

FIRST RECORD BOOK OF SAGINAW COUNTY, 1835-1864

Page 195 - By Order of the Board of Supervisors of Saginaw County.

A license is granted to Curtis Emerson to keep a Ferry across the Saginaw River, commencing at the foot of Bristol Street in the City of East Saginaw, thence across said river to the opposite bank at the foot of Calhoun Street in Saginaw City for the term of three years from and after the 16th day of May A.D. 1855.

Said Ferry to be propelled by Steam, Horse, or such other power as the said Emerson may use, with rates of ferriage similar to those prescribed by the Board of Supervisors to Nelson Able at the Annual Session on which rates are as follows, viz:

Every two horse wagon with Team, Driver, Load & Passengers-Twelve & One Half Cents.

Every Man with Horse -Ten Cents

For each additional horse or animal -Five Cents

Every one Horse wagon with Team, Driver, load & passengers-Ten Cents

Every Footman -Three Cents

Every sheep or hog -One Cent

Every Driver, accompanying same -Three Cents

The said Curtis Emerson covenants and agrees to keep constantly in attendance one man, faithful, prompt, and ready to attend to all calls for his service at all times of the day, between sunrise in the morning and nine o'clock at night during the whole season of Navigation and while the usual passage of boats.

Page 196/7 - By Order of the Board of Supervisors of Saginaw County.

A license is granted to Michael Daily to keep a Ferry across the Saginaw River, in Lower Saginaw, commencing at the foot of 1st Street in said Village, running thence across said river directly to the terminus of the Kaw-kaw-lin Road for the term of three years from the first day of January A.D. 1857. Rates to be charged as fixed by the Board of Supervisors, as follows:

(The rates continued the same as the earlier rates)

(First Record Book of Saginaw County, continued)

The hours of Ferrying shall be from Sunrise to 9 o'clock P M and such time to be considered as the day, month and year ferriage is performed in the night hours or between the hours of 9 o'clock P M and Sunrise; three times the aforesaid rates shall be paid, and from and after the 10th day of November until the 10th of April, the following rates of Ferriage shall be double the Rates of the rates first aforesaid.

The said Michael Daily covenants and agrees to keep constantly in attendance one man, faithfull, prompt, and ready to attend to all calls for his services at all times of the day between sunrise in the morning and 9 o'clock at night during the whole season of navigation and while the usual passage of the scow remains unobstructed by ice. He further covenants to furnish a sufficient number of scows and boats for the conveyance of passengers and teams. And the scows and boats shall be substantially built and shall be such as a majority of the Supervisors may decide to be suitable for such purpose. The landing places for said scows on the banks shall admit the scows approach on a level with the upper surface and the scow shall be provided with ropes and chains to fasten them to such landing places.

Page 272/3 - By Order of the Board of Supervisors of Saginaw County.

A license is granted to John B. Allison to keep a Ferry across the Saginaw River between the following points, viz: From a slip below and near the Carrollton Mill on the west side of the river to the terminus of a highway leading to the said river on the east side thereof at a point nearly opposite said slip for a term of five years from and after the tenth day of January A.D. 1862

Rates of Ferriage to be charged as fixed by the Board of Supervisors, as follows: (The rates once again continued the same as previous rates)

The hours of ferrying shall be from Sunrise to 9 o'clock P M and such time to be considered as the day time and when ferriage is performed into night time or between the hours of 9 o'clock P M and sunrise, then three times the aforesaid rates shall be paid, and from and after the 10th day of November until the 10th day of April next, following rates of ferriage shall be double the rates of the sum first aforesaid.

The said John P. Allison covenants and agrees to keep constantly in attendance one man, faithful, prompt, and ready to attend to all calls for his services at all times of the day between sunrise in the morning and nine o'clock at night during the whole season of navigation and while the usual passage of the scow remains unobstructed by ice; he further covenants to furnish a sufficient number of scows and boats for the conveyance of passengers and teams, and the scows and boats shall be substantially built and shall be such as a majority of the Supervisors may decide to be suitable for such purposes. The landing places for said scows on the banks shall admit the scows to approach on a level with the upper surface and the scows shall be provided with ropes and chains to fasten them to such landing places.

Page 273 - At the adjourned meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Saginaw County continued and held at the Courthouse in the City of Saginaw in said County on the 18th day of February A.D. 1863. Among other things, the following license was granted by said Board of Supervisors:

Resolved that a license be granted to Jefferson Jaquith to run a Ferry untill the first day of April 1866 across the Tittabawassee River on the line between section 21 and 23 in Town 13 North, of Range 3 East, said town being known, as the Township of Tittabawassee, and that he shall receive therefore, the following rates of ferriage, viz:

For every person on foot	Three Cents
For each single horse with or without vehicle	Ten Cents
For each Team of two animals with or without vehicle	Twelve Cents and
For each Animal	Five Cents

provided that said Jefferson Jaquith shall execute the requisite bond as required by law.

Programs in Review

Leland R. Watrous

Our April meeting featured a "Show 'N' Tell" session showing a silk newspaper, signature quilt, documentation of family history and a pictorial collection of Scottish ancestors, complete with anecdotes presented by, respectively, Leland Watrous, Art Guimond, Nellie Jo Brooks and John Cuthbertson. Anna Mae Thompson completed the evening with her comments on Eddy Room additions including the "Newspapers on Microfilm" project in which a number of old newspapers, some dating back to 1837, were being microfilmed by the State Library and would shortly be available for research. Peggy Lughthart covered her Palatine ancestry to fill up the program.

The June meeting was held on 9 June and following the annual business meeting Mrs. Sydney (Ellen) Probert was the guest speaker and her topic was "Identifying old photos", which was a very edifying experience for the membership. She noted the various types of costumes for the various time periods along with the various backgrounds and frames and gave a number of helpful hints she used in identifying dates and places.

To start out our new genealogical year, Anna Mae Thompson of the library staff related her experiences at the August "World Conference of Records" at Salt Lake City, Utah. By using references available in the Eddy Room, she saved much valuable time by skipping card catalogs and going straight to ship records in which she was interested. She recapitulated the highlights of the talks which she attended, as well as the subject matter of the various talks. Many of the speakers there had either been featured at Saginaw Genealogical Society seminars or had written books which are to be found in the Eddy Room collection. Peggy Lughthart was the featured speaker at the meeting of October 13, 1980, when she spoke on "Adventures on a Budget". She managed to locate a cemetery in Thorold, Ontario, which had been moved three times, but found a tombstone

in which she was interested. She noted that she preferred to go to the county site, rather than state library because it was better to get the feel of the county this way. Another interesting point was that the New York State Library in Albany was recently built and arrangement of the collection was still in progress.

The speaker for the meeting of November 10, 1980 was Dr. Joseph Druse on the topic of "English Research". Dr Druse suggested starting with guide books of the area, and made reference to the Society of Genealogists (in England) and to the book, Genealogical Research in England and Wales. Registrations in England began in 1837 with the first English census, featuring complete names, being in 1841; the first civil records of wills began in 1858 and were located at Somerset House in London. St Catherine's House contains all vital records for England, costing approximately \$15 for an enquiry. The 1841 census of England gives the name but not relationships and the ages are not exact whereas the 1851 census gives the relationship and exact ages. Due to the fact that many of the English residents were not members of the Church of England, the Church of England records do not include the non-members; these records are kept from about 1538 on. Before 1600, most of the early records have disappeared, but after 1600 fairly complete records were kept and are available. Boyd's Marriage Index lists English marriages and are about one quarter complete. Local Histories and county histories should be checked as well as directories of parish rectories, village registries and church records. Dr Druse listed a number of books available in this country at most libraries and went on to say that the Perogative Court of Canterbury lists many of the wills and has printed indexes for several periods. Also included in the available records are "Feet of Fines" for those who held land from the King, and when this land changed hands, the owner had to report this transaction: This was one of the finest programs presented by this Society and was greatly enjoyed by all.

Research Aids

This article appeared in the June 24, 1884, *Saginaw Evening News*, on page 2 in response to an article in the same newspaper of May 16, 1884 regarding the discovery of bones at Washington and Cass in Saginaw City.

THOSE BONES

The skeltons unearthed while grading for the new pavement on Washington street a few weeks ago created considerable inquiry, and the most generally accepted theory was that they were the remains of the soldiers who had been stationed here at an early day, and Major N. S. Wood, with true soldierly instinct at once corresponded with the war department for the purpose of identifying these remains if possible and marking their new resting place in a fitting manner. In reply he received the following, which will be read with interest.

WAR DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON, June 18, 1884.

SIR; In reply to your letters dated respectively the 16th ultimo and 10th inst, in relation to the finding of several coffins, in excavating for street improvements at Saginaw, which are supposed to contain the remains of soldiers who died while that place was occupied as a military post, and requesting to

be furnished with any information the department may be able to supply, from which the names of the deceased might be ascertained, I beg to enclose herewith a list of the names, etc., of the officers and men who died at Saginaw, Mich., while occupied by troops, the same having been furnished from the office of the adjutant general of the army.

LAND DEED GOBLEDDYGOOK REALEY NOT SO DIFFICULT

What are baselines? Principal meridians? Correction lines? Townlines? Ranges? Few of today's city residents and only a sprinkling of farmers know.

But they were key words for public surveys in Michigan between 1815 and 1837 and today are the foundations on which legal claims for land are based.

The start of a survey (as in Michigan more than 150 years ago) must be from north-south and east-west points. Michigan's main north-south line, its "principal meridian," is the world's 30th parallel.

Figuring from the mouth of the AuGlaize River at Defiance, Ohio, and going north, this parallel line forms the east boundaries of these counties: Hillsdale, Clinton, Gratiot, Roscommon, Crawford and Otsego. It continues across Lake Huron (20 miles east of the Mackinaw Bridge) and moves through Sault Ste. Marie. It forms the west boundaries of these counties: Lenawée, Shiawassee, Saginaw (Meridian Road or M 30), Ogemaw, Oscoda and Montmorency.

The parallel lends its name to "Meridian" High School in Sanford. The school lies along M 30, just north of Sanford.

Michigan's "Principal meridian" is intersected at right angles by an east-west line called a "baseline." There is no fixed rule for determining a baseline. Michigan's baseline follows the north boundary of these counties: Wayne, Washtenaw, Jackson, Calhoun, Kalamazoo and Van Buren. The baseline is the south boundary of these counties: Macomb, Oakland, Livingston, Ingham, Eaton, Barry and Allegan.

Everything "ranges" east or west from the "principal meridian" or north or south of the "baseline." Each six miles in any direction from these fixed lines forms

a governmental unit called a township. A county is made up of 36 of these townships.

Since the earth is curved, no parallel north-south lines can be exactly "parallel." For that reason, all northern boundaries of townships in Michigan are smaller than southern boundaries. The difference isn't much, but for a dozen counties, it would be very noticeable.

Therefore, the government set up "correction lines" every 60 miles north of the "baseline." At each "correction line," the "range" from the "principal meridian" is refigured again.

In Gratiot County there's a baseline following Washington Road, east and west. This is the reason roads running north and south across Washington Road jog slightly at the east side of the county and even more so further west. The corrections have caused "partial" townships in many counties. When the description on a property deed reads "Town 8 North" and "Range 1 West," it means that the property is in the ninth township north of the baseline and is the first township west of the principal meridian-Elba Township in Gratiot County, in this case.
