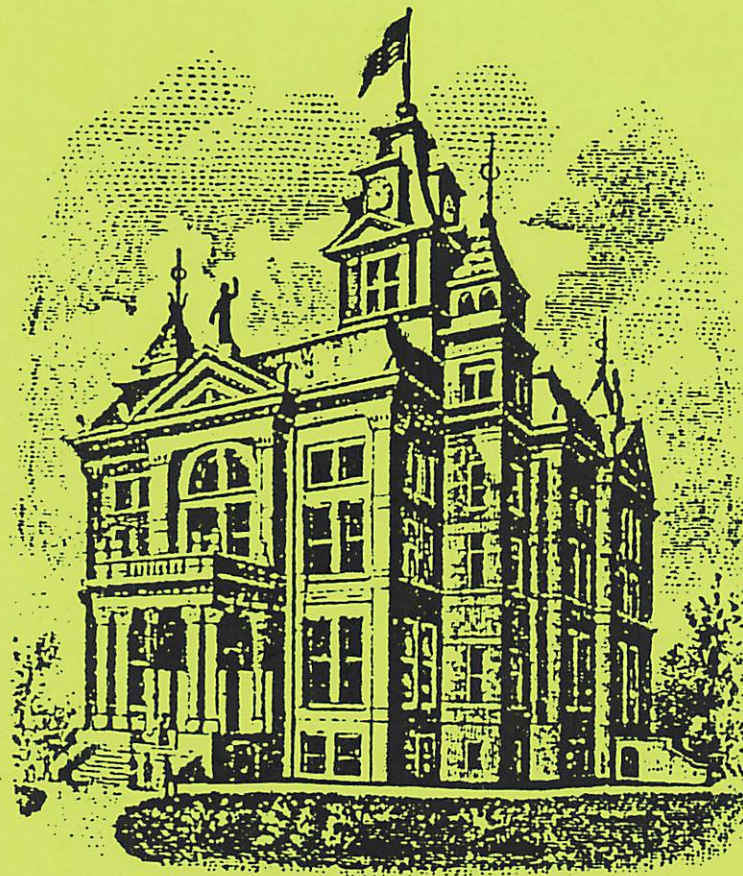

THE MINER'S DEATH

Written on the Death of **MILBURN WILSON**

At St. Charles

Whatever be the skill of man,  
The law of fate derides,  
And often with the wisest plan  
Some hidden power decides;

So that there's something intervenes  
To thwart whate'er we do,  
And where are often joyful scenes  
The tragic comes in view.

Light-hearted Milburn Wilson stepped-  
The way he wished to show-  
And to an instant death was swept,  
Two hundred feet below.

The anguished souls that loved the dead  
Feel nothing but despair,  
But nature kindly steps ahead  
And eases every care..

Thus time doth pave the way for all  
To bear the troubles dealt,  
The Christ-like spirit lifts the pall,  
Another life is felt.

A MINER KILLED

**MILBURN WILSON**, a miner employed at the Somers mine at St. Charles, met a tragic death on Saturday last. Wilson was one of a party of miners who were about to be lowered in the air shaft preparatory to ceiling it. A swinging scaffold was arranged to hang by ropes from four corners and fastened in the center, a short distance higher up, to a hook which in turn was attached to a single hawser. This was the contrivance on which the workmen were to be lowered to their task. The foreman in charge ordered everybody to keep off until the ropes should be made fast in the middle hook, but Wilson jumped to the platform and stood there for a minute. Seemingly it balanced well, and he cried to his companions to follow him, that it was all right. But he stepped to one side of the middle, and quick as a flash the scaffold was off its balance and the miner shot off the inclined plane formed by the tipped scaffold. He clutched the ropes for an instant and his companions were hopeful of rescuing him, but he wearied or fainted and fell to the bottom of the shaft, 188 feet below, being instantly killed.

The deceased was 27 years of age, and leaves a wife and one child. He was a native of the village. The funeral took place on Tuesday.

March 1, 1899

A colored miner named **WHITE**, employed in the Pere Marquette mine, was seriously burned on Saturday last by the premature explosion of a can of powder which he was using in blasting. Although badly injured, he will recover.

March 1, 1899

#### DEATH OF A DRILLER

**BION MILLER**, a driller who has been in the employ of the Monitor Coal Company and Zagelmeyer, Mather & Co, for the past year, dropped dead at Sterling on the 1<sup>st</sup> of March. Heart disease was the cause of death. The deceased was an unmarried man 40 years of age, and had a sister living at Bay City and another at Saginaw. The interment was at Bay City, where the deceased had resided a number of years.

April 1, 1899

#### A FATAL ACCIDENT

**HENRY GRIFFITHS**, a miner employed by the Michigan Coal Company at St. Charles, was fatally injured in the mine on April 20<sup>th</sup> by being struck by a piece of falling slate. His back was broken, and he was removed to St. Mary's Hospital in Saginaw, where he died several days later. The unfortunate man had been warned of the danger, but failed to heed it. The deceased was about 27 years of age and lived with his parents at St. Charles.

May 1, 1899

**CHARLES MEYERS**, a pioneer of St. Charles, and well-known throughout this section, died on Tuesday, April 11<sup>th</sup>, aged 57 years. The funeral took place on Thursday, and the large gathering at the obsequies, which was attended by many friends from Saginaw and other points, attested the esteem in which the deceased was held.

May 1, 1899

#### A MINER BADLY BURNED

**REUBEN BURKES**, a miner employed at Pere Marquette Mine No. 1, was seriously injured last week by the explosion of part of a keg of blasting powder. He had just made a drilling and turned to his keg of powder to get a charge. Either a spark from his lamp or a spark struck by his pick in opening the can, set the powder off and a terrific explosion followed. The force of the explosion, peculiarly enough, was wholly upward and resulted in Burkes' clothes being set on fire. He started to run through the passageway until a fellow miner stopped him and smothered the flames. He was at once removed to his home and medical aid summoned. He was found to be badly burned, but it is expected will recover.

June 1, 1899

#### A MINER FOUND DEAD

**HUGH FREAL**, a miner employed in the Wenona mine, threatened to commit suicide and subsequently mysteriously disappeared. Nothing was heard from him for some days, when his body was discovered in a water closet back of Joseph Fortin's saloon at Wenona Beach. Fortin had noticed an unusual stench arising from the closet which led him to poke a stick into it and the result was the ghastly discovery as stated. There was about a foot of water in the closet which hid the body. The deceased was about 35 years of age and leaves a wife and family in Illinois.

July 1, 1899

#### TWO MINERS INJURED

**PETER PETERSON** and **GEO. LEIGHTY**, employees of the Monitor coal mine, had a narrow escape from death by an explosion of fire damp on the 26<sup>th</sup> ult.

The men were sent into a deserted entry to remove the car tracks and the foreman says before he went he warned them not to go beyond the pure air with their open lamps. It is customary to use safety lamps in all parts of the mines where there is apt to be fire damp, but the men neglected to take them, and the explosion followed. Both were badly burned about the head and shoulders, and it was thought that Peterson had also inhaled the flames and was burned internally. Their injuries are not serious, however.

August 1, 1899

**ANTON HAREMSKI**, a miner employed at Pere Marquette Mine No. 1, met a terrible death on Jan. 12<sup>th</sup>. He had fired two shots, and as one failed to explode as soon as he thought it should he ventured back. Just as he reached the spot an explosion took place and he was instantly killed, his body being horribly mutilated. The deceased was 40 years of age and leaves a wife and six children. The unfortunate man had been warned not to return into the mine.

February 1, 1900

**STUART SMITH**, a colored miner employed at Pere Marquette Mine No 1, was killed by a fall of slate March 27<sup>th</sup>. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of death caused by falling slate due to negligence by his not properly timbering his room. The deceased was a married man, but had no children.

April 1, 1900

#### EXPLOSION OF DYNAMITE

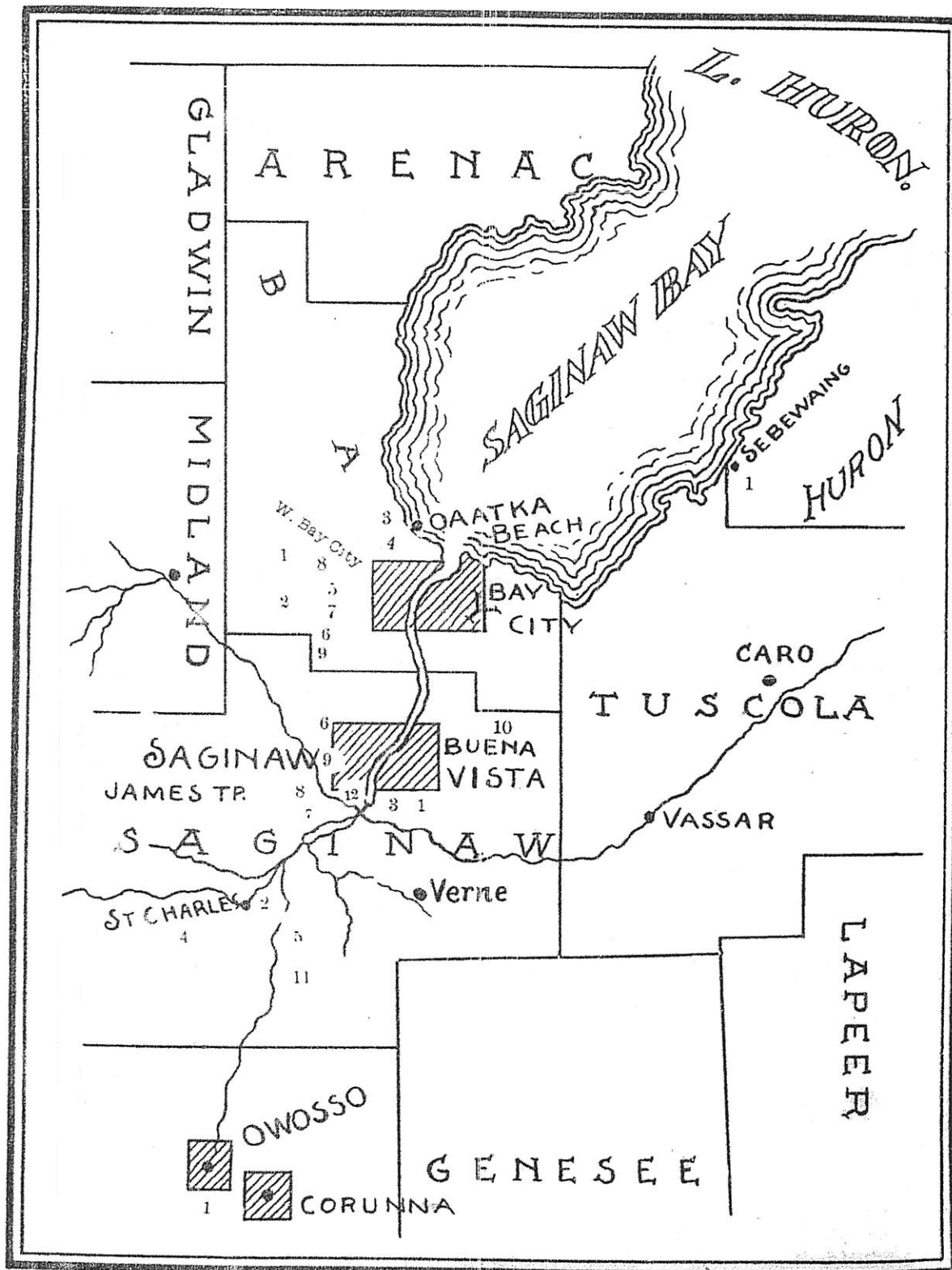
Fifty pounds of dynamite exploded at the mine of the Northern Coal & Transportation Company in James Township on the evening of Saturday, August 25<sup>th</sup>. **JAMES TUCK** and **BERT WILLIAMS** were injured, but not seriously. Their escape was miraculous. The accident is supposed to have been caused by a piece of burning wick from Tuck's lamp falling on the dynamite.

### Have You Checked the "US Civil War Rejected Men" File?

Many men were rejected from Civil War service because of illness or injury. Medical records of drafted and rejected men are at the National Archives, group record #110. They are arranged by Congressional District as of 1863. Data may include residence, occupation, age, place of birth, physical characteristics or reason for rejection under "remarks". There is no record in these files if the recruit was accepted into service.

### Just Being Here is a Miracle

It's a real wonder that we are here today. The commonly held notion of colonial American life - that many generations lived together and shared farm and household chores - is far from the truth.

Few people lived long enough to see their children grown, let alone their grandchildren. Data compiled in 1790 by Dr Benjamin Rush, the prominent physician, indicates that of 100 people born in a given year in Philadelphia, more than one-third died before the age of six, and only one quarter lived beyond age 26.

The life expectancy at birth for Americans was 34.5 years for females when George Washington became President in 1789.

### CENSUS BUREAU ASSISTANCE

A branch of the Census Bureau will assist researchers in obtaining census records from the 1930 - 1990 Federal returns for any person for whom you can supply proof of death. Age Search will, for \$25., search any two census records.

The search is limited to the person for whom you are requesting information, but you may ask for other family members to be included for a \$2. a person fee.

The full line of information from the census return will be provided with payment of a \$6. fee. The basic fee includes an official document stating the person's name, age, place of birth, citizenship and relationship to the head of the household.

### Church of Ireland Records Will Help

Church of Ireland records held at Cobb, County Cork, extensively cover the baptisms, marriages and interments of the families of British servicemen based in the area approximately 1760, and these show against each entry, the name of the army unit or HM ship on which the husband served. A research fee of \$20. which goes to the church, is charged. As to searches are done by hand - be patient.

### Have You Heard About the Irish "Griffith's Valuation?"

Griffith's Valuation in Ireland was an undertaking in the late 1840s and early 1850s and was done as a primary tax valuation of land and structures on the land. In the valuation records, you find the name of the landlord and renter as well as a description of the property and its taxable income.

Today Griffiths is used as primarily a census substitute, given the loss of Irish census records due to fire or other means of destruction. It does not give you the actual makeup of the family, but it does give you the possibility of locating the townland that your family came from as well as possibly finding other people with the same last name, nearby, who might be related.

Griffiths also provides a Household Surname Index to both Griffiths and the Tithes that can be used to track the incidence of your surname and on occasion this can locate possible places where your ancestor lived. These records are not for the beginning researcher!

Lastly, Griffiths can form a basis for further searches of land records help in Dublin at the Valuation Office. There you can actually track



the possession of the land from about 1853 until the early 1930s through subsequent valuations. Additionally since Griffiths provides you with the name of the landowner, sometimes if they were large landowners, you can then access their estate records through the National Library or the National Archives.

#### MAIDEN NAMES, PLEASE

Increasingly, Federal Census forms are reflecting the commercial interests of our country. As genealogists, we need to be sure that information valuable to our descendants is included. Many persons are requesting that a space for "Mother's Maiden Name" be included on the census in 2000.

Many genealogical societies request that you lend your voice to this request by writing to Mr Harry Scarr, Acting Director of the Census Bureau, PO Box 20233 Washington DC (no Zip given) Send copies of your letter to your Senators and Representatives.

#### RIESIGE - SWISS MERCENARIES

Although Switzerland is known for its unwavering neutrality and international diplomacy, not all of its residents have continually abstained from battle. From the 15th century to the 19th, over one million Swiss mercenaries, known as *Riesige* or "giants". They served in foreign armies, sometimes on opposing sides.

Switzerland banned the practice in 1859, but to this day there remains one exception -- The Swiss Guards who watch over the Vatican in Rome.

#### REMEMBER HUMPTY DUMPTY?

Xavier Allen writes, in *The Highland Fling*: Many people don't realize what innocent nursery rhymes truly relate to: "Humpty Dumpty" relates to King James IV of Scotland, who died at Flodden in 1513.

He was a very large man who rode the largest horse in 16th century Scotland nicknamed "The Wall." As he rode The Wall along a cliffside to join his troops, the horse slipped and the two fell to their deaths.

*Humpty Dumpty sat on a wall*

*Humpty Dumpty had a great fall.  
All the king's horses, and all the Kings men  
Couldn't put Humpty Dumpty together again.*

Looking up *Humpty Dumpty*, *Little Jack Horner* was also found. A note under that rhyme says, "Jack Horner was a man who really lived in 16th century England, and the plum he pulled out was a fine estate which he got out of lands seized by Henry VIII from the church."

*Over the hill to feed my sheep  
Over the hill to Charley  
Over the hill to feed my sheep  
On buckwheat cakes and barley*

*Charley's neat and Charley's sweet:  
Charley he's a dandy  
Every time he goes to town  
He gets his girl some candy.*

Also in the nursery rhyme me book, at the bottom of the page, it says "Kentucky mountaineers kept alive their memory of Bonny Prince Charley. Oppressed in Scotland for their love of Stuart pretenders to the English throne, they came to Kentucky and Tennessee in the 18th century.

#### A Non-Confusing Explanation of "Removed"

The term "removed" is often cause for confusion in determining relationships. Simply put, it means that two people are from different generations. You and your first cousin are in the same generation (two generations younger than your grandparents) so, the word "removed" is not used to describe your relationship.

The words "once removed" mean that there is a difference of one generation. For example, your mother's first cousin is your first cousin once removed. This is because your mother's first cousin is one generation younger than your grandparents and you are two generations younger than your grandparents. The one-generation difference equals "once removed".

"Twice removed" means that there is a two generation difference. You are two generations younger than a first cousin of your grandmother, so you and your grandmother's cousin are first

cousins, twice removed. *Family Tree Maker Newsletter*

Remember to cite the source number with the reference. The charge is 20 cents per copy plus \$2. for postage and handling.

#### What You Need to Know About "Six Types of Marriages" and Therefore Records!!

Marriages in the United Kingdom fell into one of six categories until recently. The four most commonly occurring ones were marriages (1) in the Established Church of each county, (2) in a Register Office, (3) in a nonconformist Church, (4) by Jewish or Quaker ceremony, (5) marriage for the housebound or detained and (6) marriages by Register General's license. This is reserved for the dying.

The way on which the process of marriage shall take place was laid down in Hardwick's Marriage Act of 1754. This Act stated that marriages, with the exception of Quakers and Jews, could only take place by banns or by license. They had to take place between the hours of 8 am and 12 noon. This was later extended to 3 pm and finally to the current hours of 8 am to 6 pm.

Marriage by banns meant that a couple had to be resident in the parish for one week before the banns could be read. Banns had to be written into the banns notice book and were either called in the church or proclaimed in a public place such as the market. The total process thus took one month from the start of residency to the completion of the banns when the marriage could then take place.

A huge number of couples used the loophole of a single week of residency so that they could be married in places other than home. Reasons

could include keeping the marriage a secret from people who knew them.

Among the reams of data the US Census Bureau collects and generates from the national census is a list of the most popular names in the USA. Now you can find out just how common your own name is. That list even includes your first name, since there are three listings available, by surname, male first name and female first name.

### COFFINS, TOMBSTONES AND LOTS OF NAILS

Our word "coffin" comes from the Greek "kophinos," meaning "baskets." It was in baskets woven of plaited twigs that ancient Sumerians (ca 4000 BC) interred their dead. It was fear of the deceased that accounted for the origin of coffins.

In Northern Europe drastic measures were taken to prevent the dead from haunting the living. Often a dead man's body was bound and the feet and head removed. Enroute to the graveside, a circuitous course was taken so he couldn't retrace the path home. In some cultures, the dead were removed, not through their home's front door, but by a hold cut in the wall and closed up afterward. Burial six feet underground was viewed as a good precaution, but entombment first in a wooden coffin was even safer. Nailing down the lid afforded extra protection.

Not only were many early coffins secured with numerous nails (far too many archaeologists contend, than needed to keep the lid from coming off), but after the coffin was lowered into the ground, a large, heavy stone was placed atop the lid before soil was shoveled in. A larger stone topped off the closed grave, giving birth to the practice of the tombstone. Those were days when family and friends never ventured near the dead. *YVGS Family Finder*, published by the Yucaipa Valley Genealogical Society

### ELLIS ISLAND ON 'ENDANGERED LIST'

Ellis Island, the first stop for millions of American immigrants is falling into ruin and is now one of the nation's eleven most endangered historic places, a preservation group says.

The National Trust for Historic Preservation said a lack of funding for the National Park Service has led to poor maintenance on the island in New York Harbor. The Trust blamed Congress.

"This is a wake-up call for all Americans," said Richard Moe, the Trust's president. "We cannot take our past for granted. Once these links are gone, they cannot be replaced."

The 26-acre island is owned by the Federal Government and is part of the Statue of Liberty National Monument.

The restored Main Building was reopened with great fanfare in 1990 and other buildings have been restored as part of the Ellis Island Immigration Museum. Moe said many buildings badly need repairs.

The other "endangered" sites are: The Congressional Cemetery in Washington DC, the Flathead Indian Reservation in northwestern Montana, the Bridge of Lions, St Augustine, Florida; the Cranston Street Armory, Providence, Rhode Island and the Montezuma Castle, Montezuma, New Mexico. *The Courier News* via the Elgin Genealogical Society newsletter.

### Holland-America Lists Now Available

Holland-America Line passenger lists, 1900-1940, are now available on microfiche. The actual records are at the Municipal Archives of Rotterdam. The collection is published by MMF in Holland and includes two main sets of fiche. The first set (272 fiche) is an alphabetical index that lists the names of passengers, ticket numbers, names of ships and departure dates. The index is divided chronologically into groups of five or six fiche listing all passengers who sailed during a particular three or four month period. The second set (781 fiche) contains the longer records of passage for each sailing, including the names of passengers, names and addresses of booking agents, ticket types and prices, and information

about train travel after arrival in the United States. The entire collection sells for \$7900. Fiche may be ordered in smaller segments and the index may be purchased separately. Contact Norman Ross Publishing Co 330 West 58th Street New York New York 10019

#### Another Idea for Tombstone Rubbings

A rubbing of a tombstone inscription can be made by using Pellon attached with masking tape and using a lumberman's crayon. Pellon is a brand of interfacing material, available in white, cream or black and can be purchased in a fabric store. It can be framed to make a very attractive wall hanging. Lumberman's crayon come in a variety of colors and can be purchased at the hardware store. They do not melt, smudge or smear like chalk or graphite.

(Tissue paper can be used in a pinch - although it is as fragile as - tissue paper!)

#### ...But Check Before you Rub

In New Hampshire "no person shall make gravestone rubbings in any cemetery without first obtaining the permission of the selectmen or cemetery trustees." Gravestone rubbing is potentially damaging to old and fragile headstones. Make sure you are not in violation of any laws before you make any rubbing.

#### The Oldest Continuously Occupied Building in Scotland

The oldest continuously inhabited building in Scotland is 1000 year-old Traquair House near Peebles. Twenty-seven monarchs have slept beneath its roof, including Bonnie Prince Charlie. The entrance is a side road as the main gates were closed after the Jacobite owners pledged they would remain so until a Stuart was on the throne again. *The Clan Rose Newsletter, Winter 1998*

#### Almost As Confusing as Cousins--

When a boy is named for his father who is a "junior", he is called "the 3rd" (III). A man with II after his name is **not** named for his father, but for someone else in his family, perhaps an uncle or grandfather with the same name.

#### WHERE IS CROSSMYLOOF?

There is an area in Glasgow, two miles south of the city centre, that has the unusual name of "Crossmyloof."

The word "loof" is an old Scots term for the palm of the hand. According to a popular myth, at a council of war meeting, Mary, Queen of Scots, on the morning of the Battle of Langside (13 May 1568) laid a small crucifix on her hand, saying, "As surely as that cross lies on my loof, I will this day fight the Regent!" Hence, the name Crossmyloof.

After the defeat, Mary fled to England across the Solway Firth, landing at Workington, in Cumberland, on 16 May. Soon afterwards, she was imprisoned by order of Queen Elizabeth. *The Palm Beach Thistle*, the Scottish-American Society of Palm Beach County, Inc newsletter

#### Dutch Naming Patterns

In Holland, the custom was that the first son be named for the paternal grandfather, 2nd son named for his maternal grandfather, 1st daughter for her maternal grandmother, 2nd daughter for her paternal grandmother. #### SWEDISH HELP

Did you know that in 1686 a law was passed in Sweden stating detailed records had to be kept of all people living in the country. The job of keeping these records was given to the Lutheran State Church, to which all citizens of Sweden belonged at that time. "If the Creek Don't Rise"

According to Lloyd Bockstruck, this arose from the migration from the eastern seaboard colonies to the Mississippi Valley states. In the South, the Creek Indians were vigorous in defending their land from being taken by the white settlers. So, for the pioneers moving west into Alabama and Mississippi, there was always the possibility that the Creek might "rise up" against them.

Thus, the expression rose. The pioneers would say that they would do something in the future "if the Lord's willing and the Creek don't rise." *Bluegrass Roots via Rocky Mountain Buckeye and the Aurora Genealogical Society of Colorado*

#### DAWES ROLLS ARE NOW ON THE INTERNET

The American Indians who were accepted on the final rolls of the Five Civilized Tribes as members of the Cherokee, Seminole and Creek tribes - those 50,000 more or less people - can now be searched on the Internet. The records of the Choctaw and Chickasaw have not been entered, but it is reported that they will be completed soon.

This record was produced for members of the Dawes Commission from 1898 to 1914 in Indian Territory (now Oklahoma). It was required that each person applying had to prove their ancestry and their tribal affiliation. The evidentiary documents are included in the case files of all those who did apply which is a wonderful source of information for today's genealogists.

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) has a NARA Archival Information Locator (NAIL), which is an interactive database on a wide variety of NARA's holdings. This source is updated weekly. Search at <http://www.nara.gov/nara/nail.html>

According to a statement made to the county by the officers of the Michigan Insane Asylum at Kalamazoo, this county at this time, has eight patients in that institution for keeping and treatment. Their names are as follows: Darley Doyle, Henry Elfort, Mary Hall, Radnor Haynes, Mary Ann Marsh, Sophia Odell, Dellar Seaman, Charles Stark. The county is charged \$3.50 per week for each of these patients, the total amount charged against the county from May 1<sup>st</sup>, 1868 to April 30, 1870, being \$2,188.20

**INTRODUCTION:**

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (or Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and, when possible, added a location & reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by: [ ]). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

**A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations**

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3):

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr."), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr."), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("Intellig.Bl.f.d.Rezat-Kreis"), and Boten von Altdorf are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: the year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals).

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring to, "Reg.v.Mfr.KdI, Abg.1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed for that record). "Abgabe" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "LRA Eichstaett, Abgabe1981, Nr.676/1/4" (LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "BA Ansbach, Abgabe1930, Nr.427/441" (BA="Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "Herrschaftsgericht", "Gericht- & Polizeibehoerde" and "Lg.ä.O." are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "Hometown" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG.) of the first town listed in that column.

MARY HANCHETT STONE,  
ROYALTY'S FRIEND, DIES

Saginaw today lost a colorful figure who while she still lived had become almost a legend.

Mary Hanchett Stone, 84, once the toast of the Balkans and an intimate of royalty, died in her sleep early this morning at her home at 520 VanBuren, a home where she added to the glittering fame that had been begun by Michigan's Gov. David H. Jerome who built it. Mrs Stone knew the Balkans well. Her mother, Dr. Mary Hanchett, second woman physician in the United States, had been a pioneer medical missionary in Bulgaria, Serbia, Greece and Russia. Mrs. Stone became interested in these endeavors and spent much time there. Although an intimate of royalty, especially of Queen Marie of Romania, she spent much time living with peasants and was recognized as an authority on domestic affairs of those nations. In 1909, while in Bulgaria, Mrs. Stone corresponded constantly with President Taft, attempting to avert the threatening Balkan war. She studied the diplomatic crisis that was developing between Bulgaria and Turkey. At the request of members of the Bulgarian Parliament, she returned to America to persuade Dr. George Washburn to publish certain facts which she believed would prevent war.

Washburn had spent over 50 years at Roberts College in Constantinople. He was a confidante of British ambassadors at a time when England's was the only friendship the United States possessed in the Near East.

His autobiography mentions German intrigue that followed on Kaiser William's visit to the Sultan, but he never explained the information that Mrs. Stone steadfastly declared he should publish.

In later years she maintained that secret diplomacy by German agents in Turkey, veiled by the death of Washburn, should have been revealed and that the Balkan war which grew into World War 1 would have been averted.

Mrs Stone also toured Nicaragua and Panama to collect facts later used in deciding to build the trans-oceanic canal through Panama instead of farther north. During her travels she collected many curios that made her home a show place. Her library, facing on spacious lawns through cathedral-type windows, was a veritable museum. Lawn parties at the Stone home were such colorful events that people would drive for miles just to circle the streets and admire the spectacle.

Her stamp collection had many rare items, some of them special plates printed for members of royal houses and presented by them to her. Chests bulged with letters from kings and queens, many written in their own hands. She never placed great value even upon rare objects and her large collections were given away or lost.

She rebuilt the Jerome mansion and named it "Rose Lawn". It had an Italian room, a Tudor room, an Austrian room and a French room and a large third-floor ballroom. The lawn, which covered half a block, was edged with 58 trees of 18 varieties.

After the home was sold in 1940, she maintained an apartment in it. She had been bedridden for nearly a decade. Mrs. Stone was born in Chittenango, NY June 29, 1863. Both her parents were

well-known physicians. After graduation from the University of the State of New York she became a teacher, writer and lecturer.

In 1884 she married Edward Pearson Stone, son of a pioneer lumber magnate and himself active in business and social life here. He died in October, 1943. She leaves four children, Mrs. Alice Farmer, Miami Beach; Miss Edwina Stone, Hibbing, Minn.; George Stone, Deerwood, Minn.; and Mrs. Rosemary Hallam, Philadelphia. Funeral plans will be announced Monday.

### WOODS VETERAN TAKEN BY DEATH

Joseph Basinski, 82, one of the last of Saginaw's lumberjacks of the heyday of the lumbering industry in Michigan, died Thursday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Carl Bhirdo, 2400 Oakwood. He had been ill only a few days.

Born in 1863 in Poland, he came to the United States at the age of 19 and soon afterward began work as a lumberjack in the Michigan forests near Gaylord. He later worked in the woods, on the rivers and in the mills in the Saginaw area. In later years he followed the carpentry trade. In 1891 he married Miss Stefania Gabruesch, who died in 1909. In 1910 he married Mrs. Anna Miller. He leaves seven children, Victor F and Joseph S. Basinski and Mrs. Bhirdo of Saginaw; Mrs. Walter Sargent of Flint, Leonard A. Basinski of LaGrange, Ill., John Basinski, warrant machinist in the navy, and Lt. Edward J. Baskinski of the navy. He was a member of St. Casimir's church and the Pulaski society.

Funeral services will take place at 8:30 am Monday at the home of Mrs. Bhirdo, and at 9 at St. Casimir's church. Rev. Fr. Francis S. Kozak will officiate and burial will be in Mt. Olivet. Friends may see Mr. Basinski after Saturday noon at the home of his daughter.

#### THE FINAL SUMMONS

George F. Williams Died Early  
Yesterday Morning

Had Been One of the Prominent  
Lumbermen

He Was a Good Citizen and a Man of  
Unbounded Generosity

Hon. George F. Williams, one of the  
oldest and most widely known residents  
of the Saginaw valley, passed away at 5

o'clock yesterday morning, after an illness of over four weeks. It has been known for a number of days that Mr. Williams was on his death bed and inquiries from his many friends about his condition have been numerous. Bright's disease of the kidneys and valvular trouble of the heart were the causes of his demise.

Mr. Williams was born at Pontiac, Michigan Nov. 21, 1831, and was therefore 63 years of age. He was a son of the late Gardner D. Williams, who came to Saginaw in 1827, and who built the first saw mill on the Saginaw river in 1832. When a babe, six months old, the deceased was brought to Saginaw from Pontiac, on horseback. On the way here the party camped two nights in the forests. Mr. Williams was the first white child to arrive in Saginaw county. He attended school in Saginaw for a short time and at the age of 14 years went to Pontiac where he completed a common school education.

The later Gardner D. Williams was for many years the leading lumberman of Saginaw and shortly after his death in December, 1838, the firm of Williams Brothers was organized. This firm was composed of George F. Williams, as principal, and his two brothers, William A. and Stewart H. Williams, both of whom are well known residents of the west side. The firm of Williams Bros. did a very intensive lumbering business here until six years ago, when the large plant was sold to Bliss & Van Auken. The deceased and brother, William A. Williams, took lumber across the Saginaw river about 1849 for the first building erected on the east side. In 1857 Mr. Williams was united in marriage to Miss Cora I. Sabine, of Rochester, NY, who died eleven months after. Deceased was a man of many

noble qualities. His generosity was unbounded and his business dealings were always those of a strictly honest and thoroughly upright business man. During the rebellion, though not drafted into the service, he felt it was his duty to send a substitute and he did so. In politics he was a conscientious Democrat and served this city as alderman and supervisor and held the office of mayor for one term. He was prominently connected with St. John's Episcopal church and a heavy contributor to the building. He had been a member of the vestry for the past twenty-five years and was treasurer of the church at the time of his death. Deceased was at one time a heavy stockholder in the Saginaw Valley and St. Louis railroad company and in the City of Saginaw Street Railway company.

The funeral will occur from St. John's Episcopal church at 1:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Friends will be afforded an opportunity to view the body between the hours of 10 and 12 tomorrow morning at the residence of his brother, William A. Williams, 603 South Michigan Avenue.

As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and when possible, added a location and reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by [ ]). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations:

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3).

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("**Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), and **Boten von Altdorf** are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: they year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals.)

"**Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I.**" is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring To "Reg.v.Mfr.kDI, Abg. 1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed fort that Record). "**Abgabe**" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "**LRA Eichstaett, Abgabel 1981, Nr. 676/1/4**" LRA=the office of the "**Landkreis**", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh.Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "**BA Ansbach, Abgabe 1930, Nr.427/441**" (BA=Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "**Herrschaftsgericht**", "**Gericht & Polizeibehoerde**" and "**Lg.a.O.**" are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "**Hometown**" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG) of the first town listed in that column.


