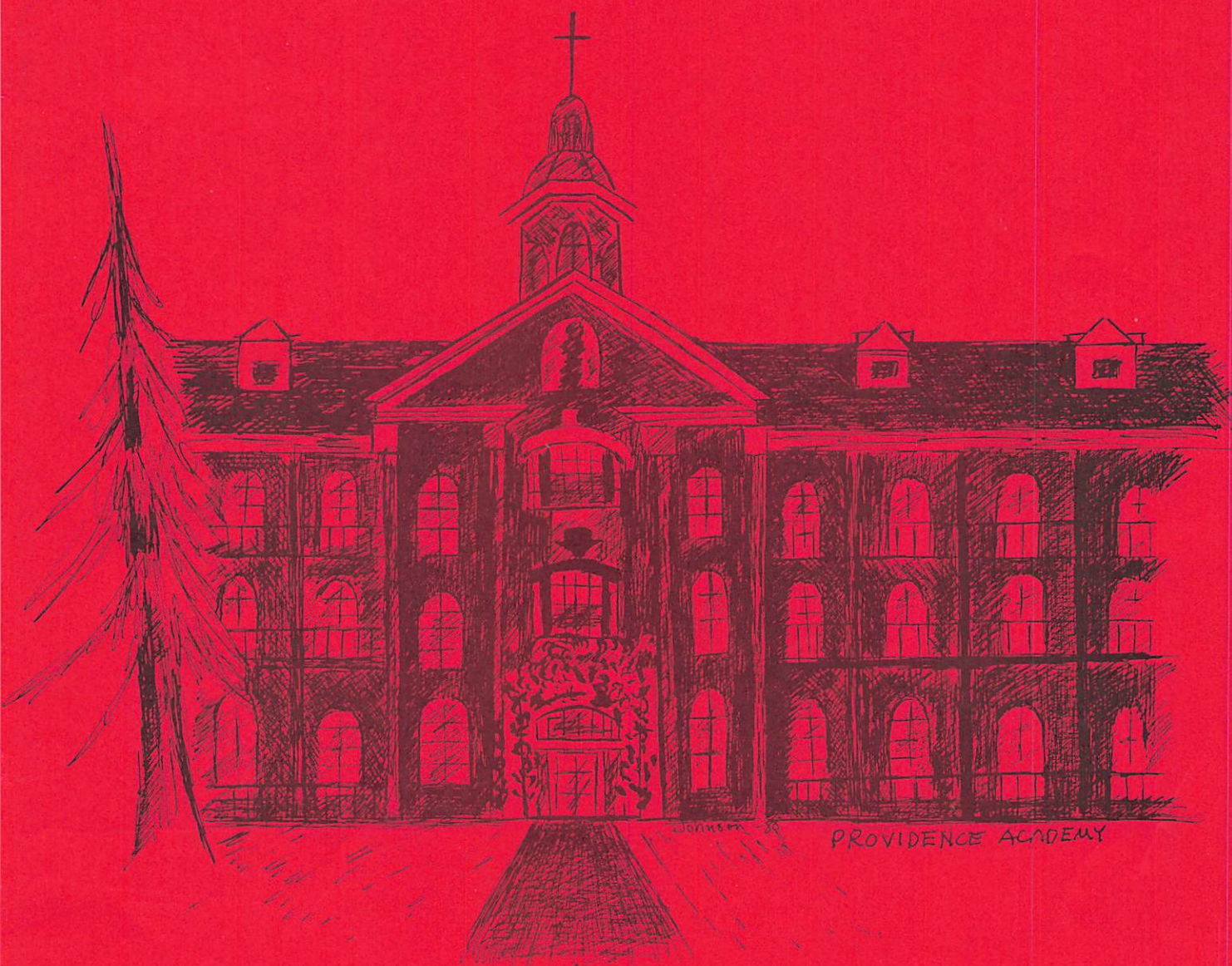

From the Peter Dewar Seminar

Sponsored by the Portland Forum

November 1980

.....Each one of us has 2 parents, 4 grandparents, 8 great-grandparents and 16 great-great grandparents. If one extends this geometrical progression back for 12 generations, i.e. about 360 years, taking us roughly back to about 1620, each one of us will have 4,096 direct ancestors. If we go back farther - 20 generations or 600 years to 1380 (making no allowance for common ancestors), the figure would be an amazing 1,480,576 ancestors.

26 generations or 750 years, taking us back to 1200, we would have 67,108,864 ancestors. This makes no allowance for the fact that many ancestors were obviously common to more than one branch of the family. Especially if one puts this into context and realizes that the population of Britain was only a fraction of the size of our present population of 55,000,000. There was obviously a great deal of overlap. In 1600 the population of England was estimated at no more than 5,000,000.....

PUBLISHING PROBLEMS

If you have premeditated plans to edit and publish a family history, genealogy or whatever, do give it your utmost concern and indepth study of the possible copyright problems that could arise. Unrecognized loop holes are always there in any contract.

Our attention has been called to this drastic dilemma from a recent author in Carson, Washington. She had written a beautiful book on her childhood area in North Dakota. Cold Cruel Land. It was very nicely published by a well known Portland, OR. publisher. They over ran the order as ordered by the author. She was told that she could purchase the extra books. This, however, would make her initial monetary outlay far greater than planned. She then asked if they would hold the extra copies for a period of time until she could assume the cost of the extra printing. The publisher agreed to her request. BUT, it was later discovered that the publisher was selling those extra books on the 'sly' without conferring with the author about selling the 'extra overrun copies'.

After consulting an attorney, the author was told that what had taken place was not illegal. The name of the publisher was shown on the book and address.

So, we alert future genealogists who plan to enter the publication field with a book, give great study and perhaps an attorney's views on the contract that you enter into with any professional publisher. Do Not let yourself have an editor's dilemma!!

WORKING IN GERMANS-FROM-RUSSIA GENEALOGY

Working in Germans-from-Russia genealogy has a few different twists to it that one should know about before getting deeply involved in the subject.

FIRST - We will present a background of this ethnic group so as to better grasp the overall picture. In 1762, negotiations were started between the Russian and German governments to provide for colonization of more or less vacant portions of Russia by German people. This led to the issuance on July 22, 1763, of a manifesto by the Russian government outlining the conditions under which Germans and other could emigrate to Russia. Principally, the conditions were freedom from military service, provision of transportation, grant of land, loan of money, freedom of taxes for a time as well as other points.

An exodus of Germans to Russia then began which lasted up until about 1862, with a trickle continuing for several years. The first groups settled in the so-called Volga region which centered around Saratov. Then, beginning in the early 1800's, groups settled in southern Russia, generally known as the Black Sea region. This area is some 1500 miles from the settlements in the Volga region. The total emigration was on the order of 100,000 people.

The Germans largely started more or less self sustaining villages, or dorfs as they were known there. Each family was allocated a tract of ground in the village containing about one acre where he had his house, some garden space, room for some livestock. Nearby the village was usually some community pasture land. Also, farther away, perhaps from 2 to 15 miles, was ground assigned for the purpose of raising crops. As the villages began to get large, nearby so-called "daughter" villages were established. Catholic and Protestant people settled in distinctly separate villages as did the Mennonite people.

In 1871, the Russian government elected to revoke the 1763 agreement, along with other sweeping changes. This made the young Germans subject to compulsory military service and it required the teaching of the Russian language in the schools in the German villages as well as other drastic changes.

In 1849, a small group of Germans-from-Russia had emigrated to the United States and settled on Kelley's Island in Lake Erie, near Sandusky, Ohio. Following the new Russian decree in 1871, the Germans in Russia began to look seriously for new territory in which to relocate. Emissaries were sent to both North and South America to investigate the conditions for emigration. In the United States, the principal areas selected were Kansas, Nebraska and Dakota Territory.

Beginning in 1873, emigrations started to the United States in earnest with several hundred people coming that year. This emigration continued off and on until about 1923. Some 200,000 people came in all. A few people went to South America while others went to Canada. In the rural areas, again, Catholic, Protestant and Mennonites generally established separate settlements.

SECOND. Now to go into genealogy - On one hand, German-Russians are somewhat reticent about their origin. On the other hand, most families brought with them fairly good personal genealogical records. The people were quite church oriented and the churches usually maintained good records. One of the problems, however, is the records of discontinued churches. Sometimes they were lost. In other cases, they are stored by the church taking over the territory.

Many German-Russian communities, especially those in the Dakotas and Canada, have published what is known as Jubilee books to go along with the 50th, 75th or 100th anniversary celebration of the founding of a town. These Jubilee books usually contain much biographical and genealogical data, such as dates and places of birth, marriage, and death, and relationships. Perhaps 100 Jubilee books have been published

by the heavy German-Russian towns in the Dakotas, as well as a substantial number in Canada. Many churches have published Jubilee books, too. These usually consist of a history of the church and a listing of the current members. Sometimes, listings of all of the baptisms, confirmations, marriages, and deaths occurring in the history of the church are included too.

Then there are the normal sources of genealogical data such as marriage records, cemetery records, etc., as well as newspaper accounts of births, marriages and deaths. Ther German-Russian obituaries are usually well written from the genealogical point of view. One of the usual problems is the wide variations in name spelling. Other problems is the recording of data in the German language in county marriage records as well as church records.

A few years ago, an organization was formed to bring together the Germans from Russia. It is known as the America Historical Society of Germans from Russia (AHSGR). The headquarters were initially in Greeley, Colorado, but at present are in Lincoln, Nebraska (615 'D' Street, 68502). Several local or state chapters have been formed. A separate organization was formed in North Dakota. It was the North Dakota Historical Society of Germans from Russia (NDHSGR), but has been renamed Germans from Russia Heritage Society (GRHS). Headquarters are Bismarck (Box 1671, 58502). Both of these groups have started publications which carry genealogical sections. One of the find features of both publications are translations of German language historical and genealogical articles. A section on ship's passenger lists of German-Russians is especially lucrative.

Both the AHSGR and NDHSGR have conventions. AHSGR conventions have been held at Greeley, Colorado, Lincoln, Nebraska, Boulder, Colorado, Portland, Oregon, Fresno and San Francisco, California. NDHSGR (GRHS) conventions have been held in Bismarck North Dakota, as well as Rugby, Minot, Dickinson and Grand Forks. AHSGR conventions have also been held in Seattle, Washington, and Dearborn, Michigan.

For several years, a person could write to Dr. Karl Stumpp in Tübingen, Germany for assistance in tracing German-Russian lines. In 1972, however, Dr. Stumpp published his holdings of German-Russian passport and census records in a book entitled "The Emigration from German to Russia in the Years 1763 to 1862, 1018 pages. While this book contains very little on migrations to the Volga region, it is probably the greatest boon of all time to the German-Russian researcher working in the Black Sea region. The census records are generally for 1816, but in a few cases the census for 1858 is included. Where both the 1858, and an d an earlier census exists for a particular village, a line may quite often be traced from emigrants to the USA all the way back to Germany. To use even the English version of the book, however, one needs a good German-English dictionary. Even then, some of the words will require study to figure out what is meant. It is known that the Russian government has in their custody a 1769 census of Germans who were living in Russia at that time, but efforts to have it made available have so far been futile.

Lincoln, Nebraska has long had a rather heavy German-Russian population, predominately from the Volga region of Russia. In 1913, Dr. Hattie Plum Williams undertook the preparation of her Doctorate thesis there with the subject, "A Social Study of the Russian German". During the assembly of data for background for her thesis, she with the help of Mr. Jacob J. Stroh, took a census in 1913 and 1914 of most of the German-Russian population living in Lincoln. This census added up to about 9000 names and is available on microfilm from the Nebraska Historical Society at Lincoln.

As you know, the newspapers in smaller communities take rather painstaking care to publish obituaries which carry good genealogical detail. The writer subscribes to newspapers in two Dakota counties in which he is doing research. Where the obituaries leave out some essential data, he often sends a partially completed family group sheet to a surviving family member and asked them to finish filling in the blanks. The response has been almost 100% to such requests. One thing he did learn though - do not send more than two family groups sheets or they are apt to become confused and get it all mixed up.

The writer has become rather heavily involved in the genealogy of McIntosh County (Ashley, North Dakota, which is where his wife was raised. Through the process of indexing several Jubilee books, cemetery and marriage records, as well as newspaper data, he has developed a library catalog card index which now stands at about 40,000 names and is still far from being complete, even though the present county population is about 5000 people.

LOOMIS FAMILY BIBLE

This Loomis Bible record was submitted by Marjorie Endicott, P.O. Box 780, Scappoose, Oregon 97056. She discovered the Bible in an antique store in Odell, Oregon in 1980. She will make the Bible available to any descendant of the people listed with proper identification.

The Bible is in very good condition and is inscribed, "Tola E. Loomis from her mother, as an Easter gift, March 31, 1907." The family records are inserted in the back of the Bible and are partially written as a narrative. Also found in the Bible are some newspaper articles of Franklin Pierce Walker and an attorney Loomis.

The/Teachers' Bible/ Containing the/ Old and New Testaments/ According to the Authorized Version/ Together with/ A Selection of New and Revised/ Illustrated Helps to Bible Study/ and/ A New Concordance/ New York/ 1901.

- 1) Joseph Loomis was born about the year 1590. He was of noble family following the occupation of a woolen draper in Barintree, Essex Co, England. He sailed from London April 11, 1638, in the ship "Susan and Ellen" and arrived at Boston July 17, 1638. He removed to Windsor, Conn. in the autumn of 1639. He brought with him five sons and three daughters. He died November 25, 1658.
- 2) Joseph, eldest son of Joseph, born in England about 1616. Died at Windsor, Conn. June 26, 1687. He was twice married; first to Sarah Hill. Second to Mary Chauncey. 12 children.
- 3) James, son of the last, born October 31, 1669. Married Mindwell _____, 1696, who died March 1, 1736, aged 65. He died at Bolton, Conn. December 29, 1750. 10 children.
- 4) Captain Matthew Loomis, son of the last, born October 25, 1703. Married first Rachel Wright, October 19, 1727, who died February 16, 1736. Married second Martha Lathrope May 29, 1739 who died August 26, 1787. He died in Bolton Conn. July 31, 1764, Nine children: Mathew, 1729; Racheal, 1731; Lehr _____ iama, 1736; Martha, 1740; Levi, 1742; Mary, 1747; Andrew, 1747; Jerusha, 1749; Mabel, 1749.
- 5) Andrew, son of the above, born March 14, 1747. Married Buelah Strong, December 22, 1768. She died May 10, 1834, aged 88 years. No date of his death. (1808 South Bridge, Mass.)
- 6) David, son of Andrew, born 1772. Married first Mariah Bridges who died 1807. Married second Mary Estes who died 1837 at Duanesbury, NY. He died 1814 at Sacketts Harbor, a soldier in the US Army. There were two children only of Andrew of whom David was one and a sister named Buelah who was twice married and died in N. Y. City in 1854.
- 7) Rev. Jesse, son of David and Mary Estes, born 1811. Married Elizabeth Blackman, who died May 7, 1889 at East Portlenr, Oregon. He was a minister of the M. E. Church and died 1845 at Pompey Corners, N.Y. His brothers were John, 1799 (Fland ?); Justice, 1800; David, 1804; Andrew, 1809; and Morgan, 1813; and one sister, Mariah, 1804.
- 8) Captain Royal Houghton Loomis, only child of Jesse, born at Pompey Corners, N.Y. on May 20, 1835. Enlisted in the Union Army, Co. A. Sec. Reg. Michigan Cav. on the 21st day of August 1861, at East Saginaw, Michigan. Commissioned 2nd Lieut. March 1, 1864. Capt. December 26, 1864, serving until the close of the rebellion. He died at East Portland, Oregon, February 13, 1892. Married first Naomi Dobson, January 19, 1857, who died July 4, 1867. Second, he married Katie Clary, July 24, 1878. His children are: (Children of Naomi) Jessie, Frank, Lizzie, Harry. (Children of Katie)

Lola Elona, born June 30, 1879; Eva D., born April 1, 1881; Rose Helena, born January 22, 1883; Sarah A., born November 14, 1884; Royala C., born February 4, 1892.

Alcial Clary was married to Miss Mary Duet Biekerstaff in the year 1823. Their five children were:

Jephthah Vinrum, born March 9, 1824.

Carroline, who married Aaron Beck. She died in Clay Co, Texas, 1876.

William Newton last heard from in Texas.

Elizabeth Greene, died aged about 4 years.

Robert J. Clary, the youngest who never married. Last heard from at Galviston, Texas, where he went on an excursion just after the terrible tidal wave. He disappeared no one knowing his fate.

Carroline Beck left five children. Mollie, wife of Fay McCracken. Elizabeth, wife of James McCracken, and three sons, Robert B., Aaron and John Beck.

Jephthah V. Clary married Barbara A. Stevenson October 29, 1854, at Oregon City, Oregon. He died March 12, 1862, in Skamania Co, Washington. Their children are Olive F., born Portland, Oregon, May 19, 1856; Wellard S. died aged six weeks; Lola A. born Milwaukee, Oregon, April 16, 1859; Katie J. near Portland, Oregon, February 6, 1861.

Olive F. Clary was married to H. M. Swafford at E.P.O. April 1, 1873. Their children are: William, Fred, Clara, (Who died in 1879) Marda, Eva, Ouida, Hellen.

Lola A. Clary was married to Dr. Harry Lane September 5, 1882. Their children are Nina, Harriet.

Katie J. Clary was married to Capt. Royal H. Loomis. (See Loomis record.)

Lionel Tait, son of Nathaniel Tait of Northumberland, England, with his wife, Barbara Readit Tait and their six children, emigrated to the U.S. of America leaving England September 6, 1818, and arrived in the state of Virginia at Petersburg November 2nd of the same year where they lived on the plantation of his cousin (Mr. Dunlap) until he died in the spring of 1820. His widow with five children (Lional, Jr. remaining with Mr. D) left Petersburg July 29, 1820 and arrived in the English settlement near Albion, Edwards Co., Illinois September 16 of the same year.

There he acquired a homestead and was married on February 11, 1834 to Sarah Tait, the third daughter of Lionel and Barbara Tait, who was born in Northurnberlin, England, April 12, 1811. Six children were the issue of their marriage, all born in the above said county and state.

Suffice it to say they encountered the usual hardships but finally reached the Willamette Valley, going over the Cascade Mountains into Clackamas Co. October 8, 1853, remaining there two years. Removed to Skamania Co, Washington Ty. in the fall of 1855, locating on a Donation land claim near Cape Horn and continued to reside there until his death February 27, 1871. His widow, Sarah Tait Stevenson, died at Oregon City September 24, 1889. There remains, also those of George James Stevenson, rest in Lone Fir Cemetery, Portland, Oregon.

THE WITCH TRIAL PAPERS

After almost a century and a half in a musty Essex County Courthouse (MASS.) transcripts of the trials of 20 unfortunate souls for witchcraft and thousands of other old legal documents have been officially turned over to the library of the Essex Institute, an historical society. These yellow, hand-written brittle documents have been stored in the basement and cler's office of the county courthouse since it was built in 1842. What history!! The manuscript librarian of the Essex Institute, North Adams, Mass., intimated that it was a typical old type basement with dripping pipes, etc. A very poor place to store old documents. All are written in cramped and barely legible writing. Some will be on display and some pages of trial records will be available to scholars. And that could mean genealogists. The witch trials took place 238 years ago, but they remain one of Salem's chief claims to fame. The 158 years of court records take up 150 feet of shelves in the library's air conditioned stacks.

They are now being catalogued and sorted so that historians will be able to use them. Some of the early legal business records have been difficult for researchers to obtain. There has not been any access to them previously - what an historical find! Now an historical picture of the 17th century can be conceived. The records depict a time when the courts strictly controlled the demeanor and morals of the citizens. They record prosecutions for blasphemy, fornication, stubbornness, eavesdropping and 'wanton dalliance'. What would they have done for LSD and 'Pot'? What would have become of those involved with Abscam?

For vacation plans (for those of you who can go) this would be a wonderful part of your vacationing itinerary.

There is a two volume book called "Glenzdorfs Internationales Genealogen Lexikon" which lists names of those in Germany who are doing family researching. Until this can be located, we have learned from Gems of Genealogy, Green Bay, Wisc. that you may write to Miss Gretchen Leisen, 1018 Riverside Dr. S.E., St. Cloud, MINN. 56301. For \$5.00 per surname, she will send you the names and addresses of those who are researching that name in Germany. Your money is refunded, if no researcher is listed. Do include a SASE with your request.

There also exists a cross index system for West German refugees, village by village. By giving the surname and old village name, it may be possible to contact relatives formerly of that area. The names of people, their birthdates and present addresses will be sent you. The address of this Cross Index System is: Heimatortskartei Nordosteuropa (Pommern-Danzig-Westpreussen Ostpreussen) 2400 Lubek, Fackenburg Allee, 31 Federal Republic of Germany. One Wisconsin genealogist sent \$10.00 with his request, and received quite a bit of information.
