

## Ravages of Fire

Homeless in Clarke County Counted by Hundreds Fire Sweeps Many Settlements

Dole, Yacolt, Hockinson, Mill Plain and Other Outlying Districts Sustaining Great Injury, Fire Burns Through Big Timber Belt.

The greatest tragedy ever witnessed in Clarke County was experienced during the past week, as a result of the fierce forest fires that have swept through our prosperous little county. The distress and desolation left in its path is awful to behold. Twenty are known to have perished in the flames and more are thought to have burned. The heroic efforts of men, women, and children to save their homes are heard on every hand. May miraculous escapes are recited, and all in the fire swept districts have gone through experiences never to be forgotten. At least one hundred families have been left homeless and many are left destitute with nothing but the clothes on their backs, and in other cases these are no more than night clothes. Those who were able to save their homes have given freely to their unfortunate neighbors, and through it all there has been observed a Christian spirit that is good to behold.

An accurate summary of the losses is impossible at this time as it is not yet known just how much damage the fire has done.

It is estimated that the damages to timber and grazing land in addition to personal losses in the way of hay, barns, fences, houses and school houses, etc. will bring the loss up as high as \$1,000,000 and of the famous big timber belt in the north end of the county is ruined the loss sustained will much exceed this amount. The fire swept through the big timber belt, but it is not thought that the fire was hot enough in that section to kill the trees. The timber in this section is of great value. Quarter sections sold this summer as high as \$8,000.

Accounts of the direction of the fire indicate that it started in Skamania County and was carried at a cyclone pace by a strong south east wind through Bell Mountain, across to Larch Mountain, through the Lewis River Country to Yacolt Mountain, continuing east along the northern part of the county into Cowlitz County. The Last Chance Mines, on which Portland capitalists have invested much money in development work is said to be ruined. The explosion of a powder magazine at the mine did great damage. In the Fifth Plain and Hockinson Country the school house was burned and a number of families were left homeless. Many living along the East Fork of Lewis River were burned out. At Dole but five houses are left in that stricken little valley. It was here that Mrs. John Schmidt and three children, who sought refuge in a cellar, perished. In the big timber section all the settlers were burned out, and a number who lived on the edge of Yacolt Prairie also lost their homes. Fred Burlingame who lives at Yacolt, was brought to town last Thursday badly burned about the face and hands and taken to St. Joseph's Hospital for treatment. Thursday, darkness reigned throughout the County districts, and lights were needed at mid-day. Cinders and burned leaves fell about town like a snow storm.

A number of campers at Trout Lake who had started home, were overtaken by the flames and perished. Among these were Mr. and Mrs. O.E. Reid and four children, Mr. and Mrs. J.A. McKeen and two children, and George W. Smith, wife and child, all of LaCenter. Mrs. Meyers, a widow woman, living near Hockinson also perished being old and feeble and unable to escape. Mrs. Graves, who lives on Rock Creek is also among the dead.

The Fire nearer town in the Mill Plain and Pucker Brush settlements did considerable damage. Most wood was destroyed and many fences were burned but further than that no severe damage is recorded.

## **VOLUNTEER SPOT-LIGHT**

Rose Marie has many hobbies and interests which include computer interest, drawing and painting, fabric painting, stained glass, sewing and ceramics.

Joining Clark County Genealogical Society in 1977, Rose Marie almost immediately became Vice-Pres. of the society and served as President in 1979-80. She has been Librarian and was a library volunteer for many years. Her service on committees and other projects, too numerous to mention, has extended far beyond the call of duty. Most of us are probably most familiar with the work Rose Marie contributes to the Printing Committee, mailing and distributing publications and her work on the Trail Breakers' staff. Along with designing book covers, flyers and brochures for the society, Rose Marie is presently preparing the 1900 Census of Clark County for publication.

Rose Marie was chairman of the Clark Co. Centennial book project for five years. She compiled material for the book, typed it and saw to its publication and distribution.

In addition to life membership in C.C.G.S., Rose Marie is a member of Daughters of the Pioneers of Washington, Sons & Daughters of the Oregon Pioneers and the Fort Vancouver Historical Society.

She has future plans to publish a book on Chenette/Parmentier and related families.

Sewn in between the Old and New Testaments are the papers upon which marriages, births and deaths are written. An announcement is pasted in and a loose scrap of paper with information is found. A letter Mr. Ben F. Jones, 268 Glen Ave., Porland, Ore, dated Dec 3, 1923 from Oregon State Hospital at Salem, OR, confinrming the death of his brother W.H. Jones on May 26th was folded and in the front of the Bible. The following inscription is noted on the fly leaf:

# Hudson Bay Co. saw plain future

East Mill Plain is a sleeping giant, soon to be transformed from a quiet rural community to an industrial center.

Located about seven miles east of Vancouver, along and to the east of Northeast 164th Avenue, East Mill Plain is expected to become the home of two large electronic firms, Tektronix and Hewlett-Packard.

Northeast 164th Avenue is born at the edge of the Columbia River in the Fisher area and climbs to a gentle plateau as it heads north. This is Mill Plain, the first of a series of plains that rise terrace-like from the Columbia.

The Hudson's Bay Co., which founded Fort Vancouver in 1825, was the first to recognize the potential of Mill Plain. Old records indicate the company had a thousand acres under cultivation early in the 1800s, raising wheat that was ground into flour at the grist mill in the Ellsworth area.

While Fort Vancouver was still a trading post, the Hudson's Bay Co. operated a store and had stables and barns about where the Mill Plain Elementary School now is located.

The first commercial orchard in Clark County was planted in East Mill Plain in 1855 by Dr. Joe Knight. More than a half-century later, the orchard was still bearing and supported a large fruit-processing company.

Among the earliest permanent settlers were Jacob Duback, Robert McQueen, J.A. Earnst, Henry Hitchcock, C.A. Tiffany, Carl English and Jim, Matt and C.S. Blair.

In August 1879, Robert Robb, county superintendent of schools, roamed the county by foot and on horseback and recorded his observations. The "ridge road" (now Mill Plain Road) east from

Vancouver cut through a forest of thick firs, then suddenly burst out into a fertile plain, he reported. "This is an area of fine houses and barns, thrifty orchards and blooming gardens," he wrote. "This area has been truly blessed by nature."

The first elementary school in East Mill Plain was constructed in 1863, during the Civil War, on property owned by Jacob Duback. The second school, built in 1887, served the community for 55 years. It was sold in 1948 and made into apartment units.

In 1909, residents of the district voted to construct a four-room high school at a cost of \$4,000 to \$5,000. The Fisher and Harmony districts joined in the effort and the school was opened on Jan. 1, 1910. The final cost was \$6,490.

The Union High School was located on the site of the existing elementary school, at 400 S.E. 164th Ave. James Blair was the first principal and Nettie Miller the teacher when the high school




opened with 50 pupils.

At the time, it was reported the Mill Plain community consisted of two stores, a barbershop, two churches, one shoe shop and two blacksmith shops.

On Jan. 27, 1945, seven school districts, including East Mill Plain, voted to consolidate to form Evergreen School District.

The Mill Plain Post Office was established on May 9, 1876, in the two-story home of Alfred H. Lovelace, on the west side of

Northeast 164th Avenue. On Nov. 15, 1890, a townsite of Mill Plain was platted eight-tenths of a mile north of the post office.

The Mill Plain Post Office was short-lived. It was transferred south to Fisher. On Sept. 19, 1901, the first application for rural free delivery in Clark County was approved and mail began to move from Vancouver to Mill Plain and Fisher.

The East Mill Plain United Methodist Church, also located on Northeast 164th Avenue, has a history going back 93 years. The church was organized at the Harmony School, just north of Mill Plain, on March 7, 1886. On Sept. 21, 1891, a church was organized in the Mill Plain School. Increased attendance caused the congregation to outgrow the

school house and services moved to the Fisher Grange Hall.

The present church building was completed in 1910 and formal dedication services were held on Jan. 11, 1903. It was then known as the Epworth Church.


On March 21, 1921, the Harmony and Epworth churches voted to unite and form the East Mill Plain Methodist Episcopal Church. This united congregation soon outgrew the building, so the Harmony Church building was moved from its original location and placed adjacent to the Epworth Church building.

While East Mill Plain is a beautiful area, featuring green fields and beautiful old homes, it is ironic that the highest promontory in the area is a mountain of garbage.

The English Sanitary Landfill, operated by Clark County for decades and named after a pioneer family, was a deep hole in the ground a quarter-century ago. Today, the collection of garbage deposited over the years has turned the ravine into a mountain of trash, looming high over any other point.

From the top of the landfill, the visitor can scan the surrounding terrain, the beautiful fields and the housing subdivisions pressing in from Cascade Park to the west. Adjacent to this "Mount Trashmore" are huge sand and gravel operations. Because of an odd geologic formation, this area of East Mill Plain sits on a fortune in alluvial material just right for making concrete products.

#### VOORHEES, PHILIP

b. 31 May 1841, d. 21 Jun 1908, age 67y 21d, married, farmer, Methodist, died of complications due to failure of heart, lungs and liver (at home), attended by Dr. R.D. Wiswall, Vancouver, funeral 23 Jun 1908, buried Vancouver City Cemetery, NE 95 S/2, line 15, charged to C.F. Voorhees, Burnt Bridge Creek, Vancouver, WA.

#### WALLACE, WILLIAM

b. 29 Oct 1850, d. 28 Jun 1908, age 57y 7m 25d, a sawyer, died at Camas, WA, attended by Dr. Mrs. L.V. Wright, Camas, WA, funeral 24 Jun 1908 at home, buried Camas City Cemetery, charged to C.G. Wallance & Mrs. W.H. Reed, 242 Mill Street, Portland, OR.

#### OGDEN, CHARLES WILLIAM

b. 11 Jun 1884, d. 28 Jun 1908, age 24y 17d, single, barber, died of pulminary TB, Portland, OR, attended by Dr. Arthur L. Canfield, Portland, OR, funeral 7 Jul 1908 at Easide Methodist Church, Rev. Bates, buried at Salmon Creek-Goddard-Cemetery, chraged to A.G. Ogden 1521 Madrona St., Portland, OR.

#### RICHARDS, CHRIST

b. 1830, d. 7 Jul 1908, age 78 years, married, farmer, died of cancer at home, Burton (Vancouver), WA, attended by Dr. Harry Wall, Vancouver, funeral 8 Jul 1908 at school house, buried Brush Prairie, Section M, charged by W.L. Lowery.

#### JUST, INFANT (girl)

b. 2 Jul 1908, d. 8 Jul 1908, 6 days, child, daughter of Charles L. Just, died due to prematurity at 24th & Grand Sts., Vancouver, WA, attended by Dr. E.B. Flagg, Vancouver, funeral 8 Jul 1908, buried Vancouver City Cemetery NE 119-4, line7.

#### JOHANSON, ERIK

b. ca. 1873, d. 13 Jul 1908, about 35, laborer, died of heart failure at the Clark County Jail, attended by coroner, J.R. Smith, Vancouver, fumeral 15 Jul 1908, buried Vancouver City Cemetery, Potters Field, charged to E.J. Johanson & Nyle Hagland of Fomten, Stockholm, Sweden, ordered by Clark County Jail.

#### COLLINS, BENJAMIN WESLEY

b. 5 Dec 1835, d. 16 Jul 1908, age 72y 7m 11d, died of chronic organic heart disease at River Road East, attended by Dr. John D. Scanlon, funeral 19 Jul 1908 at Medford, OR, Rev. M.F. Horn, buried Jackonville Cemetery, Jacksonville, OR, charged to C.H. Collins, RR#1, Vancouver, WA.

#### BLACK, ADDISON

b. 15 Dec 1821, d. 25 Jul 1908, age 86y 6m 4d, married, farmer, Chritian, died of heart failure at Thompson's farm at Fisher, WA, attended by Dr. E. Van Zant, fumeral 28 Jul 1908, Rev. J.F. POSTPONED....A race between D. BROWN's roan horse and A. RIGG's black horse was to have taken place on last Wednesday on the Vancouver race track; distance four hundred yards. The same was however necessarily postponed for the reason, that Mr. BROWN's horse having been tied in the stable was cut loose during the night, as is supposed and eat a tremendous quantity of oats, in consequence of which it foundered. The opposing party, although the stakes were forfeited, liberally extended the time of running the race until the horse could recover. It is now expected that the race will come off this afternoon. In this connection we may state, that another race will come off this (Saturday) afternoon on the same track between Mr. J. F. SMITH's horse (an old race nag) and the aforesaid horse of Mr. RIGGS.

THE EXPEDITION.... The following, being Special Orders No. 48 were promulgated by order of General STEELE on the 30th of July:

I. Capt. WM. KELLY, Company 'C.' 8th Cavalry, will proceed, without delay with his command, by the way of the Willamette Valley, Eugene City, Fort Klamath, Sprague river and Goose Creek to Camp Warner, Oregon, and on his arrival there will report for orders to ... Major General GEORGE CROOK com'dg District of the Owyhee.

Captain KELLY will take with him four month's supplies.

Lieutenant WM. McCLEAVE, 8th Cavalry, is appointed A.A.Q.M. and A.C.S. of the expedition.

In obedience of the foregoing order Capt. KELLY started with his expedition yesterday. It consisted of a full company of mounted soldiers, and some forty citizens engaged in various capacities, as packers, herders, artificers, &c. Some 200 mules had been purchased to convey the necessary supplies. Capt. KELLY has been an old resident and a highly respected citizen of the town, who by his own intrinsic worth and sterling qualities, has won the honorable position he now occupies. His departure is generally regretted. [2/2]

A largely signed petition was presented requesting the Common Council to guarantee to Britton & Gray, Atty's at law at Washington City, the payment of one thousand dollars in coin, if they are successful in procuring a patent for the town site, which petition was referred to committee on Ways and Means.

The Chief Engineer made requisition for oil for the use of Vancouver Fire Engine Co. No. 1 and Gen. Allen No. 3. Referred to committee on Fire Department.

The following bills were ordered paid: W. H. M'GRATH, \$8.00; J. F. SMITH, \$8.00; MARSHAL BRADY, \$13.00.

JOHN EDDINGS asked and obtained leave for the use of one half of Main street in front of his premise for building purposes. H. COCHRUN asked and obtained leave for the use of Main street to move a building for ten days.

An Ordinance to fix and establish a grade on Main street was then taken up, read a third time and passed by the following vote: Ayes, BRANT, EDDINGS, FLETCHER, PRESTON, and WHIPPLE - 5. Noes, O'KEANE, DURGAN - 2.

On motion the Council proceeded to the election of a city Collector. H. B. WOOD having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly elected.

Mr. JOHN MIDDLETON having presented a bill for repairing the apparatus of Vigilance Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1, and the committee having reported unfavorably upon the same, whereupon Mr. FLETCHER introduced the following resolution, which was adopted.

Resolved, that the Clerk be instructed to draw an order on the city Treasurer in payment for said truck and apparatus, whenever the said Hook and Ladder Co. shall acknowledge in writing, the ownership and right of property of the city in the said truck and apparatus.

The Council then adjourned.

On motion Mr. LOUIS LOVE was elected chairman of the board.

The several official bonds of the Auditor, Sheriff, Treasurer and Coroner were presented and approved.

A petition signed by 19 citizens for a road commencing at the termination of the Vancouver and Fifth Plain road at JOHN CAMPBELL's old house, running from thence Northward to Salmon creek, was presented, examined, passed and it was ordered, that T. M. COFFEY, J. CAMPBELL and W. I. ... be appointed viewers of said road and that the county Surveyor be directed to survey the same.

It was ordered that WILLIAM QUINE, a pauper, be placed in St. Joseph's Hospital and maintained at the expense of the county.

LEVI DOMTHIT, Probate Judge, was allowed fifty four dollars per diem and mileage during the July term 1867 of Probate Court. [3/1]

During a recent correspondence with EDWARD A. MAYO, one of Vancouver's ex-chief of police, I recieved the following information to add to the "Swan disaster" printed in Trail Breakers Volume 15 No.3, 1988-89.

Dick,

You mentioned the "Swan" incident. I hadn't known that THIBEDEAU'S wife was involved, (Vancouver police officer HENRY "TIP" THIBEDEAU) but have heard a number of stories about it. It seems that the old 7th Infantry band, of which I later became a member, made a trip in order to play at the dedication for the city of Longview, Washington. (The Longview Bridge opening ceremonies). The band leader and others in the band prefered to return by bus to Vancouver, but a portion of the band had stayed aboard on the return trip to play for a dance on board. When the collision took place, some of the band were credited with saving the situation. In particular, PRIVATE ROLAND TOWERS, who was playing in the dance band acted very wisely. At the crash, the barge all but tipped over. This precipitated a scramble of the passengers to the high side, which resulted in the boat almost capsizing in the reverse direction. was repeated several times. TOWERS was near a stanchion on the lower deck, and he was able by holding to the stanchion to seize several people and hold them in the center of the deck, while shouting to other passengers to "settle down and stop rocking the boat." Eventually the passengers did stop milling, and none who stayed aboard were casualtys, though a number who jumped overboard were drowned. Not all, however. One small fellow, a member of the band who was unable to swim had luckily grabbed hold of a plank or timber, and had managed to get two women, one on each side of him. His name was BOBBY GIAMATTEO, and as his name suggests, he was an Italian, and spoke very imperfect english. He hollered, "Hey, bringa da boat, I gotta two wim." I knew Bobby and he was a very shy man, and later the bandsmen claimed that GIAMATTEO hollered so loudly was because he was afraid of the women.

Another woman was saved by **EVERETT McKENZIE**, a bandsman. Regards, Ed







I photocopied everything — my files were a disaster — But now, computerized, I pile up papers so much faster!










