

"MORMON HYSTERIA" AT THE LEWIS RIVER

Hysteria is defined in Webster's Dictionary as a disturbance of mental faculties and mass hysteria then is a disturbance of the mental faculties for many people. During the 1830's and throughout the rest of the Nineteenth Century all a person had to do to set off mas hysteria was to make their neighbors think that the Mormons were coming.

Some believed the rumors that the missionaries took back girls and women to Utah to place into their harems. When two missionaries were given shelter for the night at a Hillsboro, Oregon home the woman stayed up all night for fear the missionaries would kidnap her. The next morning she learned that they were really fine people and she said, "I'm sorry I acted so mean last night, and I hope you will forgive me. You see, I have heard so many stories about the Mormons having so many wives that the Mormon preachers are travelling around the country getting young girls to run off with them to Utah, so I thought you were bad men and that was the reason I did not want to have you in my home."²

Some immigrants believed that the Mormons were encouraging the Indians to fight off the white settlers by supplying them with guns while talking about Choosuklee, or Jesus Christ. Read into the Congressional Record of the 35th Congress, 2nd session, was a letter from General N. S. Clarke which included the extract of a letter from George Gibbs, dated November 27, 1857:

'A very curious statement was recently made me by some of the Indians near Steilacoom. They said that the Klikatats had told them that Choosuklee (Jesus Christ) had recently appeared on the other side of the mountains; that he was after awhile coming here, when the whites would be sent out of the country, and all would be well...It needed only a little reflection to connect this second advent with the visit of Brigham Young to the Flathead and Nez Perces country. '3, 4

Indian scares were very real to the settlers. In March of 1856 a renegade band of Yakimas and Klickitats had attacked the blockhouses at the Middle and Lower Cascades (near present day North Bonneville, WA), and at that same time, the folks living near the Lewis River settlement moved across the Columbia River to stay in the block house at St. Helens. The men commuted daily across the river to tend the livestock and farms while other stood guard.

Some of the settlers had been present in Missouri and Illinois when mob violence broke out, and they wanted no more out here in the west. Some people were from slave states in the South, who wanted to continue their way of life, and it was known that Mormons wouldn't vote to become a slave state. Some looked for excuses to blame them for other wrongs such as the Reverend Mr. Goodsell, captain of a 105-man party which arrived at The Dalles May 29, 1851 after wintering in Salt Lake City. He reported:

"The Mormons have appointed missionaries for South America, California, Oregon, and numerous other countries...The two missionaries appointed for Oregon, it is expected will soon arrive...we cannot think...that we have men among us who will join them and be enticed to go with them, after obtaining the facts about their manner of living and their gross immoralities, which outvie in practice, the seraglios of the Turks and Persians.'

The account continued, picturing the vices of life among the saints but protested most vigorously against a 2% property tax levied on emigrants wintering there with livestock to feed and water."5

On May 9, 1857 four missionaries arrived at the steamboat landing at St. Helens, Oregon from San Francisco on the ship *Columbia*. They met Mrs. Bodwell, the wife of the hotel keeper, who refused to serve them. She remembered a John Hughs had stayed there two years earlier and had attempted to pay his board by leaving church literature. She told David M. Stuart, leader of the elders, "Mister Hugh, a Mormon Elder stopped at our house two years ago and left some Mormon books to pay his board bill. He traveled like a tramp without purse or script and he tried to preach but the people would not hear him, but threatened to mob him out of the country and he left for parts unknown."

Mr. Bodwell, who described himself as a 'free thinker' came to the rescue of the Stuart party. He told his wife, "every man has a right to worship God as he pleases." He. introduced them to his neighbors and they obtained permission to use the school room to preach the following day, as it was Sunday. Stuart said, "We had a big turnout and marked attention was given to what we had to say." The congregation took up a collection, which paid the board bill but no invitation of a place to stay was offered, so they

had Mr. Bodwell ferry them across the Columbia River in a schiff.

Lying across the Columbia from St. Helens is the mouth of the Lewis River. Stuart was looking for the Bozarth family who had been Mormons and lived at Nauvoo, IL. He located John Shaw Bozarth at Pekin and located other Mormons, including Daniel W. Gardner and Solomon Strong.

Stuart learned that Hughs had organized a branch of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at Lewis River two years before. Stuart recorded, "The Lewis River Branch was reorganized on May 20, 1857 by the full time elders with Daniel W. Gardner presiding. At this meeting it was moved and carried, that John S. Bozarth be ordained to the office of an Elder, and act as teacher of the branch. The work now commenced in Washington Territory, Elders Harmon and Winslow to continue their labors here. I called upon all who wished to renew their covenants to come forth and do so and be a part of the reformation. Several came forward and renewed their covenants, President Garner [sic] and his wife and Sister Louisa A. John [Springer].

Elders Stuart and Higgins then left the group and proceeded to preach at Hillsboro, where they preached at a meeting that was like an armed camp--half the group being for them and half against. They went next to Portland where they were egged before some men of conscience took them a bought them new clothing. On to Oregon City where the sheriff promised them use of the court house then disappeared with the key, and the meeting was moved to a dance hall. Next came Salem where a lively debate was started among the clergy, and then to Lane County where a man nearly threw an ax at them. By October, they were organizing a branch of the Church called Lost Fork on the North fork of the Willamette River when Stuart got word that things were not well with the Saints back at the Lewis River, and that Elders Harmon and Winslow had been run out of the county at the point of a gun.

Leaving Elder Higgins with the Lost Fork Branch, he headed back to Washington, stopping in Salem to preach again, and in Oregon City to visit the members there. At Portland he caught a boat to the Lewis River and met John Bozarth at the landing. Said he, "I cannot be harassed any longer by mobs and I've left the Church. The Saints have been called together and Solomon Strong made a motion that all those who wanted to comply with the resolution of the mob and not be driven from the territory keep their seats and all who wish to continue with the Church and suffer the

consequences, rise to their feet. Sister Louisa
John Springer was the only person there who arose
to her feet. All the rest submitted to the rule of the
mob through fear."

Only two and a half months after the Lewis River Branch had been reorganized, the 'gentile' citizens (as Mormons call non-Mormons) of Lewis River drew up a set of resolutions banning Mormons. The resolutions were sent to the Weekly Oregonian for publication. The resolutions were adopted at a meeting of the citizens of Lewis River in Washington Territory Sunday, August 2, 1857. It resolved that Salt Lake Mormonism is treason, that it authorized murder, robbery, and the breaking open of the United States mails, that every inducement is made to proselyte the less intelligent of our fellow citizens to its creed. It went on to rail against Brigham Young and the church leaders in Utah and to advocate confiscation of individual property used for Church purposes. It ended by saying, "that while we are not willing to employ abusive measures or use personal violence in executing our determination, we shall feel justified in using severe measures when milder ones fail."

Elder Stuart made an effort to reactivate the Church members but he found the saints were afraid to recognize him in public or invite him to their homes. "They had all backed out but Sister Louisa A. John, who was neither afraid nor ashamed to invite me to her house, although her husband was in sympathy with the mob. I remained there two weeks trying to break the yoke of bondage from the necks of the Saints, but all to no purpose."8

Shortly after this, about 70 converts and missionaries left Oregon for Utah but Louisa John Springer remained behind.

EXCERPTS FROM AN OREGON TRAIL DIARY

Submitted by CCGS member Hazel Ketterling K-011

The following are excerpts from a diary written by Henry Allen. The entire document is 23 pages and the condensed version appears in the *Gresham Outlook* 19 Aug 1919 as 4 pages. She notes that in the movies we see the pioneers riding in the wagons, but it was easier on them and on the horses to walk. Can you imagine walking across the country and being that pregnant?

THE JOURNAL OF HENRY ALLYN, 1853 and

excerpts from Wilson Pioneers Drove Mules To Oregon

Gresham Outlook 19 Aug 1919

28 March 1853 --Started about 2 p.m. on our long and tedious journey to Oregon. Noted: After some side trips in Iowa the wagon train (mule train) is nearing Idaho.

5 July 1853--At Rock Creek they saw and tasted their first Salmon. Indians fishing there caught it and sold it to them. Their dog over-ate and died.—the only casualty of the journey. The year 1853 was a healthful year for emigration. The ample rainfall has checked the cholera and smallpox that had ravaged the trains in the previous years. The way was strewn with graves dated 1852, white shoulder blades of dead oxen were used as tombstones.

13 July 1853--In southern Idaho they came upon a hot springs -- with water "hot enough to scald a hog." Then up the beautiful Boise River, clear as crystal.

4 Aug 1853--Got an early start and arrived at Fort Boise at 11: a.m. and found 10 wagons waiting to cross on the ferry.

They charged 8.00 dollars per wagon. What villianery is this!

5 Aug 1853--A man arrives from the Willamette Valley with bad advice about a new road which will cut off 200 miles. They new road intersects the old where we are now, --- at the Malheur River ford.

6 Aug 1853--We concluded it will be safest to take old road. We continue up the ravines of Burnt River and cross it six times.

6 Sept 1853--We lay last night about 3 miles above the mouth of Big Sandy creek. We landed this morning at our destination and our joy found the rest of our company with the mules all safely over the Cascades. We rest here and councel where to lay our claims.

19 Oct 1853--The roof was barely on the cabin when Sarah Ann gave birth to another daughter Sarah Elizabeth Wilson.

30 Nov 1853--John Patrick and wife Sarah Ann (Stagner) Wilson filed a donation land claim of 320 acres [which would now be between 287th and 302nd and Division St., East of Gresham, OR].

HISTORY OF HAMILTON FUNERAL HOME

The Hamilton Funeral Home was established by William H. Hamilton, Jr. in 1917. He and his wife had come west in 1900, settling in Greshman, Oregon, where he was an undertaker. In 1917, he purchased a lovely old home at 302 West 11th Street which is on the corner of Columbia Avenue, just one block north of the Knapp Mortuary. This became the Hamilton Mortuary and is still the home of Hamilton-Mylan-Knapp-Gunderson Funeral Home. (In 1905, he had established a funeral home in Vancouver, but, according to his obituary, this one he sold to William Jennings Knapp and became the Knapp Funeral Home.) After William Henry Hamilton, Jr., died, his son Edward Arthur Hamilton took over and he was followed by Ethel and son John Hamilton who took charge of the home until 1939. Joe Shaunassey had the home from 1939-1945 and Ray Andrews took it over for two years followed by Mrs. Ray Andrews for another year until 1948 when Paul L. Mylan purchased the facility. Mr. Mylan operated the home for twenty-five years until he retired and sold the business. Additional information on this home can be found in *Knapp Mortuary Funerals* 1907-1925, Clark County Genealogical Society, Vancouver, Washington.

WILLIAM HENRY HAMILTON, Jr.

Born in Pickaway, Pickaway County, Ohio, on December 29, 1856, William Henry Hamilton, Jr. was named for his father, William Henry Hamilton, Sr. He was the second son born to Henry Sr. and his wife Maria/Mariah McElligett. The Hamilton name was one that became adopted into the line as Henry (senior's) father was actually born a Roberts. When his father died and his mother Maria remarried, she married an Irishman by the name of Andrew Hamilton who became his step-father; Wm. Henry adoped his step-father's name.

In Albion, Nebraska, on the fifteenth of October 1879, William Jr. married Martha Ann Foote, new English immigrant. They had ten children: (1) Elmer Elsworth Hamilton, b. 27 September 1880, Nebraska, married Elva M. Cox in 1904, Gresham, Oregon. She was born about 1884 in Oregon. He died March 2, 1918, and had several occupations: in 1904 he worked as a butcher in Gresham, as a barber in 1908 in Vancouver, followed by a time as a fireman on the O.W.R. & N.R.R., then around 1915 in Klamath Fall, Oregon, he set up a butcher shop, and in 1917 he was back up in Portland, Oregon, as a elevator operator shortly before his death. He and his wife Elva had six children: Gregory Hamilton, b. May 1905, Gresham, Oregon, d. 1907, Mabton, WA; Martha Hamilton (who is the granddaughter whose short narrative on the family is included

later), b. 6 Nov 1907, Sandy, Oregon; and Howard Elmer Hamilton, b. 22 March 1910, Vancouver, Washington, d. 9 May 1975, 2 children; Marie Helen Hamilton, b. 19 Spril, Fallbridge (Wishram), Washington, m. Herbert William Parker, d. 17 Jan 1992; James Arthur Hamilton, b. 9 April 1914, Sandy, Oregon, m. 17 April 1937 Annamaried Elizabeth Glanz, d. 13 Jul 1988, Portland, 1 child; and Louis raymond Hamilton, b. 19 Sep 1916, Klamath Falls, Oregon, 2 marriages. (2) Fitzer Robert Hamilton, b. 16 July 1882, Albion, Nebraska, d. 2 August 1938, Klamath Marsh, Oregon, three marriages, a daughter, Dorothy, Hamilton. (3) Edward Arthur Hamilton, b. 9 March 1884, Albion, Nebraska, and mentioned later as the son who followed in his father's footsteps, taking over the funeral home. (4) Edna Mae Hamilton, b. 16 Mar 1889, Albion, Nebraska, married Grover H. McKeown, and died in Vancouver, Washington on February 4, 1920 leaving two children. (5) Frederick William Hamilton, who was born on 9 April 1886 in Nebraska and died 6 January 1950 in Phoenix, Oregon, was a blacksmith and married Pearl M. Courtney on December 23, 1916, had one child.

(6) Emma Laura Hamilton who was born in October 10, 1894, Albion, Nebraska, married Louis Allison Meeker, had five children and died 3 May 1962, Portland, Oregon. (7) Albert "Burt" E. Hamilton, born in Albion, Nebraska, and died in France during WWI apparently due to a sniper's bullet, no children. (8) Marie Ellen Hamilton, born in Albion, Nebraska, on 6 April 1897, married three times, Dallas Thomas Smith, Earl C. Hembree, and Chester "Jack" Hardy, and died 22 Apr 1989, Portland, Oregon. (9) Erma E. Hamilton who was born in 1899 in Albion, Nebraska, married first Alvy(?) Arnold, and married second Dr. Florelle D. "Peter" DeVany/Devenney, and died 25 Jun 1974, Pacific Co., WA, leaving an adopted daughter Patrician Ann DeVeny. (10) A tenth child, a little girl died young.

William Henry Jr.'s brother S. Elba was probably the first of the family to move to the Pacific Northwest about 1886 when he had been married about four years. He had been converted to a Seventh Day Adventist by the evangelist Ellen G. White, from the probable Methodist background that the family had been raised. When his father let it be known late Friday that he needed to have him help with working shears (that is cutting wheat) the next day, Elba refused because it was his Sabbath and because of the dispute Elba and his wife Eva moved out and west to Oregon where he was a "colporter," selling church books. His brother F. Elmer had also been converted and he came west by train in 1887 and married Eva in St. John, Oregon, in 1889.

In 1900 William Henry Jr. rented a whole train car for the trip west to join his father, mother and other brothers and sisters who had moved out in the late 1880's or early 1890's. Family say that he was at Gresham before coming to Vancouver. He died August 24, 1922 at the age 66, although the paper says 65; his family says he was born in 1856, not 1857. His wife Martha died on the fourteenth of April 1939 at Portland, Oregon. His obituary appeared on the front page of the *Vancouver Evening Columbian* on Friday, August 25, 1922:

W.H. HAMILTON DIES SUDDENLY AT HOME ON EAST 11TH STREET VANCOUVER UNDERTAKER SUCCUMBS TO ATTACK OF HEART TROUBLE

W.H. Hamilton, aged 65, died suddenly at his home on west 11th street yesterday afternoon at 1:30. The night before Mr. Hamilton had been feeling bad and a doctor was called but nothing serious was found to be the matter. His sudden death came as a shock to his family and relatives.

He was born in Illinois December 29, 1857 [family gives 1856], and moved west in 1900 from Nebraska. He settled in Portland where he lived five years before coming to Vancouver. In 1905, Mr. Hamilton opened an undertaking parlor and in 1910 he sold his business interests here to W.J. Knapp and then moving to Portland where he opened another undertaking parlor. Last May Mr. Hamilton and his son came to this city and opened an undertaking parlor at the corner of West 11th and Columbia streets.

Mr. Hamilton was a member of the East Gate Masonic Order of Portland, Order of Eastern Star, Portland, Portland lodge I. O. O. F., Knights of Pythias and D. O. K. K., both of Portland, Modern Woodmen of America, Portland, and the grange of Orchards. He was an active member of the Methodist church and was recently elected to the office of director in the First Methodist Episcopal church of this city.

Surviving relatives include his wife, Mrs. Martha Hamilton, three daughters, Mrs. L. A. Meeker, Mrs. D.T. Smith and Mrs. F.D. DeVeny, all of Portland, three sons, F.R., Klamath Falls, Ore., F.W., Newberg, Ore., and E.A. of this city, his mother, Mrs. Maria Hamilton, Portland, 13 grandchildren, two sisters and two brothers in Portland, and one brother in California.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Two follow-up notices appeared in later newspapers on August 26 and 28:

August 26: BODY TO LIE IN STATE. The body of W.H. Hamilton will lie in state all day Sunday at the W.H. Hamilton and Son undertaking parlors at the corner of west 11th and Columbia street. At 10 o'clock Monday morning the body will be taken to the Finley undertaking parlors at Portland and services will be held that afternoon at 2:30 providing one of the sons can get here in time.

August 28: W.H. HAMILTON The funeral of W.H. Hamilton, Vancouver undertaker who died suddenly at his home on West 11th and Columbia streets, will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 at the Finley undertaking parlors of Portland. Rev. J.P. Marlatt, of this city will officiate and interment will be made in the Mount Scott cemetery. Masonic funeral service will be held.

EDWARD ARTHUR HAMILTON



Mayor Ed Hamilton died this afternoon at 3:15 at his home after an illness of a few days from intestinal flu.

Although the obituary indicates the "new" Hamilton Funeral Home started in May 1922, records would indicate that it was in January 1917 that the Vancouver parlor was opened. Perhaps William H. Jr. was establishing his son Edward A. Hamilton in the business. Or perhaps illness struck the father or grandfather. In June 1918 there is a lapse in the records and a new book was started. It is felt that Edward took over at this time, perhaps with his father helping, and continued to be in charge of the funeral home until his untimely death in 1936. Just after William Henry Jr.'s death, there is also a lapse in the records in August of 1922, with only four funerals recorded until the new year.

Edward Arthur Hamilton was the third son born to William Henry Hamilton, Jr. and his wife Martha Ann Foote. He was born on the ninth of March 1884 in Albion, Nebraska, and was joined by six other siblings. Edward was sixteen in 1900 and probably came west with his father and other family members in the rented box car. However, one source indicated that he did not come west until 1902, so he may have stayed back and come out later.

He found a job with the SP & S railroad at the Vancouver, Washington, yards as a pipe fitter. On 28 Sep 1908 he resigned that position, and presumedly went into business to help his father the next two years. On January 3, 1918, he was again at work for the Sp & S and when WWI was at its height, he was promoted to a train Engineer, a position he held for the rest of his life.

On Christmas Day 1907, he married Ethel J. Henrichson, daughter of Gustavus A. Henrichson and Sarah E. McCann, who was a descendant of Washington pioneers William Dudly McCann and his second wife Joanna M. Smith. Sarah was a babe in arms when her parents crossed the Oregon Trail in 1864 from Mt. Vernon, Illinois to Grass Valley, Oregon, a wheat growing section not far from the The Dalles, Oregon. Here they had a trading post for a short time until they moved to the Hockinson area of Clark County, Washington, the next year. They lived here fourteen years, then moved across the county to Felida.

Edward and Ethel had two children: Lois Ethel was born on July 3, 1910, and John Edward was born on March 13, 1913. The Hamilton's lived in the upstairs apartment over the Mortuary and young John helped by keeping the Chapel clean and later became a funeral director running the Hamilton Funeral Home with his mother after his father's death.

Edward was very active and, having been elected by popular vote, was mayor only one year when he suddenly died on New Years Eve 1935. Because he was mayor of Vancouver at the time of his death, several papers carried obituaries and accompanying articles. He had completely reorganized the city's business and his administration was generally applauded as honest and efficient. Succeeding Mayor C.A. Pender issued this proclamatin: "Whereas, the Supreme Authority has seen fit to summon Edward A. Hamilton from his post as mayor of Vancouver to higher duties; and "Weheras, the



city of Vancouver and the residnets thereof share alike in the loss of this leading citizen, "now therefore I do hereby request that all aresidents join in paying respects to the memory of Former Mayor E. A. Hamilton by observing a fivenminute period of silence beginning at 2 p.m. Monday." His wife Ethel was unfortunately too ill to attend her husband's funeral due to an operation and she tragically died about five years later on July 19, 1940, after a fall from a horse she had recently acquired.

Both are buried in Park Hill Cemetery.

Fall from Horse May Prove Fatal

Mrs. E. A. Hamilton Sent to Hospital in Serious Condition

Thrown from her horse while taking an early morning ride in the Waln t Grove area, Mrs. E. A. Hamilton, prominent Vancouver woman and widow of Edwin A. Hamilton, former Vancouver mayor, was taken to St. Joseph's hospital today critically injured.

Mrs. Hamilton suffered a skull fracture and was described by her physician to be in a "very,

very serious condition." St. Joseph's hospital reported her still unconscious at noon today.

The accident occurred on the Robeck road, near its junction with the Stapleton road while Mrs. Hamilton was riding with W. L. Runyan, whose private riding academy she patronizes. Although Runyan was unavailable for comment, a report indicated that the horse broke unexpectedly into a canter and, surprised, Mrs. Hamilton fell from the saddle.

Jack Hamilton, a son, said that his mother purchased the horse four months ago and that it was of an excitable temperament.

The fall also inflicted scalp wounds, it was reported. She! was taken to St. Joseph's hospital by the Finley ambulance service shortly after 7 a. m.

E. A. Hamilton passed away here while mayor December 31, 1935. Since his death, Mrs. Hamilton has continued to operate Hamilton's Mortuary.

ANCESTORS OF W.H. HAMILTON, JR.

The senior William Henry Hamilton has an interesting background. His father was a was a William Roberts from the eastern section of Ohio, near Pennsylvania, and his mother Elizabeth (maiden name believed to be Phinnesy, though sometimes it is recorded Phinney) was born in Pennsylvania. It is believed that his father William Roberts had some canal stock and lived in Gustavus, Ohio. Henry Sr. took the Hamilton surnamed when his mother Elizabeth married Andrew Hamilton. His mother and Andrew gave William seven half brothers and sisters: Andrew Jackson, Margaret, John Wesley, George Washington, Isabella, Joames K. Polk, and Charles A. George who died near Bremerton, Washington, did some prospecting in Alaska. Charles, who was very short and worked in a circus for a time, died in Gresham, Oregon on December 8, 1923.

Named for president Harrison, William Henry Harrison [Roberts] Hamilton (Henry Sr.) was born in at Pickaway in Pickaway County, Ohio, August 30, 1833. Just before the civil war, he dropped the Harrison name from his name. He was a civil war vet, enlisting from Ohio. On the second of July 1853, at Akron, Ohio, he married Maria [Mariah] McEliget [spelled also: McElligett or McElliott]. She was the daughter of Patrick McEliget (son of James McEliget of County Cork, Ireland) and Naomi Cronkhite, who were married at Chipaway, Ontario, Canada on July 9, 1832. Maria was born December 5, 1834, in Paynesville, Ohio, and died June 9, 1925, in Portland, Oregon, at the age of 90. Her mother Naomi Cronkhite was born in Toronto, Canada and christened in July or August 1819. Naomi was born to Abraham Cronkhite of Redmondville, Ontario (who was the son of Capt. James Cronkhite of Revolutionary War fame, son of Casper Cronkhite of Albany, New York). [Her great-great-gradfather Cronkhit was one of the early Dutch settlers of New Amsterdam and one of her second cousins, Hiram Cronk, was the last survivor of the War of 1812, dying at 105 years.

Together William Henry (Senior) and Mariah Hamilton had eleven known children: (1) Charles L. Hamilton, born 1855 in Ohio married Fannie Luela Riden in Lincoln, Nebraska. (2) William Henry Hamilton (Jr.), born 1856 in Ohio, named for his father and founder of Hamilton Funeral Home in Vancouver. (3) Edward Darwin Hamilton, born 1858 in Ohio, married Sabinia Ford Foote, who was a sister to William Henry (Jr.)'s wife Martha. (4) Salem Elba Hamilton b. 1860 in Toledo, Ohio, who married Eva Myria Selby. (5) Frederick Elmer, born in 1862 in Toledo, Ohio, and married Mary Roseanna Logan (and progenitor of Arlan

On september 7, 1913, the (Portland) Oregonian carried the story of the couple's anniversary with the headlines: "SIXTIETH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED BY GRESHAM COUPLE WITH FAMIL ALL PRESENT. Eight chilren, 48 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren participate[d] in festivities honoring aged couple - special car on Gresham line carries visitors from Portland, and many gifts are received from East and West - Fine Dinner is enjoyed and tales related." [A copy of the photo what appeared in the article is printed in this article also.]

William Henry Sr. served as Sheriff and County Commissioner in Boone County, Nebraska, and was a member of the first Council of St. Johns, Oregon. When the civil war broke out, William joined Company B, Sixty-seventh Ohio Volunteer Infantry, and was with Ashby's Cavalry. Taking part in several skirmishes, he was promoted for bravery reaching the rank of sergeant. He was the company representative for carrying the vote during Lincoln's second election. He was honorably discharged at Nashville, Tennessee on July 7, 1965.

In the Spring of 1871, they left Toledo and went west by team to Nebraska where they had a sod house and experienced Indian raids, drouth, and grasshopper plagues. Twenty years later they moved to Oregon, where they settled.

William Henry Hamilton (Sr.) died the fifth of November 1918 at William Henry (Jr.'s) home at 7919 E. Gilsan, Portland, Oregon. He had been invalid for seven years and died of Cerebral Apoplexy. His wife Maria(h) died at the age of 90 on June 9, 1925. Both are buried at Mt. Scott Cemetery, now known at Lincoln Cemetery.

Grand-daughter Martha Hamilton Miller wrote this short history of the family in 1990:

My grand father [William Henry Hamilton, Jr.] had a farm in Albion, Nebraska. Before that I don't know [where], but somewhere he learned to be a mortician, because when he came to Gresham, Oregon, in 1900, he had an undertaker's facility along with a furniture store. When he was in St. Johns and Vancouver, he had an undertaker business. When he moved to Montavilla about 1913, he had a furniture and undertaker store on 80th and Glisan St. Then in 1916, he moved one block west to 79th and only had a Parlor. A few years later he moved back to Vancouver and had a Parlor at the N.W. corner of 10th and Columbia, which you can still see today.

When he was in Montavilla, I think he held an office with the Oregon Mortician Association, and he was also a Mason.

All the Hamiltons had blue eyes and I think William H. Jr. had darker brown hair and was probably about 5 ft. 10 in.

My father Elmer Elsworth Hamilton was 5 ft. 8 in, and I believe that his hair had a little bit of red in it as did the Foote girls.

Elmer did several things during his short life. He was a butcher* in Gresham in 1904 when he married Elva Cox. Next, they were at the Homestead in Washington, just out of Mabton near Sunnyside where my oldest brother, Gregory, died. Then a short time in Fall Bridge, Washington, where I was born in 1907. Somewhere he learned to be a barber and when they moved to Vancouver in 1908/9 that was his trade. Then on to be a fireman on the O.W.R. & N.R.R. and was there when the R.R. and the U.P. ran a race to see which of them could get a track down along the Deschutes River first. Then back to Fall Bridge and to Sandy, Oregon, in 1912. We then moved to Montavilla for a few months in 1914-5 and then down to Klamath Falls where [his brothers] Fitzer, Fred and Burt were. And he set up another butcher shop. In the fall of 1917 we moved back to Montavilla where my father ran an elevator in the bank building at 6th and Morrison st across from Meyer [Meier] and Franks building. The nest year he passed away in March.

I know nothing much about the Foote girls, Martha and Sabina. They came to America from England when they were about 15 and 17 years old. I don't know how much family they had, nor, who they came with. I know that they never saw their mother again because I remember Martha saying that she heard from her 93 year old mother.

Sabina and Martha was about as tall as I am, 5 ft. 2 in., the Elder grandmother was also a short little Dutch lady.

They must have all married quite young to have so many children and the Hamilton men died when they

were quite young.

I attended Gresham and Washington High School. I married Clarence Steadman whose father had English parents and mother's were Scotch. Clarence was a steel painter, mainly bridges, Burnside, Crook Rive, etc., when we were married.

About four years after Clarence died, I remarried [and was married to a] William J. Miller, a traveling shoe salesman, for seven years till he died.

Clarence and I just had one daughter, Janet Mae, who also graduated from Washington high and worked for the city before and after she married Herbert Hohn. They have two children. Nothing great about any of my brothers and sisters, but I am so grateful that we were all good, honest, everyday people and most were professed Christians.

*Martha described that as a butcher Elmer would take meat from door to door just as the green grocer did. The Hamiltons moved around quite a bit, and was in Washougal, Washington, before moving to a place in Vancouver where he could hear taps from the Vancouver, Barracks. In 1910 when Elmer was working on the Deschutes, they went by boat and lived on the river that summer, moving for the winter into a shack that had been abandoned nearby. Elmer suffered a severe heat stroke working here, and was never the same afterwards. It may have been was eventually precipated his death. In Wishram [Fall Bridge], Martha's sister Marie Helen was the first white birth recorded in the area. They could hear the pow pows from their tent house. Life was very rough and the winter when Martha was seven, both sister got diptheria. She remembers that too much asprin killed a tot.

Another interesting note Martha shared was that the Steadman ancestors were the family that sold the hotel that Laura Ingalls writes about in Little House on the Prairie. When daughter Janet stopped by a museum in the area, they were delighted to get more information on the family.

In 1990, Arlan Blodgett, had listed 108 descendants of William and Martha Hamilton. He is the historian of the Hamilton/Blodgett families and in 1989 compiled a book, *Chronology and Ancestory of William H. Hamilton* with over eighty other affiliated families form New York, Ohio, Nebraska, California, Washinston, and Oregon. In 1993 he is living at 594 N.E. 63rd in Salem, Oregon 97301. Martha Miller is living at 15717 N.E. Eugene St., Portland, Oregon 97203.

As a man and as the mayor of this city, Ed Hamilton made good. There wasn't a man who didn't love him."

That was Ed Hamilton.

Vancouver mourns the loss of a mayor and a first citizen. "Ed Hamilton" as he was known to his friends was another conspicuous example of a man who made his own way to the top. Arriving in Vancouver as a young man just reaching his majority by dint of hard work and careful management he carved for himself a place as one of the city's leading business men and when opportunity presented, was elected its chief executive officer.

His able management has left its mark on our civic life. There remains as a tribute to his personal political program an efficient and well organized police department and a revamped and highly satisfactory fire department. His ideas about city planning and zoning are in step with the forward trend in all modern

Although some opposed and doubted the wisdom of his municipal water program there was none who could question his sincerity of pur-

His Chamber of Commerce activities were those of a man who gave freely of his time and ability that his city might grow and prosper and important projects still uncompleted which will mean much to Vancouver had his persistent sponsorship.

His death is untimely in that his work was not finished. It will be difficult for another to fill his place effec-

tively.



BEFUDDLED BY STATE ABBREVIATIONS?

Have you picked up an old letter thinking that the "O." abbreviation in the address meant Ohio? It could have been for Oregon ("OR") instead, especially if mailed from Oregon. And "Wn" could have been Washington ("WA"), not Wisconsin which is "WI." Until recently, when the post office standardized the abbreviations ,there was great latitude. On second thought, there are still a lot of us out there either still sticking with the old ways or just plain making mistakes. One I keep catching myself with is "NB" for Nebraska. The correct abbreviation is "NE" because "NB" stands for New Brunswick! Another I misused was "MA" which I used for Maine -- it is for Massachusetts! Maine is "ME." Did it occur to you when looking at that old census record that "la" wasn't lowa but Indiana? The "O" for Ohio and "Te" for Tennessee were easier to figure out. Indiana could have been abbreviated "In" or "Ind." 


