

### 1871 CANADIAN CENSUS

When searching through the 1871 Canadian census for your missing relatives, you will find that there are indeed nine schedules for each town or village. They are as follows:

- 1. Nominal Return of the Living
- 2. Nominal Return of the Deaths within the Last Twelve Months
- 3. Return of Public Institutions, Real Estate, Vehicles and Implements
- 4. Return of Cultivated Land, of Field Products and of Plants and Fruit
- 5. Livestock, Animal Products, Home-Made Fabrics and Furs
- 6. Return of Industrial Establishments
- 7. Return of Products of the Forest
- 8. Return of Shipping and Fisheries
- 9. Return of Mineral Products

The Nominal Return of the Living is the one you would be most interested in, as it would list family members, with their age, county or province of birth, religion, origin, occupation, and marital status. This return lists everyone in the census for a household on the day the census taker called, which sometimes resulted in a family member being missed or in another household.

When searching this return, often researchers have been stumped when trying to decifer the religion. Sometimes the religion is abbreviated. Below is a list of some of the religions that may be found in the census listings:

To be noted is that many of one religion settled in an area together.

Although the Nominal Return of the Living would be the most beneficial in your research, don't neglect the other eight returns completely. When you find your family on the Nominal Return of the Living, remember to note the page number and the line number of the head of the household. Returns 3 through 9 do not show your family's surname, but are referenced by the page and line number in the town or village where you found them in the first return. One valuable clue that may be found in the Return of Public Institutions, Real Estate, Vehicles and Implements is whether the person living there was the owner or a tenant and what the concession and lot number was of that particular piece of land. Finding this information could open many more doors, if you were to use that information and obtain an abstract and deeds of that property. It may be interesting to the researcher to find out how many acres their ancestor owned, how many barns, stables, carriages, sleighs, wagons, ploughs, cultivators and reapers he owned. In the Return of Cultivated Land, of Field Products and of Plants and Fruits, you may be interested in knowing how much of his acreage is improved, how much is pasture, what crops were cultivated (wheat, oats, peas, or potatoes) and how many bushels were produced. The Livestock, Animal Products, Home-Made Fabrics and Furs Return may show your ancestor to have owned 2 horses over 3 years old, 5 milch cows, 5 other horned cattle, 14 sheep, and 2 swine, how many of those cattle or sheep were killed or sold for slaughter, how many pounds of butter and wool were produced. In the Return of Products of the Forest, you may find he produced 14 cords of wood. The Return of Industrial Establishments may show your ancestor to be the owner of a butcher shop, with 300 capital invested, working 8 months of the year, and having 1 male over 16 employed. This is only a small sampling of some of the things that may be found in these returns. Although much of the information found in returns 3 through 9 is only historical information, sometimes clues can be found here which lead to greater discoveries.

You may wish to check the Hillman Catalogue of Census Returns on Microfilm to see what returns are available for the counties and provinces you would be interested in. The L.D.S. Genealogy Library has many of these censuses on microfilm. Also, census microfilms may be obtained through the Fort Vancouver Regional Library on interlibrary loan.

### ORIGINAL NAMES

It has been asked why the surnames of Black, White, Grey, Brown and Green are so common while there are so few Blues, Reds and Yellows.

Very many surnames derive from where a man came from, lived or held land. Others owe their origin to nicknames, appearance or human behavior and many more are occupational surnames.

The Blacks, Whites, Greys and Browns all come from early medieval times and are based on the appearance of our ancestors; the first Mr. Green probably lived near the village green or woodland.

Red, indicating someone with red hair or red face, is not at all uncommon and appears nowadays in the thousands of Reeds, Redheads, Redmans, and so on. The colors blue and yellow are not common human features, and so were not tagged on as surnames when the need for people to have more than one name arose.

In the London telephone directory there are 42 surname entries starting with Blue and three starting with Yellow.

The Washington State Genealogical Society has adopted a centennial project that will be of special interest to any direct descendant of an individual who was in Washington prior to November 11, 1889. Here are some answers to questions you might have about the project:

What geographic area is involved? Only the area that is included in the present boundaries of the state of Washington.

Did they have to stay if I can prove they were here?
No, as long as you can prove residency at some time prior to the date of statehood.

What do you mean by direct descendant?
The individual who is receiving the certificate must be a son or daughter, grandson or granddaughter, etc. of the pioneer.

What kind of proof do I need?
Your proof must be official records--census, deeds, land records, birth certificates, marriage records, court records, church records, wills, etc. You must submit copies of your proof with the application.

Can I use family histories or county histories?
NO, only official records or contemporary newspaper accounts will be accepted.

Both of my grandparents were here. Can I get a certificate with both names on it?
Yes. If you supply both names and the proof for each.

What is the cost? \$5 is the base cost but if you order additional certificates for other descendants from the same ancestor, you only pay \$3 for those. However, these must be ordered AT THE SAME TIME as your certificate.

What do I receive?
You will receive an attractive, framable 8 1/2 x 11 certificate printed on cream paper with green ink. The certificate has the names of the pioneer or pioneers and your name (the descendant who is applying).

How do I begin?
You can obtain an application form from your local genealogical society or by writing to this address: WSGS Pioneer Project, c/o Dee Ackerman, 3235 Alderwood Avenue, Bellingham, WA 98225.
Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope when writing.

What else is involved in this project?
As the final phase the Washington State Genealogical Society will publish a book presenting information about Washington pioneers whose descendants have received certificates. This will be done by the state's centennial in 1989.

# LIBRARY UPDATE

During the past few months due to the generosity of many of our members, the C.C.G.S. Library has acquired many interesting and worthwhile books of genealogical worth plus other miscellaneous material. In addition, the remainder of the 1910 Federal Census of Washington has been ordered.

A group of family pictures consisting of four large photographs and a variety of smaller ones has been received. It is estimated that these are from the early 1900's. Surnames inscribed on the back of the photos are Stafford and Stranahan, ancestors of Marion Schuman. It is also noted that these lines may have descended from Ralph Waldo Emerson. These may be viewed and examined in the library. The smaller pictures are being placed in the vertical file.

Members who have been requesting records of vital statistics from various states have probably found out by trial and error that many of the fees have been raised in the past couple of years. In the meantime reference may be made to "Gila Heritage" (a new periodical exchange published in Payson, AZ). Page 3, Vol. 3, No. 3, August 1985, for an up-to-date list of "Where to Write for Birth and Death Records". The most recent catalog of "Where to Write for Birth, Death, Marriage and Divorce Records" is on order and will soon be available for use in the library.

There is not enough space here to list all the new exchanges of periodicals that have been acquired during the past year. They, however will be listed in the new directory. Do consult the periodical card file where all new exchanges are listed and cross referenced. Periodicals are filed according to the area (county or city) in which they are published. Therefore, when referring to the card file, it is necessary to make use of the cross referencing system in order to locate a certain periodical.

It is realized that there are very few books on Alabama and Mississippi in our library (actually not many available in print). However, there are several excellent periodicals available on the periodical shelf; namely, "Alabama Family History & Genealogy News"published by North Central Alabama Genealogical Society of Cullman, AL (all information in this one is confined to family surnames) and "Natches Trace Newsletter" published by Natchez Trace Genealogical Society of Florence, AL. There are now two periodicals available in the library on Mississippi; "The Skipworth Historical and Genealogical Society Newsletter" from Lafayette County, MS and "Tate Trails" from Tate County, Mississippi Historical Society of Senatobia, MS (new exchange).

Georgia researchers will find the periodical, "Ancestoring" from the Augusta Genealogical Society an excellent source of information. There are a manual of back issues on the shelf as well those up to the fall of 1985. This periodical contains many early church records, Augusta cemetery records, voter's registration records and many articles of genealogical interest.

Martin for his descendents and pioneers of that area. The cemetery now located in Cowlitz County, was previously part of Clark County. These records were compiled by Ruth H. Lane of Woodland.

Notes: The abbreviation "mkr" has been used when the grave site is only marked by the Funeral Home marker. The abbreviation "mkr" with data enclosed in parenthesis has been used when the Funeral Home marker is still at the site besides the grave stone. Names indented under another appear on the same stone. Names with an asterisk are also on the same stone. Additional data of some of the pioneers, when known by the compiler, has been added in parenthesis.

### THE LANGUAGE OF GENEALOGY

Genealogy, like any other specialized subject, has its own special language. For example, when doing genealogical research, we "hunt" for ancestors or information. We "dig" and "trace" our ancestors, seeking for anything which will bring us the needed information. At times we may come across terms which are not familiar. If we are in a hurry, we may not take the time to look them up, but assume we know what they mean. It might pay us to check those terms. Knowing their correct meaning can have a bearing on our future research. Let's look at some of these terms and their meanings.

PRIMARY SOURCES: This is a term which may be loosely used, and whose real meaning may be lost. Strictly speaking, primary sources are those sources which provide information first-hand. PUBLIC RECORDS, such as DEEDS, WILLS, CONTRACTS, AGREEMENTS, INDENTURES, VITAL STATISTICS, MAPS, and CENSUS RECORDS fit into this category. So does ORAL EVIDENCE from knowledgeable elder people, those individuals who knew first hand the information they provide. Other primary sources are INSURANCE POLICIES, FAMILY PAPERS, DRAWINGS, LETTERS, JOURNALS and DIARIES, POSTCARDS, INVENTORIES, PHOTOGRAPHS, STORE ACCOUNTS, PURCHASE ORDERS, BILLS OF LADING, and PAPERS of other relatives, friends, and neighbors.

SECONDARY SOURCES: This term covers information taken from second-hand, not primary, sources. Among the most ususal secondary sources are newspaper stories, advertisements for lost property, lists of items for sale, newspaper and other reports of marriages, deaths, business ventures or social activities. Books, too, are usually a secondary source as their contents often come from other, usually primary, or even secondary sources.

As you can imagine, primary sources would be preferred to secondary ones as the information is more likely to be correct. However, you may not always be able to find primary sources and thus may have no option. You have to rely on secondary sources sometimes. In any case, you should try and find primary source information. Don't assume it doesn't exist. To prevent later research problems, it's good to check primary sources against secondary sources, and if they don't agree, look further to prove which is correct. Primary sources can be inaccurate, too.

BANNS: This is a term used to indicate that two individuals have openly proclaimed they wish to be married. The announcement is therefore publicly proclaimed, usually in church. The publishing of banns was for the purpose of permitting anyone to bring forth reasons why the proposed marriage should not be performed.

COMMON LAW: An unwritten law that becomes binding because it has been followed for centuries. Today it is usually found in connection with the marriage state. A common law marriage is one which is not legally performed by an official, but the couple lives together, and are accepted as man and wife.

CUM TESTAMENTO ANNEXO: "C.T.A.", this is a Latin term meaning "with the state attached."

CONSORT: A term which often embarrasses the unknowledgeable, it is merely another term for spouse, and may be used for either husband or wife.

DOWER: In early days, a woman brought something, an inheritance, money or property, to the marriage. This was her dower. Husbands often gave their wives a life estate in the property when he dies so that the widow had a place to live. This was also called a dower.

EDOM DIE: A Latin term found in court records meaning "the same day" or "the same place."

ET AL: A Latin term meaning "and others" or "among others."

ET UXOR: A Latin term, often found written as "ET UX" and meaning "and wife."

FEE SIMPLE: An estate without restrictions of any kinds.

FREEHOLD: Property held by an individual. He was a "FREEHOLDER."

GLEBE: The land belonging to a church, or which was given to the minister as a part of his salary.

IMPRIMUS: A Latin term meaning "in the first place" or "first." Often found in wills.

INDENTURE: A deed or agreement of some sort which was written in two parts on one piece of paper. This paper was then cut or torn apart by a ragged tear so that only those two identical pieces of paper would fit together. Each party to the agreement held a copy. If the two pieces did not fit when demanded, it was cause for suspicion that one was a forgery. The document could be any legal agreement. Often an indenture is thought of, and did pertain to, the binding out of a young boy or girl to someone to learn a trade.

INMATE: A term usually found in tax records. It denotes someone who is renting a property, but does not own land.

INTESTATE: Used in connection with the settlement of an individual's estate. It indicates that the person did not have a will, or that none could be found.

IPSO FACTOR: A Latin term meaning "by the act itself."

LEGACY: A bequest, or grant, or personal property to someone, usually given in a will.

MESSUAGE: A term denoting that there is a dwelling house and possibly other buildings on a property.

MUNIMENT: Proof in writing by which someone can defend his title to some property.

NUNCUPATIVE WILL: A will made verbally, rather than being written down. Often called a "deathbed" will.

PATENT: The granting of title to government land by the government itself. This may be a national or state (colonial government).

QUIT RENT: A payment whereby tenants on land were free from paying other services to the landowner.

RELICT: A widow.

SINE DIE: A Latin term meaning "indefinitely" or "without date."

There are many other terms used in genealogy, and these may be found in some genealogical books. If you find others you have not come across before, write them down for future reference.

Small town newspapers - place ads for information.

Estate settlements - available whether or not there was a will.

Send queries to local genealogical societies.

Cemetery records - often with relatives who completed arrangements.


