For many, nothing is more rewarding than to see the work that you have spent hours researching (too numerous to count) in book form, to be shared with family members near and far. When a decision has been made to begin preparing a book for publication, there are many decisions to be made - who will type it (yourself or someone else) and in what format, photos or not, index or not, hard cover or soft cover, type of paper, copyright or not, assemble yourself or not, and on and on.

Many members of Clark County Genealogical Society have had the opportunity of making those decisions and been rewarded with the feeling of accomplishment at seeing their books in print. Following is a list of some of those who have published family histories or historical data.

Diary of Cyrus Shepard, March 4, 1834-December 20, 1835, compiled by Gerry Gilman. 120 pages. Price: \$10.00 plus \$1.50 postage.

Cyrus Shepard was a minister and teacher at the Willamette Mission. He traveled to Oregon with the famed Jason Lee Party.

The Long Trail to Paradise, Linus Brooks 1850 Journey, compiled by Gerry Gilman. 162 pages. Price: \$15.00 plus \$1.50 postage.

Linus Brooks was the founder of Brooks, Oregon. Contains family photos, genealogy and letters.

Surnames: Lane, Full, Morgan, Chaffee, Tibbetts, Withee. Born in 1888 in South Dakota with ancestry from Maine and Pennsylvania.

Ontario Ancestors: Lane, Youmans, Maybee, Henley, Hancock, Taylor by Frances Lane Harris. Published January 1987. Price available on request.

The Lanes came from Ireland to Ontario in 1858. The Youmans and Maybees were United Empire Loyalists, originally from New York. Henleys came from Devon and later homesteaded in North Dakota. John Hancock came from England, lived in Huron County, Ontario. Mary Anne Taylor came from Prince Edward Isle.

The Goedker Tree With Its Many Branches 1801-1985 by Bertha L. Krause. 367 pages plus a 36-page index. Over 150 pictures, plus copies of marriage records, birth certificates, baptismal certificates, naturalization records, and census records. Price: \$25.00 plus \$2.00 postage for soft cover; \$30.00 plus \$2.50 postage for hard cover.

The "Goedker" book begins with William Goedker and his wife, Elisabeth Fenneman and daughter, Lisetta. They left Ostbevern, Germany in 1837 and settled at Berlin, Ohio. Eight more children were born in Ohio. Later they moved to Minnesota.

Grandma Ordway-Kennedy Twelve Generations by Nadine A. Mikesell. Published 1986. Hard cover, 555 pages, 150 pages with pictures. Indexed. Price: \$40.00 plus \$3.00 postage.

A genealogy for the Ordway-Kennedy family, starting with the emigrant James Ordway of Massachusetts. This family lived in the New England States migrating west to Missouri, Kansas, Wisconsin, westward to Oregon and the Washington Territory.

Allied families include: Bailey, Bartlett, Bond, Brown, Burbank, Chaney, Chase, Clark, Cilley/Silley, Emery, Godfrey, Jordon, Kelsey, Leathers, Merrill, Morse, Parsons, Rachliff, Saunders, Thompson and more.

The Maine Events in the Young Family by Nadine A. Mikesell. Hard cover, 329 pages. Indexed. Price: \$30.00 plus \$3.00 postage.

This book contains an abundance of pictures and a fold out chart showing William Buzzle Young and wife, Sarah Parker (Delano) Young and their descendants through 1980. Eight generations shown, plus the following allied families: Abbott, Batchelder, Bean, Caldwell, Campbell, Chamberlain, Chandler, Cushman, Delano, Gould, Leathers, Muzzey, Ordway, Sleeper, Townsend, Trask, and Young. (The author later traced two lines to the Mayflower. Richard Warren and William Brewster.) These families were from Maine and other New England States.

The Mikesell Family Eleven Generations by Nadine A. Mikesell.
Published 1984. Hard cover, 555 pages and 150 pages of photos.
Indexed. Price: \$40.00 plus \$3.00 postage.

The Mikesell book contains the descendants of Wolfgang, plus 800 bearing the name, also lists 2,100 other surnames. Much of the book is devoted to biographical sketches, essays, memoirs, biographies, autobiographies, charts, maps and pages from the family Bible.

A chart starts with the 11th generation, followed by the common ancestor to emigrate from Germany to America in 1720. The compilation goes on to include descendants of Andreas/Andrew Mikesell and goes down to the last generation.

The Descendants of Three Hilton Brothers compiled by Kitty R. (Hilton) Oman, Lillian G. Hughes, and Betty Gay. 650 pages, with 390 photographs. Indexed. Price: \$30.00 plus \$2.00 postage for soft cover; \$40.00 plus \$2.00 postage for hard cover.

The three brothers covered in the book are Silas Davis Hilton and his wife, Jane Mary Vaughan; Eliab Sylvester Hilton and his wife, Sarah Willard; and Nathan Hilton and his wife, Nancy Willard.

Silas, Eliab S. and Nathan were sons of Eliab Hilton and Abigail (Davis) Hilton and grandsons of Nathan and Mary Hilton, who were among the earliest settlers of Bovina, Delaware County, New York. Information on the Hilton ancestry is included, although the descendants of these three brothers are carried out to the present generations most thoroughly. Wherever possible the ancestry and families of the spouses of the Hilton family descendants have been included. A few of those are Taylor, Randolph, Perkins, Bixler, Akerly, Hamilton, Rubey, Vivian, Gladstone, Oliver, Northrup, and Van Keuren/Van Curen.

This is the story of the Hockinson School District with stories from children and citizens of the community.

Leaves from a Family Tree by Dorothy Wooldridge Person. Published 1972. Soft cover, 133 pages. Price: \$7.00.

This is the story of William and Harriet Wooldridge who came across the plains on the Oregon Trail in 1860 and settled in Walla Walla, W.T. and later Oregon and California. It includes their descendants with special emphasis on their son, Milton, who pioneered back to Washington in 1910. It has a page and a picture for each of his descendants. Allied families are Craig, Bryant, Bragdon, Charlton, Hackett, Sessions, Wills, LeMar and Olsen.

Spencer Citings by Dorothy Wooldridge Person. Published 1986. Hard cover, 345 pages and over 300 pictures. Price: \$30.00.

This is the story of the Spencer family from William Spencer of Litchfield, CT, born 1652, to the present, specifically emphasizing the family of Solomon Spencer, OH, Albert Spencer, MI, and his known descendants. The book begins with letters received and written by Ira Eddy Spencer while he was a soldier in the Union Army during the Civil War. After he pioneered to Washington, there are letters received from his brothers and sister in MO and MI. There is a page and a picture for each of his descendants. This is the family history of Charles John Nordquist (1862-1923, born Carl Johan Larsson in Sweden) and his wife, Anna Mathilda Backstrom (1877-1958), who resided in Rhinelander, Oneida County, Wisconsin.

Some of Charles Nordquist's Swedish ancestors are traced back to the late 1600's. Anna Mathilda Backstrom's Finnish ancestors go back to the 1700's. It also includes all descendents of Charles and Mathilda, including some of the following family names: Rolain, Stefonek, Gafke, Dietz, Church, Gross, Payne, and many others.

Skamania A Columbia River Gorge Community in the 1920's by Homer and Alice Townsend. Soft cover, 157 pages. Price: \$5.00 plus \$2.00 postage.

Here is a researched and detailed look at a Columbia River Gorge community as it existed in the decade of the 1920's. The authors were children in this community in that decade and in this book they recapture, for themselves and others, the full picture of who those people were and how they lived together in their community.

Life for these people revolved around six community centers - post office, Grange hall, general store, two public schools and the railroad station. Their lives were being pushed to make dramatic changes. The auto was making its appearance; radio was new; mechanical washing machines were introduced; and everyone was making their acquaintance with electricity and the telephone.

With little money and great determination they cleared the land, erected buildings and attended to the education of the youth. Together these people found ways to solve their problems and create an environment for wholesome and happy living.

This is a book of exquisitely written letters in their original written form. They were written by a professor of Home Economics while on a sabbatical teaching assignment in China in 1936-37.

All forty-eight of these fifty-year-old, "Dear Mamma and Papa" letters were intended by the writer, Professor Mabel A. Wood, to be her diary. She expressly wanted them saved and read by others. Many were those who had the privilege of reading the originals.

These letters cover a grand array of subjects that Mabel learned about and dealt with in her China experience. They speak much about China, her culture and her people, about home and family life at that time, about students and their home and school life, about the laboring people and their problems, about travels in and around Peking, including visits to the Forbidden City, and about the very troubled times the government was then experiencing.

History teachers and students, and especially Home Economics teachers and students, as well as China-watchers and China-students of all ages will gain insights from and greatly appreciate and enjoy these letters.

The Green Boys and Their Sisters, A Memorial by Homer J. E. Townsend.

The book is a memorial to an entire generation of one branch of the Philip Schuyler Green family, descending from John Greene of Quidnesset, New England. The children of Robert and Addie Green were of Scotch, Irish, English and American Indian descent. Their forefathers were in America before the Revolutionary War.

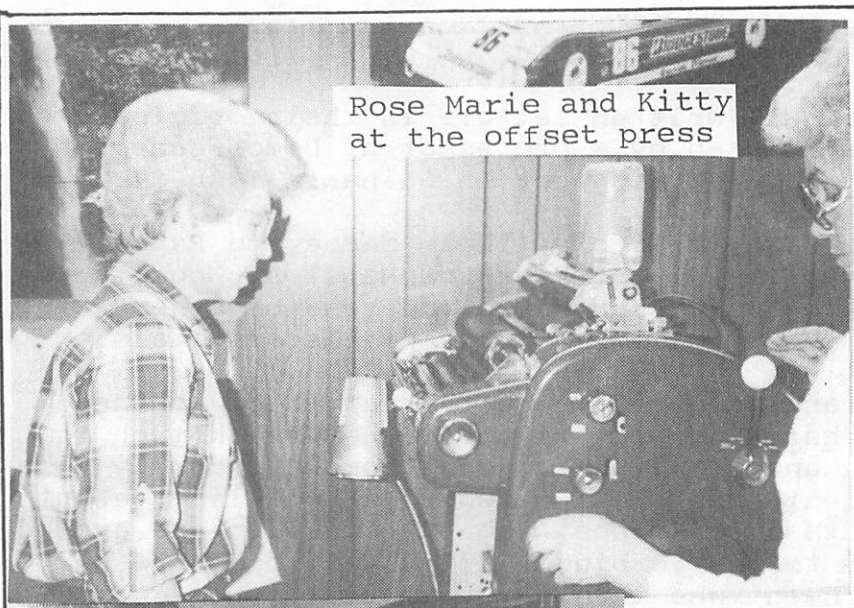
Tips:

Before 1754 marriages in Great Britain were not required by law to be performed before a Civil or Religious official. Man and wife could stand before two witnesses and declare themselves married, thus making a legal and binding marriage. Usually some sort of certificate was given, there being no legal need for a record to be kept.

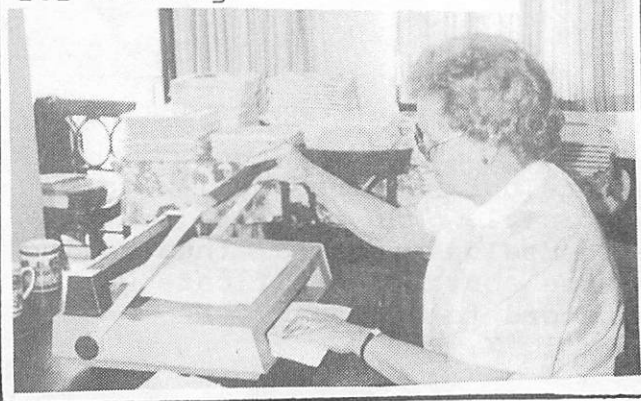

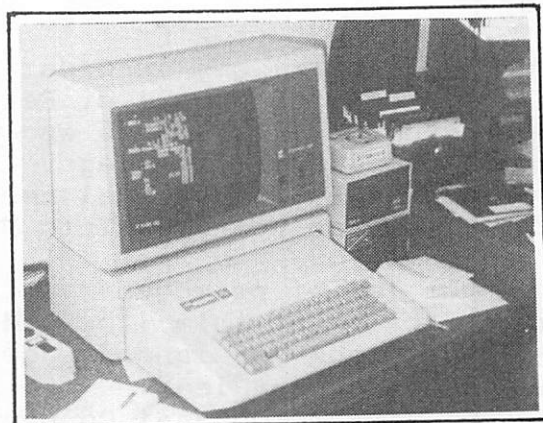

VANCOUVER REGISTER

The "VANCOUVER REGISTER" has been abstracted from microfilm on file at the Clark County Historical Society and the Fort Vancouver Library by ROSE MARIE JONAS and Mr. and Mrs. RICHARD GRAFTON, members of C.C.G.S.

The microfilmed copies of the "VANCOUVER REGISTER" begin with Volume 1 Number 4, Saturday, October 7, 1865. The first three editions have apparently become lost. Items of local interest for genealogists and historians have been copied. The [] following the articles indicate [page #, column #].

Saturday, April 7, 1866 - Vol. 1 #30

A man by the name of SANBORN who was stabbed by NELSON HAUXHURST at Salem a few weeks ago, died last week from the effects of his wound. The man SMITH charged with the murder of his brother and brother's wife, near Brownsville, Linn county, Oregon has had his trial and sentence to be hanged. [2/4]

INFORMATION WANTED: By a letter from his father, we are requested to make inquiry as to the whereabouts of WN. FRANCIS SLOCUM. He was a member of Capt. BORLAND's Company, 1st Oregon Infantry. Any person knowing anything of Mr. Slocum will do a favor by addressing WN. SLOCUM, Roseburg, Oregon, or by leaving information at this office. [3/1]

ADMINISTRATORS SALE.....In the middle of the estate of F. D. MARTIN, deceased. W. H. MARTIN Administrator. H. G. STRUVE, Attorney of Administration of said estate Vancouver, W.T., March 27, 1866. [3/2]

Thurs last Dr. WAGNER of the United States Army amputated the right leg of Mr. MOUDER of this City, just below the knee. He had suffered greatly for many months and upon examination it was found that his ankle was almost deteriorated, necessitating the operation. Mr. MOUDER is expected to recover.

NOTICE.....A. W. NYE appointed Adm'r of JOHN NYE estate.

Saturday, April 14, 1866 - Vol. 1 #31

Strong suspicion exists in the vicinity of Eugene City that a Mr. SHELLY, who resided some seven miles from that place, has been murdered. He left his home to visit Eugene City, but after several days absence nothing could be found or heard of him. [2/3]

DIED.....In Portland on the 29th of April 1866, FRANCIS S. aged 13 months infant son of Dr. WM. H. and LIZZIE WATKINS. "It sparkled, exhaled, and went to heaven."

MARRIED.....At the church six miles west of Vancouver, May 5th, by Rev. O. OSBORN, A. L. DURGAN to Miss NANCY J. JOHNSON, all of Clarke county, W.T.

RIOT & KILLING

On Monday night a row occurred in the Mount Hood hurdy gurdy saloon during which a soldier, JACK McDANNIEL, was shot and instantly killed, another slightly wounded and Mr. GOLDBECK, City Marshal, was severely, though probably not fatally injured. There was considerable excitement on the street the next day and a few persons had some apprehension of a difficulty at night, but the most felt there was no danger of an outbreak on the part of the soldiers. The intense excitement however of which the Portland paper speak was not felt here. A guard of soldiers was posted day and night about the scene of the disturbances but so far as we know or heard, citizens went to bed and slept with no unusual precautions for defense. The saloons were closed by order of the authorities, as we understand so as to prevent the soldiers getting the bad(line is unreadable).....more serious in the community than the facts warrant. It is indeed a fearful fact that institutions are permitted to exist in any community whose legitimate results are those to raise a horrible harvest for the bloody reaper to gather. Of what are the hearts of men made that they will foster and encourage a work and traffic which gives no good, but only evil on the homes and hopes of humanity.

From the MILWAUKIE DAILY WISCONSIN.....DIED - March 24th 1866, MARY MORRIS COOPER HUBBELL wife of LEVI HUBBELL, and daughter of Hon S. W. BEALL.

The following is an abstract of a flowery obit. of Mrs. HUBBELL. Died in Milwaukie, Wisconsin, smitten down in the prime of her life, when in the enjoyment of the most vigorous health and happiness. She was justly deemed one of the most beautiful women in the state. (Wisconsin) During the war no lady in the state was more marked for her unbounded devotion to the great cause of the nation. Having a father and brothers in the Army of the Union.

The deceased was the daughter of the Hon. S. W. BEALL of Wisconsin, and sister of Mr. S. W. BEALL of this place. (Vancouver, Clarke co. W.T.)

DIED.....At the residence of his father, at Elkridge, New York, on the 29th of March, 1866, m Judge D. B. STEVENS of St. Helens, Oregon.

May 20, 1866, at the residence S. D. MAXON, of whooping cough, Little BIRDY MAY, infant daughter of I. M. and CLARINDA ZEECK, aged 17 days. "A sweet little flower that e'en in blooming died" MARY

Saturday, June 23, 1866 - Vol. 1 #41

NEW ADVERTISEMENT.....Doctor GODDARD informs the afflicted that he will be ready to wait upon them at his residence one half mile above the Ordnance Department.

DIED.....At the residence of Mr. TOMLINISON, near this city, June 15th, Mrs. RACHEL LIGGET, aged 77 years. Mrs. LIGGET was a Virginian by birth emigrated, first to Ohio, then to Indiana, then to Illinois, thence to Washington Territory in 1854. She lived and died respected and beloved.

EARLY CLARK CO. PEOPLE

The following material was taken from a scrapbook of Early Clark County People compiled by Mildred Porter. This collection, which is in the CCGS Library, contains newspaper articles, obituaries, extracts from other books, and biographical sketches.

JOHN KING

John King is regarded as one of the exemplary citizens of Clarke county, Washington, whose well spent life has gained him the respect and esteem of all with whom he has been brought in contact. When the government owned much of the land in this district, he took up a claim and is now giving his attention to its development. He was born in Fayette county, Ohio, on a farm on Compton's Creek, March 26, 1835, and was but six years of age when his parents removed to Lee county, Iowa, where the father engaged in farming. John King continued in that locality until eighteen years of age, and then, attracted by the favorable reports which he heard concerning the opportunities of the northwest, he started for Oregon on the 2d of April, 1853, with an ox team, joining a wagon train of one hundred and twenty-five wagons. They proceeded westward to the Missouri river, which they crossed at St. Joseph on the 2d of May, and at that point practically left behind them the outposts of eastern civilization. Then came the long and wearisome trip over the prairies, the plains and onward to the mountains, until they reached Portland, Oregon, on the 26th of October. Mr. King, however, stopped for a time at Deschutes, Oregon, where he operated a ferry boat across the Deschutes river for eighteen days. he then came on to Portland and secured employment in a saw mill owned by W. P. Abrams & Company. Two months later he went to Benton county, Oregon, in the Willamette valley, where he continued until the fall of 1856, when he returned to Portland. So wild was the northwest and so treacherous were the Indians that there was constant need for military surveillance, and in October, 1855, Mr. King enlisted as a member of Company I, of the Oregon Volunteer Infantry under Captain L. B. Munson, of Corvallis, the regiment being commanded by Colonel Kelley. He served in the battle of Walla Walla at Whitman Station for four days and nights, and saw active service until the following April, when he was honorably discharged in Portland.

For a time he was employed in Portland and then went out to fight the Indians at the Cascades with a number from Portland, the Indians having massacred white settlers at the point indicated. After but little service there he assisted in getting boats over the rapids for ten days, and then returned to the Willamette valley where he spent the fall. He was afterward married and resided in the vicinity of Portland for two years, but in 1859 came to Vancouver where he took charge of the engine in a sawmill owned by his father-in-law, Louis Love. For over four years he was thus engaged, at the end of which time he began farming on the Love ranch known as the Taylor place on the river road. Two years were devoted to agricultural pursuits and the following year

was spent in Washougal. Subsequently he took a homestead, which is now the Stamp place, on La Camas Lake, but relinquished that to the government after five years and on account of the illness of his wife removed down on the Columbia river to the Love ranch and worked in a saw and flour mill. He afterward returned to Vancouver, where he entered the employ of the Oregon and California Railroad, with which he was connected for two years, when he went to Columbia City, where he built a sawmill. A year later, however, he removed to Buena Vista, where he built a sawmill, after which he engaged in various lines of work until 1888, when he settled upon the ranch which he now owns. He took this up as a claim from the government - one hundred and sixty acres. It was mostly covered with timber and he has cleared seven acres. He has put all good improvements on the farm, has fenced the place, and is now devoting his energies to the cultivation of the fields.

On the 26th of October, 1856, Mr. King was married to Miss Melinda J. Love, of Portland, the wedding being celebrated at her home, then on Clay and Front streets, in the Rose City. They became the parents of six children, but only one is now living, William D., of Portland. Mr. King has reached advanced age of seventy-five years. He is a member of the Pioneer Society, having been a resident of Oregon since 1853. His entire life has been characterized by high principles and manly conduct. He has never played cards nor drank liquor of any kind, and has always held firmly to a course that he has believed to be right, thus commanding the entire confidence and good will of his fellowmen.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Minta McPeck and Mrs. Nellie Cannon, both of Vancouver; four grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren and eight great, great grandchildren.

Funeral services for Mrs. Alexander will be held at 1 p.m. Thursday in the Vancouver Funeral Chapel. The Rev. T. Earl Poindexter will officiate and interment will be in the Manor Cemetery.

IDA HUCKINS

A PIONEER PASSES. Mrs. J. M. Huckins one of the early pioneers of Clark County, passed away at St. Joseph Hospital, Vancouver, March 23rd 1948. She was interred in the Washougal Cemetery March 26th.

Mrs. Huckins was born in Atchison County, Missouri, March 31st 1867, and while a small child moved with her parents to Furnas county, Nebraska, whence, after the grasshopper plague and famine of the early 1880's the family set out for the Pacific Northwest. The trek was made in true pioneer style, via covered wagon. The family arrived at Ft. Vancouver in 1884, Ida L. Blackburn, the future Mrs. Huckins being then seventeen years of age.

The Blackburn family moving to the Burnt Creek area, north of Vancouver, Ida Blackburn met her future husband, M. H. Huckins, who was engaged in logging operations in that area. Mr. Huckins had come to the Columbia river country in 1881, preceding his bride-to-be by three years. They were married August 21st, 1888, in the First Baptist Church of Vancouver, the Rev. P. H. Harper performing the ceremony.

The Huckins honeymoon consisted of a trip from Vancouver to Camas on the river steamer "Traveler", their residence in Camas, where Mr. Huckins was employed by the old Pittock Paper Company, the couple returned to Vancouver, where their first child was born.

In 1890 Mr. Huckins purchased the old Turner place in the Fir Grove community from H. J. Biddle, and Mrs. Huckins resided there until her death.

In Ireland it is c/o Recording Clerk, Friends House, 6 Eustace St., Dublin, Ireland. Some additional collections in England are at Somerset House in London and the Society of Genealogists, 14 Charterhouse Bldg., London, EC1M 7BA.

American sources for English Quaker records include Genealogical Society of Utah, Friends Historical Library in Swarthmore, PA, the Moses Brown School, Providence, RI, and Friends Library, Arch St., Philadelphia, PA.

It is possible to establish that some Quakers had honorable war service which would make descendants eligible for DAR or SAR Membership. Although Quakers refused to bear arms, many took a very active and helpful part in the war as teamsters, physicians and other non-combative roles. Some also contributed large sums of much needed money.

Do you have ancestors in the American Legion? If so, write to: American Legion, National Headquarters, Box 1055, 700 North Pennsylvania St., Indianapolis, IN 46204.

GERMANY Each citizen in Germany during the Nazi regime carried an AHNEPASS, which listed three to six generations of ancestry. The Genealogical Society of Utah has microfilmed 671 reels of these passes for the area of Mittelfranken (in Bavaria) in the Brenner collection. From--Decatur Gen. Soc. Newsletter, May 1986.

CCGS Library has a number of surname periodicals and family newsletters. Valuable information on families contained therein may be advantageous.

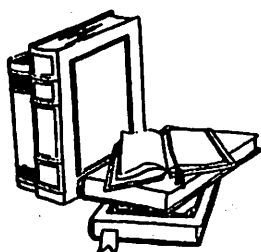

(The following article appeared in the Effingham County Genealogical Society, Vol. VII No. 3., and was taken in part from the Genealogy Column of the Terre Haute Tribune Star by Dorothy J. Clark.)

Needing information on how to obtain information, a correspondent from Jacksonville, Indiana, asked where to write to find out more about an ancestor who arrived at Ellis Island, N.Y. in 1888.

Here's the answer.

If you have an ancestor who immigrated to the United States by ship to an eastern or gulf coast port between 1819 and the 1940's, you can request a search of the records in the National Archives Building, Washington D.C. Better yet, submit your request on NATF Form 40, "Order and Billing for Copies of Passenger Arrival Records," available from the regional archives branch serving this area.

Address your inquiry to: Chief, Archives Branch, Federal Archives and Records Center, 7358 S. Pulaski Road, Chicago, IL 60629. After you receive the proper form, fill in your ancestor's full name, port of entry and date of entry, if known, or its approximation.

Before requesting this service, be sure you've consulted all possible non-federal sources - family members, family bibles, personal family papers, and records found in town or city halls, county courthouses, state and local archives, historical and genealogical societies and libraries of the area.

The federal government did not require passenger lists at ports of entry for the pre-1820 period. Lists compiled after the 1940's are still maintained by the Immigration and Naturalization Service. If the information you are seeking is found, you will be billed when you are notified of what is available and the exact charge.

At the foot of the genealogy column in the newspaper is this invitation: Send queries to Genealogy, Dorothy J. Clark, Tribune-Star Publishing Co., P.O. Box 149, Terre Haute, Ind., 47808. There is no charge for publication.

TRIFLES THAT CAN LEAD TO BOOK DAMAGE

By Dorothy Lower

One problem which is common to all libraries is the wear and tear inflicted on the collection by constant usage. This can be particularly disastrous in the case of a genealogy collection.

Much of the damage is done unintentionally by unthinking researchers. One of the most common offenders is the person who researches with a pen in his hand. He may unconsciously mark a name or paragraph which is pertinent to his research, and it is impossible to erase such a mark. For this reason, most libraries insist (or try to) that the patron use pencil only when working with the genealogy collection.

Some readers seem to be ignorant of the fact that turning down the corner of a page to mark the place causes irreparable damage. It doesn't require too much effort to place a small piece of paper between the pages.

Licking the fingers to turn pages is unthinkable, since it not only damages the paper, but is most unsanitary.

The spine of the book is the most important component in its construction and anything which damages it can ruin the book. Pressing down on the opened book when photocopying a page can crack the spine. This is one reason that many large libraries do not allow the patron to do his own copying, but will do it for him. Piling several open books on top of each other weakens the spine, which eventually give way.

Some damage done to books is intentional and should be specifically guarded against. The patron who is too lazy to copy material by hand or too cheap to photocopy it will resort to tearing out the page or pages in which he is interested. This not only ruins a good book, but is against the law in most states. While these things may seem trifling, the genealogy collection is made up of unusual and often valuable books which are difficult, if not impossible to replace.
