

Volunteer Spotlight

Descending from Clark County pioneers, Dorothy Person's roots are deeply embedded in the area. Around 1870 her great-great-grandparents along with her great-grandparents and their family traveled from Missouri and located near Chelatchie Prairie which was just opened for homesteading. Her grandfather was a toddler at the time. The daughter of Ivan Wooldridge and Claire Spencer, Dorothy was born March 19, 1924 at Battle Ground, Washington. She attended the local schools and has always lived in Clark County except for short intervals.

Dorothy's life long romance with Vernon Lyle Person began with their meeting at Charter Oak Grade School when she was six years old and he was eight. They began dating in high school and were married on November 26, 1944 in Battle Ground. They celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary in 1989. Born June 19, 1922 in Battle Ground, Vern is the son of Gerhard Person and Minnie Houlder. He is a retired watchmaker.

During W.W.II Dorothy worked in the Finance Office at Vancouver Barracks as Personnel Director. She later worked as

a Legal Secretary. After her children started school she resumed her education and received her teaching degree from Portland University. She retired in 1981 following a twenty year career in education.

Dorothy and Vern are the parents of three children, all born in Vancouver, WA: Pamela Rae (b. 24 Mar 1947, marr. Arnold Gordon Friesen), Renee Arlene (b. 18 Oct 1849, marr. James Leslie Holt) and Timothy Ivan (b. 1 Jun 1952, marr. Mary Elizabeth Sheldon). They have five grand children: Scott Michael (age 15), Mark Jonathon (age 13) and Daniel Jeremy Friesen (age 9), Lindsay Allison (age 9) and Elizabeth Joanna Person (age 6).

The Persons are members of the Charter Oak Evangelical Free Church where they teach an adult Sunday School class. He serves as Deacon and she plays the organ and piano. Her hobbies include history, music, sewing, quilting, needlework and lace making. You may have viewed her entries at the Clark County Fair or have attended one of her bobbin lace classes. Dorothy recently placed second in the nation for the design and execution of a battenburg lace collar that she entered in the DAR contest. During the centennial year her lacemaking work was displayed with that of forty other folk artists in exhibits throughout Washington State. She has made the research trips we all dream of: Salt Lake City, Library of Congress, DAR Library, researching in New England and a genealogical tour of England.



COMPUTERPHILIA IN SALT LAKE CITY by Gene Swain Kuechmann

These are exciting times for computerphiles who do research at the Family History Center in Salt Lake City. Every year sees an increase in the number of computers available to visitors. On the second floor, you can use a computer to consult the United States and Canadian sections of the IGI and United States and Canadian sources in the Library catalog. On the International floor, you can consult the International IGI and Library catalog, and similarly on the British floor. You can ask the computer itself for instructions on how to use it, and library volunteers are usually more than happy to help. The computer screen is generally easier to read than is microfiche. And instead of trekking to the copy room and spending twenty cents for each page you copy from a fiche, you can make a printout on the spot for five cents a sheet paid later at the office window.

The IGI and the Library catalog are stored on plastic-encased CD ROM disks that look just like audio CDs. When you tell it what information you want, the computer tells you which disk to insert into the disk drive. (A young man at a computer near me took the disk out of the case, as you would an audio CD, and put it in the drive. After the disk was rescued and restored to its case by a librarian it seemed to work as well as ever.) Telling the computer what you want may be as easy as pressing a single letter key to choose between the IGI and the catalog, or as complicated as typing in a county or town and state name — and spelling them correctly — to consult the locality file.

The computerized IGI has some nice features, one of which is the ability to group the names of children under the parents' names. For example, all the children of Isaac and Abigail Smith can be listed together, all the children of Isaac and Anne Smith, and so on. Another feature is the ability to set up a "holding file," to which you can add names from anywhere in the IGI. Before you print it out, you can read this file and delete any items you don't want — for example, you may have added a marriage under both the man's name and the woman's name. Printouts can contain everything listed in the IGI, or you can omit LDS information or sources if you wish.

To use the Library catalog, you first choose whether you want to search by locality or by surname. You can limit a locality search to certain topics, such as deeds and vital records, and a surname search can be limited by specifying a key word or words, such as a locality. For any reference found, you can print out either an abbreviated description or a complete catalog record. These printouts are invaluable for keeping a record of what you search, what you find, and what pages you photocopy. Of course, the Library catalog doesn't index all publications, and a publication is cross-referenced to a given surname only if it emphasizes that surname. So for such things as The American Genealogist you still must consult the printed indexes.

There are two or three dozen sit-down computer stations on the General (first) floor of the Center, and patrons sign up to use them for one or two hours at a time. These stations have CD ROMs for all of the IGI and the Library catalog, and can also be used to gain access to the Ancestral File. The Ancestral File contains material submitted by LDS church members and others on four-generation pedigree charts or, more recently, on computer disks. These charts are not submissions for Temple ordinances, and they have not been checked and verified, so they are of limited usefulness. However, names and addresses of the submitters are available from the computer, and many — but not all — of the submission sheets, which name sources, are on film elsewhere in the library.

There seem to be many "typos" in the Ancestral File. In one case, I found a man listed as marrying his mother, and in another, a man who married someone with the same name as his own (but a different ID number). Just as anomalous is the way family group sheets are assembled. If two or more submitters give even slightly different data for a person, that person is entered in the file once for each set of data, with a different ID number each time. The person may appear as a child on the parents' family group sheet once for each set of data — provided, that is, that all submitters attributed the person to the same set of parents! The most extreme case I found was that of Matthias Button. He was born once and married four times, so he should appear on five family group sheets. Actually, he is on twenty-five sheets: on six as a child (twice on one of them) and on nineteen "as a parent" (actually, as a husband)! Two of the group sheets are identical, some have minor differences (Joan and Joane, for example), and some have major differences. Matthias always has the same ID number, but his father has two different IDs and one of his wives has ten ID numbers, one for each slight variation in name.


Of course, data found in a computer, especially at the Family Research Center, presents — in spades — the same problem as data found in print: To too many people, if it's there, it must be true. I'm sure these data have all been "documented" by the submitters — too often, unfortunately, by reference to unreliable secondary sources. So the Ancestral File contains many "facts" that have been disproved by accredited genealogists using primary sources or the best available evidence. Patrons are encouraged to send in corrections, but they must be in red and on printouts from the Ancestral File. (I wonder — might this simply result in the addition of more family group sheets for the persons involved?)

"Crashes" and problems at the individual computer stations scattered throughout the Center are common — usually signaled by a red rectangle with a message that ends "Call a librarian." When all other efforts fail, a librarian may restart your computer. Occasion ally even the mainframe — that source of all knowledge — crashes. However, in the long run the computers at the Family Research Center make searching for sources, keeping track of those sources, and copying data submitted by others much easier and less costly of both time and money. Now you can go to Salt Lake City for a week and come home with three or four years' worth of material to sort, file, and assimilate instead of just one.

THOMAS J. BEATTY

Thomas J. Beatty was born in October of 1842 in Illinois to James Beatty, an Irish immigrant, and Bathsheba Gans, a Pennsylvania lass. He may be the Thomas Beatty, age 9, with the James Beatty family of Marshall County, Illinois, in 1850. The census show Mary Beatty (age 23, born VA) and possibly a second wife for James (age 39). Other children mentioned are Mary Ann, 12, Margrett, 11, James, 6, and Sarah, 2; all were born in Illinois.

Thomas came to Clark Co., WA, sometime before 1869, for he married Mary M. Sturgis in Vancouver on 18 October 1869. Mary was a step-daughter of George Beatty, possibly an uncle or other relative of Thomas since George was also Irish. George's naturalization was granted on the eighth of April 1856 in District Court in Vancouver. The files showed he had declared his intentions in 1853, had arrived in Oregon on September 31, 1950, and was born in Derry Co., Ireland in 1818.

Mary was born to David Sturgis and Adelaide (Minton?) on the 11th of August 1851 in then Oregon Territory, later to become Vancouver, WA. George Beatty and David Sturgess were neighbors and would have shared the problems of the Columbia River flooding as described in the letter thought to have been written by David to his sister Lydia and printed in the "Letters" section following this article.

On October 16, 1854, when Mary was almost three years old, her father David and possibly a brother John M. Sturgess were accidentally drowned in the Columbia. Life along the river could be tragic, with loss of life as well as loss of possessions. In 1852 David had harvest awaiting shipment when flood waters carried all away. More information on the Sturgess family can be found in Clark County Pioneers: A Centennial Salute.

George Beatty [Baty] married Mrs. Adelaide Sturgis on the second of August 1855, but Mary retained her Sturgis identity on census records and as a student at the "Young Ladies' School." On April 3, 1866, George and Adelaide Beatty made a provision that gave Mary Sturgis a section of her father's DLC.

Thomas and Mary [Sturgis] Beatty had seven children, all of whom were born in Vancouver. The first was Bertha A., born 25 Aug 1971 and died 12 July 1900, in Vancouver, unmarried. Second was James Edwin, born 17 July 1872 and dying just barely

a year later on 11 Aug 1873. The third child was George Minton born 9 Apr 1874 and marrying Maude Alberta Rinehart on 1 Feb 1902; he died 6 Feb 1976 at Gresham, Oregon. "Maggie" May was the fourth child; born 17 Aug 1876, she married John G. Lewis on 27 Jun 1897 and died 9 Feb 1904 in Vancouver. Charles Thomas, the fifth child, was born 22 May 1879 and died about three months later on 24 Aug 1879. Sixth child Edmond Ray, who was born 29 Jan 1881, died on 12 Dec 1885 just short of his fifth birthday. Seventh and last child was Fred E. who was born 13 Mar 1885 and married Jessie V. Reynolds; Fred died 7 Nov 1958 at Sheridan, Oregon.

Mary Sturgis died at the age of 49 years on 15 Oct 1890 and is buried in the Old City Cemetery in Vancouver. Three of her children preceded her in death. The at age 56, Thomas again married, having been a widower for eight years and having raised the surviving children. His new bride was a spinster dressmaker named Etta J. Jordan who was born in Indiana in 1867 to Josiah & "Lizzie" [Reid] Jordan. She was crippled in one foot, apparently caused by being dropped as a baby. Fred, the youngest, was five when his mother died and thirteen when his father remarried. Bertha, who was twenty when her mother died, was no doubt a great help to her father in raising the family. It is not known when and where Thomas and his second wife died.


George and Maude Beatty Wedding Photo (1902)

George Minton Beatty, who was born April 9, 1874, in Vancouver, felt a need to increase his math knowledge in pursuit of a career in building construction and thus attended a business college in Los Angeles, California. He also spent some time working in the wheat fields in Blalock, Oregon. On the first of February 1902, he married Maude Alberta Rinehart at her father's house in Vancouver. That year the Columbia River was frozen between Vancouver and Portland and the couple drove across with horse and buggy for their honeymoon trip to visit friends. Maude's parents were Albert Corbert Rinehart and Clarissa Josephine Bone; she was born 25 Sep 1877 in Watkins, IA.

George and Maude had five children: Clifford Rinehart, b. 1 Dec. 1902, at Arlington, OR, and married a woman named Emerald; Lucille was born 9 Apr 1908 in Portland and married David Rolfe; Lilia was born 15 Mar 1913 in Portland and married Ernest Trentin; Clare was born 29 Jul 1915 in Portland and married James Dirrin; and E. Lloyd was born 29 May 1918 in Portland and married Anita Agard. George became an excellent home builder and cabinet maker and served for years as Secretary and Treasurer of the local Carpenter Union Group in the Portland area. He was a member of the Kern Park Christina Church of Portland and they hosted his 100th Birthday Celebration at which he could play most any tune requested on his harmonica. George died February 6, 1976, at 101 years, in Gresham, OR, and Maude died on March 8, 1963, at age 86, in Portland, OR.


"MAGGIE" MAY BEATTY LEWIS

Maggie Beatty was born on the 17th of August 1876 in Vancouver, WA, and married John G. Lewis on the 17th of June 1897 at the Brush Prairie Baptist Church near Vancouver. John was born 29 Oct 1868 in Vaynor, Merthyr Tracil, Blam, Wales, to David R. Lewis and Elizabeth Watkins. John came to America in 1882 and was at one time a groceries salesman. Their first child, Edwin Thomas, was born 8 May 1898 in Merced, CA; he married Virginia Mae Patchin 13 Oct 1921 and died in Sep 1988 in Shasta City, CA. Their second child, Margery Mary, was born 10 Jun 1902 in Vancouver, WA, and married Frank Cooke Johns on 12 Oct 1920; she died in Seattle, WA, on March 31, 1959.

Maggie died at age 27 in Vancouver, WA, on 9 Feb 1904 and is buried in the 01d City Cemetery. She had contracted pulmonary tuberculosis shortly after the birth of her daughter, and fearing the disease would spread to the children, moved out and died a year and a half later. Six weeks later, John lost his father in a logging accident in Preston Pct., King Co., WA. John died on the 3rd of July 1935 in San Jose, CA.

FRED E. BEATTY


Fred E. Beatty was born on March 13, 1885, in Vancouver, and married Jessie V. Reynolds. They had only one child, a daughter named Margaret Jessie Beatty. They lived in the Woodlawn district of Portland were Fred was employed as a streetcar motorman. Jessie opened up a beauty shop and urged Fred to take up barbering, which he did. Over the years they lived in Bandon, Tillamook, back in Portland, and finally in Sheridan, OR. There she died of cancer on April 7, 1951. Jessie had been born 8 Aug 1885 in Scotland, SD, the daughter of Joseph R. Reynolds. Fred lived another seven years and died 7 Nov 1858 in Sheridan.



OLD LETTERS:

25 Jan. 1852 Columbia River Clark Co. O.T.

to Miss Lydia Sturges



23 Jan, 1852

My Dear Sister:

I have so long procrastinated writing to you that I am ashamed to attempt any appology; but lest you may think me too careless and unaffectionate, I will State some of my excuse I wrote you last March and told you I would write again in 2 Months, but I had been some time looking for one from you and delayed writing on that account till about the first of Sept. when I got one from you dated 30 June 1852 -- by which I learned that you had got mine last March. Since that I have intended every next mail ship to carry out my (The mail steamer goes out every 2 weeks right by my door) The above is all I had time to write at that time I now begin again this 25th of January I am sitting out in my garden, a beautiful day. I continue my excuse for not writing last summer was a very sicly season principally fever and ague on uncommon high water of the Collum River. I lost the principal part of my crops My coss was not less than \$ 2500 I only saved 2 acres of potatoes and garden stuff around the house which will beside my living sell for about 600 or 700 Dollars. The flood moved 2/3 of my fence but the land is so situated that it can but some of it was carried a mile off, and My Family being all Sick most of the season, it took all Summer to Replace my fence and tend my garden Andrew (Andrew Jackson Sturgis--ed.), the oldest boy I have with me know, has been Sick about a year and a half. He is and has been well for 2 months past. and we are all now in good health. ill health of my Family has brought so much labour on me that all my time has been taken () for late potatoes, some of my last planting was in August and they came good -- we had a light frost in Sept which killed the tops in some places, but mine was not hurt till the snow covered them -- They are now safely stored on the Bank of the river and where a vessel can stop and take them aboard for California -- Luantha came up here last summer to stay 4-5 weeks while her husband Philips went to California to buy a vessel, after being here a week She got the ague and went home to Astoria Philips is now owner of 1/3 of a vessel and he Sails it as captain, and She goes with him they are coasting between Oregon and California I have not seen either of them since she was here. parents live hear Auburn N.Y., he wants to go and See them, but thinks will come back here to live. Luantha has had 2 sons and lost them both. I have informed you that Sarah lives in Umpqua* Valley, her Husbands Name is Samuel Gardner they were well the last I heard six months ago Orville was home on a Visit in July and returned to his claim on the Willamette River 50 miles above Oregon Citty and 80 from him- his claim is 3 miles from Melvins* in a thick settled place -- While Betsey (^his former sister-in-law--ed) was engaged in getting her writings of divorce from Kellogg, news came that he was drounded in Rogue Rivers, So She married an old Bachelor, by name of Thomas Davis--He had made his home at

Kelloggs about a year before she turned Kellogg off They were married Some time last Summer -- Soon after they got married they moved from the Willammette River to the Columbia River opposite Vancouver. It is out of my line of travel and I have not Seen her Since. He has no claim nor much property. She has but 2 children now (George and Eudora) the one she had by Kellogg died last fall. She has not seen your last letters and perhaps she never will. Jane lives at the place that her Mother left She has a young Son I am informed of late They talk of going to Umpqua and take a claim this Spring David and Andrew will finish diging potatoes I lost all my first planting Can raise a crop after the flood in June. I lost 4 acres of fine wheat consequently I had my flour to buy at the Enormous price of 24 dollars per hundred. has now began to fall--Beef is now 18-25 cents a pound , 30-50--It is the hardest for Emigrants it Ever has been, we have had a hard winter So far, it has rained 2 Months most of the time Except for about the 1st of January was cold enough to Snow and Snow. & I went and got 2 feet deep on the Collumbia Bute in the Willamete Valley above Oregon City it was 4 feet deep--Still farther South on the Mountain between the Willamete Valley and Umpqua Valley it was ten feet deep After lying about 3 weeks it went off sudenly and done Much damage on the Streams, washing away Bridges and Mt. and dwelling Houses--There were 5000 Head of Cattle left up at the Dalls on the Collumbia to be wintered there and they are all dead--were brought down where I live, about half of them are dead. have bought 2 pair 5 year old Cattle which I shall \$100 for one yoke and \$-80 for the other I can now turn off My old cattle next fall which fetch more than I paid for Both yoke of these

There is an Immense Emmigration this year it makes provisions high Potatoes are now worth \$2,00 per bushel at my House, Onions \$5 I have about 40 bushels of onions, and 200 of potatoes for sale Youd think price will be \$3 The weather has been favorable this....

The remainder of the letter is missing but I feel certain the author is David Sturges who wrote his sister, Lydia. The address on the envelope states: "Miss Lydia Sturges Indian Town Bureau Co Illinois".

b. 10 Aug 1878, d. 18 Sep 1907, age 29y 1m 8 d, married, housewife, Methodist, died of cancer of the bowels, attended by Dr. J. R. Smith, Vancouver, funeral 20 Sep 1907 at Knapp Gunderson Chapel, Rev. Robert Yeatman, buried Vancouver City Cemetery, NE 105-1, line 8.

HAGEN, FRED

b. 14 Sep 1854, d. 6 Sep 1907, age 53y Om 12d, divored, laborer, Catholic, died of fistula of Ano at St. Joseph's Hospital, attended by Dr. Edward L. Hixon, Vancouver, funeral 29 Sep 1907, Rev. W.C. Sheppard, buried Vancouver City Cemetery, NE 87-5, line 7.

MILLER, KEITH

b. 26 Sep 1907, d. 28 Sep 1907, 2 days, child of F.P. Miller, <u>stillborn</u>, at Felida, WA, (Vancouver), attended by Dr. Edward L. Hixon, Vancouver, funeral 30 Sep 1907, buried Vancouver City Cemetery, NW 96, Masonic section.

VANCOUVER REGISTER

The "VANCOUVER REGISTER" has been abstracted from papers on file at the Clark County Historical Society by JANE GERMANN, a member of C.C.G.S.

The microfilmed copies of the "VANCOUVER REGISTER" begin with Volume 1 Number 4, Saturday, October 7, 1865. The first three editions have apparently become lost. Items of local interest for genealogists and historians have been copied. The [] following the articles indicate [page #, column #].

Saturday, July 13, 1867 - Vol. 2 #43

LAND TITLES..... For a number of years past the progress of our town has been materially impeded by existing controversies between the different parties claiming title to the land embraced within the corporate limits of the city of Vancouver. The Catholic Mission of St. James, the heirs of the SHORT estate, and the BEERS estate, H. C. MORSE, the U.S. military authorities and the corporate authorities of the city, all claim title of portions of the land. No final adjudication has been made, but the cases have been boxed from one tribinal of the Land Office Department into the other, and some of them are now hanging fire in the office of the Secretary of the Interior. In the matter of the St. James Mission claim, Mr. Attorney General BATES decided a few years ago, that the claim of any mission or religious society presented a question of legal title to land entirely judicial in its character and not proper to be determined by any executive department. Mr. ODO, then acting Secretary of the Interior adopted this decision and instructed the General Land office accordingly, that the parties must ascert their titles in the courts and that is was not competent for that Department nor any of its officers to determine the questions of title involved in the claim of the Mission. Here the matter rested for a while, until Mr. HARLAN, the succeeding Secretary of the Interior, reversed the decision of the Attorney General, in a lengthy opinion, which we have seen and which we intend to publish at a subsequent time. accordance with the latter opinion the Land-office was instructed to again take jurisdiction of this class of cases. It is very evident, that unless these officials are stirred up with a long pole, an endless number of red tape formalities so characteristic of the cicumlocation Bureau in Washington city will prolong the final adjudication in this case to an indefinite period of time, when perhaps the witnesses necessary to show the facts and true merits shall have died or be beyond the reach of process. We do not pretend to assert, that this party or the other is legally entitled to the land, but we do urge a speedy adjudication of the controversy, one way or the other.... [2/1]

LOST AND FOUND....A Mr. RATHBON, living on Union Ridge in this county, lost \$400 in greenbacks about six weeks ago out of his pocket. A careful search was made but the same could not be found. On the 22d of this month \$200 of the same was found accidentally by some children of Mr. QUIGLEY playing in the neighborhood, and upon the search being renewed the balance was found by Mrs. CARTY, near whose house the money had been lost. He is having the gravel which was dug in making ANTOIN YOUNG's new beer cellar hauled to fill up where it was badly needed. We understand that Col. HODGES will continue the work as soon as practicable by having the lower portion of the reserve filled up to the proper grade.

ON THE RAMPAGE....An individual, whose name we did not learn and who has been enfor Mr. SPARRY as a hod-carrier, got on a spree last Tuesday, and broke and smashed up things generally. He destroyed a bed of mortar, broke doors, upset water barrels &c., and threatened to whip a number of men, who had discharged him. A warrant was issued for his arrest by Justice SMITH upon a charge of malicious mischief, but he had not been arrested at last accounts.

STILL ANOTHER....Mr. LOUIS SOHNS contemplates the erection of a large two story brick store on the site of his present place of business, to be completed the present season.

EARLY CLARK COUNTY PLACES

Beautiful trees rooted in name's rich heritage

Charter Oak, a rural area two miles north of Battle Ground, is as picturesque as its name.

It has oak trees — lots of them — along with rolling fields, thick woodlands and a rich heritage.

"Sure, I know how Charter Oak got its name," said Dorothy E. Person, a teacher at Hockinson Elementary School. "It was my great-grandmother, Miranda Spencer, who named it."

Ira Spencer, a Civil War veteran, and his wife came from Missouri after the war. They settled on the breaks of the East Fork of the Lewis River.

There were beautiful oak trees, and they reminded Miranda Spencer of her former home, Charter Oak, Mo., said Mrs. Person, author of several books on Clark County history.

Charter Oak had its own school, dating back to the 1870s, and one of the earliest Granges in the county. However, the community never had its own post office. Early day residents picked up their mail at Lewisville, a small town on the river near where Lewisville Park is now located.

The first business in Lewisville was a general store, started by D.M. Rowland in 1880. The Charter

Oak Grange in 1890 started its own cooperative store there.


Nothing is left of the community of Lewisville, which once was bigger than Battle Ground, but Charter Oak remains memorialized in road signs and a beautiful church, the Charter Oak Evangelical Free Church.

Mrs. Person said the Charter Oak Grange, which dated back to the 1880s, was disbanded during the last decade. Charter Oak had several school buildings over the years, but these, too, are all gone.

The last of these was a large, two-story structure. The Charter Oak School District 44 elected to consolidate with Battle Ground May 9, 1931, and the school building was later torn down.
