

NOTES & QUOTES



A portion of a letter written to the assistant editor from a friend in Floreat Park, Australia who has taken up the most difficult task of deciphering the 1900 Clark County Census. Those of us who have worked on this project can appreciate his problems and he has our sympathy and gratitude for this undertaking.— Ed.

CCGS Member:

Thank you for your letter 20 July. I always enjoy hearing news of you and the CCGS through your letters which help break down the distance barrier between Perth and Vancouver. Many thanks for the copy of the 1880 Census which came as a complete surprise. You will be pleased to know that it has been a tremendous help, not only in identifying families who were in the county at the taking of both census but also in providing an insight into the style of print names in use at the turn of the century. There seems to have been a great population explosion in Washington in the 1880's and 1890's, as there are many new families who were not living in the state at the time of the 1880 census. However, the booklet is receiving plenty of use and will, I suspect, be rather worn by the time I finish this project.

You will note that I now speak blithely of finishing the project, but there was a time when I thought I would never have the time or energy to complete the undertaking. A friend of mine who has turned into a "genealogical nut" after I introduced him to the subject, is frankly incredulous that I should have taken on the job of transcribing the 1900 census. I am sure he believes that I have gone soft in the head, but then he operates as I used to-always taking from the system but never putting anything back. Like my pioneering ancestors who blazed a trail across America in 1850's if stout hearted souls like you and your mother and others before you had not spent long and tedious hours compiling genealogical records for printing the likes of my friend would not be able to trace his ancestors with comparative ease today.

The first few hundred transcriptions were the worst, but having now completed the Cedar Creek, Chelatchie, Columbia, Fern Prairie, Fruit Valley and Salmon Creek precincts, I feel as though I am starting to see daylight at last. I still have some studying to do on those pricincts, but regard them as virtually complete. When I took the prouect on you and others had done approximately 2,000 transcriptions to which I have now added a further 3,500. With only about 2,800 to go I feel that I am well and truly on the downhill run. As one launches into a new precinct, one feels that the handwriting is the worst you have ever seen. Gradually however, one becomes used to the style of the enumerator to the extent that you become familiar with every line, loop and peculiarity of his hand. Then suddenly you are into a new precinct and once again you feel the particular enumerator has the worst handwriting you have ever seen. etc., etc.



Ever find something you think you want to share and talk yourself out of it? Excuses: Its not important: who would care: Oh, well, never mind.

Ever notice that the 'Trail Breakers' editor, Mildred Porter goes to the trouble to ask people to contribute material to help fill the pages?

I found such a thing and dropped her a line and she called me and asked if I would mind writing it up for publication in the next issue. I said I can try. Maybe it is time that we all should perhaps create a new column with

a cute name. (Like Readers Resources, Members Market, Sacred Scuttlebutt, Tracers Trivia, Jabberwocky Junque, Genealogy Gibberish, or Digger's Digest) and why not? Its food for thought.

Of course it would be blank if no one sends in anything.

I think I spent more time making up names than checking on copyright perimeters. I simply called the Ft. Vancouver Library (695-1566) question line. I was told that the following quote from a book could be reprinted with source cited if it did not exceed 1/10 (one tenth) of the length of the published material. So on with my find in the quest of the missing ladies "Samples of names used by frontiersmen for contraband females and Mary Magdalenes: Nymph du Prairie, Nymph du pave, Fairs, Fair Dolcina (Dulcineas?), girls of the night, girls of the period, soiled doves, fancies, calico queens, painted cats, scarlet ladies, demimondes. Of course there were the more mundane spellations such as laundress, dance hall girl and waitress by which many were shown on census records.

Though not thoroughly verbatum, this passage can be located in "Great Gun Fighters of the Mansas Cowtowns, 1867-1886" pg 12-13, compyright 1963 by Nile H. Miller and Joseph W. Snell.

Editor:

I thought that the following experience might be of some interest and help to some of our genealogist friends.

When I was a young boy, I remember my father telling me that his fathers older brother, Luke, was a Drummer Boy in the Civil War and he died when he was only seventeen years old.

For years I imagined young Luke in his tattered uniform, bandaged head and well worn drum, proudly drumming the troops through battle after battle finally succumbing to wounds on the field of battle.

A couple of years ago I sent letters out to relatives in Ohio asking about Luke, but they professed no knowledge except that he died at age seventeen in the Civil War. I next sent in the proper forms to the National Archives and Records Administration, Military Records Division: 8th St. & Pennsylvania Ave. N.W., Washington D.C. 20408 and requested the military records of Luke Grafton, probably enlisted as a drummer boy in Ohio, Civil War. That was the only information I had. In a few weeks I recieved Lukes xeroxed records. It dashed all of my heroic dreams. He had become ill several weeks after enlisting as a Private, Company I, 45th Ohio Infantry. He was sent to a hospital in Lexington, Kentucky where he died of Typhoid Fever, December 13, 1862 at the age of 18.

Luke had never been in a battle.

Early this year I again became curious about Luke and wrote to the Veteran Administration, Dept. of Memorial Affairs, Washington D.C. 20420; and asked for his burial place. Soon they replied with the place of his burial as Lexington National Cemetery, Lexington, Ky. Grave #151 and the date of his death.

There went some wonderous illusions of brave deeds and a family story of a Drummer boy who died heroicly. But poor Luke tried: and really what else can one ask of another but to try.

Mr. FLANDERS, the Republican nominee, accompanied by the up-country delegations have gone home. Mr. CLARK has also gone to make preparations for the canvass which will soon commence. We have to throw ourselves on our own resources once more.

No. 3, on Wednesday it was resolved to give a ball on the first of May, inaugural of their magnificent hall which will be completed by that time. He has been ordered to Fort Vancouver, from which it would appear that the War Office at Washington have designated Fort Vancouver as the Department Headquarters. General ROUSSEAU's appointment is said to be very distasteful to regular army officers, as he is said to be without much military experience, and as the claims of many deserving veteran officers of the regular army have been entirely ignored by making this appointment.

HORSES.....General ELLIOT and Lieut. HALL have been engaged during the last week in inspecting a large number of horses offered for sale to the Government and intended for use in the cavalry service. Our old friend ROBERT J. LADD, Esq., and numerous horse dealers from Oregon are here on that business. PROBATE COURT.....Judge DOUTHIT held the regular term of the Court this week, but little business of importance was transacted. The final accounts in the estates of JOHN AIRD and JOSEPH WRIGHT, deceased, were filed and will be shortly settled. [2/5]

CEDAR LUMBER....The finest lot of cedar lumber we have seen, was brought into town last week by Mr. LOUIS LIESER, who has just completed his new mill on Salmon Creek. It is well and evenly sawed and entirely clear of knots and other blemishes. Messrs. SOHNS & SCHUELE have been appointed agents for this lumber. We are informed, that Mr. LIESER will be able to supply all the demand in this market and more too. We are glad that this branch of industry has been fairly opened and another leak-hole stopped, thro' which many home dollars slipped out of circulation in this neighborhood. [2/4]

REWARD.....Mr. JOHN McMULLEN offers a reward of \$150 for the recovery of the greenbacks and gold watch which was recently stolen from him.

A PRECOCIOUS RASCAL.... A young chap named MARK SMITH, some 15 years old, who was acting for a short time as an errand boy for the Mission, went to CRAWFORD & SLOCUM's store the other night, pretending that he had been sent by the Sisters of Charity and requested a loan of \$30 for the Sisters. The principal clerk had stepped out and Mr. JNO. O'KEANE, the book-keeper, believing the boy's statement to be true, unhesitatingly gave him the required sum out of his private purse. In a short time the boy returned and stated that the Sisters wanted \$60, instead of \$30. This second demand created a little suspicion and the boy was told, that he must bring a written order. He played the same trick upon another merchant, Mr. JOSEPH WISE, who was hoodooed out of \$80 in the same manner. Subsequent inquiry established the fact, that the Sisters did not know anything about the matter and that the whole transaction was a little private financeering operation upon the young scamp's own account. Before the discovery, however, the boy took passage on the Cascades boat and he is now supposed to be on his way to Walla Walla, where some of his relatives are said to reside.



GEORGE WEIGEL DIES SUDDENLY

George M. Weigel 68, retired pioneer business man and well known citizen of Vancouver, died suddenly at his home on Thirty-fifth and Columbia streets yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock. Mr. Weigel had been dowtown earlier in the day and after returning to his home went into the kitchen for a drink of water where he dropped dead.

Mr. Weigel first came to Vancouver as a member of the United States Army and was stationed in Vancouver Barracks. After serving five years in the army he was discharged at the Barracks in 1887. He afterward assisted in organizing Company G First Regiment of the National Guard organization. In 1896 Mr. Weigel resigned this office, and went

into business. The firm was known as George M. Weigel & Company and was located in the John Eddings building.

Later Mr. Weigel formed a partnership with Frank Eichenlaub, who later purchased the business. In 1916 Mr. Weigel, in partnership with his sons, George Weigel, Jr., and Frank Weigel, opened a grocery store. The store is still being operated by the sons in the Weigel building at Eighth and Main streets.

While in business in Vancouver Mr. Weigel took an active part in civic affairs and served two terms as a member of the city council of this city. He served on the city council in 1911 and in 1912.

He was born in Germany [Rhinepfaiz, Bavaria, Germany according to one source] October 11, 1860, and came to the United States in 1878. In 1866 he was married to Miss Marie Herman of this city. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge; Kumtux Tribe No. 3, Improved Order of Redmen and Sons of Herman.

[The Interment was the 10th of February and was noted in the Vancouver Columbian.]

"It was one of the largest funerals held in the Hamilton parlors. The services at the chapel and at the grave in Park Hill cemetery were in charge of members of Mt. Hood Lodge No. 32, F. and A.M. with Dr. J. H. Stream worshipful master of the lodge in charge and Dr. Coleman E. Byram, chaplin of the lodge, officiating. As the body was moved from the chapel to the hearse a line of fifty Masons formed an aisle and as the body was carried to the final resting place in the cemetery the aisle of lodge members again formed. Acting pallbearers were William C. Bates, David Talbot, Fred Sinn, William Laughlin, L. J. East and H. W. Arnold."

A family member has told that the C.C. store was established by this family after the grocery store was closed.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN PASSES AWAY

Ridgefield Wash. Jan. 8-- William O. Brice, aged 71 years, died early Saturday morning of heart failure at the home of his son-in-law, A. R. Smith after being ill for some time. The funeral services was held Sunday afternoon from the Methodist Episcopal church and was conducted by the Ridgefield I.O.O.F. Lodge No. 152 of which organization he was a member. Rev. Harvey O. Cooper pastor officiated in funeral services. Interment was made in the family plot at the Ridgefield Odd Fellows Cemetery.

The deceased was born in Illinois and when a small boy moved with his parents to La Crosse, Wisconsin. Here he resided, also in that vicinity until 1889 and then moved

westward with his family and located at Vancouver, Wash. In 1891 he came to Ridgefield where he lived until the time of his death. He lived on a farm for some years in this part of Clarke County and later conducted a small brickyard here after which he entered the mercantile business.

He was a Civil War Veteran being a member of the 14th Wis. infantry and took part in a number of big engagements. He also served in the navy.

The survivors are one daughter, Mrs. A. R. Smith, this place, four sons, David B. Brice of Ridgefield, R. W. Brice, W. T. Brice, G. F. Brice of Portland, Oregon, three grandsons, Elmer Brice and Vernal Brice and George Frederick Brice of Portland. One brother also survives him at Fall Creek Wis. Mrs. Brice died November 3, 1914.

Harris are all married and reside in this county. George Harris lives in Missouri, and Amy Turnbull in Kansas.

The deceased was for a long time a member of the Baptist church, after which he joined the Christian denomination. He joined the order of Free Mason in Marion, Linn County, Iowa, and affiliated with Washington Lodge in this city in 1869. He lived a life worthy of emulation, was loved and respected by all who knew him. FORT WALLA WALLA, WASHINGTON

TITLE, Declared a reservation for military purposes by Executive Order dated May 13, 1859. By act of Congress approved February 24, 1871 (16 Stat., 430), the Secretary of War was authorized to transfer the reservation to the Secretary of the Interior for disposition, and under date of July 16, 1872, the Secretary of War, in accordance with said act of February 24, 1871, transferred the reservation to the Interior Department. The Interior Department having returned the reservation to the War Department, it was again announced as a reservation for military puposes by General Orders No. 24, Department of the Columbia, August 25, 1873. October 26, 1875, the whole of the timber and part of the hay reservation was by the Secretary of War relinquished to the Interior Department. May 3, 1880, the remainder of the hay reservation was relinqueshed and also 26. 35 acres of the militarry reservation, leaving the area as above stated.

FORT WALLA WALLA CEMETERY

Military Cemeteries tell the story of how a country was built, who the people were, what they did or why they lived. This cemetery was laid out in 1856 and the graves definitely mark events nearly forgotten. There are graves of members of the First Oregon Cavalry who were killed at the battle of French Town in 1856 and Colonel Geoge Wright had the bodies brought to this site and they were the first burials. There are thirty-three bodies buried in one grave of soldiers killed in the White Bird Battle of the Nez Perce Wars in 1877. Lt. Sevier Raines is buried there with the ten soldiers who fell with him in the battle of Lawyers Canyon of the Nez Perce War. Major Eugene Baker (Tim Baker) commanded a detatchment of the Second Cavalry and also the Infantry and members of his command had their final resting place there. Bakers troops wiped out the Peigan and Blood Indians on Maria's River in 1870. The Major was buried there in 1884.



A few days ago I visited a spot at Stateville [town of Hebron, N.Y.] where there was once a family burying ground and where I was told there were quite an array of grave stones some fifty or more years I found only three stones, all down, that bore inscriptions. to John McCall, a Scotchman from the county of Argyle, who died March 1, 1806, in his 59th year. The others were to George H. West who died June 9, 1854, age 22 years, 6months, 15 days, and Francis M. West who died June 15, 1831, age 15 days. The McCall stone was almost covered with dust thrown out by a There were graves marked by field stones. What became of the other stones no one seems to know. Perhaps there are others that are buried in the accumulation of leaves, bushes, weeds and dirt thrown up by the woodchucks, and perhaps some of them have been taken by people in the vicinity to use when a nice flat stone was wanted. 
Note 2196. Barons of the Cinque Ports. It may be interesting to correspondents of these columns who have ancestors in Kent that under the laws of the Kingdom the burgesses [that is, freemen] of the Cinque Ports were entitled to the honor of the title "Baron of the Cinque Ports," and it is perfectly legitimate to so designate them whenever writing a description of the lives of such ancestors. The Cinque Ports, so called, were five in number, namely--Sandwich, Dover, Hythe and Romney in Kent and Hastings in Sussex and these were the original "Cinque Portuus." Winchelsea and Rye in Sussex were subsequently added. Each of these principal ports had six detached members as follows to Hastings belonged Pevensey, Seaford, Bexhill and St. Leonards, all in Sussex; Bakesbourn and Grench in Kent. To Romney belonged Lydd and Oriestone, Hythe had no detached members. belonged Folkestone, Faversham, Margate, Birchington and Ringwould. Sandwich belonged Fordwichm, Deal, Ramsgate, Sarr, Walmer and Brightlinsea To Rye belonged the town of Tenterden. Every official and freeman of the above named parishes and towns was a Baron of the Cinque Ports. They were free of all taxation by the King, in return for which they rendered service to him in defense of the realm at sea. G. E. B. M.
