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FIRST WHITE CHILD BORN IN SAGINAW COUNTY DIES AT 85

Mrs Sarah Vinton DICKINSON, 85 years old, the first white child of her sex born in Saginaw county and for all save a few years of her life a resident of this county, died at 3 o'clock last Saturday afternoon in Washington, DC at the home of her daughter, Mrs J W TYLER.

The body arrived in Saginaw Tuesday noon and funeral services will take place at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Frazee undertaking rooms, in charge of Rev N S BRADLEY of the First Congregational church.

Sarah M VINTON was born May 9, 1833 in a log cabin on the banks of the Tittabawassee river on what later came to be known as the McCLELLAN farm. A few years later she moved with her parents, Grosvenor and Harriet Whitney VINTON, to Genesee county, where she was married in 1851 to Samuel J DICKINSON. Immediately after their marriage they came to Saginaw and this city was their home until Mr DICKINSON's death in 1908. Mrs DICKINSON remained here until 1910 when she went to Washington to live with her daughter.

She is survived by one son, William G DICKINSON of Grand Rapids, and one daughter, Mrs J W TYLER of Washington.

WAS FROM SAGINAW
Joseph LaPorte, Who Met with Death
In Canadian Lumber Fields

The Babcygeon (Ont) Independent of last Friday, in its correspondence from Irondale (?) Ont says:

In connection with the discovery of the body of the Frenchman that was found recently in Korgawong, I notice that no description has been given of the man that would enable his relatives to be aware of his death. As far as known here he came from Saginaw Mich, about a year ago and worked for a short time at one of the Howry camps. He remained around here at Mr Hancock's hotel until April last, when he got a job of peeling bark on Kongwong Lake. His name was Joseph Laporte, age about 70 years, he may not have been quite that old, height 5 feet, 11 inches or thereabout, gray hair and whiskers, near

blind in one eye, being hurt with a chip from an axe, both eyes were affected. All that is known of his relatives is that he mentioned having a son in Saginaw, and said he was going to write him for money to take him back. It would no doubt relieve his relatives of anxiety and uncertainty to know of the poor old man's death.

LOUIS LEHAY, PIONEER FISH PEDDLER, DIES

Picturesque Resident, Who Lived
Through Brightest Days of Lumber Industry,
Passes to Great Beyond at 84 Years of Age

Louis LEHAY died Saturday morning at 3 o'clock in St Mary's hospital.

Of worldly goods he had little as possessions are now reckoned but in associations he was rich and his life, if all his many friends were known, was probably as picturesque as any in spite of that it was always obscured by the drab garb of labor.

Louis LEHAY was born in the province of Quebec, Canada, 84 years ago, and while still a young man he came to Saginaw in the days when this was the Sawdust Town and lumber occupied chief time and attention. Through those historic times he lived for years, following the timber industry with its every rise and fall until, as the nineteenth century was preparing its swan song and new activities took the place of and outstripped lumber locally as means to success and fortune, he went into business for himself.

It was the retailing of fish that Mr LEHAY undertook when the forests failed to provide him with employment. He secured a little pushcart, with just enough room for a fair supply of amphibians and enough ice to keep them fresh, and with his feet and legs his only motive power, made the rounds of the city daily, selling his stock in trade. He called, eventually, at every door, and there are comparatively few homes which have not at some time or another purchased fish from him.

The cry "Fresh Fish" was well known and as expected as the figure and coming of its owner, and in many households he became an institution, one who was depended upon to bring the main articles for the meals upon the days allotted to this food. He was very regular in his trips and rarely missed a day. It was early to bed and early to rise with him, and no doubt, to a certain degree he prospered. At any rate, he secured the acquaintance and friendship of a larger circle of people than the average man enjoys, and a bond once made, he preserved it.

Personally he was as picturesque as was his life. A man of medium stature, he gave the impression of having been very powerful in his younger days, and his long life, with activity almost to the time of his death, supports this theory. He was never in his "Sunday best." His clothes were rather inclined to be a trifle shabby and not too

scrupulously clean, but they were never skimpy, and were always sufficient to supply the demands of the season. His face and hands were rough and weathered with the appearance that only a long and strenuous tussle with nature in the open can give to man, and he wore a healthy coat of tan, acquired in those years out in the woods and maintained through his constant outdoor activity.

Death came to this pioneer as the result of the combination of old age and misfortune. About eight months ago he fell and broke his hip. Though his constitution was strong for a man of his years, he was not able to survive this ill-luck and never fully recovered. His wife died several years ago. There are no children.

The funeral will take place Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock from Deisler's undertaking rooms and burial will be in Mount Olivet

CHESANING MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Byron Newton, Aged 68, Shoots
Himself Through Ear With Shotgun
HAD NOT BEEN VERY WELL
Held Gun to His Head With
One Hand and Released Trigger With Poker

(Special to the Daily News) Chesaning, Mich, May 11—Byron NEWTON, aged 68, conducting the Newton berry farm three miles south of here, committed suicide during the past night by shooting himself through the left ear with a shotgun. He evidently had sat at the bottom of a cherry tree, held the gun to his head with one hand and with the other released the trigger by means of a stove poker.

Mr NEWTON had been parted from his wife for some time and it is understood she recently had been making demands for money. He had settled some time ago for \$1,000. This trouble and general physical ailments are believed to have caused his act. He is survived by his wife, living at Fenton, and three sons, Albert and Arthur of Chesaning and Harvey of Owosso.

**CHARLES E. BRENNER,
HERE 72 YEARS, DIES**

**Was First Recorder's Court
Magistrate of Consolidated
Saginaw**

Attorney Many Years

Charles E BRENNER, 84 years old, 72 years a resident here, prominent for many years in Saginaw as a municipal judge, attorney and bank director, and a member for four years of the lower house of the state legislature, died Wednesday morning at his home, 523 Adams street

He was justice of the peace in Saginaw from 1876 to 1886, served four years as the first recorder of the consolidated city and from 1891 to 1895 was a member of the state legislature

He was one of the original directors of the Saginaw County Savings Bank and maintained his relation with that bank until its consolidation with the Bank of Saginaw. At that time he became a director of the Bank of Saginaw and continued in that capacity until last August, when he resigned because of failing eyesight. During the years that he was a director of the Bank of Saginaw he maintained an office at the west side bank, taking care of some of the legal work of the institution. During those years he also practiced law and dealt in real estate

Came to Saginaw in 1850

For 10 years previous to his election as justice of peace he had served as a city or county official. In 1866 he was appointed city marshal and in the fall of the next year accepted appointment as turnkey under Sheriff Henry MILLER. A year later he was made a deputy sheriff. In 1869 he was elected constable, which office he held continuously until 1876.

He was born in Prussia January 1, 1838 and came to New York city when 10 years old. A year later he went to Cleveland, and in 1850 came to Saginaw. When 19 years old he entered the government employ as a freight wagon driver, in charge of a team of six oxen


Enroute to Fort Laramie on his first trip he and his companions were snowed in near Ash Hollow and were isolated from help for 56 days, during which time they lived on corn. Upon reaching the fort he and six other men determined to walk back to Fort Leavenworth, a distance of 750 miles. One of the group died of exposure in a storm and Mr BRENNER suffered frozen feet, but through the aid of Indians the six reached their destination. He continued working for the government until 1865. At various times he engaged in mining, generally gold mining, in Colorado, Montana, British Columbia, Idaho, California and Washington

Leaves Four Children

In 1865 he tried farming on a western ranch, but grasshoppers ate practically all of the crops. Flour then was selling at \$1 a pound and potatoes at 60 cents a pound, according to his diary. He sold his hay at \$100 an acre and realized

LITTLE WANDERER OUT IN THE SNOW
PROLOGUE TO A MYSTERY

In 1874 Tyler Bros. & Co. of East Saginaw published a song written by Maj. J. Barton and arranged by S. L. Tyler. This song, written to be sung by a four part chorus and accompanied by piano, was inspired by the sight of a young girl wandering the street on a cold, snowy evening pausing to rest on the step of a mansion. This song was written three years prior to one of East Saginaw's tragic mysteries. The words of this song may well have been on the minds of East Saginaw residents during the weeks following the snow storm of March 7, 1877.

In the fall of 2001 Laurie Rubier chose this East Saginaw event as the topic of her English paper for Mary Beth Looby's English class at Delta College. The following excerpts from this paper were published with her permission. Below are excerpts from Major Barton's melancholy song:

*Poor little wanderer out in the snow,
Homeless and friendless, with no where to go.
Cold blows the wind thro' the desolate street
Freezing the tears on her thin hollow cheek*

*While the hurrying feet of the crowd passing by,
Drown with their footsteps her pitiful cry
Leaving her there, all alone in her woe
To perish with hunger while out in the snow*

*Is there not someone to offer relief
Someone to shield her from sorrow and grief
Someone to love her or care for her fate
Someone to save her e'er it be too late?*

*Will not some kind heart but pause as they pass
Offer protection and save her at last
Wipe the warm tears from her cheeks as they flow
And rescue a life from a grave 'neath the snow*

In 1955 an 81 year old Lydia Beer stated that she believed her sister Emma was alive and would be 84 years old. No doubt, descendants of Emma's siblings. have heard these stories. With today's technology it might be possible to solve this mystery through DNA. But the chances of locating DNA from the fragmented remains even if located in the cemetery, are probably impossible. Perhaps someday a genealogical researcher will come to Saginaw with an unbelievable family story of a great-grandmother who had been kidnapped.

BODY OF CLEMENTS RECOVERED SUNDAY

River Gave Up Its Dead and Cleared Away a Mystery

Doubt as to the probable fate of Wilford CLEMENTS was turned to certainty Sunday morning about 11 o'clock when his body was found floating in the river near Booth and McCoskry street by David A BURLEY, his son Albert, and Richard BLUHM.

A remarkable coincidence is connected with the discovery. The three gentlemen mentioned were standing on the dock, discussing the accident in which CLEMENTS lost his life, when in answer to BLUHM's remark that it was strange the body could not be found, the elder BURLEY exclaimed "Here he comes now," at the same time indicating the body, which was floating down stream. The attention of a fisherman with a boat was attracted and the party went out to the place and brought the body to shore. At Black & Baker's undertaking rooms where it was removed, it was later identified by the family. An inquest will be held by Coroner ENGLISH at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The deceased was born in England, September 13, 1878, and with his parents came to Colton, O, when three years of age. He had been a resident of this city for two years. He is survived by his parents, Mr and Mrs Joseph CLEMENTS, 317 Emily street, and several younger brothers and sisters. Funeral services at the residence at 4 pm

CLEMENTS-The remains of Wilford Ernest, eldest son of Joseph and Arline CLEMENTS, of 317 Emily street, were taken to Coalton, Ohio, on Tuesday afternoon for interment. Services were conducted at the family residence by Rev E E COWPERTHWAITE, pastor of the Church of Christ. On arrival at Coalton, the body was taken to the church, where services were held. Members of the lodge of Foresters at Coalton united with the representatives of the order from Saginaw in the impressive burial rites of the order at the grave.

Wilford was born Sept 13th, 1898¹, at Crondale, Durban county, England. He came to this country with his parents, May 11th, 1882 and to Saginaw May 29th, 1901. His school days were passed at Glen Roy, Ohio. A young man of great promise, a favorite with a host of young and old friends. A ?oiner of choice, possessing rare artistic ability, as the pictures made by him of his brothers and friends attest, no tutorage in art was his. Artist SMITH of this city will finish the work, giving it the life touches before presentation. He possessed musical ability also, to a marked degree, playing the piano with skill. That home of which he was the joy and pride will most keenly feel his loss. Besides the parents he leaves three brothers, Thomas W, Elijah J, Earl J,

aged respectively 21, 10 and 8 years; a sister, Hilda Annie, age 4 years. The father accompanied the remains to Ohio, Mrs CLEMENTS being unable from nervous prostration to undertake the journey.

AMONG THE OLD 'UNS

The mention in The Courier Herald Sunday of two citizens, Bryon B BUCKHOUT and James F BROWN, who landed in Saginaw fifty years ago last week, aroused considerable interest among the older citizens of the railway and commercial metropolis of north eastern Michigan, and in comparing notes at the Bancroft last evening a coterie of old residents dug up quite a collection of people who have lived in Saginaw half a century or thereabouts

Capt Emil MOORES came to Saginaw in 1849. He was born in Prussia in 1827, was many years in business with Jesse HOYT as one of the firm and manager of the Mayflower mills and is still an exceedingly well preserved man

Police Commissioner Patrick A O'DONNELL came to Saginaw November 15, 1855, when he was but 13 years old. He was in the lumbering business a number of years, and also pleads guilty to being a horny handed granger, owning a farm a few miles from the city

A K PENNEY came to Saginaw in 1848. He lived at the south side, subsequently

the village of Salina, and later annexed to the city, and erected in 1851 what was afterward the old Warner & Eastman saw mill on what is now South Tilden street. He sold it in 1863, and then engaged in the manufacture of salt. He erected the Penney block in 1867, and is one of the oldest citizens of Saginaw, having passed the four score mark some years ago.

Hon Chauncey H GAGE has been a resident of Saginaw since 1849. His father, Capt Morgan L GAGE, WAS POSTMASTER HERE IN 1853. He has held many positions of trust and is still an active citizen.

John L JACKSON, an energetic west side citizen, was born in Saginaw in 1853. He has been actively engaged in business many years, and is an influential member of the board of trade.

It was recently noted in these columns that William BARIE, the "Wanamaker" of Saginaw came here in 1850, and is still in the midst of a busy career.

Thomas STEELE came to Saginaw in 1856, and was for many years engaged in the manufacture of boilers, founding the Pioneer boiler works.

Hon Peter HERRIG, of the Saginaw Hardware Co, Saginaw Lee & Coal Co, and the Riverside Coal Co, came to Saginaw in 1848, and has been a resident of this city all his life.

D L C EATON, who was born in Schenectady county, New York, in 1817, came to Saginaw in 1848. He was actively engaged in business pursuits many years, but retired some years ago.

Hon John MOORE came to Saginaw in 1851. He has been prosecuting attorney of the county, mayor, member of the west side school board, and circuit judge, and in 1868 he was the Democrat candidate for governor. He is one of the most esteemed and upright citizens of Saginaw.

A B PAINE came to Saginaw in 1855. He was engaged in the lumbering business a number of years and is now engaged in agriculture and the manufacture of brick, residing south of the city.

Michael LEIDLEIN, of Buena Vista, came to Saginaw in 1848. He located in Buena Vista township where he built a saw mill in 1852 and he has always been prominently identified with the growth of the township. John E NOLAN was born in Saginaw in 1854 and has always resided here

NEW BRIDGE AT GENESEE AVE AT LAST IS ASSURED

After Three Years of Controversy the
Contract for its Construction is Duly
Signed With Ceremony Befitting the
Occasion

Pen With Which the Important
Document was Last Night Signed
Becomes the Property of President
DeLand of Board of Works—Gift of
Contractor Cowing

History was made at the city hall last night when the finishing touches were put on the negotiations which ensure a

new bridge across the river at Genesee avenue.

After about three years of bickering between councils and boards, court injunctions and trials, bitter personal feelings, a special law by the state legislature and other side issues of a handicapping nature too numerous to catalogue, the contract which makes all that has gone before a sealed book was signed.

It was 8:12 by the town clock when the last of three signatures necessary to close this long drawn-out controversy was appended to the official document and the Genesee avenue bridge fight was recognized to be a thing of the past.

It was at a special meeting of the board of public works, called for this purpose and the proceedings were held, as usual, in the city engineer's office.

The contractor, John P COWING, the city attorney and members of the board talked informally before the meeting and discussed the contract which had been changed somewhat from the original, to meet the requests of the contractor.

Mr COWING was present with his bonds, furnished by the National Surety Co of New York, and the local representative of that company, Wm WALLACE, of Ferguson & Wallace, was also in attendance and scrutinized the official documents.

When the board convened City Attorney NAGGELY reported the contract and bond correct as to form and a motion by Mr AURENT was unanimously adopted instructing the president and clerk to

execute the contract. That was all the official action the board took.

After that interest centered around the engineer's desk, where the closing of the deal was to take place. It was council committee night and by a common impulse many altermen and others gathered in a group to witness the important proceedings.

Contractor John P COWING took a fountain pen from his pocket and sat down in the city engineer's chair. His was the first name to be inscribed at the bottom of the last type written page which ended a long stretch of conditions and requirements between the contractor and the city.

The contractor signed his name "John P COWING" in a bold hand entirely free from nervousness. President DeLAND signed next. He wrote rapidly "M L DeLAND." The city clerk inscribed his name, "W H ???TON" in much the same way that he dashes off a hundred or more signatures on licenses or pay checks.

While the signatures were being attached, the crowd of interested spectators were remarking upon the importance of the event. As President DeLAND took the pen from Mr COWING, something was said about who should own that valuable instrument.

"It is yours, if you want it, I give it to you," said Mr COWING.

"You bet I do want it," was the reply.

The pen was passed around for inspection afterwards but the head of the

board of works kept a close watch on it. Mr COWING said it was an ordinary fountain pen that he had used some time

Contractor COWING also had a little desire to preserve the historical features of the deal so he asked that the contract be signed to duplicate, which was done. By this Mr COWING gets an original copy, which he will keep as a memento of the closing of one of the hardest bridge struggles in the country.

Mr COWING announced that he proposed erecting steel plates several feet square at each end of the bridge bearing the names of aldermen, members of the board of works and city officials who have had to do with the bridge question

There are two bonds, each for \$50,000, one running to the city and the other to the state.

Contractor COWING was a happy man and everybody else was in the same frame of mind. Mr COWING left this morning for Cleveland, where he will at once get his appliances together for beginning work. He expects to start operations by Sept 10. If the city decides to float the old bridge his first work will be in removing the protection piling from the swing span. Otherwise he will first tear down the approaches. He will return in a few days prepared to do business

Mr COWING's \$18,000 check which was put up as a forfeit when he bid on the contract, was returned to him last night.

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: |). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

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

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FIRST CHANCERY CALENDER OF
SAGINAW CIRCUIT COURT UNCOVERED

Writing Is Still Very Plain—Calender Was Approved by Judge W W Morrell and G D Williams and P G Gardner Associates
First Case Recorded October 23, 1837

Interesting from the point of view of how officers conducted the circuit court business when Michigan became a state, was brought to the attention of the court house officials today when County Clerk E C HUMPHREY and his deputies while at the work of bringing the basement vault records out of chaos into some systematic filing, uncovered the first circuit court chancery calendar, dated October 2, 1837. It was rather a pleasant incident and attracted no small amount of attention.

Opening the book on the fly leaf appears the following: "We approve of this book as a suitable and proper book to be used as the calendar for the circuit court of Saginaw County, Michigan.

"Approved October 2, 1837.

"L WL MORELL, judge.

"G D WILLIAMS, P G GARDNER, associate judges."

According to the Michigan manual, at that time there were 920 inhabitants in this county. In 1840 the number had decreased to 802, and today there are 89,240.

The first case recorded was that of Joseph I MAIDEN vs Elisha RICE, for trespass, the damages asked being \$100. It was recorded October 23, 1837. S G WATSON appeared for the plaintiff. From that time until 1843, which is the extent of the record, 80 cases were recorded.

Naturally it is expected that the writing would be very dim, but this is not the case, as the ink used in those days remains very distinct, even more so than the ruled lines of the book.

The preservation of the first calendar shows with what care the records were kept when Michigan was admitted to the union. It will remain in its proper filing place.

DIVORCE

Several Cases to come before the Court at the Incoming Term—A short Synopsis of some of the Principal Cases

Whether it is that the hardness of the times causes people to become more economical in their domestic affairs by which working, saving wives refuse to longer support worthless husbands, and husbands ditto, we know not; but the fact is that some seven or eight cases of divorce will come before our October term of Court, suing to be relieved from the fetters, which when first put on by Hymen were bright as gold and light as gossamer, but have since become galling as moulten iron and heavy as lead. The papers in the majority of these cases have been filed with the Clerk of the County Court, and in all probability Judge Moore will be called upon to decide upon the continuation of the marital relationships thus sought to be ruthlessly severed. The first of these cases we notice is that of

JAMES VS. ALTHEA FARRELL

The husband in this case brings action against his wife, charging her with repeated acts of infidelity. The parties reside in Maple Grove, and, if all be true as set forth in the bill James asks for, Althea was rather a hard citizen, and that miserable John Doe, who figures so prominently in drunks, street rows and such, has in some of his lucid moments gotten on the soft side of the too warm hearted Althea, causing her to forget morality, virtue, her allegiance to her James and all she should remember, save the irrepressible charms of John Doe. The probabilities are that James will so work upon the sense of justice in the bosom of Judge Moore that he will be released from all future relationship with Althea. The complainant is represented by W. H. Sweet, Esq, and the case will be defended by Dan P. Foote.

The next case which comes before the court sighing for relief is that of

LISSELLA VS. GEORGE MENTHEN

These parties reside in the high-toned and moral City of East Saginaw, and have been married seven years. For the first few years of their married life the stream of love flowed smooth, and their bark glided down its swift rolling current without let or hindrance. A several stations along the river of life the little bark would stay for a brief season, and a facsimile of the loving pair would be taken on board. But a change came over the spirit of their dreams, and George began to indulge in that which is said to steal away a man's brain. The result was that in a few short months he was a poor degraded drunkard, who was unable to support his family, and consequently poverty and distress stared Lissella and her little ones in the face. This, as the complaint states continued up to the present date when Lissella, rendered almost insane by the crushing of all her fond aspirations, comes before the courts and tells the story of wrongs, asking to be released from the unendurable burden of a man who has drowned all semblance of his former self in the cup of domestic ruin and personal degradation, and makes her sad story known through W. J. Loveland, Esq.

The third case claiming attention is that of

LOUISA VS. FREDERICK HARNISH

These parties are also denizens of our model city of East Saginaw, and the case is similar to the above in that the domestic felicity of the parties have been ruined by the insidious approaches of the demon of rum. The result has been that Fred has become a confirmed

drunkard as stated in the complaint, and has treated his wife with cruelty and neglect. She was forced to leave him and reside with her stepfather where her only child died, leaving her alone in the world bereft of a husband's love and the caresses of her little one. The complaint of Louisa tells a sad tale of cruelty and neglect which will, if established, provide the last dread alternative for domestic infelicity, divorce. The case is in the hands of Flanders & Wilbur for complainant.

The next on the list of complaints suing for separation is the case of
JOHN VS. MARY ROBINSON

This action is brought on the ground of adultery, wherein Mary forgot her marriage vows and lavished her favors promiscuously upon diverse gay lotharios. The parties reside in Fremont, and the domestic revolt of Mary took place some time ago. John had repeatedly forgave the erring fair one her domestic wanderings from the path of virtue, but all in vain, for Mary would not stay forgiven, and at last patience with John ceased to be any longer a virtue. The case for the complainant is in the hands of Flanders & Wilbur.

The last case we will mention is that of

MARGARETT VS. HAMILTON M. ROGERS

These parties are well known to our readers, the defendant being largely engaged in the music trade both in this city and Saginaw City. The complaint is made by Mrs. Rogers, and charges cruel treatment and systematic neglect for a long time past on the part of her husband. It would seem that the latter was desirous of a separation, and has made some arrangements to dispose of his property unknown to his wife. This she had knowledge of and immediately put the matter in the hands of Gaylord & Hanchett, of Saginaw City. It is a sad affair, as the parties move in good society and the reading of the papers now on record in the Clerk's office would seem to give a bad feature to the conduct of the defendant

REMARKS – We have just glanced at these cases simply because of the amount to be brought before the court at the present session. In Michigan we have not had more than our share of this description of litigation, and wish for less. We understand that several other cases will be brought forward at this term, making, possibly, in all some eight or nine. We have made no comment upon the merits of the cases save what might be gleaned from the papers on file, and simply give the unvarnished statements of the several complaints

**State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to
North America**

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: |). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.
