## HERITAGE OF THE WASHINGTON TERRITORIAL MILITIA

### CHAPTER II MILITIA DURING THE MIDIEVAL PERIOD

In some respects Midieval Europe may be said to have reenacted, over long centuries, certain briefer periods in the history of both Greece and Rome. The short-lived ascendancy of one or another of many states, with ever-shifting boundaries, was not unlike the turmoil among Grecian supremacy. During the disintegration of Roman authority over western Europe there was a long period of major and minor wars between countless powers. Kingdoms and empires rose and fell, none to compare with modern nations as we know them.

The period of the Middle Ages constitutes an intermediate period in which was germinated the Anglo Saxon culture we inherit. The slow dissipation of Roman influence made possible the development of new nations with new languages and novel cultural elements. Feudalism was born of this dissipation and of absentee rule. Nationalism was entirely submerged. The instinctive yearning of men for an object of their devotion found satisfaction in a wildfire of religious hysteria which produced the phenomenon of the Crusades. Each of these developments had its effect on the military responsibility of the individual.

With the Feudalistic system, citizenship was a privilege unknown to the dependent of a feudal lord, and there was no place for patriotism or the spirit of freedom or pride. Under feudalism, the villein and serf rendered service to the arms of his feudal lord as one more penalty of serfdom. Each feudal lord was an absolute lord, and this overlord to a sovereign.

While the power of the lord over his serfs was absolute and immediate, the overlord or sovereign of a country could place but doubtful trust to his vassals. True, the sovereign could levy against each of his lords a quota of fighting men to provide, but compliance with the levy was not always prompt or dependable. To minimize this uncertainty, the sovereign required a mercenary army for reinforcement. Necessity for funds to support these armies gave rise to the system of scutage, a form of taxation in lieu of personal service which enabled the sovereign to maintain formidable personal forces of professionals or mercenaries. The personal army of the monarch not only protected his realm but policed its populace. The King was the head of State, and all within the State were his subjects.

This system was usually effective as a guaranty of the monarch's absolutism, but provoked hatred on the part of the liegemen and minions alike. The profession of arms once respected lost its glamour for the common soldier and became a detested occupation which only attracted the scum of society, and they awaited opportunity for self-assertion. Their opportunity arrived only occasionally, when the throne was so endangered that a frightened monarch placed arms in their hands to survive an emergency. On such occasions the public was again disarmed only with difficulty, and only after the concessions of some civil rights from the sovereign. Thus, by painful process, the common man gradually regained a degree of self respect, which his ancestors had surrendered with their arms long centuries before.

Throughout the first thousand years of the Christian Era, autocratic governments rose and fell with their big and little tyrants. And always the common man was left without any of those civic rights which had brought greatness to Greece and some. The armies which fought ceaseless war were professional armies or untrained and undisciplined mobs impressed to face an emergency.

Early in the second millenium of the Christian Era, however, a novel method of raising armies was introduced. The new system appealed to both prince and pauper. Perhaps the pauper sought to escape the poverty, oppression and servility which were his lot under feudalism. For whatever the reason, both prince and pauper rushed voluntarily, and with fanatical enthusiasm, to fill the ranks with thousands and thousands of volunteers. And the war continued sporadically for 200 years. Never before or since has volunteering been so productive of military



manpower, undisciplined and untrained though it was.

All this began when Peter the Hermit received the sanction of Pope Urban II for a crusade to rescue the Holy Sepulchre from the Turkish infidels. The first crusade was led by the principle dukes of Europe, thereafter - the ruling monarchs of all Christendom took part in person. At length tens of thousands of children died in the same cause, trying to accomplish where their elders had failed for yet another hundred years.

Though failing, the Crusades were more than a fruitless spectacle. Besides giving a lift to the spirits of men, they brought about a new intercommunication of nations, touched off modern commercial progress and disclosed the older arts and sciences of the East to scholars of the newer West. Militarily, the Crusades disclosed the extravagant waste of the volunteer system in sending men to war undisciplined and untrained in the use of arms.

Justly proud as Americans are of the "American Way of Life", the fact that early colonial and federal customs and institutions were transplanted largely from the British Isles indicates that review of British practice of the principle of citizen obligation for military service is essential to an understanding of the development of Militia in the United States. England, more than any other nation provides the geographical, political and historical link between our own civilization and that of other European peoples, both ancient and modern. In the assimilation of laws and usages that come from older civilizations across the Channel, England made modifications to suit her own uses and introduced new practices as her own people gathered experience. We must know something, then, of its English episode, if we are to comprehend fully the evolution of the principles which has brought us to the twentieth century National Guard laws.

Pytheas, the Greek voyager in search of tin, was probably the first civilized man to touch British soil. His visit was entirely commercial and he found the early Britons both friendly and hospitable, as has usually been true of first meetings of civilized men with semi-barbarous people. When Caesar came as an invader, three centuries later, however, he found an infusion of Belgae who had been pushed across the straits by the steady pressure of the more powerful Germanic tribes. The Roman invaders were met by conscripted warriors who withstood conquest for a hundred years. The Britons fought with unexampled fury, even the women mingling in the fray, and the Druids themselves struck terror into the soldiers by the violence of their imprecations. Withdrawal of the Romans at the beginning of the fifth century was followed by Saxon and Danish invasions; and it was not until the end of the ninth century that Alfred won the war of liberation and unified the first free England.

Alfred the Great accomplished his epochal feat largely because of the national spirit and governmental organization which had been developing for two centuries in the seven kingdoms of Northumbria, Mercia, East Anglia, Essex, Sussex, Wessex and Kent. The realm was divided into township, the borough, the hundred and the shire. The township was the smaller unit, a sort of emigrating unit of independent settlers - a plantation, we might have called it, in our colonial structure. Certain obligations, called *trineda necessitas*, were imposed upon the township, including the sending of a contingent of soldiers to the national host in the event of war. For purposes of both peace and war, a group of townships formed the hundred, and above the hundred stood the shire. The military force of the shire was represented by the *fyrð* (militia), which was a mobilization of all freemen of the shire between the ages of 16 and 60, each family marching together in the township fighting unit which was led by the town reeve, or *tungerefa* (town sheriff). Military leaders were elected, though usually appointed to the lower grades by the lord or in the case of the higher command, by the King himself with the consent of the Witenagemot - wise counsellors.

Thus, there existed a democratic military organization, in spite of the fact that English society was basically divided into freemen and slaves, and even the freemen were again divided into the land and the landless, the gentle and the simple

folk. "Landless men of whatever rank were obliged to attach themselves to a Lord; and for the sake of peace many landed men were also in the habit of putting themselves under the protection of their more powerful neighbors, there was the beginning of a system in which all ranks of society would be bound together by a chain of mutual dependence and protection". The whole social scheme pictures a semifeudalism which, however, preserves a dignity of citizenship England never lost, though, was the principle of military liability allowed to die.

King Canute, the Dane, later introduced a new military element by instituting a royal bodyguard of select forces called "Huscarls", and relegated the fyrd to subordinate importance in the national defense. "The huscarls, were in fact a standing army". Later in the century, King Harold marched with an army of regular Hastings. Military writers generally express the opinion that this eventful fight was lost when the untrained thegns of the fyrd fell dupes to a tricky Norman stratagem, broke ranks and exposed Harold's huscarls to a flank attack of William's archers. Whatever the contempt of his professional soldiers for the English national militia, however, William himself made important use of the fyrd in his conquest of Maine just seven years after Hastings. His son, William 11, too, used Norman barons who had come to England with his father.

The reign of restless and capable King Henry II effected a far-reaching military reorganization. While no king since the conquest had been without his personal guard of huscarls, the feudal array remained a regular part of the military baronial power against the throne. For the double purpose of discouraging the military efficiency of the barons and encouraging the military efficiency of the freemen of the fyrd which had repeatedly proved its loyalty to the crown, King Henry II issued the Assize of Arms in 1181 which follows hereinafter;

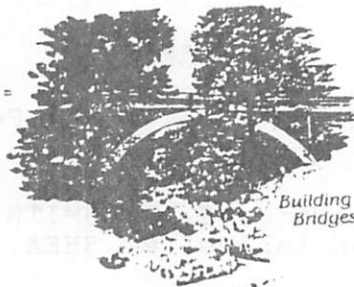
#### THE ASSIZE (Assembly) of ARMS

1. Let everyholder of knight's fee have a hauberk (coat of mail or armor) a helmet, a shield and a lance. And let every knight have as many hauberks, helmets, shields and lances, as he has knight's fees in his demesne.
2. ...Free layman who hold chattels or rent to the value of 16 marks, have a hauberk, helmet, shield and a lance. Those with chattels worth 10 marks have aubergel (neck and chest protector of mail or armor) & a headpiece of iron and a lance.
3. ...All burgesses & the whole body of freemen have quilted doublets and a headpiece of iron, and a lance.
4. ....Let every one of them swear that before the Feast of St. Hilary (13 January) he will possess these arms and will bear allegiance to the lord King Henry namely the son of Empress Maud, and that he will bear these arms in his service according to his order...neither let a lord in any way deprive his men of them either by forfeiture or gift.....
5. If anyone bearing these arms shall have died, let his arms remain for his heir.....
6. Every burgess who have more arms than he ought..will sell them or give them away or otherwise bestow them on such a man as will retain them for the service of the King of England.
7. Item, let no jew keep in his possession a hauberk or an aubergel, but let him sell them or give them away....
8. Item, let the justices cause oaths be sworn by lawful knights and other free and lawful men of the boroughs, who have chattels of such value as makes it necessary for him to have a hauberk, & aubergel, a lance, & a shield, namely that one by one they will give their names.....
9. Item, let no one carry arms out of England except by order of the lord King;
10. Item, let the justices cause it to be announced throughout all the counties through which they may pass, that those who have not these arms,.....
11. Item, ...no one, as he values his life and his possessions, may buy or sell any ship with intent to take it out of England.

About 100 years later, Edward I brought Henry's Assize of Arms up-to-date. Every man between 15 and 60 was to provide himself with arms with stipulation: "The man with land worth 15 pounds and 40 marks of goods was required to have a hauberk, a helmet of iron, a sword, a knife and a horse; With land worth but ten pounds and only 20 marks of goods, he was required to have all the above except the horse; with land worth 5 pounds, the hauberk changes to a doublet; if only land worth 2 pounds, then a sword, bow and arrows and a knife were the limit required of him. There was no exemption, however, of any freeman".

During the 16th century in England volunteering for service was established a practice which had its roots in the aftermath of those zealous expeditions remembered as the Crusades. The oldest such volunteer group dates from 1637, when they were chartered "The Fraternity of Guild of St. George; Masters and Rulers of the said Science of artillery as aforesaid rehearsed for Long-bow; Cross-bow and Hand guns", whose heritage descended to "The Honorable Artillery Company of London" which rendered distinguished service in World War I.

After remianing with them 2 years he moved to Knox County, Illinois. In 1846 he was married to EVELINE KOONS, of the same County where he remained until 1853, when he moved to this Territory, where he has since lived. He leaves a widow and 7 children to mourn their loss. In the death of Mr. SCHUH his family have lost a kind husband and good father; he was an enterprising and industrious farmer, and was emphatically an excellent citizen, one of the best neighbors and the poor mans true and honest friend.

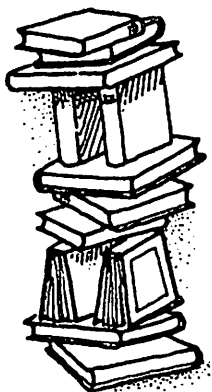

## EARLY CLARK CO. PEOPLE

HUGH MACMASTER

Material for this caption is taken from Biographical Books, Newspaper articles, Obituaries and other books.

The most important commercial enterprise in Camas, Washington, is the general store of MacMaster & Company, which is not only the oldest concern here but is also doing the largest business. The president of the company, Hugh MacMaster, has been very active and influential in matters affecting the welfare and progress of the community and is justly regarded as one of its representative citizens.

He was born in Scotland and is a son of A. E. and Elizabeth (Mc Indoe) MacMaster. In 1874 the family left Scotland and landed at Quebec, Canada, on the 24th of May--Queen Victoria's birthday. They lived in Canada for nine years first in Ontario; afterward for a short time just outside of Ottawa; and then in Compton County, Quebec, where they remained until 1883. In the summer of that year the father came to the Pacific coast, stopping first in Portland, where he was employed for a short time at his trade, that of carpenter and joiner, and then came to Camas, Washington, where he built a house and store combined. He then sent for his family, who arrived in September of that year, and here he and his wife spent their remaining days, the father dying in September, 1888, and the mother in December, 1907. They had thirteen children, of whom four sons died in Scotland, the others being as follows; Jessie, who was the wife of William Mills, and is deceased; Donald, deceased, who was at one time judge of the court of Clark county; Agnes, who is the widow of Henry Craw, of Newburg, Oregon; Violet, who is the wife of David Burcham, of Long Beach California Isabel, who is the widow of John Scott, of Montreal, and is apast president of the Women's Club of that city; Mary, who is the widow of W. F. Bowman, of Scotstown, Quebec, Canada; and Annie, who was bookkeeper for E. P. Edwards in Portland and is now deceased.

Hugh MacMaster received a public school education and was employed for one year in a wholesale drygoods house in Montreal. After coming to Washington he spent three years in a paper mill of the Columbia River Paper Company. On the death of his father he took over the management of the store at Camas and has been at the head of the business continuously since. The original store building was an unpretentious affair, the store room being fourteen by twenty-feet in size while the family lived up stairs and in the rear on the first floor.



In 1885, the increasing business requiring more room, the father erected a two-story building, twenty-six by fifty feet in size, at the corner of Third and Columbia streets, the upper story being used as a lodge hall for a number of years. In July 1890, Hugh MacMaster took his brother-in-law, Allen Duffin, into the firm, and in 1893 a younger brother, Donald MacMaster, was also given an interest in the business. During this period the business having outgrown the building, a one-story addition, twenty-two by sixty feet, was erected. Having studied law in his leisure time, Donald MacMaster removed to Vancouver to practice his profession in 1898, disposing of his stock to a sister, Violet MacMaster, who early in 1902 sold her share to George Self, who continued a member of the firm until 1908.

In April 1915, A. C. Allen of Ridgefield, was admitted as a partner. On September 1st of that year, Allen Duffin's connection was terminated by his sudden death, he having been a member in the firm in April, 1916, and the full membership at the present time is Hugh MacMaster, who is president; W. L. Chapell, vice president; A. C. Allen, Secretary and treasurer; and Mrs. A. Duffin. In 1916, the business having again outgrown its building and the Crown Willamette Paper Company wishing to extend their buildings in that direction, there was an exchange of properties, MacMaster & Company securing two lots on the southwest corner of Fourth and Clark streets and on these erecting a modern store building, two stories high, of reinforced concrete, seventy by one hundred feet in size, with full basement, and having twenty offices and apartments on the second floor. This is a splendidly designed building, of attractive architectural style, and the store room is as light, sanitary and pleasing as could be devised. The firm carries a full line of general merchandise, including dry goods, furnishing, shoes, hardware, groceries and allied lines; employs a force of courteous and accomodating clerks, and draws a large trade from a radius of surrounding territory.

In October, 1891, at Camas Hugh MacMaster was united in marriage to Miss Ella Patton, whom he had met in school in Canada, and whom he again seen while on a visit to his old home there in 1888.

Mr. MacMaster has taken an active interest in local public affairs, having served two terms as a member of the city council, one term as mayor and also as clerk of the school board. He is president of the Farmers Cooperative Creamery Company; is director of the Citizens Bank of Camas, and while the Chamber of Commerce was in existence there he served as chairman of the good roads committee, having always been a strong advocate of improved highways. He is a past president of the Camas Cemetery Association. He is a member of the Masonic fraternity and Kiwanis Club, while his religious connection is with the Presbyterian church, in the work of which he takes an active interest. A man of sterling character and upright principles, an able and progressive business man and an enterprising and public-spirited citizen, he has long commanded to a marked degree the unqualified confidence and respect of his fellowmen and has well merited the prosperity which has come to him.

## PIONEER RESIDENT OF CAMAS PASSES AWAY APRIL 24

## HUGH MC MASTER WAS FORMER CAMAS MAYOR

Camas lost one of its Pioneer residents in the passing of Hugh Mc Masters, 82, at Vancouver Memorial Hospital, April 24, 1948.

Services at the Stoller Chapel in Camas were held Tuesday afternoon, April 27, with Reverend Clyde Wilson, first Baptist Church Officiating and J. M. Tedford as soloist, with Mrs. Tedford as accompanist at the pipe organ. "Crossing the Bar" and "Abide With Me" were sung. Vault entombment was made in the Camas Cemetery.

Born in Glassgow Scotland, July 30, 1867, Hugh Mc Master went to Canada with his parents, then came to Camas in 1883, at the age of seventeen along with his mother and other children of the family. Following his father Aneas Mc Master, who had gone ahead to prepare for their coming.

As a young man Hugh Mc Master helped clear the land for the Crown Willamette Mill, and went to work at the mill himself the second after it started to make paper. From 1891 to 1932, Mr. McMaster operated the Goods and Hardware store. First retail store established in Camas which was started by his father in 1883.

October 28, 1891 he was married to Ella Patton, of Montreal, Quebec, who survives him. Their Golden Wedding Celebration in October 1941, was the occasion for congratulations by a great many friends made during their many years of residence in Camas and active participation in the community and church affairs.

Mr. Mc Masters served as Mayor of Camas from 1915 to 1917 and as city clerk from January of 1935 through December 1944.

He was also a charter member of the local cooperative Creamery Association known as the Bede Island Creamery until its merger into what is now the Clark County Dairy-Co-Op. During the many years of his membership he held the offices of President, Vice President, Secretary and Secretary-Treasure and was also an active member of the board of directors.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, the Masonic Lodge and Kiwanis Club.

Survivors include his wife, Ella Mc Masters, Camas, temporarily at a nursing home in Battle Ground. A sister, Mrs. Violet Burcham, Long Beach, California and several nieces and grand and great-grand nieces and nephews.

## NOTES & QUOTES

HEIRLOOM BIRTH CERTIFICATES: These certificates are described as scroll-like certificates which make nice gifts at a cost of \$25. They must be authenticated by the state's vital records department. They are sent to a calligraphy artist and finally, delivered to Gov. Neil Goldschmidt for his signature. About \$11.50 of the amount goes directly to education against child abuse. It is time-consuming. For information about ordering, call the Health Division's Vital Statistics (Oregon) number which is located in the Blue Pages of local telephone books. (From The Oregonian, Wed. Oct. 21, 1987)

NEW in the C.C.G.S. Library are eight microfilm reels of Washington Marriage Returns 1891-1920. These are not complete for Washington for this time period as some counties evidently did not send in their returns to the State. It requires some patience to read the films, but the information, when found, is worthwhile. It is necessary to research by date. The Marriage Returns are filed according to Certificate No. It is also well to quickly review the complete film as some years are out of order. Information on Marriage Return...Names of bride, groom, their parents, birthplaces of all parties (if known), places of residence, date of license and marriage, occupation of the spouses, color, date return was filed (there may be a lapse of time between the date of marriage and date return is filed).

CENSUS: One of the most significant tools available to the genealogical researcher today is the U.S. Census. It aims to include everyone in the U.S. at 10-year intervals from 1790 to the present covering the whole U.S. in the geographical designations of the area when the census was taken. The schedules for 1790 for some states were destroyed when the British fired the Capitol buildings in 1812. Tax lists of various dates have been substituted for the missing census schedules for parts of Virginia, Kentucky, Georgia, Delaware, and District of Columbia. However, there is neither tax list or census for New Jersey.

Census schedules prior to 1850 include the heads of families, with the number of males and females listed in each household. Ages should be confirmed from other sources. As a rule, those of children under 16 are correct. For various reasons, ages, particularly of women, are often incorrect. Perhaps the person giving the age did not know the exact age (anyone at home at the time the census taker paid his visit); a wife may have given an incorrect age to avoid showing that she was older than her husband; or people would report the age as what it would be on the next birthday. There can be an honest variation in age from one census to another depending on the date the census taker took the census. Therefore, watch the date the census was taken and always record it on the recording sheet.

Census takers were often careless and limited further by nationality and lack of education. For example, an Irish census taker wrote "Chartier" as "Sherkey" and a family was "lost" until first names were studied. "B" and "P" are interchanged as "Brobst" and "Probst," also "Coble" and "Koble," etc. A person's pronunciation of "Harbrough" caused it to be spelled "Arbaugh" in one census.

A man's name appeared in the 1810, 1820, and 1840 census but not in 1830 in one locality thus giving the impression that he had moved to another location during the latter time. It was discovered that the census taker had given the surname of the man just ahead of him on the rolls of the 1830 census. Therefore, his name did not appear at all in the 1830 census. So you see, there are many examples of errors.

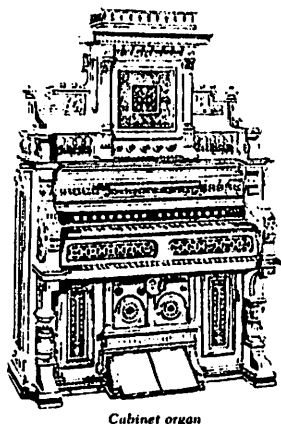

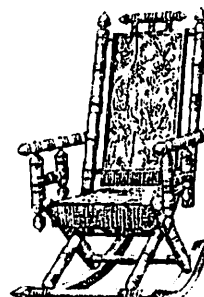
