



HERITAGE OF THE WASHINGTON TERRITORIAL MILITIA

MILITIA IN ANCIENT TIMES

Hieroglyphic inscriptions uncovered on ancient monuments of the Nile Basin, whence arose the beginnings of western civilization, tell us something of the military laws of the Pharaohs. "Egypt was divided unto seven castes, of which the priests formed the first caste, and the warriors the second." Egypt presents the first instance known to history of organized armies, under which provision was made by the earliest laws for the support of warriors. Miliatry service was conferred on these men as a privilege, while at the same time a property qualification was imposed. Even the common soldier was required to possess not less than 6 acres of land which served for the support of his family and which was free from taxation.

King Saul practiced the most extreme example of compulsory military service when - "there was sore war against the Philistines all the days of Saul, and when Saul saw any strange man, or any valiant man, he took him." Rather than a demonstration of military obligation, here is an act of military impressment which was not witnessed again until the Age of Feudalism. This illustrated the right recognized in the ancient Jewish monarchy to compel military service of an individual

Perhaps there has never been a society more severally regimented than that which built the heyday of Sparta. Mere liability in law and custom was not the full extent of the Spartan's military obligation. Every youth with citizenship qualifications was consecrated to the profession of arms, and every member of the Spartan In contrast, community was disciplined in his or her place in war. the mere versatile and venturous Athenian had the time and aptitude for trade, art, literature and philosophy without neglect of his duties - and privileges - of citizenship. This privileged duty of Athenian citizenship included military training for as long as 3 Years and held every man liable for service until he attained 40 years of age. So justly and universally was the law applied that Periclean Athens was a city of but 36,000 males of military age, yet it possessed a citizen army of 28,000." It is impressive that, in each and all of the many city -states of Hellas, none but the citizen could bear arms. The Slave did not enjoy this privilege. The glory that was Greece, earned by brave citizen armies discharging their privileged duty at Marathon and Thermopylae, at Salimis and Platae, half a Millennium before the Christian Era.

But such glory did not always defend Greek civilization. Early wars were fought in short campaignes near at hand. Extension of trade pushed the frontiers of Greek interest farther and farther from the homeland. These lucrative interests brought increasing wealth - but required increasing military protection too. More distant campaigns necessitated longer and longer absences from the comfortable life at home. Then, too, conquered people were enslaved and brought home to serve the conquerors. The slave population so increased that it became no longer safe to leave them behind while free citizens went off to battle. It was natural then that more and more slaves should be used on distant battlefields to die while their masters remained at and lived lavishly, for there seemed no

bottom to the barrel of conquered abundance. The opuland Greek sent slaves or hired substitutes for his personal service and the one time citizen army became a full-fledged professional army of the most dangerous sort.

Greece had died of an insidious disease that affects nations no less than individual. Greece had died for lack of will to live. As Demosthenes phrased her death pang - - "your citizens have ceased to be soldiers".

So close were the ties between Greece and Rome that we find the second elected King of Rome, Tarquinius Prisous, a first-generation immigrant from the yet unconquered Corinth. Although Rome was barely a century old, already the principle of compulsion was well established. Tarquinius' wars, and they were many, were fought by unpaid conscripted citizens who furnished their own equip-Tarquinius was succeeded by his own ex-slave, Servius Tullious, "the great lawgiver of the Seven Kings". This former slave enrolled the whole citizenry for military service, made annual levies on the enrollment, and emposed heavy penalties for failure to report and serve. Every able-bodied man between the ages of 17 and 47 was required to render active duty service for 10 to 16 years, and those from age 48 to age 60 were liable for garrison duty. Every soldier enjoyed special right and privileges, except that the patrician right of suffrage continued to be withheld from the plebian. With citizen armies conscripted under these laws, the Seven Kings consolidated authority throughout the Italian Peninsula and later the republic prepared for the Punic Wars which wrested Sicily from Carthage, decisively defeated the professional armies of Hannibal, and finally obliterated Carthage itself.

The wars with Carthage were of such duration that armies which set forth as citizen troops returned as professional soldiers. These vast armies of professional soldiers and their experienced leaders carried the Roman Republic to the zenith of its power. From Spain to Syria, the world was her subject. Rome grew so rich in spoils of war and tribute from conquered people that the Roman Citizen was at one time freed of all tax burden. But the poor did not share these new won riches equally with the great military leaders and political nobility; rather the poor became poorer as the influx of captured slaves brought change competition for their already underpaid labor. Such wide economic disparity, concurrent with the lenghtening frontiers of conquest produced the perfect situation for the wealthy to circumvent military compulsion by hiring substitutes to take their place in the farthermost corners of the world. This was the beginning of the end of the citizen army which had raised the Republic to world position. armies in the field lost contact with Rome and became tools of their generals, to whom they gave complete allegiance. The inescapable result was constant clashing of ambitions among the leaders. In major conflict of ambitions, Marius fought Sulla, then Caesar fought Pompey, Lepidus fought Brutus, and finally all power was unified in the person of Octavian after he routed Anthony at Actium to complete a cycle of Roman history. Five centuries before Actium a citizen army had thrown out a king and established a Republic. Now Professional armies overthrew the electoral power of the people and enthroned one man as ruler, who, although he chose to be known only

as the "first citizen" was also given the title of Augustus. One of the things done by the new imperator was the removal from the citizenry its right to bear arms. So long as the Roman state had been a democracy, all the Italians were armed; but from the time when Augustus became sole ruler, he relieved the Italians of this burden and disarmed them - establishing hired troops.

Thus Roman practice of honoring all citizens by the right to bear arms died at the very dawn of the Christian Era. To Augustus, as to each of his Imperial successors, the throne seemed safest without - a citizenry trained and accustomed to arms. So, the right of the people to keep and bear arms - was taken from the Roman citizen in exchange for the soothing benefits of a despotic peace enforced by professional armies of an autocrat. In time, the luxury bought at the price of unquestioning acceptance of those crumbs of civil liberty which their masters meted out to keep them passive so weakened Rome, that, when the long-explored "barbarians" of the North swooped down on the eternal City, there was no trained citizen army of virile native population to save the nation. As wealth had accumulated, men had decayed-and the Dark Ages settled on a civilization that had taken a millennium to build.

The grown, flower and decay of both Greece and Rome extended beyond a thousand years. Their laws, customs, experiences and endresults bear close resemblance each to the other. Perhaps there may be profit even to us, in a quick comparison of Greek and Roman In both Greece and Rome a willing devotion to the principle of military compulsion accompanied the nation's rise to wealth and power. In each nation the abondonment of citizen-military service for a system of mercenary or professional soldiery was in ration to the length of campaigns and the extension of conquered frontiers. In Rome, as in Greece, the degree of release from the obligation of the citizen to bear defensive arms was the measure of surrender of other rights of citizenship. In Greece, and in Rome, avidity for economic advantage, brought its reward of prosperity, but desire for wealth and luxury undermined the character of the people in a spiral of degeneration, bred spiritual indolence and left the citizen without a defense against autocratic government. All the city-states of Greece were weakened when their "citizen ceased to be soldiers". Rome reached the summit of her glory while every citizen was still a soldier, then lost her security when civic complacency permitted Emporers to disarm the citizenry and send professional armies on long campaigns of conquest to distant frontiers.

These soundings in ancient history indicate the invariable tendance for nations to develop in strength and security so long as they hold to the principle of the citizen's privileged duty to render military service. While military conquest produce temporary economic prosperity the combined result of excessive wealth and imperialism is the relaxation of civic responsibility and the growth of professional armies led by ambitious men. Greece and Rome clearly teach that abandonment of the principle of military obligation fertilizes a breeding-ground for empire builders and provide a graveyard for personal liberty and national independence.

EARLY CLARK CO. PEOPLE

HON. JOHN F. CAPLES

Standing among the leading members of the legal fraternity of the State, and holding the responsible office of Prosecuting Attorney of the Fourth Judicial District, Hon. John F. Caples, both by virtue of his official position and his acknowledged professional acquirements, ranks among the representative men of Oregon. He is a native of Ohio, in which State he was born January 12, 1831. In 1832 his father removed with his family to Seneca county, Ohio, where he died in 1835. There were ten children in the family, of whom the subject of this biographical sketch was the youngest. He remained with his widowed mother on a farm until fifteen years of age, receiving such advantages of obtaining an early education as were afforded in a country school. He then began clerking in a variety store, which avocation he pursued for three years, when he went to Delaware, Ohio, and attended school until he attained the age of twenty-one. Removing to Bellefountaine, in his native State, he read law with Hon. Ben. Stanton and C. W. B. Allison, and was admitted to practice in 1854. On the 24th of May of the same year, he was married to Miss Sarah J. Morrison, daughter of F. A. Morrison, of Champaign county, Ohio. Mr. Caples practiced his profession in Northern Ohio until 1858, when he removed to Warsaw, Indiana, where he continued attending to legal business until 1862. Returning to Ohio he remained until 1865, when he removed to this coast. He located at Vancouver, W.T., and resided there until 1866, when he removed to Portland, where he soon acquired a lucrative practice. Mr. Caples is a Republican. ing the war of the rebelion he was actively engaged in the recruting service for the government in both Ohio and Indiana. His first active participation in politics in this State was in 1872, when he was elected a member of the lower House of the Legislature. After serving one term he retired from political life, until 1877, when he was elected for the first time to the position he now holds. On the 4th of December, 1877, death invaded his household and took from his side his amiable wife, and he still remains a widower. In 1878 he was again elected Prosecuting Attorney, and he has been re-elected successively to the same position of each recurring election ever since, and, without disparagement to others, it may be stated that at his third election he received a highter number of votes than any other candidate on his ticket. Mr. Caples is a man of vigorous constitution and active mind, bidding fair to insure him many more years of active life.

GOLDEN WEDDING

Mr. and Mrs. G. Sproul celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage at their home in Minnehaha, Wednesday, Jan. 11, when they entertained a large number of frineds and relatives. Mr. Sproul was born at Rogersville, Tenn., April 13, 1827. His good wife and companion for fifty years, was born near Pompey's Hill, Onandage County N.Y., Aug. 4, 1823. In the year 1844 she was married to Aaron Archer, of Union County, Ohio. At the end of three years she was left a widow with one child, (now Mrs. Cratty, of Minnehaha). She was again married to her second and present husband Mr. Sproul, at the home of the bride's father, Abraham Ackerman, in Union County, Ohio Jan. 11, 1849. For fifty years they have lived happily together, until they have lived to the ripe old age of 72 and 76 years. Three quarters of a century of happy useful life, honored and revered by all, and loved most by those who know them best. They have lived in times of peace and times that tried the souls of men. At his country's call in 1861, Mr. Sproul marched away to fight four long years in defense of the flag and an undivided country and while he was on the tented field his good wife kept things moving at their home, and took care of the family through all the trying years. By industry and frugality they have acquired a good home in which to enjoy the rest of their days. They have resided in nine different states. Their descendants number 9 children, 44 grand-children and 16 great grand-children, a total of 69. Frequently four generations are at the dinner table at Mr. Sproul's. surname - n. 1. the name that a person has in common with the other members of his family, as distinguished from his Christian or given name; family name.

Two interesting sources of information on the history and present use of surnames are *The Hountain of Names* by Alex Shoumatoff (Simon & Schuster, 1986) and "What's in a Surname?" by Rifka Rosenwein, in *The Wall Street Journal*, 11 February 1987.

Shoumatoff cites Elsdon C. Smith (New Dictionary of American Family Names) as saying that the first Europeans to use family names were upper-class men who went on the Crusades. They adopted surnames for both convenience and prestige, usually calling themselves for the lands they owned. Meantime, the clerks keeping records on manors and feudal lands tended to add a descriptive term, perhaps an occupation or physical feature, to distinguish one vassal named Robert or Leofric from others. However, these surnames did not usually pass from one generation to the next until after 1400.

In the European system, surnames were patronymic - derived from the father's name. The general custom in Europe became to identify a female first by her father's surname and later by her husband's. Males kept their father's surname whether or not it described their own occupation or residence.

Shoumatoff says that for a surname (or title or Y-chomosome) transmitted exclusively through males to have a run of more than a hundred years is notable. He reports that demographers James E. Smith and Phillip R. Kunz have calculated that in the United States in 1960 there was only a twenty-per-cent chance that a man would have descendants with his last name thirteen generations later, and that as many as forty per cent of the families existing in 1700 have been exterminated by war, famine, epidemic, or natural disaster, or have died out from failure to reproduce. He feels that we may be slowly progressing to a day when everybody will have the same surname.

But this theory requires surnames to be dying out faster than new ones are created, and new ones are being created all the time. When slavery was outlawed, most black Americans took an already-existing surname. And adoption of a Muslim name may not create a new surname. But there has also been a move to take completely new names that lack connotations of oppression. Other social movements, such as the hippie culture and the most recent phase of feminism, led to the creation of such new surnames as Chicago, Freedom, Love, Peace, and Sunshine.

According to Rosenwein, many states allow parents to give a child any surname they choose. In other states, court challenges to proscriptive laws have been so successful that regulations are being rewritten to avoid them. Some new surnames are an outgrowth of rejection of the custom of identifying a woman by her husband's

surname. When the parents have different surnames, it is natural to be more creative in giving the children surnames. Some parents even give each of their children a different surname! Others give their children a hyphenated surname that combines the parents' surnames in one order or another (one can see difficulties with this after two or three generations). A popular trend is to fuse two surnames into an entirely new name — Ledbetter and Skylar into Skybetter, for example, or Greenberg and McBride into Greenbride. (And would a child of Skybetter and Greenbride be a Skybride, or a Greenbetter?)

Rosenwein says that genealogists fear that these new naming practices will result in the growth of "wild" family trees. And a former Indiana legislator warns that free-form naming will result in everyone having different names at family reunions. But I'm not convinced that's any worse than:

FUNERAL HOME RECORDS

In looking for vital statistics after 1915 or possibly a few years before most of us know we can likely obtain birth and death records from the State board of Health, located at the Capital of the State in which we are searching. Any record before this time, we would probably look or write to the county Court House. In the State of Washington you now can most likely find records of the cemetery stone readings, birth and death dates in the City Hall.

Funeral Home's are a great place to look for records. Especially the more recent deaths. They will have a deceased's death date, place of death, the birth date and place, the interment date, locations of the gravesite. They will also have a copy of the obituary, or if not they possibly will have the name and date of a newspaper where one can find the obituary. One may also find Military record notices, back history and any organizations of which the deceased may have belonged.

Mortuary's and/or the State Board of Funeral Directors have books with lists of Funeral Home's all over the United States. If one can obtain one of these books, it makes a useful addition for the Genealogical Library.





Then screaming with pain and both blazing, the two women rushed from the building to the yard where the attention of George Elthridge, a neighbor, was attracted. Mr. Ethridge ran to them, tore the burning clothing away and smothered the flames with his bare hands. He was burned also, although not seriously.

Dr. A. W. Vincent was called. Both women were removed to their homes. They were both badly burned about the front of the body and the neck. Little hope is held out for Mrs. Basey's recovery. Mrs. Ashby is also severely burned, but will recover.



During high water, the island was a dangerous place to live, and one morning the family awoke to find the river only a few feet from their door. It was a lonely place,

and Mildred always looked forward to the times they would take their boat across the river and walk into the nearby town. She was the eldest of the children in the family and cared for her brother Stanley much of the time while he was growing up. She also has a younger sister, Ruth. Church activities were the focal point of her family life, and she was very active in "Christian Endeavor" at the Friends Church in Marion, Oregon. Her education was commenced with graduation from Aumsville High School.

A letter from Hon. Elowood Evans of washington Territory, was read, declinning to deliver the next annual address, on account of previous engagements.

On motion, the Printing Committee of 1875 was reappointed, which consisted of Hons. E. N. Cooke, S. F. Chadwick, Willard H. Rees, Esq., and Hon. John Minto.

On motion, the Secretary was requested to make an exhibit of the financial resources of the Association.

The Secretary was added to the Committee on Printing.

On motion, adjourned until 7 o'clock, P.M.

LIBRARY UPDATE

Literally, this page does not deal with what is new in the library as one would be led to believe. New books and other materials are listed on the pages of "Book Reports" so that there is little to be said here on "Library Up-date." Therefore, from time to time, items of interest on research that come to my attention will be shared.

Something new that was recently learned from one of our members, Lorie Okel, is that there is a Law Library on the main floor of the Clark County Court House which is open to the public and is free of charge. This is not a usual source of information for genealogy, but the results can be rewarding. There is a clerk in attendance although it will be necessary for you to master the research on your own. The library contains many volumes of books entitled "The American Digest" dating from 1658 to 1981. They deal with court cases from locations throughout the United States. Surnames are listed alphabetically which may be found from a general index. You will probably have to learn to decipher the abbreviations. Once you have found a surname in which you are interested, you may wish to further your research by writing to the county and state of litigation. The cases deal with wills and probates as well as other subjects.

The deeds whereby your elusive ancestor bought and later disposed of his property should be on file in the county where the land was located. The "grantee" is the person acquiring property, and it was his responsibility to file the deed. There are exceptions as to why this was not always accomplished, including carelessness on the part of the grantee and the destroying of records.

The "grantor" or the previous owner of the property, is known in deed language as "the party of the first part." He is identified by his place of residence and often by his occupation.

Some understanding of the value and possibilities of researching deeds is apparent when one considers the minimum contents of a deed: (1) some identification of both contracting parties, in terms of residence and/or occupation or family relationships; (2) more or less precise identification of the property conveyed, always as to location and extent, sometimes as to previous ownerships, surveys, divisions or neighboring property owners; (3) a definition of the consideration given in exchange; and (4) at least three dates indicating when the instrument was drawn, when the signatures were acknowledged, and when the whole was filed for record.

The most hoped for genealogical clue from grantor definitions is the identification of wives, and that the wife is still living at the time she acknowledged her signature to the deed. However, do not rule out that there was no marriage if the wife did not sign. Some wives signed rarely or not at all except when disposing of property which was theirs by inheritance. Identification of the property may set forth relationships.

Even though you may or may not be successful in acquiring identification of value from deeds, do not pass it up as a source of research.

Also remember that counties have genealogies; that is, they have <u>parent</u> counties. The part of the county where our ancestors lived was often cut to form a new county, so that their land moved without their having left the "old home."




