EARLY MEMBERS OF ST. LUKE'S CHURCH Contributed by Lesla Scott

THE REV. JOHN McCARTY, D.D. Rector of St. Luke's Church 1853-1868

Dr. John McCarty, Washington Territory's first Episcopal clergyman and the founder of St. Luke's Church in Vancouver, was born in New York State in 1798. He practiced law for three years and then studied for the ministry, serving as chaplain in the United States Navy for a year. After twenty-one years as rector of an Episcopal Church in western New York he enlisted in the United States Army and was commissioned as brigade chaplain after the outbreak of war with Mexico. He joined his brigade at Vera Cruz and accompanied General Scott into the city of Mexico. The Army and Navy Journal said of him that "he served in a remarkably heroic and conspicuous manner." For several months after sessation of hostilities he stayed in Mexico City, the only chaplain with the American forces. He spent four years, from 1848 to 1852, at Jefferson Barracks and then returned to the headquarters of the Episcopal Church in New York City to be reassigned. He was sent to Oregon traveling via the Isthmus of Panama. He wrote on May, 1853-- "I arrived here (Portland) the 19th of January last after an unusually tedious journey of sixty-one days from New York City..."

By this time the Fourth United States Infantry was stationed at Vancouver Barracks and when it was learned that their former chaplain was coming to Portland the officers immediately applied for his services. He consented to divide his time preaching in Trinity Church, Portland, in the morning, leaving at noon to come to Vancouver Barracks to hold services in the afternoon and spending the first three days of the week conducting his services as chaplain. His first service at the fort was on Sunday, January 30, 1853.

He wrote in a letter -- "Vancouver is distant from Portland about 18 miles by water ...which includes three ferries, the Willamette, more than a quarter of a mile wide, a slough as it is called here, about twenty rods, and the Columbia, which is to the garrison landing about two miles."

An Act of Congress March 2, 1853, made Washington a territory so Dr. McCarty made a trip to the Puget Sound area because he felt the capital would be there. Fourteen days later he was back in Portland having traveled three hundred twenty-five miles and holding services in five places. For a time he was in the Puget Sound area where he established St. John's Episcopal Chruch in Olympia. He held the first services there either in the hall of the House of Representatives or in a schoolhouse.

In 1855, he made a trip to the Atlantic Coast returning in April, 1856, with a wife and children. According to newspaper notices in the Portland Oregonian, his daughter Mary was married to James Crawford in Vancouver and his youngest child, Miss Eliza McCarty, died in 1872 at the age of twenty-eight.

Late in 1857 Dr. McCarty was transferred back to Fort Vancouver and he began services near the Barracks in a schoolhouse converted into a church and consecrated by Bishop Scott on May 27, 1860, as St. Luke's Church. Indian troubles at various times forced McCarty to make trips to the Cascades.

The army retired him on September 16, 1867 and on April 8, 1868, having resigned as rector of St. Luke's Church he and Mrs. McCarty left for WAshington D. C. to live with a son there.

Dr. McCarty returned from Washington D. C. to Vancouver in 1873 to be present at the dedication of the new church which had been built. By this time he could travel by railroad. He stayed in Vancouver two years longer and returned to Washington D. C. in 1875. He died there May 10 1881, and was buried in Rock Creek Cemetery. His pall-bearers were mostly former fellow officers with whom he had served and had attained the rank of general.

ALBERT SCOTT NICHOLSON
Rector of St. Luke's, 1868-1886

Albert Scott Nicholson was born in Pennsylvania in 1829 and finally realized his ambition to enter the ministry. He was assigned to a church in Wisconsin and immediately established a school in the town. He married Mary Warner, a native of Michigan, and soon after, they left for Stockton, California, where again he opened a school. In 1868 he, his wife and son, embarked on a ship for Vancover, Washington Territory, conductinghis first service at St. Luke's, June 28, 1868. Here, for over eighteen years he was rector at St. Luke's Church.

Shortly after reaching Vancouver he was asked to establish a school in connection with the church. As the result, St. Luke's Parish School for Girls was opened with Mrs. Nicholson the guiding spirit of the institution. An accomplished musician she was the teacher of vocal and instrumental music in the school and the church choir director. Miss Yates in her history of St. Luke's Church as this to say -- "Mrs. Nicholson has been remembered by those who knew her as one of the outstanding women in the Vancouver of her day."

In the eighteen years of his ministry at St. Luke's certainly much progress was made and there were many "firsts" in the church history of Washington Territory. In the diary of his first ten years work in St. Luke's Parrish and the vicinity he lists 130 baptisms, 39 marriages, 49 confirmations and 72 burials. Church services when the Nicholson's came to Vancouver were still in the little building which had been consecrated in 1860. By 1871 enough money had been raised to begin a church on Eighth Street. According to the Oregon Churchman, work progressed slowly with the recotr "having performed more manual labor in the erection of that comely and spacious building that the clergy can usually boast." Although only the nave was completed, services were held March, 1873, with the Rev. Dr. McCarty preaching in the morning and Mr. Nicholson in the evening. The chancel was added in 1880 and the spire completed in 1884 with each part of the church paid for as it was built.

In 1879 Mr. Nicholson was responsible for St. Luke's becoming the first self-supporting Episcopal Church in the Territory, heretofore it had been partially supported by the General Board in New York City.

The first Convocation of an Episcopal Chruch in Washington Territory was at St. Luke's in 1881. At this meeting was another "first" -- the ordination of Edward F. Miles, M. D. as deacon.

Besides his church work, according to newspapers of the time, he must have been very active in the community. In 1877 he lectured at the M.E. Church, the proceeds for the Vancouver library. There were several notices regarding his lectures at other churches on temperance. Several times he was a representative to other towns in the territory for the Knights of Pythias and other Lodges. Information regarding teachers' examinations, positions open, etc., were signed "the Rev. A. S. Nicholson, Vancouver County Supt. of Schools."

August of 1886 saw the Nicholson's leaving for Tacoma where he was rector of St. Peter's Episcopal Church and chaplain of the Fannie C. Paddock Memorial Hospital. He died May 29, 1893, and was buried in a cemetery near Tacoma.

MISS AMANDA LOOMIS Teacher, St. Luke's Parish School

Miss Amanda Loomis, principal and teacher of St. Luke's Parish School, was born on the island of Oahu in the Sandwich Islands in the year 1824. Her father was a missionary there, her mother one of a coterie of brides sent to furnish wives for the group of missionaries. Her brother was said to be the first white child born in the islands.

The family returned to the states and Amanda was educated in a female Seminary in New York. Until she was forced to leave the South at the outbreak of the Civil

War she lived there and taught a plantation owner's children. The Rev. and Mrs. Nicholson had moved to Stockton, California, and after the war, they invited Miss Loomis to teach in their parish school. Immediately upon their arrival in Vancouver a number of citizens asked them to undertake to provide a school in connection with their parish work at the church which was at the corner of Sixth and C Streets. The school was located there until the growth of the church demanded larger quarters and the school was moved to the Ninth Street frontage of the parish grounds. St. Luke's Parish School for Girls (some advertisements invited good little boys to come to school also) maintained in these quarters until 1889 with an average attendance of forty pupils. The children were of all ages, beginners and older girls studying Latin, French and other high school subjects.

Miss Loomis came to Vancouver in 1873 and except for eight months she spent with her brother in Michigan she was here all the time until her retirement in 1889. She was the personification of neatness and primness. The few dresses in her ward-robe were conservative, made of brown cashmere and grey alpaca, high neck buttoned up the front and long tight sleeves. With some of her dresses she wore the usual bustle of the period and the skirts draped and pleated. At the neck she usually wore a plain linen collar and white cuffs at the wrists.

She was kind but firm in her conduct of the school being greatly attached to her pupils and they of her. She read many classics to the children, always doing one of Dickens every year. Every morning the children sang several songs, always ending with a hymn. Mrs. Nicholson had the choir work and the teaching of vocal and instrumental music.

In the Vancouver Independent of July 1, 1876, is an item that Miss Loomis's school term had closed on the previous Friday with a public examination at which many parents and their friends were present. "We were particularly well pleased with the proficiency of the bright-eyed little boys and girls in rudimentary arithmethe."

Miss Loomis spent ler last years with the Nicholsonfamily in Tacoma. She died in 1903.

JOHN EDDINGS

Member of the Vestry of St. Luke's for 12 years between 1868 and 1887

John Eddings was born in Ballintry, Antrim County, Ireland, about 1830 and came to America when he was eleven years of age. After several years in New York and St. Louis he enlisted as a private in the Fourth Regiment, United States Infantry, at Fort Grashet, Michigan, July 17, 1851, coming with that regiment shortly after by way of the Isthmus of Panama to Vancouver Barracks. He actually engaged in several of the earlier Indian wars, notably among which was the Rogue River engagement. He was married during this enlistment and from this union there were twelve children, eight of whom were living at the time of his death in 1896.

Mr. Eddings died in his sixty-sixth year while in the employ of the government at Vancouver Barracks as military storekeeper. He was appointed to this position in 1857 by General, then a captain, Rufus Ingalls. He held the position of post-master, in connection with his military office, for three terms, being commissioned by President Grant, his good friend at Vancouver Barracks. He was Vancouver's second postmaster. Clark Brown in his column in the Columbian, "Visiting Around," told of interviewing Mrs. Mary Nichols, a daughter of John Eddings. She said that the mail came many ways, by stage, by horseback carriers, and by steamboats on the river, that people came a long way to get their mail. According to the daughter, Mrs. Eddings always served coffee to these people, a treat which they all enjoyed.

During his thirty years in government employ he had only one leave of absence or vacation. According to one obituary he secured a leave of absence of several months and started for Ireland: after he had been gone for two or three weeks he unexpectedly returned home, having gone only as far as Michigan. He resumed his duties at the depot on the government warrf after a vacation of one month and never

applied for another leave.

An obituary stated that his funeral was one of the most largely attended in the history of Vancouver -- nearly half a mile in length, besides an unusual number of carriages of friends and relatives of the deceased. The caisson containing the casket was preceded by officers and members of the fraternal societies to which the deceased belonged -- Mount Hood Lodge, A.F. & A.M., Col. Thomas M. Anderson garrison, Army and Navy Union. The procession moved with slow and measured tread to solumn marches played by the Fourtheenth Infantry Band winch marched at its' head.

The Clark County Historical Museum has about a dozen letters donated by a granddaughter of Eddings, Belle Haven Gillogly; most of them are from Col. Kenry C. Hodges who spent many years at Vancouver Barracks and was at this time living

in Washington D. G.

A SHORT HISTORY OF ST. LUKE'S

Written by Mark Berhow Contributed by Maxine Inman & Mary Aylmer

The HBC built in present day Vancouver, a fort as headquarters 1824 of their vast fur trading empire for this area. It was called Ft. Vancouver.

Dr. John McLoughlin, Chief Factor of the fort, held the first 1825

services in his house.

The Reverend Herbert Beaver held the first Holy Communica at 1836 the Chief Factor's house. From this event we trace our history. He left the fort in 1838.

Services from the Book of Common Prayer were conducted by 1838-1860

officers of the HBC each week.

- The Reverend John McCarty served as the U.S. Army Mounted 1853 Rifles Battalion Chaplain. In this year St. Luke's congregation worshi ped together for the first time. The church was a converted school house.
- The Church was consecrated as St. Luke's Church by Bishop 1860 Scott, D. D.
- 1868 · ... and incorporated as a parish. St. Luke's was the hub of the new community. The city's social functions were usually centered around the church. Priests were very, very poor and just managed to survive on the Alms and donations they received.

1869 St. Luke's Parochial School was first opened.

- A new and larger church was started at 8th and C Street. It 1871 was to be the second St. Luke's.
- The Church was first used. Work continued very slowly. The 1873 church was reaching outward with missions establised at Battle Ground. Orchards and Sifton.

With the completion of the tower, the work on the church was 1884 finally completed.

A semi-Centennial was held. The old church was still standing 1903 adn was used as a residence. It has since burned down.

1909-1913 A Rectory was built by the Church.

1931 December 6, a fire broke out after church services that morning. Attempts to put it out were fruitless. The Rector managed to save all carriable things, but all larger things were lost. The Fire Department saved surrounding buildings but the wooden structure was a complete loss. Damage estimated \$5,000.

A third church as 26th and F Sts. was dedicated. It is our 1932[.] bell tower and chapel today. St. Luke's Hall burned down ('located at 8th). It was never rebuilt.

PRESERVING OLD PHOTOGRAPHS

The idea of preserving photographs immediately brings forth two meanings of the work "preserve." (1) The preserving of the original print that was made by the original photographer, was in the posession of someone in the past, and now is in our posession. It could have originated one and a half centuries ago, and still it retains an understandable image! These originals certainly should be treated in such a manner that they will survive as long as possible. (2) The preserving of the image idea by copying the original to have something to view and handle while preserving the original. I willaddress #2 with brevity and #1 at somewhat greater length.

Copying a photograph is a relatively simple process. One merely takes a picture of the original and then either himself makes a print or has one made. A close-up lens, a tripod, and the light from a window are all that are needed. The original is not damaged in any way, and the resulting copy can be printed in any convenient size. This method provides a negative that should be carefully cataloged since it can be used to produce more prints of the copy.

Now, about those old prints you wish to preserve. Perfect preservation would involve control of the following eight factors: light; temperature; humidity; sulphur; chlorine; glue and cement; envelopes, albums, etc; and physical damage (spots, abrasions, rips, etc.).

The image on the photograph (except for daguerreotypes) is formed from microscopic particles of silver suspended in gelatine and coated on paper. It, being formed from silver, is a stable image and should last forever. One or more of the above factors can cause a change in the silver image. However, in conjunction with other factors it could accelerate bleaching. Therefore, keep photographs out of light especially direct sunlight.

Temperature and humidity go hand in hand in our homes. An environment of low humidity and temperature would be ideal for photographs, the lower the better. If the photographs can be stored someplace where there is some protection from moisture and heat, the images will last longer. A refrigerator or freezer would be ideal.

It is difficult in this area of paper mills and other environ-ment-polluting industries to protect our photographs from sulphur and chlorine. They both enter into reactions with the silver to to alter, its' color. Images that fade into invisibility may have been bleached in the same way that paper mills bleach paper. Ideally photographs should be kept in a vacuum.

A heavy contributor to image bleaching or changing color is glue, mucilage, or cement that has been used to fasten pictures to cards, pages, etc. Nany adhesives contain volatile solvents and/or mucilagenous materials that liberate gasses as they disintegrate. This also applies to "photo corners." Albums protect prints from light, physical damage, and to some extent temperature and humidity change. However, the very paper that comes in contact with the prints is likely to be of low grade containing harmful chemicals and gasses. Bond 100% rag paper is most likely to be washed free of print damaging chemicals. If paper must come in contact with your prints, try to assure that it's good quality. Envelopes would appear to be the answer, but this writer has seen photos on which is a perfect imprint of the glue used on the flaps! It happened slowly, as the glue disintegrated. If envelopes must be used they can be made from bond paper folded over and held together on the edges by double stick Scotch tape. That is the only tape that has been adequately tested at this time.

If a photograph has become soiled or spotted it is feasible to try a small amount of cleaning yourself. First, gently brush the surface, and then using a Q-tip moistened in water, gently try the effect of the water in a small corner of the print. Allow it to dry. If there is no loosening of the emulsion or other bad effect, gently swab the spot. Let dry before touching it. Do not touch the surface of a daguerreotype: It has a different system of image formation.

The report, "Preserving Your Historical Records, A Symposium" from Drake University, available in the CCGS library, deals with these subjects in technical detail. Those wanting an in-depth analysis will find it interesting. It is located on the reference shelf.

A point that should be made is that badly faded photographs often can be improved by the copying process. A person skilled in the use of films and developers can increase the contrast, and in some cases make parts of the image appear that were not visible. There are some local studios that specialize in restoring old photos, and do remarkably well. Since the image is not visible, one is likely to think it is not there. "Au contraire!" It has merely changed to an invisible compound of silver. There are some laboratories that specialize in the reconstruction of such images. It's expensive, but making visible some aspect of history might easily be worth it. To contact such a lab, make inquiries of The Nathonal Archives, Preservation Services Division, Washington, D. C.

NOTICE FROM NATIONAL ARCHIVES

effective September 1, 1981 the National Archives instituted two changes in its pricing and payment policies on mail requests for copies of veterans record files.

1. The cost for reproduction of each record file was increased from \$3 to \$5. This is the first increase in 5 years. Fore than 200,000 requests annually for veterans records includes pension files, bountyland applications and military service records.

2. A prepayment policy was put into effect. Customers are requested to send payment with their orders when the total cost is known. When not known, a price quotation can be obtained by requesting the order form for copies of veterans records--NATF Form 26. Write to: Military Service Records (NNCC), National Archives, Washington, DC 20408.

LIBRARY - UPDATE

"Mapping" Your Ancestry . . . Maps can be of great value to the genealogical research. You may have already used county and township plats, but have you investigated the use of quadrangle or topographical maps? In addition to the physical features of the terrain, such as hills, rivers and valleys, these maps often show churches, buildings, roads, towns and villages, cemeteries and county boundary lines. They are marked on the maps by means of symbols. Many times these features were named after the people who once lived there.

Whether you are merely interested in studying the area your ancestor lived in, or are trying to locate an old cemetery where they were buried, the quadrangle map can be of much importance.

"Quadrangle" or topographical maps are published by the U.S. Geological Survey. The maps were printed at various times, but even if the map you desire is out of print, the U.S.G.S. Map Service can make you a photo-copy of their file copy for a reasonable fee. They are usually \$1.25 each.

To find the quadrangle of your area of interest you will first need an INDEX MAP. These are free. You simply write and request a copy for the State of your choice. The index map will show what maps are available, with the date the map was made. The older maps usually cover a larger area, they are subsequently replaced with maps showing smaller area but greater detail. Instructions accompany your index map with your order.

C.C.G.S. is currently attempting to secure a set of index maps for our library. When a map that you have used has served it's purpose, why not give it to our library where it's usefulness may continue by helping others.

KNIGHT FAMILY CEMETERY

this old Family cemetery is located just off the old Evergreen Highway, three miles West of Camas on the property of Leendert Groenevelt. It is east of the house and across the pasture. There are large cedar trees and poplar trees with the remnants of broken tombstones leaning against them. Blackberry vines cover much of the grour

Because the marker has been destroyed, there is no way to identify the grave of Joel Knight. History tells us that he played an important part in the development of both the county and the state.

Records show that Joel Knight was born inKent County, England, on April 5, 1808. He emigrated to the United States and lived in New York, Massachusetts and Iowa. His wife's name was Amelia.

The family arrived in Vancouver on Oct. 21, 1853. The records indicate that Mr. Knight was a doctor. He was a member of the Washington Territorial Legislature. He died April 1, 1868.

The cemetery is very overgrown with brush and vines. We found only a few readable markers.

MT. PLEASANT CEMETERY

This is an old, sadly neglected cemetery in western Skamania County, Washington. It is found by traveling east of Washougal on Highway 14 to M.P. 22.99 to Marble Rd. turning left. About & mile up the road on the left is a building that used to be the Mt. Pleasant School, but is now a private home. The cemetery lies back down along the road behind the garage. It is across the road from the present Mt. Pleasant School. The headstones are scattered here and there under towering fir trees and ground brush. Many of the stones are fallen over, many metal markers are unreadable. The cemetery is the property of the Mt. Pleasant Grange. The earliest headstone we found was 1884, the most recent was 1963. Mrs Della Miller, M.P. 22 75L, Washougal, has what few records exist.

Milt and I had a fine time playing croconolo (?). I think your ma looks so much better your father said his back hurt him ell1 I go along very well today I never got a whipping today. Milt said he was going to whip me but I guess he forgot it, he said he very near beat me playing crocouole I received some nice birthday presents. Ma got me a Brocaded Black silk waist. Ina got me 2 large hair Pins with Eight pearl sets on them, Ella Sent me two alful large apples. I sent Ella a large sweet potato.

Ina has been having h r spring fixed up. Sidney Burdoin has been working here and our neighbor Boys, the two ner Johnsons have been working here Ina had the spring dug out and cememted inside and out the wall is ten feet high she is having dirt scraped up around the wall. she is thinking about building a hotel over there, we received a letter from Robert not long ago is is Enjoying good health. Bro. Joe in Kansas has been out and made Robert a visit. he stayed four weeks. they had a fine time fishing while they were out fishing one day some men came up on horse back and rode out in the stream and spear fish five feet long and showed they told him that would be quite a fish story to go back to Kansas and tell that people fished on horse back, but is was so Joe said if he could sell his place he would move to Oregon. Tom was down to Kansas on a visit about two weeks ago. he stayed Eleven days. pa's youngest Sister Aunt Maria Edgmaud that lives in Kansas is very low they dont expect her to live ma and did not get to take our visit down there I dont Expect we will get to go. Grandpa is having such poor health he has had seven weak spells inside of the last month seems like just the least bit of Exercise more than he is used to makes him so weak he cant stand up, I am afraid this winter will be alful hard on him. Barsha Elson was out and went Back over a week ago. she was in to see grandpa a few minutes two evenings. Old Mr. Glaus was burried last week and the Old lady Cass and some little child were burried week before last. they are having protracted meeting at the Methodist church held by Rev. Horn we were out to church to night he is not as good speaker as Mr. Tho nfrue I dont think, they and two mourners down at the bench to night some young Boy and girl you had ought to have heard hartley sing tonight I dont belive you have forgotten how he Sings Mr. Nute Tabler and family are out visiting his father. Mrcle? Jonny? Tabler. they have out over a month, they have one grown son, Ernie, he was out to church with Cora Bracewell tonight. weddings are the fad of the Day. Ellen Sears and Arch Dunbar were married about three weeks ago - we attended their wedding and Innfair at Mr. Dunbars, had a real nice time. Henry Hamilton he came from K.Y. not long ago. he hasn't been out here more than four months and Lissa Holder were married at Corydon. and Last wednesday Hattie Marrick and Will Wolf were married at Alerton at Mr Burn's and Thursday Francis Paddock and Dock Cravens were married at Corydon. I am just wondering who will be the next. Mr. Dunbar bought Tom's place paid \$4100.00. I think Ellen and Arch are going to live there. I don't Know just what Tom's will do. John Hampton and wife and Orvil and wife left for Kansas about two weeks ago. they bought an Eighty apiece down there. John's place had a house on it and Orvils didnt. Port Johnson has sold out to Mr. John Travis and I hear Carrie and Ely Clapp are going to live on the place. I want to ask you a question do have lots of everything good to Eat at the place you board? Al, Barkers new House looks real nice we can see it from our house plain.

Mr. and Mrs Barker and Edna & Jake were over at our house last Sunday and stayed all day. I have been wanting to visit the barker school but I have never got started yet, we did not go to the fair at Corydon. we went to the Lineville fair two Evening, it was so very dusty, their floral hall was nicer this year than it has been for a long time but they didnt have anything Else but races. Jess Elson had a race horse, there it was pretty. The Priceton band was there and played for them. Bill Elson has gone to Eureka Spring Ark., Dick and Tom and Mr. Elson all went with him. I dont Expect he will live long, he has not talked above a whisper this summer No. Burt I didnot get one of your pictures. they said you would send me one so I didnt get any.

Ina and I havent had any pictures taken yet I have been wanting to get some taken, I think we will be fore long.

You remember Mrs. Jennison that was sent away to the insane asylum she was Mr. Staudifords sister she died week before last and they Brought her back here and burried her at the Clio Cemetry. there has been several new stories put up, up here well I must close for it is getting late it struck Eleven just a few minutes ago, and I am not used to setting up late so good night, dont wait as long I did to answer I will try and do better in the future. (Excuse poor writing)
