













Clark County Genealogical Library Moves Back to the Basement



Librarian Mary Geoghegan was very pleased to have the library open to patrons three days into the move back to the basement. The great turn out of volunteer helpers and much pre-planning helped make this possible. North is at the rirhgt in this view. The general collection begins by the copy machine and periodicals are located on the east (bottom) and half of the north (right side) walls. This plan shows where a second computer will eventually be placed. The microform center was open a few days later. Mary's experience as librarian for the move upstairs paid off for the move back down.





Last time the library was located downstairs, only a part of the large open area was available for books and the move upstairs was welcomed. Over the years that space became filled (and over-filled). The museum approved CCGS's utilization of the north basement area. The area represents about 50% more space than we had upstairs. A great floor plan was developed by Mary Geoghegan and Roy Katschke. Roy built most of the shelving and the computer station. The SP & S Railroad Museum is in the southern section, across from our library. It took 234 volunteer hours to move.





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# SWIFT AWARDS CCGS GRANT

December 3, 1997, SWIFT awarded CCGS a grant of \$4,265 towards purchase of the Canon Microprinter 90. This machine will help researchers by allowing them to make photocopies of the films they are viewing instead of hand copying the information. This model will print from both microfilm and



microfiche. CCGS has 368 rolls of microfilm and 70 microfiche titles and plans to add to this collection. SWIFT granted nearly all the amount requested. Thank you SWIFT!

SWIFT – Southwest Washington Independent Forward Thrust – awarded \$385,000 in grants to 72 groups, including a one-time \$100,000 grant to establish a community-based oral health care clinic to Southwest Washington Health District. Six groups received grants over \$10,000. We were among the 65 "regular" grants given. One hundred seventy-one organizations applied for funds. Of the \$285,000 awarded "regular grantees," Social & Health received \$136,800, Civic & Education received \$108,300, and Cultural received \$39,000.

Each group gave a brief description of the project funded. It was extremely heart-filling to see what our community is doing to help others and to see that SWIFT is helping these groups make a difference in our community.

# Beginning Genealogy

In our continuing series on genealogy for beginners, we are realizing that some of us old-timers are learning a few things. We hope that this series is aiding all genealogists in their research for their ancestors.

### **Obituaries and Death Notices**

Sometimes ignored, the obituaries and death notices in local newspapers are a good source for genealogical information. Often researchers get so wrapped up in the official records that they do not consider the newspaper articles that are usually stored on microfilm in local libraries.

Microfilms of newspapers are not easy to deal with but on the other hand, they are not difficult. Pages of newspapers are photographed and this becomes the record. Knowing the date that a death occurred is important for this research. Usually the obituary or other news about deaths appeared in the newspapers after the fact. It is often that obituaries appear in newspapers up to one month after the death.

We will note the various information that can be gleaned from the obituaries below and make reference to that information contained in them. Not all obits are alike. Some are more helpful than others.

#### Samarimes Elizabeth Rees Died Friday, Aged 95; Funeral Services Sunday

Samarimes Elizabeth Carlion, only child of Thomas and Nancy Reed Carlton was born in Johnson County, Illinois December 11, 1853 and died June 10, 1949 at the age of 95 years, 5 months and 29 days.

She was united in marriage on April 7, 1878 to Jesse Morgan who preceded her in death. To this amon was born 4 children, 2 dying in infancy and Mrs. Mayme Bain dying October 21, 1919. Surviving is Mrs. Nellie Brown of New Columbia and a stepdanghter, Mrs. Minnie Roby of Metropolis, whom she raised. She also leaves to mourn her passing five grandchildren and four great grand-

Later in life she was united in marriage to

Samuel Rees who also preceded her in death.

Early in life she united with the Berea Church

of Christ under the preaching of Bro. Pace.

Since 1919 she had made her home with her daughter's family, that of Elmer Brown of New Columbia. For the past six years she had been bed-fast due to a broken hip. Until her last illness she remained cheerful and bright always piecing

quilts and enjoying visitors and flowers.
Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Berea church conducted by Rev. Herman Carlton and Rev. Weaver, pastor of Metropolis Church of Christ

Casket bearers were Hillas and Marvin Morgan. Buton Farley, Johnny Carlton, John Morgan and Hard and Earnest Harper. Music by the Farley

Name - She was an only child - Father was Thomas Carlton and mother was Nancy Reed.

Location of birth - Date of birth - Date of death.

C Date of first marriage — Husband's name.

Number of children born — Number still living -One child was married to a Mr. Bain and died at date noted - Another child married to a Mr. Brown and location of residence - Stepdaughter from a second marriage (not her own child) married to a Mr. Roby and location of residence - Number of descendants other than daughters.

E Second marriage (no date given) noted — Second husband died earlier.

F Religious experiences and denominational faith.

Important dates here! — 1919 was same year that one daughter died (could she have lived with her previously?) - Living with one of her children could indicate that she was widowed — Illness noted — Disposition — Hobbies (descendants may wish to search for one of these quilts) — Other enjoyments.

H Note that she lived near and attended same church as in her youth - Two pastors indicate that one may have been a family friend.

Casket bearers were usually either friends, relatives, or church members — This musical group had some meaning to the deceased or family members.

#### Analytical Study of an Obituary

Obituaries as at left contain tremendous amounts of useful information to aid in reconstructing a person's life. Genealogy is not only the search to find names and dates but the study of information available that will reveal what ancestors were like in their everyday lives and their relationships to others.

Not all obituaries are as simple as this one. Some are brief while some are elaborate and contain flowery prose. Note that almost all obituaries eulogize the deceased. Few, if any, will reveal negative characteristics—these facts may never be revealed.

A word of caution! Not all information contained in obituaries is correct. These are usually written by family members, friends, pastors or other persons. There are some facts that may become distorted and it is not unusual to find that dates and names are not accurate.

Like all genealogical material gathered. Information found in obituaries must remain tentative until proven by other corroborating records.

They had 5 children: (1) Charles Edson (1888-1935), (2) Annie Laurie (1891-1920), (3) Mary Elizabeth (1892- married Harry Klick), (4) Philip Alexander (1895) and (5) Mary Alice Cramer (1898). Mary Olive Cramer married (2nd) 29 Mar 1925 Richard Leonard (1875-1948) has marker "Dick" in the Leonard Plot NE #35). Mary Olive (Goddard) Cramer Leonard was a member of the Christian Church, lived at 515 Franklin St., Vancouver, Clark County, Washington, had lived in Clark County Washington all her life. She died at the Clark County General Hospital in Vancouver attended by Dr. R.W. Armstrong of Vancouver. The funeral was 12 Aug 1938 3 PM at KNAPP CHAPEL with Reverend Lawrence W. Wells of Vancouver. Ordered by and charged to husband "Dick" (Richard) Leonard. Parents were Charles Goddard (1844-1906 born in Troy, Davis County, the son of Joseph Hill Goddard and Hester Ann Hendricks, (who was one of the first school teachers of Clark County, Washington). They came over the Oregon Trail in 1852 with 8 children and arrived in November in Hazel Dell, Clark County, Washington. Mother was Mary Jane Alexander (1848-1906 born in Illinois); (she and her husband Charles Goddard are buried in Salmon Creek/Goddard Cemetery. Ref: #1 #3, #4 & #6 (1871 & 1880 Census).

#### **DETRICH, MARY ELDA**

A.J. REMINGTON, of Mill Plain, was accidentally shot in the neck by GEORGE **DAVID**, on Wednesday evening last, under the following circumstances: A party consisting of REMINGTON, DAVID and some others started on a deer hunt, separating with a view of completing the circuit of a wood. Fatigued by the walk REMINGTON seated himself on a log to rest. Approaching from the rear **DAVID's** attention was attracted by REMINGTON's red shirt and bare head. Being dusk, he mistook the object before him for adeer and fired, the ball striking **REMINGTON** in the back of the neck. slightly to the left of the center, tearing the cords of neck and flesh of the cheek in a frightful manner. DR. I.L. TOBEY was immediately called and the wound dressed. Though a dangerous wound, hopes are entertained that no farther serious consequences will ensue than a partial disfigurement of the face.

The case of the Territory of Washington against THOS J. # HINTS FOR YOUR RESEARCH TRIP TO SALT LAKE

I can still remember how excited I was when I went on my first trip to the Family History Library at Salt Lake. CCGS had a meeting in December to help us prepare for the January trip. We were urged to prepare so we could spend our valuable time in research rather than looking up call numbers.

Lorie Okel gave us a good piece of advice: check the Family Histories first. This way, you can see what others have done and use what their research has yielded when you begin to document your own families. I was really surprised to find a book that was directly linked to my Squire line!

Lorie also gave some really practical advice. Be sure to wear layers of clothing. In January it will be cold outside and usually very warm inside. One year we had a particularly cool winter here in Clark County and I packed a lot of sweaters. The area in which I was doing research was very warm and I had to try to find some short sleeved blouses. Another year, the basement floor was very cool in the microfilm readers' section but roasting on the fourth floor when I was looking at US census films.

Others advised taking along some mints (and ointment for the nose), as the air system is very drying. Remember to get up and drink water – it is easy to get dehydrated.

A research log is a good tool to use in organizing your search. It's a chart with title across the top that might include call number; type of source, title of source, surnames you are searching, date, and research results. Sharon Wodtke uses a highlighter to indicate those she has reviewed. This emphasizes those sources still needing to be searched.

When I went to the Archives in Seattle, I made a search sheet specifically for census records. If you have a lot of census films to review, you may want to make one too. My titles across the top included film #, census year, state, surnames, and search results. The Federal censuses at Salt Lake are very conveniently located by time and locale, so don't waste time filling out the numbers "at home" – but be sure to fill them in when you are there so you have an accurate record of your source. (Hurray for the librarian who thought up this time-saving organized system!)

Be sure to take paper for notes. I will include some colored sheets for help when viewing microfilm – sometime a color will heighten the ability to make out difficult reading. A magnifying glass is helpful to have as well.

The same courtesy applies here that you should be practicing at any library. Don't write in the books –in pen or pencil. I have seen books with red ink underlining an entry. I can only hope that the researcher marked up here own copy and donated the book to the library later. What a shame for later researchers.

Kind words are always welcome. Whether staff is volunteer or paid, be polite. You may be repaid with some help you didn't anticipate. "Thank you" and "you're welcome" should be second hand for any researcher.

Most of us don't mind a rare restrained "I found him!" We get all excited and it can be refreshing to our own research. But I've been annoyed when the broadcast was loud and long. Keep your voice soft and conversations very short in research areas. If you are planning a strategy with a fellow researcher, go to an area with conversation is allowed.

Sometimes there are limits on equipment use. For example, there are frequently long lines at the copy machines. It is fair that the maximum number of copies to be made is eight or ten (check). The line moves quickly when the rule is obeyed. In general, early morning is a good time to copy from books. And go up prepare to copy quickly. I use lined index cards to mark pages, facing the lines to the page I want to copy (and using two for facing pages). The glue from sticky tabs can eventually damage books, so don't use them, except on your personal copies.

Don't forget the title page when making copies – you will be able to cite your source accurately.

We used to need to bring rolls of dimes and quarters, but now you will want to bring singles and five dollar bills for the coin machines.

Be sure to check what to do with items you have reviewed. Books may need to be placed at the end of book shelves and microfilms replaced in drawers. Libraries vary – follow the rules where you are.

Hate to say it, but neatly dressed people just plain get more help. And a question of WHERE ARE the records rather than DO YOU HAVE will probably get more results. In public libraries use "local history" rather than "genealogy" when approaching librarians who sometime turn pale at the g-word. Check the open hours before visitng.

# QUESTIONNAIRE RESULTS:

Thanks for returning the questionnaire, which appeared in the last issue of the TrailBreakers. Over two hundred members responded (just under half). Still not too late, if you want to dig it out and mail it in. The results will be helpful in targeting the interest of the members. Here are some of the results:

Of the fifty states, only Hawaii was not checked as a research target! Florida and Arizona had one check mark, and little Rhode Island had seven. Surprisingly, Washington state did come in with the highest numbers (70), but it was ver closely followed by Illinois (66), Missouri (65), and Pennsylvania (61). New York and Oregon both tallied 55 and Indiana (47) and Iowa (48) were next in line.

Germany came in as the second most frequents researched country with 108 tallies. England drew 127 tallies, Ireland 85, Scotland 60 [and Canada also 60], thus giving the British Isles and a whooping majority. Even Australia drew one tally. And we have a member researching Azores, one Mexico, and one Greece. The Scandinavian countries tallied up with Denmark 16, Finland 7, Norway 23, and Sweden 21 for a total of 66. France drew 26 marks.

Interest groups showed the "Help, I'm Stuck" as the most needed. British Isles, Midwestern states, and New England came in with strong numbers. With room in the new library, watch for something to happen in response to this arena.
