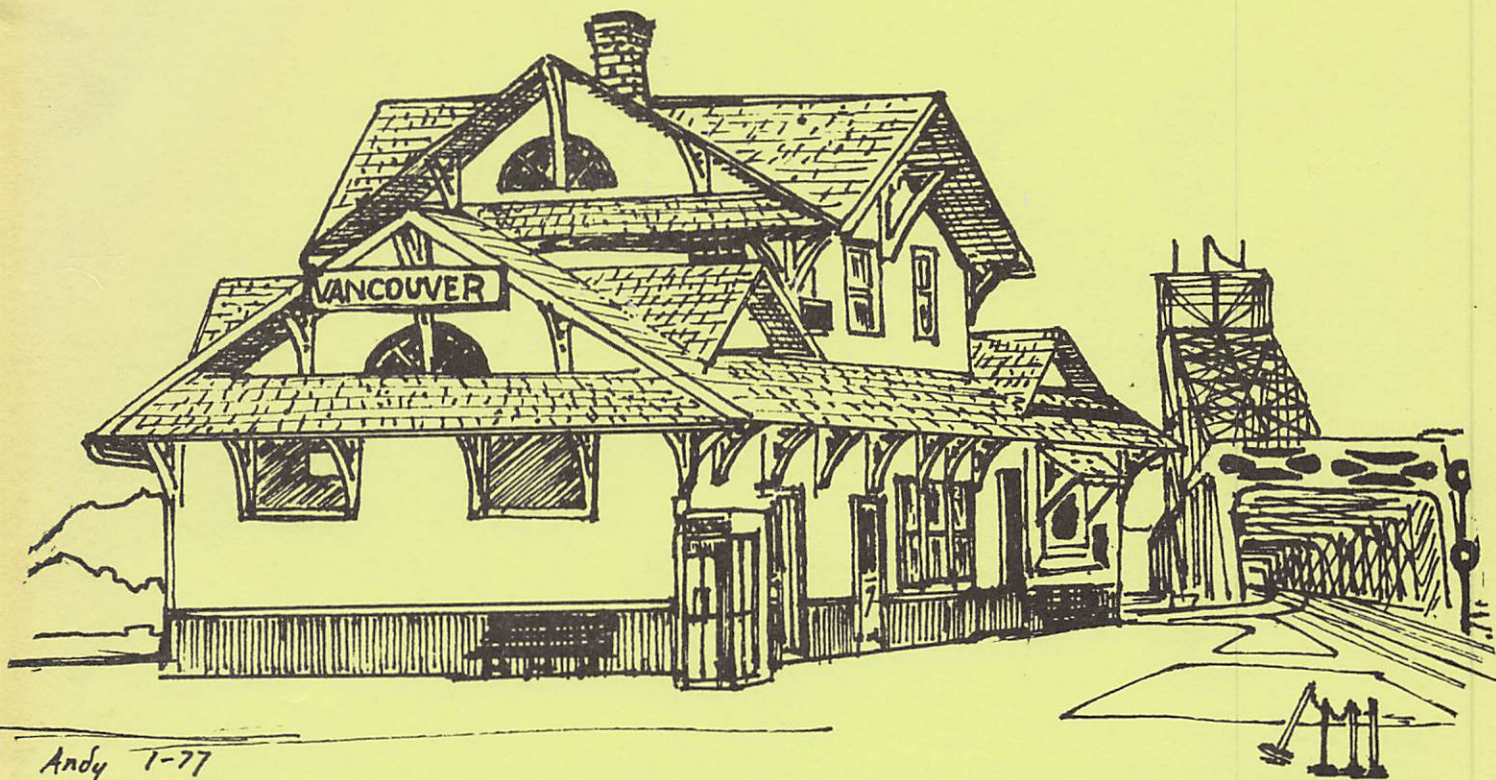

U. S. NAVAL SHIPS

Richard N. Grafton has alerted us to a very important clue in researching Naval records. He indicates, "if the genealogist is writing about the ship that their ancestor served on, the name of the ship is important, but so is the hull number of that ship. The hull number identifies that particular ship. Many U.S. Navy ships had several names as they were moved up or down in importance or changed in classification. The hull number helps in establishing the exact ship you are referring to. For example, the USS Lamson was a destroyer, but which one? There were three USS Lamsons. DD-18 was commissioned in 1910 and de-commissioned in 1919 and sold for scrap in 1919. DD-328 was commissioned in 1921 and de-commissioned in 1930 and scrapped in 1931. DD-367 was commissioned in 1936 and de-commissioned in 1946 after it was used as a target in the Bikini atomic bomb test."

Mr. Grafton indicates that he has a listing of all major US Naval ships that had hull numbers, plus the launching, commissioning and final de-commissioning and disposal dates which he will look up for members free of charge. But, of course, be certain to enclose your SASE. He also has the history of most USS Navy ships Old Ironsides to the present which he will photo-copy for \$1.00 per ship. NATURALIZATION RECORDS 1794-1880 Port of Philadelphia

This alphabetical list of persons applying for naturalization before courts in Philadelphia was issued in typescript form and only half a dozen copies were made. The list gives name, country of origin, court and date of intention and/or Oath of Allegiance. This remarkable document was compiled by the Pennsylvania Historical Survey, W.P.A., in 1940, and it contains no fewer than 110,000 names from over 30 countries. MY GRANDMA BEAN

My great grandmother was born in Maine in 1840. During the 103 years of her life she traced a westward movement path as did so many of our ancestors. After growing up in Maine she lived in Iowa, South Dakota, San Diego, and then a visit to the 1905 Lewis and Clark Exhibition in Portland led to the purchase of an acreage near Milwaukie, Oregon where she spent the last four decades of her life.

During the twenty years in South Dakota (Sioux Falls), because photography was new and she had a chance to learn the business, she and her second husband set up a "gallery" and had a thriving business. So when on a trip I had a chance to visit this town I had heard about but had never seen, we stopped in at their Pettigrew Siouxland Museum because the Chamber of Commerce brochure said they had pioneer photos. Their librarian found "Dean Photo Gallery" in an 1882 city directory with the address in the center of town where their new city library is now located. I promised to send a copy of the fourteen page biography she had dictated in her later years and some photos from our family album. The result - the January 1980 issue of Prairie People, a Siouxland Heritage Museums Quarterly Publication, was devoted to Grandma Bean's biography and our favorite album photos. So we were delighted and so were the Sioux Falls people who hadn't had this material.

I wonder if other genealogist may have family material which would be appreciated by historical museums and genealogy libraries. Perhaps it could provide a piece of history lost to the area in which it was enacted. Do you have some history to share?

SEARCHING FOR CIVIL WAR RECORDS - NORTH AND SOUTH

After searching for your civil war ancestors in national and state archives your research should shift to books that may be available. Most major libraries will have the set of books that I recommend for you to search. There are records to be found that vary from battle reports and correspondence to personnel narratives, accounts of people considered disloyal to the Union and histories of regiments. There is usually a fairly large section of military books available. Once you acquaint yourself with the local card catalog, you may find a gold mine of personnel narratives. Historical societies and state archives may also have both printed and manuscript personnel narratives. These could especially be helpful for those of us who have lost a confederate soldier.

There is a set of books in print that consists of 128 volumes of material like that just mentioned and much more. The volumes are entitled Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies in the War of the Rebellion. The United States government began, in 1864, collecting all of the available Union Armies' records, reports, orders and memorandum. After the war, the federal government collected the same Confederate records that were available. In 1881 the federal government began printing the items from the material that was considered the most important. Nineteen years later the last of the 128 volumes were published. The finished product contained more than one hundred and thirty-eight thousand pages of records.

In 1894 the government began printing the companion set entitled Official Records of the Union and Confederate Navies in the War of the Rebellion. It took twenty-eight years to complete the volumes. They contain the same type of material as just mentioned. There is an index to go with the set. Along with this set and the one mentioned previously comes an atlas. The Official Atlas of the Civil War is not located in the library in the same area as the collection. As with all atlases, you should check the card catalog and look for it with the map collection of the library.

The above two collections of books beginning with the title Official Records are known as the OR and ORN respectively. They will be referred to as that in the future. Many authors of military books with use OR and ORN in content of their books. You should be familiar with the use.

These collections give firsthand reports written by regimental colonels and brigade commanders. Some of the accounts may be a little biased because the reports may have been written by an officer in his defense. They may also be a little melodramatic but most of the time they seem to be close to

the truth and lend color to the researchers character that he is searching. They add so much to the life of our ancestors that they are certainly worth the time it takes to investigate them. The collection is more about officers than enlisted men but there are thousands of names of enlisted men included in the volumes.

There is a 1,242 page index for the OR and a 473 page index for the ORN. The OR books are divided into I, II, III, and IV. The index to the OR also contains a section of additions and corrections. If you know only your ancestors name and not the state in which he enlisted or the regiment in which he served, the index is an excellent finding tool. When you use the index you may find more than one person listed with your surname. If you are not sure you know the names of all your ancestors then it would be advisable to check all the surnames listed. When you find your surname, there will be a Roman numeral such as I. That is the series number. Following the series number there will be another number. That number is the volume number such as 19. Example: BUMPASS, THOMAS C. I, 19.

I stands for Series I and 19 stands for volume 19. You should then go to volume 19 of Series I. Look in the index of volume 19 for the name Thomas C. Bumpass. In the index of volume 19 you will find he is mentioned on page 1088 of that volume. There following his name, it says "mentioned". This means that he is mentioned in the body of a letter or account so you will have to read the whole page to find his name.

This is only one example of what can be found. Aside from the fact that I found the name I also found other valuable information or clues. The letter also told me his regiment, as well as his commanding officers name and where the regiment was located at the time the letter was written. I was able to determine that Thomas Bumpass had been wounded. There were other names in the letter which may have led me to the discovery of other relatives such as brother-in-law or father-in-law etc.

There are three volumes devoted to information about prisoners of war, which could be of great value in finding a missing ancestor. This is also a clue that he may have taken an oath of allegiance to the north in order to have been released. A search should be made to see if you can find those records.

Much of the material that you find is just a clue to other sources. You open a new avenue to the lost ancestor. There are other books that can be of help in doing military research. CIRCULATE THOSE BOOKS!

Tips For Pack-Rats

Genealogists are pack-rats. Yes, we are! How long have you been dusting those same old books on your library shelf and wishing you had money to get new ones?

Guilty as charged, what should we do about it? First you face facts. Those books are so much deadwood if they aren't being used; no good to you (for you have already extracted what you might want from them), and no good to anyone else who might find something of interest in them. Very few genealogy books are beautifully bound; so, you don't need them for decoration. You are hoarding them, aren't you? And for no good reason other than you are a pack-rat.

There are a number of possibilities for getting more mileage from your genealogy dollar and helping your society library at the same time.

Why not donate those old books to your society to be raffled off to society members. Four or five of your old books should pay for one cherished new one. The understanding could be that books bought at the raffle should be returned to the society library shelves within six months (or before the next raffle is held). This way, for a dollar or so, members can pick up books they want and the books will be returned so that you still have access to them for review.

Another thought would be to set up groups of members who are researching in the same areas; pool your money to buy one good book, then donate the book to the library, after you have all used it. Again, the book is available to you, but at the same time is being used by many.

If you set aside a small fund of \$2.00 a month to purchase books for your own library, it would take a year to afford the book you want. The same \$2.00 fund, combined with others, could bring you a book each month. No quarreling about who owns the book, for it is available to you all in the society library. Let the society keep them dusted for you.

Still another plan would be to set up a paid-lending library within your society for new books, or those most in demand. Charge 25¢ a week for books which members take home for study....okay, with inflation, charge 50¢ a week...the society could soon buy quite a number of new books with the lending library fund. Today's people simply don't have leisure to sit for hours in a library. Why not allow books to go home? Limit the time....one week is plenty to examine a book for genealogical information, and it keeps the books available to others.

A final suggestion - any book you donate should have your name on the fly-leaf. Also, with your name, write lightly the surname you found in that book that is YOURS. Others who use the book can then contact you if they are working on the same surname. They may have fresh information on your lineage. Genealogy works sometimes in mysterious ways....that is the fascination! Give it a chance.

Whatever plan you might choose, and there are many variations of the above, CIRCULATE THOSE BOOKS! Get new ones and keep research alive in your organization.

I REMEMBER . . .

The early days of Clark County were vivid and interesting. I am one of the present inhabitants who was born here and has lived here most of my life. I was born into a family with two older brothers. Later I was blessed with a sister, a brother and another sister. At that time, my mother was washing diapers with a wash board, home-made soap and water that was heated on a wood stove.

One of my earliest experiences that I can recall was riding with my mother in a Model T. Ford. We were coming up the Hyatt Hill across the Lewis River north of Day Break Farm. The Model T went about half-way and refused to budge another inch. I remember that my mother backed down the hill, turned the Model T around and backed up the hill using the middle pedal on the car which was the reverse. I was extremely frightened but have since learned that that was a common experience at that time, because there was no vacuum system on the earlier vehicles and the gas would not reach the carburetor without the power of gravity. Mother said that I couldn't have been more than three years old at that time. I recall another time when my Dad came to the rescue and pulled the Model T with the team of horses when we were stuck somewhere.

The first eventful thing in my life that I recall vividly was my first day of school. I went with my two older brothers and we carried a lunch box that was an old tobacco container. I remember how much fun it was to play with the other students and I was also excited about learning to read. I learned my A.B.C's in short order. Our school used the Elson Reader series with emphasis on phonics. After my first year of school, Charter Oak consolidated with Battle Ground School District, so I started my second grade there and continued through Junior High School and Senior High. I graduated in 1941 with a total of 96 students in my graduating class.

We had a small Sunday School at the school building at Charter Oak. This work was pioneered by the American Sunday School Union. It was here at the age of 7 that I met my husband who was then 9 years of age. Of course, I did not know at that time that I would be spending many wonderful years with him as his wife.

My recollections of childhood days were happy and busy. It was very difficult for my parents to raise a large family during the depression years. We children usually went barefooted in the summer to save our shoes for school during the winter months. Buying new shoes for a family of six with ever-increasing foot size was no small item in spite of the Montgomery Ward catalog.

Mother canned hundreds of jars of fruit and vegetables. When we butchered a cow, calf or pig, we ate what we could fresh, salted part of it and Mother would can the rest of it, because we had no means of refrigeration. We had a smoke house and I remember the delicious hams, smoked salmon and smelt. We never wasted anything. Sometimes in the spring when the canned goods were devoured and the new garden had not started to produce, we would have potatoes and milk. We also kept 6 or 7 dairy cows and shipped milk to the Battle Ground Cheese Factory. During those lean

this barely took care of the grocery staples such as sugar, flour, coffee and tea. Breakfasts usually consisted of hot mush - oatmeal, cornmeal, graham, and farina. Mother always believed in a hearty breakfast.

The day electricity came to our home was one of fascination. One of the neighbors had wired the house for us and there was a cord hanging down in the center of the room with a socket and a pull chain. When the light bulb was inserted, how exciting it was to see the light appear with just a pull of the chain. I was so enthralled I kept trying it out untill mother scolded and said that I'd wear it out.

I also remember the day that we got our first radio. Once again, I was so fascinated to hear a voice coming out of a box that I'd sit in front of it and turn the volume up and down.

On winter evenings, Dad would get the dish pan full of apples from the basement and peel and core them and give us each a section as we listened to the radio. His favorite program was "The Lone Ranger". Mother and I liked "Fibber McGee and Molly" but the boys liked "Inner Sanctum" and "Mr. District Attorney". Sometimes we would crack filberts or eat popped corn. When we butchered a pig, we would have a big doughnut feed after rendering the lard. Mother used to play the piano and sometimes we'd sing or she would read to us from "Dr. Doolittle".

Mother sewed all of our clothes. We got to choose our fabric from the Sears Roebuck catalog, and I always chose material that leaned toward red shades while my sister usually chose blue.

Summer found us hoeing corn. We would spend the mornings hoeing the endless rows of field corn and in the afternoon were rewarded by getting to go swimming in the Lewis River. We'd take the German Shepherd along and hike about 3/4 of a mile to the swimming hole. We all learned to swim at an early age.

During hay season, everyone had to help as we were always waging a bet with the weather. Wet hay could cause spontaneous combustion, so once it was cut, it was a race to get it put into the barn. I'd usually drive the team of mules and help spread the hay on the haywagon while my brothers and my Dad pitched the shocks up to the wagon. When we got to the barn, I'd unhitch the team and go behind the barn where we would hook up the fork lift rope and pulley. Dad would hook the hay fork into the load, call "Go ahead". I'd start the mules and go until I heard my brothers call "trip". My Dad would jerk on the rope, the fork would drop the hay in the mond. While my brothers spread the hay around, I would unhook the rope, turn the team around and go back to the start.

My climbing experience proved invaluable at one time when our house caught on fire. The chimney burned out ever so often and it took only one spark to ignite a dry roof. The fire had gotten a good start when we heard the roar and smelled the smoke. The telephone signal for help then was 1 big long and 10 short rings which we made by turning the crank on the wall phone. Being on a party line of about 25 people had some advantages. By the time the neighbors started pouring in, we had the fire out. My Mom formed a bucket brigade and passed the water to my brothers and me on the roof. My Dad went to the attic and threw water underneath the roof. After it was all over, we kids thought that it was great excitement. However, when my Grandmother's house burned to the ground a few years later, fires lost their thrill and excitement. I gained a healthy respect.

Mother loved to take walks around our pasture and woods. One of my happy memories of childhood was when we children went on these walks with her. I received a rich heritage of botanical knowledge for Mother taught us the names of many wild flowers, trees, bushes and weeds. I remember looking for Bluebells, Sleepy

Heads, Anemones, Adder Tongues, Johnny -jump-ups, Trilliums, Wild Currants. Later we saw Wild Iris, Columbine, Scotch Broom, Dogwood, Skunk Cabbage and Lupine. We'd also look for lichens and remember some white Indian Pipes that came out of the ground overnight like a mushroom. We would catch tadpoles in our creek and take them home to watch them mature into frogs. In the summers, we would pick Dewberries, Wild Black Caps, Salmon Berries, Himalaya and Evergreen Blackberries, Hazel nuts and huckleberries. I loved to pick berries and my folks used to say I could out-pick the rest of the family. Of course, my brothers spent most of their time hunting for a better patch.

Another happy memory of childhood was getting to sleep on the front porch in the summer. My two brothers and my sister and I had to take turns. I can still smell that fresh country air mingled with the fragrant odor of Honeysuckle that grew on the east side of the house. I always took my favorite cat to bed with us and it was so warm and cozy under the homemade wool quilts that my mother and grandmother made. Since we slept on the north side of the house, we always looked for the big dipper and the north star before we went to sleep. I also remember the empty space in the northern sky where there are no stars. On certain summer nights, we were thrilled by the dancing rays of the aurora borealis depending upon the atmospheric conditions. In the mornings, I can still hear the birds twittering, the bees gathering nectar from the Honeysuckle and the distant sound of cowbells in the pasture. Usually our big dog was curled up at the foot of the bed. He wasn't to be outdone by the cat.

In the winter when we would get snow, we always took our homemade sled and would slide down the numerous hills around our place. Occasionally, we would have a blizzard and the east wind would pile the snow along the fence posts.

Whenever Dad would butcher an animal, we children became the audience to the theatrical performance. I could never stand to see the animal killed, but after it was hanging from the pulley rope in the barn, we would climb on the hay rack and watch while my Dad made the incision which allowed the entrails to fall in the wash tub. I got to carry the heart and liver to the house for Mom to wash for supper.

We had our share of picking and cleaning chickens. Mother taught me how to cut them up at the joints so there would be no rough bones.

When the threshers came to thresh the oats or the wheat, the neighbors would ban together and pool their resources. Since there were lots of men to feed, the ladies would plan a big dinner which usually included fried chicken, mashed potatoes and gravy, vegetables, salad, pies and cakes, homemade bread and sometimes homemade ice cream. I remember Lemonade and cold buttermilk. The men got to eat first and the women and children had what was left. It was fun to watch this huge, noisy machine operating with the grain going into the sacks and the chaff blowing out into a huge stack of straw.

In the fall, we would pick up prunes for my grandparents who had a prune dryer. The going wage for picking prunes at that time was a nickel for an apple box full. We also picked up Filberts for 1¢ a pound. In the early summer, we picked strawberries and raspberries.

When my younger sister was still a baby, Mother and my younger brother both contracted scarlet fever. The County Health Officer came out and tacked a sign on the door stating that we were quarantined. This meant that we had a communicable disease and no one could leave or enter the house. My Dad had to go to work so the rest of us moved out to the garage and did our cooking and sleeping there. Fortunately, the weather was not too cold. None of the rest of the family got sick.

I well remember my first permanent wave. I was blessed with extremely straight hair which was also fine in texture and thin. When we heard of a beauty operator coming to Battle Ground for a temporary stay, Mother made an appointment for me. I was overjoyed at the prospect, but the actual experience did not prove that joyful. After shampooing and cutting the hair, it was divided into sections and put through a small 1 x 3 pad with a slit for the hair. Then the hair was very tightly wound around a roller and locked. Then a tool resembling a screw driver was employed to tighten the roller a little more. It seemed that the more scalp that could be raised, the better the curl. After a solution was applied, an appliance was attached with several clamps extending with cords. These clamps were placed on each rolled curl and the heat was turned on. When I would complain of a spot burning, the operator would take a small hand blower and blow a little cold air on the spot. She would also remind me that one would have to suffer to be beautiful. The end result was a head full of kinky curls intermingled with several small blisters from the burns.

The growing up process has its ups and downs. Although I am now grown and have raised a family of my own, my memories of childhood are very special. My husband and I have traveled in many parts of the world including all of our United States, but I am sure we can both say that there is no place like the Pacific Northwest and especially our own Clark County. My parents are both gone, but I am so thankful that they cared about me and made sacrifices during those depression years so that I could have a better life. I hope that I have inspired and instilled some of that early training in my children so that they might pass it on to the future generations.

This story of Dorothy Person's childhood and later youthful memories relates the kind of autobiography every genealogist should be compiling for their future generations. Her great great grandchildren are going to vividly picture their great great grandmother Dorothy. They will know that she loved nature and its beauty, and her enjoyment in helping her parents with the farm tasks, even at haying time. They will know her hair was not naturally curly. And too, they will learn that their great great grandfather met her at a Sunday School class.

BOOK REVIEWS

Camp, John F. and N. Grier Parke II. The Ancestry and Descendants of Frederick Tracy Camp and His Wife, Marion Fee. Vancouver, WA: John F. Camp, Jr., 1961. Presented by Margaret Camp Behm in memory of John F. Camp, Jr. Copies may be obtained from Mrs. Richard Behm at 503 W. 35th Street, Vancouver, WA 98660 for \$25.00.

This 170-page book gives genealogies of 42 families plus many other (indexed) names. Frederick Tracy Camp, born in Pennsylvania in 1850 married Marion Fee in that state, moved to Washington state where they farmed his uncle's homestead near Centralia. Ancestry is traced back to John Camp of Essex, England. The early U.S. heritage of these lines stems from Conn., Mass. and New York. Among over 400 allied kinships are these surnames: Baldwin, Bigelow, Bond, Brooks, Canfield, Clark, Collier, Flagg, Gold, Hyde, Jackson, Lacy, Kellogg, Lord, Pratt, Sanford, Skinner, Warner, Wheeler, Woolson.

Landry, L. Paul and Eugene J. Connerton. Genealogy of the Juneau Family, 1600-1965. 1971. Presented to CCGS by the authors. Can be obtained from Mr. Eugene Connerton, 4478 N. 26th Street, Milwaukie, WI 53209.

To be useful to both English and French speaking descendants, the book is written twice in alternate pages of French and English. The first "Jouineaus" to arrive in Canada came from La Rochelle, France. The book delves into much background, then follows in detail through ten generations, many of whom live in Quebec, Wisconsin, and Louisiana. One famous Juneau, sixth generation, was Salomon, the founder of Milwaukie, WI. Another, Joseph, seventh generation, founded Juneau, Alaska. A large ten generation genealogical chart accompanies the book. In 1960 there was a rally of 600 Juneaus in the original parish of Champlain. Related surnames: Gadbury, Girard, Gorgues, Galarneau, Rougeau, Latulippe, Soliquin, Barry, Gouguet, Amireault, Plante, Gaspard, Gauthier, Ducote, Carmouch, Lemoine, Roy, Husting, Connerton, Jamieson, many others.

The Erie Canal, completed in 1825, became one of the routes west. In 1817 seventeen hundred immigrants from Ireland entered the Port of New York. Some of them helped build the canal. This book tells of planning, building, and use of the canal.

Angell, George M. Genealogy of Some Descendants of William Angell, Great Grandson of Thomas Angell, Immigrant Ancestor. 1961. Presented by Gerry Gilman.

This is a supplement to the 1872 Avery Angell Genealogy adding information not then available about William Angell's branch of the family. The author incorporated diary and letter quotes so it is interesting reading.

Aspinwall Notarial Records, 1644-1651. Early History of Boston. Municipal Printing Office of Boston. 1903. Presented by Mildred Finley.

A resume of Aspinwall's life is followed by his records which report legal actions between people and/or merchants so dates and many names are here and indexed.

Bakeless, John. Journals of Lewis and Clark. New York: Mentor Books, 1964. Presented by Mildred Finley.

An introduction gives background of the expedition. Some grammar and spelling of the original journals is here corrected for easier reading.

Barker Genealogy. Compiled by James Parshall. 1897. Presented by Mildred Finley.

This lists chiefly the line of Ephraim Barker who married Hannah Cove in 1752 in Connecticut.

Barto, Martha Ford. Passamaquoddy. Genealogies of West Isles Families. 1975. Available from the author at Clam Cove Head, Fairhaven, Deer Island, New Brunswick, CAN. EGG IPO. Presented by Clifton and Viola Foreman.

The first third of the book is history of exploration of these eastern shores of Canada and eventual entry of Loyalists after Nova Scotia advertised for settlers in 1758. The bulk of the book details genealogies of 84 families (listed in the p. 120 index).

Belknap, Henry Myckoff. The Grafton Family of Salem. Salem, MA: Essex Institute, 1928. Presented by Richard Grafton.

Joseph Grafton, a mariner and merchant married Harry Moore. This account tells of their lives and descendants with references to the Grafton family in England back to 1546. Indexed.

Blackman, Leah. History of Little Egg Harbor Township, Burlington County, NJ. Tackerton, NJ: Great John Mathis Foundation, 1963. Presented by Maxine Inman.

Written in 1880, the marriages are listed from 1715 to 1859 from Friends meeting notes before the township was established in 1741. Within these 400 pages are genealogies of the first families of the New Jersey coast, as well as the history of the region.

Boone, Marijane. Newkirk and Kay County, Oklahoma, Diamond Jubilee. 1893-1968. Presented by Merle Degemark.

Filled with pictures, this community project depicts much history and shows many people and buildings.

Central Oregon Beginnings. Special Supplement to the Bulletin, Vol. No. 90. Bend: March, 1979. Presented by June Andrews.

Superimposed on a beautiful Oregon mountain cover scene are pioneer Rube Booton and a handsome Indian brave. Articles are on geology, Indians, settlers, city slickers, and empire builders. Many photos.

Chester County Pennsylvania Area Key. Compiled by Florence Clint. 1976. Presented by Colleen Bennett.

A guide to the genealogical records of this county including maps, histories, charts, lists of townships, cemeteries. Other Area Keys are available from P.O. Box 333, Kiowa, CO 80117.

Clark County History. Fort Vancouver Historical Society, Vancouver, WA. Annual Volumes 1971-1977. Presented by Mildred Finley.

Besides local history, genealogists will find these surnames: Marshall, Sohns, Douglas, Grant, Ford, Hintler, Nelson, Anderson, Thomas, Pitchford, Frasier, Gibbons, Shepherd, VanVleet, Duback, Rotchy, Niederhausern, Ough, Russell, Biddle, Butler, Coxe, Loring, Cresap, Goethals, Jacob, Carpenter. The 1971 issue contains an 1883 map with some Clark County farms indicated.

Colorado Area Key. Compiled by Florence Clint. Denver: Eden Press, 1968. This is a guide to genealogical records in the state of Colorado. It includes maps, histories, charts, and other helpful material.

DAR Patriot Index. Washington. 1966.

Contains names of Revolutionary patriots whose service between 1774 and 1783 and identity have been established by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

First Supplement to the DAR Patriot Index. Washington, 1969.

Contains names of 1200 patriot ancestors newly identified, additions and corrections to the index, and cross index to the various spellings of the 1966 index.

Third Supplement to the DAR Patriot Index. Washington, 1976.

Contains additional names and corrections to the index and previous supplements.

Davolt-Hughes Family Records. July 1979. Presented to CCGS by Bernice Hughes.

Beginning with Adam Davolt, born 1785, and his wife, Frances (Whisenand) this gives many descendants' names, dates and places. Related surnames: Martin, Hughes, MacRae, Campos, Thompson, Kennison, Spears.

Deubler, Mellie Hazan. Pioneer Life in Oklahoma. 1949 and 1968. Presented by Merle Degermark.

This story about pioneer life starts in 1892 with a covered wagon trip from Anthony, Kansas to a homestead near Seiling, Oklahoma. In addition to good descriptions of their difficulties, a page is devoted to each of these families: Shepherd, Shuck, Russel, Knott.

The Emerald Isle Album, Counties of Wicklow and Wexford. Presented by Colleen Bennett.

Fifty-seven black and white photographs by William Lawrence show scenery, castles, important buildings.

Foreman, The Name and Family of. Washington, D.C.: Media Research Bureau. Presented by Clifton H. Foreman.

The name goes back to about 1400 in England and then to Watertown, Mass. in 1630. Eleven pages and bibliography.

Gold Rush Days, Vol. II. Deaths copied from early newspapers of Stockton, CA, 1856-1862. Compiled from early newspapers of Stockton, by San Joaquin Genealogical Society 1979 and donated for CCGS exchange.

Greenwood, Val D. The Researcher's Guide to American Genealogy. Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., 1978.

The author is an instructor of genealogy on the college level and compiled this as a comprehensive text on American records. It's an excellent reference, full of advice and sources.

Guthrie, A.B. The Way West. Boston: Houghton Mifflin and Bantam, 1949. Presented by Vera Sessoms.

This novel starts in Missouri and ends as they sight Fort Vancouver.

History of the Arkansas Valley, Colorado. Chicago: O.L. Baskin and Co., 1881. Reproduction by Unigraphic, 1976.

This 900 page book gives history of the state and then these counties: Lake, El Paso, Chaffee, Fremont, Custer, Pueblo, Bent, plus a chapter on railroads. Each county has a biographical section as well as names within the narrative. About 140 men in leadership have full page portraits. There are also scenic views and pictures of mines and buildings. Indexed.

Illinois Libraries, Feb. 1979. Newspapers in the Illinois State Historical Library. Springfield, IL. Presented by Maxine Inman.

This issue of their monthly magazine lists Illinois microfilmed newspapers which are available on interlibrary loan.

Ireland. Tracing Your Ancestors. From Eastern Washington Genealogical Society Bulletin, Vol. XVI II, III, IV. 1979.

History and sources here should make this useful to Irish searchers.

Landis, John T. Mayflower Descendants and Their Marriages. Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., 1977. Presented by Clifton Foreman.

This gives a history of the Pilgrim church and follows the descendants for two generations of 22 families of the 104 passengers.

Latter-Day Saint Settlement of the West. Ensign Magazine, Feb. 1980. Presented by Geraldine Gilman.

The Latter-Day Saints founded almost 500 towns in the west between 1847 and 1900. This issue has maps, stories, and pictures.

Linder, Bill R. How to Trace Your Family History, A Basic Guide to Genealogy. New York: Everest House, 1978. Presented by Maxine Inman.

Mr. Linder is director of Central Reference Division, National Archives and has given genealogists an excellent book for the beginner and for the experienced genealogist as well. It is direct, humorous and well written. It tells facts, methods and reasonings for the research.

Martin Genealogist, The. June, 1976. The Genealogy Bug. August, 1976. These are single copies of a newspaper at the time of a name change. North English, Iowa 52316. They had specialized in the Martin surname but were expanding.

Morrison, Dorothy Nafus. The Eagle and the Fort. The Story of John McLoughlin. New York: Atheneum, 1979. Presented by Shirley B. Short and Anne Gear.

This is authentic northwest history with documentation. Easy reading tells early background of Fort Vancouver, Oregon City, French Prairie.

Myers, E. L. Foster-Pettygrove Store Lists, Barlow Toll Road 1846-1919. History of Eagle Creek. Portland, OR: Genealogical Forum, 1972. Presented by Mildred Finley.

The store lists are names of the first Americans to settle in Oregon. The Barlow story includes records of a toll keeper for 1848, listing wagon owners. 5770 emigrants came this way by wagon train between 1846 and 1849. In the Eagle Creek chapter are some name lists and genealogy details of surnames Foster and Wilbern.

Nichols, Joann H. Some Vermont Ancestors. Brattleboro, VT. Genealogy Society of Vermont, 1976. Presented by Clifton M. Foreman.

A bicentennial project, personal incidents in the late 1700's are told within sixty-one biographies.

Noyes, Sybil, and C.T. Libby and W.G. Davis. Genealogical Dictionary of Maine and New Hampshire. Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., 1979.

Originally published in 1928, this lists alphabetically Maine and New Hampshire families before 1699. Through each paragraph children are distinguished by bold face type. Numbers refer to lists on which a name has been found.

Ohio, Union County, 1830 Census. Presented by Portland Forum.

This is a list of about 550 names with page numbers.

Parkins, Robert E. Guide to Tracing Your Family Tree in Missouri. St. Louis: Genealogical R. and P. 1979.

Inventories of county records are followed by explanations about major research centers as well as names and addresses of reliable genealogists and record searchers. There are maps of county outlines and articles about history.

Pennsylvania, Centre County Area Key. Compiled by Florence Clint. Denver, CO: Area Keys. 1976. Presented by Colleen Bennett.

This is a guide to the genealogical records of Centre County including maps, histories, charts, and other helpful material.

Pioneer Families of the Oregon Territory. 1850. Oregon State Archives, 1961. Presented by Portland Forum.

This index contains over 7,000 names of heads of families in the Oregon Territory which populated area then consisted of western Washington and Oregon. Photographic prints of entries in the original schedules might include other recorded information and can be obtained from the Oregon State Archives.

Power, John Carroll. History of the Early Settlers of Sangamon County, Illinois. Springfield, IL: Phillips Brothers, 1970. Presented by Mildred Finley.

An index has been added to the original book, first printed in 1876. The story of the beginning of the county in 1821 is followed by nearly 800 pages of paragraphs about families with names, dates, and statements about career and various facts. A reproduced original hard cover in red, gold, and black makes this an elegant book.

Prairie People, Vol. II, Issue 4. "Photographer Sarah Bean," by Keith Lekness. Sioux Falls, SD: Siouxsland Heritage Museums. 1980. Presented by Frances Harris.

This issue of their quarterly tells of Sarah Bean coming from Maine to Dakota and a photograph gallery business 1880-1900.

Preece, Floren S. and Phyllis P. The Sure Guide to Genealogical Research. Mendon, Utah: Genealogical Club of America, 1969. Presented by Kitty Oman.

This has a clear chapter on specifics of their notekeeping system.

Raincoast Chronicles. Editor, Howard White. B.C. Coast Historical Society. Box 119, Madeira Park, B.C.

Generously illustrated with drawings and photographs, diverse articles on lighthouses, tugboats, whalers, ancient oriental ties, Tsimoyan myths, contain some names and an article about Paul Kane.

Records Submission Manual. How to Submit Names for Temple Ordinances. Published by the Genealogical Society of the Church of Latter-Day Saints. 1973. Presented by Pat Stephens.

This sixty page booklet details instructions for submission of applications for Temple baptisms and sealings.

Savage, James. Genealogical Dictionary of the First Settlers of New England Showing Three Generations of Those Who came Before 1692. Four volumes. Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., 1977.

Originally published in 1860, the author says nineteen-twentieths of the

New England colonists were descendants of those found there in 1692. Families are alphabetized through the four volumes. Refer to the abbreviation list at the start of volume I. He intends to include all residents, not just those who were prominent. He includes occupations and comments as well as names and dates.

Skamania County, Washington, Marriages. Compiled by Daphne Ramsey, P.O. Box 273, Stevenson, WA 98648. Index to Records 1854-1931, including an abstract of marriage register from 1893 to 1920.

The abstract section of this compilation usually includes names, ages, residence, birthplace, occupation, names of parents.

Skamania County, Washington, Births, 1893-1926. Compiled by Daphne Ramsey.

Typed from the original hand-written register of births in the court house in Stevenson, Washington. Included are parents' names, ages, birthplaces, and occupation.

Skamania County, Washington, Cemeteries. Compiled by Daphne M. Ramsey. This includes burials in 15 large cemeteries and 22 smaller and some private burial areas.

Skamania County, Washington. Compiled by Daphne M. Ramsey. 1860, 1870, and 1880 Census. 1885-1887 Territorial Census. This also includes index of deeds and miscellaneous records from 1856 to 1892.

Texas Special Issue, National Genealogical Inquirer. Vol. III, No. 4. West Allis, WI: Janlen Enterprises, 1979. Presented to CCGS by Pat Stephens.

This contains some Texas history as well as lists and maps of counties and much other information useful to genealogists.

The Times Weekly Edition. London. Vol. XVIII, No. 888 to No. 939. January 5, 1894 through December. Presented by Jenny Wood on behalf of the LDS Church.

There are 1000 newspaper pages for the year 1894, with a table of contents each week and an index at the end of the year. Here are some quotes:

"Mr. Gladstone on Friday completed his 84th year. The Prime Minister received the cordial congratulations of members of his Cabinet when they assembled at Downing Street for a Cabinet Council."

"There were 58 cases of cholera and 29 deaths in Galicia."

"The dangers of oil lamps."

Sept. 7, 1894: "All the old fogies in Britain howled in chorus when Sir Bowland Hill proposed to introduce cheap postage. 'Don't even think of it,' they cried. 'You will have everybody writing letters on all sorts of subjects. Mercy only knows what seeds of heresy and sedition may be scattered over the country. Besides the clerks will be worked to death, and the post offices burst with the weight of the mails. (Actually this was the introductory paragraph to an ad for Mother Seigel's Curative Syrup.)"

Where to Write for Divorce Records: Where to Write for Birth and Death Records: Where to Write for Marriage Records. Presented by Pat Stephens.

These three booklets, published by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, concern records in the U.S. and Outlying Areas.
