

## A RECIPE (for Preserving Paper)

Through the years, many methods have been brought forward to preserve those old newspaper clippings, so dear to the hearts of genealogists. Detroit Free Press and the Reader's Digest as well as a Seattle, Washington, newspaper have all printed recipes for preserving newspaper items. All three boil down to the same basic recipe: take a couple of spoonsful or a tablet of milk magnesia, dissolve and thoroughly mix in a quart of club soda. This can be used immediately or refrigerated over night, as desired. Immerse the newspaper page in the solution in a large tray or container, keeping it flat and soak for an hour, then remove to some supporting material, such as a sheet of plastic, window screening or netting. Dry the page (or clippings) between sheets of white blotting paper, changing the blotters as needed and keeping it under the weight of a stack of books. Blotting paper can be purchased at most photographic stores and is non-contaminating. Once dry, the acid content of the paper will be neutralized and the stable alkaline base will remain. Most of the very early papers were compounded of rag paper, but later innovations in paper production brought increased use of wood fibres for this purpose. The cellulose, of which the wood fibres are made of decomposes under conditions of light and humidity and is hastened by the acidic composition of the chemicals used to produce the paper. Once the paper begins to decompose, the process continues to the detriment of the newspaper page.

A friend of ours, Daniel H. Haigh, is a research chemist at Dow Chemical Company of Midland and was nice enough to check the above process out and to give the following account of just why this process does work:

Milk of Magnesia is Magnesium Hydroxide  $(Mg(OH)_2)$ . Club Soda is a solution of carbon dioxide  $(CO_2)$  in water  $(H_2)$ , forming the weak acid-carbonic acid  $(H_2CO_3)$ . When the Milk of Magnesia reacts with carbon dioxide by way of the carbonic acid, magnesium carbonates are formed. All of these compounds are "basic". They react with acids to give neutral products, so that by soaking paper in a solution of these compounds, the acids in the paper are neutralized, and when the water evaporates, some of the carbonates are left with the paper to act as "acid scavengers" for extended protection.

Actually, milk of magnesia itself would give the same protection if it could get at the acids, but it is much less (around 150-170 times) soluble in water than are the carbonates. So, by reacting milk of magnesia with club soda, you make a product wherein the "active ingredient" is more soluble, and hence more available.

If any of our readers wish to consider the chemistry more thoroughly, Mr. Haigh, who prepared this article, has checked it out and approves this application for the use of preserving newspaper.

#### GLEANINGS FROM THE EAST SAGINAW COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Monday, 15 Jun 1874, p 87, ff

Samuel F ARNOLD and 4 others asking that they be allowed 90 days to build the sidewalk ordered on 5th st. between Chestnut and Cherry Sts.: tabled.Robert DAVIDSON and others asked for removal of present poudmaster; referred to committee. George LOCKLEY and others complained that nuisance existed on property of Matthias ROUBLE on Welles, between Thompson and Hoyt; referred to board of health. J E Cooley, thru T M JAMES his attorney, remonstrated against an assessment for street improvement; tabled. R R MORGAN and 8 others asking for grading of 8th St from Carroll to Wadsworth, also construction of sidewalk from Wadsworth to Astor: referred to committee. Mayor H H HOYT objected to reducing the amount of ligense of J BURROUGHS, his veto was sustained. Land was offered for purchase to the city for a street from D MacINTYRE and wife for \$25.00; adopted.
