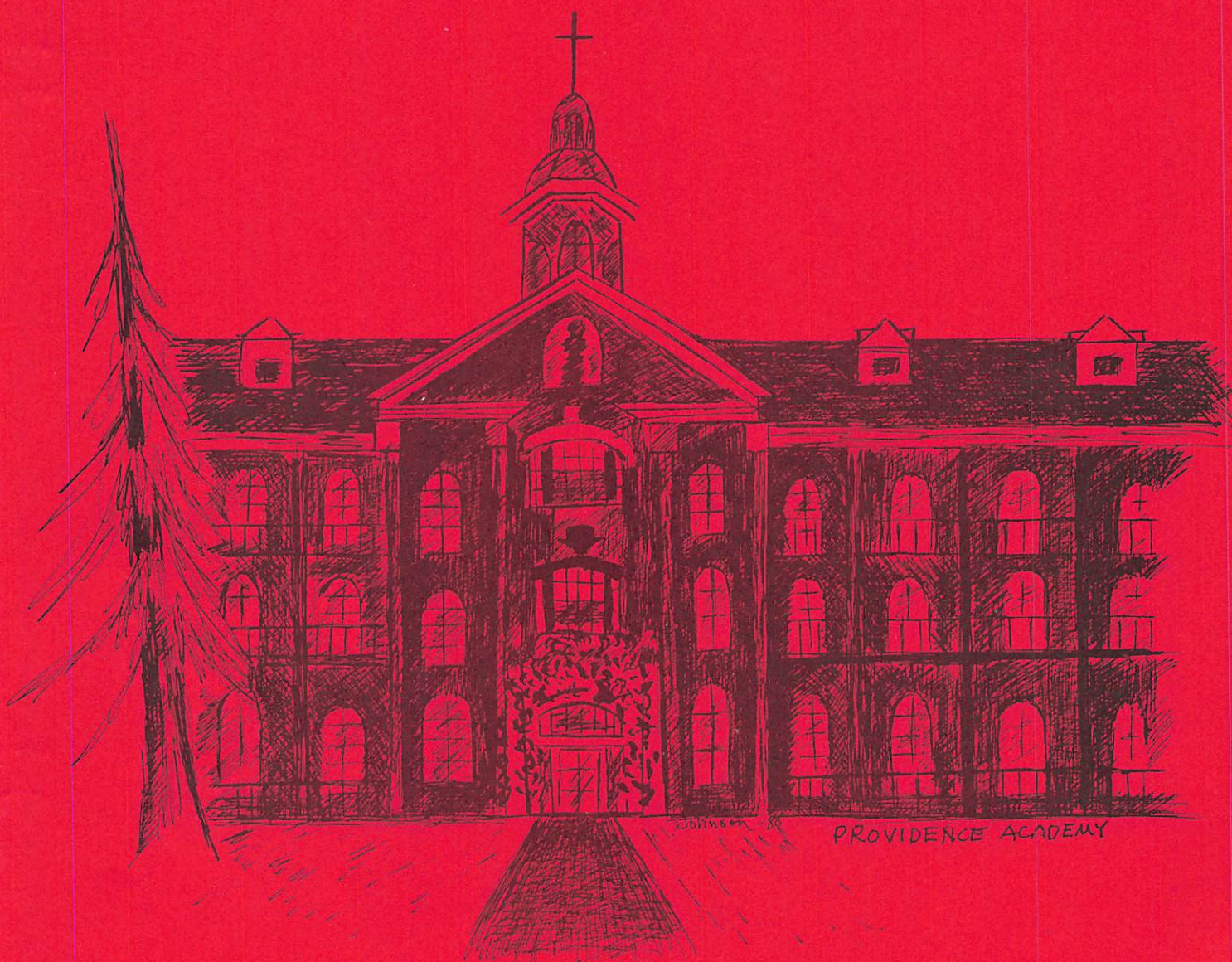

The cover - In April 1857, Mother Joseph of Sisters of Providence established a school, orphanage and other institutions for the ill and affected who needed vital care. She arrived in Vancouver in 1856 at the request of Bishop Blanchet to found a school. She was responsible for the building of many schools, hospitals and missions in the northwest, but Providence Academy was the most notable one. So energetic and tremendously constructive, Mother Joseph helped build the academy as the architect and a skilled craftsman, carpenter and mason. She was an artist at fine carving and modeling in wax for the precious statues and an excellent administrator as well. Much of the money to build the academy structure was from her begging activities at logging camps, mills and settlers. It was designed in the shape of a cross four stories high. The building plans used 300,000 bricks fashioned in an early settler, Lowell M. Hidden's brick yard. The school building as it now stands was completed in 1892. In the 1960s, the school became no longer feasible to keep open and too dangerous to be left vacant. It was doomed for destruction. Mr. Hidden's grandson, Robert A. Hidden with a strong feeling of nostalgia for Vancouver history and with appeal of many many citizens of Vancouver chose to retain the academy. Because of Mr. Hidden's love for his childhood community, it has been fortunate for the area as we still have this beautiful landmark of ancient cultural charm and history as a building of unique shops, offices and a restaurant with decor in keeping with the enchantment of the academy. The pen and ink drawing was done by Jeanette Johnson.

The reports of February 20, 1980 and April 30, 1980 really did the trick in my search for the Anton and Anna (Wanner) Kaufman's grandchildren

Included in the earlier report was - 1908 marriage record data on William H. Pickett, and Emma Kaufman which showed the groom's father to be A. R. Pickett.

The second report also contained a list of 30 local present day 'possibles' - Picketts, Kaufmans and Wolvertons. In this list, there was also an A. R. Pickett. This was the first person to whom I wrote - and 'JACKPOT'.

Arthur R. Pickett - son from a first marriage forwarded my letter to his half brother and sister, Sidney L. Pickett and Edith (Pickett) Witkowski, both of Washougal, WA.

I now have, thanks to them, all the names and addresses of the remaining grandchildren - Picketts, Kaufmans, Jones, Jorgensons and Wolvertons.

The only grandchild who had been living in the Vancouver area was the late Buford C. Kaufman; and your second report even contained obits on him.

I certainly appreciate the real fine job that all of you did on my behalf.

MILITARY RECORDS

Records with Genealogical Application are:

Personnel Records: Service Files from Colonial Ward to present,
Enlistment and induction,
Orders and citations,
Muster rolls and rosters,
Discharge and separation record

Veterans Records: Disability Claims
Death, grave and burial records
Indigent soldier claims.

It has been suggested when writing for any military record, specifically request that you desire all records be forwarded. For instance, do not request only discharge records as the enlistment and induction records may contain the clue you are needing. And letters that may be in the pension files have been very revealing of important clues.

DON'T WAIT FOR THAT SOMEDAY

Friends, enjoy your genealogy! Don't wait for that "some" day, when all of your charts are complete. They are never really complete, you know. And let your relatives share in the joy of your 'finds'. Even tho many seem uninterested, they may like your work anyway. The chances are some good will come back to you, such as what recently happened to me.

Anyone who has searched for that elusive ancestor, will know the thrill I experienced when that small packet arrived from Washington D. C. the other day. The name David Hack, on the envelope was familiar because his father, Raymond who lives in Sacramento, California is my cousin. I have never met David. The first picture from the packet was of an old Colonial type home with the following explanation on the back, "the John Boyle House northwest corner from across the Old Mill Road. Note giant Eacalyptus tree!". I think I almost stopped breathing because the words "Old Mill Road" were once in my mind almost constantly. There were 16 pictures, including a picture Christmas card of David Hack standing beside an old stone wall - one stone with initials, S.B. carved on it. David explained this stone had been formerly located some 200 - 250 yards behind the old Solomon Boyle House, but was damaged by vandals, then moved and incorporated into the present retaining wall in 1978. According to Solomon Boyle's will, the old stone was used as a land mark to measure the land for his heirs. David Hack, born 1940, is the 8th generation descendant, and I am 7th of the immigrant ancestor. Solomon Boyle built the original part of the house between 1735-1750 at 42 Old Mill Road, Millington, New Jersey, Passaic township, Morris County.

"Solomon Boyle settled in Millington about 1730. From East Jersey proprietors, he purchased 600 acres of land to the west of, and adjoining the Berkeley tract. The land ran from the Passaic River on the south across Long Hill to the River again in the North. This tract was the westernmost part of Millington. The house at 42 old Mill Road was the home of Solomon Boyle. At that time, only the western part of the house existed. His son, John lived across from his father at 47 Old Mill Road. In the middle of 1700's, he built a gristmill, sawmill and forge at this site. It is believed that Millington was named for the mills" (excerpt from book Passaic Township - a short history published in connection with the New Jersey Tercentennial 1664-1964)

The other pictures included various scenes of the Solomon Boyle house and the house of his son, John. (also our direct line) and of the river and the bridge abutment near where father and son once had their sawmill and gristmill, etc. Also, in the packet of pictures were those of the Presbyterian Church of Basking Ridge, founded circa 1717, and of the gravestones of Solomon Boyle and his wife Susannah (Pelletrew) Boyle. David wrote on the back of the Christmas card. "Mrs. Finley, please see info written on back of this photo. It is one of a complete set of photos for you and your family to keep and enjoy of the Solomon Boyle and John Boyle houses in Millington, New Jersey. Thanks to your 'Boyle Genealogy', I took two trips there and took these photos".

When I first started on genealogy, I attempted first the Boyle (maternal) line because my mother was getting so much pleasure of knowing her ancestry. Since she was already over 90 years old, I dediced to write into booklet form the lines I had found. (by no means complete, some of them even now). My daughter, Mary of Junction City, Oregon worked on this line a great deal and when we found the break through back to

the immigrant ancestor, we decided to print our data. Many letters were sent to New Jersey churches, libraries, archives and the History Bureau at the State Library, and to individuals who answered adds in "The Helper" to complete this booklet. I contracted for 25 copies of off-set print from a local printing company. By postal cards, we asked relatives to order books if they were interested. Some had all already sent family group sheets. The first 25 booklets sold very quickly, and we then had 25 more printed, then 25 more. In all, we mailed almost 75 orders, and could have sold more. David's parents bought 5 of the books, one for themselves and one for each of their four children as a gift for Christmas. NOW, David has given me a great present, the packet of pictures in return. I most likely would never had the opportunity to possess these picture treasurers.

As for the price of the booklets, I more than covered the expenses, because many relatives sent more money than I had asked for indicating they were grateful for the work we had done on the family lineage. It was not our intention to make money on the publication, but to acquaint the relatives of their heritage as well as mine. I have been more than compensated for the work involved.

CEMETERY RESTORATION AND PRESERVATION

Cemetery restoration and preservation projects are forming throughout many states. It is seriously being pursued to protect, restore and preserve burial grounds. The State of Illinois is making a serious study of a Cemetery Care Act with the idea of a State Cemetery Preservation Alliance being organized by the Illinois State Genealogical Society.

Vermont, Maine, Wisconsin, Kentucky and New Hampshire have all formed statewide associations to encourage the restoration and preservation of their cemeteries. The associations' aims are to locate all cemeteries, burial grounds and burial mounds, to clean, restore and maintain all cemeteries and tombstones; to locate all cemetery records and already copied inscriptions; and to copy all unrecorded inscriptions. 1981 KICKOFF YEAR FOR

NATIONAL GENEALOGICAL CONFERENCES IN THE STATES

The Council of the National Genealogical Society unanimously at its last meeting to launch in 1981 annual national conferences outside the Washington D. C. area.

Following up quickly on this exciting development, contacts were made with a number of State genealogical societies to firm up plans for conference sites 1981 to 1985. As a result, it has been decided that the 1981 meeting will be held in Atlanta, hosted by the Georgia Genealogical Society.

According to NGS President, Phyllis W. Johnson, the Society hopes to set up an annual meeting/educational program comparable to such meetings held annually by the American Historical Association, the American Library Association, and the Society of American Archivists.

The Seminars will be designed to meet the current needs of the genealogical field. Mrs. Johnson said preliminary program discussions suggested special seminars for state and local society officers, lectures on research methods and a full run of other possibilities, e.g., publishing, charts and forms, family organizations, archival institutions, county research, indexing, foreign research, etc.

General planning and discussion meetings will be held and it is expected that NGS committees will also meet. There will be major addresses by NGS officers and notables in genealogy and related fields.

Mrs. Johnson explained that the goal of these conferences is to create a truly professional national annual meeting for the genealogists in this country, moving the meeting from city to city, and "away from Washington D. C."

She said if NGS can start to repeat on an annual basis the tremendous accomplishments of the Bicentennial conference in Cleveland, the NGS Diamond Jubilee conference in Washington, and the two World Conferences in Salt Lake City, the field of genealogy will be significantly strengthened and national unity and organization will be a natural by-product.

Watch for announcements and further details about the first conference in Atlanta in 1981 as plans develop.

REV. ABSALOM JOY

Rev. Absalom Joy was born in Belmont County, Ohio, December 20th, 1802. At twenty he was converted, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was soon appointed class-leader, then licensed to exhort, then to preach. He was employed as a supply on a circuit for several years, and, as such, was acceptable and successful. He lived more than thirty years in one neighborhood, in Morgan County, enjoying to a wonderful extent, the confidence of all who knew him. He labored diligently, and made sacrifices cheerfully to advance the cause of Christ. His house was the home of the itinerant as well as the place for preaching and social meetings. In 1864, he, in company with a number of families, chiefly relatives, emigrated to Northwest Missouri, and settled in Andrew County. The same Christian spirit and work characterized him here that did in Ohio. He removed to Sweet Home, Nodaway County, in 1870 or '71, where he continued to work for the Master as his health and strength would permit. His last sickness was of less than a month's duration. From the first of his attack he seemed to be impressed that his work was done. He said to his eldest son, one week before death, "I am prepared for any emergency. The Lord and I settled this matter years ago." He passed peacefully away, February 13th, 1874, in his seventy-second year. The writer preached his funeral sermon from one of his favorite texts on such occasions; namely, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord," etc. The widow and children bow in submission to the will of Him who doeth all things well.

JOHN JOY, SEN.

Died on the 18th of June, 1872, near Sweet Home, Nodaway County, Mo., of prostration from old age, John Joy, Sen.

He was born in the State of Maryland, March 25, 1782; removed when a boy with his father to Virginia, near the now city of Wheeling, when the scattering citizen had to live at times in block houses to secure themselves against the depredations of the Indians; removed before he arrived at manhood to Belmont County, Ohio, which was then Northwest Territory. Married there and removed soon thereafter to Guernsey County, Ohio, and in 1833 removed to Morgan County, Ohio, where his wife died about twenty-five years ago, since which time he has lived his children. He removed four years ago with a daughter and family to the place where he died.

He was for over sixty years a member of the M.E. Church: he always expressed great confidence and trust in God, and died in hope of full salvation. And so has gone another of the veterans of the War of 1812.

He has left behind numerous descendants, even to the fifth generation.

Many in Pleasant Valley, or Federal Creek, will remember him with pleasure.
