

MEMBERSHIP: Membership is open to anyone interested in the collection and preservation of family and regional history. It includes a subscription to the *TRAIL BREAKERS*, a *DIRECTORY*, a nearly monthly *NEWSLETTER*, and checkout priviledges at the CCGS Library. Membership Chairperson: Sandy Thompson.

DUES: \$15.00 per year for an individual, \$20.00 for joint members (two people, only one publication mailing). Life membership is \$250, joint life (married couples only) is \$310. Contributing membership is \$50.00 or more per year.

IF I COULD CHANGE ONE THING IN GENEALOGY,

PEOPLE WOULD NOT BE ALLOWED TO BUY ANOTHER BOOK UNTIL THEY'VE READ WHAT THEY ALREADY HAVE!

I'm really not deadly serious about this title, but it is a pet peeve that all too many genealogist buy book after book and never seem to discipline themselves to read and study those books. We are all looking for the One Magic Answer, and perhaps that will be found in The One Source, and maybe that's why all this book buying is constantly going on. You know what I mean. Visit the vendor area for any workshop or conference form local to national level and it's BOOK that folks are buying. I think perhaps that genealogists succumb to the temptation to buy whenever they get in smelling distance of new books because book buying is addictive. And because it is an addiction, family historians don't always do their buying wisely. Maybe there ought to be a rule that genealogists should read and study two books for every one they purchase.

With tongue in cheek, I propose a set of guideline to help control this Oklahoma Land Rush of book buying. May we all raise our hand in allegiance to these rules:

- (1) If One Book Is Good, Two Aren't Always Better. It is far better to buy one good reference book (or at least one at a time) and really study it, that to buy several and have them grow brittle on the shelf. Of course, with extra books you have more to loan and forget where they are -- and then never have to read them.
- (2) The More Expensive Book Isn't Always The Best Choice. If you are serious about genealogy book buying, it's best to do some checking and some asking to get a clear idea of just what is the best book in the area you're considering. Make the wisest choice, not just a "checkbook choice." Brag about dress prices, not book prices.
- (3) Pictures Are Necessary. Not necessarily; charts and graphs will explain facts and concepts quite nicely, too. Only some pictures are worth a thousand words.
- (4) Do Not Buy A College Level Book When A Kindergarten Book Will. Do. If you are just beginning your research in a certain area, perhaps a simpler, overview book will answer most of your questions. It was Sgt. Joe Friday who said, "I just want the bare fact, Ma'am."
- (5) Do Not Buy A Book Just Because The Vendor Is Pushing It. Book sellers are just that, book sellers. you must pretend you're buying peanut butter and be choosy.
- (6) If Your Need A Book On Virginia, Don't Buy One On Alaska, Too, Just Because They Are Selling 2 for 1 Price. This is where real discipline comes in. Perhaps in

- the future you will need to know about researching in Alaska, but if you buy that book now, you're obligated to read and study it NOW.
- (7) Set Your Budget Before You Approach a Vendor. It's easiest to resist filling your tote bag with books if you've only brought funds for half a tote bag. But then, you can always skip lunch.
- (8) Constant Browsing Feeds The Addiction. Make one visit to the vendor area and then stay away. Visit with other genealogists and learn verbally form them. Go shopping in book stores only in Leap Years.
- (9) Wear A Button That Says, "Help Me! I'm a A Compulsive Book Buyer." Actually, this will bring on the giggles and smiles form your friends; they will flock around you, and then perhaps THEY will buy the books right out from under you -- and you can borrow them.
- (10) Make No More Book Shelves In Your Home. This might help. Why store books under the bed or in the laundry room? Like hiding the whiskey bottle, genealogists squirrel away books all over the house, and then forget them. That's a really chicken way to get out of reading the books you buy.

If these rules don't help a bit, and you plan to cheerfully continue buying books at every opportunity like there was no tomorrow, then at least swear allegiance to the idea that you henceforth MAKE TIME to read and study each and every book you buy. Promise The Man In The Moon that you will not buy a book that you won't read. Its is a sobering fact that all the good information in books won't do your genealogical research a bit of good if it all stays in the book.

Well, I wear a button that reads, "I Never Met A Book I Didn't Like." With these rules firmly in mind, I'm off to my library's book sale. Good luck to all of us.

CCGS LIBRARY HAS MUCH TO OFFER!

Are you one of those who belong to CCGS and have no Clark County connections? Not having a Clark County connection doesn't mean you might not find a treasure in our library! Looking in the recently mailed *Directory*, one can see how wide of a collection our small library offers. Pages 36 & 37 give statistical graphs showing the states and countries our library holds and the interest area of our members. Pages 28 - 32 lists periodical exchanges for CCGS. The map on page 32 shows that this list includes a broad coverage with a west coast concentration. The CCGS library is located inside the Clark County Museum (presently no phone for CCGS), at 1511 Main Street. Presently, the library is open Tuesday through Saturday 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Doris Wastradowski is the present librarian. Below are statistics about our library that will surprise many:

Specialties:

- * Washington: Census/Soundex (Over 270 microfilm rolls) including all WA Territory. Censuses (1857-1892) and Soundex (1880) and Washington Censuses and Soundex through 1920 for all counties. Also have 1860, 1870 and 1880 WA Territory. Mortality Census; 1890 WA Veteran's Census. There are over 300 genealogy books for this state and the Statewide Death Index 1907-1988 on microfiche.
- Oregon: Death Index 1903-1970; Oregon Marriage Index 1906-1924; 1946-1992; City of Portland Death Index 1881-1917; City of Portland Birth Index 1864-1917; Marriage books for Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Crook, Curry, Gilliam, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Linn, Marion, Morrow, Multnomah, Polk, Sherman, Tillamook, Umpqua, Umatilla and Washington Counties; 1860 Census for Benton, Clatsop, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Multnomah, Tillamook, Umpqua, & Washington counties; 1870 Census for Coos, Curry, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Multnomah, Tillamook & Umpqua counties; 1880 Census for Columbia, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lake, Lane, Marion and Tillamook counties; 1900 Census for Curry, Josephine, Umatilla, Union & Wallowa counties; 1910 Soundex for Clackamas County, OR; 1910 Census for Coos, Curry, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Lane,

- Marion, Morrow, Union, Wallowa, Wasco, & Yamhill counties; Over 230 genealogy books for this state or it's counties.
- * California Marriage Index 1960-1985; California Death Index 1940-1988; 1990-93; 1850 California Census Index; 1860 Census for San Diego County; 1870, 1880 & 1900 Census of Riverside County; 1900 Census for Del Norte & San Diego Counties; 1910 Census for Napa, Nevada, and Orange Counties;
- * GIRS: A computerized Genealogical Information Retrieval System to search for library resources matching a geographical location, surname, census year, type of genealogical record, author, title, or Dewey Decimal number based on keywords. The system also contains over 47,500 names being researched by members with submitter information and seven Windows based genealogical programs for patrons to "explore."

3900+ book, microfilm, microfiche and vertical file accessions in the Society's collection, plus many shelves of current and back issues of periodicals exchanged with over 180 other Washington and out of state genealogical organizations.

Included is a large general section, over 260 family histories; about 150 books dealing

with research in foreign countries including a new 3 volume set of *The French Canadians 1600-1900*; *Griffith's Valuation Index for Ireland*; and some Census Indexes for selected provinces in 1850- Canada; Massachusetts Vital Records (Holyoke 1895 & Easthampton 1785-1864) and the Boston Transcript Index on microfiche.

U. S. Census Indexes (may be a book or microfiche) include: 1790 for CT, MA, MD, ME, NC, NH, NY, RI, SC, & VT; 1800 for MA; 1820 for GA, TN, & VA; 1830 for GA, IL, IN; 1840 for IN, & MO; 1850 for AL, CA, CT, DE, GA, IN,

KY, MA, ME, MI, MN, MO, MS, NC, NH, NM, NY, OH, SC, & UT; 1855 WI; 1860 for AR, DE, FL, IA, IL, KS, LA, MT, NE, UT & VT; 1870 for CO & NE; 1910 for NV & WY; 1890 Veteran Census Indexes for LA, MD, MN, MO & MS.

The collection also holds over 150 compilations of census records for various years and selected counties for the following states: AK, AL, AR, CT, DE, GA*, IA, ID, IL*, KS*, KY, LA, MA, MD, MI, MN*, MO*, NC, ND*, NE, NJ, NM*, NY, OH, OK, RI, SD, TN*, TX* & VA*. (* = more than 5 titles)

As a result, she is well equipped to begin a column covering information on many libraries. As a start, we have included on pages 5 & 6, two pages out of her syllabus for class. FAMILY TRAVELS THE OREGON TRAIL

Fourth in the series: As a part of the Oregon Centennial, the Washington-County News-Times, Forest Grove, Oregon, ran many articles celebrating the event. Among them were these letters and diary entries of the Condit family who took six months to travel from Wood county, Ohio, beginning March 19, 1854, arriving at their destination in the Willamette Valley on September 16th. Permission to re-print the series was obtained from Jim Hart, current editor of the News-Times.

Sabbath, June 18th

Our sick all better and disposed to rest. Attended to Bible class and prayer meeting with interest and I think profit to our needy souls. Rained a little today. From our camp we can see snow on the mountains south of the river.

Monday, June 19th

All well and thankful to our Heavenly Father for all his benefits bestowed on us. Day very cold and some rain. Passed some very rugged hills today went 7 miles to the last watering place on the Platte, where we dined and then bid farewell to that river and hope never to see it again. Then passed 15 miles over a very pleasant road. Passed the Rocky Avenue and Alkali Swamp and camped near Willow Springs.

Tuesday, June 20th

This day we crossed over Parapet Hill where a small stream was to the left of the road called Grease Creek. Then passed Alkali Swamp and on to Sweetwater river near to Independence Rock were we found good grass and water. In all 20 miles.

Wednesday, June 21st

Left camp at an early hour to see Independence Rock, which is something of a curiosity to Emigrants as it is separated from the mountains by the river on the north side. And here are thousands of names of emigrants who have visited it with the dates of the time they passed this way. And 5 miles up the stream we passed the Devil's Gate, a much more curious object to the weary traveler. This is an opening through the mountains

through which the river flows with perpendicular rock on each side. Said to be 700 feet high, still I think it is exaggerated. Then we passed several small streams and one spring near the Gate and made about 18 miles today.

Thursday, June 22nd

Traveled about 14 miles today over a sandy road and camped near where the road leaves the river.

Oxen Die Along Trail, Other Hazards Arise

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth installment in a series of five relating the Philip Condit family's trek across the plains from Ohio to Oregon in 1854.)

Friday, June 23rd

Left camp at 8 a.m. and moved up the river 6 miles to the ford and then crossed it twice within a mile among the rocky bluffs where we had to raise our wagon beds to keep them dry. Then we went on, passing several curious rocky bluffs of

various descriptions and camped near the 4th ford on Sweetwater, having traveled about 15 miles today.

Saturday, June 24th

Traveled 6 miles to Ice Spring or Sway, where it is said that ice can be had almost any time, but we could not find any. We then passed over 11 miles of good road to the 5th ford on Sweetwater and tired and willing to rest.

Sabbath, June 15th

Spent this day as usual. Day very windy and a little rain. Our tent was blown down, but we soon had it all right. One of our family a little sick.

Monday, June 26th

All well rested, the sick better. Traveled 12 miles and camped near where the road leaves the river.

Tuesday, June 27th

Traveled today about 20 miles, first crossing a small creek and lake, then over a pleasant road passing Strawberry Creek, 2 or 3 spring creeks, Sweetwater Creek and Willow Creek and pitched our tent near the 5th ford of the Sweetwater.

Wednesday, June 28th

Morning clear and cold. the last ford Crossed Sweetwater river. I sold a lame ox for 12 dollars. We then went 7 miles to Twin Mountains, so called because they stand, as it were, isolated form the rest and the road passes between hem. Here we encountered a heavy gale of wind which raised a heavy cloud of sand and dust such as we had not before seen. Then about 3 miles more brought us to the summit of the South Pass of the Rocky This pass is not Mountains. remarkable for anything except its gentle and easy ascent and descent. The road is perfectly good on both sides. Then in 3 miles more we came to the

crossing of Pacific Creek, so called because it runs west into the Pacific ocean. Here one of the boys brought us a snow ball, which was to all of us quite a curiosity on the 38th of June. Here the air seems to be perfectly dry and cold enough to wear mittens and overcoats. Traveled 15 miles today and camped 2 miles below the ford on a dry sandbank. Here we found a little grass, but we had to drive our stock into a swamp to get it.

Friday, June 29th

Day cool and pleasant for our teams. Traveled 9 miles to Dry Sandy. Water bad for stock. Then we passed 6 miles to the junction of the Oregon and California roads. Then over good roads to Little Sandy. And down the stream 2 miles where we camped on a barren sand ridge with little grass, but plenty of wood and water. Made about 23 miles today.

Friday, June 30th

Left camp at Little Sandy and went 5 miles to the ford of Bid Sandy and then over a hilly road to a small creek, making 22 or 23 milty [miles]. Day cool and windy.

Saturday, July 1st

Traveled 22 miles today without water and part of the way over alkali roads and camped late at night between or near the middle ferry on Green river. No grass to be found.

Sabbath, July 2nd

We left camp early for want of grass. Crossed the river. Paid 25 dollars for ferrying our wagons and swam our stock and

went down the river about 3-4th of a miles and camps, having performed what we thought a sufficiently long journey for the day. Witnessed a great amount of profanity today at the ferry. O that men would learn to fear the Lord and depart from evil.

Monday, July 3rd

Shod several cattle this morning. Left camp at 11 o'clock and traveled up the river 15 miles and camped on a small creek in the bluffs above where we struck it.

Tuesday, July 4th

Traveled about 15 miles today and camped at an early hour on Mr. Freedom, where the boy's killed a sagehen, which with a variety of other good things constituted our 4th of July supper. Even here in Deserette the principles of Freedom begin to be enjoyed. Excellent water and grass.

Wednesday, July 5th

Day cool and pleasant. Traveled and valleys and spring runs and camped in a beautiful valley near a spring run where the water was good and wood and grass plenty.

Thursday, July 6th

Traveled 4 miles to Hines fork of Bear river and then up the end of the backbone to the top, where we had an ox to die at noon and then about 8 miles over a good road to Summit Spring where we found good grass, so we went into camp.

Friday, July 7th

Passed Fir Grove, a long and steep mountain, to Muddy Creek then 1 miles up a steep hill to a good spring on the summit, then over the rocks down into the valley of Bear river and camped west of a good spring run. All tired and disconsolate, having made about 13 miles today.

Saturday, July 8th

Traveled 3 miles to Smith's fork of Bear river where we paid \$1.50 per wagon for crossing a bridge and thence 10 miles down to the bend of the river and the 3 miles to a fine spring creek where we put up for the Sabbath, all weary and tired and willing to rest.

July 9th

Ice frozen in camp this and the two preceding mornings. Day pleasant, but the horseflies very bad here. We enjoyed our Bible class and social exercises very well.

July 10th

We traveled 20 miles today over some very hilly road and camped on Telluk fork where we had good feed for stock. Flies very bad today.

July 11th

Traveled 22 miles today over an excellent road, crossing 6 or 8 beautiful spring runs which afforded us abundance of the best water. One of our oxen took sick today.

July 12th

Day pleasant. We traveled 8 miles to a small creek and dined. And 2 miles more brought us to a soda spring which boils out of the banks of Bear river at the edge of a cedar grove. This, with a number of curious springs in the neighborhood. is an object worthy of attention, especially to

scientific travelers. A little farther on you will find the far famed Steamboat Spring which is also a curiosity. It, however, will probably soon be lost, for its alternate ebbings and flowings are not so powerful as when first discovered by Emigrant. observed some other places where, no doubt to my mind. there had been similar springs, but had ceased to flow. I might also state that there seemed to be a curious formation of crust over the surface of the earth and as you ride or walk over it, a deep hollow sound is produced as if you might break through at every step.

July 13th

Left camp of Bear river and went down 2 miles to the junction of California Oregon roads, the former down the river. We took the Grasshopper Valley where we witnessed one of the most remarkable flight of grasshoppers we ever saw or read of. The day was warm and the wind blew moderately but steadily from the Southwest and for about 15 or 20 minutes there seemed to be a perfect cloud of them all going with the wind and in a few minutes after there was scarcely any to be seen. seemed as if with one consent they had all moved off in a body. Today we found a remarkable arched cave which some call the Devil's Bake Oven. Passed Broom Springs (another cluster of soda springs) and a little further on we found a bluster of springs of excellent pure water. Made 21 miles today and

camped near the bluffs 2 or 3 miles west of Grasshopper Creek.

July 14th

Went 7 miles to a ford and bridge on Portners Creek. Crossed at the ford, went 2 miles more to a spring at the foot of the bluffs where we dined and then crossing several excellent spring runs, up 7 miles bottom, over the summit, then 8 miles to Best Springs. Here we camped for the night on the headwater of the Columbia.

July 15th

Traveled down along the food of the mountains on the left, crossing several remarkable spring runs, to Row Creek and a remarkable gap where the creek passes through the mountains 7 miles and then down the creek 8 miles to a little flat between the creek and the road and went into camp for the Sabbath. Wood, water and grass plenty.

Sabbath, July 15th

Day pleasant and we enjoyed it well only for one of our oxen which had been sick for several days and still getting worse every day.

July 17th

Our ox died this morning and as we moved out of camp we became more sensible of our dependence on God. Rained a little this morning, but not enough to lay the dust. Traveled 22 miles today; viz., 2 to fork of road, 11 to Fort Neaff bridge, and 9 across the bluffs and camped on the bluffs near the river. Here we found plenty of mosquitoes.

July 18th

Another ox nearly dead so that we had to leave him and go on. We went on 3 miles to Prairie Creek and left another ox dead of alkali, and passed on 10 miles and camped at a spring near to Snake River Valley.

July 19th

Traveled down the river 5 miles to the American Falls and 12 miles to Rocky Pass and 1 mil to camp near black Bluffs. Saw some things today that were very interesting to us.

July 20th

Left another ox dead. The Lord seems to be taking our oxen very fast to feed his fowls on, but he has right to them, therefore, we will not complain. Passed Stony and Fall Creeks and camped on Raft river. Part of the road was stony and rough. Made 17 miles today.

July 21st

Left Raft river at 7 1-2 a.m. and traveled 19 miles over sand, sage and stones without water till we came to Swamp Creek where we found good water and plenty of grass, but not much wood.

July 22nd

Traveled 8 miles down Swamp Creek to its crossing and then in 6 miles more the road strikes the river and then 9 miles more to Goose Creek where we found water but no grass. It was all eaten off close.

Sabbath, July 23rd

We though we could not stay here on account of feed for our stock. Therefore we hitched up and went 7 miles over sand and sage to the river, then down the river over hills and rocks 5 miles to Horseshoe Bend. A long Sabbath's day journey, but we could not help.

July 24th

Went 10 miles down the river to ford it and then 7 miles more brought us to our camp on a high bank where we had to drive our animals down a very steep bank into the ditch for grass.

July 26th

Drove 8 miles over sage and sand to a steep watering place on Snake river and then over heavy sand roads to a watering place in the valley, but not much grass.

July 27th

Traveled 3 miles to the mouth of a small creek and then 3 miles to Salmon Falls Creek, then 2 miles farther down and went into camp opposite the great Shoshone Falls, or falling springs. Here some of us came near wished we had not gone to see them.

July 28th

Drove down the river to Salmon Falls where we watered and then 16 miles over the White Hills without water to a bend in Snake river where we camped. But little grass.

July 29th

Traveled 14 miles over a dry sandy road to Logchain Valley. A very good place in water here. Some of our folks found a very good spring. Then 4 miles farther to the old ford on Snake river. Here we found good grass.

Sabbath July 30th

A very pleasant day and we all rested and enjoyed, I hope the Bible class and prayer meeting.

July 31st

Drove over rocks and along the side of bluffs down to a bend in river where we found grass in abundance, where we went into camp at 3 p.m. There are several camping places in the distance. Made 12 miles.

Aug. 1st

Traveled down the river touching it in several places. Left another (ox) dead at noon today and camped early near an Indian Island when some Indians came to us, but all peaceable. Made 12 miles today.

Aug. 2nd

Traveled 8 miles across the bluffs of Catherine or Sunflower Creek. Here we found plenty of Indians, but, they were all peaceable and friendly, wanting to trade fish and ponies, etc. Here we had another sick ox, so we only went 2 miles down the creek and camped on its bank where our ox died and we tried to say, the will of the Lord be done.

CAUTION: Not all the relatives are friendly!

Sometimes, even with the best intentions and the greatest of tact, an encounter with relatives to seek more family information is very disappointing. Is that really any surprise? Many of us already knew that. And there must be at least a thousand reasons why.

Sometimes, there's a skeleton in the closet that causes fear in sharing information. Sometimes, the person is just overwhelmed with other things at the time and taking time to share information is too large a task. Maybe, especially with elderly people, the thinking skills have become impaired and it will take a lot of ingenuity to break through to the information. Sometimes a distant relative has been "burned" by someone else getting all the years of research he accumulated with "nothing" in return. Or maybe, it was just "a bad hair day!" We might not know why, but it's always worth another try.

Look for that open door that was left open and follow up on it. Ask questions in a different way. Explain why you are seeking the information. (Genealogy is a hobby.)

CCGS member Carol (COEN) HUESSER, P.O. Box 167, De Beque, CO 81630-0167, shares this experience she recently had:

Just had to tell you of an experience I had this evening [2 Aug 1996].

My grand-daughter works in a doctors office in Bend Oregon. A young man came into her office & she was shocked because he looked so much like my brother, Robert COEN. You guessed it -- this mans name was also Robert COEN. She explained that her grandmother's name was also COEN & that her brother was Robert. The young man said his parents, also living in Bend, had big charts on his COEN side & that his mother was Swedish. (Many of our COENS in Iowa also married Swedish girls.) He gave Meli his parents number & also his number & said "Maybe we are related."

Meli called me with the story & what followed was quite a shock & something I have never run into before. First time for everything, I guess!

Mr. COEN was not the most cordial man. He said he thot I was a con artist, looking up phone numbers & getting information & then trying to sell his COEN histories & wouldn't even let me explain where I had received his number. However, I had spoken briefly to his wife, & maybe she will check out, with her son, what I told her. After telling ;me he thot I was only wasting his time, he hung up.

He did tell me that his grandfather or father, was a R.R. man. Mr. COEN sounded so much like my Father and Uncles & was so suspicious of everything I said, that I have come to the conclusion that he's <u>got</u> to be a relative as all my COEN men have the same traits, even tho they can be great teases too. Yes, several of my COEN line were R.R. men too.

I'm disappointed that he thot I was trying to pull a con, because his son told my granddaughter that hey had used the phone discs at the library to contact COEN kin.

I was only seeking to find another "COEN" line that might tie into mine, & would have liked to have corresponded with them & exchanged COEN histories. Maybe I could have had the answers to names they were looking for & vise versa -- But, I'll never know.

That is, perhaps, unless Carol tries again. Notice that she still has open doors. One would be in contacting the wife who was open to her; another would be re-contacting the son to talk with his father. Looking forward to see this turn into a success story for a future *Trail Breakers* issue!
