

Knowing the history of our country and of the entire globe can help in the forming of the family history. It can tell us the when, how and why for the ancestors that had the courage to perform as they did.

Do you know when the Spanish came to America and where they settled? When and where the French came? We all know that the English came in 1620, but did you know in 1607 that they came to Virginia and that the first maidens came to Virginia in 1619 and that by 1624 there were 7,000 people in Virginia?

In 1625-1650 how many Puritans came and where did they settle? When and where were the Swedes, Finns, Dutch, Germans, Danes and Russians, the Huguenots, Palatines etc.


There is a "Short Chronology of Arrivals by Nationality", by Jeanne Lacy Pramaggiore, taken from the Franklinonian and prited up in the "Family Backtracking" of Aug. 1989 Vol. IV #3, which is worth going to the library and copying for reference. It will make researching more interesting and may compare with the family history.


Another chronological list on History is found in the "North-west Alabama Settlers", Vol. XXVIII, No. 2, October 1989, page 41. It is "Calander of American Wars and Campaigns". This is a very necessary list for who is it in these times who doesn't have ancestors in one or more wars.

In the "STALKER 9 #2 page 60" is an article on Ellis Island. While it is not a history of the people entering the U.S. it could give some clues and references for researching. It is so interesting that it makes one wish to go there after 1992 when the new buildings and museum is finished. That year will be their cennteneal celebration.

For those who have German Ancestors I read in Myra Goirmley's article in the Seattle P I where she tells of the book "German Church Books Beyond the Bases" by Kenneth L. Smith which she says, "addresses the multitude of problems an American researcher may encounter." Sounds like a must for the serious researcher, and a good one for anyones own library. It is available as hard bound from Picton Press, Box 1111, Camden, Maine 04843 (\$31.50 postpaid).

Another book which Myra refers is a book for those who have Texans in their family line. "Genealogies of Texas Families" new 400 page book. Available for \$37.20 postpaid from Datatrace systems, P.O. Box 1587, Stephenville, TX 76401. The editor of this book edits "American Genealogy Magazine" (a quarterly) for \$10. per year from the above address.





In his excellent book Applied Genealogy, Eugene A. Stratton gives some examples of spurious lineages created by jumping wide gaps between documented facts to reach unfounded conclusions. Reading his examples reminded me of some of my own painful experiences with widely published but unproven family trees.

Early in my research I looked, as I should have, to see what work had already been done on my family lines. An early find was The Book of the Wilders, a revision of an 1878 work by Reverend Moses Hale Wilder. My first problem with this book was the claim that Thomas Wilder (1644-1716) married Mary Houghton of Lancaster, Massachusetts. Other sources did not bear this out, and I was also suspicious of the claim that there were at least three contemporary Mary Houghtons. I advertised and searched widely for more information, and finally became convinced that he married a Mary Wheeler. But that balloon made a small POP compared to the next one. Rev. Wilder and his revisers assumed, in the absence of evidence to the contrary [emphasis mine], that Thomas Wilder (d. 1677), my immigrant ancestor, was a brother of another immigrant, Edward Wilder, whose ancestry in England can presumably be traced back to 1485. So imagine my shock on reading in the highly respected Stevens-Miller Ancestry, by the very highly respected genealogist Mary Lovering Holman, FASG, that there is no proof that Thomas Wilder and Edward were brothers. POP!

Then there was William Gayer of Nantucket. His descendants have accepted uncritically, and repeated frequently, the claim of A.E. Gayer, in *Memoirs of the Family Gayer*, that William and his brother Sir John Gayer, governor of India, were sons of one Humphry Gayer and nephews of Sir John Gayer of London. This leads nicely into a well-documented royal line. But one day in the Newberry Library in Chicago I came across *Gayre's Booke, being A History of the Family of Gayre*, published in England in 1959 and compiled by Lieut.-Colonel Robert Gayre of Gayre and Nigg (K.C.M.M., M.A., D.Phil., D. (Pol.) Sc., D. Sc., Consultore Pro Lingua Anglica, College of Heralds, Rome) and R.L. Gair (F.R.G.S., F.S.A. Scot.). This impressively qualified pair shows convincingly that Humphry had no son William. But they do conclude that "until further research can be done which might yield more exact information, we cannot be more precise as to their exact ancestry, although there can be no doubt that they are members of the family." So royal descent there may be, but not through Humphry Gayer. **POP! POP!** 

It's always fun to find another ancestor who arrived on the Mayflower, so I was pleased to read in the *New York Genealogical and Biographical Record* that Hannah Brewster, granddaughter of William Brewster, married John Thompson, ancestor of my Eunice Thompson who married Ebenezer Carpenter. But when I picked up a copy of "The Mayflower Quarterly" for May 1986 at The Oregon Forum, imagine my distress to find on page 82 a citation to an authoritative refutation of the Brewster-Thompson marriage! **POP! POP!** 

It's been awhile since I checked to see if anything more has been discovered on any of these lines. Or if any more of my best balloons have been popped. Of course, we're all human and prone to error, but there are lessons to be learned from these examples — among them: cite your sources, defend your conclusions, and always leave room for a reasonable doubt.

### CLARK COUNTY FUNERAL HOME

#### THE HISTORY OF HAMILTON-MYLAN FUNERAL HOME

The Hamilton-Mylan Funeral Home history involves several Clark County families and the funeral homes they owned: Knapp was the earliest and became Knapp-Gunderson; Hamilton became Hamilton-Mylan and the two merged keeping the Hamilton-Mylan name. A chronology follows:

#### KNAPP:

1905-1934: William Jennings Knapp at 10th and Columbia St.

1934-1939: Sadie Stargur Knapp and son Joseph Knapp

1939-1960: Jospeh Knapp

#### KNAPP-GUNDERSON:

1960-1966: John E. Gunderson with Paul Mylan as silent partner bought out Joe Knapp and mortuary became known as Knapp-Gunderson Funeral Home.

#### HAMILITON:

1917-1918/19: William E./H. Hamilton at 11th and Columbia

1918-1936: Edward Arthur Hamilton

1936-1939: Ethyl Henrichson Hamilton and son John Edward Hamilton

1939-1945: Joe Shaughnassy who sold out to Ray Andrews to go into partnership with Shaughnassey, Goetsch, & McGee of Portland, OR

1945-1947: Ray Andrews

1948-1966: Paul L. Mylan

In 1966 John Gunderson, with Hamilton's employee Hugh Lanier, merged Knapp-Gunderson with Hamilton-Mylan.

#### HAMILTON-MYLAN:

1966-1981: John Gunderson and Hugh Lanier

1981-1986: John and Sue Gunderson

1986-present: David R. Fuller

Paul Mylan had a seven year contract to work for them. Hugh Lanier died in 1981, leaving John and Sue Gunderson as owners. In 1986 David R. Fuller became owner with John continuing to work on a part time basis.

Note: CCGs member Geraldine Gilman has been working closely with the people at the Hamilton-Mylan Funeral Home, extracting genealogical information from the records. Early material will appear as a series in the Trail Breakers before it is published as a book. Gratitude is expressed to the funeral home for their generosity in providing these records which are valuable to researchers and also to John E. Gunderson for reviewing the biographical information provided herein. Interviews were held with David Fuller, Bob Standefer, and John Gunderson of Hamilton-Mylan as well as Mrs. John Hamilton and Paul L. Mylan. Newspaper clippings were provided by John Gunderson.

#### WILLIAM JENNINGS KNAPP

William Jennings Knapp was born on the 12th of August 1873 at Garden Grove, Iowa. When out of school, he started an Ice and Transfer business in his birth city. On February 6, 1896, he married Sadie E. Spargur in his home town and they had one son, Joseph A. Knapp. By 1904 he was associated with the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis, Missouri; and when that closed, he decided to go west to Portland, Oregon, where the opportunity to learn the mortuary business became available with J.P. Finley & Sons until 1906. Once Knapp felt he knew the undertaking business and had passed his required tests he set out for himself, choosing Vancouver City, across the Columbia River from Portland, to start his own mortuary in a store front building on Eighth Later he bought a lovely old home at 10th and Columbia Streets for his business. The newspaper advertisement for the "Knapp Funeral Service; The Home of Personal mortuary read: Service. Telephone 68."

Knapp had to gain the respect and confidence of the people of Clark County to succeed in a mortuary business and, therefore, through the years, he joined many service organizations and became a leading citizen. He belonged to the Mount Hood Masonic Lodge, the Afifi Shrine, the Elks Lodge, the Moose Lodge, Woodmen of the World, Knights of Pythas, Odd Fellows (I.O.O.F.), the Order of the Eastern Star (Martha Washington Chapter #42), White Shrine of Jersuleum, Kiwanis, St. Luke's Episcopal Church, and the Vancouver Chamber of Commerce.

William J. Knapp was also the Clark County Coroner for sixteen years which often resulted in handling the person's funeral. At times the family decided to use another mortuary and as Knapp had done the preliminary investigation this was called a half funeral.

Although Knapp's name was not among those listed in the tragic accident of the Swan, he sustained injuries severe enough to curtail his life and four years later, on 21 April 1934, he died at the Clark County General Hospital at the age of 61 years. His remains were cremated and the service was read by the Rev. Franklin D. Hart. He left his wife Sadie, son Joseph, two grandchildren of Vancouver and of Waterloo, Iowa, two brothers and a sister. William Knapp was well know for his chairtable donations and often went out of his way to quietly help some unfortuante person. Neither William J. Knapp nor his wife Sadie are buried in a Clark County, Washington, Cemetery, but it is presumed they are at the Portland Memorial Cemetery.

(The story of the Swan was reported in Vol. 15, #3, issue of the Trail Breakers.)

#### JOSEPH KNAPP

Joseph Knapp was born May 13, 1901, in Garden Grove, IA, the son of William Jennings Knapp and Sadie Spargur. He came with his parents to Vancouver in 1904. He attended Central and Franklin

grade schools and graduated from Vancouver High in 1919, and from the University of Washington in 1924. When his father died in 1934, Joseph followed on with the funeral business he had been running for several years because his father was incapacitated from injuries from the ship accident. Joseph was married to Katherine Peterson and had two children, a daughter Alice May Reiherzer and a son Colonel William L. Knapp who retired and presently lives in Ireland. Joseph had worked with his father from the time he was a child and knew every phase of the business. He sold out in 1960 to Mylan-Gunderson-Lanier and died in 29 May 1965.

#### WILLIAM H. HAMILTON

Little is known about William H. Hamilton, but in 1906 he and his wife Martha A. Foote and family left Albion, Boone County, NE, by train and settled in Gresham, Oregon, where he went into the undertaking business. It is believed in 1917 he bought a lovely old home at 302 West 11th Street which is on the corner of Columbia Avenue, just one block north of the Knapp Mortuary, and turned it into the Hamilton Mortuary. This is still the home of the Hamilton-Mylan Funeral Home. No record of his death was found, but it is believed to be 1918/1919.

#### EDWARD ARTHUR HAMILTON

Edward Arthur Hamilton, the son of William Hamilton and Martha Foote, was born March 9, 1884, in Albion, NE. He had long been fascinated with railroads and journeyed west in 1902, starting with the SP & S RR at the Vancouver Washington yards as a pipe fitter. On the September 18, 1908, he resigned that position and, it is presumed, went into business to help his father for the next two years; then on the January 3, 1918, he again went to work for the SP & S when World War I was at its height and was promoted to a train Engineer, a position he held for the rest of his life.

Edward Hamilton married Ethyl J. Henrichson (1889 - 1940), the daughter of a prominent Vancouver Family. Her parents were Gustavus A. Henrichson and Sarah E. McCann. Sarah had been a babe in arms when her parents, William Dudley McCann and wife Joanna M. Smith, with their children crossed the Oregon Trail in 1864 from Mt. Vernon, IL, to Grass Valley, OR, a wheat growing section not far from The Dalles, OR.

The Edward Hamilton's lived in the upstairs apartment over the Mortuary and their son young John Edward Hamilton helped by keeping the Chapel clean and later became a funeral director.

Edward Hamilton was very active in various unions. He held the office of Chairman to the local union of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers. He became general chairman for the entire S.P.& S. system for nineteen years and was a member of many service organizations besides being very active in the Democratic politics. He also belonged to Mount Hood Lodge #32, F & AM, the Elks Club, Odd Fellows (I.O.O.F.), the Eagles, Artisons Life Association, White Shrine, both Minnehaha and Pomona Granges,

and in 1935 he won the election as Mayor of the city of Vancouver. He was considered to be a very good mayor and his unexpected death only one year after he took office was a blow to the city. It was on December 31, 1936, that he was found dead in his second floor apartment over the Mortuary by his wife and Lloyd Brice. Brice had been employed as a special officer to instruct the police force in pistol shooting and needed signature of the Mayor on a salary warrant. Mayor Hamilton had gone home with the flu several days before and Dr. Herbert Leiser had been called, but the autopsy said he died of Angina Pectoris. He was but 51 years old. Edward Arthur Hamilton was survived by his widow Ethyl J. Hamilton, a daughter Lois who was located at Tripler General Hospital in Honolulu, Hawaii, a son John Edward Hamilton of Vancouver, his mother Mrs. Martha Hamilton, two brothers: Fritz of Ft. Klamath, OR., and Fred of Newberg, OR. and three sisters: Mrs. F. D. DeVeny, Mrs. Louis Meeker and Mrs. Marie Hembree all of Portland, OR.

The funeral services were held in the Hamilton's Chapel with internment at Park Hill Cemetery. Mrs. Hamilton could not attend as she was scheduled to have serious operation at the time of her husband's death and had not recovered in time for the funeral services. She died on July 19, 1940, when she fractured her skull after being thrown from a very spirited horse she had bought only a few months before. She was riding with Mr. W. L. Runyon, a local jeweler and operator of the Runyon Riding Academy. She lies besides her husband at Park Hill Cemetery.

#### HAMILTON AND SHAUNAESSY

After Edward A. Hamilton passed away, Mrs. Ethyl Hamilton and her son John continued the Mortuary until 1939 when they sold out to Joe Shaunaessy/Hennessey who operated the mortuary until 1945 when he formed a partnership with Hennessey, Goetsch and McGee, funeral directors of Portland, OR; this company is still operating.

#### RAY ANDREWS

Ray Andrews of Camas next bought the Funeral Home. He also was the Clark County Coroner; he was drowned on July 23, 1947, at Seaview (near Long Beach) Washington and is buried at Park Hill Cemetery.

The following year Mrs. Andrews sold out to Paul L. Mylan who operated the business for 25 years until he sold the Mortuary and retired.

#### PAUL L. MYLAN

Paul Mylan was born August 8, 1908, at Larchwood, Lyon County, IA. He lived and worked in Minnisota and North Dakota. He tried to enlist in one of the United States Services two days after Pearl Harbor but was turned down, so in 1942 he came to Vancouver, WA,

and got a job in the ship yards. His wife was Virginia Zimmerman who was born in Valley City, Barnes County, ND. At the present time they have celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary. The have one daughter, Mitzi Mylan, who graduated from Vancouver High School in 1948 and is married to William Parker. The Mylan's have five grandchildren.

Paul Mylan and Ray Andrews were friends and, when Mrs. Ray Andrews decided to sell, Paul bought the Hamilton Funeral Home in 1948. He operated this funeral home himself and then in 1960, when Knapp Mortuary was for sale, Paul with John Gunderson and Hugh Lanier bought them out. He put John Gunderson and Ray Lanier in charge of Knapp's Mortuary and operated the two mortuaries as competitors. Knapp's at 10th and Columbia had a scaricity of parking space and when Rex Garrison wanted to buy the land and put up a Buick Garage, he sold out and the old house was torn down and the garage put up. Rex Garrison was the brother of Lloyd Garrison who ran the CC Department Store for many years. Gunderson and Lanier then transferred their operations to the Hamilton Funeral Home at 11th and Columbia.

Paul Mylan was active in a number of organizations and was the President in 1960 and a Commadore of the Vancouver Yacht Club. He also belonged to the Optimist Club, the Elks, and the Knights of Columbus.

#### JOHN E. GUNDERSON

John Gunderson was born June 26. 1921, in Alexandria, MN, to John E. Gunderson and Thelma Johnson. He moved to Dickinson, ND, where he went to grade school and graduated from high school in 1939. He graduated from University of North Dakota in 1950 after service in World War II, being discharged as SFC. John came west to San Francisco to a Mortuary school and then was called back into the service in January of 1951, returning to North Dakota and then sent to Fort Rucker in Alabama. In August of 1951 he married Sue DuVall from Dothan, AL. He was discharged in November 1952 as a John and Sue moved to Everett, WA, in January 1953 and in September 1955 they then moved to Camas, WA, where John worked for the Stoller Memorial Chapel until June of 1960. He then came to Vancouver as one of the owners of Knapp's Mortuary. In 1966 he bought out Paul Mylan, one of his partners, and with Hugh Lanier moved their operation to the Hamilton-Mylan Funeral Home. Has a step daughter, Kaye Bowers, who now lives in Vancouver, four grandchildren and three great grandchildren. John Gunderson is now enjoying semi retirement and lives in Vancouver, WA. He belongs to the Elks Club, the Retired Officers Association, the Reserve Officers Association, VFW Post 731, Americasn Legion, Sons of Norway, Washington Lodge F & AM, Eastern Star, and is a founding member of # 1592 Sigma Alpha Epsilon. He retired from the Army Reserve (104th) in 1973.

These present day biographies have been included to make an up to date history of the funeral homes.

#### HUBERT W. LANIER

Born January 10, 1916, in Licking, MO, the son of Gordon Lanier and Avon Beard, Hubert W. Lanier came to Vancouver in 1949. He had worked for an uncle in Whittier, CA, in the mortuary business. Hugh served in World War II for five years and married Blanche Flitcroft. They had two sons and one daughter and he had four grandchildren at time of death. He died May 28, 1981, and is buried at Willamette National Cemetery in Portland, OR.

#### DAVID RUSSELL FULLER

Dave Fuller was born January 26, 1954, in Portland, OR, the son of Dr. George Russell Fuller and his wife Dorothy Belle Masters. Dr. Fuller, recently retired, was a dentist for 35 years in Camas, Washington.

Dave Fuller went to the Vancouver Schools, Carney, Firgo Elementary, Columbia Accidemic, Walla Walla College where he graduated in Business Management and finally Mt. Hood Community College where he grduated in Mortuary Science. He has not married and loves sports of all kinds. He belongs to the Elks Club, Moose lodge, Lions, Sertoma, and the National Rifle Association.

#### ROBERT STANDEFER

# **Volunteer Spotlight**



**Eva Jane Matthies** 

Working behind the scenes, most members are unaware of the tremendous contribution being made to Clark County Genealogical Society by the devoted efforts of Eva Jane Matthies. A long time member, she has labored consistently through the years on the C.C.G.S. marriage records extraction project.

When work began in 1979, Eva Jane volunteered for the project then chaired by Colleen Bennett. Our first marriage records book, covering the earliest Clark County marriages through 1896, was published in 1982 and Eva Jane then continued on as chairman of the committee to the present date. Since that time she has succeeded in the publication of volume II (1897 - 1904), volume III (1905 - 1909), volume IV (1910 - 1913), and volume V (1914 - 1916) which is currently being printed. In all she has been instrumental in the publication of over 1200 pages of records. We are proud in behalf of all researchers that will benefit from her unselfish efforts and grateful for her endeavors in support of our society, which derives its number one source of income from publications. In addition to being marriage records chairman, Eva Jane works in our library and has helped at many of our activities.

Born 11 July 1924 in Ottumwa, Iowa, to Ernest Anderson and Anna Helen Yanok, Eva Jane Anderson spent her early childhood there. In the summer of 1937 the family moved to Faribault, Minnesota, where her father worked in a flour mill and farmed. In 1942 she graduated from Faribault High School, the same school that her mother had attended and even had some of the same teachers. After finishing school she went to work as a telephone operator for Northwest Bell and later was employed as a PBX operator.

# EARLY CLARK COUNTY SITE:

# Enclave of quiet amid din of growth

Grass Valley is an enclave of quiet in the center of one of the nation's fastest-growing counties.

Standing on a hillside and gazing west across the broad valley, one scans a panorama which looks much as it did 100 years ago. Housing developments lurk on Prune Hill, at the south edge of the valley, and subdivisions are creeping eastward through Mill Plain from the west, but Grass Valley remains sprinkled only with isolated farm dwellings.


The valley lies southwest of Lacamas Lake, about three miles north of Camas. It was settled just after the Civil War. A Colonel Knapp was probably the first settler. Knapp had several sons, and among them, they ended up with quite a piece of the valley.

These first settlers were farmers. Among their crops was lush grass, thus giving this area its name.

"Timothy hay grew five- or six-feet tall in the fields," say historians. "They carted it to Vancouver and sold it as feed for the Army's horses and mules."

Another early crop was a blue variety of potatoes. These were grown because they could withstand long voyages by sailing ship.

In the 1880s, prunes became the big cash crop in Grass Valley, and everyone planted trees. One could look in any direction and see a prune dryer.

Today, residents of Grass Valley are still farmers, but almost all of them hold other employment, primarily in the big paper mill in Camas.

Many of the historic old farms, including Colonel Knapp's homestead, have been bought up by land developers MacKay and MacDonald, who are selling much of it to a giant Canadian developer.

In the meantime, sleek black Angus beef cattle continue to graze on the lush vegetation that gave this valley its name.

# WILLIE AND JOHN ROBINS WRITE "HOME"

On the next two pages appear two letters copied from the *Iowa Centennial Book 1888-1988*, published by Fourth Street Publishing, Box A, Central City, IA 52214, and sent in by Bev Brown of Newton, IA, who identified names mentioned. The letters refer to several names found in the Hockinson area of Clark County in 1880.

In the letter from young Willie Robins who was born in Linn County, IA, and died in 1958 at Long Beach, CA: Hattie, Sibbie, Ellie, and Nannie (about one and one half years) are his sisters; Uncle sons is Uncle Lons, grandma is believed to be Nancy Ward, Uncle Henry, Abner and Jake are Wards, Aunt Sade unknown.

John M. Robins wrote the other letter as a post script to Willie's letter. John was first born of Joseph and Ann [McArthur] Robins and all three were born in Ross Co., OH. Joseph was among the earliest settler of Linn Co., IA, buying land and settling in 1844, some of which was surveyed and plotted into street of the town of Robins, IA, in 1888. Ann McArthur was a niece of ex-Governor of Ohio, Duncan McArthur. John married Hannah Ward, sister of Jacob, Rauzewed (as Rosswood on 1880 Clark Co. census), Henry, Alonzo. Hannah was the daughter of William Ward and Nancy Cochran. William, one of the earliest settlers of Linn Co., IA, lived and died there and his wife Nancy came to Clark Co., WA, with her family.

AT LAST.....The Common Council on Monday night purchased from Mr. MANEY ten acres of land immediately back of the Ordnanda grounds to be used as a city cemetery. The sum of \$400 was paid for the same. [3/1]

#### THE CELEBRATION AT VANCOUVER

The glorious Fourth was ushered in by the firing of canon at the Garrison and the ringing of bells. The town looked "gay and festive"; national flags were floating every where and numerous houses were beautifully decorated with evergreen and garlands. Early in the morning numerous delegations of people arrived from the country to participate in the celebration. The procession was formed upon the arrival of the Fannie Troup and Okanagon from Portland. They arrived at about 10 1/2 a.m., bringing a delegation of the Portland Fire Department having Multnomah Co. No. 2 Steam Fire Engine with them and also a vast multitude of people numbering over five hundred. Infantry band and a number of our boys then escorted the Portland Fire Department to its place in the procession. The procession having been formefd by Capt. BABBITT, Chief Marshal, then commenced to march in the following order: The 1st U.S. Cavalry band in full uniform, mounted on horseback, playing national airs and lively marches, a carriage containing the officers of the day, consisting of Col. HODGES, President, Messrs. TURNBULL and FLETCHER, Vice Presidents and Hon. COLUMBIA LANCASTER, Orator, Rev. J. McCARTY, D. D., Chaplain, and also Major General STEELE, U.S.A. They were escorted by Capt. KELLY's Company of the 8th Cavalry in full uniform. Then came the Liberty car, containing 46 little girls representing the different States and Territories presided over by Miss LILLY SMITH, personating the Godess of Liberty and supported by Justice, Truth, Fortitude, Temperance and Prudence. The girls were dressed in white, blue scarfs and wreaths on The car was beautifully decorated and drawn by six their heads. Then came the 14th Infantry Band, discoursing eloquent music followed by the Firemen in the following order: Portland delegation with their steam engine, Vancouver No. 1, Gen. Allen No. 3, Vigilance Hook and Ladder No. 1, Young America No. 4. \_\_\_\_ machines were out in full dress, adorned and embellished with garlands, wreaths and A canopy of red, white and blue was erected over Gen. Allen No. 3 wherein was seated Master HARRY HODGES clad in uniform. ornament adorned the Hook and Ladder apparatus, which was occupied by We must not omit to mention Young America No. 4, Miss MINNIE COCHRAN. a miniature engine, but capable of doing good service, which formed quite a feature in the procession. A company of young boys in full uniform had charge of it. It looked as gay as any of them, having been newly painted and put in good working order by Chief engineer TROUP, whose property it is. Seated upon the same were Miss FANNIE TROUP and Master JAMES CRAWFORD. We have not space at this time to allude to other attractive features in the procession. The same halted in line at the Garrison, where a company of artilery fired a national salute, after which a military dress parade of the artilery, cavalry and Ordnance troops took place. Post Adjutant HALL here read the Declaration of Independence. The procession then formed again and marched through the streets preceded by music, to the public square, where the exercises took place. A stand had been erected and sufficient seats for the whole assemblage had been provided. music and prayer, Judge LANCASTER delivered his oration, which was well received, after which the assemblage was dismissed. A collation for the Portland firemen had been provided by our boys and was heartily enjoyed by their guests. The steam engine was then put to work, which

was quite a novelty to many persons. After the departure of the boats a general social time was enjoyed by everybody around town. In the evening a grand ball, numerously attended, took place in Oro Fino Hall, for the benefit of Vigilance No. 1. We have not space at this time to allude to this and many other matters, deserving of especial mention. Thanks are due, and will hereafter be more formally tendered, to many persons and societies, who worked unceasingly to make the celebration what it really was with some slight exceptions, an appropriate, joyous and happy one.

SEVERE SENTENCE....Private JAMES BURKE, Co. I, 1st U.S. Cavalry, was recently tried by a court martial at this post, for mutinous conduct, contempt and disrespect to his commanding officer and making a murderous assault with a loaded weapon upon his superior officer at Camp Watson in April last. The court sentenced him, "to forfeit to the U.S. all pay and allowances that are or may become due him up to the promulgation of this sentence, except the just dues of the Laundress; to be confined in the charge of the Guard, at such place as the commanding officer of the Department may designate for the period of six (6) months, forty two days of such period to be kept in solitary confinement on bread and water; to walk, carrying a log weighing not less than fourteen (14 lbs.,) eight hours each day during the rest of his confinement, one half hour being allowed for each meal; to forfeit all pay and allowances, except the necessary clothing during his confinement, and at the expiration of this sentence to be shot to death with musketry, two thirds of the members of the court concurring General STEELE however, in mercy, to the prisoner, remitted that portion which sentenced him to "be shot to death with musketry," but ordered the remainder to be executed at Cape Disappointment, W.T. The deceased was well and favorable known, having served the government in various positions on this coast. His death is lamented by a large circle of friends.

BRICK HOUSES - Dr. WALL has already commenced the necessary excavations to lay the foundation of a fine two-story brick, 50 by 25 feet in size, to be built on the corner of Main and Fourth streets. The contract for building has been let to a Mr. O'BRIEN, now residing in Portland. It is to be ready for occupancy before the 18th of October next. Mr. ANTON YOUNG, we understand, is also about to commence building a large brick brewery, 60 by 35 feet in size, on West C. St. adjoining the Public Square. It is to be two story and a half high. Col. TRIPP is the contractor.

Mr. EDDINGS has also commenced the building of a large store house 65 by 25 feet, on the corner of Main and Fifth street.

We also observe that Mr. SCHOFIELD is putting up another dwelling house on his block.

All these improvements are certain evidence of permanent and substantial prosperity.

A TORNADO.....We learn from the Rev. Father RICHARDS that on Monday last, at about 10 o'clock a.m., a most destructive tornado, accompanied with rain and hail visited the quiet little town of Cowlitz, in Lewis county, W.T., tearing down fences, uprooting trees and destroying everything in its onward course. The frame of a fine building, 65 by 35 feet, and two stories in hight, just put up through the untiring exertion of the Rev. Mr. RICHARD, of the Catholic church, and intended for an Academy for young ladies, was, in less time than is required to pen these lines, rased to the ground; thus destroying in an instant the work which had required months to accomplish. The church near it suffered considerably also, having part of its tower carried away, and its windows, as well as those of the Rev. gentleman's residence, smashed to pieces. Among the other sufferers is Mr. ROBERTS who had the roof of his house also carried off, and Mr. HOWE part of his barn's. The harvest, which for want of rain presented a very sickly appearance, did not gain much in looks by this storm, and promises but little to the industrious farmer in return for his hard toil.

The following items were found between pages of the Bible:

A calling card of Mrs. M L Dearing

A card reading "A Happy New Year. January 1, 1870. James N. Neff."

Seven "quarterly tickets" from the "Methodist Episcopal Church, founded A.D. 1784." The dates range from May 1854 to Apr. 6, 1861. Three of the tickets belonged to Maria L. Dearing, three belonged to Mary A. Neff, and one has the name torn off.

The Dearings, Neffs, and Cavens lived in Cincinnati, Ohio; most, if not all, of the people listed above are buried in Spring Grove Cemetery there. Wm. and Anna E. (Talbot) Caven were the parents of Walter Leslie Caven, who married Jessie May Dearing, and of my grandfather George Mead Caven. Walter died 3 December 1962 in Cincinnati.

Also found in the Dearing-Neff Bible were eight newspaper death notices. Two are for Maggie Neff, from different newspapers. She died on Sunday, 17 July 1864, and is described in one item as the only daughter and in the other as the only child of Jas. R. and Maria L. Dearing, aged 9

months and 5 days. The funeral took place from the residence of her parents, 320 George street, Wednesday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. Friends of the family were requested to attend. This poem was included in the notice:

Dearest Maggie, thou hast left us —
Here thy loss we deeply feel;
But 'tis God who hath bereft us —
He can all our sorrows heal.

A notice dated in pencil 1866 reads:

"NEFF — On Saturday afternoon, November 10, at 4 o'clock, Mrs. Mary A. Neff, aged 51 years, 9 months and 9 days. Funeral on Tuesday afternoon, November 13, at 2 o'clock, from the residence of her son-in-law, J.R. Dearing, No. 320 George st. Friends of the family are invited to attend." The poem printed above was included in the notice, with "mother" substituted for "Maggie."

Two notices are apparently for Marguerite (Neff) Marcy. One reads:

"MARCY — June 20, 1885, after a lingering illness, Mrs. Margaret J. Marcy, at her residence, 1025 West Eighth street. Due notice of the funeral will be given." The other notice states "Funeral at 2 o'clock P.M. Tuesday. Burial private."


A notice dated in pencil 1893 reads:

"DEARING — On Friday, January 6, at 8:45 o'clock a.m., Mrs. Maria Louise Dearing, in her 55th year. Funeral from her late residence, Summit avenue, Price Hill, at 1 o'clock p.m., Sunday. Burial private. Kindly omit flowers."

Another notice reads: "MARCY — James W., in his 68th year, May 20, 1902. Interment in Spring Grove cemetery."

Finally, an undated "List of Deaths" begins: "The following deaths were reported to the Health Office this morning." Ten of the 15 people listed were 10 years old or younger. Listed last is James Dearing, 45 years. The family Bible says James W. Dearing died in 1918, a year noted for epidemic influenza. But if this item is from 1918, either this is not the same James Dearing or the age given is incorrect.

Though the deaths of James R. Dearing and James N. Neff are missing here, this appears to be the end of these particular Dearing, Neff, and Caven lines.

#### YOU NEVER CAN TELL

You never can tell from what source you may get information about an ancestor. A few months ago, my husband, Hazen, wrote to a photography magazine inquiring about a flash cord. He received a reply from a reader, Mr. Hazen Eugene "Bud" Herron, of Scotts, Michigan, as follows:

"I saw your letter in the October issue of the  $\dots$  and HAD to write. Not that I can be of any assistance concerning the flash cord you need  $\dots$  but because of your name."

He went on to say that he did some research into his family history and discovered that the name of "Hazen" was at one time the LAST name of one of his ancestors. Several Hundred years ago this ancestor had gotten into some trouble with the "crown" in England and had to flee to Wales. There he met a woman who eventually married him and since his own last name (Hazen) wouldn't allow him to go home to England again, he adopted his new wife's last name of HERRON and moved his own last name up into first place. Their sons came to the new world and settled in the northeast. THEIR children then moved inland into Pennsylvania. About a century later, THEIR sons settled in Tennessee, here Mr. Herron's grandfather and father were born.

He went on to say that recently he was going through a checkout lane of a grocery store and upon giving his check to the clerk, she called the assistant manager. It turned out that the assistant manager's name was also Hazen Eugene Herron.

So if anyone is researching the name of HERRON and comes to a dead end, perhaps this bit of information will be helpful. One never knows from where a lead may present itself.


