

- 7. Will or probate records
- 8. Clark County histories or biographies (Give name and location of book)
- 9. Gravestone inscriptions, with death dates and cemetery information
- 10. Tax lists
- 11.Old letters or other proofs of Clark County residence
- 12. Clark County Genealogical Society publications available for research at our library

We would like photocopies of any proofs that you would be willing to share with us for our files. We would appreciate the loan of any pioneer photographs for our publication or a copy for our files if you have one.

Fill out one five generation pedigree chart and a family group sheet for each generation being submitted. Please make out a separate chart for each marriage if the person was widowed or divorced. Include any interesting biographical material and other information that is available such as: occupation, military service, church affiliation, physical descriptions, education, special talents, fraternal organizations, political offices, their life prior to emigration to Clark County, cause of death. Family group sheets and pedigree charts are available at the Clark County Genealogical Society Library.

EARLY CLARK CO. PEOPLE

GEORGE TURNBULL

George Turnbull came to Clark County in 1871. He appears with his wife Mary E. and four children on the census taken that year and the youngest child, Cornelius, age 7/12 was born in Missouri. In the lumbering or logging business for at least twenty years, he built the first logging railroad in the county at Sara and owned farm 67, T3N R2E.

George Turnbull was born August 1846 in Kentucky; his father was born either Kentucky or England and his mother either Virginia or Kentucky. About 1864 he married Mary Elizabeth Harris who was born Aug 1843 in Missouri. Her father was born in Canada and her mother in Missouri. They had fourteen children: William was born c. 1865, MO; D.F. "Franklin" was born 23 July 1867, MO; m. 10 Nov 1890 Clark Co., to Jennie Steelman who later m. James A. Hand 7 April 1900 after Franklin's death on 13 Mar 1896, bur. Wilson Bridge Cemetery; Susan L./Susie M. was born 1868/69, MO, m. Andrew M. Roberts 30 Sep 1886, Clark Co.; Cornelius /Cornealus H. was born 15 Mar 1870, MO; d. 17 Oct 1890, bur. Wilson Bridge Cemetery; Nellie E. b. 1872 MO, m. John Bird or John Price on 11 Jul 1891, Clark Co., May/Mary b. 1874, WA, probably the Mary A. m. C.E. Carlisle 18 Jun 1892, Brush Prairie, WA; Henry b. 1876, WA, m. Jessie Carlisle 18 Nov 1893 Brush Prairie, WA (her parents: James Carlisle and Margarett Careon); Leticia/Letta H. b. 1877 WA, m. Andrew Hanes/Haines 12 May 1869, Maple Grove, Clark Co., Roxie E. b. Oct 1879, Brush Prairie, WA, m. Mortimer Bennett, 11 Jan 1895, Brush Prairie, WA, (he was b. There are many family histories to research for help with the type of history one elects to acquire.

We are entering into the coming fiscal year with new material ideas and peronnel or staff changes for the Society.

Starting with the printshop which may not have as much change but they have had printing jobs during the summer for other societies and private histories, thus making new interests and monies for our society. The printing of our "Early Clark County History" was a huge success. The editors and those who sent in their histories did an excellent work. The printing committee now has Cemetery and Marriage books to print as soon as indexing and typing work is finnished. It should be a rewarding year for them.

The CCGS Library has taken on the new idea concept and added a number of shelves and tables. The books are adequately spaced for an easier access to the books and periodicals.

Since the Editorship of the "Trail Breakers" has changed, we may see some newness there also. As the outgoing editor I would like to give those on my staff a rotund "Thank You" for working so graciously to put out our periodical. I could not have accomplished this without your help. I should also include those people who contributed and were not on the staff but free lanced their articles. These were especially appreciated and they made for a more interesting periodical. I enjoyed the editorship but felt I could not do justice to it so decided it was time to let others have a turn at it.

The Society is again sponsoring a beginners class on Genealogy at the Clark College. This is an activity well worth the effort. Besides creating an interest in genealogy it improves the understanding that there are records and people right here in Vancouver that can give much help0. Some of these record are found in Clark County Court House, Clark County Historical Society, the CCGS Library and the LDS Library. FOURTH OF JULY

The citizens of Vancouver have resolved to appropriately observe had celebrate the coming anniversary of our National Independance. A Committee of Arrangements has been appointed who are determined to do their duty. We are not enabled to publish a programme this week, but we may say that there will be a grand procession, composed of the Military, the Fire Department, and other civic societies, a car of liberty, &c. &c., an oration by some distinguished gentleman, reading the Declaration of Independence, music, and other exercise, firing of salutes, &c., &c. It has been determined that no public dinner shall be given at this time, it having been the cause of some dissatisfaction on former similar occasions. But the Public Square, which is now covered with beautiful shade trees, will be suitably prepared to accommodate parties from the country, who may bring their own refreshments, and enjoy them there in picnic style. The following gentlemen have been chosen as officers of the day: Col. HODGES, President; Capt. JAMES TURNBULL and J. M. FLETCHER, Vice Presidents. Capt. L. S. BABBITT will officiate as Chief Marshal. A full programme will be announced next week. Let us have by all means a glorious good old fashioned time, and to that end we trust that the various sub-committees will diligently attend to their duties, that nothing may mar the festivities of the occasion.

HON. ALVAN FLANDERS.....It is now ascertained to a certainty that the Union party of the Territory have carried the day, and that Mr. FLANDERS is elected by a majority of not less than about seventy-five.

Saturday, June 22, 1867 - Vol. 2 #40

ROBBERY.....The residence of Capt. HAKES in this place was entered one night this week by burglars and numerous articles stolen therefrom. The inmates had retired to bed at the time of the act and although the next room was occupied, yet a successful entrance was made without awakening any one. Suspicion rested upon several soldiers, who deserted about the time of the burglary. Information reached town the next day that some of the stolen articles had been seen in the possession of some of these men, who had been seen near the river about nine miles above this place. A squad of men were immediately detailed by Capt. KELLY who accompanied them, who pursued the scoundrels but they had stolen a boat and had succeeded in making their escape into Oregon. The stolen articles were however recovered and returned to the owner. Among the articles stolen was an immensely large Hoorsehaum pipe, the handsomest one we have seen and valued at about \$125.00.

WRITING SCHOOL....Mr. DOLBEAR, an experienced Professor in Penman-ship has been engaged for several weeks past in giving lessons in penman-ship to a number of pupils in town with the most satisfactory results. His engagements has expired, but he will give another course of lessons, provided he receives sufficient encouragement. The following flattering testimonial signed by well known and reliable citizens has been handed us for publication. We trust Mr. DOLBEAR will be patronised sufficiently to warrant him in prolonging his stay among us:

I.O.O.F....At a regular election by Vancouver Lodge No. 3, held on Monday last the following officers were elected: R. J. MOORE, N.G.; J. A. ORR, V. G.; A. B. INGRAM, R. S.; H. COCHRAN, P. S.; J. L. RANKIN, Treasurer. The officers will be installed next Monday. [2/3]

AWARDED.....The contract for supplying the U. S. Government at this post with seven hundred thousand pounds of oats, five hundred tons of hay and hundred tons of straw, was awarded to JAMES CRAWFORD and JARED VAN VLEET of this place. [2/3]

The attention of contractors is called to the advertisement of Dr. WALL, in another column, for proposals for the erection of a two story brick-building in this place. [2/3]

ELEGANT.... The Union men at Olympia on Saturday were making preparations to receive Mr. FLANDERS, who was expected at Olympia on that day. They accordingly requested the use of the guns at the Territorial Arsenal, for the purpose of firing a salute, which request was granted by General MURPHY in the following characteristic note to his Adjudant Mr. TURPIN:

Friend TURPIN. Please let the d--d Radicals have those Democratic guns to fire a salute for the Temperance candidate, FLANDERS.

We call attention to the last call made upon delinquent debtors by Mr. P. O'KEANE and which appears in our issue of to day. [2/5]

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.....Mr. GEORGE WEBBER, owner of a saw mill on Salmon creek, in this county, met with a serious accident on Tuesday. He was removing some boards from the vicinity of the circular saw, which was in motion, when his left hand was caught by the saw and terribly cut and lacerated. He came very near bleeding to death before any assistance could be rendered. A portion of his hand was amputated yesterday by Dr. TOBEY.

VERY ILL....Telegraphic information from ALLEN FRANCIS, U.S. Consul at Victoria, reached this place that Mr. RAND, formerly lieutenant in the Oregon volunteers, and still later connected with the Pay Department, U.S.A., is lying very ill in Victoria, with no hope of recovery. This is sad news to many of his friends residing here. [2/2]

Paymaster FRANCIS has gone to Steilacoom and other military posts on the Sound for the purpose of paying the troops. [2/2]

SCARCE.....We learn that medical men belonging to the army are very scarce on this coast now. Most of the medical services at the different military posts and stations are performed by civilians who have contracts with the government. Dr. SEMPLE, Surgeon at this post, is under orders for service in another Department and will leave in a few days. There being no one else to supply his place, the Medical Director himself will have to act as Surgeon at this post. [2/3]

CONTESTED ELECTION.....We understand that H. M. HODGIS, late democratic candidate for Sheriff, contests the election of A. SEITEL, on the ground of fraud. It is alleged that a number of illegal votes were cast for Mr. SEITEL, which if deducted, will give the office to the contestent.

SHERIFF'S SALE.....By virtue of an execution issued out of the District Court for the 2d Judicial District of Washington Territory, and to me directed and against the goods and chattles of Bradford and Bishop, and in favor of DAVID F. NELSON, I have, this 21st day of June 1867, levied upon for want of personal property the tract of land known as the DAN'L. BRADFORD claim, situated at Upper Cascades, in Skamania county, W. T. and lying on and along the Columbia River and between the Donation claim of DAN'L. BAUGHMAN and F. A. CHENEWORTH. The above described property or so much thereof as will satisfy the sum of forty-two dollars and sixty cents with legal interest from October 19th 1866 until paid, and twenty-six dollars cost and accruing costs. I will proceed to sell on the premises to the highest bidder for cash on Saturday the 20th day of July 1867 between the hours of nine o'clock a.m. and four o'clock p.m. of said day.

NEW ADS.....We call attention to the advertisement of Mr. STEVENS, who in connection with his grocery store has also started a bakery and is now ready to accommodate any number of customers with all needful articles in his line of business.

DAVID SCHUELE, Esq., Treasurer of this county notifies the tax payers that he is now ready to receive all taxes due for the year 1867. [3/1]

A FINE GARDEN.....It is really worth while for any of our citizens to visit the garden of Mr. CHARLES BAKER on the corner of Main and Sixth streets in this place. Mr. BAKER has taken a great deal of pains to make it an attractive place of resort. The trees, shrubbery, flowers, the cool and shady arbors of grape vine, now in the hight of luxuriance, the gravelled walks, scruplously clean, and tastefully laid out, the great variety of fruit and vegetables now growing, altogether afford a pleasant sight and are well worth a visit. Mr. BAKER will gladly receive any visitors that may call upon him. For the 4th day of July next he will provide an abundance of refreshments of all kinds for customers who may call upon him at that time. [3/1]

SEMINARY....We are requested to state, that persons indebted for tuition to the "Vancouver Seminary," under the charge of Mr. NICHOLS, will please call on the Treasurer, Mr. LOUIS SOHNS, and pay their bills. His business engagements preclude him from calling personally upon the parties indebted.

GOT HIS REWARD....On Tuesday night a soldier belonging to the Cavalry went into Capt. HAKES's garden and regaled himself with all the cherries he could eat. Capt. HAKES, who had noticed the trespass and was watching him, let him alone so far. The soldier then attempted to lay in a supply of cherries and commenced breaking some of the limbs laden with fruit for the purpose of taking them home, when the Captain thought that forbearance had ceased to be a virtue and he fired at the fellow with a shot gun, wounding him severly in the face and other parts of the body, not dangerously, however. It served the men right, for Capt. HAKES had cautioned him the day before not to take fruit clandestinely, but come and ask for it openly and it would be given him.

The Common Council has made no definite arrangements about the purchase of a city cemetery. The subject was before the body on Monday night, but the members came to no conclusion. All propositions were voted down except those of Mr. WM. TURNBULL and Mr. J. MANEY. Each of these propositions received three votes, Mr. PRESTON the seventh Councilman being absent. The matter will probably be decided at the next regular meeting, when all the members are expected to be present.

Volunteer Spotlight

A charter member of Clark County Genealogical Society, Mildred Melina Finley has been active in our group since it's formation. Her living room was used as the library by early members to access the books and magazines donated to society. Our Publicity Chairman since 1977, Mildred was our first Trail Breakers Editor, and has also been Recording Secretary.

Mildred Melvina Main was born 14 September 1913 at Liberty, Gage County, Nebraska, the daughter of Ambrose Main and Laura L. Boyle. When she was about two years old the family moved back to their homestead in Haakon County, South Dakota. Later they sold the homestead and moved to a farm called the "Jim Young Road Ranch," a way station for freight wagons enroute from Ft. Pierre to Rapid City. Here she attended a one room country school house until her high school years. She graduated at Philip, in 1933 and went on to complete a two year course at the Wesleyan University in 1936.

Mildred taught at the Gull Rural School near Edgemont, South Dakota where on many cold mornings the children would huddle in their coats while the older boys would coaxe the fire to burn in the huge stove in front of the classroom. On 14 May 1938, at Gering, Nebraska, about two weeks before the school term was over, she was married to John Wallace Finley. Since her contract specified that she must be single, she didn't announce her marriage until school was out. John, the son of George Wallace Finley and Anna Hagenmeister, was born 24 February at Belmont, Dawes Co., Nebraska.

In 1943, the couple with their daughter Mary Ellen , who was born 11 November 1939 at Hot Springs, South Dakota, moved to Washington. Mary Ellen was married 12 August 1957 to Delbert Butts.

Two daughters were born in Vancouver: Dorothy Jean, born 11 March 1943, married 14 February 1989 to Lauren Waller, and Carol Laurann, born 8 September 1946, married 11 September 1967 to Donald Burger. The Finleys have seven grandchildren: Susan Butts Lester age 31, Kevin Butts age 30, Renee Rintala Grose age 28, Victor Waller age 24, Dawn Waller age 22, Barbara Burger Williams age 21 and Dana Burger age 19. They also have seven great grandchildren.

After completing most of her family research in local libraries, Mildred journeyed to Eastern Nebraska, visiting cemeteries where her grandparents were buried, photographing gravestones and gaining important information. She has published two booklets for her relatives: Boyle Family History and One Main/Maine Line. Mildred belongs to the East Vancouver Methodist Church and to the Women of the Moose, Lodge # 1774.



Where lumber mills thrived

Once buzzing community no longer hive of activity


A historic community with a picturesque name, Bee Tree is fast becoming just a memory.

The old one-room school still stands, ramshackle and deteriorating, but there is little else to mark the pioneer settlement that provided ties for Northwest railroads.


"Most of the old settlers are dead, and their families have moved away," said Adeline Harrison, about the last of the oldtime Bee Tree residents.

Mrs. Harrison was born in 1889 on the same property on which she now lives, the last house on Bill Harrison Road. Bill Harrison was her late husband. Bee Tree lies about five miles due north of Battle Ground in rolling hills that once grew some of the mightiest stands of Douglas fir in the nation. The area between the East and North Forks of the Lewis River was solid forest when the settlers arrived. By 1908, the year the railroad was completed through Vancouver, some 35 sawmills were counted in the immediate area of the Lewis River country.

Mrs. Harrison is the daughter of Edwin and Belinda Batchelder who came from Iowa in about 1883. They homesteaded on the north side of Mason Creek, a rollicking stream that was to become the lifeblood of the community.

"Bee Tree got its name from a tree in which the pioneers discovered a swarm of bees," Mrs. Harrison said. To the pioneers a hive of bees was as welcome as a 100-pound sack of sugar.

This bee tree stood about where the first school was built, a log cabin structure on the south side of Mason Creek Road. An early record of this school, dated Nov. 5, 1887, reveals that Ida Anderson was paid \$25 a month to teach. School was in session just three months a year.

In 1896, the existing school building was constructed across the street from the original school. That was the year Mrs. Harrison entered the first grade. She was taught by her brother, Milton Batchelder, 21.

Mrs. Harrison said she does not know how much education her brother had, but in those days only a grade school education was required of school teachers.

The Harrison children attended the same school as their mother. The school was operated until 1931, when the Bee Tree district consolidated with Battle Ground. "Sure, we got a good education," said Clarence Harrison, 69. "We had all eight grades in one room, but we learned a lot."

Harold Harrison, 58, also remembers the one-room school.

"Sometimes we kids would sneak down to Mason Creek to go fishing, and we'd just forget to come back," he confessed.

The biggest mill in Bee Tree was the Columbia Tie Co. on Mason Creek about one-quarter mile upstream from where County Road 3 crosses the creek. In about 1902, this mill was sold to Jim Brothers of La Center.

A logging railroad ran from the mill up the canyon. After the logs were sawed, the ties were dropped into a flume that carried them along the creek some seven miles downstream to near La Center. There the ties were rafted in the East Fork of the Lewis and towed downstream to where the railroad was being pushed through to Portland.

Clarence Harrison remembers the mill and the pond into which the logs were dumped.


"A guy threw me in this pond when I was little and said, 'Swim, you little SOB,' "he recalled.
Harold Harrison said he used to

so he could pick up trout and salmon in the dry creek bed.

The site of the big mil has reverted to jungle-like growth, but an occassional rusting piece of rail marks the spot.

The Harrisons said there is nothing left to remind people of the heritage of Bee Tree except the old school, which is now privately owned. They said they would like to see it restored and preserved as an historical monument to the day when the rolling hills of Bee Tree, now denuded, were crowned by virgin forest.





PHOTOGRAPH TREASURES:




There is a fascination in looking at old photographs and even the later snapshot albums. They give one a nostalgic yearning to know the character's and their thoughts, avocations, and adversities in their family lives. What person as a child hasn't taken their turn at dressing up in old clothes from closet or attic? Something of this nostalgica is given off from those old pictures and one can almost hear the stories these people might tell if they were able.

The ones you can't hear and must conjecture over, are those photo's which belonged to someone who did not appreciate them enough to write, somewhere on the picture the name, date and time the photograph was taken. Those folks in the photograph could be called our "Orphan Ancestors". So many of these pictures have found their way to the "flea markets, garage sales and thrift stores". I have bought a few of them--sometimes for a reason or maybe for no special purpose in mind.

Hardly any of the old family photo's have dates on them and this is the one clue that could help start one determining who the ancestor could be, "Uncle Thad" or "Cousin Albert". Here is where we need to put on the sleuthing cap and do some serious reasoning. Looking at the clothes they are wearing may give you a time or era their style was worn. It might be a good idea to round up some books on periodical fashions and styles. Establishing a date or near date of when the photograph was taken may be arrived at by a thorough study of everything in the picture—such as clothes, background, hair style, mustache, collars, lapels, trimmings and object in the picture. Comparison with other photo's of a known origin will also help.







By guessing the age of the orphan ancestor and subtracting from the presumed time the photograph was takeen we may about have a date to work with. And now will be the hardest sleuthing. From the family history and chronology, compare dates with the conjectured ones. Armed with this knowledge and the photograph it would be time to pay a visit to a relative, an Aunt or Cousin and getting a good conversation with them might lead to many facts and clues. You never know just what may click and some bit of history may bring out another clue.

Granted, this is a hard way to learn the in's and out's of Geneal-ogy, but isn't it a thrill to learn all about the "Orphan Ancestor". It becomes a hobby with an interesting challenge and one that keeps nagging to learn more of ones progenitors.



Bible records are a vital source of information, particularly for accurate dates before birth, marriage, and death records were recorded officially by local governments. 



Dear Cousin,


I was pleased to get a letter from you. Have head Father and Aunt Belle MACK speak of your parents, but I never expect to have the privilege of corresponding one of Uncle __?__ sons. Am very sorry I am ___ to inform you ___ to our Grand Parents. I know that Father's Grand Parents were of German birth and could not speak English and I feel quite certain that his parents were born in Penn. Grand Father was married three times. Uncle Raymond and Aunt Lucy his first wife's children and he have seven children, by his second wife five sons and two daughters. Grand Mother's maiden name was GOOD. I do not think G Frather lived long after his last marriage. I remember of Father saying that his Father had gone to Philadelphia to have his eyes treated and died very suddenly while there. I do not know where he was burried.

I think you could find out more from cousin Emma CHRISTIAN than any one else now. My Father is dead. He died March 25th, 1890. Aunt Belle died five years later. Uncle Goodwin G died near Darmon, Mich. several years before Father died. He and five children died within three or four years. Aunt Libbie, his wife only had one daughter left. She married again. Her husbands name was HUFF. They left Aunt Libbies old home. I rec'd several letters from her but at last lost track of her. Although I wrote twice to her and also to Post Master but never recieved a reply.

Uncle Raymonds only child by his first wife cousin Lizzie BUFORT lived near La Belle, Mo. For years she was indeed a good christian woman. We often visited her home and never failed to have a pleasant visit. She died—it will be three years in March. She left a husband and three children all are grown. Cousin Lizzie was blind several years before her death. Her eldest daughter Kate is nearly blind and has been all her life. she nearly fourty years old. Her sister Minnie married a Baptist minister and ___ in Canton, Mo. Uncle Raymond lived in Texas after his second marriage. He died and left a young wife and several children. Grandmother died when her youngest child was quite a babe. Uncle Will was the babe of the family. There is but one of all the family living and that is the eldest sister Aunt Kate. If Father was living, he could tell you all you wish to know. He told me so often of his childhood. Giving my Father up was the saddest trial of my life. I idolized him. I was his oldest child and I am so much like my dear Father. He has been away thirteen years past but I hold his memory fresh on my mind. I shall never cease missing him. I so often wish we could have him back for just a little while at least but he has passed beyond the



Also included in the book are photographs and biographies of Colonels Hathaway, Walker, and Wade. A short history of the Seventy-Third Regimental Association closed the book.

The history of these battles are included: Harker's Brigade Going to Sustain Johnson, Map of Stone River Battle-field, Adjutant-General Terrell's Sketch of Regiment, From South Bend to Lexington, Ky., From Louisville, Ky., to Nashville, Tenn., From Nashville to Murfreesboro, Streight's Raid, From Annapolis, Md., to Indianapolis, Morgan's Raid, Libby Prison, History of Detachment Company "Q" [made up from Companies already listed], Return of Seventy-Third to Tennessee, Battle of Athens, Ala., Evacuation and Return to Alabama, End of the War.

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
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
