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TUSCOLA'S FIRST SETTLER TABBED IN '83 HISTORY

Tuscola - Ebenezer Davis is considered to be the first white settler of Tuscola County. This fact is supported by Townsend North through his writings in "History of Tuscola and Bay Counties" printed in 1883.

"Local tradition awards to Edwin Ellis the honor of being the first settler in Tuscola. This honor is of too doubtful importance to warrant any controversy and yet if the distinction is worthy of any consideration, it is deserving of accuracy," according to the book."

"If the title to the honor of being the first permanent settler in this county is closely analyzed it will be found to belong to the late Ebenezer Davis. Mr. Ellis came, as already stated in December, 1835, and remained until the summer of 1837, when he went to Saginaw and did not again take up his residence in Tuscola until 1840."

"Ebenezer Davis and family arrived in Tuscola in June, 1836, and remained there until his death. About the time of Mr. Davis' arrival the people who were here left and, during the following three months, Mr. Davis' family were the only white people in the county."

"Mr. James H. Davis, a son of Ebenezer Davis, who came with his parents, is still a resident of Tuscola (1883)." We give herewith short biographical sketches of these men as follows:

"Ebenezer Davis departed this life, at his residence in Tuscola, March 13, 1880. Mr. Davis was born Nov. 6, 1797. He settled in Tuscola, in June, 1836, his family at that time comprised his wife and 11 children. He was the first postmaster in the county, and his son, James M. Davis, was the first mail carrier, the route being from Bridgeport to Tuscola."

"Mrs. Davis was largely instrumental in getting this county detached from Lapeer County and attached to Saginaw County for judicial and representative purposes. Mr. Davis spent more than half his days in the town of Tuscola. Mrs. Phoebe M. Davis, his wife, died in May, 1871. She was born in the year 1800."

SAGINAW'S OLDEST HOUSE GETS IDENTIFYING MARKER

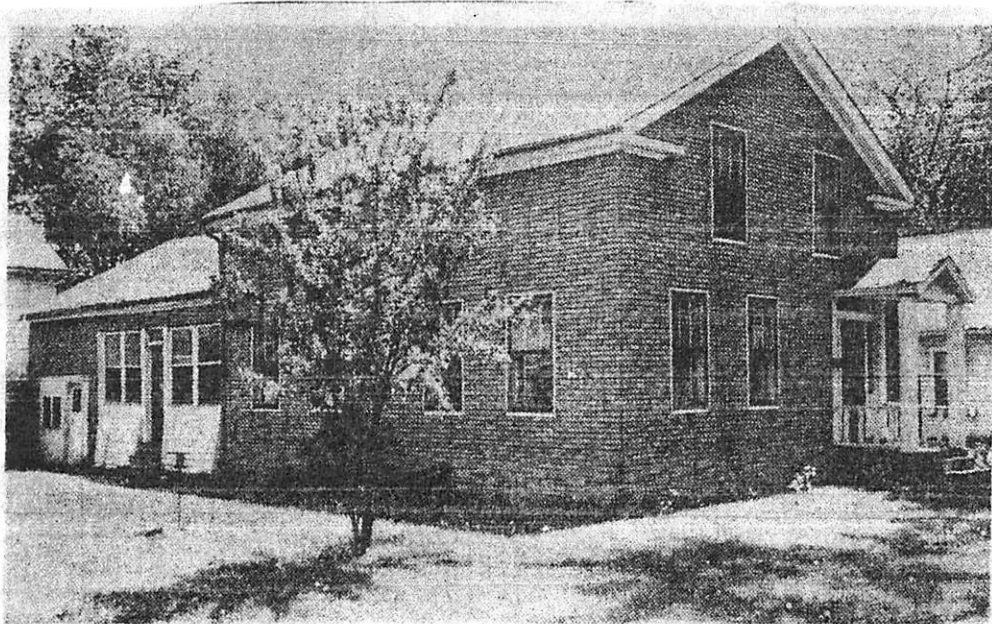
A house at 1404 S. Fayette, on the corner of Perry, soon will become the first of a series of historical sites being researched, authenticated and selected for commemorative markers under leadership of the Saginaw Historical Society.

The building has been authenticated as the oldest surviving residence in Saginaw. Records show the house was built in 1832 on property once occupied by Fort Saginaw, now the site of the Fordney Hotel. The dwelling was moved to its present location in 1869. Occupants since the 1920s have been the family of Samuel Nacarato.

The house is of heavy frame construction. It was clapboard sided but has in more recent years been given modernization in the form of additional siding and improvements of plumbing and heating equipment. Apparently as sound as it was 134 years ago, it is framed with hand-axed timbers and evidence of auger-pegging is a marked contrast to fastening and construction methods which have prevailed for many years.

Mrs. Mary Nacarato, according to the Historical Society, is most tolerant of the curiosity the age of her residence evokes but finds it a bit amusing that a house "only 134 years old is so interesting." She was quoted as mentioning that "In Italy, where our ancestors come from a house isn't old enough to be historical unless it's at least 500 years old."

Under urging from the local Historical Society and with assured support from the Michigan Historical Commission and other governmental agencies, the old house will not only be suitably marked but will be listed in state and other publications as an official historical site.

JONESFIELD TOWNSHIP HISTORY TRACED TO 1812

Mrs. Edward Jones, Area's First Resident, lived to be 107

MERRILL - The history of Merrill and Jonesfield Township in Saginaw County stretches back to the War of 1812 and before.

With a tip from Merrill's history buff, 86-year old Miss Elizabeth Sweeney, 315 E. Saginaw Road (M-46), and research through old newspapers and contributions from members of the family, the thin trail left by the first inhabitants of Jonesfield Township - Mr. and Mrs. Edward (Johnny) Jones Sr. - has been traced.

Some of the people, dates and facts may seem unusual because they contradict history books.

Assisting in the research were Miss Sweeney; Mrs. Dana Skeen, 10770 N. Wheeler Road, Wheeler, a great-granddaughter of the pioneers; Walter M. Jones Jr., 215 Rumsey Road, Lansing, a great-grandson and Mrs. Skeen's brother, and Mrs. Allen Jones, 613 Center, Clio, an elementary school teacher who married a great-grandson.

In Detroit Aug. 16, 1812, American Gen. William Hull, caught below strength when he sent units out to hurry "reinforcements" and taunted by British Gen. Isaac Brock's threat that his Indian allies would be "beyond my control the moment the contest commences," gave up the fort at Detroit without a serious struggle.

A 6-year-old half-French, half-Indian girl names Catherine DuForce - who was to live more than 100 years and become the first white settler in Jonesfield Township - was at the fort. She had been born Sept. 15, 1805, the daughter of Peter DuForce and his Indian wife, and had lived all her life along the Detroit River.

In a story written by the late James Sweinhart and printed April 25, 1905, in the Saginaw Semi-Weekly News, Catherine (then 99 years old) was quoted as saying:

"One night in summer I and my sister in bed. My sister sleep, but I awake. I hear my mother call fadder. 'To the door, Peter, to the door.' Someone knock. I think the Indian come and I cry. I hear great noise cross the river."

"Next morning, I get up an look out the window. All the bank on the Canada side lined with soldier. My dear boy (she is speaking to Sweinhart), how fine they look all in their red suits. Six o'clock come. They draw up cannon and fire at the fort."

"Then fadder come, pick us all up and hurry to the woods. After a time the soldier go away. Pretty soon they back again, cross the river and go straight to the fort."

The officer come out and talk long while. A white flag is on the fort. Pretty soon they take it down and the red English flag is put up. Then all the blue-coats march out and the red-coats march in, and fadder tell us the fort is surrender and we stay no longer."

In a story in The Saginaw Evening News Oct. 23, 1910, when Catherine was 105 and was living in the Sisters of Mercy Catholic Hospital in Big Rapids, she was quoted as saying:

"I well remember Detroit when it was but an Indian village. My parents owned a little hut near the river. In those days, I often waded in the river. The Indians were still savage and I often ran from the river up to the house for fear of harm from them. Scalping was not uncommon, and it was the fear of my life that my scalp would grave one of their poles."

In Sweinhart's writings of the future wife of the first white settler of Jonesfield Township, the French-Indian accent of Catherine flavors his printed quotes. About Ft. Detroit, she is quoted as saying:

"Behind on a hill, the fort; here a row of huts made of mud and log, five, six, seven, and before us ran la river Do I remember the fort? Oh, yes, my good child. She stood high back upon the hill. I knew it well."

"On Sunday my fadder take my han' in his and take me up by the fort. An' my auntie she take me to the fort. She know the officer. One day we walk by. All around the fort was a fence of cedar posts. I peek through the crack. Mon Dieu, good child, they hang a young soldier. And he so young and tall and straight. My, I hate to see dat. I run away home."

"Soon after the fall of the fort, Catherine's mother died. Catherine's father left her with her grandmother for safekeeping while he went to work in the woods near Port Huron. Catherine's grandmother, 'being old,' passed her on to a 'fine family they good to me.'

"When I grow up I go back to Detroit. In those days, there was a hotel named 'The Eagle' and I work dere (as a cook). Den after long time I get married. I 29 year old. (All during her story to Sweinhart and reportedly all during her life, Catherine fondly referred to her husband as "Johnny." He also was 29 when they were married.)

"My fadder get married too, same year, and I never see him again. My man his name John Jones. He came over from England (actually Wales) in 1832 and two year later we get married."

In a history book about the Eagle Hotel in the Burton Library in Detroit, reference is made to Catherine as being a cook. The restaurant was built in 1830 on the south side of Woodbridge Street in Detroit near Griswold. The book says the hotel was closed in 1865 and that it burned in 1866.

Records kept by Mrs. Jones in Clio reveal that Edward (Johnny) Jones Sr. was one of the 11 children of Mr. and Mrs. William Jones of Wales. They lived near the river Wye at the hamlet of Haye. His mother is unofficially reported as living until she was 112 years of age before dying in Haye.

Edward Sr. was born March 10, 1805, in Wales, and is buried in Pine Grove Cemetery at Lewis and Tuscola Roads in the southeastern tip of Tuscola County. He was buried March 24, 1901, at the age of 96 and is the only Jones buried in that Arbela Township cemetery.)

In 1822, Edward went to Canada with two of his brothers to work. His two brothers soon returned to Wales. Edward started working aboard a boat that carried passengers from Buffalo to Detroit. He stayed at the Eagle Hotel in Detroit, where he met Catherine.

They were married in the hotel and lived short times in Detroit, Mount Clements and Dearborn areas before moving to the "Louis Gordon" farm on the Canadian side of the Detroit River. This where Nancy and Henry, the first of 11 children born to Edward and Catherine, were born.

According to Sweinhart, Catherine - later called "Granny" Jones - told of the trials she and "Johnny" underwent, traveling as a farmer and lumberjack to Canada and moving back to Detroit. Sweinhart's story says the Jones family lived in Canada for about 20 years (until about 1854).

"One day we decide we go to Gran' Rapids to live and we start out with team and wagon. We go days and days tru da forest. Some places da road was cut tru, but in other we go straight into da woods."

"Well, one day we come to a place where the road part and we don't know which way to go. A man come along and we ask him which road go to Gran' Rapids. He point out da one to da left. We say 'Tank you' and go on."

"We travel many day more till one day, when da sun go down we come to a city. We think it Gran' Rapids and we so glad. But when we come to it and see it close, we know it not Gran' Rapids. It was Saginaw. My child, my man mad. We no come Saginaw anything. It bad town those day, my child. I angry yet at dat man who show us the wrong way."

She then told of her husband going to work in the mill and of family happiness:

"But city life no suit my man." Sweinhart quotes her as saying. "He like the country and woods. So one day we start out again to make our home with da birds in da forest. We drive our team westward many mile 'til we come to a good place."

This "good place" eventually became Section 11 in Jonesfield Township and now is the southeastern corner of Dice and N. Merrill Roads.

"Den we stake it out, and go to da government (the Flint and Pere Marquette Railroad Co.) and have it given us (they leased it and never owned it). Da men come and sign da paper and we settle down. It was summer time. I have five leetle children (Edward Jr., William, Betsy, Walter and Thomas, Henry and Nancy had married and settled near the village of Tuscola.)"

"Da first summer (1857), my man go away to the lumber camp on da Chippewa (near Mount Pleasant) and leave me all alone with my children. I alone all summer. We had a leetle log cabin with only three wall. All summer I work on it and fill the cracks with clay and mud and make it warm for winter."

"The chimney I built of branches and mud and I remember how glad I was when da smoke first go up. One day, whole tribe of Injun come. There were a hundred twenty of them. They hunt around our cabin all summer and they grow to like us. My children play with the leetle Injun children and have a happy time."

"O child, but I love da woods. To live an hour among da pine and da hemlock is better to me dan to live years in da city. It is my home, my child. Dat summer I work awful hard. Near our cabin was lot of tree and I cut all away to make our garden."

"Saginaw was thirty mile away. Some time we get out of flour. Den I have to walk to Saginaw an get some. Ah, my boy, my poor man do dat many and many a time."

"Pretty soon da leaves start to fall. Da autumn and den winter come. Game of every kind was plentiful and da streams were full of fish. Sometimes in da long night we hear da bears go by our cabin. Da sun go down early and in the evenings we all set in a ring round da fireplace. When we get sleepy we roll up and go to sleep on da floor. Dat our bed."

"After a time our cornmeal begin to get short, and we have no flour. In winter time I cannot go to Saginaw and back in a day. The Injun gone long while and left us alone and I afraid to leave the children by themself."

"Den, ah den, my child, we begin to listen for the footstep of da fadder. Every day we watch da stream dat flow by our cabin and listen far into da night. One day da sun go down and all da sky was red as fire. Everything was dry, da tree an' branches above and the twigs on da ground."

"A leetle snow was on da tree. We all watch da sun as he sink down to sleep in a blaze of red fire. As we look suddenly we hear far away as it was a hundred mile, a cry. 'Yoho! Yoho!' My child, how da warm blood run from ma ole heart. We listen."

"Again it come leetle louder, leetle clearer. 'Eagle,' say da baby (Thomas). 'No,' say Henry (she meant Edward Jr.), da oldest boy (he was 17), 'it's fadder, fadder, fadder.' An' it was. When it come again, I answer and it come nearer and nearer."

"Da sun been down an hour and it all twilight. We had da fire heaped high. Da fire shown bright and warm and made da spur on da evergreen glisten, and we all stand round da door as da dark night settle down. Soon we hear a step and in come da fadder with flour and other things we wish for so long."

"We 'fraid no longer and dat night we all happy as da birds. So it went, ma child. Da children grow up and go to da woods and some go onto da lake, as sailor. Den after long time, after da country all round us all get cleared up, my ole man and I tink we leave da farm. An, ma child, dat was da wrong step."

"We have eighty acre, as nice land, as in da country, but we not content. We leave it. Few years later da ole man die (1901) and today I all alone. But child, I no unhappy. It always best to be cheerful and so I am. I goin' to live few more years, den da good Lord take me to my ole man, who is waitin' for me."

Sweinhart went on to say: "That is the way she will tell you the romantic story of her years. In the 70 years (actually 67) which she was married, she gave to the world 11 children, 4 of whom are dead and the rest have lived to be strong men and woman."

"Sixty years (actually 51) ago, when she and her husband went into the locality of the present village of Merrill, all the country round was a vast wilderness. In it they made their home, overcoming the terrible obstacles which would have frightened less sturdy hearts with a courage that was inherent, not made"

"Her life in the forest gave her a constitution that has withstood the attack of increasing years with wonderful strength. In the vicinity of Merrill she is known for miles round. When the locality became more thickly settled, the township was formed (1871) and it was called Jonesfield in honor of Edward and Catherine."

"Her days are far gone; she will not last long. Yet, while she lives (seven more years), she is one last reminder of the hardy, fearless people from which our fathers sprang."

Catherine's death notice came in the Big Rapids Bulletin Herald Sept. 6, 1912. She died Sept. 5, just 10 days short of her 107th birthday. The notice said:

"In the death yesterday afternoon at Mercy Hospital of Mrs. Katherine (Catherine) Jones, the State of Michigan lost its oldest native inhabitant. She was 106 years, 11 months and 17 days (actually 20 days), and despite the ravages of time, she retained remarkable physical vitality and a wonderfully clear memory."

"The body was shipped to Hungerford this afternoon and funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at the Hungerford church. Interment will be in Hungerford." (She was buried in Hunkleford Cemetery near Woodville, about seven miles west of Big Rapids.)

BRIDGEPORT TOWNSHIP'S OLDEST RESIDENT PASSES

Claus Dankers, 96, Came Here 70 Years Ago,
Cleared Timber for Cabin Site

Claus Dankers, 96, Bridgeport township's oldest resident, died Thursday afternoon at his home on Portsmouth road.

Mr Dankers was born in Germany Nov 6, 1838 and at the age of 20 came with his family to Howell, Mich. Seven years later he drove his cattle over a forest trail to Bridgeport township. Here he settled in a log cabin with his wife, the former Miss Meta To??mann who had come to America with the family and whom he had married in 1860. She died in 187?. And he later married Miss Christina Brosch of Saginaw, who died in 1894.

CLEARED TIMBER FOR CABIN

In the early days Mr Dankers was a friend and neighbor of the grandfather and the father, Ferdinand Brucker, of Ex-Gov. Wilber M Brucker. They helped erect his cabin on his 80-acre tract of land, which was all timbered and had to be cleared over a period of years. Failing in health in 1895, Mr. Dankers took a sea voyage for his health and spent four months in Germany, his homeland. In recent years his home annually was the scene of a gala birthday party in which his more than 30 descendants participated.

Mr Dankers leaves two sons, John of Saginaw and Henry of Bridgeport; three daughters, Mrs Henry Neumann and Mrs Arnold Peters of Saginaw and Mrs Leonard G Huber of Bridgeport; 23 grandchildren and 30 great grandchildren. A fourth daughter, Mrs Otto Peters, died in 1925.

The funeral will take place at 1 p.m. Sunday at the home, and at 1:30 p.m. at St Matthew's Lutheran church, of which Mr Dankers was a charter member. Rev C F Miller will officiate and burial will be in Oakwood cemetery, Bridgeport

The fee for a full certificate is \$3 and \$1 for assistant. The board consists of five members appointed by the governor for the period of five years, one member being appointed annually. 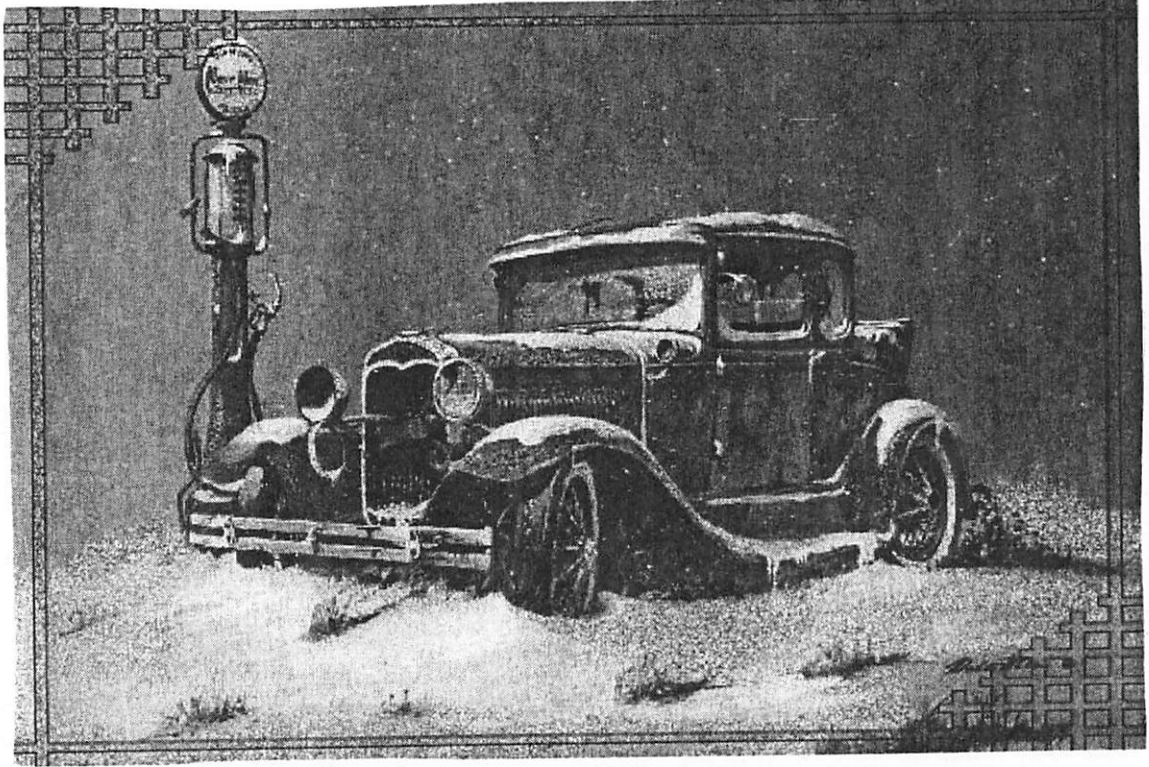

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia
To North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and when possible, added a location and reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations:

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3).

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("**Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), and **Boten von Altdorf** are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: they year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals.)

"Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I." is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring To "Reg.v.Mfr.kDI, Abg. 1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed fort that Record). **"Abgabe"** (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: **"LRA Eichstaett, Abgabel 1981, Nr. 676/1/4"** LRA=the office of the "Landkreis", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh.Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: **"BA Ansbach, Abgabe 1930, Nr.427/441"** (BA=Bezirksamt, in this case the city of Ansbach). **"Herrschaftsgericht"**, **"Gericht & Polizeibehoerde"** and **"L.g.a.O."** are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the **"Hometown"** column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG) of the first town listed in that column.

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SAGINAW'S FIRST DOLLAR DAY

In an age of sales occurring every day in one store or another, it is hard to believe that a community could get excited about a Dollar Day but that is just what happened in all of Saginaw's business districts - east, west and south side.

Saginaw business men and municipal officials became enthused about the Dollar Day promotion when they learned how successful the day was in Flint, Canton, Ohio, Utica, New York, St. Joseph, Mo., and other places. Some said their sales were from 50 to 516 percent better and an average of 50 percent were new faces to their shopping stores.

Samuel Seitner, of Seitner Bros., who had stores in Canton, O., and Flint, had to send half a dozen clerks to Flint to help take care of the crowds. Both stores broke business records on that day.

Saginaw Mayor Paddock said he would be glad to do anything to boost sales and promote the city. Merchants gave their hearty endorsement and agreed to offer unusual values. The success of the Dollar Days in other cities was a result of their leading business men being behind the day.

Saginaw's progressive merchants were behind this day. Board of Trade President, W. S. Linton, felt it was a "splendid idea"; President M. N. Brady of the West Side Business association offered his endorsement as did Dr. T. M. Williamson, president of the South Side Business Association. Saginaw Chamber of Commerce President Harry E. Oppenheimer also supported the day.

The date for the Dollar Day was set for Thursday, October 21. It was to be like a festival. Amsden's Thirty-third Regiment Band was to play musical selections on the streets of the business centers. The Courier-Herald published a list of participating merchants who were offering special values. Every type of store seemed to participate - clothiers, shoemakers, music stores, farm implements, stoves, drug stores, banks, dry cleaners, hatter, groceries, florists, art goods, furniture stores.

To make the day more interesting, a \$25 reward would be yours if you spotted Miss Dollar Day. The Courier-Herald secured the services of this well-known Saginaw young lady. She consented to be Miss Dollar Day for the adventure and to aid Saginaw General hospital. She would also receive \$15 for her efforts. The Courier-Herald published one picture of her, backside, with hat, long sleeved blouse and long skirt. Another picture showed her but she has a mask over her eyes. She could be mingling with you in any participating store, any side of town. She would only be on the street to go from store to store. She would ignore you if you accosted her on the street. You had to find her in a store and have a sales receipt from any Dollar Day participating merchant. Also, if you were lucky enough to collect the reward, you and Miss Dollar Day would be featured in a moving picture that was being taken of Saginaw.

President Winslow, of the American Commercial Film company, would be taking the moving picture for a camera play written about Saginaw personages and scenes. Pictures in the Saginaw drama would be taken at the A. T. Ferrell residence, 923 North Michigan avenue, where the entire cast would assemble. November 18 and 19 were the dates for it to be shown at the Auditorium for the benefit of Saginaw General hospital.

DOLLAR DAY PROCLAMATION

I hereby proclaim Thursday, October 21, Dollar Bargain Day for Saginaw, and request business men and citizens to observe it as such. The special trade festival and get acquainted function known as Dollar Day has proved attractive, educational and successful in all other cities where it has been given. Let us all

co-operate in making Saginaw's Dollar Day the biggest success of any.

I would recommend that in honor of the day and as a tribute to our visitors from outside, flags be displayed generally throughout the city.

Further, I would recommend that employers of labor, who can conveniently do so, close their respective institutions for the afternoon, or part thereof, in order that their employes may enjoy the opportunity to co-operate with the business men and citizens generally in making Dollar Day the success we all anticipate it will be.

Dollar Day proved to be a huge success. Chris Schaefer, Schaefer Hat Store- "Not an idle moment the entire day". Max P Heavenrich, Heavenrich Bros- "Too busy to give our customers customary service"; James Bartlett, Wm. Barie Dry Goods- "The biggest business day we have had in a year; wonderful thing for the town. Would like to see Merchants' Dollar Days often-at least four times a year; W. T. Loney - Best special sale day I ever had. Store crowded from 5 in the morning until 7 in the evening. Never had a moment's rest all day.

And Miss Dollar Day, a.k.a. Daisy Mueller, was captured about 4 o'clock by Miss Ara A. Dietz, 539 South Park street. Daisy had been going in and out of many of the participating stores for most of the day. Miss Dietz thought the pictures in the paper looked like Daisy but she couldn't be sure. She spotted her at the M. W. Tanner store and waved her sales receipt and exclaimed "You are the Courier-Herald's Miss Dollar Day."

"Yes, I am."

"Oh, go on. You're crazy. You are not"

She believed when asked to go to the Courier-Herald office to get the \$25.

And the moving picture plays of Saginaw called "Saginaw in Filmland" and "The Billionaire Lord" were shown at the Auditorium to some four or five thousand people in a couple of shows. The main floor of the big building was crowded and the balconies and gallery were comfortably filled. The film, about 7000 feet in all, was of excellent quality. Scenes taken around Saginaw of many of the leading industries showed the diversity and size of the city's industries. Familiar faces and familiar scenes were shown. The appearance of George W. Wallis, late chief of the fire department, who died suddenly at a fire about a week after he and the other members of the department had staged a spectacular downtown fire scene, brought applause from the audience several times.

The play "The Billionaire Lord" had a cast of more than 50 well-known society persons that many in the audience recognized. The cast included Mrs. Newell Barnard, Cyril Quinn, George Grant, Jr., George O'Brien, George Stone, Mrs. Lewis Barnard, A. S. Harvey, George Humphrey, Lewis Barnard, Mrs. Otto Schupp and Mrs. George Humphrey.

Dollar Day was a HUGE success.

**PIONEER RESIDENT
CALLED BY DEATH**

James Passmore Had Resided
In Saginaw for Nearly A
Half Century

James Passmore, a well known pioneer resident of this city and county, passed away at 12:45 o'clock yesterday morning at his home, 1808 Janes avenue, of senility. He was the last pioneer of Deerfield road, now known as Janes avenue, and was the oldest honorary member of the Bricklayers union. He was a subscriber to The Courier before it was combined with the Herald, and has continued as a steady reader of the paper since, having been one of the oldest subscribers. His was the first death in the family in 43 years, and he had been married for 59 years. He had been a member of the First Baptist church for 43 years.

James Passmore was born in Cornwell, England March 5, 1834. When he was about seven years of age his parents emigrated from England and settled in Montreal, Canada, where they remained for five years. Mr Passmore later moved to Whitby, Ont, Canada, where he remained until he attained his majority. He received all the school advantages of those early days in Canada, and went to Rochester, NY at the age of 17 and learned the trade of a mason, which he has followed since. He was married to Amelia Curviel in Canada July 26, 1855. After their marriage they located in Whitby township, Ont where they made their home for 11 years.

In the fall of 1866 they came to Michigan and settled in Saginaw. In

following his trade in Saginaw Mr Passmore was engaged in building many of the public structures and private residences. He remained in the city one year when he purchased a farm on Section 21, Buena Vista township, Saginaw county, when it was a wilderness, and it was not an uncommon sight to see deer and wild animals. He was justice of the peace for four years, and he also served as overseer of highways.

Mr and Mrs Passmore were the parents of eight children, Charles D Passmore, Pecos, Texas; Thomas D Passmore, Albuquerque, NM; Mrs Robert Law, 1812 Janes avenue; Luke J Passmore, Burt, Mich; Amelia Passmore, who died at the age of four years; Mrs H D Houck, Saginaw, west side; Mrs D A Edwards, Detroit; and Dr J L Passmore, Saginaw. He also leaves 23 grandchildren and six great grandchildren, and three sisters, Mrs Levinia Cook, Bloomington, Mich; Mrs Jeremiah Leslie, Des Moines, Ia; and Mrs Fannie Edwards, St Marys, Ont, Canada.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence and at 2:30 from the First Baptist church. Rev Boone will officiate and the interment will be in Forest Lawn cemetery

CENSUS TIDBITS-

- 1790 – First census was handwritten, made into columns on any paper the enumerator could find and bound in any way he could.
Divides family members by sex and age ranges.
- 1820 – First census to report the number of “colored” persons
- 1820-1840 – “Free colored” were listed by name if they were the head of household
Were counted statistically as “Other free persons” or “slaves” in 1790-1810
If foreigner is naturalized
- 1830– First census to include an age category of over one hundred years
Prior to this the oldest age category was over 45
First time supplied with uniform forms
- 1840 – Revolutionary War pensioners and widows mentioned in this census
- 1850 – Lists the names of each individual residing in household
Color of each person to be reported
- 1850-1930 – Report place of birth (state or country) for members of household
Report ages of each person in household. Ages of children are sometimes fractions
3/12 (three months old)
- 1850-1890-Asks if person was married 12 months prior to date of census. If column checked, estimate date of marriage within one year
- 1860 – Indians counted first time in category “civilized Indians” -meant living in general population and paying taxes
- 1870 – If person had foreign born parents
If male citizen over 21 could vote or not because of being in the Rebellion
- 1880 – Marital status was first reported
First to report the street name and house number (Not all enumerators did this)
Birthplace of individual’s mother and father listed. Foreign country was to be as specific as possible
First to instruct enumerators to use a race classification of “Indian”
Reports household relationships for the first time
- 1890-1910-Asks how many children were born to each female; how many are still living at the time of the census
- 1900 – Only census to ask month and year of birth, reported for each individual
- 1900-1910- Length of present marriage
- 1910 – Asks if married before. M1-meant first marriage, M2 meant more than once. A third marriage would still be recorded as M2
- 1900-1910-Indian Schedules ask number of times married and if living with more than one wife and if wives are sisters

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia
To North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and when possible, added a location and reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations:

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3).

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("**Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), and **Boten von Altdorf** are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: they year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals.)

"**Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I.**" is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring To "Reg.v.Mfr.kDI, Abg. 1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/I" (the reference listed fort that Record). "**Abgabe**" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "**LRA Eichstaett, Abgabel 1981, Nr. 676/1/4**" **LRA**=the office of the "**Landkreis**", called the "**Landsratsamt**", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh.Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "**BA Ansbach, Abgabe 1930, Nr.427/441**" (**BA**=**Bezirksamt**", in this case the city of Ansbach). "**Herrschaftsgericht**", "**Gericht & Polizeibehoerde**" and "**Lg.a.O.**" are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "**Hometown**" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "**Landgericht**" (**LG**) of the first town listed in that column.

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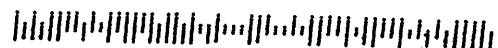

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**PARENTS WANT TO GET CHILD BACK
SAGINAW CO. RESIDENTS START ACTION TO RECOVER SON ADOPTED BY
OTHERS**

Mr. And Mrs. Charles Hausbeck, Buena Vista, Saginaw county, have brought habeas corpus proceedings against Mr. And Mrs. Charles Allen of Bay City to secure possession of their three-year-old son, Ferdinand Charles. Testimony was taken yesterday by Judge Collins of the Bay City circuit court and is to be decided Tuesday.

According to the testimony Mr. And Mrs. Hausbeck were married in Saginaw about June 1, 1912, and went to Detroit to live for a short time, their son being born October 31, 1912. It is said they wished to keep the knowledge of the child's birth from Mrs. Hausbeck's mother, and Mrs. Hausbeck was unable to care for the child, so several weeks after the boy's birth they advertised in a Detroit Sunday paper for some one to adopt the child signing the name E. Ausbach. Their Detroit address was 421 Elmwood avenue.

The Allens in Bay City replied to the advertisement and received a return communication informing them they could have the child if they called for it immediately and asking them to be good to the baby. Mrs. Allen went to Detroit and obtained the child.

The Allens asserted that they never saw the Hausbecks until November 6 of this year when Mr. Hausbeck came and claimed the boy.

**DENIED CUSTODY OF "ADOPTED" CHILD
SAGINAW COUPLE FAIL TO SECURE CUSTODY OF INFANT FROM BAY CITY
FAMILY**

Bay City, Mich., Dec 14-

By a ruling of Circuit Judge C. L. Collins here today, the custody of Ferdinand Charles Hausbeck, three-year-old son of Mr. And Mrs. Charles Hausbeck of Buena Vista township, Saginaw county, will remain with Mr. And Mrs. Charles Allen of this city, who adopted the child with the consent of its parents when it was only a few weeks old, and have cared for it since, though no formal papers of adoption were ever taken out.

At the time of the adoption, the Hausbecks were living in Detroit and were unable to care for the child. Since then, Hausbeck has met with measured success and is now a prosperous farmer of Buena Vista. Judge Collins' ruling was made following a mandamus proceeding brought by the Hausbecks to require the Allens to show cause why they should not turn the custody of the child over to the parents. The judge ruled that Mrs. Allen's care for the child entitled her to its custody, despite the fact that no papers were taken out when the adoption was made.

After considerable legal difficulties and after being turned down by the court Mr. And Mrs. Charles Hausbeck of Buena Vista secured possession of their three-year old son, Ferdinand Charles from Mr. And Mrs. Charles Allen of Bay City who adopted him. The parents appeared with a Saginaw attorney and a police officer at the Allen home this

evening and, it is understood, reached an agreement, paying the Allens \$50 and securing the child.

Judge C. L. Collins of Bay City in his decision on the habeas corpus proceedings brought by the parents about three weeks ago gave the custody of the child to the Allens. A week ago a motion for a rehearing was filed in the county clerk's office, and this was to have been heard Tuesday morning.

Mr. And Mrs. Hausbeck advertised their son for adoption about three years ago when in Detroit, and the Allens answering the ad secured the child but no regular adoption papers were made out. Some few months ago the Hausbecks appeared and demanded their child back but the Allens refused and habeas corpus proceedings were started.

CITY'S FIRST POLICEWOMAN RETIRING

The Saginaw Police Department's first and only police-woman is about to retire, after 25 years' service.

She is Thelma Ruff Gerow, whose quarter-century as a law woman has seen her handling cases ranging all the way from 8-year old toy counter shoplifters to razor wielding women murderers.

Mrs. Gerow today made application for retirement at her 60th birthday, less than a month distant. This is under the Police-Fire Civil service rule under which a pension-eligible policeman or fireman can continue in service only on the annual written request of the head of his department.

Mrs. Gerow's claim to the distinction of being the Saginaw Police Department's first and only policewoman is indisputable. However, she was pre-dated by two women who carried the title of police-woman, but who worked out of the City Health Department and possessed no police powers. They were Mrs. Helen Brooks Davis and Mrs. P. M. Lawrence, and their activities were more or less limited to the cases of wayward girls.

On the other hand, Mrs. Gerow has had a hand in almost every sort of police case from the whole gamut of morals offenses to burglaries and holdups. Though her assignment has placed her in the Juvenile Division, her work never has been confined to the problems of juvenile delinquency. Among other things she has been a genuine factor in City Health Department's continuing war on venereal disease.

Mrs. Gerow, who doesn't begin to look her 60 years, says she hasn't the slightest intention of "sitting down with folded hands," and hopes to find a new place for abilities and her long experience.

Mrs. Gerow is a daughter of the late Byron J. Rockwood, remembered well by many Saginawians of his generation. She has three children and is nine times a grandmother.

State Archive Nuremberg: 19th Century Emigrants from Central Franconia
To North America

INTRODUCTION:

These records are based on information in the State Archive of Central Franconia (Mittel Franken) at Nuremberg. As a Sesquicentennial gift, the city of Gunzenhausen sent this information to its sister city of Frankenmuth, Michigan. Frankenmuth Historical Assn. translated the information, compiled these charts and when possible, added a location and reference as to where in N. America the settler arrived (set off by []). If there are any questions regarding accuracy, researchers should request to see copies of the original records in Germany and for this reason will need the reference and the archive's address (there is a fee):

A Very Short Explanation of Reference Abbreviations:

(a fuller explanation can be found in the first issue of this series, Volume 29 Issue 3).

Intelligenzblatt fuer Mittelfranken (abbreviated "**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Kreis-Amtsblatt fuer Mittelfranken ("**Krs.A.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), Intelligenzblatt fuer den Rezat-Kreis ("**Intellig.Bl.f.Mfr.**"), and **Boten von Altdorf** are official newspapers in which prospective legal emigrants published the fact that they were leaving Germany. The remainder of the reference is: they year, part (Beilage), number, column, and date of publication (the month is usually in Roman numerals.)

"**Reg.v.Mfr.K.d.I.**" is the abbreviation for "Regierung von Mittel Franken Kammer des Inneren" (Chamber of the Interior for Central Franconia, located in Ansbach), a department of the provincial administration. If one wished to see copies of the papers of Mathias Abelein, one would order them from the State Archive in Nuremberg, referring To "Reg.v.Mfr.kDI, Abg. 1932, Titulus Ia, Nr.57740/T" (the reference listed fort that Record). "**Abgabe**" (abbreviated "Abg.") refers to the year records were transferred to the State Archive in Nuremberg.

Other references indicate the administrative town near the emigrant's home (see the first issue for a fuller explanation of the various terms). If one wanted a copy of Walburga Abele's records, they would give the reference for that record: "**LRA Eichstaett, Abgabel 1981, Nr. 676/1/4**" LRA=the office of the "**Landkreis**", called the "Landsratsamt", in this case the city of Eichstaett). If one wanted a copy of Joh.Jakob Ackermann's records they would give the reference for that record: "**BA Ansbach, Abgabe 1930, Nr.427/441**" (BA=Bezirksamt", in this case the city of Ansbach). "**Herrschaftsgericht**", "**Gericht & Polizeibehoerde**" and "**Lg.a.O.**" are other terms for types of administrative towns. In the "**Hometown**" column, the second town listed is one of these types of administrative towns. Unless noted, it is the "Landgericht" (LG) of the first town listed in that column.
