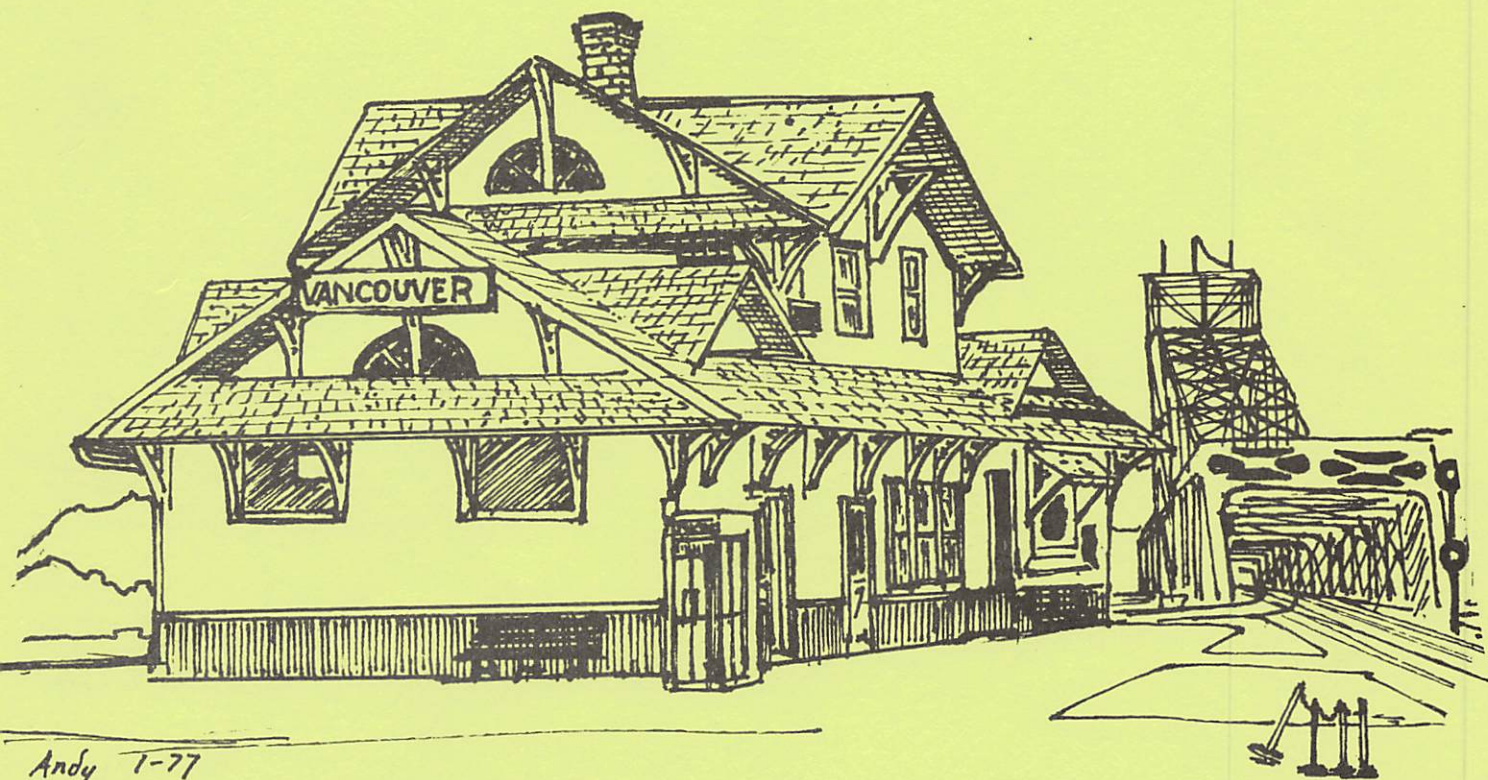
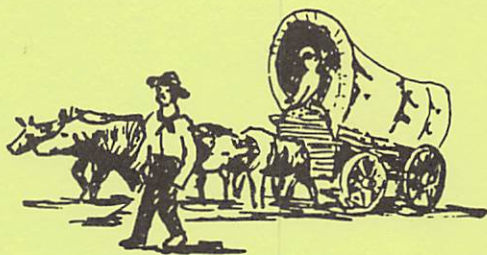

MENNONITE HISTORICAL LIBRARY

This Library, located at Goshen College, Goshen, IN. 46526, has a collection of nearly 1,000 published genealogies of Mennonite families. They also have county histories in which there are life sketches of individual Mennonites as well as indexes of cemeteries where Mennonites are buried. Other material of interest to genealogists include an index of obituaries which appeared from 1860 to 1970 in the Herald of Truth and Gospel Herald, official organs of the Mennonite Church; these publications also have announcements of marriages and birth records since 1940. Mail to the Library is not encouraged as their staff is very limited. However, researchers are welcome to use this material if they are visiting the Library.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES - INTERLIBRARY LOANS

Effective October 1, 1980, all microfilm will be loaned from a central location, Fort Worth, Texas. This includes census and any microfilm that has been sent on interlibrary loan. Each Regional center is sending the microfilm to the Fort Worth Central Regional Center. There will be a set of film at the Regional Center that will be for "reference only". You will no longer have to worry whether the film you desire will be loaned out and not available to you.

MIGRATION TO OREGON: TWO RECENT STUDIES

The related fields of genealogy and history interact in many ways. One of these is "genealogical history," which may be described as those aspects of history which assist the genealogist in his pursuit of new genealogical connections. Under this heading may come knowledge of church history, the history of the family, or, more specifically, the history of a particular document or class of documents. One of the most valuable subdivisions of genealogical history is the study of migrations. The value of a knowledge of migration patterns does not need to be emphasized, but some recent studies in migration to Oregon demonstrate new ways in which migrations are being investigated, and also provide an opportunity to comment on ways in which genealogists may be of assistance to those social scientists who are studying migrations.

In 1978 was published William A. Bowen's The Willamette Valley: Migration and Settlement on the Oregon Frontier (University of Washington Press, Seattle and London.) Bowen is a professor of geography, which explains his penchant for cartographical demonstration of historical subjects. His study is limited to the Willamette Valley, the region south of the Columbia River, between the Cascades and the Coast Range, and in time to the 1840s. His most important source of information is the 1850 Federal Census, and after that the records of the Donation Lands. All this is supplemented by county histories and various other secondary sources, as well as the files of various historical and genealogical societies.

Of particular interest to genealogists are his discussions of the motivation of migration, and the patterns of migration and settlement. He notes that migration is frequently undertaken for economic reasons, either in search of free lands, or in order to escape mounting debts. But he places special emphasis on migration for reasons of health. The unhealthy topography of much midwestern land is pointed out, and many pioneer accounts of movement to escape malarial environments are quoted. Bowen's explication of the reasons for migration in general are excellent, and his emphasis on the importance of health are an important corrective.

Bowen then hits his stride in the middle portion of the book, when he analyzes the 1850 census and derives from it a number of maps showing point of origin of the migrants, patterns of settlement, and related kinship networks. Not surprisingly, the largest contribution to the 1850 population of Oregon came from Missouri, with Kentucky and Illinois next in line. In general, the bulk of the migrants seem to have been those who had earlier moved from Virginia and North Carolina, through Kentucky and Tennessee, on to southern Ohio, Indiana and Illinois, and then to Iowa and Missouri. The contribution from the Northeast (New England, New York and Pennsylvania) is much less than that from the states further south; and the contribution from the Deep South is almost non-existent.

He is a contributing Editor of the American Genealogist and has had articles published in the Genealogist The Genealogical Journal and others. Mr. Anderson has been guest lecturer at genealogical symposiums.

In his discussion of patterns of settlement and kinship networks, a number of extremely important points arise. First, many later migrants found their most important source of information about the West to be letters from friends and relatives who had already gone West. Thus, the population of Oregon is not a random sample of the East, but consists of a number of clusters of related families (see map 27 on page 54). Second, the earlier migrants prospered by providing supplies to later immigrants, a circumstance that maintained a healthy agricultural economy through the period of heavy migration. This is reminiscent of the situation in the Great Migration to New England in the 1630s: in that case the local economy boomed until migration ceased about 1640 with the coming of the English Civil War, after which the economy slumped badly. This phenomenon may well be a nearly universal feature of frontier economies, and is a worthy subject for study.

In discussing the importance of kinship networks, Bowen bemoans the fragmentary nature of the available genealogical publications for these early settlers of Oregon, and gives this as the reason for the tentative nature of many of his conclusions in this area. Here is a field where the genealogist may be able to help the historian and other academics. If a genealogical society or other group of individuals were to consult with historians and develop a planned program of genealogical investigations, designed to generate new genealogical studies of all the settlers of a given region during a defined period of time, then the historian or demographer would have a sounder base of data upon which to draw his conclusions. But as long as historians are unwilling to undertake new genealogical work themselves, and depend on the random nature of work already done, their conclusions are bound to be less than adequate.

A study of migration to Oregon of narrower scope has been carried out by Irene W.D. Hecht. In Kinship and Migration: The Making of an Oregon Isolate Community (Journal of Interdisciplinary History, 8 (1977): 45-67), she investigates a group of people in the Willamette Valley who have in recent years exhibited some unusual medical difficulties. Attempts to demonstrate the usual sorts of transmission of hereditary diseases failed, and so a more subtle approach was tried. By studying church and census records for the group in Oregon, along with printed material on early generations, she came to the conclusion that the medical problems arose in this small group of people because of repeated intermarriage over a number of generations of a small band of immigrants first from Holland in the nineteenth century to Wisconsin, and then on to Oregon some decades later.

Like Bowen's study of the earliest years in the Willamette Valley as a whole, Hecht's study only begins to utilize fully the available records, and because of this falls short of attaining a fully satisfying description of the group in question. In studying the band of Dutchmen in Wisconsin, she and her assistants used only the census records for Wisconsin, and were therefore unable to trace accurately the generations of this group between the departure from Europe and the arrival in the Pacific Northwest. And even in Oregon, the researchers used only the census and church records. Hecht notes the inability to establish some suspected genealogical connections in Oregon, or to bridge the chasm in Wisconsin. Her aims might have been more fully attained had she used such standard sources as wills and deeds.

Hecht, like Bowen and so many historians and demographers who have come to use the tools and materials of the genealogist, has not yet learned the full range of sources and techniques available; and until historians learn this lesson, they will continue to be stymied in answering some questions that are in fact answerable. We as genealogists have a double obligation - first, to learn what work these social scientists are currently involved in, for the results of this work, even with the inadequacies described above, will often be of value to us in our genealogical researches; and second, to offer assistance to the social scientist, to display to them the full range of sources upon which they may draw, and the full array of methodological tools which may be employed to exploit fully these sources.

TOTAL LOSS OF THE SAN FRANCISCO
LOSS OF OVER 300 LIVES

NEW YORK DAILY TIMES

January 14, 1854

The following depicts the fate of the steamship SAN FRANCISCO in 1854. The printed is a portion of accounts and the listing of names as appeared in the New York Daily Times. The full account story may be available thru Marilyn Dahlquist who submitted the tragic article.

The British ship THREE BELLS, of Glasgow, Capt. Creighton, from Glasgow to this port, arrived yesterday at 4½ p.m., with merchandise and passengers, after a passage of 45 days. The brought over 150 passengers from the steamship SAN FRANCISCO and confirmed the worst fears that had been entertained of the fate of that vessel.

The SAN FRANCISCO, Commodore Watkins, left this port on the 21st of December, bound to San Francisco, via the Straits of Magellan, touching at Rio Janeiro, Valparaiso, and Acapulco. On board, were Companies A.B.D.G.H.I.K. and L. of the Third Regiment of United States Artillery, amounting, with the non-commissioned staff and band of the regiment, to over 500 men.

Mr. Geo. Aspinwall, Capt. J.W.T. Gardiner, (of the First Dragoons on his way to join his Regiment in California), James L. Graham Jr., and Lieut. F. K., Murray, U.S. Navy, en route for the Squadron at Rio were also on board. There were also some passengers whose names we have not learned.

The above with 16 seamen, and the cabin and steerage waiters, made up a total of over 700 souls who sailed in the San Francisco from this port. She was entirely a new ship, constructed with a view to her occasional employment in the transportation of troops. She had three month's provisions for the troops.

.....In this way the excitement respecting the illfated ship was kept up, when yesterday afternoon the arrival of the THREE BELLS, of Glasgow with a portion of the troops, officers, passengers and seamen, at this port terminated the suspense. By the following account, by an officer of the SAN FRANCISCO, we are put in possession of the whole history of her voyage and mishaps, from the time of her sailing till she was scuttled and abandoned. When last seen, she was on her beam ends, and would go down in less than an hour. Nothing, we may add was saved from the wreck

We conversed last night with Mr. Edward Oster, of Buffalo, one of the quarter-masters of the ship. He assures us that the accounts given by the mate and other officers are correct. According to the best means he had of judging, about three hundred persons were lost, over one hundred being washed away by a single wave which swept the deck. About one hundred and fifty were taken on board the ANTARCTIC, bound for Liverpool, and about the same number were taken off by the bark, KILBY, on the 28th ult (?), bound to this port. The KILBY being short of provisions, and having only one cask of water on the board, would probably make the nearest port. She has not yet been heard from.

Col. Gates, Major Merchant, Col. Burke, Capt. Judd, Lieut. Fremont, Lieut. Loeser and Lieut. Van Voast, with all of the ladies were put on board of the KILBY. Lieuts. C. S. Winder and J. G. Chandler were put on board of the ship ANTARCTIC, bound to Liverpool. Major F. O. Wyse and Lieut. Wm. A. Winder came on the THREE BELLS. Col. J. M. Washington, Major Taylor and wife, Capt. H. B. Field and Lieut. Smith were washed overboard on the first night of the gale.

The following memorandum has been handed us by one of the officers of the steamer SAN FRANCISCO, who desires it published for the information of friends:

Part of the most terrible of this shocking disaster was the outbreak of cholera.

.....Dec. 24th - at 9 a.m. chipped a heavy sea amidship, which stripped the starboard paddlebox, carried away starboard after king post, both smoke stacks, all the upper saloon staving the quarter deck through and washing overboard a large number of the passengers - one hundred and fifty including Col. Washington, Major Taylor and wife, Captain Field, Lieut. Smith, two ladies - names unknown, three civilians, also unknown and about one hundred and fifty privates. Brooks, a waiter, the barber and a young man names Duckett (the carpenter's brother) were killed. Up to this time the water had gained much. The ship was now open in the seams, over the water, a large part of her quarter-deck stove in, and it was only by the greatest exertions the ship was kept afloat. A gang of soldiers set apart the hold blankets around the shafts to prevent the flowing in of water. Made an attempt to cut away the mizzenmast, but it could not be accomplished on account of the ship's laboring.Dec. 27th Lost a seaman overboard named Alexander.

Dec. 28th. Johnson, a waiter died. Before night succeeded in getting on board the KILBEY upward of 100 persons, men, women and children, including Col. Gates and family, Lieut. Loeser, and family, Capt. Gardner, Lieut. Murray, Major Merchant and family, Capt Judd and lady, Lieut Fremont and family, Mr. G. W. Aspinwall, and Mr. J. L. Geaham. Also sent on board quantity of stores. During the night, the wind increasing, with squally weather. At 10 p.m. the KILBEY let go our hawser. Morning - nothing to be seen of the KILBEY. Latter part, a gale of wind from southwest and cloudy. Louis Hestator died (a waiter).

Dec. 30th...A large number sick and many dying daily.

Dec. 31st - William Wilson, mate died.

Jan. 1st - Many of the people sick and dying fast.

Jan. 2nd - Still a great many sick and dying

Jan. 3. At about 1 p.m., the THREE BELLS boat came alongside. Sent Mr. Greeton, second officer on board to charter the YHREE BELLS to the United States Government, through Major Wyre, the senior United States Officer on board.

Jan. 5th - at 10:30 a.m., all out of the ship excepting Capt. Watkins, Mr. Marshall, (Chief. Engineer) and myself, we then left Capt. Watkins being the last. Latter part a gentle breeze from the west and squally weather, Capt. Watkins, Mr. T. L. Schell, purser, Mr. Barton, 3rd officer, and Mr. Mason, 4th officer with Lieut. Chandler, Lieut. Chas Winder, Mr. Rankin and carpenter, Washington Duckett, excepting the above, all the officers of the ship and army returned in the THREE BELLS

The SAN FRANCISCO was built by Messrs. W. H. Aspinwall, for the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, and cost \$350,000. Her constructor was Mr. William H. Webb, one of the most successful and accomplished shipbuilders in this city. Under the inspection of Commodore Kearney and Captain Bell, both officers of the U.S. Navy who from time to time expressed their views and made their suggestions. Captain Skiddy, so long and so favorably known for his nautical skill and practical knowledge was also employed by the Government to superintend her build

OBITUARIES FROM THE PAST

DIED. On Saturday, November 28, 1896, Mrs. Luvisa Ganer (Greene) Marble, in the 67th year of her age. Mrs. Marble was born in Licking County, Ohio, on April 3, 1830. She married to Anson (Ansil) Marble at Council Bluffs, Iowa, on March 29, 1852, and in May of the same year the couple started for Oregon with ox teams. They arrived in Portland, on December 1 of the same year and lived there three years, coming to this county in February, 1855, where they have resided ever since, raising a family of thirteen children--eight girls and five boys--of which there are still living five girls and three boys. There is also seventeen grandchildren and one great grand child.

For sometime she had been afflicted with dropsy and had suffered much, but she died in peace, with her husband and children about her and in the full possession of her mental power. Notwithstanding the storm, a goodly number followed the remains to their last resting place. The family will have the sympathy of many friends throughout the county.

Mrs. Marble joined the United Brethren church in 1847, but was buried under the ceremonies of the Methodist church, Rev. Williams of this city officiating, the funeral taking place from the old home at Salmon Creek and the interment in the Salmon Creek cemetery. Peace be to her. (NB: She was later moved to Park Hill Cemetery where she rests today beside her husband, Ansil S. Marble.) (Information of this article is from the Vancouver Independent newspaper.)

ANSIL S. MARBLE PUT UP THE FIRST FLOUR MILL IN CLARKE CO. Was Native of New York, but Had Lived in Northwest Many Years. Vancouver, Wash. Dec. 29, 1916.

Ansil S. Marble, a pioneer settler of Clarke county, died this morning at 6 o'clock, at his home on the St. Johns road north of the garrison. He had been failing in health for the last two years, but had been confined to his bed for only a week. Mr. Marble was a native of New York, and was 84 years old. At an early age he removed with his parents to Illinois, where he resided until 1852, when he went to Portland. Four years later he came to Vancouver, and a short time after this built the first flouring mill in this part of the country. The mill was constructed along the banks of Salmon creek, and was operated for a period of 36 years, under the direction of Mr. Marble.

OBITUARIES FROM THE PAST (Continued)

VANCOUVER PIONEER WAS BORN AT FORT AFTER INDIAN RAID. FRANK S MARBLE Dies After Week's Illness; Spent His Entire Life at Vancouver.

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 10, 1917. FRANK S. MARBLE died this morning at 3 o'clock at his home at 31 Drummond Avenue following a week's illness of bronchial pneumonia and heart complication. Mr. Marble was 60 years, 11 months and 22 days of age and was one of Vancouver's best known pioneers. His entire life has been spent in and near this city.

In the early fifties his parents homesteaded about four and a half miles north of this city on what is now the Pacific highway (Salmon Creek). Just prior to Mr. Marble's birth the Indians raided the neighborhood, and the settlers were forced to take refuge in the garrison barracks then protected by the Hudson Bay company. While the men stood the Indians off the women packed their belongings in baskets and hurried to the protection of the fort. Thus it happened that Mr. Marble was born in Vancouver barracks.

Mr. Marble is survived by his wife, Sarah (Pender), six sons and two daughters.

Died - At his residence in Preston Precinct, Clark County, W.T. Eberhard Schuh, age 48 years.

Mr. Schuh was born in Wirtemberg, Germany in 1818. At 12 years of age he emigrated with his parents to this country and settled in Ohio in Wayne County, near the town of Wooster; 6 years after he moved with his parents to Scott County, Iowa. After remaining with them 2 years, he moved to Knox County, Illinois. In 1846, he was married to Eveline Koons of the same county where he remained until 1853, when he moved to this territory, where he has since lived. He leaves a widow and 7 children to mourn their loss. In the death of Mr. Schuh, his family have lost a kind husband and good father; he was an enterprising and industrious farmer, and was emphatically an excellent citizen, one of the best of neighbors and the poor mans true and honest friend.

DIED - At Oysterville, W.T. on the 4th ult. of Typhoid fever, George W. eldest son of Gilbert and Elvira Stevens, aged sixteen years two weeks and four days.

BOOK REVIEWS

These are new acquisitions and will not be on loan for the first two months while on the "new" shelf, but can be used for reference when our library is open. Later they will be filed according to the number on the spine. Some will continue to be reference only, while others can be checked out by members for a two-week period.

Andreas, A. T. Illustrated Historical Atlas of the State of Iowa. Chicago: Andreas Atlas Co., 1875. Presented by Jennie Wood.

This is a large book with many engravings showing early Iowa towns, residences, and portraits as well as town plans and maps of counties. The book includes histories of counties and the state. A patrons directory listed by town or county gives name of person, business, place of nativity, and year in which he came to Iowa. Town plans show a few named farm locations.

Baer, F. M. "Max." Creating a Family History. Yakima, WA: P.O. Box 9453, Baer Publications, 1979.

This is a guide for creating your own layouts and doing much of the work yourself for a printed book.

Bangen Family History by Nancy Larson Stout, 16313 N.E. Caples Road, Brush Prairie, WA 98606, 1979. Presented by the author. She has other copies available for sale.

About 370 descendants are listed, of Hans H. Bangen and Eline Thompson. He (b Norway 1838) came to Minnesota in 1866. They married in 1870 (she b Norway 1848) and had nine children. This book has many pictures and interesting narratives about people. Bannon, John Francis. The Spanish Borderlands Frontier 1513-1821. Albuquerque: U. of New Mexico Press, 1974. Presented by Jennie Wood.

A hundred years earlier than the Pilgrims, Ponce de Leon opened the history of the Spanish borderlands frontier in Florida. This book of history could help genealogists understand migration locations and problems. Historical maps show parts of all the border states.

Blum, John M. et al. The National Experience: A History of the U.S. to 1877. New York: Harcourt, Brace & World, 1968. Presented by Jennie Wood.

From exploration to aftermath of the Civil War, this history text can help genealogists, such as in the section on westward movement. Many maps, charts, pictures.

Brown, Erma Lee Skyles. 1883 Pension List. 145 - 24th Street S.E., Salem, OR 97301, 1976.

Mrs. Brown has reprinted pages from an old federal book. This Volume II has lists by counties from Colorado and these territories: Arizona, Dakota, Indian, Montana, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming. Given are the certificate number, name, town, cause for which pensioned (usually an injury), monthly rate, and date of original allowance.

Brown, Joseph C. The Rainbow Seekers: Stories of Spokane, the Expo City, and the Inland Empire. Spokane, WA: Westcoast Pub. Co., 1974. Presented by Mildred Finley.

A light-hearted history of the Inland Empire, generously illustrated. The reader learns about Idaho silver mining days, missions, Indians, forts, early Spokane.

Burkholder Family Reunion, Part II. Harrisburg, PA, 1927. Presented by Jim Hill.

Descendants of Christian Burkholder of Langau, Switzerland, whose son, Abraham, came to America in 1837, met in Marshalltown, Ohio in 1926. Another group, descended from Ulrich Burkholder who came on the ship Samuel in 1732, met in Troy, Ohio in 1926. This pamphlet tells about persecution of Mennonites in Switzerland 1709-11. Some lineage data tells of descendants in Pennsylvania and Virginia.

Calder, John and Mary, Donation Land Claim. Clark County Abstract. Presented by Margaret Krupicka.

This is a series of legal papers between 1865 and 1942 dealing with five acres in the John Calder DLC in Clark County, Washington.

Catlin, George B. The Story of Detroit. Detroit, MI: Detroit News, 1926. Presented by Gerry Gilman.

The author, a librarian of the newspaper, in 100 chapters, intends to acquaint the reader with the history of his city. Many names are within the narrative and indexed.

Cemetery Record Compendium. By John D. and E. Diane Stemmons. Logan, Utah: Everton Publishers, 1979. Presented by Jo Landers.

This is a listing by state and county of cemeteries, giving their names and a code for source, volume and page, or microfilm number.

Cornish, Louis H. National Register of the Society: Sons of the American Revolution. New York, 1902. Presented by Portland Forum.

The first hundred pages give history of the society, biographies of officers and list principal events of the revolution. Then follow lines of descent of 11,000 members.

Cunningham, Ronald and Evan Evans. A Handy Guide to the Genealogical Library and Church Historical Department. Logan, Utah: Everton Publishers, 1973. Presented by Jennie Wood.

This is a guide to two of the most unusual libraries in the world, in Salt Lake City, unusual because most of the collections are on microfilm.

Edwards, Rev. Jonathan. History of Spokane County, Washington. W. H. Lever, Publisher, 1900. Presented by Margaret DeWitt and Frances Harris.

This is a large book containing, besides history of the county, 150 portraits and 900 biographies and histories of surrounding communities as well.

Evans Family History. Carpinteria, CA: Heraldry, 1976. Presented by June Rice Satre:

Many Evans names are listed, such as 1790 census Evans, Revolutionary War Evans, some census names (1800, 1820, 1850), some lineage lines in America, as well as a list of Evans researchers with addresses.

Franklin County, Virginia, 1785-1979, Yesterday and Today. Editors: Dorothy R. Cundiff and Rodney Shively. Franklin County Merchants and Businessmen's Association, 1979. Presented by June Andrews.

Published in connection with their eighth annual Fiddlers Convention, this contains many old pictures of families and buildings and has historical anecdotes.

Frye, Lillian Harris and Linda Kaufmann Parrick. Woodland Cemetery, Quincy, Illinois, Early Lot Owners. Quincy, IL: Great River Genealogical Society, 1979. Presented by Lena Morgan.

The cemetery association was formed in 1879 but some earlier graves were moved from Jefferson and Madison cemeteries. This book has a list of names of lot owners and a series of maps to show lot locations. This list does not go beyond 1882, but the cemetery is still being used today.

Genealogical Resources in Washington and Oregon. Seattle Public Library and Offices of Secretary of State, Washington State, June, 1980. Presented by Rose Marie Harshman.

Classifications of materials listed from several libraries and in some cases specific titles such as the Daughters of Pioneers shelf list in the Washington State Library. Several pages are devoted to the Seattle Archives.

Hamlin, Charles Hughes. They Went Thataway. Baltimore: Genealogical Pub. Co., 1974.

Three volumes in one, originally published 1964, 1965, 1966. The intent of the author is to make easily available various genealogical items he has accumulated about Virginians. Since there are three volumes in one, there are three sets of indexes.

Hilton Notes by Winifred Lovering Holman and Mrs. L. E. Warmke. Exeter, NH, 1967. Presented by Kitty Oman.

This is a hundred page research story tracing descendants of Edward Hilton. Most of the research was done in New Hampshire. They found that several errors had been made in previous Hilton write-ups.

Jacobus, Donald Lines. Index to Genealogical Periodicals. Baltimore: Genealogical Pub. Co., 1978. Three volumes in one, originally published in 1932, 1948, 1953.

This is a help in locating data in about sixty genealogical and historical periodicals. Name and place indexes in each section refer you to volume and page of a periodical.

Jackson County, Oregon, Mortuary Records by Ruby Lacy, Box 628, Ashland, OR, 1977.

From several sources this lists deaths between 1904 and 1931. Early records include name, age, death date, and burial place. Later ones may add other information such as name of spouse.

Johansen, Dorothy O. and Charles M. Gates. Empire of the Columbia: A History of the Pacific Northwest. New York: Harper Bros., 1957. Presented by Jenny Wood.

This is a 700 page text concerning northwest history from early Indians, then exploration, to civilization up to 1956. Maps and photographs.

Kirkham, E. Kay. A Survey of American Church Records. Logan, Utah: Everton Publishers, 1978. Presented by Jo Landers.

The two main sections of this comprehensive book are (1) a survey of denomination (not doctrine) and (2) a survey of records by state. There is a section on migration.

Lacy, Ruby. Getting Started in Genealogy. Ashland, OR: P.O. Box 628, 1978. Presented by June Andrews.

This is a helpful "how to" book with many suggestions for searching and for a system to keep track of it all.

Lane County, Oregon, Cemeteries. Lane County Historical Society and Oregon Genealogical Society, Eugene, OR. Three volumes. 1975 and 1976.

Many cemeteries are listed with location directions and with maps in volumes 2 and 3. Most of the names are alphabetized within each cemetery list, and state birth and death dates.

Larson Family History. Nancy Larson Stout, 16313 N.E. Caples Road, Brush Prairie, WA, 98606, 1980. Presented by the author. She has other copies available for sale.

Some of this lineage traces to the 1600's but the main theme is the 165 descendants of Bernhard Marinius Larson (b 1852 in Norway) and Elise Saxhaug (b 1863 in Norway). Each of them emigrated to Minnesota where they met and

married in 1884. The book is very well done with many photographs and family stories. Marion County Oregon Marriage Records. Jean Custer and Daraleen Wade. Salem, OR: Willamette Valley Genealogical Society, 1979. Volume I: 1849-1871. Volume II: 1871-1874. Volume III: 1874-1879.

Each volume has indexes for brides and for grooms and for others mentioned in the records. The marriage data tell the names, places, date, witness, plus the volume, page and item number in the Marion County Courthouse.

Mason, William H. Snohomish County In the War. Everett, WA: Mason Pub. Co. Presented by Jenny Wood.

The part played in WWI by soldiers, sailors, marines and civilians of Snohomish County, Washington, with maps, charts, photographs, and articles. Over 2600 names are indexed and paragraphs about their records usually include birthdates and places.

Mayflower Families Through Five Generations. Plymouth, MA: General Society of Mayflower Descendants. Vol. I: 1975. Vol. II: 1978. Copy of Vol. I presented by June Rice Satre.

Volume I focuses on the families of Francis Eaton, Samuel Fuller, William White. Volume II deals with families of James Chilton, Richard More, Thomas Rogers.

McHenry County, Illinois, Federal Census 1850. Compiled by Ruth Flesher Robb, 131 W. North Ave., Lombard, IL, 1979.

Mrs. Robb transcribed, typed, indexed and published the census in townships. It is preceded by four pages of explanations which include statements about cemeteries within each township.

Our Lady of Lourdes. J. T. Chapmen and Fr. Dennis Zoet. Vancouver, WA, 1980.

This is a pictorial directory of the membership in this church in St. James parish. It also tells something of the church and the parochial school.

Pennsylvania, Maps Showing the Development of. Land Office Bureau, Dept. of Internal Affairs, 1920, reprint 1976.

This has thirteen maps showing changes in county boundaries with dates.

Pennsylvania Marriages, Prior to 1810. Two volumes. Baltimore: Genealogical Pub. Co., 1968.

Each marriage partner is listed alphabetically with the date of marriage but within the list for a certain church, so use the tables of contents for town, denomination, and period. Some are listed as early as 1685.

Pennsylvania Marriages Prior to 1790. Baltimore: Genealogical Pub. Co., 1979.

Nearly 300 pages in this book alphabetize marriage partners 1742-1790. A hundred page supplement adds others.

Pioneer Families of the Oregon Territory, 1950. Oregon State Archives, David C. Duniway, Archivist. Presented by Genealogical Forum of Portland, OR.

This area included the modern states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and part of Wyoming. This is an index of heads of families with notation of county and whether found in schedule 1, 3, 4, or 5 to aid in ordering transcripts from the Oregon State Archives.

Roberts, Kenneth. Northwest Passage. New York: Crest Book, 1963. Presented by Rose Marie Harshman.

A reprint of a 1937 Doubleday book, a selection of Book-of-the-Month Club. A novel of America in the making, it starts in New England in 1750, gives a picture of life, attitudes, exploration toward the Great Lakes area.

Ross, Dana Fuller. Oregon. New York: Bantam Books, 1980. Presented by Rose Marie Harshman.

This is a novel about men and women of wagon trains going over the south pass of the Rockies to Fort Vancouver.

Rune, Ann. Oral History Index. Olympia, WA: Division of Archives, Washington State, 1977. Presented by Sidney McAlpin, State Archivist.

This book contains index sheets to a Washington State Oral/Aural History Program 1974-1977 in differing ethnic or occupational groups. The pages give accession numbers, the names of interviewer and interviewee and a summary of what was recorded on tape.

Smith, Herndon. Centralia: The First Fifty Years 1845-1900. Centralia, WA: Centralia American Revolution Bicentennial Committee, 1975.

This was a 1940-1942 project of high school English classes in which community pioneers shared their memories and photographs. Indexed.

State and Provincial Archives, 1977. Presented by Sidney McAlpin.

This was prepared as an aid to archivists, librarians, historians, and other researchers. It lists one address and archivist for each state and Canadian province.

Stewart, George R. Ordeal by Hunger. New York: Ace Books, 1960. Presented by John and Mildred Finley.

This includes a reprint of the 1936 edition plus seventy pages of added information about the Donner party, a tragic group of emigrants to California. This edition also has two diaries and an 1847 letter describing the ordeal.

Surname Interest Listing and Index for 1979. Genealogical Association of Sacramento and the Root Cellar Sacramento Genealogical Society. Volume II, 1980. Presented by Rose Marie Harshman.

About 500 names are listed with code numbers for members who listed them, with their addresses.

Tepper, Michael. New World Immigrants. Two Volumes. Baltimore: Genealogical Pub. Co., 1980.

A consolidation of ship passenger lists and associated data from periodical literature. The first volume is given over to the hundred-year period 1618-1718. The second volume continues to 1878 and includes articles, ship lists, and some naturalization lists of diverse immigrant groups. English, Irish, Scottish, German, Swiss, French, Dutch, Norwegian, as well as Jews, Quakers, Huguenots, and Minnonites. A name index in each volume is a big help.

Tuscarawas County, Ohio Marriages, 1808-1844. New Philadelphia, Ohio: Tuscarawas Genealogical Society, 1979. Presented by June Satre.

Names are listed alphabetically with date, official, page, and return number which will facilitate identification if a certified copy is ordered from the Probate Court.

Wars, Pensions, and Military Records: Where to Write for Records. Presented by Rose Marie Harshman.

This is a twelve page compilation outlining war information and pension acts and including lists of appropriate addresses useful to genealogists.

Winther, Oscar Osburn. The Old Oregon Country. Lincoln: University of Nebraska Press, 1969. Presented by Richard Grafton.

This is a history of frontier trade, transportation, and travel in the Oregon Territory. Table of contents leads you to your section of interest. Illustrated. Indexed.

Winther, Oscar Osburn. The Transportation Frontier, Trans-Mississippi West, 1865-1890. Albuquerque: U. of New Mexico Press, 1974. Presented by Jenny Wood.

While chiefly about early railroad travel, this tells about stage coaching, cart and wagon travel, steamboats and barges for pioneers and freight. Illustrated.

Wright, Norman Edgar and David H. Pratt. Key to Genealogical Research Essentials. Provo, Utah: Brigham Young University, 1966. Presented by Jenny Wood.

This is a detailed manual for students attending an LDS Genealogical Research Seminar. An article on calendars and another on note-taking and recording systems are among the useful topics.
