The regiment or unit is given as well as rank. Noted are those who settled in Canada after the Revolution, and places in the states are also listed. A short history of the financial arrangements for sending troops from the Duchy of Brunswick to aid the British is given at the start of the book.

REVOLUTIONARY WAR VETERANS CHENANGO COUNTY NEW YORK. In Four Volumes. By Nelson B. Tiffany. 1225 pages. Each volume covers a different part of the alphabet. Information about Chenango County, the history of legislation pertaining to military pensions, and a list of Revolutionary battles precedes the alphabetical listings. A complete veteran list with a page number (which is actually the record number and not the page number) also precedes the actual entries. Within each record there is information on place of enlistment, regiments of service, family data, and burial location. The information contained in the four volume set was taken from DAR files, cemetery records, surrogate court records, as well as family genealogies. Pension records and family migration routes also provide valuable genealogical clues.



SCOTTISH BOOKS ON REVIEW

THE JACOBITES OF ANGUS 1689-1746. Part 1 & 2. By David Dobson. 49 pages. This book contains a list of the supporters of the House of Stuart monarchy. The first part covers A-L, and part two contains the lists from M-Z. Prisoners and soldiers are included in these lists along with an abbreviation indicating the reference sources.

SCOTS IN POLAND, RUSSIA AND THE BALTIC STATES 1550-1850. By David Dobson. 169 pages. This book chronicles the emigration from Scotland to eastern Europe. This alphabetical listing gives information about the occupation, date of emigration, or other records pertaining to Scottish persons in foreign lands. A reference source for the entry is given. This emigration from Scotland was the result of economic hardships. Eventually some of these migrants went back to Scotland and they or their descendants may have emigrated to America. Those who remained in eastern Europe may also have left descendants who later came to America. The reference sources provide insight into various types of records available for genealogical research.

AN ORDINARY OF ARMS CONTAINED IN THE PUBLIC REGISTER OF ALL ARMS AND BEARINGS IN SCOTLAND. 2nd Edition. By Sir James Balfour Paul. 429 pages. This is a reprint of a book originally published in Edinburgh in 1903. The introduction gives information about heraldry in Scottish history and explains that there may be variations in surname spellings. There is an index at the end of the book which gives names with the common spellings used at the time of original publication. There are no pictures in this work, only textual descriptions of what types of figures were used in Scottish Heraldic Arms, such as Axes, Bars, Chevrons, Lions Rampant, Spears, Trees. These figures are in alphabetical order. The entry then gives examples of which family arms contained these particular figures. The index is the only way to access surnames or families in this work.

THE PEERAGE OF SCOTLAND....339 pages. Originally published in 1767 in London, the 1995 edition published by Heritage Books, Inc. is a facsimile reproduction complete with the old style of lettering which may be difficult for some to decipher. Some of the family coats of arms are pictured in the beginning of the book. A history of over 100 titled families is given. Clues to the relationships of these titled families may also be found, as well as a list of those peerages that were already extinct at the time of original publication. There is a two page index at the end.

SELECTIONS FROM THE JUDICIAL RECORDS OF RENFREWSHIRE...2nd Series. By William Hector, Sheriff-Clerk. This compilation of records was originally published in 1878. The author-compiler of this work was appalled at the condition of various records in the Records Offices and set out to publish the information for public reference. The subscription series was a success and a second series was published. This particular volume lists freeholders and parliamentary representatives of Renfrewshire. One section deals with Renfrew families and estates. Information about county courts, social conditions, and miscellaneous town history is given. A name and subject index, as well as a list of subscribers is noted at the end of the work. A companion volume was also reprinted by Heritage Books, Inc. and entitled **FURTHER SELECTIONS FROM THE JUDICIAL RECORDS OF RENFREWSHIRE.** Originally from 1876 this volume gives further information about the record rooms and their contents.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday morning at Holy Rosary church at 9 o'clock. Rev Fr LIPINSKI officiating. Interment will be at Calvary Cemetery.

According to a telephone message received by The News, Mrs Otto ALBRIHT, 140 Wipplinger street, missing since Sept 1, has been found with Bay City friends. This is the case referred to in Monday's News. No information has reached police headquarters about the affair, as far as can at present be ascertained. It is something of a coincidence that the fire mentioned elsewhere occurred at the home of Mrs ALBRIGHT, 140 Wipplinger street.

Another extensive list of civil service examinations are to be held Sept 26 at the Federal building and will be for the following positions: Mechanical engineer, salaries from \$900 to \$1,200; steam and electrical engineers; pack master, a unique position draws a salary of \$540 per annum and rations, the service being in Arizona. Another position, that of artist for the hygiene laboratory, public health and marine hospital service, the salary being \$1,400 per annum. The work is the illustrating of pathological, anatomical and zoological specimens. Wagon service for Fort Sam Houston, Texas, commands a salary of \$900 per annum. Interpreter Spanish and Syrian

for the immigration service commands a salary of \$1,200 per annum, with service at Laredo, Texas. The scientific assistants in analytical chemistry and scientific assistant in plant pathology draw \$1,200 and \$1,000 per annum.

A statement sent out from Lansing is to the effect that the primary money is apportioned this fall at the rate of 1.78 per capita. Saginaw county is entitled to money on 26,229 children, and will accordingly receive \$46,687.62. The total amount distributed in the state is \$1,321,375.24

E Everett COPPERTHWAIT, who served as pastor of the Church of Christ in 1903, leaving this city to establish a work in Wilkesbarre, Pa, closes his work there with this month and will take a much needed rest. He leaves Wilkesbarre with a good congregation now ready for a building enterprise already under way

Union evangelistic meetings, participated in by the teachers of the North End and West Side, were begun Sunday evening, and are being held this week at the Ames ME church in Hanchett street. Preaching services are

held every evening this week except Saturday. The public generally is cordially invited to attend the meetings

A car will be placed at Bridgeport this afternoon ready to be loaded tomorrow with grain and provisions for the fire sufferers in the north. Many around Bridgeport have asked to have a car loaded there. It is requested that all contribute and fill the car as quickly as possible. Now is the best time to ship these articles before the freeze-up

Gentlemen's—First, Neil GIRMUS; second, Herman PETERS; third, Richard BEARDSLEY. After supper games and dancing were indulged in. All had an enjoyable time

A horse belonging to Herman ZOLENSKI who resides outside of the city limits, broke out of the stall Sunday afternoon and, wandering towards town on Wadsworth street, became frightened at a freight engine leaving the city with a string of cars on the Pere Marquette. The animal took to the track ahead of the train and put up a very spirited race for a quarter of a mile and finally escaped injury by jumping into a bank of snow, from which it was rescued shortly afterward by its owner

Mrs W E BROWN fell on the slippery sidewalk at the northwest corner of Washington and Germania avenues Sunday evening and sustained a dislocation of the hip. She was taken to her home on North Bond street and the injury treated. It will be several weeks before she will be able to be out. The place where the accident occurred

is one of the most treacherous in the city, the warm basement extending under the sidewalk furnishing sufficient warmth to melt any snow falling on the sidewalk and causing it to be extremely slippery.

He served three months and seventeen days and was transferred to the Sixth Michigan cavalry in which he served three years and eighteen days. At the close of the war he came to Saginaw and was married to Miss Eliza JOHNSON in 1868. Mr FELLOWS was employed for many years as conductor on the old City of Saginaw street railway. He served two terms as alderman for the old City of Saginaw. He was a member of Camp Sherman, NLVS. He leaves his wife and two sons and one daughter, Leo and Giles, Jr, and Miss Amelia, all of Saginaw; four brothers, Louis and Albert of California; George of Duluth and Edward of Saginaw.

DIETLEIN—Peter DIETLEIN died at St Mary's hospital last evening. Mr DIETLEIN was a market gardner and would have been 67 years old next month. He leaves a wife but no children.

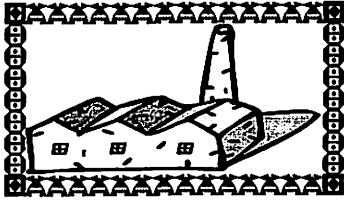

**Office of the Saginaw Salt Manufacturing Co.
Saginaw City March 2nd A.D. 1860**

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Directors of the Saginaw Salt Manufacturing Co. held March 2, AD 1860. Present Geo. W. Bullock President, Messrs. Andre, Binder, Barnard, Williams and Little. Minutes of the previous meeting read and approved.

The Committee appointed March 1st 1860 to confer with H. L. Miller on the subject of a location for said company made a report in writing which a motion was accepted and the committee discharged.

On motion of Director Barnard (2) that the proposition of H. L. Miller which is as follows, "First of all and without any departure therefrom I reserve sixty feet in width following the channel of the Bayou the entire distance of the width of the farm."

"Above the burying ground (3) fence I will measure two acres of ground commencing at a point some two or three rods from the S.W. corner thereof toward the river bounded on the east by the line of the reserve above named. This amount of land I will donate to the company. On the river bank on the north line of the farm I reserve sixty feet for my own use. Above that sixty feet I will sell to the company five hundred feet front on the river extending back to the line of the first named reserve for one thousand dollars stock in the company full paid not subject to any assessments or the payment of debts. The whole conditioned that the company shall be successful and shall use the lands herein offered to be given and sold for purposes connected with the salt manufacturing of the company. In case of failure in finding salt and the abandonment of the company of the salt business the land in both cases that of gift and sale to revert to me, my heirs or assigns 'Signed' H. L. Miller" be accepted. The same was adopted by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors.

On motion it was resolved that Timothy Jerome be and he is hereby authorized to surrender the eighty shares of stock originally subscribed by him to this company and further that he be and is hereby released from all assessments thereon.

On motion resolved that the office of the Saginaw Salt Manufacturing Company be until further ordered at the office of Charles D. Little (4) in Saginaw City. On motion the Board adjourned until March 6th A.D. 1860 at 7 o'clock PM.

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

PASSAGE TO AMERICA 1851-1869: THE RECORDS OF RICHARD ELLIOTT, PASSENGER AGENT, DETROIT, MICHIGAN by Mary Lou Straith Duncan. (R 929.3 M582)

Richard Elliott established the Irish Emigrant Society of Detroit in 1847 and had a profound impact on emigrants coming to Michigan. This volume contains lists of emigrants, that includes the date of transaction and account number, name of person paying for the emigrant's ticket, port of departure and destination, passenger's name, numbers for adults, children and totals, ocean fee, inland fee, and gross total cost.

GENEALOGICAL DATA FROM UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY APPLICATION PAPERS 1805-1866, Volume 1 by Lt. Col. Patrick G. Wardell. (R355.07 Wa)

The U.S. Military Academy was established in 1802 to organize a Corps of Engineers. The Corps was stationed at West Point, The Act of 1812 provided that candidates for appointment could not be younger than age 14 or older than age 21, but was revised thereafter to be between 17 and 22 years of age. The data included in this volume can be very helpful to the genealogist as it includes miscellaneous data such as, parents, grandparents and sibling names, residence, employment and military information, etc. A surname index is included, as well as an abbreviation list and a list of applicants for whom no papers have been found.

THEY BUILT RAILWAY CARS: THE PULLMAN SOCIAL EXPERIMENT AND THE SWEDISH IMMIGRATION by Allan T. Nilson. (R929.3 IL6)

A large number of Swedes came to the Chicago area in the 1880's to live in the town of Pullman to work in the factory that produced luxury sleeping cars. This book contains stories and pictures of Swedish immigrants from the Nykyrke Parish in Sweden and a biographical account of the Railroad car magnate George M. Pullman who built the factories and the town. Also included is a list of several hundred names of Emigrants from Nykyrke Parish, 1850-1910, which includes dates of immigration and places of origin.

THE STONES SPEAK: IRISH PLACE NAMES FROM INSCRIPTIONS IN BOSTON'S MOUNT CALVARY CEMETERY by R. Andrew Pierce (R929.3 M382)

A compilation of tombstone readings from a predominately Irish-American cemetery in Boston. Many of the stones are inscribed with the county and sometimes the parish or town of birth. Included in this volume is an Index of Persons and an Index of Places.

CONFEDERATE CEMETERIES, VOLUME 1 by Mark Hughes. (R 973.7 Hu)
Genealogists with Southern roots should scan through this list of cemeteries containing the names of Confederate Civil War soldiers and civilians who were killed as a result of the Civil War. Included is an alphabetical index that gives the name, the soldier's company and regiment, date of death and a code for the cemetery. Another section gives a description of the cemetery and where it is located. Section I contains an interesting overview about burying the Confederate dead.

ONCE UPON AN ISLE: THE STORY OF FISHING FAMILIES ON ISLE ROYALE by Howard Sivertson. (R977.4997 Si Michigan Room)
This book depicts the every day life of fishing families on the alluring Isle Royale in Lake Superior. The first section includes a pictorial history of the Island, followed by beautiful paintings and companion stories that capture the experience of life on the Island. This book would make a great gift for anyone interested in the Great Lakes or Michigan's history!

MANITOBA SCRIP by Gail Morin. (R929.3 M314)
The Manitoba Scrip was issued to the Metis Tribal Nation, half-breeds and all original white settlers of Manitoba beginning in June 1875 until the early 1880's. Information on the application included: name, date and place of birth, spouse's name, and race or national origin of parents. Information about original white settlers (between 1813 and 1835) and their descendants includes nation of origin and date of arrival in the Red River Country. The majority of settlers came from French Canada, Scotland and England. Listed alphabetically by surname.

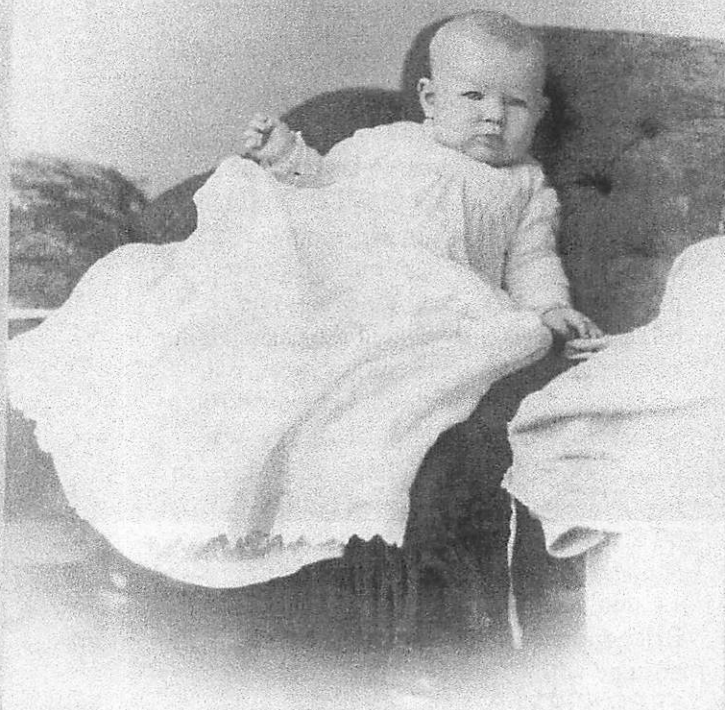

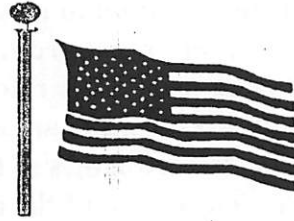

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.Kdl, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett) . If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

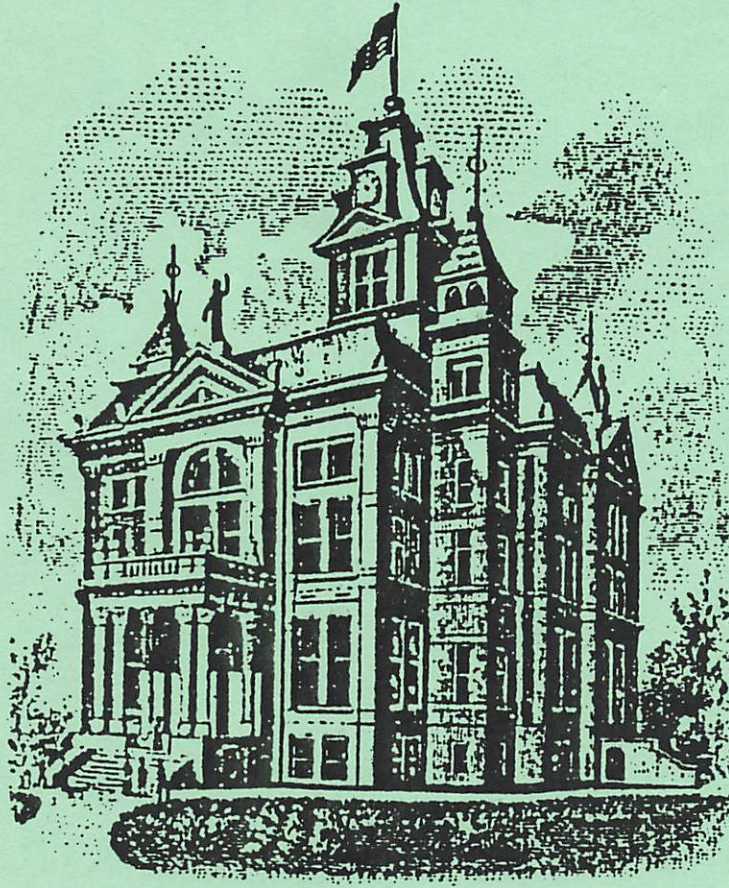

JACQUES CAUCHOS,
BENJAMIN CUSHWAY,
AND
THE EARLY FRENCH OF
THE SAGINAW VALLEY

THE FRENCH LEGACY

Oftentimes we think of Saginaw's history starting with the Treaty of 1819. But long before that, during the 1700's Saginaw had a transient French population. From the written and archaeological record we know that there were Native-American communities at Bay City and Saginaw's Greenpoint. At these locations, no doubt, the early French could be found living among the Native population.

During the 1740's the French gave a medal to a Saginaw Ottawa, Achouabeme, whom they called a "good Frenchman" for his help in turning over the murderers of three Frenchmen. Achouabeme was possibly still living in 1765 as we find a similarly-named person receiving gifts from a member of the Marsac family acting on behalf of the British Indian Agent Sir William Johnson of Albany.

About 1742 Augustin Amiot was appointed blacksmith for the Saginaw Ottawa. His father, Jean Baptiste Amiot was the blacksmith at Mackinac. A Frenchman named Celeron, Sieur de Blainville, spent the winter at Saginaw in 1741.

From published reports and translated documents, we know that in 1755 there were French who returned to Michilimackinac from Saginaw. And in 1759 Commandant Bellestre of Detroit waited at Saginaw for orders from Pouchot who was commander at Niagara. Bellestre had gathered the Saginaw Ottawa with the intent of helping the French and Native-American forces at Niagara. Pouchot later surrendered Fort Niagara, and Bellestre surrendered at Detroit.

Even though the French & Indian War was fought elsewhere, there was much political intrigue in the Saginaw Valley. The battle that was being fought in the Saginaw area was the one being waged by the French and British over the allegiance of the Saginaw Native community. Even after the British victory and the Treaty of Paris in 1763, the British were not happy about the French who still wintered at Saginaw. And the Saginaw native community supported Pontiac's uprising.

In 1762 Theresa Sanspeur was born at Saginaw and baptized at Mackinaw just one week before Pontiac's uprising. In 1766 Jean Baptist Brilliant dit Beaulieu and his Chippewa wife, Francoise Itagisse wintered at Saginaw. Jean Baptiste was a doctor and was in the French Colonial militia. He was married at the Sault in 1752. One of their daughters was born at Saginaw and baptized later at Detroit. By the time Benjamin Cushway was appointed blacksmith to the Chippewa in the 1830's his family had already made an impact on the Saginaw Valley. It turns out that Benjamin Cushway was the great-grandson of Jean Baptiste Brilliant and his Chippewa wife. And we know that there was a Jean Baptiste Cushway in the Saginaw Valley in the late 1700's. This was probably a cousin.

CUSHWAY HOME & ANCESTRY



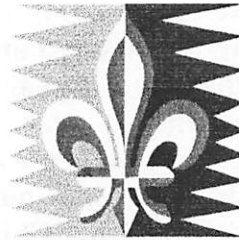
Residents of Saginaw may already know that the home of Benjamin Cushway has been moved to Rust Park and is being preserved by the Saginaw Valley Historical Preservation Society. Members of the preservation group have added new data to the story of Benjamin Cushway's family and their role in the exploration of the Great Lakes and Mississippi River Basin.

Not only was Benjamin Cushway the descendant of an early inhabitant of the Saginaw Valley, but we have found that he was also a descendant of an early French explorer, Jacques Cauchois.

Jacques Cauchois was born in Rouen, France in 1652. He was married at Montreal in 1683. Before his marriage Jacques Cauchois was one of those who accompanied LaSalle on his voyage of exploration to the Mississippi River in 1682. On April 9, 1682 Jacques Cauchois was with LaSalle when LaSalle placed a metal plaque declaring Louisiana to be French Territory and taking possession in the name of Louis XIV. Pierre Prudhomme, the gunsmith, was to become the future brother-in-law of Jacques Cauchois started out with the group, but didn't finish the trip. He was left behind at a place which was called "Fort Prudhomme. In a book called "Chapters in Illinois History" it was reported that when LaSalle needed a surgeon, it was Jacques Cauchois who traveled downstream to intercept the rear party and tied a message to a tree. In June 1682 Henry Tonty left LaSalle's party accompanied by three Frenchmen and an Indian. One of the Frenchmen was Jacques Cauchois. Tonty was supposedly back at Michilimackinac by September 1682. And in October 1682 business was conducted in Jacques Cauchois' name in the amount of 2633 livres and 15 sous. This business transaction was in some way connected to LaSalle's endeavors.

Jacques Cauchois dit Duclos was back in Montreal by December 22, 1683 where he married Elisabeth Prudhomme. He was listed as a merchant. In 1682 when Cauchois traveled with LaSalle he was 29 years of age. Jean Baptiste, one of the sons of Jacque Cauchois, was born in 1700 and married in 1725. Jette's Dictionary says that in 1726, a year after marriage, Jean Baptiste was hired to go to the west. He was buried in Detroit in 1736.

QUESTIONS



Do we know the names of the Frenchmen murdered by the Saginaw Ottawa and where did these murders take place? Do we know the names of those persons who left Saginaw and went back to Michilimackinac in the 1750's? Perhaps there are discoveries yet to be made about Saginaw's history, and research to be done about the Cauchois (Cushway) family history in the Great Lakes and Saginaw. Someday, hopefully, we will find out more about these early French people who called Saginaw their winter home. It may mean that someone will have to search the Montreal merchant records, or the notary records of Montreal, Quebec City and Three Rivers.

As a doughboy

HORROR REMAINS FOR EIGHT "OLD LIONS"

James A. Allardyce was a member of Co.D, 338th Infantry, 85th Division, during World War I.

"I started a Camp Custer (Fort Custer, Battle Creek recently demobilized as a military installation and now a Job Corps Training Center) and I was mustered out at Camp Custer," he said. "We got it ready for everyone else and about the time it was liveable, we were shipped out," he explained, ruefully voicing an age-old story of solidiers.

He remembers that his outfit left the United States July 13, 1918. "There were 13 boats in the convoy and it took us 13 days to cross," he said. One man had jumped overboard during the crossing. Recently Allardyce met a new neighbor and discovered the neighbor was on that convoy crossing the Atlantic. The man who jumped overboard had been standing next to his new neighbor Allardyce said.

Describing training Allardyce says, "We drilled with imitation rifles. Then finally we had British guns because our factories were not turning out enough weapons yet".

Discussing modes, of transportation at the front 50 years ago, he said, "We traveled by box car and the sign on the side said, "Capacity 40 men or 8 horses", By the smell you knew the box car had been used inexchangeably for both".

Allardyce had come to this country from Scotland with his parents in 1907 when he was 11 years old. He had brothers who fought in Work War I and has a son who is a veteran of World War II. He is a retired General Motors Worker and lives with his wife at 730 Simoneau.

GUERRILLA RAIDS TO TRENCHES

William A. Krause, a winner of the Distinguished Service Cross, enlisted in the National Guard on his birthday in 1916.

"I was single and thought I might as well join with my friends. You know, join the Army, see the world... and all I ever wanted to see after I got there was home."

His outfit was sent to Grayling and from there went to the Mexican Border to stand guard against guerilla raids on the United States.

Krause said many men were held in New Jersey for about a month before going overseas in World War I because of their German descent. Finally he said they let him go because his parents were dead. "Besides I was a first aid man and wouldn't be shooting anyhow."

He recalls the duties of a medical corpsman. "We checked the wounded to determine type of wound and looked for broken bones. We could give hypodermics if necessary. We carried splints but we couldn't set broken bones. First aid stations were right behind the firing line in the field. The men had to walk there if they could. He said he was trained by "a Dr. Passmore here in Saginaw while we were still a national guard outfit."

Krause won't talk much about the action for which he received the DSC - he helped 120 wounded men, pulling them out of no-man's land one at a time.

He commented on food - not very good., on living conditions - "mud up to your knees" on friends - "the best ones you have are those beside you and in front of you".

He said as most do, "night was the worst." The Germans sent up flares. Anybody who tells you he is not afraid is telling you the biggest lie he ever told.

Krause came from Poland to the United States in 1914 when he was twenty years old. He and Mrs. Krause live at 2123 Benjamin, have four children and eight grandchildren.

BARRAGES CAME IN GIANT STEPS

Earl. E. Bartlett spent three years in Co.K, 125th Infantry, 32nd Division. He joined the Army, he said, because he was not working at the time and thought "a little excitement would be a good thing". Of course, I didn't realize just how exciting it would get."

There was not much "going over the top" for Bartlett since his outfit was a part of a holding operation in the trenches of Alsace.

"That was bad enough" he said, recalling giant steps of of rolling barrages approaching the trenches from "Big Berthas" miles behind the German lines.

Men in World War I had little contact with civilians, he said since war was so organized - "the rules said civilians had to be cleared out before the fighting began. Everyone knew where the battlefield was and once cleared out, civilians stayed out".

Bartlett remembers the monotony of most of army life - whether at the front or occupying territory.

"We were often broke. We couldn't go on furlough and we used to do a lot of gambling. We'd bet on anything. That is about all we had for recreation".

Asked about the reasons for wearing leggings with World War I uniforms, he says, "The uniforms weren't very comfortable. I don't know why the leggings... the canvas ones were for every day wear, while the wrapped ones were for dress and were considered a lot spicier".

Mr. & Mrs. Bartlett live at 1040 Hoyt. He is retired.

CARRYING MESSAGES DANGEROUS

Kenneth E. Greenleaf joined the Ypsilanti National Guard when he was 17 after attending Reese High School.

He went overseas with the 107th Field Signal Corps riding motorcycle dispatch during World War I.

"I wanted to go places and I did... and after I got there I would have given anything to be back. Oh, I don't begrudge it. The discipline alone is good

for you." he said.

Greenleaf left high school as a sophomore to join the Army. "When I go back it took me a while to decide to go back to school with those kneepants kids. But I did, and took both my junior and senior years in one. I couldn't have done it without the self-discipline I learned in the Army."

Greenleaf also laid communications lines between trenches as well as between commandposts and described what happened to him as on occasion: "My buddy and I were out trying to find a break in the phone line and were following it along one night when it was so dark upi couldn't see a thing. Well, we were crawling along the line out in the woods. He was ahead of me. Though I couldn't see him, I could hear him. Then I couldn't hear him ... all there was coming back from that darkness ahead was a gurgline noise. It made my hair stand. I started creeping forward again and froze when I touched a hobnail boot. The guy inside the boot was dead and cold, so K knew it couldn't be my buddy. But I could still hear the gurgling. I whispered, "Hey are you alright?" Come to find out he had fallen flat over this dead German. He had been dead a long time and the air literally exploded out of him. It made by buddy sick.

The bid difference Greenleaf said he could see between war then and now is that "the stuff we got now can kill more men faster and get there quicker to do the killing".

Greenleaf is retired and lives at 1810 Carolina and enjoys remodeling his home and carpentering for a hobby.

WINNER OF THE DSC

That haunting phrase, 'It had to be done,' is heard over and over again from veterans of World War I.

Added to that oft-repeated phrase comes another from a man who holds the Distinguished Service Cross and the Croix de Guerre for his action in the battle of Chateau Thierry.

"I didn't even know I had them coming," Harlow B. Emerson said

Ordered to the rear lines because he was severely wounded in the arm and shoulder, Emerson had instead gone the other way.. out into "no-man's land."

Some of his best friends were out there.. one with no face.. the other with no hands...all crying for water. Blanketed by machine gun fire only inches above his body, Emerson crawled to them, gave them water, pulled them to a ditch and gave what first aid he could. When the first-aid men took over, Emerson re-grouped his squad and let them through the woods in pursuit of Germans. Finally he was felled by machine gun bullets in his leg.

Born in Saginaw, Emerson used to fish off the Johnson Street Bridge with a group of his friends.

He joined the army when he was 21 and all the other young men he knew were filled with "patriotic fever". He was overseas about a year... "I know because I spent both birthdays on the water... one going across and one coming home."

He was a member of the 125th Infantry which began operations in Alsace, France... and continued through the Oise Marne, Aise Marne and Chateau Thierry.

Emerson is retired and lives at 3555 Bishop Road, Bridgeport.

AMONG OCCUPATION TROOPS

A member of Co.K, 125th Infantry, 32nd Div., Albert Moore remembers walking for two weeks when the army of occupation crossed the Rhine, Friday, Dec. 13, 1918. "But being in the infantry, I guess you'd expect that."

Moore who had been a billeting sergeant and French interpreter said "I think what impressed me most was when we captured the city of Metz, capital of Lorraine, and I walked through the famous gateway. I had seen it in hundreds of pictures when I was studying history. It's funny you never think you will be in some of those famous places and when you are, it is a thrill."

Moore recalls that he was part of the outfit that captured the ground where Quentin Roosevelt was buried. The Germans had buried the air ace, son of Theodore Roosevelt, in a little plot of ground and had built a fence around it. They had put the landing gear of the wrecked plane at the head of the grave."

Two days before the Armistice, Moore said he came to a farmhouse. Since his shoes were frozen, he took them into the kitchen to thaw them out. There he came face to face with Roy Benway of Saginaw.

We found in waves... five paces between men... 30 paces between lines, and advanced in leap-frog fashion...one line over the other, he said".

"When we stopped at night, we could hear the Germans talking in the trenches ahead," Moore remembers.

He said his outfit paraded for three days when it came home. "We were in Port Huron, Saginaw and Owosso and I finally was mustered out one night at 7:30," he said.

Retire now, Moore lives at 512 Jefferson. Zilwaukee.

STORY ONE OF CONTRASTS

Roy A. Benway had joined the National Guard, enlisting at Detroit. His story is one of contrasts.

An outstanding athlete in school in Saginaw, he played baseball and football in the service from Superior, Wis. to Waco, Tex. But the name of the game changed and at one point in the battle of Chateau-thierry, he was forced to dig carrots out of country gardens in order to have anything to eat.

"Another time, he said, a wagon load of fresh French Bread was delivered to my unit early in the morning and dumped on the ground. When we got to the bottom of the pile we found the bread had been dumped on top of two dead Boche."

He got home without a scratch, he said. "Then playing baseball in Alma 15 months later, I slid into second base and broke my ankle."

He had his fill of war, he said, describing the carnage of men and horses lying half buried and rotting in the fields.

The paradox of building for destruction bothers him. It took the French six years to build the bridge at Chateau-Thierry and it took the Americans only six minutes to blow it up he recalls.

Benway is retired and lives at 335 Hunter.

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: |). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.Kdl, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett) . If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.
