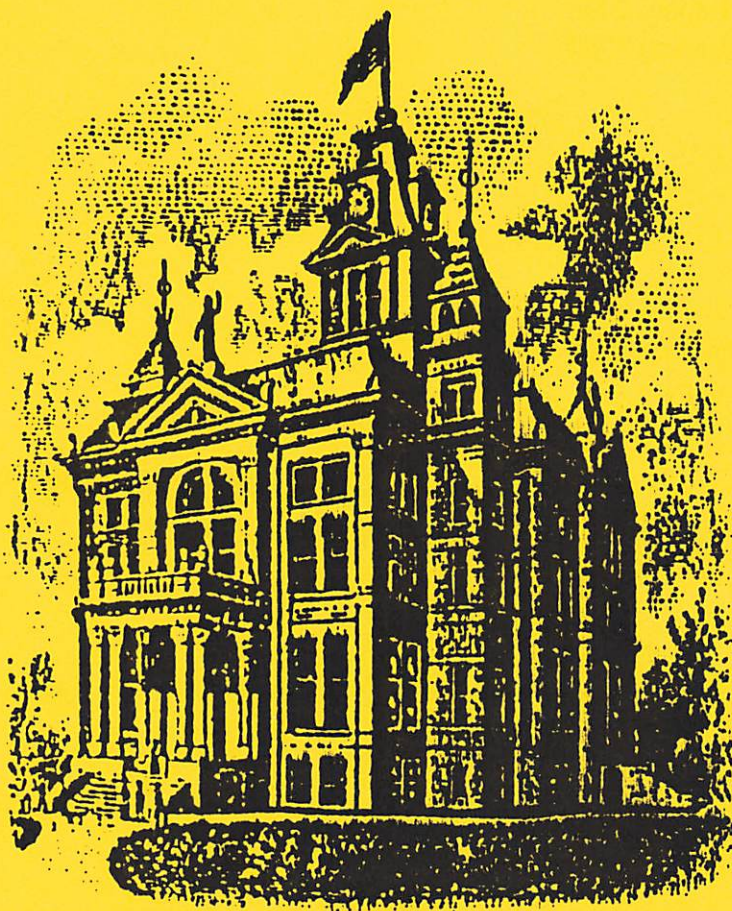

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CLARK CAPTURED

A Notorious Desperado Who Has Given
Saginaw County Considerable Trouble
Captured by a Plucky Deputy Sheriff

It will be remembered that the name of Walter E CLARK was brought conspicuously before the public a few months since in connection with a Mrs KRAMER, who was charged by her husband with keeping a house of ill-fame, and was sentenced from the circuit court to the house of correction for one year. CLARK committed an assault on Mr KRAMER, and warrant was issued for his arrest, but notwithstanding the utmost vigilance on the part of the officers he eluded capture. Later he was suspected of having been guilty of other offences and an effort was made to arrest him, but after an exchange of shots he again escaped. After continuing his depredations in the surrounding townships, Deputy Sheriff W L DENEEN of Maple Grove, got on his track for another offense, supposed to be horse stealing, and followed him for five days until Sunday about 5 o'clock when he discovered that he was at the house of a man named Edward BOULIETT, on the Genesee plank road about two miles southeast of Bridgeport, at which alternately with the houses of a man named BRADSHAW and another named McINTYRE in the same neighborhood, CLARK made his rendezvous. After surveying the place the officer laid his plans, went to Bridgeport to get a man who had got "sand" enough to go with him, but failed, and came on to this city and reported to Deputy Sheriff MEYERS, who declined to go with him, but sent Carl SCHULTZ. Returning to Bridgeport about 12 o'clock at night they left the horse at Hilliard's hotel, and taking a lantern started for BOULLETT's house, the idea of taking the lantern was that if they had to go into the house a light would be needed. Arriving at the house SCHULTZ went to the front door

and knocked, and DENEEN stationed himself at the north window on the northeast corner of the house, from which he expected CLARK would endeavor to come through. Instead, CLARK came out of the front door and asked what was wanted. SCHULTZ at once told him he was his prisoner, as he had been previously instructed. DENEEN heard CLARK with an oath order SCHULTZ to leave or he would shoot him, and immediately after heard a shot fired. Turning back he saw SCHULTZ clinch with CLARK, and rushing forward he got within four feet of them, when CLARK, who still held the revolver, fired, the ball striking DENEEN on the left arm, about three inches from the shoulder, shattering the bone badly. He then made another jump and took the revolver from him, and got him down. With one hand DENEEN got his handcuffs out and endeavored to put them on, but laboring under the disadvantage of only having one hand to work with, before he could get them on, one of the cuffs locked, and he had to leave him in the hands of SCHULTZ while he got the key. CLARK jumped away from him and ran around the house, SCHULTZ and DENEEN after him. After considerable scuffling in which CLARK did some biting and kicking, SCHULTZ getting his hand badly bitten and a kick over the right eye, he was captured and being handcuffed, they started on the road toward this city. After going about half a mile, DENEEN went into the house of Dennis BOW for assistance, leaving CLARK and SCHULTZ in the road. While there he heard SCHULTZ calling. He called back "stick to him," and hurried up as fast as he possibly could with his wounded arm. After getting up he learned that CLARK had succeeded in getting his hands over to his right hand pants pocket and succeeded in drawing a knife, with which he stabbed at SCHULTZ, cutting a frightful gash over the back of the right hand, and turning, tried to drive the knife into his abdomen, but only succeeded in cutting through the vest, pants and shirt. SCHULTZ endeavored to take the knife from him, and taking the blade in his hand

he succeeded in bending it, but at the same time badly mutilating his fingers.

CLARK then ran and endeavored to jump over a fence and get into a field, but he was again recaptured and brought into the city about three o'clock yesterday morning, and placed in the lockup, without further trouble. DENEEN and SCHULTZ then went into KIPFMILLER's hotel, and a doctor was sent for. Drs ESMEA and ROSS were in attendance and succeeded in extracting some pieces of the fractured bone, after which he was removed to St Mary's hospital, where amputation at the shoulder will be performed. DENEEN had been deputy sheriff of this county for the past six years, and constable of Maple Grove for a number of years. He has one brother in Tuscola and another at Farwell, and his father for a number of years was sheriff of Lapeer county. He has a wife and two small children and is a farmer. The chances are that he will lose his life. He went through the war service in the 23d Michigan and 28th Michigan regiments as a lieutenant. SCHULTZ is also deserving of much praise for the manner in which he acted.

While DENEEN is entitled to sympathy and is a plucky fellow, the affair was managed with a bungling stupidity that is surprising. It is stated that he had no warrant for the arrest of CLARK, a fact that the lawyers of the latter will not be slow in taking advantage of, and that SCHULTZ was not an officer. A warrant for CLARK's arrest was in the hands of the officers in this city, and Officer OSTRANDER, who learned of CLARK's whereabouts some days since, notified DENEEN of the fact. Further, CLARK's desperate character was well known to the officers in this city, and had DENEEN called upon them, a plan of capture would have been doubtless carried out that would have saved DENEEN the wound and in all probability his life. The wonderful astuteness, however, that characterizes the management of the present sheriff evidently would not permit the

deputy to co-operate with East Saginaw officers.

CLARK, whose right name is W B CHISHOLM, is well known throughout Ohio and Indiana, and it is understood about six years ago was sent to the state prison for attempting to steal a stallion from Tiff JEROME of Saginaw City. He also traveled under the alias of BYARD. He was taken to Saginaw City by Sheriff MILLER yesterday morning and a complaint made before Justice BRENNER charging him assault with attempt to murder.

A DESPERADO'S DEED

William Clark Cornered at Last and Makes a Desperate Fight for Liberty—Deputy Sheriff Deneen, of Maple Grove, Shot and Dangerously Wounded, and His Assistant Badly Cut Before He succumbs—Particulars of the Affair

Again does the name of William CLARK, the gentleman (?) who gained some little notoriety in connection with the KRAEMER family embroglio some two or three months since, come into prominence before the public. This time, however, it comes to the surface under circumstances almost tragic in character, and it is altogether likely that he has got himself into a scrape more serious than any in which he has as yet figured.

As is well known to the readers of the HERALD, at the time of the KRAEMER difficulty, warrants upon different charges were issued against CLARK for the part that he played therein. He made his escape, however, and was next heard of in the vicinity of Bridgeport, where by the aid of friends he managed to elude the officers sent after him at different times. Since leaving the city he has wandered about the county, sometimes appearing at Clio, again at Frankenmuth, and at other points, but always seeming to be sure of a hiding place in the vicinity of Bridgeport. Here he made his headquarters, sometimes at the house of a man named BRADSHAW, or that of another named MCINTYRE, but more frequently at the residence of Edward BROUILLETTE, a Frenchman residing about two miles the other side of the village, on the east side of the Genesee plank road. In his rambles CLARK passed himself off as a detective, but seems to have indulged in a more lawless profession, from the fact that the theft of more than one horse is laid at his door. But it was well known that CLARK was a sharp and dangerous man, and the officers were wary how they proceeded

against him, especially as he went at all times armed and prepared for any emergency, and it was not known to what extent his friends would aid him in resisting arrest.

For some five days past, Deputy Sheriff William N DENEEN, of the township of Maple Grove, has been upon CLARK's track, having a warrant for his arrest upon the charge of horse-stealing. Early Sunday evening he "spotted" his man at the house of BROUILLETTE, and feeling sure he would stop there all night went for help to take him into custody. Not feeling satisfied with the assistance he could get at Bridgeport, DENEEN came to this city and applied to Deputy Sheriff MEYERS to go with him to BROUILLETTE's house and arrest CLARK. Not wishing to go, MEYERS deputized a German named Charles SCHULTZ to act in his place. DENEEN and SCHULTZ then went to Bridgeport, and on arriving there left their horse and wagon at HILLIARD's Hotel, proceeding on to BROUILLETTE's house on foot, SCHULTZ carrying a lantern under his overcoat. They arrived there at 11:30. SCHULTZ then stationed himself at a corner of the house where he could watch the front door and see who came out, while DENEEN went to the rear for the purpose of gaining entrance at that point. Scarcely had the two separated when CLARK came out of the front door and spying SCHULTZ, at once seemed to suspect his errand. Pulling out a revolver he fired, but the German, noticing the movement, dodged and so escaped injury. CLARK then turned in the opposite direction, and at once noticed DENEEN coming round the other corner toward him. Without any hesitation he fired a second shot, the bullet taking effect in DENEEN's left arm near the shoulder and shattering the bone. SCHULTZ then sprang on CLARK (who is a large and powerfully built man) from behind and bore him to the ground. Here after a severe struggle he was handcuffed, DENEEN pluckily holding a revolver in his left hand while with his right he placed the wristlets on the desperate man, who still clung to his revolver. During the

struggle SCHULTZ received a severe kick over the eye and also a bad bite on one of his hands. The deputy sheriff did not attempt to use his revolver, as he did not wish to do the man harm, and also because SCHULTZ wished "to take him alive."

They walked their prisoner off in the direction of Bridgeport, and had gone but a few yards when it became apparent to DENEEN that he was becoming too weak to walk so far. Accordingly he left CLARK in care of SCHULTZ, while he went into the house of Dennis BOW to get a rig to drive to the hotel where they had left their horse and wagon. While he was absent CLARK made a desperate effort to escape, but he miscalculated on the man he had to deal with. He managed to get his manacled hands to the pocket containing his knife and to open the same. Holding it on his closed hands he struck savagely at SCHULTZ, laying the back of his left hand open from the wrist to the end of his second finger, splitting the finger nail. With a second stroke he cut his captor across the abdomen, making large rents in his vest, pants and shirts, but fortunately doing him no bodily injury. CLARK then ran and endeavored to climb a fence at the road side, but SCHULTZ was at his heels as he climbed over. Grasping him by the coat collar he caused him to fall on his back across the fence. At this CLARK began to cry "Murder," when SCHULTZ fearing some one would come to his assistance, caught hold of the chain connecting the hand-cuffs, and twisting on them soon brought him to his senses. He gave in at once, and DENEEN coming with a vehicle and assistance, he was brought to this city and placed in the lock-up without further trouble, the party reaching here about 3 o'clock in the morning. During yesterday CLARK was taken to the county jail and given in charge of Sheriff MILLER

The sorrowful part of the affair is the serious injury sustained by Deputy Sheriff DENEEN while in the discharge of his duty. Though the best is hoped for, the result can

not be told yet. The ball lodged in his left arm near the shoulder, and an examination by Drs ROSS and EAMES, who visited the wounded man at KIPFMILLER's Hotel, showed the bone to be completely shattered. He was removed to St Mary's Hospital, where several pieces of the bone were removed during the afternoon. The wound was found to be even more serious than was at first supposed, and it was decided to postpone the operation until this morning, when the arm will either be amputated at the shoulder or a re-section of the bone will be made. His friends were telegraphed for in the afternoon, but at 8 o'clock last evening had not yet arrived. He resides on a farm in Maple Grove, and has a wife and two children.

A warrant was issued against CLARK by Justice BRENNER, of Saginaw City, charging him with assault with intent to commit murder, and he doubtless will find he has got into a bad scrape. It is said that his true name is BAYARD, and that he already has served five years in the state prison, having been sent from this county for stealing a horse from Tiff JEROME. He is tall and of stout and muscular build, but presents a venerable appearance, being between 50 and 60 years of age

SCHULTZ is to be commended for the "grit" he showed in the affair. In it he received a mark he will carry to his grave, even should no more serious results ensue from his severe wound. His hand was also badly cut in taking the knife away from CLARK. The strange part of the affair is that the weapon with which the latter did the shooting cannot be found.

DEPUTY SHERIFF DENEEN

There is still considerable talk and excitement over the arrest of CLARK and the shooting of Deputy Sheriff DENEEN, who lies in St Mary's hospital in a very

dangerous condition. The surgeons, Drs ROSS and EAMES, yesterday performed the difficult operation of removing about five inches of the humerus, or shoulder joint. The bullet was found solidly embeded in the shoulder joint, which was considerably shattered. At last accounts DENEEN was alive, but much prostrated, and the result of the operation can be determined by time alone.

There seems to be considerable misapprehension as to the actual facts and circumstances of CLARK's arrest and the criticism of a certain paper about "bungling stupidity," and the management of Sheriff MILLER. These reflections are altogether uncalled for, and are simply the stories of an officer who has carried a warrant for CLARK's arrest for some weeks, but who lacked wither the industry or the "pluck" to serve it. Sheriff MILLER did not know anything about DENEEN's intentions, and was not consulted, and never advised or directed DENEEN to attempt the arrest. On the contrary OSTRANDER did tell DENEEN that he had a warrant for CLARK, but with commendable prudence, did not assist him. Deputy Sheriff MEYERS was notified and asked by DENEEN to go with him, but declined, as he had a right to do, and recommended the man SCHULTZ as a good man to take, and SCHULTZ' conduct fully confirmed MEYER's opinion of his bravery and strength.

Whether DENEEN had the warrant or not matters little. The offence he sought to arrest CLARK was horse stealing, as he informed the editor of the HERALD in an interview Monday afternoon at the hospital. There are good reasons to believe that CLARK is a professional horse thief, and was at the bottom of the theft of a horse from Mrs Mary GUYOTT, a short time ago, and there are still other matters laid to his charge. He has passed under various *aliases*, HAS SERVED AT LEAST ONE TERM IN State Prison, and is known to the officers throughout Indiana and Michigan as a desperate person

In this connection we will allude to another matter. Mr DENEEN is a poor man, and has a wife and two small children living on his little farm in Maple Grove. If he recovers his wounds will incapacitate him from labor of any kind for many months, and cripple him for life. There has been some talk of starting a subscription for his benefit, which would be a generous thing to do, and would aid a worthy man.

INTERVIEW WITH CLARK

A reporter of the HERALD yesterday, by request of CLARK, the man who shot DENEEN, called on him at the jail, and had a long interview. CLARK states that the newspapers have dealt unfairly by him in calling him a noted desperado and well known to the officers in Ohio and Indiana. He says that he was never in either of the states but once in his life. The story that he served a term in state prison six years ago for stealing a horse, he indignantly denies. He further claims that these stories were set afloat by a man who has served a term in state prison for the purpose of screening himself, and that the said man belongs to a ring of horse thieves that are now operating in this state and that certain officers in this vicinity are trying to injure him in the eyes of the public because he refused to squeal to them. He remarked in conclusion, "You will see that the matter will all come out in a few days, and you need not be surprised if some of the guardians of the law are implicated in the matter." CLARK also gave his side of the story of the arrest and the shooting of DENEEN, but in regard to divulging anything regarding the ring he spoke of, he refused, excepting that he knew all about it, but did not belong to it. Our reporter asked him if he had employed counsel to defend him, and he said he had not, but thought as soon as the money he had written for arrived he would employ counsel

DEATH OF WM N DENEEN

As had been anticipated ever since he received his terrible wound in the attempt to arrest the man CLARK, at BROULETTE's place in Bridgeport, Deputy Sheriff William N DENEEN has died. He began sinking on Friday night, and failed gradually until Sunday noon, when he breathed his last. It is a sad ending to a terrible tragedy, and CLARK closes a career of sin and crime in our midst with the stain of murder on his brow

Mr DENEEN was a good citizen and a worthy man. He was brave and fearless to a fault, and never wavered in the line of duty as he understood it, and it was this trait which cost him his life. His object was a laudable one—to rid the community of a supposed criminal, but he counted too lightly upon the reputed desperation of his murderer. It is the old, old story—the better man lost, another heart widowed, little children orphaned, a happy home desolated, and the cause of all this destruction unharmed. Even should he receive his full

deserts as the hands of the law, it will entail no such suffering as by his act has fallen upon the family of DENEEN

The deceased resided in Maple Grove township, where he had a homestead of forty acres of land, which we understand is encumbered for fully half it is worth. He leaves a wife and two small children desolate and in straightened circumstances. His friends in Maple Grove and Chesaning have come forward and pledged aid for expenses of his illness and will give him a decent burial. The remains were taken to Chesaning for that purpose last night. A number of citizens have suggested that something should be done for his family, by way of subscription or donation. Such an act would be a most worthy thing to do, but who will start it and carry it out? The public certainly owe it as a duty not to let his family suffer from want, and that his murderer should not be allowed to escape the just punishment for his reckless and desperate crime

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

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FRONT COVER

The illustration on the front cover is by Carl Bertsch from a book written by Grace Lee Nute titled VOYAGEUR. It was first published in 1921 and has been reprinted many times.

The following is an explanation of the illustration.

“Without the birch-bark canoe the history of inland North America would have been altogether different from that which is on record. Dugouts, bateaux, rafts and other clumsy craft could have replaced the canoe in many instances and on many waterways; but dugouts cannot be carried easily on men’s shoulders over the scores of portages which made tedious the explorers’ and traders’ routes; bateaux and rafts cannot shoot rapids skillfully; and a dozen other objections to such water conveyances could be advanced to prove that the canoe was the only practicable vehicle for a large part of the fur-trader’s frontier..

Disassociated from his canoe the voyageur can hardly be imagined. As well separate him from his pipe! It was his carriage by day, his house by night, the topic of fully half his conversation, and the object of his pride. His clothing, his food, his songs, his family life, his very stature were all conditioned by a frail basket which he could carry on his shoulders.”

ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE COMMISSIONER OF THE RAIL-
ROADS OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN
Extracted by Anna Mae Maday**



The first annual report of the Commissioner of Railroads was published by the State of Michigan for the year ending December 31, 1872. Subsequent reports continued to be published on a yearly basis until the 34th Annual report of 1906. Public Act 312 of 1907 established the Michigan Railroad Commission and gave the commissioner more power to "correct existing evils." Prior to 1872 Michigan yearly railroad information was compiled by the auditor general and included the Annual Reports of the Railroad Corporations in the State of Michigan. These are found going back to 1869. After 1918 these railroad reports were published by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission. The 7th Annual Report was published in the year ending December 1925. Not all of these railroad reports give names of the deceased or injured. In 1904 a new report format just included statistics. In most of the earlier volumes each railroad submitted a list of accidents resulting in death or injury. A complete set of these reports are located on the shelves at the Library of Michigan. Many other local history collections maintain full or partial collections of these old published reports. Names, dates, places and sometimes the circumstances of each accident are given. Genealogists would be wise to search the local newspaper microfilm for more information about these accidents and the obituaries of the deceased. Publication of names from the earlier reports of 1868 through 1871 will be included in subsequent editions of the Timbertown Log. Only Saginaw area names were extracted for our genealogical magazine.

ORPHAN TRAINS & THEIR PRECIOUS CARGO: THE LIFE'S WORK OF REV. H.D. CLARKE

New York City was home to several thousand homeless, abandoned and orphaned children in the mid-1800s. Relief came when the Children's Aid Society was established in 1853 by Charles Loring Brace. The Society gathered orphans and sent them west by train, stopping at predetermined destinations where foster homes were located. This book is the story of Rev. Herman Clarke, an agent of the Children's Aid Society, who was in charge of Children's homes in Dodge Center, MN, Cincinnati, OH and Battle Creek, MI. The book contains copies from his scrapbooks which contained numerous photographs of orphans and their foster families, as well as advertisements published by the Society and a section of orphan train poetry. Indexed.

MAP GUIDE TO GERMAN PARISH REGISTERS (Series of books published by Heritage Creations)

This is an exciting new series that we are starting to receive, as each volume is published. There are plans to publish 40 volumes! So far, we have map guides for Baden, Hessen, Mecklenburg, Wurttemberg, Oldenburg and Schleswig-Holstein. The Map Guide series is used by researchers and genealogists to locate the church and parish where their ancestors worshipped, based on where they lived. The maps identify church parishes for Lutherans and Catholics within each district. Once the parish has been determined, researchers are able to obtain copies of the church records and find their ancestor's vital records. The book provides the Family History Library microfilm number for ordering the records. If you have German ancestry, this new series is one you will definitely want to look at! Remember to visit your Local History & Genealogy Collection often to check for new volumes!

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett) . If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

**LAST OF PENOYER G A R,
"UNCLE DAN" CRANE PASSES**

One of Few Remaining Veterans of Civil War Dies at 93 – Served Through War

Daniel Crane, one of the few remaining veterans of the Civil war and the last surviving member of J N Penoyer post No 90, GAR, died at 6 pm Wednesday at his home, 505 North Fayette street, after a long illness. He was 93 years old. Mr Crane, known affectionately to hundreds of Saginawians as "Uncle Dan" served his post faithfully as quartermaster and commander, holding both offices during the past year. It was only a few weeks ago that he made his final report to the state organization as being the last surviving member of the post.

Active in business until his seventy-fourth year, Mr Crane was identified with the lumbering business as a millwright and constructed many mills in the various lumbering centers of the country. His business associations here were with the Saginaw Barrel factory, Swift & Lockwood and Wickes Brothers

SERVED UNTIL CLOSE OF WAR

Born Oct 26, 1839 in the town of Romulus, NY, Mr Crane grew to manhood there. With the outbreak of the Civil war he enlisted in August, 1862 in Company G, 50th New York Volunteer Engineers and served until the close of the war in 1865, being discharged with the rank of sergeant.

After the war Mr Crane went to Williamsport, Pa, and for three years worked there as a millwright. In 1869

he came to Grand Rapids, staying there until 1871, when he came to Saginaw. His first business enterprise here was the building of the Saginaw Barrel factory on the site where the Saginaw Manufacturing company now stands. In 1874 he became associated with Swift & Lockwood as engineer and remained with that company until 1882 when he entered the employ of Wickes Brothers as gang expert. During the course of his employment with Wickes Brothers he was sent to Europe as that firm's representative.

Resigning from Wickes Brothers in 1895, Mr Crane engaged in business for himself, constructing saw mills in various sections of the United States and Canada. These mills took him to lower Canada, South Carolina, Mississippi and Louisiana where he built his last mills at Elizabeth and Merryville. Then in his seventy-fourth year, Mr Crane retired from active business

FUNERAL SATURDAY

Mr Crane was married in 1868 to Miss Susan Caroline Coryell, also of Romulus, NY. She died in January 1904. He attended the First Presbyterian church.

Surviving are two daughters, Misses Gertrude and Irma J Crane, Saginaw, and one brother, Edward E Crane, Penn-Yap, NY

The funeral will take place at 2 pm Saturday at the home. Rev Henry W Fischer, pastor of First Presbyterian church, will officiate and burial will be in Oakwood. Services will be under the auspices of the Woman's Relief Corps No 135. Friends are requested to omit flowers

ORMSBY HELD FOR SAGINAW POLICE

Former Agent for Typewriter Co
Arrested in Indianapolis

Pursuit and Arrest Directed by Wire by
Chief Kain—Faces Charge of
Embezzlement

As showing persistency in looking after men wanted here on criminal charges the latest developments of the local police force nearly put the climax on anything that has happened before. Since the latter part of last month Chief Kain has desired the presence here of one R L Ormsby who was said to have embezzled money from the Royal Typewriting company

Ormsby is now under arrest in Indianapolis, Ind and held for the Saginaw police, according to a telegram received by Chief Kain from Chief

Robert Metzger of the Indiana city. The telegram said: "Ormsby in custody, waives requisition: send officer."

Detective Sergeant Jordan will leave this morning to bring the man back

Ormsby, for a time, it is said, was quite a prominent figure here. As agent for the concern named he had offices on Genesee avenue. The only picture Chief Kain had of him to send out was one taken of him sitting at his roll top desk and the office furnishings looked very swell

C S Burrows, agent for the Royal Typewriting company, made the complaint and the alleged embezzlement was \$90

Ormsby left here the latter part of September. Chief Kain sent out circular letters describing him as being 25 or 30 years old, a flashy dresser, sometimes wearing pearl colored gloves and carrying a cane

In trying to locate Ormsby the chief addressed communications to twenty-three cities. Indianapolis was first on the list. The police of that city returned the picture with the information that Ormsby couldn't be found in Fort Wayne, his home. It was also stated that at the headquarters of the national guard there it was found the man was wanted for desertion

Chief Kain became positive that Ormsby was in Indianapolis, notwithstanding the failure of the police there to find him, and yesterday wired the authorities exactly where he could be secured. The result was his arrest

Ormsby while here boarded at the Hotel Vincent and was well known

Subject: Rosecrans Descendants

I am in possession of a lovely old photo album I believe contains photos of a ROSECRANS family. The photographs appear to be professionally taken and date from probably the 1870s through at least 1891. The photos are almost all in very good to excellent condition. The album is about 2 inches thick and has a worn velvet cover and a metal buckle.

Almost all the photos were taken in Michigan, mainly Bay City, Romeo, and Frankfurt. There are two from Ontario, Canada and two from New York and one from Telluride, CO. Other cities in Michigan were Saginaw, Pontiac, Ionia, Detroit, Mt. Clemens and Armada.

Here is what I have been able to determine:

Orson U. ROSECRANS b. Michigan m. Susan MC/MAC INNIS b. Canada

On August 30, 1914 in Bellingham, WA their daughter, Rena, b. April 24, 1888, Clinton Co. Michigan, m. Julius H. TEPEL, a mfg jeweler b. abt 1884 Pittsburgh, PA. Rena ROSECRANS TEPEL d. February 16, 1981 in Sacramento, CA

The only daughter of Rena and Julius TEPEL, Rose-Margaret (Rosi) b. July 24, 1919 Sacramento, CA m. 1st William Price Gilson on June 14, 1941 in Sacramento, CA. I believe this marriage ended in divorce. Rosi m. 2nd Lloyd F. Donant on October 12, 1963 in Marin County, CA. Lloyd Donant d. May 10, 1971 in Sacramento, CA. Rosi TEPEL DONANT d. December 12, 2001 in Sacramento, CA.

Lloyd Donant was my husband's cousin. The photo album was found among Rosi's possessions and I believe it had belonged to her mother, Rena ROSECRANS TEPEL.

Of the over 40 photos in the album, only one is identified! That one reads, "Rev. P. Schemerhorn", I think. The writing is very faded and it is difficult to make out. One other loose photo of a woman is identified (I believe by Rosi) as "Susan MC INNIS ROSECRANS". A card behind one photo bears the name, "Mrs. Alex Chapman. E. Saginaw, MI"

I would love to see this wonderful family album in the hands of some ROSECRANS descendants, where it rightfully belongs. Could you possibly print the above information in your newsletter or somehow get this information to your members in the hopes of locating a descendant of this family? I would appreciate any effort on your behalf. I wish no monetary reward other than costs of mailing.

Hero of Crossing Accident

INJURIES CAUSE DEATH OF COLE
Man Who Saved the Life of Miss Jackson
Passes Away at St Mary's
MAKES BRAVE FIGHT FOR LIFE
Pneumonia Set in Causing His Death,
His Weakened Constitution Being
Unable to Stand the Strain

Alfred David COLE, who saved the life of Miss Ivis JACKSON at the Third street crossing of the Pere Marquette network of tracks the night before Thanksgiving, died at St Mary's hospital at 1:30 o'clock this morning. He made a brave and determined fight against death and was optimistic for the future up to the last. With one leg off below the knee, the other just below the hip and one arm amputated below the shoulder, the man whose deed is on everyone's lips in Saginaw had planned cork legs and an artificial arm. But pneumonia was set in. His constitution, strong and robust before the terrible accident, was taxed severely by the shock his system received.

Up to Saturday night his condition gave signs of a complete recovery. But since that time he had been sinking as was told in The News.

Miss Ivis JACKSON was at the hospital last night and spent several hours with COLE. Quite an attachment had grown up between the two and although the girl herself was suffering from the shock and injuries of that night she never failed to visit COLE at least once a day.

Had COLE lived he would have been given as merry a Christmas as the Big Hearted Men and Women and Children of Saginaw could pour out to a man afflicted as he was. Cash contributions to the COLE fund had been made liberally. Efforts were being made to get a Carnegie hero pension fund for the man so that he might have a permanent income on which to depend

HOW HE LOST HIS LIFE

The accident which was responsible for his life occurred on the south side of the Pere Marquette crossing. It is said that the gate was down. One of the passenger locomotives was in the easterly end of the yards waiting near the Fifth street tower to back down to the Potter street station and pick up a train that was bound for Detroit. Miss JACKSON, so the engineer says, was the only one seen by him. Miss JACKSON told the story of the accident to The News some time ago.

She was crossing the track and was horrified to see one of the big locomotives coming around the slight curve which is partially hidden by the large frame warehouse on the east side of the street. She thought she would be run over. Just as the locomotive was within

a few feet of her someone gave her a might shove and she was thrown onto the tracks beyond.

That is all that was known. The engineer stopped his engine. Beneath it lay the body of a man. The body was just below the cab window. The locomotive was run down to the depot and a stretcher placed aboard and COLE was rushed to St Mary's hospital.

His entrance there was signalized by an immediate amputation which took off the mangled limbs. For a few days it was expected that the shock and loss of blood would result in death. A strong, rugged constitution hardened by years of daily labor, pulled him through that crisis, but pneumonia set in, causing his death. COLE was 55 years old.

RESIDED HERE TWO YEARS

Mr COLE was born near Lexington in Huron county and for many years resided at Howell, Mich, coming to Saginaw about two years ago. He was married, but his wife died ten years ago. There are two children surviving, a boy, Francis, 21 years old, who is in the navy and cannot be located, and a daughter, Vera, fourteen years old, who makes her home with a relative in Flint. The girl is afflicted with a crippled hip. There are a large number of brothers and sisters surviving, they being Mrs A WALTERS of Flint, Mrs James NEIL of Bay City, Mrs Mary TERRY of Flint, and Mrs Christina PUMPFORD of Flint, and the brothers William A COLE, 1117 South Washington avenue, this city; George of Oxford, Mich; Charles of Flint and Nona of Montrose, Genesee county.

Mr COLE was a member and enthusiastic worker in the City Rescue Mission and became one of the most earnest of that band three or four weeks before his accident. Miss JACKSON was also a worker in the Mission.

The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock Friday morning from the undertaking parlors of W Frazee & Sons, with the City Rescue Mission in charge, Rev A R ADAMS conducting the services. The body will be taken to Oxford, Mich, for interment at noon Friday. Those who wish to view the remains can do so by calling at the undertaking parlors this evening or Thursday

THE COLE FUND

The total amount of the fund subscribed to date to reward the late Mr COLE, and now in the hands of The News, is \$372.50.

It has been suggested that the fund be used to purchase and erect a monument to Mr COLE as a testimonial of citizens of Saginaw to the heroic act which cost him his life

It has also been suggested that the fund be turned over to Mr COLE's daughter of fifteen, who was dependent on him.

The News would like to hear from those who have subscribed to the fund as to disposition of it, or if they prefer to have their subscriptions returned.

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THE VERA COLE FUND

The News has investigated the fact concerning the daughter, Vera, of the late Alfred D COLE, and finds them to be as follows: She is nearly fifteen years old and is very delicate. When a baby she fell out of a high chair and suffered an injury to her shoulder, which not only impaired its use, but has also impaired her health. This little girl is practically without a home. She has been staying with relatives, first one and then another. Her father's earnings were small, and at the time of the accident which cost him his life he was planning to go to housekeeping and have his daughter with him. Recently Vera has been cared for by Mr and Mrs Alva WATERS in Flint, but at present she is with Mr and Mrs William A COLE, 1117 South Washington avenue. She has absolutely no means of support and is dependent entirely on her relatives. She is not sufficiently strong to earn her own living. She should be in school and comfortably cared for.

The News has received many expressions from contributors to the fund subscribed for her father, all of which are that the fund be turned over in trust to her use and benefit. It believes this is the proper use of the money, and it is also believes it would be a worthy act to further increase this fund to not less than \$500. One thousand dollars would not be too much. It therefore reopens its columns to this purpose and will be pleased to receive further subscriptions to the fund, with the understanding that it is to be placed in trust for Vera COLE, and applied to her use and benefit.

The funeral of the late Alfred D COLE, who died as the result of injuries received when he saved the life of Miss Ivis JACKSON at the Third avenue crossing of the Pere Marquette, was held Friday morning at 10 o'clock from Frazee's undertaking rooms, Rev Albert R ADAMS officiating. There was a large attendance of friends, many of whom had known him in his work at the City Rescue Mission attending. A quartet from the Mission sang "Jesus Lover of My Soul," "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Nearer My God to Thee." The remains were taken on the noon train to Oxford, where interment takes place.

IN BUENA VISTA 60
YEARS, DIES AT 89

After living in Buena Vista for 60 years and watching it grow from the wilderness which it was then to the populous community which it now is, Mrs Louise ANKLAM, widow of Christopher ANKLAM, and one of the first settlers in Buena Vista, died Monday at the residence of her daughter, Mrs C F WILL, on the Washington road. Death was due to senility. Mrs ANKLAM has been in ill health for the past five years.

She was born in Neudorf, Schlanke, Germany, September 20, 1828, being 89 years of age. She was married in Posen March 6, 1852, and came to this country that same year, settling in Cleveland where they lived for four years. In 1856 they came to Saginaw and lived for two years on the spot where the Central school now stands, moving in 1858 to Buena Vista. Mr ANKLAM died in 1913. Mrs ANKLAM was a member of St John's Evangelical Lutheran church and she was one of those who were instrumental in building the frame church which preceded the present brick structure.

Mrs ANKLAM is survived by three sons and one daughter, John, Michael and Edward ANKLAM and Mrs C F WILL, all of Buena Vista, and one brother, Christopher REETZ of West Branch

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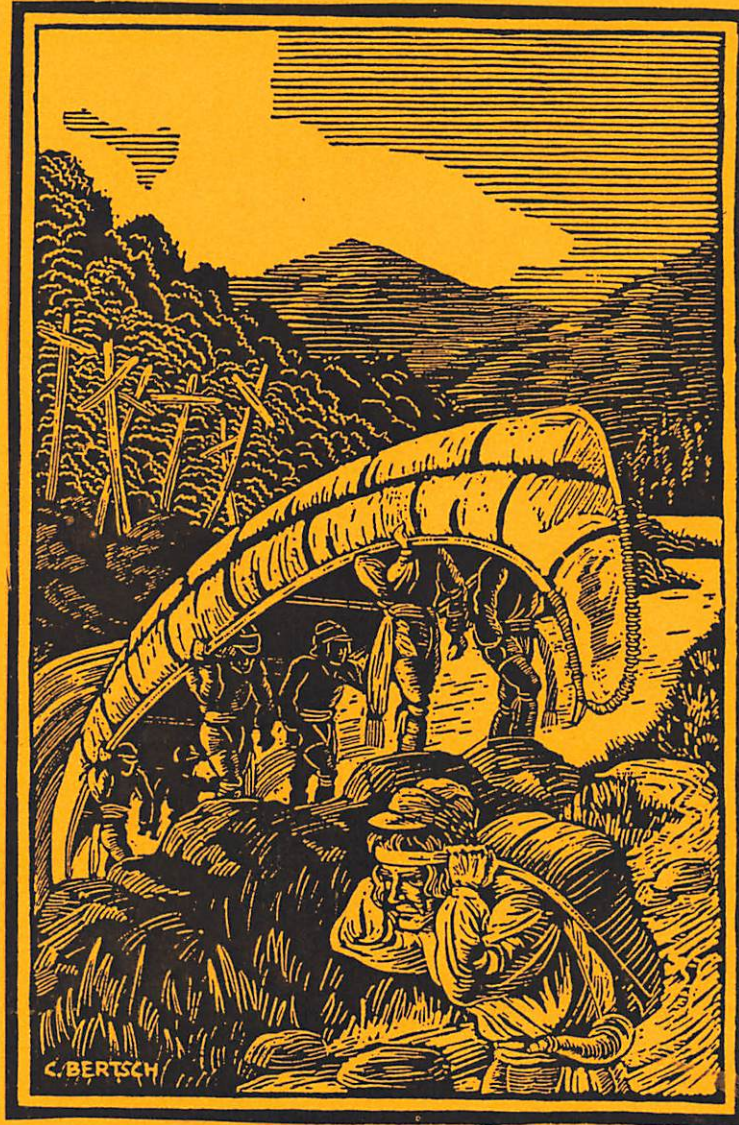

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**C. H. DAVIS, PIONEER
LUMBERMAN HERE,
DIES SATURDAY**

C h Davis, pioneer of the lumbering days in Saginaw and one of the city's most widely known and highly respected citizens, died at his home, 515 North Michigan avenue, at 11:30 o'clock Saturday morning. Mr Davis had been ill for about five weeks, but death came suddenly and as a great shock to his family, as it was believed he was improving. Cause of death was angine pectoris.

Mr Davis was born in Andover, Mass in August, 1848, having just passed his seventieth birthday. He had lived in Saginaw for upwards of 40 years and had extensive lumbering interests both in the Saginaw valley, in the lumber days of the valley, and in other timber lands.

Deceased is survived by his widow, one son, C H Davis, jr of Portland, Ore, one daughter, Mrs Fred E Weyerhaeuser of St Paul, Minn and one sister, Mrs Reuben Kimball of Detroit

CHARLES HENRY DAVIS

The boyhood days of Charles H Davis, the pioneer Saginaw lumberman who died Saturday, were spent on a farm which was situated about two miles from Portsmouth, New Hampshire. While attending to the minor duties which naturally fell to a small lad on the farm, he went to the district school. At ten years of age he entered the grammar school, in which he continued for about four years, and then advanced to the Portsmouth high school, the instruction of which he received for a like period to the close of the course. During these years at the high school among his schoolmates was Willie T Knowlton, with whom he was long associated in business, whose parents lived close by, the friendship and mutual confidence thus formed continuing through life.

In the winter of 1864, he supplemented the knowledge which he had thus gained with a full course in Eastman Business College, of Poughkeepsie, New York, acquiring the theory and rudimentary practice of business. He then returned to the farm for four years engaged with his brothers in market gardening, the green produce and fruits which they grew finding a ready market at Portsmouth, all to some extent in the resort colony at Rye Beach.

While thus making a modest start in active business life, his youthful imagination was kindled by glowing accounts of the opportunities arising in the west, and he formed the ambitious plan of sometime, when he should come of age, seeking his fortune on the western frontier. He had heard of the undeveloped wealth of the Michigan forests, and of the productive valley of

the Saginaw, and being fond of the "great outdoors" and woodland life, he resolved to locate in the Wolverine state. Accordingly, in the fall of 1869, he landed in Saginaw City, an entire stranger in the place. In a few days he was offered a job of scaling logs by Newell Barnard, but as he was unfamiliar with this work he was obliged to decline it. Meanwhile he had been impressed by the great lumbering operations of Ammi W Wright, in association with James H Pearson, of Chicago, and determined to secure employment with him, if possible.

Asked for Job

One day he mustered his courage and approached the big lumberman to ask for a job, resolved to begin at the bottom and master every detail of the business. Mr Wright quietly sized up the sturdy figure of the young man, and, evidently liking his appearance and confident manner, offered him work of piling lumber in the yard at twenty dollars a month and his board, remarking in his usual brusque yet kingly tone, "that his clothes were pretty good for this rough occupation."

But when the young man appeared the next morning in his farm work clothes, and began shoving lumber with strong arm and resolute will, his employer observed that he was evidently not of that class of youths, of which he had had some experience, who sought the easy, soft jobs in business. He thereupon concluded that the young fellow was well worth watching. That he found him not wanting in the elements that make for a successful career, is evident from the fact that three months after, he one day called him into the office, which still

stands at the corner of Niagara and Throop street, to give him other and advanced employment. After questioning him as to his knowledge of accounting, he offered him the position of bookkeeper for the firm, which was about to be made vacant by the promotion of Smith Palmer to the cashiership of the First National Bank of Saginaw, shortly before organized by Mr Wright.

To this new work Mr Davis applied his characteristic energy, native ability and thoroughness in handling details, and soon became invaluable to his employers, having the faculty of doing the right thing at the right time. A year and a half later he was placed in charge of the affairs of Seymour Coleman, who operated the Pearson mill on the west bank of the river, a short distance north of the Wright property. In this position he was equally successful in meeting the full expectations of Mr Wright and his associates.

It is quite apparent that these episodes in the life of Mr Davis were the rising tide in his affairs, which, as later events showed, were taken at the flood and led to fortune.

Bought Pine Tract

In the winter of 1871-72, when about to make a prospecting trip into the woods, Mr Wright invited Mr Davis to accompany him, and from this date begins the successful career of the younger man. Backed by the keen judgment and money of Mr Wright, he joined his benefactor in the purchase of a valuable tract of pine land on Bullock Creek, near the village of Midland. The timber on this tract was cut, dumped into

the stream, rafted to the mill at Saginaw, and sawed into merchantable lumber for the large and increasing trade of the firm. Soon after the firm of Wright, Wells & Company was organized, which, besides its principal, Mr Wright, was composed of Charles W Wells, Charles H Davis and Reuben Kimball. They operated on a large scale at Wright's Lake, in Otsego county, cutting white pine timber from adjacent tracts and sawing it into stock for the general trade. For eleven years this business was conducted with great success, and in 1883, Messrs Wells and Kimball retired, when the firm became Wright & Davis. Some time after, the remaining interests were sold to Henry Stephens & Son, who continued the lumbering operations.

About this time the firm began blocking timber in Minnesota, and soon, after Charles W Wells and Farnum C Stone were admitted in the to company, and the name changed to Wright, Davis & Company. Among the valuable holdings that they acquired, were about seventy thousand acres of pine line in Itasca and St Louis counties, upon which the late Morris Quinn had discovered traces of the existence of iron ore. Although not especially interested in the ore deposits, when the company sold the timber holdings to the Weyerhaeuser interest in 1892, they reserved the fee to about twenty thousand acres, upon which was later developed one of the largest producing mines in the famous Mesaba Range, estimated to contain more than fifty million tons of ore

Built Railroad

Mr Davis was also interested in the Swan River Logging company, formed by Mr Wright and his associates, which

took a contract from the purchasers of the lands to lumber the tract, and built 35 miles of railroad, called the Duluth, Mississippi River & Northern, with about 30 miles of logging branches, from the banks of the Mississippi to Hibbing, Minn, to transport the timber and iron ore to outside connections. They then entered into a contract with the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic railroad, which had built ore docks at Alloues Bay, near Superior, Wis, whereby the railroad leased traffic rights over their line, furnished the cars and motive power to haul the ore, paying for said rights on the basis of 20 cents per ton. Over the main logging road was hauled annually for several years about one hundred million feet of logs, besides a heavy tonnage of iron ore from the mines on the lands of Wright, Davis & Co. In 1896 the firm sold their fee to the iron ore deposits, and assigned their traffic contracts to James J Hill and his associates; and soon after closed up their operations in Minnesota. After that date Mr Davis became interested in timber purchases on the Pacific coast, of which he acquired large holdings.

In the year 1900, Messrs Wright and Davis, in association with D D Blodgett and his son, John W Blodgett, organized the Wright-Blodgett company, Limited, and purchased a large block of yellow pine timber lands in Louisiana. In 1905 Mr Wright and D A Blodgett retired from the company, leaving Messrs Davis and Blodgett, the estates of Charles W Wells, Farnum C Stone, Willis T Knowlton and Gilbert M Stark and others to continue the large and profitable business

Married in 1872

On August 20, 1872, Mr Davis was united in marriage with Miss Edith Frink, of Hebron, Pennsylvania, and brought his bride to Saginaw, where they made their home. Two children were born to them, Harriet, now Mrs Frederick Weyerhaeuser of St Paul, Minn and Charles Henry Davis, jr, a resident of Portland, Ord, who married Miss Anita Bwines of that city in September, 1912. In 1883 Mr Davis built the spacious and pleasant home at 515 North Michigan avenue, which in the following years was the scene of many brilliant social functions. With its clinging vines and beautiful gardens it is one of the most attractive residences of the west side.

It may be said of Charles H Davis that he was a true-hearted gentleman of the old school. He was kind, generous, broad minded and possessed a clear vision respecting public matters, in which he took much interest. Standing well above middle height, with a ruddy face and a clear eye, his every word and movement testifies to his physical well-being. Through very fond of a quiet home life, he has traveled extensively in this country and in Europe, but in winter lived in his beautiful home in Pasadena, Cal

Coming to Saginaw 45 years ago, with no capital but an indomitable will, earnest purpose, and unflinching integrity, combined with industry and an interest in the business of his employer, the latter was not slow to appreciate and to reward by advancement to more responsible and lucrative positions. Mr Davis worked his way to a high position in the business world. He was an example worthy the emulation of all young men who seek success in life, and

may invariably find it in paths of diligence, economy and perseverance in any honorable calling.

RESIDENT OF WEST SIDE

FOR 47 YEARS PASSES AWAY

George Washington, Negro Veteran of Civil War, is Victim of Attack of Paralysis

George Washington, a respected negro resident of Saginaw for the past 47 years, died Thursday of paralysis at his home, 201 South Bates street. He was 72 years old. It was in 1870 when Mr Washington came to this city and he conducted a barber shop in the old Taylor house which was where the Hotel Fordney now stands. He also operated in several other locations on the west side. He was a familiar figure on the streets of the city and enjoyed a wide acquaintance.

He was born in Garrett county, Ky, December 25, and at the age of nine years went to Laporte, Ind which was his home until the outbreak of the civil war. He became an aide to Majoy Clark and served three years after which he enlisted in Co F, 102 Regiment Colored Infantry, and served thus until the close of the war. November 2, 1870 he was married to Miss Eliza Jane Malvine of St Joseph, Mich and shortly afterward they moved here

Besides his widow he leaves three sons and four daughters, Fred of Saginaw, George of the 24th infantry, Columbus, NM, William and Mrs Charles Carpenter of Chicago, Mrs T H Williams of Detroit, Mrs L L Goings and Mrs D D Moore of Grand Rapids. He was a member of the Michigan Avenue Baptist church. The funeral will take place Sunday.

HINTS FOR THE BATH

For protecting the hair during a shower bath or in a large plunge a cap of waterproof silk is light and comfortable.

The rule is: Hot water for the tub bath, cold water for the shower bath, water of normal temperature for the plunge.

It is hardly necessary to remind the bather that weakened digestion is the result of bathing within an hour of a full meal.

If the temperature of the bath water is either above or below normal the face and edges of the hair should be thoroughly moistened with the water before the plunge is made.

One should never stay in a bath tub more than ten minutes, nor in a shower bath over two. In a plunge bath one may safely stay twenty minutes, as the exercise prevents bad effects.

A return from a dusty trip or a ride in the wind should be followed by a hot rather than a cold bath. The escaping steam induces perspiration and the hot water washes out the fine dust.

If one is contemplating the necessity of exposure to sun or wind, a cold water bath is better than a warm one, as it toughens the skin and makes it firmer in its resistance to unfavorable conditions.

The strained juice of three lemons, if put in the bath water, will give one a delicious sense of cleanliness. The acid removes all stoppage of the pores caused

by the accumulation of saline substances.

The bather who has had recommended to her cold water baths and who cannot overcome her repugnance to them may be sure that this shrinking is the warning of a delicate constitution that the treatment is too drastic.

By procuring two cents' worth of coarse rock salt and allowing it a little time to dissolve the equivalent of a sea bath may be had. This is a beautiful way of bathing, as salt invigorates the skin and quickens the action of the glands in the skin.

The luxurious maid who is in the habit of putting toilet perfumes in the water of her bath will find a mixture of the same quantity of pure alcohol with a few drops of handkerchief perfume far more satisfactory, and, being less liable to adulteration, helpful, not harmful, to the skin

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DEATH OF MRS ISAAC DELANO

Well Known Saginaw Woman Passes Away
After Brief Illness

Had Passed Practically Entire Life in This
City—Formerly Teacher in Schools

Death claimed another spirit dear to a large circle of friends in Saginaw yesterday morning when the final summons was answered by Mrs Isaac D DELANO at the Woman's hospital. Her passing will be a severe blow to a host of friends, scarcely any of whom were aware of her precarious condition of health. Her illness was of very brief duration, beginning with a slight chill Monday morning. At once taken to the hospital she received the best possible attention and the utmost care, but gradually gave way before the ravages of a complication of maladies it became generally understood by those intimately associated with her that death was inevitable. Nevertheless the tidings of her death yesterday morning at eight o'clock was a severe shock and one that was to the majority most unexpected. A student in the true sense of the word, being read on almost every branch of literature, Mrs DELANO revealed to the community a life seldom equaled for unselfishness and influence for betterment. Her activities were many and in each her loss will be a blow, almost irreparable.

SPENT LIFE IN SAGINAW

Ida Frances WOODRUFF was born Dec 26, 1847 at Flat Rock, Mich, where she lived with her parents until 1856. At this time she came with her parents to Saginaw, which has been her home up to the last. Her elementary education was concluded in the public schools here and, supplemented by wide reading and her particularly studious habits, she acquired a learning and information that might easily

have won distinction for her in a literary field.

When later she became a teacher in the public schools of this city a vast amount of noble work was accomplished in the performance of her duties, done with whole souled pleasure in the task. Her career as a teacher lasted about ten years, at the end of which time she married Isaac DELANO, who survives her. The marriage ceremony took place at the home of her parents, May 21, 1879. Later the WOODRUFFS moved to Farwell, Mich

DEVOTED TO DOMESTIC LIFE

In her domestic life, Mrs DELANO exhibited a devotion that was a fine portrayal of the true housewife. Her first concern was her home and family and in seeking their comfort she made many sacrifices, often foregoing her own personal comfort for the pleasure of others. She bore trouble with cheerfulness and brightened the lives of all who have had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Even to the last she showed an interest in children and many students have derived untold advantages from tutoring pursued with her. This was often said by her to be one of the pleasantest of her activities, she closely enjoying the work.

An active member of the First Congregational church, Mrs DELANO did not restrict her activities to any particular branch of church work. She gained a reputation for clear thinking and always displayed a grasp of finer things that has been a source of pleasure to her close friends. She has held various offices among the societies of the church where most important work was accomplished. In the Sunday school a class of girls reaped the benefit from contact with her personality. In her church life more than anywhere else Mrs DELANO will be sorely missed

ACTIVE IN SOCIAL LIFE

As a member of various clubs of the city many honors have been shown her from time to time. In the Saginaw Woman's club much was accomplished in a literary way. She was a wonderful aid to her fellow workers and contributed much to the betterment of the organization. She was president-elect when she died.

Mrs DELANO was a director of the Young Women's Christian association and was closely identified with its work up to the time of her death

There are surviving besides the husband, two sons, Edward W DELANO, and Evans H DELANO, both living at home. There are also four sisters and two brothers, Miss Amanda WOODRUFF, of Bridgeport; Mrs Elizabeth WALLER, Saginaw; Mrs Mary W EDGET, Bridgeport; Mrs Harriet CARPENTER, Muskegon; Henry W WOODRUFF, Roscommon, Mich, and Willis H WOODRUFF, Bridgeport

THE FUNERAL ARRANGEMENTS

As an especial privilege to the immediate friends of the family, it was stated last night that the remains will lie at the family home, 315 South Jeffeson avenue, where they may be viewed between the hours of 10 and 12 Saturday morning. The casket will be closed at this time, the funeral taking place from the Congregational church at 2 o'clock. Rev N S BRADLEY, who has regarded Mrs DELANO as one of the most talented and brilliant members of his congregation, will officiate at the funeral services. Interment will take place in Forest Lawn cemetery.

Her Life A Source of Inspiration Says Rev N S Bradley

Attended by the most impressive ceremonies, the remains of Mrs Isaac D DELANO were yesterday afternoon laid away in Forest Lawn cemetery. Following a brief prayer at the home of the bereaved family on Jefferson avenue, the funeral moved to the First Congregational church, where Rev N S BRADLEY led in paying tribute to the memory of Mrs DELANO. The church was well filled with those who had known the deceased

"Mrs DELANO has made the greatest possible contributions to the three greatest institutions of the world," said Rev Mr BRADLEY, "the home, the church and the state." Her whole life in this city has been a source of inspiration to those with whom she has come in contact. Her willingness to work has at times appeared remarkable. As far as I know she has never expressed a doubt in speculating about the future. This is an unmistakable mark of strength of character. While in Saginaw I have found Mrs DELANO to be an exceptional source of inspiration and have known her to be a lady of worth unsurpassed."

Mr BRADLEY spoke of the value of the deceased to the church and the irreparable loss that would be sustained through her death. Mrs BENN sang two touching selections

Following the church service the remains, accompanied by only the closest friends of the deceased and the immediate family, were taken to Forest Lawn cemetery. The grave was strewn with evergreens and roses. The service at the grave was touching in the extreme

MORTALITY'S MANDATE

Death of Ex-County Treasurer John C Valentine

John C VALENTINE, a well-known citizen died at his residence, at the corner of Washington avenue and Brady street, at 4:25 am yesterday, of consumption, after an illness of thirteen months, and confinement to his room since January 15. For eight weeks past he was unable to leave his bed. The event though not unexpected created general regret. Deceased was born in New York city in 1834; his early years were passed in that city and at Greenbush, when he was engaged in a store. After attaining his majority he removed to Chicago, and thence to Desoto, Wis, where he was engaged in trade several years. In 1861 Mr VALENTINE was married to Miss Mattie J MAYFIELD of St Louis, Mo, who with three children, one daughter and two sons, survive him. Mr VALENTINE came to East Saginaw in 1863, and during the first two years was in the employ of G S WEAVER of Albany, NY, his cousin. Subsequently he was in the employ of Hon W R BURT four years, and Sears & Holland seven years. Deceased was for a number of years identified with the city government, serving as school inspector, alderman of the Fifth ward four years, and city assessor one year, a position he resigned to accept the position of county treasurer to which he was elected and served two years, his term expiring on January 1st. The funeral will occur on Wednesday from the Congregational church at 2:30 pm under the auspices of St Bernard Commandery, K T. The remains can be viewed at the residence from 10 am to 1 pm Wednesday

LAID AT REST

The Funeral of the Late J C Valentine— "Rest to his Soul and Peace in His Ashes"

The remains of the late J C VALENTINE were viewed yesterday from 10 am till 1 pm by numerous friends who knew him in life as an honorable, upright and conscientious business man, whom to know was to honor and respect. The farewell look taken by many was very affecting, especially by his brothers-in-arms, among whom he was a beloved member, and also by those who had been associated with him in business relations and city and county offices. The room where the remains were on view was appropriately decorated with flowers and evergreens. The remains were encased in a beautiful Stein 'monarch' casket, a combination of velvet and broadcloth, with embossed velvet mouldings, with silver extension handles on the side and small bar handles on each end. On the top near the head was a Knights Templar cross and crown and in the usual place was the memorial plate with the inscription:

JOHN C VALENTINE

Died

March 14th, 1881

Aged

47 years and 21 days

At the foot of the casket was the Masonic square and compass. Inside the upholstery was of a very fine order, being composed of fine cloth with raised silk flowers and wheat, and was supplied by D I PRALL, under whose management the funeral was conducted. The casket was appropriately decorated with smilax and floral designs, cross, anchor, etc. At 2 o'clock Sir Knights numbering about fifty swords, headed by Prof BELSA full band, with muffled instruments, marched to the residence. The sword and chapeau of the deceased was placed on the casket and Sir Knights Fred A ASHLEY, J B PETER, O J HETHERINGTON, D B BROWN, Geo C MERRILL and Frank LAWRENCE acted as pall-bearers. The remains were conveyed to the church which had been handsomely decorated with flowers by the ladies of the church. On the altar were numerous ferns

and hot-house plants, appropriately arranged, on the right was an elegant cross of white roses, lillies, etc, on the left an anchor of the same, while in front was a pillow of white flowers, with the word "Rest" in violet immortelles. The services were conducted by the Rev Warren F DAY, assisted by Revs Theodore NELSON and J T OXTOPY. Miss Alma JONES presided at the organ, and a choir, consisting of Mrs KRENKLE-STEVENSON, Mrs Chas H HOLLAND, Gurdon CORNING and Chas F SHAW sang hymns which had been selected by the deceased himself. The services were commenced by the choir singing "Thy Will be Done," after which the Rev J T OXTOPY read a passage from the 44th chapter of the First Epistle of Paul to the Thessalonians. The choir then sang "Rock of Ages" as selected by Mr VALENTINE prior to his death. Rev Theodore NELSON offered an appropriate prayer asking the Father's sheltering care over the widow, and to give her courage, faith, wisdom and strength, and the sweet consciousness of the friendship of God, to be more than a father to the fatherless children, and to make them a blessing to their mother and a benediction to the world to remember the mother of the departed bowed down with years and grief; enable her to feel that at even time it shall be light; remember the church of which he was a member and the fraternity to which he belonged, who were paying the last sad tender offices of affection in this world.

The choir then sang, by request, the 1,206 hymn:

I would not live always, I ask not to stay,
Where storm after storm rises dark o'er the way
The few lurid mornings that dawn on us here
Are enough for life's woes, full enough for its cheer

Rev Warren F DAY then delivered an appropriate and fitting address, taking for his text the 19th, 20th 21st and 22nd verses of the 31st Psalm. He thought the words of the

text were so appropriate to the relations and memories of the hour that little need to be said further. He dwelt upon the fact of the deceased giving his heart to the Lord, the consoling fact it was to his family and friends. Once more the business ranks of our city has been broken; one man less to help transact its business. In the great throng of citizens a man has gone; still we should look upon it as a stupendous event, a greater event than should a star drop out of the firmament. A man has gone, a thinker has gone, one who had the power of emotion has gone, one who had the power to receive and to give has gone, one who had the power to think of God and human destiny has gone, a man has gone; there is another gap in the business circle, we have one citizen less. Once more the ranks of that society whose motto was the cry of the early christian church has been again broken and they mourn the loss of a brother. In the church there is a gap—a member who for over 13 years has found his name on the rolls is gone; a member at whose request a few members of the church went from the communion service to the home, where he again celebrated the holy communion receiving these emblems of the living God and God's blessing; something which as a church will not soon be forgotten. A home has been broken, a home where he has been the chief corner stone, a home where love and peace reigned. Cast upon his own resources in this world at 17 years of age he has gone out at 47—18 years of which he was a citizen in this city. In his last days he was so careful of those whom he loved and should leave, thinking of everything that should help them in the days to come. The reverend gentleman commended the family to the gracious goodness of God, which goodness God alone can give, to His sympathy, His care, His tenderness, who has always proved a comfort to those who have suffered bereavement. The usual service of the fraternity who with drawn swords and uncovered heads responded to the words of prelate DURAND, and pledged themselves to cherish the name of that brother whose life had been a burning light in their midsts

and for whom the alarm which none could challenge had come to the door of their asylum. A prayer by Rev Theo NELSON brought the services at the church to a close. The remains were then consigned to Brady Hill cemetery, where the usual services of the fraternity were performed. The sight was an affecting one; as they gathered round the grave and listened to the words of the eminent prelate, gazing for the last time on the casket that contained the remains of one was near and dear to them as a working brother. The eyes of many of the strong men present were suffused with tears. "Rest to his ashes, peace to his soul;"

The attendance at the church was large, and numerous carriages formed in the procession to the grave, showing the respect in which the deceased was held by his fellow townsmen

**State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia to
North America**

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

How Saginaw Streets Got Names

WRIGHT WAS LUMBER BARON

He Moved to and Took Great Interest in Alma

Alma gets the spotlight today. We haven't a street named after that town but we do have one named Wright after Ammi W Wright, the man who put Alma on the map. He did that after he had helped to make the Saginaw valley the world's lumber center.

Coming to the valley from Vermont via Boston and Detroit, Wright first lived at Pine Run, Now Clio, in 1851. In the 60's he and Harry Miller bought the "Big Mill" at the foot of Throop street in Saginaw City and later built a large planing mill on the west side of the river at Bristol street. Mr and Mrs Wright moved to Saginaw City about the same time. In 1878, because of Mrs Wright's failing health, the couple moved for a while to Saratoga Springs, NY, where Mrs Wright died in 1885.

After her death, Wright bought a farm near the settlement of Alma. He hadn't been there long when he took an active interest in the town. He built the Opera House block, a group of stores, the three-story Wright House, the Alma Creamery and the Alma Flouring mill. In 1887 he built the Alma sanitarium, which he later gave to Michigan Masons.

Wright was president of the First National Bank of Saginaw when it was organized in 1871 and also was president of banks in Mt Pleasant, Battle Creek and Duluth, Minn. Besides that, he was interested in five other banks and about two dozen sugar, electric light, hardware and other assorted kinds of companies. He also was one of the first valley lumbermen to develop lumber and mineral resources of Minnesota, mostly around Hibbing.

HABITUAL CRIMINAL GETS LIFE SENTENCE

William Kutzbach, Captured After Jail Break, Pleads Guilty

A life sentence to the state prison at Marquette was given William Kutzbach, 28, of 1847 West Michigan avenue, when he pleaded guilty Monday before Circuit Judge Martin on charges made under the habitual criminal act. Kutzbach's latest offense was theft of \$300 worth of equipment from St Vincent orphans' farm near Shields. He gained brief freedom by an escape from the county jail Saturday but was captured by sheriff's deputies three hours after his escape.

Herman Gough, 19 years old, 1020 Gallagher street, charged with felonious assault pleaded not guilty Monday before Circuit Judge Martin and his bond was set at \$1,000. He is accused of hitting Andrew Schwarzott, 55, of 916 Webber street, on the head with an automobile jack.

Burt Morrow, who was arrested at 911 Cass street, September 28 for violation of the liquor law, pleaded not guilty and was released on his own recognizance.

FINDS 1934 AUTO TAGS SURE SIGN OF TROUBLE

William Butzin, city market policemen, usually doesn't have much to do on Monday mornings. Traffic through the market is slow and there aren't many buyers, ordinarily. So this morning he leisurely made his rounds. Suddenly he stopped, fixed his gaze on a producer's truck, blinked and rubbed his eyes, It was a 1934 license plate he saw. Patrolman Butzin proceeded toward the owner of the truck. The conversation went like this:

"Say, aren't you a little out of date with those plates?"

"Well, officers, to tell you the truth, I haven't had time to put the new plates on. They're under the front seat of the truck," said the offender as though that explained everything.

Whereupon Butzin flourished a small black book in which he makes record of such things. Action was brisk and sudden. The truck owner clambered from his vehicle and said the license-plate change would be immediately. It was, and was supervised by Butzin.

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BLONDIN SENTENCED BY JUDGE W G GAGE

Was Given one and a Half to Five Years at Ionia Reformatory

Frank Blondin, the navy man who was found guilty of highway robbery last week in Judge William Glover Gage's court, was sentenced Monday morning to serve from one and a half to five years. Blondin, with several others, held up a man from Midland at Carrollton early last spring and the evidence showed that Blondin took his money. Soon afterward he enlisted but a warrant charging highway robbery was issued and he was brought back from Norfolk by Sheriff Schulz

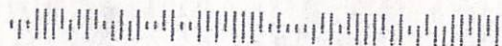
