



CHARLEMAGNE'S EMPIRE

YOU ARE RELATED TO CHARLEMAGNE !!!

Doug Walker, author of an article printed in the Augusta Genealogical Quarterly, resounds an emphatic "YES !!!" He states that if as few as one of your ancestors within the last 20 generations came from Europe, you are almost certainly descended from Charlemagne. About 45 generations ago (800 A.D.), Charlemagne became emperor when there were about 50 million people in Europe and about 300 million world-wide.

Following back from your two parents, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, etc., you had 35 trillion ancestors - a hundred thousand more than in the entire world than - so you had to be related to ones that were alive! Mathematically, you are related to each person alive in 800 AD in about 100,000 ways.

Even if only one of your ancestors came from Europe only twenty generations ago, the probability of being related to Charlemagne becomes virtually certain. He encourages "Now, considering the 100,000 or more ways that you are related to Charlemagne, it shouldn't be hard to trace at least one line back, now should it !?!"

CHARLEMAGNE

Charlemagne (Charles the Great) was king of the Franks and Lombards, emperor of the Romans, founder of the Holy Roman Empire and one of the foremost rules in history. His traditional birthdate is April 2, 742 A.D., the son of Pepin the Short (first king of the Carolingain line) and grandson of Charles Martel. Pepin had built up and stabilized the Frankish kingdom. When he died on Sept. 24, 768, his sons Charles and Carloman ruled independently over sections of the kingdom and civil war was averted when Carloman died naturally in 771.

Charlemagne continued to expand the empire until he dominated all of central Europe from the North Sea to the Mediterranean and from the Atlantic Ocean to the eastern shore of the Adriatic Sea. On Christmas Day 800 he was acclaimed emperor of the Romans and received a gold crown.

Charlemagne was interested in learning of all kinds and gave orders for someone to read to him at dinner each day. He also ordered "Let every monastery and abbey have its school, where boys may be taught the psalms, the system of musical notation, singing, arithmetic, and grammar, and let the books which are given them be without

faults, and let care be taken that the boys do not spoil them either when reading or writing." Although his grandsons ruled over his empire, no one was found for more than a century worthy to wear the crown.

Rolling farmland splashed with color

Sara must be the most beautiful rural area left in Clark County.

Its rolling farmland is verdant, splashed with spots of red, gold

and yellow.

There are wide fields and some orchards — pears, mostly — and berry patches. There are red barns, symbols of a thriving dairy industry.

Huge subdivisions have yet to carve up this pastoral scene.

Norman Harris has been master of the Sara Grange. He isn't optimistic that Sara will remain beautiful.

"They're cutting up the area into five-acre tracts," Harris said. "New houses are going up all over the place."

Harris said most of the members of the Sara Grange are farmers or retired farmers, but many of the farms are disappearing. "You can't blame them for quitting farming," said Harris, who pointed to high taxes as one reason farms are no longer profitable.


"At one time there were solid prune orchards here, all the way south to Fruit Valley," Harris said. "Now they're about all gone."

Sara is a traditional farming afea about 10 miles north of downtown Vancouver. Its history is tied to Whipple Creek, a lazy, quiet stream that drains a large area just north of Hazel Dell and dumps its water into Lake River.

The Lake River Lumber Co. built a mill on Whipple Creek about 1888. This mill was located about one-quarter mile west of the present intersection of Northwest 179th Street and Northwest 41st Avenue. A residence at that intersection, a former general store, is all that's left of what was once the heart of Sara.

A flume ran along Whipple Creek in the old days, floating lumber from the mill to Lake River where sternwheelers were waiting for their cargo. There was also a logging railroad, the oldest tracks ever laid in the county.

A shingle mill operated around the turn of the century near this intersection. The shingles were hauled by horse and wagon to Vancouver.

John Eaton established the store in connection with the mill, and he became the first postmaster of Sara. The Sara postmark was used until 1905 when Ridgefield became the center of rural free delivery for the area.


Exactly how Sara got its name is a matter of argument.

The Fort Vancouver Historical Society in 1961 offered three explanations.

Maurice Hoff, son of Sara's second postmaster, said the community was named after a patented device that attached to a circular saw, the Sara Sawtooth.

Mrs. Roy Fletcher, daughter of the captain of an early sternwheeler that plied Lake River, was of the opinion Sara


Sara

had been named after her grandmother, Sarah Brewster Packard.

A third version was taken from an early edition of The Columbian: "This trading place on Whipple Creek is said to have been named for Sara Emmons, wife of the operator of a larger logging camp there in 1890."

The historical society said all three explanations appeared plausible.

One of the more picturesque spots in the community is the Sara Union Cemetery, which forms the churchyard for the tiny, white Lutheran Church. Here one can wander beneath the spreading canopies of massive maples, reading the epitaphs of Sara's pioneer families on time-darkened grayestones.

SO HOW DO YOU DO IT?

You are just beginning to get the "genealogy itch" and you don't have a computer to put family sheets and pedigree charts together automatically. As the computer finds its way into more and more homes and makes this task a snap, there are still those whose budgets shout "NO!" So how do you do it?

Genealogists can't avoid family sheets and pedigree charts any easier than one can avoid using a hammer and nails to build a house. They are the basic tools researchers use to compile and sort the information they have. They show what information has been found and where research is still needed.

A AMIL Y SHEET

A FAMILY SHEET is a form on which to record the research data about the father, the mother, their marriage, and their children. Sometimes called work sheets, they generally come in letter or legal sizes. The good ones will always have a place for sources. And sources are critical. When you find conflicting information, you will need to know your sources so you can evaluate discrepancies. (Some researchers make a family worksheet for each separate source.) If you choose to use a family sheet for compiling data from several sources, make a list of your sources and indicate which source supplied which data. The example has circles for indicating the source from the list at the bottom of the page. You can add a source list on the back and draw in your own circles if the sheet you have chosen does not have this feature.

Start the family sheet by filling in as much information as you know about father, then the mother, and any children. Put a "1" by this information to indicate that it came from your knowledge. If you consult Family Bibles, Aunt Edith, birth, marriage, or death certificates, censuses, county histories, etc., list them under the source list and place the corresponding number to where the information was used to fill in areas on the sheet. Record women using their maiden names.

Record the date with the day first, the month spelled out or in a three letter abbreviation and the full year: 9 Jun 1964. When recording dates, do NOT use numbers for the month, such as 6-9-64. There is too much chance for confusion. Use the abbreviation "ca." to indicate "about," for example, ca. 1829.

If a person has more than one marriage, a sheet needs to be made out for each one. If there are adoptions, add an * and make a notation to indicate this. This keeps your data accurate. And record all children, even if they died young or did not marry.

Underline unusual spellings or circumstances. For example, when "Doctor" is the name and not an earned degree, or Larry, not Lawrence, is the given name. Also if the maiden and married surnames of a woman are the same. Often the surnames are written in all capitals letters to show that they are the surname (last name).


Use <u>exact</u> spellings and dates the sources use, even though you know they are wrong – and make a note. [Use brackets or parentheses to add corrected data, spellings, comments you care to add.] Then you will know what actually came from the source and what you have added.

Once you begin to gather a number of sheets, you will need to get a binder and dividers. All sheets corresponding to one major family can be filed conveniently together. Family sheets of siblings or married children can be grouped together and then re-grouped or sub-divided as each section becomes too full to manage easily. [One professional rule is that once a file has ten sheets, it needs to be divided - this is a good guide here too.]

For some it helps to color code the various family groups or "lines." For example, green for paternal grandfather (your father's father), yellow for paternal grandmother (your father's mother), red for maternal grandfather (your mother's father), and blue for maternal grandmother (your mother's mother).

If clear tabs are on the dividers, a colored marker can be used. This system can also be used for the files that contain your copies of your source materials.

Some people prefer to use separate notebooks for each major line. You will need to develop what works for you. Both public and genealogical libraries have books for beginners. See what systems several researchers have used and use "the best" of their ideas.



PEDIGREE CHARTS are used to keep track of your ancestors. They come in a variety of forms and names: cascading, fan, standard, Ahnentafel, compressed, four-generation, fifteen-generation.

They always begin in the present generation, then move backward following direct blood lines. [Adoptions or step-parents should be kept on a separate chart and clearly indicated.] You will want to keep a permanent chart with ancestors you have proved to be yours and another working chart with proposed lines. Be sure to label them.

Except for the initial person, men will always have even numbers and women odd numbers. The father will always be double the number of the child and the mother double the number of the child plus one. [This will work backwards also: the number of the child for the father will be half his number and the number of the child of the mother will the mother's number minus one and then divided by two.] Because pedigree charts are used only for the direct line ancestors, you will be able to assign each ancestor his unique number that will always be valid.

For example, the father of ancestor number 11 will be 22 and the mother 23. The father of 22 will be 44 and his father 88 and his father 176. The wife of number 176 will be 177. The father of ancestor

number 9025 will be 18050 and the mother 18051.

Because charts with all names on it can become extremely large and space for information becomes less for each generation out, a series of charts may be desirable. By building a series of charts, each person has space for pertinent data.

Begin with Chart No. 1. You (or the person you have chosen will be number 1) your father will be 2, mother 3. Your paternal grandfather will be 4 (double your father's number), your paternal grandmother 5, your maternal grandfather 6, your maternal grandmother 7. You great-grandparents will be numbers 8-15, great-great-grandparents will be 16-31, etc. The last column on the chart will contain space for the name and "continued on chart #____."

Now comes the tricky part. Some people will re-start numbering each beginning person as one and indicate "Person No. 1 on this chart is the same as Person No. 14 on chart No. 20."

Another method is to use the sequential chart numbering guide which reserves chart numbers and additional charts are filled out only when necessary. For a 5-generation pedigree chart, Chart 2 is continued on charts 18-33; chart 18 is continued on charts 274-289, etc. Using this method, ancestor numbers assigned on larger charts will be identical on this series of charts.

For example, if on Chart No. 1, person Number 23 is Anna Elsie LAYTON, she will continue on chart #9. Her number 23 can be carried on and her father will be 46, her mother 47, etc. On her chart she will have an ancestor numbered 375 who will continue on chart # 137. You will need to fill in chart number one. On the space provided in the "continued on Chart #____" begin at the top with 2 and continue down until you get to 17 on the bottom. Then as you add charts, look up the appropriate chart number on the reference guide to know what number to begin the numbering of the top "continued on chart # ."

Some genealogists will also keep a simple pedigree chart with their family sheets just to help them keep track or missing ancestor data or to refresh their memory where "this person" fits into the line.

Another chart which allows information on each ancestor to be recorded compactly is sometimes called a condensed or ahnentafel. This method uses the numbers of each ancestor and records information

in a "paragraph form" for each ancestor known and compiling records numerically. The *Trail Breakers* uses this format for charts contributed for the "Ancestor Charts" column. [See page 32.] Disadvantages include the difficultly of adding new information if it isn't on a computer and the lack of visual ease in seeing relationships of the numbers.

EARLY CLARK COUNTY PEOPLE

INFORMATION PERTAINING TO THE REID FAMILY: VICTIMS OF THE 1902 YACOLT BURN

Obituary published in the *Vancouver Daily Columbian*, Tuesday, June 1, 1915; contributed by R. N. Grafton, G-013

D.F. REID, a pioneer of Clarke county, died at Sawtell, California, Friday, May 28, 1915. Mr. Reid accompanied by his wife, Mrs. Hattie Reid, went to California about four weeks ago to try to build up Mr. Reid's health, which had been failing for several weeks before leaving here.

Mr. Reid was well known here, being a resident of this vicinity for 44 years, coming from Etna Green, Indiana, where he was born February 17th, 1845. He was married to Hattie James September 11th, 1866 and came to Portland with his family in 1871, settling on a homestead in Clarke county a short time later.

Mr. Reid leaves to mourn his loss a wife, two sons and two daughters. One son, Orin with most of his family, was burned in the big forest fire of September 12th, 1902. The other children are J.J. Reid of Amethyst, Alberta, Canada; Mrs. Frank Turgeon of The Dalles, Oregon; Rev. M.M. Reid of Portland, Oregon, and Mrs. R.C. Wilson of Vancouver. He also leaves two brothers and two sisters, A.C. Reid, of View, Wash.; J.M. Reied of Pulman, Wash.; Mrs. John Eggers of Winton, California and Mrs. Cora Grantham of LaCenter, Wash.

Mr. Reid served in Company G, 118th Indiana Infantry during the civil war, was a member of the G.A.R. post of this city and a member of the Grange at Orchards.


The body will be interred at the National Home Cemetery for its final rest.

PIONEER PARAGRAPHS

Pioneer Grange Charter Members, published in *The Reflector*, November 24, 1921, contributed by Mary Snell.

On Saturday evening, Nov. 19, the people of Pioneer were addressed by Mr. William Bouck, State Master of the Western Progressive Grange of Washington, at the Pioneer school house. There was a very good attendance in spite of the down-pour of rain. The Western Progressive Grange of Pioneer was organized with the following as charter members: J.W. Dolan, J.T. Ayres, R.A. Goff, Peter Wacha, Albert Wacha, Mrs. R.A. Goff, Mrs. Allena B. Ayers, George Dietrich, J.C. Shultz and Wilber Tobey. Meetings will be held the first Saturday of each month a J.W. Dolan's. J.T. Ayers was a delegate to the Farmers' National Council which met in Portland last week, and reports that among the resolutions adopted was one demanding complete disarmament without canceling any foreign war debts.

The Washington Grange

Washington Grange #82 was formed on August 19, 1889, three months before the Territory became a state. In order to join, early grange members had to be connected to farming. This is not the case today. The 13th Washington Grange master, Metta D. Sparks, daughter of Simeon Durgan, who was the first grange master, had to give up her membership when she was no longer had a direct connection with farming. In 1892, members within a four mile distance of the grange hall were fined 10 cents if they did not have a "reasonable excuse" for not attending a meeting. Elmer Wolf, served four terms as grange master in the 1920's and '30's. He performed with Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show and Bailey's Circus in Europe. After serving in the Army in Spain and the Philippines, he married a Clark County girl, Molly Nerton.

It is said to be Mr. H's expectation to cross the Columbia only a short distance above this and continue the survey up the river on this side as rapidly as possible. It is somewhat refreshing to us, even to hear a railroad talked about. [2/5]




