

I am also interested in hearing from you what you would like to see in the Trail Breakers. I have received many articles and short "fillers" since I have been editor; I try to pick those which I believe would be of most interest to the majority of members and/or readers. Keep sending them in! If you have knowledge or experience in a certain area of research and would like to write an article for a future issue, please get in touch with me.

Many of you may not be aware of the process involved in publishing the Trail Breakers. Let me briefly explain:

CCGS members submit ancestor charts, queries, and Bible records to the appropriate staff member. Articles and fillers are also submitted directly to the editor.

Staff members type the information they receive and submit to the editor. The editor also receives Book Reviews (from Frances Harris), Vancouver Register articles (from Kitty Oman), and a Library Update (from Doris Wastradowski).

The editor presumably by this time has the lead.

The editor presumably by this time has the lead, continuing, and any miscellaneous articles already typed. The editor compiles all the information, types in filler as needed, indexes the issue, and then submits the 40+ pages to the publication staff.

The publication staff (consisting of Kitty Oman, Rose Marie Harshman, and several helpers) print, sort, assemble, and prepare the issue for mailing. The Trail Breakers miraculously appears in each member's mailbox.

Please note: The process begins and ends with you, members of CCGS. Without you there would not be a Trail Breakers.

GENEALOGICAL FILING SYSTEM by Peggy Roberts

Over the past several years I have observed many different "filing systems" used by genealogical researchers. I have tried some or parts of these systems. Some I found didn't meet my needs; others I found too involved. I finally came up with a compilation of several different methods which make up my system. In sharing my filing system and tracking system with you, possibly you will see some ideas here which might work for you.

My filing system consists of a four drawer filing cabinet, a bookcase, a set of notebooks, and most currently, computer files.

My bookcase has one shelf of just genealogy-related books - a few county histories, atlases, some periodicals, phone directories from other areas, and research guides. Although I don't have an extensive library, it does help to keep all these research books together.

My set of notebooks consists of the following:

Surname notebooks: Each notebook contains the family group sheets or individual sheets of a certain direct ancestor surname. Occasionally a few surnames are combined in one notebook when not much information is yet available on those names. Within each notebook, sheets are filed in numerical order by each individual person's number. Since I have begun to enter data in the computer this past year, my numbering system has changed, which has only rearranged some sheets within the surname notebooks.

Surname index notebook: This contains lists (numerical and alphabetical) of persons found in each surname notebook for quick reference.

Expense and Correspondence Log: This is a two-part notebook. The first part is a listing of all monies I spend for memberships, books, film rentals, postage, birth/death/marriage records, etc. The second part is a record of correspondence, where I list the following information on any letter I have written: name/address, information requested/money sent, date of reply, information received-yes or no.

Research notebook: This notebook is a tracking method of research that has already been done; and although the tracking is sometimes a little time consuming, it has many times saved me from doing the same research over again. This notebook is divided into three sections, as follows:

Census Microfilms: There is a sheet for each surname being researched. On a sheet are listed the microfilm number, description (year, state or province/county), and results (none found, found and copied, found but didn't copy, etc.) of each census microfilm read. When more than one surname has been searched for on a microfilm, it is listed on each surname sheet.

Research Log: The form used in this section was obtained through the LDS Library and contains the ancestor's name, the collection or call number (film or book number), description of source, and results. Sheets are kept by surname and information is entered on any microfilms (except censuses) or books that have been researched. Also indicated is the date the research was done.

Census Indexes: These again are forms arranged by surname. Each form lists each U.S. census year and every state for that year which has an index in book form. Every year/state is circled when a search has been made for that particular surname.

Research To Do notebook: This notebook gets the most wear as it is the one I carry whenever I go to one of the libraries to do research. In it I keep notes of research I want to do next time I go to the LDS library, the CCGS library, the Vancouver Public Library, the Genealogical Forum, etc. (I have lists for each library and add to them as ideas occur.) I also keep a list of census microfilms (with surnames I'm looking for) to be researched in the future; occasionally one of these are available at one of the libraries.

Also kept in this notebook are my ancestor charts for quick reference when away from home and surname outlines which I have compiled. Each outline contains dates and events (births, marriages, deaths, purchases of property, census showing, tax list, etc.) of a certain surname in chronological order. When new events are uncovered they are noted on the list and every so often the outline is updated.

My filing cabinet holds all the information I have extracted, documents I have obtained, correspondence I have received, etc. These papers are kept in files according to a direct ancestor name. A hanging file is set up for each direct ancestor (showing grandfather's and grandmother's name). Within each file are at least three folders: one for the grandfather, one for the grandmother, and one for the "children of" this couple (and their descendents). Each file contains that documentation pertaining to that particular person or persons. If a lot of information is available on the children, a folder is set up for each child (which also contains his descendents). Once the information found on these documents are noted on family group sheets, I rarely need to get into these files.

VANCOUVER REGISTER

The "VANCOUVER REGISTER" has been abstracted from microfilm on file at the Clark County Historical Society and the Fort Vancouver Library by ROSE MARIE JONAS and Mr. and Mrs. RICHARD GRAFTON, members of C.C.G.S.

<u>Saturday, February 10, 1866 - Vol. 1 #22</u>

DEATH OF DOCTOR HENRY--We copy from the "Illinois State Journal," published at Springfield, Ill., of the 16th of October last, the following tribute to the memory of the late Dr. A. G. HENRY, of this Territory. Its publication in this paper will be gratifying to his friends.

Our dispatches, a few days ago, announced the loss, on the 28th of July, of the steamship Brother Johnathan, bound from San Francisco to Portland, Oregon, together with two or three hundred passengers. Among the lost we observe the name of our former fellow townsman, Doctor A. G. HENRY. He was, we presume, on his return home from this state, where he had been visiting for a short time.

Doctor HENRY lived and practiced his profession in this city for many years, and was one of the earliest pioneers to Sangamon Co. Being an active, busy and pushing man, he took a prominent part in all public matters, and thus become generally favorably known throughout the State. He emigrated, with his family, to Oregon about fifteen years ago, and has ever since made his home upon the Pacific coast. For a number of years he corresponded regularly for the Journal, and through his letters, gave the people of Central Illinois the first reliable intelligence of the resources, and capabilities of that then unsettled region.

Of late years we had quite lost sight of the Doctor, until we met him here last April. It appears that he had been to Washington, soliciting office at the hand of President Lincoln, and was there at the time of his assassination. He was subsequently appointed by President JOHNSON, as Surveyor General of Washington Territory, and was on his return to discharge the duties of the office, when he met his death in the dreadful calamity which overtook the steamer Brother Johnathan.

Those who knew Doctor HENRY best, say he was a kind hearted and genial gentleman, affectionate in his household and amiable in all the relations of life. We are not acquainted with his age, but presume at the time of his death he must have been nearly sixty years. [2/6]

THOUGHT HE HAD IT

On the 3d inst., two men, J. J. BUSH and GEORGE W. WRIGHT, made their exit from the Multnomah county jail without the parting compliments. Sheriff STITZEL immediately offered a reward for their arrest. One of our vigilant corps of city police officers, probably somewhat excited by the prospect of the reward which should follow, valiantly seized "a bowld sojer boy" belonging to the glorious 14th, on last Sunday, thinking that he certainly had the (W)right man. On Monday morning he marched his prisoner on board the Fannie Troup, and was soon at the Sheriff's office in our neighboring metropolis. There he was informed that his exertions were vain and his labor lost - he didn't have the man the sheriff wanted to see. WRIGHT was caught, however, on Monday, near the Cascades, and returned in safety to his former quarters.

On Wednesday of this week the mortal remains of Mr. NYE were consigned to the grave. The services were under the charge of the Masons, of which Order Mr. NYE was a member. Any exceedingly appropriate and impressive discourse was delivered by Rev. Dr. MCCARTY, after which a very large procession followed the hearse to the grave. The occasion was solemn and instructive. We were only speaking of the fact of the attendance of those societies of which Mr. AIRD was a member. We were glad to see that society present, and assure its members that it was the farthest from our thoughts to overlook them on any particular.

Saturday, February 24, 1866 - Vol. 1 #24

WM. A. RUSSELL has recently arrived in Oregon to settle up the affairs of his brother the late Brigadier General RUSSELL, one of the "dead on the field of battle." Gen. RUSSELL left many friends on this coast when he went east at the outbreak of the war. PHIL SHERIDAN was then his Lieutenant. He was one of Sheridan's Lieutenants when he was killed in one of the battles of the Shenandoah. His name is recorded in that great honored list, the roll of freedom.

The Idaho Statesman says that Corporal BURKE who was killed in the late Indian fight had come unhurt out of twenty-three battles of the rebellion. It seems almost a sacrifice to set such men up as a mark for Smoke Indians to shoot at. [2/2]

FERD. PATTERSON, the notorious fighter, who had himself killed several men, has at length met death in the same way in which he had been instrumental in visiting it upon others. He was shot at Walla Walla by a man named THOS. DONAHUE who fired into his body several balls. This violent killing is always horrible, and in the great majority of cases those who thus take life at last lose their own in the same manner. It is said PATTERSON sacrificed bright prospects as a young man to depravity and crime. Such is a horrible life to live and a still more horrible death to die. [2/4]

A horrible tragedy has lately been enacted near Brownsville, Linn county, Oregon. A Mr. SMITH and his wife were found dead, and the statement made by a brother of SMITH that SMITH had killed his wife and then himself. Several suspicious circumstances led to the arrest THOMAS SMITH as the murderer, and so strong were the evidences that at the preliminary examination, some 300 persons attending, there was a strong feeling in favor of hanging him. It is probable that a most brutal murder has been committed.

<u>Saturday, March 24, 1866 - Vol. 1 #28</u>

Two men, named MOTT and BROWN, were murdered by Indians near Ruby City, I.T., on the 2d inst. There is an intense feeling caused by these outrages. The Indians are well armed and the citizens are becoming alarmed for their safety.

A man by the name of BENJAMIN POWERS was frozen to death on the night of the 12th inst., near Canyon City. [2/6]

A man by the name of BADUE was killed a few days since, in or near one of the dens of infamy and pollution of which Portland can boast more, for its size, than any other city in the United States. Of BADUE as a man we know nothing, but we do know him as the representative of a class of men, and his fate is a sad warning to all others to show the way he traveled. Most of the men who live such lives and die such deaths have abilities that might win distinction and honor, but they throw their youth away in idleness, and their early manhood in drinking and debauching, and violence closes their days. REV. JOSEPH DURGAN - On Sabbath morning last, at about half past five o'clock, Rev. JOSEPH DURGAN, one of the most aged gentlemen in the county and perhaps the Territory died very suddenly and unexpectedly. Having a very vigorous constitution, he was hardly ever, in his long life of over seventy-six years, unable to attend business affairs. a few days preceding his death, he had complained of being somewhat unwell, but was yet able to be on the streets. On Saturday he was at the place of business of his sons G. W. DURGAN & Co., and though speaking of a feeling of weakness, gave no unusual evidence of disease. He retired to rest Saturday evening in his usual state of health, apparently, and slept undisturbed through the night. little after five in the morning of Sunday, while his son was kindling a fire his attention was arrested by a slight moan, and going to the room occupied by his father and mother, he found the former lying in apparent repose but just gasping his last. He had evidently suffered no pain, not even awakening out of slumber, as his eyes were closed, and every feature was in the repose of sleep, but he was dead.

Mr. DURGAN was a native of New Hampshire, but had resided in Maine, Ohio, Illinois, from which State he crossed the plains in 1854 and settled in Clarke county, where he has always since resided. He was surrounded here by a large and highly respectable family of sons and daughters, and his desire seemed to be to live among them, enjoying their society, and caring for his own necessities, until the last.

His funeral services were attended at the M.E. Church on Tuesday, where a very large attendance of the people of the county evidenced the respect in which the deceased and his family were held by the people. Probably no other man in the Territory could be followed to the grave by so large a number of his children, grandchildren and relations as the deceased, and the manly and proper evidences of sorrow that large circle evidenced on the occasion of the funeral, showed the estimation in which they held the patriarch.

The white boy who escaped from the Sioux Indians a few months ago, and found his way to the camp of Col. KING and was by him taken to Jefferson City, has proved to be the son of Mr. SYLVESTER, who now resides in Albany, Oregon. The boy was stolen in 1861, while on his way to Oregon with his father's family, and has long been given up as lost by his parents and friends. His recovery is like bringing back the dead.

Research Tips:

NEW ENGLAND MARRIAGES - In New England, newly married men were often elected "Haywards". These were men married in the previous year. Sometimes the job was called "Hog Reeve". This can be an indication of when your ancestors were married. Check town records. If your ancestor was elected "hayward", subtract one year for the marriage date.

EARLY CLARK CO. PEOPLE

The following material was taken from a scrapbook of Early Clark County People compiled by Mildred Porter. This collection, which is in the CCGS Library, contains newspaper articles, obituaries, extracts from other books, and biographical sketches.

CHARLES L. FORBES

Charles L. Forbes was born at Algonac, Michigan, on the St. Clair river, on September 23, 1847. His parents were Charles P. and Hannah A. (Daniels) Forbes; the former was a native of Addison county, Vermont, his family being old New Englanders of Scotch descent.

When Charles L. was two years old his parents removed to Vermont where they lived until he was seven years old, when they went to Dodge county, Wisconsin, where he received his education in the common schools, meantime following farming principally. He also learned the printer's trade in the office of the Waupun (Wisconsin) Times. In 1874 he left Wisconsin and went to Nebraska, where he remained for one year and then in 1875 went to Portland Oregon. In 1876 he located at Pekin, Cowlitz county, and followed steamboating as engineer on the "Hydra". After three years at this occupation, he bought 160 acres of land where he now resides, situated three and one-half miles from La Center, Washington. He has forty acres cleared on which he raises hay, grain, potatoes, etc., besides having 300 apple and prune trees.

Mr. Forbes was married in Cowlitz county, on September 12, 1875, to Miss Adelaide Weir, a daughter of Captain Weir, of La Center. They have four children, viz: Bertrand, Myrtle, William and Bertha.

He is a member of La Center Grange No. 48, and was one of the organizers in 1890, of the Patrons of Husbandry and has held office in the order ever since its organization. He is a Democrat politically, but is a slave to no one party, being decidedly independent in his tendencies.

MARION EDWARD McIRVIN

Marion Edward McIrvin is a representative of one of the families early established in the Columbia river valley. He was born in Putnam county, Missouri, July 31, 1869, and came to Washington with his father across the plains, making the long and tedious journey which at length brought the family to Clarke county, Washington, where he was reared and educated. After putting aside his text-books he engaged with his father in the lumbering business near the Chehalis river for three

years and in 1883 he turned his attention to agricultural and commercial pursuits, purchasing in that year forty-one acres of land, including the present site of Felida. This land he cleared and thereon built a store and conducted a general merchandise business for fourteen In fact he became the founder of the town of Felida, named the place and through his influence the railroad station which was there established was also called Felida. Mr. McIrvin was appointed postmaster under President Harrison and continued to fill that position until 1904, when he disposed of his mercantile interests there and built his present residence. While conducting his store he set out an orchard of fifteen acres and became an active factor in developing the fruit raising interests of this locality. For the past three years he has been connected with the salmon fisheries, purchasing fish traps at Chinook, Washington.

In March, 1882, Mr. McIrvin, was married to Miss Etta May Lewis, of King county, Washington, and they now have seven living children; Harley A.; Elsie, the wife of Fay Davis, of Felida; Eldon; Ethel, the wife of Hugh Miller, of Vancouver; Earl; Vernie; and Clyde. They also lost a son, Lloyd, who was the seventh in order of birth.

Mr. McIrvin is well known in various lodges, holding membership with the Elks at Vancouver, the Red Men of Felida, the Odd Fellows Lodge at Felida and the encampment at Vancouver, while his is also a member of the Grange of Felida. It is characteristic of Mr. McIrvin that he carries forward to successful completion whatever he undertakes. In this he seems dominated by the resolute spirit and unfaltering purpose which characterized the early settlers who, coming to the west in pioneer times, have reclaimed this region for the purposes of ivilization and through its cultivation have made it a rich and prosperous district of the country.

MARY LORETTA ALLEN

OBITUARY: Mrs. Mary Loretta Allen of Fishers died of paralysis Sunday morning at the home of her son, C. M. Allen of 214 West Seventeenth street in Vancouver. She was aged 56 years, 5 months and 4 days.

She is survived by her husband, G. J. Allen of Fishers, four sons, C. M. Allen of Vancouver, G. S. Allen of Portland, A. D. Allen of Fishers and Willard Allen, who was living at home. There were two daughters, Mrs. E. A. Johnson of Portland and Mrs. Daniel Dupertius of Chehalis. Besides these, her father, S. S. Cook, aged 80 years of Fresno, Cal., and two brothers, Leslie Z. Cook of California and W. J. Cook of Portland, are left.

Mary Loretta Cook was born at Vernon, Turnbull county, Ohio, September 14, 1854. With her parents she immigrated to Missouri at the age of fourteen where she met and married Mr. Allen about two years later. They were married on July 4, 1870, at Hannibal, Missouri, where they lived for nine years.

In 1879 they came west to California where they stayed one year, coming to Portland where they stayed another year. They came to Clarke county in 1881 and bought their little farm at Fishers where they have lived ever since.

About seven years ago a slight stroke of paralysis was suffered but she entirely recovered from it, having a more severe one a little over two years ago. While her death was not unexpected it came as a shock to her family and friends. She came to Vancouver Saturday morning with her husband and son, expecting to have medical treatment. When in the office of Dr. H. W. Arnold while waiting for the doctor she was stricken for the last time.

She was taken to the home of her son, C. S. Allen where she died Sunday morning at 7 a.m.

Mrs. Allen was a member in good standing of the Epworth Methodist church of East Mill Plain. She was one of the charter members of the church and one of the seven to organize the first M. E. class of which she was active class leader for over twenty five years when ill-health caused her to resign.

She was always a friend to all in need or in trouble. There is scarcely a home in the community that will not always remember Mrs. Allen for her loving kindness and ministrations to those in need in time of sickness or death. The bereaved family have the sympathy of the entire community and their host of friends throughout the county.

The funeral was held Tuesday morning, Rev. Mr. Rossman conducting the services. Interment was in the family lot at Fishers cemetery.

CHARLES MERRITT ALLEN

DEATH TAKES EARLY RESIDENT. One of Clark county's pioneer residents, Charles Merritt Allen, 76, Camas, rt. 2, died early this morning at St. Joseph's hospital.

Allen came to Clark county in 1882, and he settled at Fisher's landing. He has resided in this area since then, except for a short period when he lived in Montana. He was born Oct. 20, 1872, in lannibal, Mo.

SOME TRAILS USED FOR EARLY UNITED STATES MIGRATION

<u>BAY PATH</u> - Extension of Great Trail from Springfield, MA to Windsor, CT.

BOONE'S WILDERNESS ROAD - In 1775 Daniel Boone expanded route through the Cumberland Gap to Boonesborough, KY.

BRADDOCK'S ROAD - Built in 1755 from Cumberland, MD to Fort Duquesne (now Pittsburgh, PA).

<u>CALIFORNIA TRAIL</u> - A route used from the 1840's to 1860's that began from a point on the Oregon Trail near South Pass, WY going to Sacramento, CA.

CATSKILL ROAD - Went from Boston, MA to Wattle's Ferry, New York.

CHOREKEE TRACE - Used in 1838-39 for Indian movement from North Carolina to Oklahoma, often referred to as "The Trail of Tears".

<u>CHISHOLM TRAIL</u> - Started in 1866 to move cattle from Wichita, KA through Oklahoma to Texas. Also used by many settlers.

CUMBERLAND ROAD - See National Road.

<u>DESERT TRAIL</u> - An extension of the Santa Fe Trail starting at Santa Fe, New Mexico and proceeding to California.

EL CAMINO REAL - (Spanish for "The Royal Highway") Began at San Diego, CA going north 530 miles to Sonoma, CA, connecting 21 Franciscan Missions, each mission being one days travel.

FORBES ROAD - See Pennsylvania State Road.

GIST TRACE - Extending from Fort Cumberland, MD to Wheeling, West Virginia, an extension of Braddock's Road.

GREAT GENESSE ROAD - From Utica, New York to Avon, New York.

GREAT TRAIL - From Boston, MA to New Haven, CT.

GREAT TRAIL - From New York to Detroit.

GREAT VALLEY ROAD - Starting at Philadelphia, PA through Knoxville, KY and on to Alabama.

GREAT NATIONAL PIKE - See National Road.

GREAT WAGON ROAD - Going from Philadelphia, PA to South Carolina.

GREENWOOD ROAD - From Hartford, CN to Albany, NY.

<u>KITTANNING PATH</u> - From Philadelphia, PA to Kittanning on the Allegheny River.

IROQUOIS TRAIL - In the Hudson Valley to the Mohawk Valley in New York.

<u>LAKE TRAIL</u> - Beginning at Albany, NW to Buffalo, NY and on to Cleveland, OH.

<u>LANCASTER TURNPIKE</u> - First chartered turnpike toll road in America opened in 1795 from Philadelphia to Lancaster, PA. Was 37 feet wide and it encouraged the building of other improved roads.

MOHAWK TRAIL - Route westward along the Mohawk River from Hudson River in New York to the Great Lakes. Its importance declined sharply after the building of the Erie Canal in 1825.

MORMAN TRAIL - From Nauvoo, IL to Salt Lake City, UT, closely following the Oregon Trail except being on the north side of the Platte River.

<u>NASHVILLE ROAD</u> - From Knoxville to Nashville, being north of the Old Walton Road.

<u>NATCHEZ TRACE</u> - A commercial and military route between Nashville, TN and Natchez, MS. Many pioneers would float their goods on flat boats down the Mississippi River to New Orleans often returning home on horseback along this route.

NATIONAL ROAD - Began in 1811, led from Cumberland, MD to Vandalia, IL. It opened up a large area west of the Ohio River to settlement. Sometimes known as Cumberland Road.

OLD CONNECTICUT PATH - Part of the Mohawk Turnpike extending from Boston, MA to Albany, NY.

<u>OLD NORTHWESTERN TURNPIKE</u> - From Winchester, VA to Parkersburg, VA (now WV).

<u>OLD WALTON ROAD</u> - Going from Knoxville to Nashville except south of Nashville Road.

OREGON TRAIL - Used from 1840's to 1860's almost exclusively by settlers starting at Independence, MO over South Pass, WY on to Willamette Valley in Oregon. Average journey in covered wagon took six months.

PENNSYLVANIA STATE ROAD - Also called Forbes Road. In 1758 Gen. John Forbes cut wagon road through Allegheny Mountains from Philadelphia, PA to fort Ligonier and on to Fort Duquesne (Pittsburgh). Many settlers moved west along this route.



LIBRARY UPDATE

The importance of correspondence in family research must not be overlooked. To some of you seasoned genealogists, this will be "old stuff." However, those who are in the early stages of family research may find the following remarks of some benefit.

Writing letters to court houses in the hopes of locating land records, vital records or naturalization records is commendable, and letters to local libraries and historical societies are equally important. However, those letters written to individuals whose names appear in the query columns of periodicals, the Genealogical Helper, family history books, surname periodicals and certain books of surnames with the names of the submitters, may turn up important clues. In thinking back over my efforts in searching for clues for lost ancestors, the letters of inquiry I have written to individuals with the appropriate surname, have yielded more clues than any other source of information.

In answering queries in periodicals or the Genealogical Helper, you do not need to confine yourself to <u>current</u> issues. Many of the individuals who submit queries continue to have the same address for a number of years. If not, your letter will be returned, and you will only be out your postage stamp and writing materials.

When answering queries, it is well to take the chance on writing to someone with your surname and not necessarily your particular ancestor. The submitter may have other information which he has collected on that particular surname. On the other hand, your letter may be forwarded to a person who has your direct family line, or you may receive the name and address of a person to contact.

You may wonder how a contact could be found in the text of a family history book. In one instance, the name of a woman who had done extensive research on my surname of Leachman was listed in a book on the Foster family. There was little with reference to the Leachman surname in the Foster book, but mention of a woman who had information on the Leachmans was made. The city in which she resided was named so that by use of the telephone book, I was able to come up with an address. Her prompt reply to my letter of inquiry resulted in a wealth of information that started me on the right trail of Leachman research. I am not suggesting that you read every family history book you come upon, but do use the surname file that is present in many libraries. This will tell you which books contain the surname.

Checking telephone books for surnames in the area where your relatives resided is often beneficial. The Fort Vancouver Community Library has a collection of telephone books although it is not nearly as complete as that of the Multnomah County Library and the Portland Genealogical Forum. By writing to one of the individuals listed in a telephone book with the right surname, you may receive the name of another person who knows a considerable amount of information on your family.

If, in the telephone book, there is no address listed for the person you wish to contact, be brave and call the number. Tell the person on the other end of the line that you are researching the family with the name of the person with whom you are conversing. Ask for an address of someone to whom you may write. You may also call Information for the area in which you are interested and ask the operator for your particular surname. Write down all or part of the names you receive. Make a call in the same way as listed above. These methods often lead you to a cousin or other relative who can give you desired information or clues to help you.

On microfilm are files documenting the nearly 5 million people who left Poland, Russia and other Eastern European countries as well as Germany for North America via Hamburg. If inquirers supply an emigre's mame and the year of emigration, the office often can provide his or her age, occupation, marital status, number of children, city of origin and the ship's name, destination and date of sailing. The search costs \$30. For visitors, the process takes only an hour. By mail, the wait can be up to six months. <u>PONY EXPRESS ROUTE</u> - Also known as Butterfield Overland Mail Route. Extended from eastern Missouri to San Francisco, became obsolete when railroad across the country was completed.

RICHMOND ROAD - From Maryland to Richmond, VA to near Cumberland Gap.

ROBERTSON ROAD - From southwestern Virginia to Nashville, TN.

SANTA FE TRAIL - Used from 1821 to 1880's from Independence, MO to Santa Fe, New Mexico, then became Desert Trail on to California.


SOUTHERN TRAIL - From Galveston, TX to El Paso, TX.

SPANISH TRAIL - Extended from Santa Fe to California.

TRAMMEL'S TRACE - Started at St. Louis, MO going into northeast Texas.

<u>WILDERNESS ROAD</u> - Daniel Boone began to cut trail with 30 axmen in 1775 from Block House in Virginia, crossing Cumberland Mountains, Cumberland Gap on into central Kentucky ending at a settlement called Boonesborough near present day Lexington, KY. Another branch led to Harrodsburg.

ZANE'S TRACE - Opened in 1797 running from Wheeling, WV to Maysville, KY. Maysville being the northern end of the road on to New Orleans, LA.

Also contained in the file cabinet are a surname files, one file for each surname being researched. These files contain all the bits of information I have extracted or correspondence I have received which I have not been able to connect with my family. This information is kept in hopes that someday it may connect for me or for someone else. On a few occasions I have received a letter concerning a certain family, which I wasn't able to connect with mine, but which I did have a little information on or the name of another person who was researching this same family.

Blank forms are all filed all together in individual folders for quick access. A few miscellaneous files containing general information have been set up as follows: Genealogical Society Newsletters (filed by society name), Maps, State Research (which contain brochures or sheets on general research for any state), City Research, County Research, Federal Research, Foreign Research, Quaker Research, Computer Research, Supply Catalogs.

Also in my work area is a basket into which is dropped new information collected but not yet entered on group sheets, correspondence to be answered or filed, and just a few things still remain in the bottom of the basket (where they have been for months) until I decide where to "file" them.

TRIVIA - Did your ancestors come over on the Mayflower? Which one? According to Dr. Homer Cunningham, Professor of History at Whitworth College, this fact: "20 ships of the period in which the pilgrims came over in were at that time registered under the name of Mayflower. So if you have an article reputed to have come over in the Mayflower, be sure it is the right ship, because you have a 1-in-20 chance of having something authentic."
