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SUPPORT YOUR LIBRARY

Our libraries often offer the genealogist free or low cost services such as Interlibrary loan from which we can request books and microfilm not held by them. The Fort Vancouver Library system in Clark County is planning a levy for new buildings. As researchers, we need to support and/or join their efforts

INDEXES! usually a blessing, sometimes a curse!

Indexes: Genealogists LOVE them! And they hate them.

Genealogists absolutely, unconditionally, love the good ones. They love to find them at the end of a book (or at the beginning of a microfilm roll)! And they rejoice to find the old histories that have been indexed by present-day saints.

But defeat nearly overcomes them when they have found a wonderful book that has all this great information - and there is (oh! no!) no index. Especially when the library is about to close and it's a reference book in a library far from home. (Time for an interlibrary loan request.)

Probably the only thing more frustrating to a genealogist than having no index is having one that is hard to figure out. If you have looked at a lot of indexes, you know what I mean ... when the actual page numbers aren't the index reference ... such as III-a.

Couldn't find that entry on page 152? And there were only 111 pages in the whole book! Maybe it wasn't the typo you thought it was. Maybe it was referring to an entry number, or other keyed number. Wouldn't it have been great to have a footer along with an explanatory introduction to the index?

Wait! I can think of one index that is even more frustrating. That is when each section has a separate index -- at the end of each section! One example is when several cemeteries have been included in one volume and a *separate index* follows *each* cemetery listing.

Court records are usually found to be indexed chronologically. Unless someone has come along and re-alphabetized it later, it will frustrate the beginner. Smaller volumes are generally subdivided into separate divisions by the first letter of the last name and entered as the record is recorded. But it can get tricky in larger volumes when even the letters are subdivided into categories such as Ca, Ce, Ci, Co, Cu and you haven't realized that Chappell is found under Ca and not just before Ci - the first letter and first vowel are used to separate long lists of just first letters - and they will be added

chronologically and Chappell may be both before and after Capps!.

Another index I found recently was on a listing of baptism extracts where the names in the index were noted by the year! Actually it was quite helpful as I could turn right to the entry I desired, and each year only covered a maximum of three pages, so the name I was searching was easy to find.

If entry numbers are in numerical order, using the reference number is helpful. Mary Katschke used this in indexing the surnames to submitters (pages 39 & 40 of this issue). It can be a very useful index when abstracted wills or land records (land record number used) are indexed in this manner as one can quickly see if a couple of surnames refer to the same entry without checking the entry itself.

One of the most frustrating indexes is one which indicates the section and subsection, i.e. III-2. This means that the reference is in section III, page 2. Because one section may be a few pages and another very long, it can be slow to locate the proper page. I'm not sure that is worth the convenience of being able to add more pages to a section later.

One index CCGS used in a funeral home records volume was to put the subject name in all caps (followed by date of birth and death) and other names (such as parents, pall bearers, attending doctor, etc.) in mixed case. It was then easy to determine the type of entry the name referred to.

Several family books I've looked at have had a separate index for the main name and another for the rest -- confusing! Especially if the main name comes first.

There are a lot of styles of indexing out there. And a lot of rules to follow or not as the case be. A beginner can be bewildered by them. And sometimes they even catch the experienced!

SOUNDEX is often used in census indexing as well as other lists. For example, the Washington Death index is listed by soundex. Here all

surnames that sound alike are specially grouped by the coding system. They appear to be really mixed up sometimes, but the first names are generally alphabetical. So don't assume because you found a "pocket" of your surnames that there were no more on the list. The soundex system has been very helpful to researchers.

"Cooch" in our family is spelled Koitzsch. One would have to know to look under the K list. So remember to check other spellings if you didn't find a name in a list you expected it to appear.

If you are new at researching, perhaps you can avoid some of the pitfalls others have experienced in trying to find that name in an index.

INDEXING - it really isn't that hard to do!

Computers have made this task extremely easy. But even those who don't have a computer don't have an excuse for not including one in their book.

The first important rule to know is that you don't have to put the page numbers on a page until it is time to index. I always thought I had to keep everything in order when I was working on a large project. But you only need to keep your pages in order in sections (or chapters). Using a special blue pencil that isn't picked up by copying processes can aid in keeping order until it is time to paste on page numbers.

Once page numbers have been assigned, use index cards or other uniformly sized slips of paper to abstract the information to go into the index (for genealogists, this is usually, but not necessarily limited to, names). A full name index is really a blessing to those that will be using the book. If alternate names (such as maiden names) are known, you may also want to include "see also" reference entries.

Once your entries have been completed, begin to alphabetize them. Should Mc be a separate division, or included in the "M"s? How does Van Leuven fit in -- The telephone book is a good reference to check as a source for following the order of alphabetizing.

If you don't have a friend with a computer, consider making one. You can just enter the names from any list and have the computer do the work. (Even if your project was not done on computer). Don't check the user's guide index

under alphabetizing though. It may be called sorting lists - in ascending or descending orders.

If your project is processed on computer, entries can "marked" and the computer will do the work. It will even do the Table of Contents when marked.

And there are some software programs designed for indexing, but most word processing programs today have an adequate system.

When Roy Katschke indexes the ancestor charts for the *Trail Breakers*, he has a macro do the work for him. It takes a minute or two to do six pages. Since we use only a surname index, and the surnames are in all caps, he directs his macro to search for any "words" that are all caps over three letters (so he doesn't pick up country abbreviations such as GER for Germany). It does it automatically! If he happens to have a surname such as COX or VOS he does need to remember to add it to the list.

Another macro Roy has created is to recognize blocked information and to put last names first - the comma gives the clue - and to include it in the index with the current page number. This saves considerable time, especially if there are a lot of entries.

Indexing may take additional time, but once you understand how to do it, it is just a matter of time -- and it's time spent worthwhile. You will be greatly appreciated by the person who finds you took the time to complete an index - particularly if you did a good one!

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CONDIT FAMILY TRAVELS THE OREGON TRAIL

Second in the series: As a part of the Oregon Centennial, the *Washington-County News-Times*, Forest Grove, Oregon, ran many articles celebrating the event. Among them were these letters and diary entries of the Condit family who took six months to travel from Wood county, Ohio, beginning March 19, 1854, arriving at their destination in the Willamette Valley on September 16th. Permission to re-print the series was obtained from Jim Hart, current editor of the *News-Times*. The first installment was printed in the Winter 1995-96, Vol. 22 #2 *Trail Breakers* issue. In this issue of the *Trail Breakers*, the ancestor chart of CCGS member Betty Condit Dollar is found on pages 30 - 33.

Thursday, May 18th.

Started early and after going 4 miles came to a small creek suitable for camping, but no wood. We then went 7 miles to the crossing of Prairie Creek which has very steep banks. After some time we got across and went 4 miles to another point on the same creek where there was a good camping ground with plenty of wood and water. During this day Mrs. Condit and myself became so tired and impatient of the journey that we both had the horrors pretty bad, but when evening came, the young folks seemed to be so happy that we partly forgot our troubles and

recovered the balance of mind we had so nearly lost. During the day we crossed some very bad sloughs which detained us considerably.

Friday, May 19th.

During last night we were considerably annoyed with the wolves howling around our camp, but as they did us no harm, we did the same with them. Traveled 18 miles today and camped 2 miles above the bridge on Wood river. The road has been very good all day, except one slough which in crossing we broke a singletree. At the river we found a blacksmith who charged us one dollar a shoe for driving. James Donahue, one of our company

was very sick today, but our medicine chest being examined we found a remedy that by the next morning set him all right and able to go again.

Pioneers Battle Wind and Rain, River, Indians To Cross Plains

(Editor's Note: This is the third installment in a series of five relating the Philip Condit family's trek across the plains from Ohio to Oregon in 1854.)

Saturday, May 20th.

This morning it rained a little but soon cleared off and we had a fine day. Left camp at 8 o'clock. Traveled 20 miles over one of the most beautiful and extensive prairies I ever saw and in the

evening reached the main Platte where we found good grass for our stock, but the water is very muddy, but not unpleasant except the alkali with which it is impregnated. Saw several

wolves, antelope and elk today, but at a distance. Our camp was in a beautiful, green valley near the bank of the river where we made preparation for the Sabbath, after which we went to bed and slept soundly till morning except when the wolves would howl loud enough to annoy us, but this was becoming so common that we did not mind it much.

Sabbath, May 21st.

All in good health, some herding the cattle, the rest in tent or wagon reading their books and refreshing their minds with useful knowledge and resting their weary bodies. Even here in this lonely place we can enjoy a season of rest. All apparently enjoyed ourselves well in the Bible class and social exercise of God's worship.

Monday, May 22nd

This morning looked very much like rain, but cleared off soon. Started and traveled 20 miles over a very bad road full of check holes to Elm Creek, then to Buffalo Creek where we camped. Here we found some wood and good water.

Thursday, May 23rd

Started early this morning and traveled up the creek 12 miles to the crossing, then 13 miles without any water to Willow Lake. Went into camp about dark. All very tired and nearly ready to wish ourselves back again with civilization. From here to Buffalo Creek we found no good water.

Wednesday, May 24th

On our route today we passed Deep Creek which by the

way is nothing but a dry creek, except in very wet weather. In the afternoon we passed a new made grave where a Mr. Wilson had been buried a few days before. Advanced about 14 miles today and camped near the river opposite Deer Island where some of the boys shot at some deer, but did not get any.

Thursday, May 25th

Morning fine and all gave thanks to our God for his preserving us through the night and reviving out drooping spirits and preserving our health. traveled 15 miles today to the crossing of Skunk Creek, where we again went into camp and all are in high glee gathering buffalo chips of the first time to cook our supper with, but they are better than nothing at all.

Friday, May 26th

Morning set in rainy, but still our spirits flagged not, but started toward the setting sun. After going 6 or 7 miles we came to a spring which boiled up out of the ground like a great, seething cauldron, clear, crystal and cold, from which we filled our vessels with good water, which is a rare thing as all the water is highly impregnated with alkali. We made 21 miles today over a broken country and in the evening went into camp on the banks of the Platte. Here we found the grave of a man that had been shot but for what we never learned.

Saturday, May 27th

Still rainy, but not enough to make us stay in camp. Soon after starting we passed a company stuck fast in Black

Mud Creek. We got across with great difficulty and passed several other companies that had experienced the same difficulty we had in crossing this, the worst of all sloughs, since we started on our journey. This day we went about ten miles and then went into camp and made preparation for the Sabbath, washing and baking and such like.

Sabbath, May 28th

Rained nearly all day, but not very hard. Held our usual Sabbath exercises. Bible class and prayer meeting. Still some of our company were very down hearted, seeing everything wet and no wood to dry them.

Monday, May 29th

Rainy, which caused us to stay in camp till 11 a.m. when it cleared off and at 1 p.m. we started and crossed North Bluff Creek, then over the bluffs and camped west of them on the river.

Tuesday, May 30th

Traveled about 20 miles today over a very rough country cut up-by-streams-though small yet difficult to cross which made it wearisome to travel, but still we pressed on and camped that evening on a small creek where the grass was good but wood scarce. Still we made the best of our situation and tried to be cheerful.

KNAPP MORTUARY RECORDS

Extracted by CCGS member Gerry Gilman, the Knapp-Gunderson-Hamilton Funeral Home records were first printed in the *Trail Breakers* Winter 1989/Vol. 16 #2 issue. The history of the funeral home has been printed in the first volume of the Knapp Mortuary Funerals, the Hamilton Funeral Home Records, and the Hamilton Family history was printed in Vol. 20 No. 2 of the *Trail Breakers*. In 1960 the Knapp Mortuary merged with Mylan-Gunderson-Lanier and is presently under the Hamilton-Mylan-Knapp-Gunderson Funeral Home, located on the Corner of 11th and Columbia Streets in Vancouver, WA. Three volumes have now been printed: *Knapp Mortuary Funerals 1907-1925*, *Knapp Mortuary Funerals 1926-1940*, and *Hamilton Funeral Records 1927-1929*.

February 27, 1869

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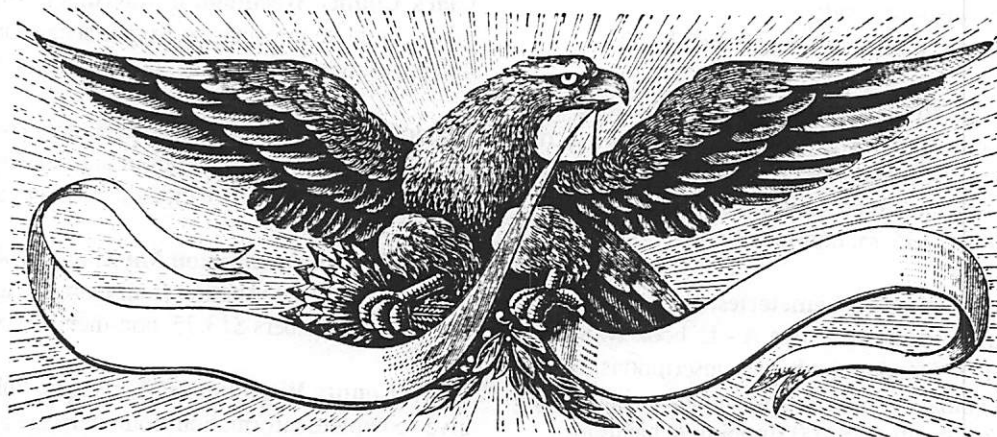
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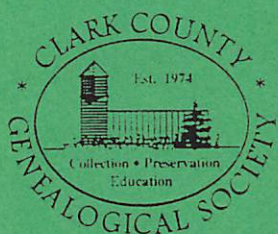
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
