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## ADrift ON THE ICE

On Wednesday morning, December 31, 1873, William McEwan, 24, and George Smith, 22, of Bay City, made preparations to go ice-fishing. In their wildest dreams they could not have imagined the adventure they would embark upon and the tragedy that would result because of their actions.

They were not regulars at ice fishing and looked forward to their outing. They planned to be gone for several days. The equipment was typical for ice-fishing- a shanty with runners about eight feet apart, a stove, food, traps, blankets, fishing spears, and two hand sleighs. All of this was placed on a wagon as they left John McEwan's place. (John was the father of William.) Until they found a good place on the ice, the gear was left on the shore of the Bay, east of Supervisor Knight's farm.

When the ice forms on the Bay, a number of fishermen will populate the ice. Sometimes these "villages" stretch out for fifteen or twenty miles and go from one side of the Bay to the other. Equipment is stored in the shanties, all the necessities of life, for the period of time they will be fishing. There are even teams employed to take supplies out to the fishermen and to bring in the fish that are caught and to move the shanties if necessary.

It was about noon when the men set off on the ice. They took with them two hand sleighs, tools for cutting the ice, blankets and fish spears. They were seen by other fishermen at that time. They began cutting holes in the ice, lying down to look for the fish. The ice was about four to six inches thick at this time. They did get three fish.

At half past four they saw a man (Rundall/Randall) running towards the shore. Because they had been so intent on finding the fish, they did not notice that a crack had opened up and there was a large channel of water between them and the ice still attached to the shore. Except for those who are near the break, the cracking of the ice may not be discovered for hours, or until the spear poles and lines began to be sucked in and the ice is in motion. Rundall later said that he and another man were on the ice looking for fish when he felt a jarring motion. Water came out of their fishing holes running two or three feet over the edges. The men decided it would be a good time to get out of there.

McEwan and Smith knew they could not get across the open water. They began to chop out a cake of ice in the hope of using their fish spears to pole towards the shore. They sounded the water and thought it was about eight feet deep.

Before they had half cut out their cake of ice, they had drifted into deeper water. They were drifting fast towards Sebewaing and the thought occurred to them that they might eventually head out of the Bay towards the Charity Islands and into Lake Huron. They could not get to the shore at this point and the ice started to break up. They went from ice cake to ice cake. They did try to use their poles again but the water was too deep and went past their elbows as they put the poles in the water. Eventually, they had to give this up.



Nearby fishermen said they tried to launch a boat to go to the aid of the men, but it was too heavy. They thought someone from the nearby Saginaw lighthouse would help the men. They did nothing else. The man Rundall did not report seeing the men until Saturday when inquiries were being made about them. For this he will be severely condemned and he and his family will be threatened for not taking action sooner. Although there were some shanties and people in other areas, he maintained he did not see McEwan and Smith.

According to seasoned fishermen, as cold weather sets in, the ice forms near the shore first, where the water is shallow. Then, colder weather helps to develop ice that covers the deeper water until it extends to the Bay for several miles. Cracks or seams develop between freezes and may never entirely freeze together and seem to occur in the same areas each year. If the weather gets moderate and strong winds blow, the whole body of the ice on the Bay may crack up.

Unfortunately, for McEwan and Smith, that is what happened on that Wednesday. The temperature reached 60 degrees and the snow started to disappear. The ice weakened very fast and then a severe gale developed on the Bay and began breaking up the ice.

Finding a secure piece of ice, the men prepared to spend the night. Using their hand sleighs to protect them from the wind, they lay on the ice in their blankets. It was not too bad. Little did they know that this was to be their *first* night on the ice.

As the morning of the next day appeared, they looked out and an ice shanty they had passed the previous day was no longer there. It had disappeared quietly in the night. They continued to drift towards the Charities. The ice seemed to be holding its own. Neither of the men had eaten anything since the day before. They had three fish which they caught the day before but they had no matches and they just did not have an appetite for food.

On Friday, the third day, they tried to make their way across the drifting cakes of ice. McEwan and his hand sleigh went into the water between cakes. Smith took his fishing spear pole and extended it to McEwan and helped get him out. It was on this day they realized that no one knew of their predicament. They hoped that the man who saw them (Rundall) would tell someone but now believed that he probably did not. They also were hoping the ice would freeze together in a big mass and they would be able to make it to the shore.

By Saturday they had drifted enough to see Fish Point. So far the nights had not been unbearable. It was at this point that the stage from Sebewaing arrived at Bay City reporting that two men were seen adrift on the ice. As it turned out, it was the Trombley boys and they did eventually make it ashore. This report about men on the ice brought attention to the missing McEwan and Smith and rescue efforts were begun.

Search parties went in carriages to places along the shore where small boats could be launched to look for the men. Alderman P. S. Heisordt, Captain Riley, H. P. Watkins, William Munroe all started out to help. Mr. William McEwan, uncle to William, was

tireless in his efforts organizing search teams and offered a reward of \$1,000 for their rescue. John McEwan, Sr., William's father, was in Detroit when the news of the missing men became known. He was telegraphed and returned home immediately to join in the search.

A party of rescuers consisting of John Sharp, Capt. Loren Vosburg, L. Jewell and others went down the river on the ice. They launched their boat when they reached the water. It was a yawl of the tugboat *Annie Moiles*. They searched the east shore of the Bay from the Saginaw River to Sebewaing and the islands around. They were forced to go back to the shore at Quanicassee because the water was so high and it was biting cold. They were thoroughly chilled and if they would have remained out in the water, they would have perished.

Captain Burrington, Robert Coriell, and William Fox undertook a great risk to their lives in trying to aid the lost men. That Saturday, these men took a small skiff in a wagon and made for the shore of the Bay, setting out from Bay City. They got there late Saturday night and went along the shore to Big Creek. They hoped to be able to put the skiff in the water at that point. The ice was so broken along the shore that it could not be crossed and the boat could not be rowed through it. At Big Creek, the boat was sent back, and the men went on the next day hoping to get a boat somewhere along the way. They finally reached Pigeon River, and saw that a boat could be launched. A man who owned a sailboat said they could use his but later declined. They eventually got a fisherman's boat and at Oak Point put it into the water. Mr. Fox had to leave at this point because of business matters and so two strangers were hired to help. The men started to pull the heavy boat, straight out from the shore to clear the field of ice and head for the Charity Islands. Capt. Burrington was directing the men and after three hours and ten minutes of rowing, they made the Charities. They made a good search of the area, looking for footprints, remnants of the boat, anything that would indicate the men were or had been there. They did not find any traces of the missing men. By the route they had taken, they went sixteen miles from Oak Point. They now prepared to return. The distance rowing on the return was not as great but will take longer. The ice shifted enough so that a shorter route was possible. The weather, however, was showing signs of snow. If that happened, they would be in real difficulty.

The men made no complaints, understanding their situation, and with great resolve gave it everything they had in rowing and they finally reached the shore. The return trip took three hours and thirty minutes, longer than the trip there. They reached Caseville on Tuesday night and received word that McEwan and Smith had been found. What these men did, in order to help rescue others, is remarkable. Some said it was the most perilous voyage ever attempted on the Saginaw Bay.

A sailboat of S. A. Van Deusen, with all sorts of supplies and provisions the men might need was outfitted. A telegraphed message was sent to Tawas City asking for help in searching and giving aid if possible. The reply was that no assistance could be rendered from Tawas at that time.



At Alabaster, a party of six brave volunteers was organized to search for the men. They did not hesitate in doing so. The party consisted of Lewis Hutton, William Mitchell, Capt. Wm. D. Wilson, John Soderman, Gustav Eman, and William Whilbury. They left Alabaster on Sunday hoping to return on Monday.

Sunday, the fifth day, was the worst day experienced by McEwan and Smith. Rain, warm rain, was creating holes in the ice the size of a man's head. The ice cakes were weakened to the point that there was only a thickness of about three inches. A gale struck and churned the water so much that ice began to grind the edges of the cakes. Then, pieces began to break off. The storm did not last long but it was very violent.

Monday, they found a small ducking boat that was frozen in the ice. The wind had parted the ice and they tried to use the boat to get to the shore but that was unsuccessful. They abandoned the boat and continued to use their sleds to cross from one cake to another. During the night they could hear the ice cracking and breaking. They thought there was a storm at the outer areas churning the water. They had to move three times and when the ice broke within two feet of them. They stayed awake the rest of the night. That night the temperature was freezing and helped to bond the old ice mass and form a new sheet of ice going to the shore.

Day seven, Tuesday, at seven o'clock, they got to the duck boat and left all but their sleighs and spear poles. They began their trek over the ice bridge that had formed during the night. They were six miles from land and the ice was only three-quarters of an inch thick. They traveled in single file as rapidly as they could because the ice sank beneath them as they stepped. Smith went through the ice and McEwan helped him out of the water with his spear pole – as Smith helped McEwan earlier.

When near Pinconning, they saw some Indians on the ice near the shore and called to them. McEwan was ahead of Smith and an Indian came out to him. McEwan got on his hand sleigh and was pushed to the shore. The Indian then went back for Smith who was brought back the same way.

The men had not eaten anything the whole time they were on the ice. They had not felt weak but upon reaching shore it hit them. Their strength gave out and they had a difficult time walking to the house of Joseph Meach, which they reached about ten o'clock in the morning. They were given food to eat. McEwan ate sparingly of the pork and potatoes but Smith ate a great deal which he probably regretted later on because he suffered for his overeating. Both men were exhausted from their ordeal. McEwan had frost bitten feet but was in fairly good condition and Smith, along with being weak, was suffering a too full stomach.

At noon they were taken by ox sled to the Pinconning Station. McEwan telegraphed the news of their survival. They were to go to Bay City on the eight-thirty evening train. A large, joyous crowd gathered to meet them.

While they were on the ice for six days, they must have gone in every direction and drifted for about fifty miles.

While there was rejoicing in the Bay City area over the survival of McEwan and Smith, there were others who were in despair.

On Sunday, January 4th, the search party of six men set out from Alabaster. While it was thought they went towards the Charities, no one knew for sure. When they set out the weather seemed promising, then, the wind direction changed, blowing strong all day, and violent rain which turned into snow. This is the same storm McEwan and Smith encountered. The men did not return on Monday.

Their boat was a clinker-built, schooner-rigged fishing boat, about 35 feet long and 8 feet wide, and weighing about four tons. It was in good condition but when the squall occurred it was thought no boat could survive such power.

A cruel twist of fate occurred on Tuesday, January 6<sup>th</sup>. That is the day McEwan and Smith were found and the word was being spread. A telegraph message was sent to Alabaster saying "The men are safe and landed at Pinconning this morning." Strangely enough, the people of Alabaster had sent out word that day that their men were missing and asked for help in searching for them. They thought the message was for them. They were ecstatic and relieved at the message. The telegraph clerk noticed that the message might be misconstrued by the Alabaster people and sent another message explaining he meant McEwan and Smith. One can only imagine what the families went through at this news.

When the Alabaster men had not been heard from, searches were started on the beaches, looking for anything that might have something to do with the men and boat. Then, Wednesday, January 7<sup>th</sup>, about six miles south of Alabaster, near Whitestone Point, a capsized boat was found. She was against an ice bank, several rods from the shore, and was on the bottom right side up. She was full of water. She had been dismasted and the mainmast was at her side, held by the rigging. The rudder was entirely gone. It now seemed likely the men had perished not too long after their mission began. Because the boat was not found until late afternoon, they could not examine it closely. The next day a large number of people came from Alabaster with horses and tackle to get the boat out. During the night the boat was jammed so much on the ice that it was broken into pieces. She was taken out piecemeal by hand. All the provisions which she started out with were fished up from where she lay. She carried two tons of ballast, among it a heavy anchor chain and the regular anchor were both found.

There was no trace of the men and nothing to show what had happened to them. It did not appear as though any of them had lashed themselves to anything to prevent them from going overboard during the storm which some seasoned sailors did.

The men were **LEWIS HUTTON** – proficient sailor, 35 years of age, born in Ohio, and he was a foreman for Smith, Bullard & Co. of Alabaster. Highly esteemed. He left a



wife and a beautiful girl about five years of age. Mrs. Hutton was soon to have another child. She had some relatives in the area. In the middle of May, the Captain of the *Benton* found a body floating in the lake near Goderich, Ontario. A Coroner's inquest was held and it was determined to be the body of Mr. Hutton. His body had floated seventy miles before it was found on shore. The Coroner's report said the body was decomposed and water-worn. The body appeared to be that of a man 30-35 years of age, about 5 feet 8 inches in height, and weighed about 140 to 150 pounds. He had on lightish grey corded tweed pants, dark American blue coat and dark plaid vest, blue flannel shirt and Gurnsey undershirt, check black and white drawers. He had a moustache. On him he had a time book in which was a record of men, time and teams, and their jobs. A hair watch guard was attached to the vest but no watch. A knife, black lead pencil, and a zinc tobacco box were also found.

**JOHN SODERMAN** – A Swede. He did not live with his wife who still lives in Sweden and is self-supporting. He was a ship's carpenter and had a son of age residing in Au Sable. His body was found the first part of April about fifteen miles from where the boat was found. He had a leg broken and his clothing badly cut. The body was in about the same condition as Mitchel's and Wilson's.

**WILLIAM WHILBURY** – a Swede. Well liked and a good worker. Not married and could, according to one article, have been related to Eman. (Could not find any mention of his body being recovered.)

**CAPTAIN WILLIAM D. WILSON** – for 38 years an experienced sailor on the lakes, and was a navigator. He resided for several years in Bay City and had become acquainted with the McEwan family and friends. He had the misfortune to be shipwrecked nine time before this and was once the only one, of nine, left to relate what happened. He leaves a wife and two (3) young children. His body had two pairs of pants, two shirts, a jacket and one pair of socks. The remains were taken to his home and a funeral held. The body was found around the middle of March.

**GUSTAV EMAN** – A Swede, 35 years of age. He leaves a wife and four children who are in Sweden and dependent upon him. He had bought a lot intending to build a house and bring his family over. He was a carpenter. His body was found three miles from Alabaster, not too far from where their boat was found.

**WILLIAM MITCHELL** – A cooper by trade, 24, unmarried, an excellent man, brave and generous. He was the owner of the boat in which the fatal trip was made. When he was asked for the use of his boat, he simply said 'yes' and started to get a provisions the men might need when they were rescued. His body was found around March 12<sup>th</sup>. The body was under the shore ice and difficult to rescue. He had on only a woolen shirt, pants and stocking.

These men did not have ulterior motives when they went in search of McEwan and Smith. No book deals, no television appearances, no rewards. They went in search of the lost men because there was something in them that said it had to be done. They would

have thought themselves to be ordinary men. Would never have thought of themselves as "remarkable" men. The term "heroes" would be for someone else. But *they were*. No radar, no telephones/cell phones, no television, no thermal clothes. A completely different period of time but they showed a caring for their fellow men which we have only on occasion to see exemplified in our own time.

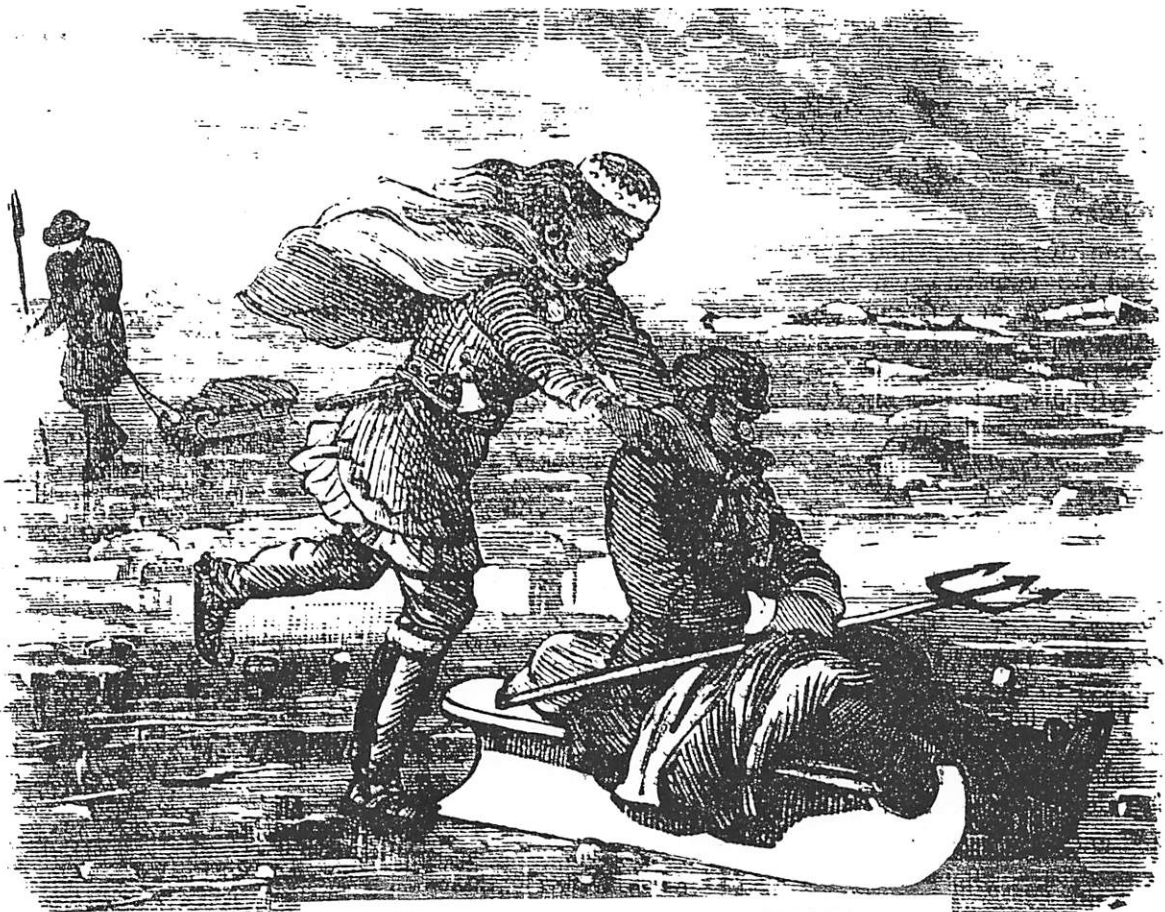

CRACKING OF THE ICE

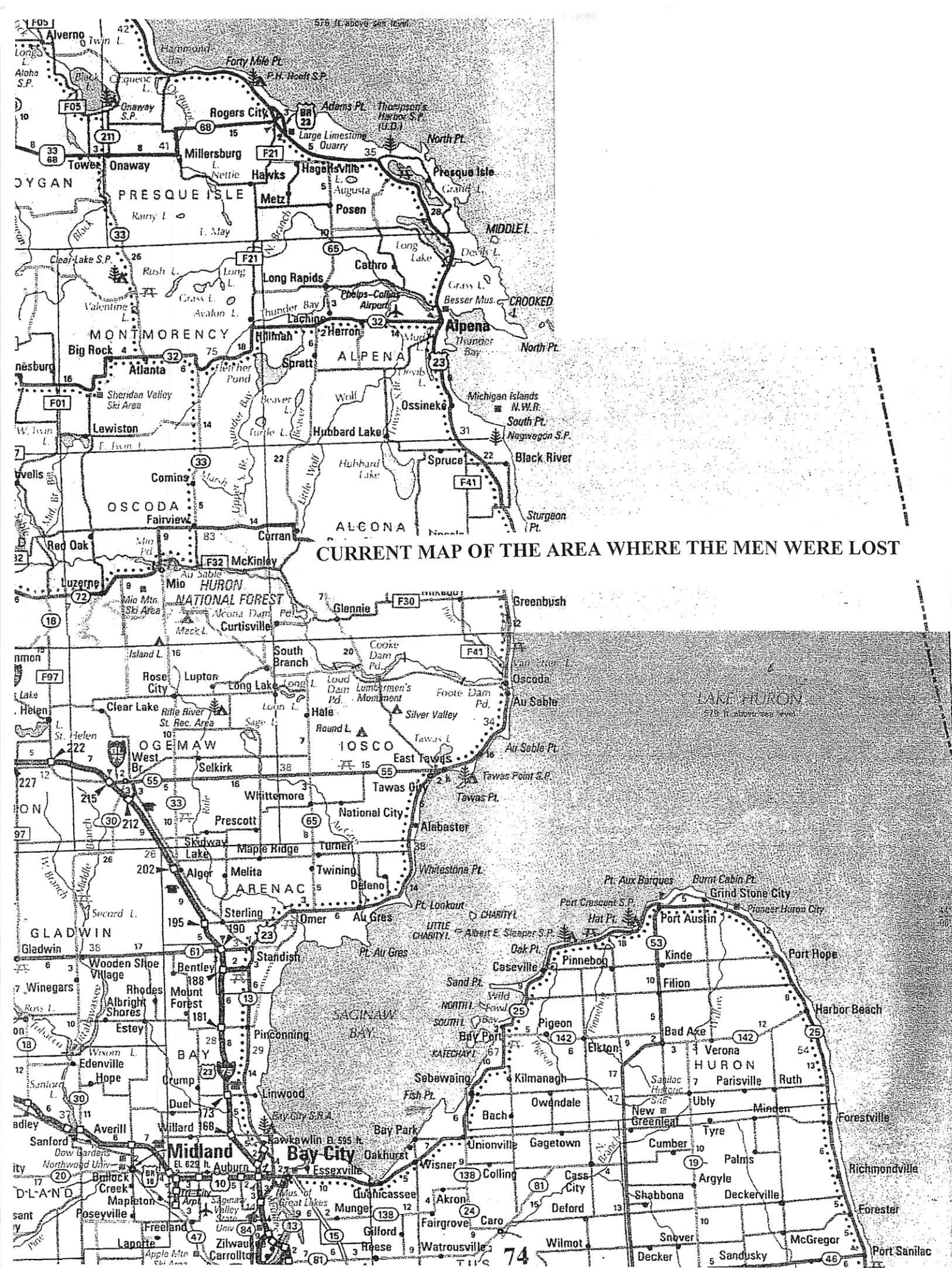

State Archive Nuremberg: 19<sup>th</sup> Century Emigrants from Central Franconia  
To North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and when possible, added a location and reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by [ ]). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations:

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3).

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("**Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), and **Boten von Altdorf** are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: they year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals.)

"**Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I.**" is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring To "Reg.v.Mfr.kDI, Abg. 1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed fort that Record). "**Abgabe**" (abbreviated "**Abg.**") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "**LRA Eichstaett, Abgabel 1981, Nr. 676/1/4**" LRA=the office of the "**Landkreis**", called the "**Landsratsamt**", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh.Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "**BA Ansbach, Abgabe 1930, Nr.427/441**" (BA=Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "**Herrschaftsgericht**", "**Gericht & Polizeibehoerde**" and "**Lg.a.O.**" are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "**Hometown**" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "**Landgericht**" (LG) of the first town listed in that column.

#### ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

Mrs Ida Benedict Swallows  
Paris Green

Ionia July 22. Dr E F Beckwith was called to Lyons to attend Mrs Ida Benedict, a young married woman, the wife of Ed Benedict, employed on the farm of William Pierce of Libhart creek. Benedict works on the farm and his wife does the housework. They quarreled on Wednesday evening and on Thursday Mrs Benedict made a desperate attempt to end her life by swallowing two heaping teaspoonfuls of paris green. Her husband discovered the fact and immediately sent a messenger to Lyons for a doctor. During the interval the woman came to the conclusion that if a doctor was called he might thwart her plans, and started for the Grand river, twice crossing the Libhart creek in her flight and once falling into the water.

Having left the creek she ran for the river, which was a quarter of a mile distant, and was in a fair way to accomplish her purpose, that of drowning herself, when her husband overtook her just as she reached the water's edge. He caught and carried her back to the house. About an hour after she had taken the poison Dr Beckwith arrived and administered the proper treatment. The woman is still alive, but very low, and the chances are about even for her recovery. Mrs Benedict at first refused to take the antidote prescribed, claiming that she was bound to die anyway but upon being informed that a

stomach pump would be used she took the proper remedies

## AN EXCITING CHASE

By Saginaw Officers After  
Fleeing Prisoners

A Revolver Shot Brings One of  
Them to Terms

But Clarence Donaldson, the Notorious  
Escapes

A raid was made by the police last evening upon the poker room of Frank Jordan on Genesee avenue near Tilden street and the following men were captured and locked up: Frank Jordan, the keeper, Chester Thomas, William Haley, William Brennan, Abraham Hogan, Frank Riley, Thomas Thompson, Clarence Donaldson, Ollie Freeman, George Schultz, John Houck and James Kennedy. This morning the boys were given a ride in the patrol wagon and arraigned before Judge Stempell who fined them each \$5 or in default of payment 10 days in jail, except Jordan, who was bound over to the circuit court charged with keeping a gaming house, his bail being fixed at \$300.

While the officers were taking the prisoners back to the patrol wagon John Houck made a break for liberty just as they emerged from the north door of the city hall and dashed around the west side at a 2:40 gait. Clarence Donaldson was also suddenly inspired to regain his liberty and made a series of kangaroo leaps down the steps, taking an easterly direction. Officer Meyers took after Houck and Officer Moloughney waltzed after Donaldson. The latter being a fleet runner got away and the last seen of him

was on the CS & M track, as he disappeared around the curve by the graveyard. Houck did not fare so well, as Officer Myers, when he found that he could not overtake him fired a shot over the retreating form, that scared the young man into instant submission, for he suddenly stopped, threw up his hands and walked back meek as a lamb. The exciting episode being over the patrol wagon returned to the central station with its human freight and the prisoners were again locked up

Another warrant has been made out for Donaldson on a charge of escaping from custody and he will probably get a heavy dose when captured

Since writing the above Sargeant Owens and officer Ryan captured Donaldson this afternoon and he was again placed behind the bars.

## DEATH OF C B STEVER

### Well Known Resident of Saginaw Who Has Lived Here Half a Century

Saginaw has lost another of its citizens of long standing in the death of Charles B Stever which occurred at 3 o'clock this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs Rose H Chamberlain, 1323 South Warren avenue. Death came after a long illness with paralysis, during the past few months of which Mr Stever has been confined to his bed. The deceased was born October 22, 1826 in Otsego county, New York. ### PIONEER OF SAGINAW ANSWERS LAST CALL

Frederick Remer Came Here 53  
Years Ago and Engaged in Business

Frederick Remer died at 5:15 Tuesday afternoon of general debility at his home, 323 South Granger street. He was for 53 years a resident of Saginaw and from 1872, when he entered the lumber business for himself, until about six years ago when he retired, he was active in the affairs of the city. He had for some time been in poor health and for the past week gradually sank until the time of his death.

Mr Remer came to Saginaw in 1863 and was connected in various capacities with the lumber industry until 1872, when he entered business for himself. He was among the organizers of the Banner Brewing Co, and took an active part in its affairs until his retirement from business, always retaining his directorship. He was for two terms an alderman in the old city of Saginaw representing the old third ward during the administration of P C Andre as mayor.

Frederick Remer was born July 21, 1844 in the province of Mecklenberg Germany, and received his education there. He was a son of the late Joachim and Frederika Bluhm-Remer. When he was 19 years of age his family emigrated to America, coming direct to Saginaw. November 18, 1870 he was united in marriage with Miss Sophia Riess, who survives him. Fraternally he was a member of Germania, lodge No 79, F & A M and of the West Side Arbeiter society



Besides his widow he is survived by an adopted daughter, Mrs Phillip Campau of Bay City and two brothers, Charles C Remer and Henry C Remer. He was an eldest son.

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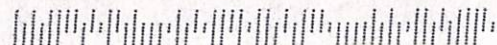
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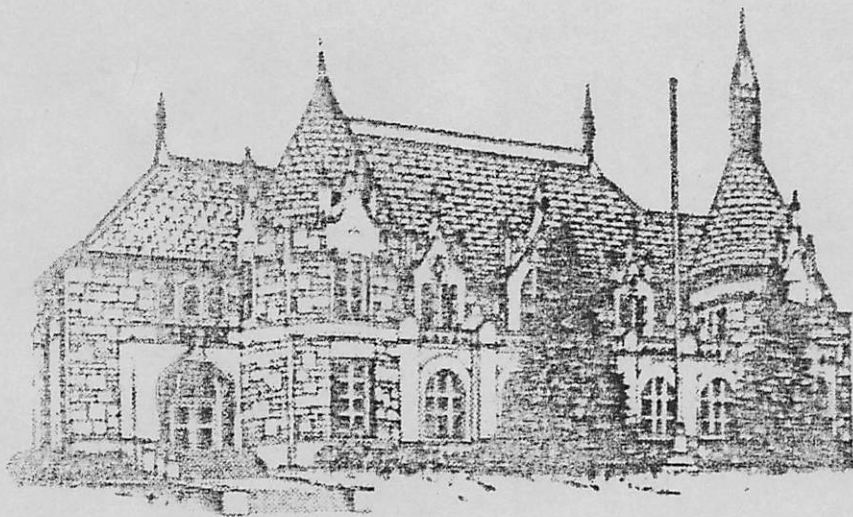

## KILLED IN A RUNAWAY

John Schupp Had His Head Crushed by  
a Wheel

The Victim Was a Farmer of Fremont  
and Leaves a Widow and Six Small  
Children-A Very Sad Case-The  
Coroner's Inquest

John SCHUPP, a farmer residing in Fremont township, was killed in a runaway late yesterday afternoon. He was driving south on Michigan avenue with a load of lumber about 5:30 pm and when near the corner of Mackinaw street and Michigan avenue the horses became frightened and started to run. After the team had run a few blocks the driver was thrown out and a wheel passed over his head just above the eyes, crushing the skull and producing instant death. The body was taken to C L Benjamin's morgue and was there identified by John MELNBERG as that of John SCHUPP, a farmer living in Fremont who came to town with a load of oats and had purchased a load of lumber which he was taking home when the accident occurred. The team was followed by Otto LEBACH, of Bridgeport, and overtaken a mile out of town and brought back.

The widow of the dead man was informed about 3 o'clock this morning of the terrible accident and at once drove to the city. She identified the body as that of her husband. The poor woman was almost heart broken and when she spoke of her six helpless children her grief was pitiful to see. She and some neighbors who came to the city with her took the body home today and will bury

it in a country graveyard near where they live. Mrs SCHUPP stated that her husband was 36 years of age. They lived on a farm of 40 acres which, however, is heavily incumbered, making the death of the family's supporter doubly unfortunate

Coroner LEE impaneled a jury this morning and the remains were viewed before taken to Fremont. The inquest was then adjourned until 1 pm when witnesses were summoned to identify the body and testify as to the manner in which the accident occurred

The trial of John BOYCE and Henry BIRCH, charged on complaint of Benjamin YANCER with stealing chickens and butter, resulted in their conviction yesterday afternoon. Justice BULGER, before whom the trial was held, fined them \$5 each and costs, the latter amounting to \$14.20. These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (Mittelfranken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and when possible, added a location and reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by [ ]). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

### A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abreviations:

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3).

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("**Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), and **Boten von Altdorf** are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: they year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals.)

"**Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I.**" is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring To "Reg.v.Mfr.kDI, Abg. 1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed fort that Record). "**Abgabe**" (abbreviated "**Abg.**") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "**LRA Eichstaett, Abgabel 1981, Nr. 676/1/4**" LRA=the office of the "**Landkreis**", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh. Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "**BA Ansbach, Abgabe 1930, Nr.427/441**" (BA=Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "**Herrschaftsgericht**", "**Gericht & Polizeibehoerde**" and "**Lg.a.O.**" are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "**Hometown**" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns Unless noted, it is the "**Landgericht**" (LG) of the first town listed in that column.
