PURPOSES OF CLARK COUNTY GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The purposes for which Clark County Genealogical Society is organized are found under section III of the Articles of Incorporation filed March 26, 1980, and are as follows:

- A. To increase the education and knowledge of members of the Society and the public in family history, genealogical records, and the scientific principals of genealogical research. This will be accomplished throughout Clark County and adjoining counties in the State of Washington by:
 - 1. Conducting formal training programs to teach, (a) the genealogical evolution of Clark and adjoining counties, (b) the research techniques required to discover family history and genealogical data, and (c) the methods required to systematically record the pertinent information found.
 - 2. Collecting and preserving countywide local and family history and genealogical data in an accessible library.
 - 3. Establishment and maintenance of a publication system to provide special educational publications, and to provide periodical publications to convey education articles and news, all in the local and family history and genealogical fields.
 - 4. Promoting access to genealogical records held in the area by private and public organizations.
 - 5. Cooperating with other organizations in furtherance of mutual objective.
 - 6. Carrying on the business of the Society in any portion of the State of Washington.
- B. All other legal powers permitted domestic non-profit corporations.

SOME WAYS THESE PURPOSES HAVE BEEN ACCOMPLISHED BY CCGS IN THE LAST 15 YEARS:

#1. January 1995 will be the first time CCGS has presented Genealogy I and Genealogy II in the same term in the classes given through Clark College. These classes are open to anyone who registers. The staff includes several volunteers from our society who speak on varied topics of genealogical interest and have changed to reflect a growing interest in the field as well as growth in population. An annual seminar draws genealogists from through out the northwest and usually features a well known speaker to share his knowledge. This spring the speaker will be

Last fall's annual workshop was geared to beginner's, but in years past workshops have featured genealogy computer program, a speaker from the National Archives, Seattle, and a workday to catch up on vital records.

#2. The CCGS library has grown. Just in the last two years more than 850 volumes have been added to our library by purchase, donations, memorials, exchanges and reviews. With the opening of the 1920 census, a drive was undertaken to obtain a complete state of Washington soundex for our library. ---Two large volumes of pioneer biographical data were assembled as well as numerous other publications. Crews "read" local cemeteries and extracted information from records for preserving the records left by those who lived in Clark County. Recently a computer was added to the library and surnames and book shlef lists are available. With the recent advancements in technology, the library is looking into the ROM and other

genealogical applications that would benefit our library.

#3. Our print shop provides a system to print syllabuses for our "Clark Classes, handouts for various programs, the many volumes listed on the last two pages of the Trail Breakers; our quarterly publication the Trail Breakers, the Newsletter which informs members of current information Sept. to June, and miscellaneous forms used by the society and sold at our library. The print shop has also printed many volumes for other genealogical societies as well as family histories written by members. They have praised by many local societies for their excellence.

#4. CCGS gave a donations for the state microfilming papers project. Private sources of genealogical data such as funeral home records have been abstracted and published. Members have spoken to Women's Clubs, Chamber of Commerce, various public schools, and groups at the Lupke center to encourage genealocial research.

#5. CCGS hosted the WA Genealogical Society Conference in 1994. Our Newsletter chronicles seminars offered by other societies.

#6. Several members have spoken and shared their genealogical knowledge with other societies in our state. Some of our member also belong to the WA Genealogical Society or other genealogical societies.

In Loving Memory of Bertha Louise Krause

Bertha Krause showed her dedication to CCGS in many ways. Not many members put forth as much effort or accomplished as much as Bertha. Featured in the Volunteer Spot-Light column in the April 1988 *Trail Breakers*, a reference to the Marine Corp's slogan "*We need a few good men,*" was applied to Bertha with the comment that she fills the need as "*one good woman.*" Bertha was then serving one of her two terms as President of the society, actively participating in the projects and events of CCGS. She continued to be active in society business, attending a spring CCGS board meeting in a wheelchair when her illness had weaken her body, but not her heart. It will be difficult to fill the boots left empty by this energetic, well-organized "one good woman."

During her eighteen years as a member, she served as Directory Editor, as President for two years, processed library accessions for six years, helped with cemetery recording projects throughout its entire course, was a member of the printing committee for seven years and eventually became its Director. In 1988 the print shop was moved to the basement of her home, offering a wonderful space for the printer, master maker, collator, tables, chairs, bookcases for paper, and other items needed by the print crew. The print shop was moved from her basement to another building on the Krause property before it was removed when she became ill. Over the years, Bertha also worked at numerous workshops, seminars, and other society events. For several years she was one of the teachers for the "Clark College" Beginning Genealogy Classes, teaching with her daughter Rose Marie Harshman on census records, Germans from Russia and Canadian research. In 1989, Bertha was among the first to become a Life Member.

At her funeral, one family member shared that when Bertha told you to do something, you did it. This same drive followed her with society business and because of Bertha's encouragement and persistence, much was accomplished. Ten books appear on the book list in 1987-88 when the print shop was moved to her home; 37 books appear on the book list printed in the last *Trail Breakers*. And this list does not include a few out-of-print books or the dozens of books printed for other societies or members publishing their own family histories. Then there's the countless forms, syllabuses, and handouts that were printed too. The accomplishments are many.

Even with the hundreds, maybe thousands, of volunteer hours she gave to CCGS, Bertha found time to enjoy sewing, crocheting, crafts, bowling and salmon fishing. With her own kiln, she spent many hours working of ceramics which adorn the homes of family and friends. She even published three good sized volumes on three family lines. *The Goedker Tree and his Many Branches* was her first effort. *Descendants of John Schmidt and Magdalena Kopfenstein* and *Tschetter-Waldner and Allied Families* followed. Surnames and areas Bertha researched: Schmidt - SD, NE, Saskatchewan, Can, Russ.; Daffe - Can., Russ.; Tschetter - SD, Manitoba & Saskatchewan, Can., Russ.; Fast - Can., Russ; Waldner - Can., Russ.; Kopfenstein - Can., Russ.; Bercier - Manitoba, Ca.; Krause - MN, Bavaria. Her daughter Rose Marie Harshman is still a CCGS member and will correspond with you if you are interested in any of these surnames.

The daughter of Henry J. Schmidt and Johanna Justina Tschetter, Bertha was born on Dec. 26, 1916, on the family homestead near Dodson, MT. When sharing about where to look for census information, she would explain that she and a sister were born in the same house, but different counties -- because the county lines had changed between the births!

Her father immigrated to the United States from Russia in 1900, and her mother was a descendent of Germans from Russia who had arrived here in the 1870s. Six girls and six boys made up the large family of twelve children. The girls were Minnie, Martha, Bertha, Violet, Dorothy and Juanita; the boys were Edward, Harvey, Alvin, Mervin, Vernon and Fred. Her grandfather died in 1920, and Henry Schmidt and family when to Yorkton, Saskatchewan to settle his fathers affairs. As a child Bertha was fluent in German and did not speak English until she started school. In 1924 the Schmidts moved to Portland, OR, and then in 1932 to Vancouver, WA.

During the Great Depression, Bertha started her working career and was employed outside the home most of her adult life. In 1972 she retired after working 24 years for the Bemis Bag Company. Bertha was a Clark County resident for 63 years.

Visitors to the Krause home were warmly welcomed by her husband Don Krause. They were married for 27 years. Bertha and Don enjoyed traveling and visiting with family and friends.

Bertha died on Nov. 17, 1995, at her Ridgefield home, following a year-long struggle with cancer.

Two sons preceded Bertha in death: John A. Jenkins and Robert A. Krause, and two grandchildren: Donna Gail Harshman and Brian David Campbell.

Bertha's family also included sons Donald R. Chenette of Naselle, Richard G. Jenkins of Vancouver, John D. Krause of Homestead, FL, and daughters, Rose Marie Harshman of Vancouver, and Donna Lee Murdock of Walla Walla. She was also survived by sisters, Martha Brohman, Violet de Lagasse and Dorothy Darnell, all of Vancouver, and Juanita Richards of Christmas Valley, OR, and one brother Alvin Schmidt of Camas. She also leaves 16 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Bertha was buried November 21, 1995, in the Garden of Love at the Evergreen Memorial Gardens Cemetery, one of the several county cemeteries she helped 'read' for CCGS.

Be Smart! Don't be misled by family book offers

Do you have an uncommon surname? Chances are you've been hit up with one or more of the *(Your Last Name) since the Civil War*, or *The World Book of Germanns* solicitations. We have. The Germann name is a 'rare' one. According to one advertisement 3,553 households bear the Germann name world wide. The most recent offer we received even had a Germann name in the return address.

A non-genealogists may really enjoy this type of product and it may introduce them to the fun of doing their own genealogy.

Several years ago I sent away for one of the offers of the "Germann family history." It contained several different chapters such as a well written, but generic, immigration information and general facts of history. A section was left so that a list of people with our name could be appropriately inserted. It's easy to tailor a cover and introduction for the family name advertised. If you were expecting a genealogically related listing, you will be as disappointed. I was. If you were expecting just a list of names, your expectations will probably be met. Our book promised a listing of all Germanns in the U.S.! When I received it, it didn't even have half of the Germanns in Clark County -- only those who had a public telephone number were listed in "that middle section." I had falsely expected more and was disappointed.

The [another rare name] family recently received a request for family information to be included in a *The (Your Last Name) Family, Who's Who in America*. A personal yellow sticky note urged David to return the form ASAP. It may be a new version of the "Name" books. Just like many of the who's whos that are out there, information was requested to be included in one book. They were honest in informing that a public records list was used to generate the mailing and urged the recipient to contact others who didn't get the mailing.

But they were "almost ready to go to press and, if we don't receive your questionnaire fairly soon, we won't be able to include you in the book." This prompted a letter to the Better Business Bureau in the locality of the company for more information.

The BBB responded that this company was essentially the same as another which had generated complaints about sales tactics and that is was nothing more than a compilation of responses. [If you read the solicitation letter carefully, it usually doesn't promise any more than that.] The BBB also warned consumers not to give out credit card, checking account numbers, etc..

They also included a general report with information for those wishing to research their own family tree. A recommendation to write to the Board for Certification of Genealogists in Washington DC for a list of qualified people who will research for a fee was included. A paragraph informed that the coats-of-arms were granted to one individual alone and passed on to one family member by rules of male descent. [Informed genealogists are already aware of this. I wish they had given a plug to finding a local genealogical society for help in doing personal research.]

If you are in doubt about a solicitation, the Better Business Bureau may be able to offer information that will allow you to make a better choice for your needs.

So it depends on what you're expecting. A family history or a family list (telephone or other computer generated list)! Thirty bucks for a telephone list may beat several hours of trying to generate your own at the library or on "the net." Or thirty bucks for a telephone listing instead of what you thought was going to be a wonderful family history could be a rip off. Read carefully! And as today's teens put it: "Get real!" or "Wake up!"

BE PERSISTENT! FOLLOW YOUR HUNCHES!

A couple of years ago I began researching my father's family, especially his maternal side. The information I had about my grandmother came from some family notes made by my father, my grandparents' marriage certificate, and a passport of my grandmother's.

I never met my grandmother. She was called Kittles but I knew her real name was Myra. My grandparents' marriage certificate told me that she was Myra Owen, a widow, and her father was Frank Sturgis. Her passport told me she was born in Bulford, Wiltshire, England, on February 12, 1872.

Wanting to find her birth record, I went to the IGI and could find nothing under Myra Sturgess. There were a number of Frank Sturgesses (a common name in Wiltshire) but I could not make a connection. I sent the information I had to Alan, an English relative, and asked him to try to find my grandmother's birth record. No luck!

So I went back to the IGI. This time I looked a little more thoroughly and found a Frank Thomas Sturgess, christened in 1846 in Bulford, parents Thomas Sturgess and Sarah. Frank's age was about right to be my grandmother's father. But what really caught my eye was his middle name. My father's name was Thomas. Then I looked for Frank's marriage record and found he had married Mari Coombs on May 29, 1871 in Bulford. The names Mari and Myra are very similar and the date of marriage was just 9 months before my grandmother was born. I was hot on the trail!

I sent this new information to Alan and not long after received a certified copy of my grandmother's birth. Her given name was Sarah Anna Maria Sturgess. Her mother was Maria Sturgess, formerly Coombs, and her father was Frank, a Journeyman bricklayer. Her birth was registered in the Sub-district of Amesbury, County of Wilts, on February 21, 1872. I then went back to the IGI and found Sarah Anna Maria Sturgess,

christened 23 February 1872, Bulford, Wiltshire. It was there all the time, but I would never have known to look under the name of Sarah!

The letter from Alan arrived in August 1993. In January of 1994 I went to Salt Lake City with CCGS, new information in hand, and continued my search. Looking at films of the Bulford Parish Records, I found a Maria Sturgess who died on 25 February 1872, age 20. Was this "my" Maria? Did she die after giving birth to my grandmother? (Back home I again looked at the IGI and found a birth listing for Mary Grace Coombs, daughter of William Coombs, born November 22, 1852 in Topsham, Devonshire. This date of birth fits with death at age 20 in 1872. However, I still need to verify that this is "my" Mary Coombs.)

Next I looked for a marriage record of Frank's parents, Thomas and Sarah Sturgess. BINGO! Thomas Sturgess, bricklayer, son of William, married Sarah Powell, daughter of John Powell, on May 19, 1841. In census records for Wiltshire I discovered that Sarah Sturgess was a widow in 1871 and in the 1881 census Sarah had living with her a granddaughter named Maria, age 9. So I now know my grandmother was raised by her grandmother.

I've found much more information than I can mention in this article, and it all started with a hunch. So BE PERSISTENT, USE THE IGI (over and over again), and TRUST YOUR HUNCHES OR INSTINCTS. It does pay off!

(NOTE: When doing genealogy, interesting coincidences sometimes occur. My grandparents lived in London in the early part of this century. For several years they lived at 12 Adamson Road in the small area of London known as Swiss Cottage. My youngest daughter just moved to London where her husband is attending the London School of Business. In this enormous city they just happen to be living at 4 Adamson Road, Swiss Cottage.)

CONDIT FAMILY TRAVELS

THE OREGON TRAIL

As a part of the Oregon Centennial, the *Washington-County News-Times*, Forest Grove, Oregon, ran many articles celebrating the event. Among them were these letters and diary entries of the Condit family who took six months to travel from Wood county, Ohio, beginning March 19, 1854, arriving at their destination in the Willamette Valley on September 16th. Permission to re-print the series was obtained from Jim Hart, current editor of the *News-Times*.

Letters Tell Of Pioneer Family's Planned Trek To Oregon Territory

With the celebration of Oregon's centennial year, many residents have gone digging in old trunks, pushed in some dark corner of the attic, hunting for some long treasured relic of Grandpa and Grandma's day. Some of the results have provided much of interest to see and read for those who look back to the "good old day," and for those who never saw them.

The C. C. Condit family of 1646 Douglas, Forest Grove, is no different. Condit, who is employed by the Waltz-Wieber Agency, and Mrs. Condit have been digging up information and historic records about the Condit family as a hobby for many years. On a recent trip to California they acquired some new data on the family, including two letters written in 1853 and 1854 and a dairy written by Condit's great-great-uncle as he and his family crossed the plains

from Ohio on their way to Oregon.

When Philip and Nancy Condit, with their family, set out from Wood County, Ohio, in 1854, they knew that they faced a long hard trip across rugged land, with danger from bad water, Indians, sickness and the thousand and one other troubles than might befall them on the trail, but they weren't easily discouraged.

At the time of the trip, Philip Condit was 53 years old and Nancy 48. He was a Presbyterian minister and had as his main purpose for coming, the establishment of a church, which he eventually did near Albany

Seven Children

There were seven children who made the trip also, the two eldest boys bringing their wives with them. They were 27, 25, 21, 20, 16 and 12 years of age.

The family began planning for its journey several years

before they actually left their Ohio home and during that time they wrote to many of their friends, encouraging some of them to join their wagon train.

A copy of the two original letters still owned by the Condits follow:

Mr. Robert Gordon
Post Mater
New Lebanon
Mercer Co., Pa.

Weston Wood Co.

Sept. 3, 1853

Brother R. C. Gordon,

After my respect to you all I would say to you that we are all in reasonable health at present. We have had a very dry summer here so that the crops are suffering a good deal in consequence of it. The rail road is progressing rapidly as possible. It goes along about a mile from out house. I guess, however, we will not see the cars running on it this fall.

I send by the next mail a packet of papers in which you will find a series of letters written by a Mr. Smith or Oregon Territory. Sylvanus [Condit] sent them to me and I got them printed in this paper for the benefit of those who wish to go to Oregon. You can read them if you please and send them to our friends on mill creek. Sylvanus thinks of coming home this fall to see us, but not to stay. He thinks some of driving cattle next summer, but I do not know what he will do.

Where's The Railroad?

I wonder what has become of your railroad of which you wrote last winter from your town to Mercer. I have heard noting more of it since, hence I conclude that it all ended in a few trips in the mud from your town to Alexander or some other town or city to Mercer. You have never told us about how it came out.

I wish you would come out and see us and bring you good lady along and let us have the pleasure of becoming acquainted with her. It is Saturday and of course I cannot write much. I will therefore leave this for some of the rest to finish if they will. Give our love to all inquiring friends.

Brother R.C. Gordon,

We received your letter of the 16th in due season and were

very glad to hear of your welfare, and that of the friends.

The great question of going to Oregon is settled, we are all going, and if you wish to go with us, come immediately, I wish, however, to view everything in the light of providence. The Lord sent us a man yesterday, and according to our wish, we have sold our land. He is to pay us \$2,500 dollars for it in a few days. He lived somewhere about the mouth of the portage river and his name is Gray.

Start in March

We calculate to start about the first of March or near that time as we can. Sylvanus wants to know immediately what you are going to do about going along or letting him have money to buy cattle with. He has an offer of money from another man, but if he gets yours he thinks he will not take that and moreover he must let the man know very soon what he is going to do so that he can have the money ready for him. Sylvanus got a letter yesterday from Iowa which states that oxen are high. I think from 60 to 75 dollars a yoke, and most things about in proportion to that.

The present calculation is for us all to start from here about the first of March. Our present idea is that we will take horses and 4 wagons or we might say three 2-horse wagons, one 2-horse buggy and when we get our to the starting place buy oxen and put to the wagons.

We have put up advertisements to all our personal property on next week

Friday. I feel mellenkelly [melancholy] to write much, therefore you have to do with.

Dear Brother,

I was going to say something about your taking your children with you if you go but perhaps I had better not. I do not know certain whether Mr. Black will let Nancy go but I guess it is rather doubtful and if he don't I would like to have Nancy Lucetta very much but I do not wish to persuade you for fear I might do wrong. Look to God for direction and decide and wish any let us know. I must close now. It is late and the boys want to start to Penncebough before day. I remain you affectionate sister.

Oregon Pioneer's Journal Tells Of Trip To Oregon

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In the July 16 issue of the News-Times two letters belonging to the C. C. Condit family and written by a great-great-uncle in 1853 and 1854 were published. The letters concerned his planned trip to Oregon. This week we are printing the first of four installments taken from the journal of Philip Condit as he and his family crossed the plains on their way to the then far off land of Oregon. [This was the second of a total of five installments.])

Across the Plains EXTRACTS

We left our home in Wood county, Ohio, on the 19th of March 1854 -- with all our families, 3 wagons, 1 buggy and 9 horses. We crossed the Maumee at Miltonville, for which we paid fro the whole train one dollar. The roads were very bad and our loads heavy so we have to buy another team and lighten our loads so that we got along better. When we got to Illinois, we found the road better, the land being sandy and rolling, which enabled us to travel at a fair rate. We crossed the Mississippi at Rock Island into Iowas, from then to Iowa City, Fort Des Moines and Council Bluffs. At the fort we sold part of our horses and put our oxen which we had bought, to our four wagons. At Council

Bluffs we made an estimate of the distance we had then traveled and found it about 900 miles. Here we rested a few days and laid in our stock of provisions for the journey and bought some more cattle and another horse. Then we heard some frightful stories of the Indians killing emigrants and driving off their cattle, etc. some of which stories we found to be true, which made us more cautious and watchful. Accordingly we armed ourselves with such weapon as we thought necessary and passed over the Missouri on the afternoon of the 5th of May, and here two young men from Ohio joined us, which formed a train of 14 persons, 4 wagons drawn by 34 oxen, 1 buggy drawn by 2 horses, 36 head of loose cattle and 5 horses. We paid form 65 to 100 dollars per yoke for oxen, 20 to 50 dollars for cows, so you see we paid high prices. We camped the first night on Mosquito Creek, about 5 miles from Kanesville. Here we found grass plenty, but the cattle were very restless on account of some cows from which we had taken their calves that morning. They were continually waiting to go back, which kept some of the boys running nearly all night, but no Indians troubled is at this place. We found they were plenty and very bold, but they did us no harm.

Saturday, May 6th

All up early, rested well and in the enjoyment of good health. The sun rose in great splendor over the eastern hills and seemed to call on us all to praise God for all his wonderful works. Breakfast was now ready and after asking the blessing of God on our food, we all partook of it as cheerfully and with as good an appetite as ever we did in a good table at home. Then we hitched up and marched in a western direction over green hills and valleys about 10 miles to a very deep slough, where we grazed, watered and dined on a cold chunk of bread, meat, milk, butter and dried fruit. Then we went about 3 miles further to Papoose Creek which was the only water we could reach that night. So we pitched out tents and drove our cattle into a natural enclosure formed by deep and almost impassable gulf, ate our supper and committed ourselves by prayer to the care of our Heavenly Father. We retired to rest and were soon wrapped in slumber and were not disturbed by anything except an occasional howl, or dog like bark of the prairie wolf, which was rather amusing on account of the novelty of it.

Sabbath May 7th

Rested all the day, only what time we spent in looking after our animals and after commending out selves into the

hands of God, we retired to rest and were only disturbed by thunder without any rain. Thus passed the first Sabbath on the plains.

Monday, May 8th.

All well and refreshed with our Sabbath's rest and ready to proceed on our journey with pleasure. Morning cool and windy, but very pleasant. Started early and traveled about 14 miles to the ferry on Elkhorn river, where we paid 2 dollars a wagon to get over. Then went up a small creek about 4 miles and camped on Fish Lake, where the boys caught some nice pickerel which made a nice dish for breakfast next morning

Tues, May 9th.

Ate our breakfast and were soon ready to march. Morning cool. Wind rose very high and blew the sand in our eyes so that we could scarcely see, which made if uncomfortable. However we marched about 8 miles and came to the Platte river at a place called Liberty Hill. Here we rested and grazed our stock an hour or so and joined another company who were very much alarmed about the Indians. We then passed several other small lakes and went about 10 miles and camped at a pond about 1-2 miles from the road, which we called Eagle Lake because the boys caught a young gray eagle, which excited our curiosity very much, having never seen the like before. Traveled about 18 miles today.

Wednesday, May 10th.

Left Eagle Lake at 1-2 past 7 with various conjectures in our

minds with regard to a singular kind of noise we all heard the night before resembling the bleating of sheep. Some us thought it was the bleating of sheep that had been left near the road. Some that it was a wild animal and others that it was Indians bawling like a calf in distress in order to attract our cattle and cause them to run away from us so that they could get them. In fact, all our cattle were very uneasy all night and kept our boys constantly running to keep them together, but they were all right when we drove them in the morning. As to the noise, I think it was a young calf that had been left by some trains as this is often done on the plains. Traveled about 5 miles to the north bend of the Platte and 8 from that to Shell Creek bridge and a very poor thing of the name. Then one mile up the creek to a very good camping ground only wood was very scarce. At the bridge, we saw the Indian agent drive some cattle out of a drove by the Indians. Here we enjoyed a peaceful night as no Indians came to trouble us.

Thursday, May 11th.

All up early, but as we were getting ready to start we saw 8 Indians coming toward us. We felt a little shy of them, but we did not let them know that we had any fear of them. They came up and bid us how-do-you-do in a very friendly manner and begged for this thing and that and almost everything they saw they wanted and as we were about ready to start, in order to

get clear of them as easily as possible we told them there was a calf that they might have if they would catch it as we wanted in off the cow at any rate. Then the sport began. The entire number started after it and such and other scampering I suppose is scarcely ever seen. Their blankets, moccasins and nearly everything else about them in every direction till they were nearly naked. Then, midst shouts from the train, they succeeded in getting the calf from the train and keeping it away till we were out of sight of them. However, they had shot several arrows into it and it still ran with them sticking in it, we were sorry that we had not taken one of our rifles and shot it for them. We, however, saw no more of them, but we heard afterwards that they caught it and went to another train of emigrants and borrowed a camp kettle and boiled it and had a feast on it. This day we traveled over a very nice, dry road to a watering place on the Platte and after watering the train we went on about 7 miles to a little lake where we had plenty of wood and water. That night it rained a little but not enough to annoy us.

Friday, May 12th.

The morning being still rainy, we were compelled to stay in camp till near noon, when we started and went 6 miles to the ferry on Loop Fork of Platte. Here we had to pay two dollars per wagon and 50 cents for 2 horses to cross over. Then went 2 miles up the fork to camping place, where we had but little

grass. Here we saw the skull and horns of a buffalo, which were the first we had seen and they caused no little excitement in camp. From the wrinkles on the horns, it appeared to have been upwards of 20 years of age. After this, however, they became very common.

Saturday, May 13th.

No little excitement prevailed this morning on account of a little calf that came into our drove during the night and which was nearly starved, so I told one of the boys to shoot it to put it out of misery. Here we parted from the company we had joining for the reason that it was harder and more tedious to travel in a large train than to go by ourselves. So we parted all in good humor. Passed over 16 miles of rolling prairie today where wood and water were very scarce, then went 2 miles to the place where one road comes to the river. Here we pitched out tent for the night. The grass was very short on account of the recent fires, yet not withstanding the scarcity of it, we determined to spend the Sabbath here, believing that in keeping of God's commandments there is great reward and after arranging things for the night, we went to rest about 9 o'clock.

Sabbath, May 14th

Rose early and found our horses and cattle all safe. And we all gave thanks to God for his goodness to us his unworthy creatures and also makes us think of thousands who will meet in the house of God for prayer

and praise and to hear the joyful tidings of salvation while we are spending our Sabbath on heathen ground hundreds of miles distant from any house erected to the worship of God. Today we had a meeting of the whole company and organized ourselves into a Bible class and social prayer meeting with the hope that under the blessing of God it may be useful to ourselves and others though they may be far away from us and in this exercise we found great delight for even here in this desert we find that we can be admitted to a throne of grace through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Monday, May 15th.

The dogs made some fuss in the night, which made us more watchful. Morning cold and cloudy. All eager to go on and no one thinks of turning back. Traveled 16 miles today over bluffs and rolling prairies, part of which if fit for nothing but the habitation of wild beasts, while other parts are good. In the afternoon came to another point on the Loop Fork, where we pitched our tents. Water good, but fuel and grass scarce.

Tuesday, May 16th.

This day it stormed and rained so hard that the water was driven into all our bedrooms, so much that it made us think seriously of our old homes. All, however, were enabled to be, or at least appeared to be, cheerful, as it was hard to tell under such circumstances what feelings anyone had in his heart, for it seemed to be a unanimous, resolution of each one of the

company to say nothing that would render the rest unhappy, therefore, all appeared to be cheerful and even more merry than if it had been clear and pleasant. We remained in camp until 9 1-2 o'clock, when it ceased to rain and we started, but it soon commenced to rain again and we only made 6 miles to another point on the Loop Fork where we could get wood. It was a good camping place, so we stopped to dry our clothing after the rain ceased.

Wednesday, May 17th.

All up early and well rested and thankful to our Heavenly Father for his many comforts we enjoy at his hand. As we were starting, we saw a wolf which generally comes to the camp to get any bits of meat that may be left and (as) a single one is not considered dangerous, we left him unmolested. We traveled 18 miles today over a very poor, sandy country that appears to be fit for nothing as not even the grasses common to this part of the country appear to grow here and in evening reach a good camping ground at Duck Lake, where we had plenty of grass, some water, but very little wood. All the water between Loop Fork and the main Platte is highly impregnated with alkali. The mail carrier camped with us this evening and afforded us an opportunity to send back letter to our friends, which we cheerfully embraced.

Thursday, May 18th.

The history of the funeral home has been printed in the first volume of the Knapp Mortuary Funerals, the Hamilton Funeral Home Records, and the Hamilton Family history was printed in Vol. 20 No. 2 of the Trail Breakers. I forward an account of one of those ancient and useful customs - a shooting match. It is a school to teach the young how to shoot and carry conviction to the hearts of tyrants, and makes man responsible to man. This makes man superior to his forefathers, when the feeble arguments of the bow and arrow very rarely convinced the proud, rich, titled tyrant, encased in armor and covered with battlements.

The above named match took place at the home of **MRS. MARY POPE**, on the North Fork of Lewis river, and the prize to be shot for was a fine, fat farrow cow, four years old, such a one as only L.R.

(Lewis River) can produce. It was divided into four quarters, the fourth, the hide and tallow. Best shot, forty rods, standing, or sixty, resting, to take his first choice, each to have his own tagged. Judges to tally, and decide on them. After some very fine practice by each and all, the following persons were decided victors, each having a center shot. It was very difficult to tell which was best: **CHARLES STRATTON**, North Ford, first quarter; **JAKE ROBINSON**, North Fork, second quarter; **THOMAS POWELL** (who was just going down with a canoe load of venison) the third and fourth quarters; the fifth was a tie between **FREDERICK PAGE** and **JOHN PAGE**. 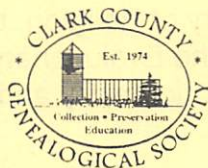

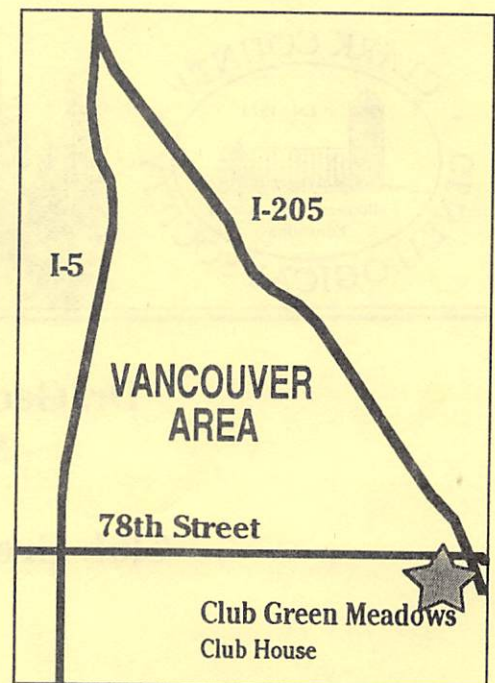

Unable to suppress his other interests, after 15 years of university teaching and research in chemistry, **Dr. Schweitzer** was awarded a National Science Foundation Faculty Fellowship, took a leave of absence, and returned to graduate school. He did his MA in the History of Religion (Columbia University) and his PH D in Philosophy (New York University) with a minor in the History of Science and with his dissertation being written on the History of the Scientific Revolution.

Dr. Schweitzer has taught university courses on the Civil War, the History of Religion, the History of Technology, Local and Family History, the History of Science, the Evolutionary History of the Universe, Colonial America, and has team-taught seminars in Historiography and Epistemology.

In the field of genealogy, he has authored 16 guide books, has documented several of his genealogical lines back to the early 1500's, and has made presentations to over 200 genealogical and historical organizations. **Dr. Schweitzer** is listed in "Who's Who in America", is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, and has held 23 endowed lectureships at colleges and universities. His undergraduate school (Central College in Missouri) has awarded him an honorary Doctor of Science degree in recognition of his contributions to the history of the interactions of science and religion. The East Tennessee Historical Society also has honored him with its Award for Excellence in History Education.

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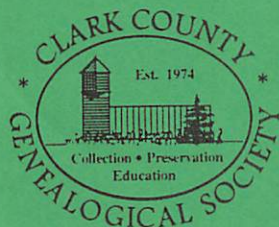
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
