

ROOTS? LEGACY? HEIRLOOM?

It has been 15 years since Alex Haley's book "Roots" triggered a national interest in genealogy. Published in 37 languages, his book had sold more than 6 million copies in 1986. On a short clip on a television program, it was brought out that Alex Haley had the opportunity to travel back to Africa and discover the story of Kunta Kinta who had been stolen and met relatives still living in the area. Haley states that Americans can find strength by studying their ancestors but still advises youth: "Don't follow me. Make your own footsteps. Leave your own legacy."

Are you making your own legacy? Will your great grandchildren know about you a hundred years from now? That is other than information they can obtain from vital statistics or census records?

Perhaps it will be to grand nieces and nephews instead of grand-children that your heirloom will fall. An heirloom is a valued possession passed down in a family through succeeding generations and may be a piece of China, an old toy, some needlework or "the family stores." It was in rough draft in a Schoolcraft notebook that a great-aunt wrote stories that she remembered being told when she was growing up. She wrote it for two of her nieces, but because one of these nieces has shared the notebook, the legacy will be passed down to generations of Wilson relatives. They have been "polished" by the member of another generation to be put it a book for many to enjoy.

The stories she wrote were in rough form; many words were crossed out and sometimes several substitutions were offered. She included a brief history of ancestors of her mother - both sides. Then she told of their early life together and their travel across the plains to Clark County. She included the major events, but also some minor ones. Because she left this record, generations know that Indians were enamored by her great aunt and desired to trade blankets and ponies for her.

How can you go about it? First of all realize that it does not have to be perfect! And don't wait for that perfect time or place. Begin it now!

One good way to start is with a three-ring loose leaf binder. Make sections for different periods of your life: Family background; Birth to Five Years; Six to Twelve Years; Teen Age Years; College/Professional Training; Married Life and Children; Work Experiences; Retirement; What I Have Learned From Life. You may also want to have divisions for specific subjects or events. One advantage of doing it with loose leaf is that you can carry paper with you and write when your memory is "jogged" with incidents or anecdotes. A computer can be used in the same way.

Remember the five "w"s are still important: who, what, where, when, and why? Then fill in with details: size, color, shape, feelings, etc. It can help to work with a friend to stimulate your thinking. Or pretend you are talking to a person like when you write a letter and "listen" for their

questions. And remember to identify people! Grandma could be one of several people. Even Uncle Larry could refer to two or more family members.

YOU: Where were you born: town, hospital, home, who was there? What has your health been life: illnesses - how were they treated? What was your weight at various ages? What are your earliest childhood memories? Stories about when you were young? Special dreams, aspirations?

CAREER/WORK: What were your responsibilities? Did you have a job outside the home? What was it like? How did you get to work? What were the careers of others in the family? If you changed careers, why?

SPECIFIC EVENTS: Record your memories of a historic weather event, the first time you saw an airplane, a president's death, an announcement of war, your wedding day, birth of a child, a vacation - what was the transportation, why did you go, what did you see? How did you celebrate (name a holiday), birthdays, etc.

ORDINARY EVENTS: How was food kept before refrigerators? When did you first use a telephone? What was your favorite dessert? What was an ordinary meal like? What were the slang words of the time - and what did they mean? Who were your friends and what did you do? What did you wear to school? What did you study? What were the classrooms like? The teachers? Describe the first time you babysat your grandchild? What makes you special?

PHOTOGRAPHS: Get out photographs to jog memories (remember the five "w"s) and identify the people written on the back or with an attached piece of paper.


Once you have a section fairly complete, then it is time to organize it. Make a rough draft (the loose leaf pages can simply be shifted if they stories were formed in units) and make at least an informal outline. This will help indicate where additional information is needed. When you have the sections completed, it will be time to let others read your rough draft so you know where you may need to rewrite.

Photographs will be an invaluable addition to your story. If you are going to have your story published, you will need to have half-tones or PMTs made. This is a photographic process that inserts small dots of white into a copy of the photo so that it will not smear during printing. Printing machines are set for different size half-tones, so you may want to think ahead to how you want to publish your book. [Our CCGS machine accepts half-tones of "85 line."] If you furnish a "print-ready" copy, it can be very modest.

If you find it hard to write, another way to "publish" is to read your story into a video recorder. Since these are now very popular, a friend may have one he will loan. You may want to have a relative "interview" you on audio or video tape. But you should plan ahead to have a polished presentation. Make notes of incidents or topics you want to cover. You may even have a list of questions ready to ask.

This is YOUR heirloom. Don't allow time to steal this priceless gift from your descendants. They will enjoy reading your story.

The Rossiter Brothers Harness Shop

Joining his older brother Charles Frederick "Fred" Rossiter who had established a leather and harness business here around the turn of the century, Louis "Lou" John Rossiter came to Vancouver in 1906. Both men had served their apprenticeship at the McMonies Leather Company in Portland, Oregon. The McMonies brothers, Fred and Walter, were first cousins of the Rossiters.

The brothers established their shop near the corner of Fourth and Main Streets. The two story building was constructed of "Hidden Brick", with a balcony for the storage of leather and apartments on the floor above. It was the only business of its kind in Clark County. Before the popularity of the automobile every farmer had a team of horses and every town family who could afford it, had a horse and carriage. While a lucrative era for the leather business, it was short-lived.

Charles Frederick Rossiter was born July 25, 1869 in Canada. He was married to Beryl Gramille Lawrence, daughter of G.C. Lawrence and Mary L. Johns. She was born February 18, 1878 at Salem, Oregon and died of Bright's Disease at the Mt. View Sanatorium in Portland, Oregon on August 16, 1923. Fred survived her by thirty years passing away on March 24, 1953. They are both buried at Park Hill Cemetery in Vancouver. Fred and Beryl were the parents of Lawrence born ca. 1901, Gladys born ca. 1903, Frederick born ca. 1917 and Patricia Lavonia born 1919. Following a short illness of diphtheria, Patricia died at the age of ten months on February 11, 1920.

In 1911, Louis Rossiter met Nancy "Nan" Howe Wester while acting as best man at his cousin's wedding. Nancy who was the maid of honor, was a genuine Southern belle. She was a graduate of Cottey College in Nevada, Missouri, a college education being a rarity for girls in the 19th century. She pursued a career in advertising with Roberts Brothers Department Store in Portland until her marriage to Lou in 1913. Nancy was an intelligent and educated artist as well as accomplished elocutionist.

Lou waited until he had saved \$10,000 before they married. A substantial sum, considering their first home, located on 23rd Street in Vancouver was built at a cost of \$2,500. They were the parents of two children: William and Elizabeth Rossiter (who married Walter J. M. Kraus).

Louis was born at Toronto, Ontario, Canada on April 8, 1876 and died of a stroke at the age of 85 years, 8 months on January 1, 1962. Nancy was born February 5, 1879, in Pleasant Hill, Missouri and died at the age of 101 years of age on Christmas Day in 1980. They are both buried in Park Hill Cemetery, Vancouver, Washington. The Rossiters were members of the First Presbyterian Church, the Pomona Grange # 82, the Odd Fellows Lodge and Progress Rebekah Lodge #84.

A newspaper account published on August 1, 1930 tells of the fire that destroyed the entire block bounded by Main Street, 3rd Street, Washington and 4th Street. It was first noticed at 2:30 a.m. The loss was put between \$125,000 and \$150,000. After the fire they relocated in the Odd Fellows Building on Washington Street. Upon retirement in 1935, Lou sold his share of the business to his brother. Fred continued on for another ten years, closing the business in 1945.

Scandinavians found quick buck paradise

If partners Anderson and Lannerberg of the Swedish Land and Colonization Co. had waited 70 years to found Venersborg, they wouldn't have ended up with so many

angry Swedes.

Instead of disillusioned immigrants trying to scratch out a living farming rocky brushland, the Portland-based company would have realized a harvest of magnificent homes nestled among the fir trees.

Venersborg, a community about five miles east of Battle Ground, was created exactly 70 years ago, in 1909, by promoters who saw a chance to turn burned-over, marginal land into a Scandinavian bonanza.

The partners who formed the colony bought the land for a song — probably a dollar or two per acre — and ran Swedishlanguage advertisements across the nation describing Venersborg as a garden of Eden.

"The Swedish Land and Colonization Co. of Portland, promoters of the Venersborg Colony, brought a large number of prospective settlers over to the site," reported the Vancouver Independent newspaper of June 26, 1910. "They went in a caravan accompanied by a brass band."

It must have taken more than a brass band to drown out the groans of disappointment from the Swedish immigrants when they saw what they had purchased sight-unseen. The advertisements had pictured fertile fields covered with waving grain. They found rocky hillsides covered with blackened stumps and crumbling snags.

But, with typical Swedish grit, the settlers pitched in to make something worthwhile of their colony. They dug out or burned the stumps and used the rocks for fences.

A scant two years later, the Vancouver Columbian, describing the dedication of the new Venersborg church, reported:

"Those going out from the city were greatly surprised at the advances made by the Swedish colony since the land was first settled. The enterprising Swedes have really subdued the forest and have built up a thriving community in a district which was in the midst of the forest a few years ago."

The newspaper spoke of "fine homes, good roads, fruit trees and berry bushes." The first church was erected and a school house was in the process of being constructed of boards sawed "in a sawmill owned by the Swedes."

Bill Allworth Sr., born just after the turn of the century near Venersborg, remembers the settlers trudging by his home with their belongings on their backs. Since they spoke only Swedish, he said, local people had little to do with them. "My mother told me to stay away from them," he recalled.

EARLY CLARK COUNTY PLACES

The community itself had been established on land owned by a farmer named Vener, according to one explanation. Company officials combined the name of their hometown of Vanersborg, Sweden, with the name of this farmer to come up with Venersborg, which is supposed to mean friendly place.

In 1912, a store was built by Fred and Wilhemina Hagberg and a post office opened there. The store building still stands.

The first church built in Venersborg was Methodist-Episcopal. In 1914, the Swedish Mission Friends Church was built on land donated by John Kullberg a quarter-mile east of the Methodist Church. Later, the churches consolidated, and the buildings were fastened together. This is the non-denominational Venersborg Church still being used near the intersection of Northeast 209th Street and Northeast 242nd Avenue.

Long vanished is the Venersborg cooperative cannery that for years turned local produce into cans of pears, prunes and beans. Also gone is the sawmill.

The Venersborg school was run until 1931 when the district consolidated with the Battle Ground School District. The old school building still stands and is used as a community hall.


While Venersborg today has no real identity as a colony, the steep hills and thick brush have sprouted a magnificent crop of new homes, expensive structures running, in many cases, from \$100,000 to

\$200,000. These houses are tucked away along narrow lanes winding through the second-growth timber and are hidden from the view of the passerby.

The owners of these homes work in Vancouver and Portland and are willing to commute long distances for the privilege of country living, according to Allworth, who himself has been a major developer of the area. Allworth Road, Allworth Avenue and Allworth Canyon all speak of the role this pioneer family has played in the growth of the area.






