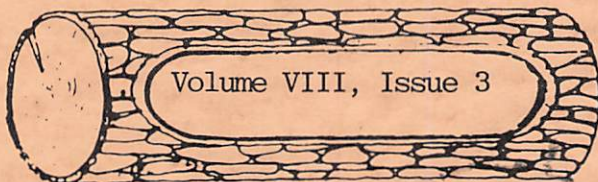

EIGHTH ANNUAL SEMINAR SPEAKER ANNOUNCED

The Saginaw Genealogical Society is very proud and immensely pleased to announce that the speaker for the Eighth Annual Seminar will be George E McCracken, Ph. D., F A S G, of Des Moines, Iowa and an internally-known authority on Genealogy, publisher of *The American Genealogist* and university professor, having spent 48 years teaching Latin, Greek, French, German, Italian, ancient and medieval history. He is a former Roman archaeologist, military historian and student of the early Christian church. He was elected as a Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists nearly thirty years ago and has contributed many scholarly articles to various genealogical works and has been associated with *The American Genealogist* as associate editor, and, for the past sixteen years as editor-in-chief. Dr McCracken is also responsible for a number of volumes of military history, classified as TOP SECRET and in 1970 *The Welcome Claimants, Proved, Disproved and Doubtful*, which is one of the most important works in Pennsylvania genealogy. He retired from the university five years ago but keeps active with TAG, which is regarded by many as the Number 1 publication of genealogy, with its emphasis on Connecticut. Dr McCracken will be speaking on genealogy in New York and New Jersey, two big problem areas for those with lines in those states. Richard Hathaway, director of the Michigan Unit of the Michigan State Library will share in the speaking duties during the morning hours and our own Dr Richard Mudd will be the featured speaker during the luncheon break, with a program relating to his grandfather, Dr Samuel Mudd and his mistreatment and vindication from the hysteria following the assassination of Abraham Lincoln. Tickets will be \$15.00 for reservations in advance, and \$17.00 after or at the door.

J H PIERSON, H Estabrook and H S & J M WILSON petitioned for stumping, grading and ditching of certain streets in Duncan's addition; referred to committee. M JEFFERS offered to rent a vault to the city. H H HOYT resigned as member of Water Board; accepted. L P MASON and 2 others asked for cross-walk on west side of Welles st, across Thompson; referred to committee. Following men had filed acceptance of office with city clerk: Alexander G ANDERSON, school inspector, 5th Ward; George M GUILLEY, Constable, 5th Ward; Patrick BEAN, Constable, 6th Ward; Albert BOHRINGER, Pound-Master. Assessor A SCHUPP reported that annual assessment of East Saginaw for 1874 was complete. Frederick H HERBERT was appointed to Sewer Board. Following claims against the city were reported by Charles V DELAND, Controller: E Ten EYCK and others, sundry sewer accounts, \$200.83; H C Gibbs, stationery account, \$12.40; F H HERBERT, services as surveyor, \$211.75; J ESPY, lighting lamps, \$24.00; Monroe JONES, rent for election, \$15.00; I M & H P SMITH, making abstracts, \$20.50; Sears and Holland, lumber account, \$263.38; J DAVIDSON, pay roll street work, \$76.75; H & E PROUX, building walk and bridges, \$14.75; P Yeaton & Co, harness repairs, \$8.75; P K FRANK, poor orders, \$12.50; Harvey & Coleman, poor orders, \$28.00; A BLANKERTS, poor orders, \$27.50; J RICHMAN, poor orders, \$15.00; Ed PEIPER, poor orders, \$198.00; J O'DONNELL, poor orders, \$85.00; H H BRADLEY, poor orders, \$14.00; E P ALLEN, insurance on city property, \$75.00. Programs in Review

Leland R Watrous

Lloyd J Cartwright of our society was the speaker for the meeting of 14 January
1980 and gave us the benefit of his experiences in researching in England. He

also described charting and explained the Everton system, whereby the number of the father is twice the chart number of the child and noted that after ten generations, a person has 512 ancestors; fifteen generations would provide a total of 16,384, *ad infinitum*. Lloyd emphasized that all information should be recorded before it is lost and that all biographical anecdotes should also be noted. He showed road atlases and gazetteers for locating market towns and villages in England. Ordinance maps for locating certain areas are available in various scales. Among various places for researching in England are the General Registry Office at St Catherine in London and the Society of Genealogists in Southwest London. The Public Records office is located in Chancery Lane and has census records. The Parish Records in England began in 1838.

Dr Evelyn Shields, an assistant professor of Speech at Delta College, spoke on the "Irish Folk in American History." She detailed ships and ports of embarkation in Ireland and England and the ports of entry into the United States. Among the causes for emigration were famine, restrictive British laws and chronic unemployment. New York City rose to about 1/3 Irish in population and Boston to about one half of the total. The saloon became the unofficial Irish center of activity in America, much as in Ireland. Few Irish became farmers, mainly because of their sociability and reluctance to face a life separated from others on a farm, but rather were urban dwellers. They raised the Catholic church to the largest in the nation, founded the Knights of Labor, one of the early organized labor unions. Over the years, the Irish rose from a despised position to a place of power and respectability.

On 10 March 1980, we had a real treat in the persons of Chet and Mary Jane Trout from Lansing who spoke on their hobby, Tombstone Rubbing, and illustrated their talks with both color slides and examples of rubbings. They recommended rice paper or mulberry paper, which is tough and comes in many textures. They also said that the stone must be cleaned with a fiber bristle brush, NEVER a wire brush and that the stones must be treated with respect. The paper should be taped to the stone tightly, using masking tape for the normal job which takes about one hour. Use a heel ball of wax--shoemaker's wax or carpenter's crayons (which come in various colors)--and rub lightly over the design. The children's crayons will not work well and tend to melt in hot weather. When finished, remove the masking tape. Many fine illustrations of New England scenes were used to explain the Puritan outlook in New England and their customs and housing, which was illustrated with slides of Plimoth Plantation. The symbols found on tombstones were the people's art due to common illiteracy at the time. They discussed various designs found and explained the symbolism, as well as sharing selected epitaphs. Chet and Mary Jane went over the history of various tombstone ornamentation and styles and noted that from their studies, they could quickly determine which carver was responsible for the stones, simply by studying the styles. All in all, one of the most delightful evenings in many a moon.
