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Clarke to Clark?

The discussion of how Clark County was changed from Clarke County and how it became Clarke (with an e) came up at one of the CCGS meetings. Mildred Pointek sent in this reference from the Sunday December 25, 1988 *Columbian*:

CLARKE TO CLARK: Christmas eve of 1925 was historically significant. It was then that Gov. Roland B. Hartley signed into law the bill changing the name of the county from CLARKE to CLARK. The bill had been introduced in the state House of Representative by Charles W. Hall of Vancouver, some 75 years after a clerk who lacked spelling skills had added the un-needed and unwanted final "e" to the name.

A reference from an earlier *Columbian* article was found in the Winter 1985, Vol. XI, No. 2, page 33 issue of the *Trail Breakers*. Appearing in *The Columbian* on February 25, 1982, it states:

Why on some old maps is Clark County spelled Clarke County?

"Thereby hangs a tale.

Clark County was named after Capt. William Clark, of the Lewis and Clark expedition. He did not spell his name with an E.

The Oregon provisional government on June 27, 1844, created the District of Vancouver, embracing all territory west of the Rocky Mountains and north of the Columbia River to 54 degrees 40 minutes North latitude. On Dec. 22, 1845, the word "county" was substituted for "district."

The Oregon legislature in 1850 changed the name from Vancouver to Clarke, for some inexplicable reason adding an E. Nobody bothered to correct this error for about 75 years.

On Dec. 23, 1925, Washington Gov. Roland B. Hartley signed a bill dropping the E and changing the spelling to Clark County. At the same time, he signed a bill making it illegal to pluck rhododendrons from state lands, so don't do it anymore."

Place Names of Washington by Robert Hitchman on page 51 adds these details:

... "On December 21, 1845, it was founded as the County of Vancouver by the Oregon Territorial Legislature. On September 3, 1849, the same body changed the name to Clark, to honor Capt. William Clark of the Lewis & Clark Expedition. In 1854, at the first session of Washington Territorial Legislature, the name of the county was entered in the record as Clarke. That spelling persisted in records and maps until corrected on December 23, 1925, by official act of Washington State Legislature.

Curiously, page 72 of *Clarke County Washington Territory 1885* contains this sentence:

"December 22, 1845, the word "county" was substituted for "district," and, the Legislature assembled at Oregon City, July 16, 1849, before the adjournment, changed the name of "Vancouver" to that of "Clarke," in honor of Captain Meriwether Clarke, U.S.A., of the Lewis and Clarke exploration."

In 1885 when the original history was written, Clarke with an "e" was the standard spelling of our county. [Note also that it is Meriwether Lewis & William Clark, not Meriwether Clarke.] The original law used the Clark spelling.

A Short History Lesson

A brief chronology for newcomers to Clark County or others not familiar with its history. "Oregon County" first included "all of the Pacific northwest" from San Francisco north along the coast line and to the divide of the Rocky Mountains. It was disputed territory, being claimed and settled by both British (French Canadians) and Americans. Meriwether Lewis was appointed by President Thomas Jefferson to see about this country, especially since news had arrived about the discovery of the Columbia River by British explorer Vancouver. (The Spanish were

also among the explorers and many land and water features bear Spanish names.)

In 1792, England had the strongest claims to the territory, but "a one eyed Yankee" Captain Robert Gray outwitted English and Spanish explorers with the discovery of the Columbia River on May 11, 1792, when he realized a current flowing, rather than an inlet of water, at the mouth. Gray came as an explorer, being sent by five Boston merchants wanted to use furs from this area to create trade with the Chinese. The river was named for the ship *Columbia Rediviva*, which had been captained by a veteran seaman John Kendrick and for some unknown reason traded ships with Gray who had commanded the *Lady Washington*.

With Lewis and Clark exploring the territory in 1804-7, the Americans establish a right to claim land here. Although we know the Revolutionary War was 1776, it wasn't until the Treaty of 1783 that England recognized the new nation. British fur companies were exploring the northwest and when Spain ceded claims along the Mississippi to France, Napoleon offered to sell all of the Louisiana Purchase instead of just New Orleans.

Hudson's Bay Company emerged victor of the small fur companies moving into the area when it merged with the North West Company in 1821. A Joint Occupancy Treat in 1818 gave right for both British and U.S. to use the Oregon Territory. Dr. John McLoughlin (his name is also spelled various ways) came as chief factor of the Columbia District for the HBC, arriving in 1824, and held the position for over twenty years.

The joint occupation was not always friendly (see Amos Short article, Trail Breakers Vol 17, #2, p. 4-7) as Americans tried to settle north of the Columbia River.

Somewhere in this time the "54-40 or fight" slogan was important, but in 1846 a boundary treaty set the 49th parallel as the northern limit of Oregon Country. Oregon became a Territory in 1848 and became a state in 1859. So until 1853 when Washington became a Territory, Clark

county history was a part of Oregon's history. Idaho became a territory in 1863, and included all of Montana and nearly all of Wyoming. Washington became a state in 1889; Idaho and Wyoming became states in 1890.

Clark County known first as Vancouver District

Actually, Clark county was first known as Vancouver District or County, named for the British explorer Vancouver for whom our city of Vancouver, which was first known as Columbia City, was named. (Isn't history interesting, if not a bit confusing at times? But on with Vancouver District.)

Holman's Address to the Oregon Historical Society in 1909

On December 18, 1909, Frederick V. Holman, President of the Oregon Historical Society, gave an address on "Oregon Counties, Their Creations and the Origins of Their Names." This speech was recorded in the March 1920 *Quarterly of the Oregon Historical Society* Vol. XI, #1, page 1 and following. Early in his talk he addressed "Oregon Counties Now in the State of Washington." In his speech he chose to focus on "Vancouver (now Clark)" County. Reminding the audience that Washington Territory was created out of the northern part of Oregon by Act of Congress on March 2, 1853, he shared that he had searched many records and finally called upon George H. Himes of the Oregon Historical Society for help in finding a copy of the Act creating Vancouver County of page 24 of Judge William Strong's book:

"An Act to Organize the District of Vancouver, passed 18th Aug., 1845.

"Be it enacted by the House of Representatives of Oregon territory as follows

"That all that portion of the Territory of Oregon lying north of the middle of the main channel, of the Columbia River, shall be and the same is hereby declared a separate District, under the name and style of Vancouver District and the said District shall be entitled to elect one member of the House of representative, at the next annual Election.

"This act to take effect and be in force from and after its passage --

"Oregon City 10th Aug. 1845

"Attest J.E. Long

"Approved

"Secretary

(Signed) Geo. Abernethy."

Holman reports the district was named in honor of Captain George Vancouver, R.N., who explored the North Pacific Coast in 1792-4.

It was "the first Oregon Territorial Legislature, September 3, 1849, [that] changed the name of Vancouver County to that of Clark in honor of Captain William Clark of the Lewis and Clark Expedition." He sites:

"AN ACT, to change the name of Vancouver County.

"Section I. Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Oregon, That the name of the county of Vancouver be, and hereby is, changed to Clark.

"Sec. 2. That all acts, or parts of acts, coming within the purview of this act, are hereby repealed.

"Sec. e. This act to take effect from and after its passage."

"Passed September 3d, 1849."

(Local Laws of the Territory of Oregon of 1850-1, page 54). [Italics in original record.]

Holman continues with a situation in Special Laws of 1853-4 when Clark County was released from paying certain taxes due Oregon Territory and the spelling used was Clark. He then sites from Abbott's "Real Property Statutes of Washington Territory From 1843 to 1889," page 69, this Act of September 8, 1849," [as probably the first official] .. erroneously [spelling of] *Clarke*. The heading of this act in Abbott's book is "Vancouver or Clarke County." Holman charged that the misspelling of the name Clark was not done inadvertently and, whether ignorant or deliberate misspelling in this private compilation, spelling changes should require Legislature act and that Clark was still the official spelling. Holman charges that the Clarke spelling insults Clark and make it appear that some unknown man named Clarke is to be honored. [The writer did not research the discrepancy of Sept. 3 and Sept. 8 dates.] [See *Flumgedgeon* later in this article for a humorous editorial about the Clarke naming.]

Clark(e) Back to Clark County

This brings the story to the need of changing Clarke back to Clark, although it was never really legally Clarke, except by common usage. And as mentioned at the beginning of this article, On Christmas even of 1925, Gov. Roland B. Hartley did officially change the spelling.

But I'm not so sure that clerk "who lacked spelling skills" should be so misaligned. And why did it take some 15 years (1910-1925) for the error to be corrected?????

That poor clerk wasn't the first to "misspell" Clarke. Alas! Biddle, who accompanied Lewis and Clark on this historic trek and kept journals which were compiled into the "Journals" used Clarke spelling (at least some of the time) in referring to the Captain. Since he repeats the spelling, it is not an accidental spelling. [see p.1,2, 61 and other Biddle entries of DeVoto's condensation of the Journals.]

And then there were the newspapers of the time. At least one used the Clarke spelling:

The Connecticut Courent (published at Hartford) Wednesday Nov 5, 1806, Vol XLII #3180 (?): Washington City, Oct 27

It is, with the fincest pleafuse, that we announce to our fellow citizens the arrival of CAPTAIN LEWIS, with his exploring party, at St. Lewis.

The Prefident of the United States has received a letter form him dated at St. Louis, September 23, at which place himself Captain Clarke and their party arrived that day. . . . [From facsimile at the Interpretative Center, Fort Canby, Ilwaco, WA -- the f style used for s.]

Another paper of the time used Clark:

By the last Mails.

MARYLAND. BALTIMORE, OCT. 29, 1806

A LETTER form St. Louis (Upper Louifianna) dated Sept. 23, 1806; announces the arrival of Captain Lewis and Clark, from their expedition into the interior. . . . [p.134, American Heritage's "To the Pacific with Lewis and Clark."]

In Donald Jackson's *Letters of the Lewis and Clark Expedition with Related Documents 1783-*

1854, he described William Clark "as a creative speller, ... a versatile capitalizer -- especially in handling words beginning with s." He promised little in the way of consistency capitalizing what Clark may have meant to capitalize. Clark's signature under his picture facing the title of Vol. 2 of Thwaites's edition of Original Journals of the Lewis and Clark Expedition 1804-1806 clearly shows Wm. Clark:



But his signature at the interpretative center at Ilwaco was flourished, and it could be easy for one of the flourished signatures to appear as Clarke. None the less, Clark County now has the standardized spelling.

And then we have the dilemma of Sacajawea which was found to be more accurately Sacagawea! And all good genealogists have a whole storage of stories about the various ways names are spelled.

A check of a few of the record keepers found inconsistent use of Clark(e). You would think that a census taker would be a good source (on second thought, maybe not!). A look at the 1871, 1873, 1883, 1885, 1887 Territory censuses should only the 1871 used Clark (no e). The 1910 federal used Clarke as did the 1860 and 1880 federal Mortality rolls -- but the 1870 mortality schedule used Clark. So much for "official" sources.

There has been given an indication of the rivalry between the British and Americans. The Flumgudgeon story below tells how it was first desired to have two counties, one Lewis, one Clark. It was McLoughlin who demanded the one district with the name Vancouver. [Robert Carlton Clark's Last Step in Provisional Government on p. 326 of Dec 1915, *Oregon Historical Quarterly*, Vol XVI, #4.] This was an obvious request to keep British names in the geography. I have to wonder if that clerk that misspelled Clark's name was of British heritage and did it out of spite?? Or maybe it was just an

honest error? Carl Landerholm, in his *Cayuse to Cadillac* [p. 47, 51], records at least two articles from *The Oregonian* that supports the animosity:

In accordance with previous notice, a meeting of the inhabitants of Clarke [with an e] county was held at the saw-mill, above Fort Vancouver, on Saturday, May 28th, having for its object the devising some means of checking the trespass of British subjects on claims held by citizens. The meeting having been organized by appointing T.J. Fletcher, Esq., as chairman and Richard Covington as secretary, the objects were briefly stated by the chairman, and on motion, the following gentlemen, viz: Silas D. Maxon, R. Covington, Benj. Olney, W.F. Crate, and Levi Dodford were appointed a committee to draft resolutions, who, after retiring for a short time, reported the following:

Resolved, That we are a law-abiding people, yet are unwilling to submit to British subjects claiming large tracts of land merely because they have cultivated small gardens thereon, whilst in the service of the Hudson Bay Company; they having given no notice of such claim until settlers claiming under the donation law have expended a large amount of time and money.

Resolved, That we believe it has now become of public and political importance that the rights of the Hudson's Bay Company and of all other British subjects, should be purchased by the United States government, in accordance with the fourth article of the treaty with Great Britain.

A vote being taken, the above resolutions were unanimously adopted.

On motion, it was agreed that this meeting do adjourn until Saturday, the 18th of June next.

On motion, it was ordered that the proceedings of the meeting should be signed by the chairman and secretary and forwarded to the leading papers requesting their publication.

Richard Covington, Sec'y T.J. Fletcher, Ch'n.
The Oregonian, June 11, 1853

On Saturday, December 16th, 1854, pursuant to call, a well attended meeting of the inhabitants of Clark [no e] county, W.T., met at Vancouver, and organized by electing Levi Douthit chairman, and Mr. Hathaway Secretary. The following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, We were invited to the Pacific coast by Congress, to settle upon and cultivate the public lands of the United States; and

Whereas, we have settled upon unoccupied lands, and at the time of the settlement, unclaimed by the Hudson's Bay Company; and

Whereas, said Company has subsequently extended a claim over ours, the greater portion of which they had not reduced to possession previous to June, 1846, thereby rendering our titles unsettled, and procrastinating our final surveys and patents, with intent to defraud us out of our just and legal right; Therefore

Resolved, that we hold the agents of that Company morally criminal.

Resolved, that we have no fears of any injustice, at the hands of Congress, provided it is correctly informed as to the facts in the case. We, therefore, ask them to take no final action in the matter till we have time and opportunity to furnish proof to sustain our rights - and notwithstanding the acts of the Hudson's Bay Company and the assertion of our delegate in the halls of Congress, they may safely, as heretofore, curse us with their presence.

Whereas, Columbia Lancaster, our present delegate, has made false representations in Congress, respecting the rights of the Hudson's Bay Company in Washington territory, guaranteed to them by the treaty of 1846, the nature of which was to defraud the settlers of their rights to land claimed under the donation law - and to create a false idea of the magnitude of the possessory rights of said Company, for the purpose of inducing our government to purchase those rights at an exorbitant price, Therefore

Resolved, the political relations of representative and constituent between us is hereby dissolved; and

Whereas, the said Columbia Lancaster made an unwarranted attack upon the public acts of the lamented Thurston, first delegate from Oregon; and Whereas, the Hon. Joseph Lane came manfully to the defense of said acts, Therefore

Resolved, that we invite the Hon. Joseph Lane to represent our interests in Congress.

Resolved, that the legislature be requested to memorialize Congress in accordance with the spirit of the above resolutions.

Resolved, that the legislature be requested to memorialize Congress in accordance with the spirit of the above resolutions.

Resolved, that our representatives and councilmen be requested to procure the passage of a resolution, by the legislature, requesting Columbia Lancaster to resign his seat in Congress.

Resolved, that the papers in Oregon and Washington territories be requested to publish the proceeding of this meeting.

M.R. Hathaway, Sec'y Levi Douthit, Chairman.

It still gets me that the Jackson bridge (I-205 across the Columbia) was named for an Oregonian Glen Jackson (who is he?), and not the well known Washington Senator "Scoop" Jackson who represented all of the Northwest in his interests. But then, when the mighty citizens proposed Columbia for our state, Richard H. Stanton of Kentucky moved to substitute the name Washington for Columbia realizing that with the District of Columbia, there surely would arrived confusion and the name of a state hadn't yet honored the father of our country. Yet, we still have to say we are from Washington STATE or Vancouver USA when back east.

And then don't forget that Vancouver was Columbia City. "But, While Samuel R. Thurston, who was sent to Congress as Oregon Territory's first delegate in 1849, was in Washington, the Postmaster General changed [Vancouver City] to 'Columbia City.' Thurston is said to have hated the British with such a wholesome hatred that he sought to remove all their geographical names. ...in 1855 by an Act of the Legislature the old historic name was restored. [p. 94-95 of thesis of Sister May De Sales McLellan of July 1933 titled: Vancouver, Washington, 1846 to 1870 with an introduction covering the Hudson's Bay Period.]

Well, here's that quote from the Flumgudgeon [or Humgudgeon -- did the H get interpreted as an Fl ?] Gazette promised earlier. Enjoy reading it:

1845 Flumgudgeon Excerpt:

We hope our readers will be a little serious and give us their attention, whilst we talk a little truth and soberness on the subject that heads this article.

We have heard ever since our arrival in Oregon many harsh and bitter things said of the Hudsons Bay Co., as well as charges of bribery and corruption preferred against many of our American citizens, who are accused of wearing the livery of this company, and being paid to do their bidding, however much it may conflict with their country's right and honor; and though we believed there might be some guilty of this charge-as we are acquainted with several who we believe would but

for a moment hesitate to hold such an office-still we have never thought these stories worth listening to, and have uniformly discountenanced them, as they seemed to be, for the most part, the mere suspicions of prejudiced persons. Our attention however, as well as suspicions, have been roused up of late on this subject, in consequence of some certain movements in our Oregon legislature of late, and particularly in reference to the naming or altering of names of certain counties.

Two counties were laid off and received the names of Lewis and Clark; but only a few days elapsed (about the time of a certain arrival from Vancouver, as the editor has been informed) when a resolution is offered in the house to blot these two names from the record, and allow that of Vancouver to swallow up the territory and assume the place of both; and this act too hurried through with the greatest eagerness and dispatch. The member who seemed to have the principal management of this affair, and who styles himself the negotiator between the Hudsons Bay Co. and the people or government of Oregon* exclaimed in his place in the house, Who is Messers Lewis and Clarke? We presume the gentleman himself, as well as most Americans, have heard something of them. But we would tell him something more; that they were his countrymen-Americans, who braved the dangers of a long and difficult journey to explore and fix the title of *his* country to the land we now claim and occupy. That they were the first whites who descended the Columbia, exploring the interior of Oregon; and being men of honor and truth never attempted to rob and appropriate to themselves the rights and earnings of others in these respects.

But now we'll ask the gentleman who was Mr. Vancouver, whom he and those who support his measure wish to assist, through their agency in robbing these men of the well earned title of giving their names to counties in Oregon. Who, we ask, but a lying swindling foreigner, who tried by every foul means to rob other navigators on this Northwest coast during the last century of their justly earned rights and praise to priority of discoveries. He tried in the first place by lying and

forgery to obtain an unfair advantage of the Spanish Commander in some settlements respecting territory about Nootka Sound. He then comes south when one of his lieutenants professes to have discovered and given his name to Chehalis Harbour, discovered and made known to him previously by an American captain. But the climax of his duplicity and robbery was attained when he, by charts given him from an American captain, who came in, advanced some miles up, and gave name to the Columbia river; sails in with ease, where he had but a short time before declared there was no river emptying itself; and then with the boldest falsehood declares that he was the first discoverer of the river. This open and bare faced deception has, however been seen into and denounced by all the civilized world, not even excepting many English themselves, although the British cabinet still puts in as one plea to her rights here, the priority of discovery for her citizens.

If the Oregon legislature wished to name a county after some Englishman, why did they not search their history for some great and good man, who has done honor to himself, his country and mankind? And they might have found several such had they looked. Or why not have named it Douglas or McLaughlin, which we would prefer before the one they have adopted; and know not but we may advocate, at some future day, the bestowal of these names on counties in Oregon. We ask however if this course in our legislature looks like upholding the honor and independence of the American government, or shows such a scrupulous and watchful guardianship of the right of her citizens, which they have heretofore in their stickling about oaths, and other things, made such big pretensions to.

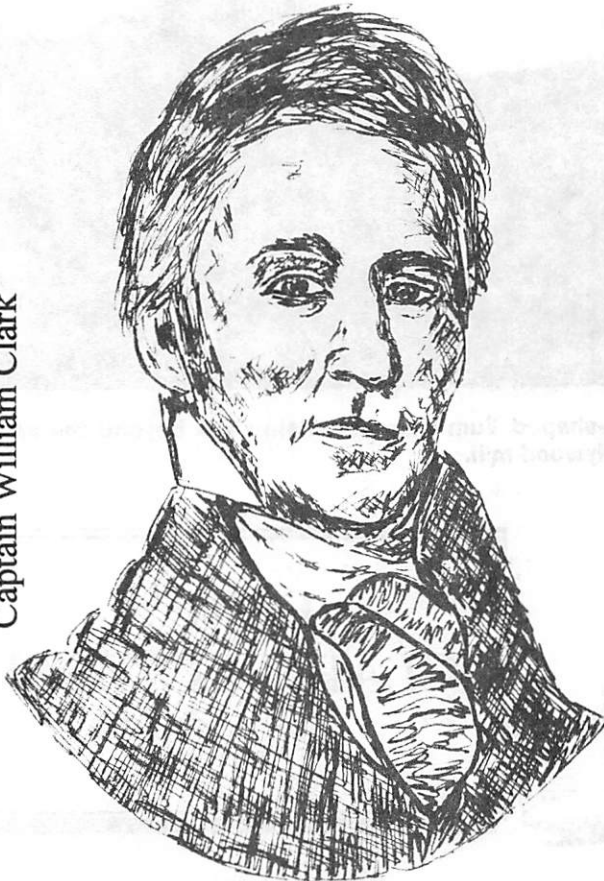

CLARK COUNTY NAMED FOR CAPTAIN WILLIAM CLARK

Captain William Clark



Clark County was named for the explorer William Clark. He was asked by Meriwether Lewis to join him on the expedition to the Pacific. They had met when in late 1795 or early 1796 Ensign Lewis (ensign would be called a second lieutenant now) was sent down to join the troops of Gen. "Mad Anthony" Wayne. Lewis was assigned to a rifle company commanded by Capt. William Clark and the two men became fast friends. [p. 11-12 of Gerald S. Snyder's *In the Footsteps of Lewis and Clark*.]

William Clark was born August 1, 1770 in Caroline County, Virginia, one of ten children and was the youngest brother of George Rogers Clark (1752-1818). His parents were second cousins and members of an old Virginia family. During the early years of their marriage, they lived on a

plantation joining that of Thomas Jefferson's Monticello in Albemarle County.

William had been too young to serve in the Revolutionary War, but did participate in the Indian campaigns when he was a teenager.

The Clark family moved to Mulberry Hill, near Louisville, KY, in 1784, and Clark received a commission in General Wayne's "Legion of the United States." He proved an excellent intelligence officer.

Jefferson had asked older brother George to lead an expedition west, but his failing health prevented it. When the offer came from Lewis, he advised William to accept.

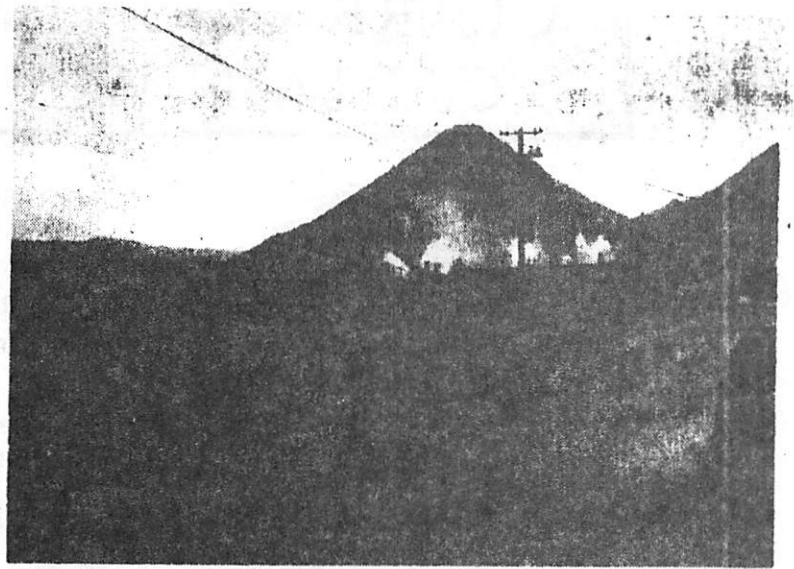
Lewis and Clark worked well together -- "What one man lacked in talent the other possessed: Lewis, the more literate, the better educated, the better botanist and biologist, hand the mind of a good scientist; Clark, the better cartographer and geographer, the better waterman and navigator, had a deep liking for Indians and a better understanding of them." [p. 37 of Gerald S. Snyder's *In the Footsteps of Lewis and Clark*.]

Although Clark had resigned his captaincy in 1796. However, Lewis promised Clark, on Jefferson's authority, equality of command and a captain's commission. Although the War Department commissioned Clark a second lieutenant in the Corps of Artillerists, journals always refer to him as Captain and he signed paper with that title. [p. xliii of Bernard DeVoto's *The Journals of Lewis and Clark*.]

After the expedition, Clark was made brigadier of Missouri militia and in 1813 became governor of Missouri Territory and Superintendent of Indian Affairs. He conducted an expedition up the Mississippi against the Indians who supported the British in the War of 1812. After the war he negotiated a series of treaties with the Indians and served as surveyor general for several states. He died on Sept. 1, 1838, in St. Louis. [Most information in this biography from Collier's Encyclopedia.]

Chelatchie

Across the road from the general store sits a huge stack of fireplace wood. Mrs. Handsacker said unemployed loggers cut the wood to supplement their unemployment benefits. It is sold for \$40 a cord, with some customers driving out from Portland to buy it.

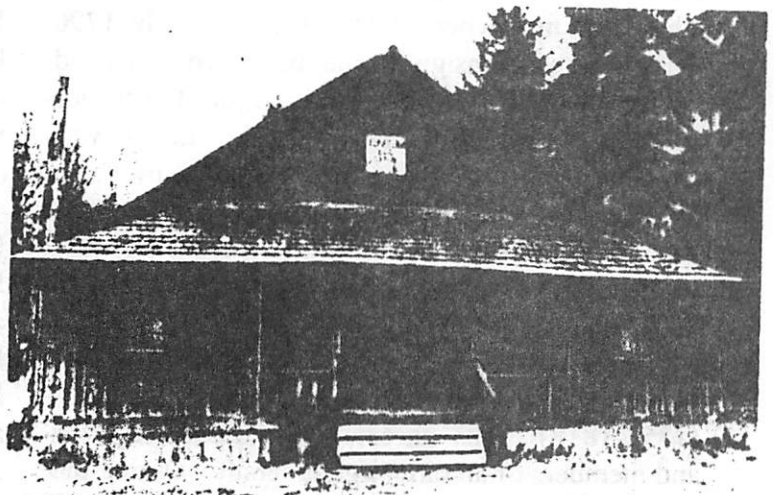

EARLY CLARK COUNTY PLACES

Closed mill once had 600 employees

The big sign on the general store boasts that the building sits "in downtown Chelatchie Prairie."

It is the only store in town.

Among the hundreds of items for sale in the country store is a bumper sticker: "Where's Amboy? I'm from Chelatchie."

While the average person probably doesn't know where either Amboy or Chelatchie is on the map, the residents of the rural community 30 miles northeast of Vancouver take a special pride in their isolation.

"People here like to say they're from Chelatchie," explained Kathleen Handsaker who, with her husband Walter, owns and operates the Chelatchie Prairie General Store.

One of the more historic rural areas in Clark County, Chelatchie Prairie apparently was settled in the early 1860s. The fertile valley ringed by mountains and drained by Chelatchie Creek was well-suited for growing grain and vegetables, and the area was among the first settled in the northern part of the county.

Chelatchie, according to historians, is an Indian word meaning a flat area covered with ferns. The

earliest settlers found the prairie covered with ferns and other low vegetation, easily cleared to prepare the land for tilling.

By far the most prominent and eye-catching geologic feature of the area is Tum Tum Mountain, a symmetrical hill rising 1,500 feet above the plain. This mountain, which has become the symbol of Chelatchie, resembles a huge gundrop.

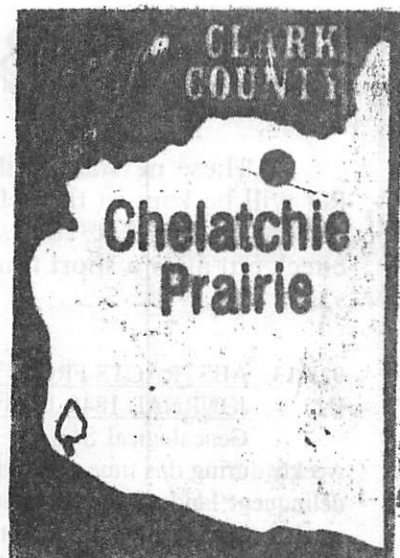
Tum Tum, according to legend, means heart, and might have been so named because it vaguely resembles an inverted heart.

Another legend insists a famed Indian chief lies buried at the summit.

At one time, two school districts, Chelatchie and Tum Tum, served the area. These districts consolidated in 1914, forming Chelatchie Valley District 84.

There had been several earlier schools in the area, but after the consolidation a "modern" school was built on the site now occupied by the Mount St. Helens Ranger District Work Center of the U.S. Forest Service.

Now, all of those old districts are part of the Battle Ground School District. Elementary pu-



pils from Chelatchie Prairie attend nearby Amboy School while high school students must be up at 6:30 a.m. to catch buses for the long ride into Battle Ground.

Although the Amboy School population has risen dramatically in the past year — from 470 to 530 pupils — most of this growth has occurred south of Amboy.

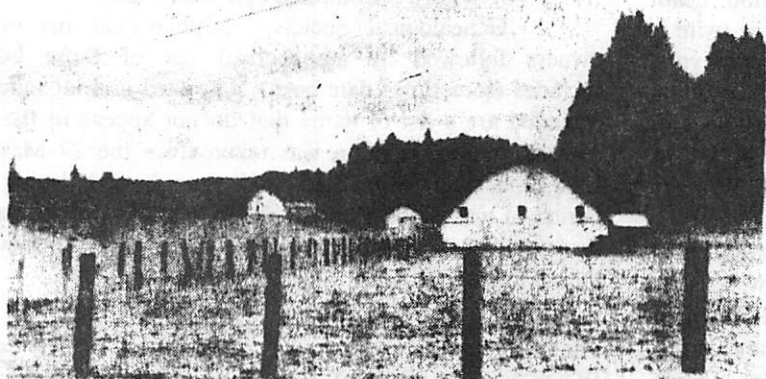
Frank Emerick, road inspector for the Forest Service, is a lifelong resident of the area. He said there have been few signs of growth.

Many of the historic farms are still intact, Emerick said, but few residents make their living from the soil.

The now-defunct International Paper Co. lumber and plywood mill, once the only major industry in the Battle Ground School District, was constructed in 1960 to replace Long-Bell operations in Longview which were phased out. The Chelatchie Prairie mill employed about 600 men and women, including those who worked in the woods and hauled the big logs to the mill.

However, the mill closed last year, and there are no plans to reopen it.

The economy of Chelatchie Prairie has moved up and down, depending on the cycle of the lumber industry. At present, residents said, there definitely is a slump.
