

# UNPUZZELING THE SOUNDEX CODE

Soundex is a finding aid which indexes names that sound similar in a grouping using the first letter of the surname and three numbers representing sounds of constants in the name.


These codes are very useful when trying to locate a name. Most researchers think of the codes in terms of census records, but they can be used to find naturalization records and passenger lists as well. The International Soundex Reunion Registry uses this system as well. Many states have indexed records as well. Washington state is one example: the death certificates are indexed by soundex.

The system has some drawbacks. For example, Philpott and Fillpot sound alike but would have separate codes because the first letter in the surname differs. The 1880 soundex limited their indexing to families with children 10 and under. In Illinois, part of the "O" listing was missed in filming (a separate printed index is available). Perhaps the biggest drawback is that simply more data is not soundexed.

Many genealogical software programs contain a soundexing section and all you need to do is to type in the name. Or you can visit the NARA Soundex Machine at http://www.nara.gove/genealogy/soundex/soundex.html. CCGS (and probably many societies and libraries) has Bradley W. Steuart's The Soundex Reference Guide, which lists the soundex, codes to over 125,000 surnames. Even with that many names, one student in our beginning classes found a name that was not listed: PFOST. Pfoust (P230) and Pfouts (P320) were listed.

The first letter of the code is simple: it's just the first letter of the name. The following three numbers will be a 0 or 1

through 6. Zeros are used to complete the three-digit code when needed. Vowels (a, e, i, o, u) and pseudo-vowels h, w, y (or w, h, y) are excluded. The constants are then divided into groups that sound similar. 1 represents **b** (the first vowel in our alphabet) and the letters that sound similar: p, f, and v. 2 represents c (the next vowel which does not sound like 1 and do sound like c): s, k, g, j, q, x, z. 3 represents d and the t which sounds similar. So far this is easy to remember: 1 is b plus similar, 2 is c plus similar, and 3 is d plus similar. 4 represents the next in the alphabet which has not yet been assigned: the letter 1. No other letters sound like an 1. 5 represent the next vowel, which is m, and n, which is similar. 6 is the last number and represents the **r** which is the only vowel not yet assigned. If you are caught someplace without access to a soundex coding reference, you may remember just enough to get you in the ballpark to play the game. The first three vowels after the initial surname letter are used in the code, with a few exceptional rules.



**STEP 1:** Write the surname you are coding. At first you will want to leave enough space between letters to add the code as a superscript (small

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number above the letter – remember the 2 in  $E=mc^3$ ), later you will not need to do this.

EXAMPLE: Switzler: Switzler Switzler

**STEP 2.** Just under the "spaced" name, write the first letter of the name:

EXAMPLE: 
$$\underline{S} \underline{w} \underline{i} \underline{t} \underline{z} \underline{l} \underline{e} \underline{r}$$

**STEP 3.** Cross out all vowels, remembering that the w is a pseudo vowel:

EXAMPLE: 
$$S \times \underline{\underline{t}} \underline{t} \underline{z} \underline{1} \underline{\underline{e}} \underline{r}$$

**STEP 4.** This leaves the constants t,z,l and r. Only the first three are coded: the t is 3, the z is 2 and the l is 4 as shown by the superscripts:

EXAMPLE: 
$$\underline{S} \underset{S}{\underline{\mathbf{w}}} \underline{\mathbf{i}} \underline{\mathbf{t}}^3 \underline{\mathbf{z}}^2 \underline{\mathbf{l}}^4 \underline{\mathbf{e}} \underline{\mathbf{r}}$$

**STEP 5.** Bring the numbers down to complete the code:

EXAMPLE: 
$$\underline{S} \overset{\underline{\mathbf{w}}}{\underline{\mathbf{i}}} \overset{\underline{\mathbf{i}}}{\underline{\mathbf{t}}^3} \overset{\underline{\mathbf{z}}^2}{\underline{\mathbf{l}}^4} \overset{\underline{\mathbf{e}}}{\underline{\mathbf{r}}}$$

The code for Switzler is S324.

LONG NAMES: example above, only the first three constants are coded, disregard other from the code. The r, which is coded with the number 6, is not coded in the name Switzler. The three-digit code is S324, not S3246.

**SHORT NAMES:** use zero to complete the three-digit code:

EXAMPLE A: Coe =  $C \Theta e$  = C 000: The C is the first letter is coded and vowels are stricken out, thus the code is completed with three zeros

EXAMPLE B: Byers = Byer<sup>6</sup> s<sup>2</sup> = B620. B is the first letter, the next two are vowels, the r is a 6, the s is a 2 and the zero is needed to complete the three-digit code.

PREFIXED NAMES: Prefixes like Van, Von, De, Di, La or Le should be coded both with

and without the prefix. (Mc and Mac are not considered prefixes.

EXAMPLE A: Van Leuven =  $V a n^5 L^4$  e  $u v^1 e n = V541$ . The first letter V is used, vowels deleted, the n is 5, the l is 4, the v is 1.

EXAMPLE B: Van Leuven =  $L e u v^1 e$   $n^5 = L150$ . The prefix Van is not used and the first letter L begins the code. The vowels are struck out, the v is 1 and the n is 5. A zero is added to complete the three-digit code.

#### NAMES THAT BEGIN WITH A

**VOWEL:** Vowels are not deleted when they are the first letter in the name. They are used as the letter in the code.

EXAMPLE: Abel =  $A b^2 e 1^4 = A240$ The A is used to begin the code, b is 2, the letter 1 is 4, and a zero added to complete the code.

#### NAMES WITH DOUBLE LETTERS:

Double letters in names are treated as one letter. The second letter in Lloyd is not coded. In Chappell, both the double p and double l are treated as one.

EXAMPLE A: Lloyd =  $L \cdot 1 \cdot 9 \cdot y \cdot d^3 = L300$ . L is the first letter, the second letter is deleted because it is double, and the o and y are deleted because they are vowels, the d is coded 3 and two zeros are added to complete the code.

EXAMPLE B: Chappell =  $C + a p^1 p e$   $1^4 = C140$ . The primary letter C starts the code. The h, a, and e are vowels and deleted; so are the second p and l. Spellings like Chapel, Chappel, and Chappelle will have the same C140 code.

### NAMES WITH LETTERS SIDE BY SIDE THAT HAVE THE SAME NUMBER ON THE SOUNDEX CODING GUIDE:

Remember the surname Pfost? P and F both are coded with a 1, so the f is crossed out. Letter combinations such as ck, cks, or, sc as in sch (the h is a pseudo vowel), are coded as one letter.

EXAMPLE A: Pfost = Pfos<sup>2</sup> t<sup>3</sup> = P230. The f is in the same group at P and is not used, o is a vowel, s is a 2, and t is a 3. One zero needs to be added. Scott = Seo t<sup>3</sup> t = S300. Schafer = Sehaf<sup>1</sup> er<sup>6</sup> = S160. In these cases, because S and c or S, c and h are coded the same.

EXAMPLE B: Dickeson =  $D i c^2 k s e$   $n^5 = D250$ . D is the first letter. Vowels i and o are deleted. Because c, k, and s are all coded 2, only the first of this series receives a code. A zero completes the code.

EXAMPLE C: Lukaschowsky =  $L tt k^2$  a  $s^2 e h o w s^2 k y = L 222$ . The coding is for k,s,s. Note that even though two "s"s are "double" they are separated in the name by letters that are not coded, so the second s is coded right after the first s. Vowels u, a, o (and y) are deleted. the sch are in the same group and only the s is coded; c an h are deleted. The next s is coded and the k would be deleted because it is in the same group as the s; however, we already have three numbers in the code and it is not used.

**SPECIAL CASES:** Phonetically spelled oriental and Indian names were sometimes code as if one continuous name, or may have used a single name. Shinka-Wa-Sa may be S520 for Shinka or S000 for Sa. Susan Thunder Cloud

could be coded under Thunder Cloud (T536) or just Cloud (C430). One name names are coded as a surname would be: Sacajawea or Sacagawea (the j and g are in the same number code) would be S220. Nuns were often recorded using Sister (S236).

Sometime the researcher needs to investigate various possibilities of coding names. Stewart, Stuart, Steuart, Stuart, Steward, Steuard, and Stuard all sound alike and are all coded S363. However, Velassaquez and Belassquez both sound alike and one is coded V422 and the other B422 because of the initial letter. Schope and Chope sound alike and one is S100, the other C100.

Next issue how: to find the 1880 soundex card and what does it tell you.

# GUY SODEN: Spanish American Soldier

(This letter was apparently written by Sarah S. Soden before her marriage in 1902 to Frederick Mathys, as she signed it with her maiden name. I have put some corrections in parenthesis to make it easier to read. PMB)

"Guy Belden Soden, son of Thomas Soden and Kate Belden Soden, was born July 25, 1875 at the Village of Dunkirk in the township of Dunkirk (Dane County, Wisconsin). (He) Was named Guy after Guy Giant (Gaunt), the owner of the Warwick Castle at Warwickshire, England, his Grandfather (Benjamin) Soden was raised near the castle.

He (young Guy) and his parents lived at Dunkirk 'till April 1877 when they migrated to Kansas, crossed the Missouri River the 4th day of May, 1877, landed in Kansas in June, 1877, the year of the flood . . . the largest flood ever known in Kansas.

(They) settled at Eagle Township, Sedgwick, Kansas and remained there until July 23rd, 1887 when we left Kansas and came to the west. (We) Lived near Portland in Oregon a short time and then we went to Washington and settled near Ridgefield and Guy's parents have been there ever since. Guy made one trip to Astoria, Oregon and several times went to Silverton hoppicking. Guy enlisted at Vancouver Barracks on June 26th. 1896 and when the war broke out Guy, with his regiment, the 14th W.S. Infantry regulars, left Vancouver on May 7th, 1898. Guy was made Corporal May 23rd, 1898 at Presidio; left Presidio May 24th, 1898 for Manila. He left Honolulu June 4th, 1898; left Guam Island June 23, 1898 and landed at Manila July 1st, 1898.

(His) First engagement with the Spanish (was) August 5, 1898. And captured Manila August 13, 1898. He was wounded in the battle of August 5 and again Feb 5th, 1899 in a battle with the Insargents. (He) died of his wounds Feb 6th, 1899 at Manila and was buried at Manila Feb 6, 1899. (His remains) were taken up and brought back to Vancouver and buried Feb 8th, 1900 in the Soldier's cemetery at Vancouver Barracks, Clarke County, Washington.

Written by Guy's sister, Sarah Subrina Soden, Who was born May 23rd, 1883 at Eagle township, Sedgwick County, Kansas."

The preceding item was among some things that Sarah Subrina SODEN Mathys had written about her family during her younger years. It gives some information about her brother Guy Belden Soden and is in Sarah's handwriting. It gives several facts about the Soden family which are quite interesting and will aid us in tracing the family roots in years to come.

The letter describes how the Soden family consisting of Thomas Soden, his wife Kate Rose Belden Soden and their eight children came to Clark County and settled in the Ridgefield area in 1887. There are many incorrectly spelled words which I have left somewhat as they were. In some cases, I have added words, such as: (He) and have corrected some of the things to make it more readable.

## CLARK COUNTY SPANISH-AMERICAN SOLDIERS

PART 2 by Jane Germann

The last issue of the Trail Breakers presented the first part of this series. Following are extracts from the *Vancouver Independent* concerning the Spanish American War:

One of the first news articles in the *Vancouver Independent* was printed on page 3 in the May 5, 1898 issue:

# OFF TO THE WAR Company H, National Guard, Left Vancouver Last Saturday

Vancouver has contributed her quota to the call of the president. Company H, 60 men strong, boarded the Undine last Saturday at one o'clock, bade goodbye to their friends and sailed for the war. The boys were busy all Saturday forenoon preparing for their departure, and at 12:30 the assembly was sounded, and the brave boys in blue fell in for the march to the boat. After the friends had been given an opportunity to pass down the line, and bidding a fond farewell, the 14th Infantry band formed in front of the Auditorium, and followed by Co H. went up 3<sup>rd</sup> street to Main and down Main to the wharf. where amid hurrahs, goodbyes and strains of "The Girl I Left Behind Me," by the band, they boarded the boad and pulled out for Portland. About 200 Vancouverites followed them to Portland, where they took the train for the Sound. They are now comfortably in camp at Camp John R. Rogers, near Tacoma.

Capt. M. F. Ellrich commanded the company. The following are the non-commissioned officers: 1<sup>st</sup> sergeant, James Reed; 2<sup>d</sup> sergeant, Bud Smith; 3<sup>rd</sup> sergeant, Geo. Bundy; 4<sup>th</sup> sergeant, O.J. Clancy, 1<sup>st</sup> corporal, Frank Dupuis; 2<sup>nd</sup> corporal, Glen Ranck; 3d corporal, Geo. Wait; 4<sup>th</sup> corporal, Arthur Fletcher; 5<sup>th</sup> corporal, Chas. Hasson; 6<sup>th</sup> corporal, J.H. Moore, 7<sup>th</sup> corporal, Toby Hendrickson.

Thirty-five men from Seattle have been added to the company, bringing the quota to 100 men.

In a private letter received from one of the boys, it is learned that they are getting along all O.K. and expect to go to the seat of the war in the near future.

Over the time of the war, many articles appeared in the newspaper. The Barracks was an integral part of Vancouver and sometimes their news was report as local news and sometimes in a special column. The following are some of the many of the articles printed.

#### OFF FOR THE SOUTH

### Fourteenth Regiment Leaves for the Presidio

For the fourth time in as many months this garrison has witnessed the departure of a portion of the Fourteenth Infantry. Saturday afternoon the last of the regiment left on the steamer Undine for Portland, enroute to San Francisco. The battalion was commanded by Major C.F. Robe. and consisted of the Fourteenth infantry band, companies C, D, E and F. Company C was in charge of First Lieutenant William S. Biddle and Second Lieutenant L.R. Krauthoff; D was commanded by captain William W. McCammon; E by Second Lieutenant P.L. Miles, and F by Captain J. Murphy; First Lieutenant J. Mitchell and Second Lieutenant William A. Burnside. Each company numbers about 55 men. First Lieutenant C.H. Martin and Second Lieutenant O.E. Hunt, respectively quartermaster and adjutant, comprise the personal staff of Major Robe. No medical attendant could be spared to accompany the troops. The battalion formed on the parade ground at 12:30 p. m. and marched to the wharf, through town, by way of Tenth street to Main, and down Main to the wharf. A special committee appointed by Mayor Brewater requested Major Robe to march the troops through the city, as special preparations had been made to demonstrate the regard in which the men

were held. At the landing they were met by a large number of friends, and were given an opportunity to say the last hasty farewell, and amid cheers by hundred they left at 1:30 p.m.

It is appreciated by all that this may be the last seen of the Fourteenth infantry, which has been here nearly 14 years, and has made itself very popular in both Vancouver and Portland, and it was with much regret that it took its departure. The city was decorated with flags and bunting, and business houses closed their doors between 12 m. and 1 p.m.

Captain F. Taylor, of company E, will join his company as soon as he is relieved from duty as mustering officer in Washington.

Companies A and G, now at Dyea, Alaska, under command of Brigadler-General T.M. Anderson, have been ordered to join the regiment at the Presidio. They are expected to arrive there in about 10 days. *Vancouver Independent*, May 12, 1898, p3.

J.N. Walden, an enlisted man in company E. Thirty-fifth infantry, United States volunteers, committed suicide by taking poison, at the Hotel Columbia, in this city last Sunday. He hired a room at this hotel Saturday, in the afternoon. The proprietor suspected something wrong and bout 4 o'clock broke in the door. The body was found lying in a natural position in the bed. An ounce vial marked "hydro cyanic acid," was empty on the table; also a vial of chloroform, contents untouched. He left several letter, one of which was addressed to Mrs. Laura Walden, Stone Fort, Ill. Walden enlisted at Seattle, Aug. 3. He was a lawyer by profession and has practiced in Chicago. His body was buried Tuesday in the government cemetery. Vancouver Independent, 21 Sept. 1899, p. 3.

**E.E. Lyons**, formerly of Cedar creek [Amboy], has enlisted with the Oregon volunteers and was at Presidio, Cal., when last heard from, expecting to go to the Phillipines. *Vancouver Independent*, June 2, 1898, p1.

During the first part of the war, several letters from boys in the service were sent home and published in the paper. Below is one:

#### From One of the Boys

Fort Mason, Black Point, Old Fountain Warehouse; San Francisco, Cal. May 27, 1898. – Don't let any exaggerated reports disturb your confidence in the huskiness of Co. G. In the matter of foot-wear some of us may be nearer to nature's heart than we have been since our barefoot days, but our digestions are still doing business at the old stand. Afternoon of the day before yesterday some of the fair ladies of San Francisco decided that U.S. rations were not enough for the vancouver boys and presented this company with a wagon lad of good things, which were a welcome variation to bacon and beans, and duly enjoyed.

But about 7 p.m. the boys began to cave in, and by 8 o'clock 57 of us were laid out cold. It was undoubtedly due to lead poisoning from the can in the devilled ham and though we could not doubt the honesty of the ladies' intentions, for a while it looked like a plot to wipe company G off the roster. And when this got around and the boy's imaginations began to get in its work, you should have seem them fade.

About 25 per cent of them actually got sick from Spanish dope on the brain, and the balance had the genuine thing, beginning with chills and ending with that tired feeling. Tom **Geoghegnan** [sic] and I missed it, but if it happens again I would rather be bit myself than put in another night as nurse in the sea-sick ward. Have not slept or had my clothes off for 48 hours, and am going to sleep all day when I get a chance.

Acting hospital steward **Tom Geoghegan** had his hands full, for the first time since he took the ferry at Vancouver. It was his first professional job with us, and we just naturally clouded up and rained on him.

Only 21 men out of 80 reported for breakfast this morning, but no one is seriously ill. An accident like that is likely to attend the eating of canned menat at any time in this balmy climate, but it won't happen to us again, as the doctor has condemned all we have on hadn.

The prospect of our being ordered to the front is not very bright, but you can bet that we will be on the move before tht third battalion at the barracks, or that second call company gets on the road. What is the use of being a politician if you can't influenece the war department?

Vancouver Independent, June 2, 1898 p. 3

AFTER RECRUITS. - Capt. M.F. Ellrich, accompanied by Sergts. Reid, Collins, Drake and Dorr, arrived in Vancouver last Saturday evening and on Sunday morning opened a recruiting office in the office formerly occupied by Justice Clancy. They wanted 26 recruits for Co. G. and by Tuesday morning has secured 17, which were sent to San Francisco Tuesday afternoon under charge of A. Comerford, formerly of Troop E, 4th Cavalry. . . . # OUR BOYS IN CALIFORNIA From Glenn Ranck.

EDITOR INDEPENDENT: -- We "rookies" for Vancouver's Company G, arrived in cmap Thrusday morning. The old boys were very glad to see us. They did not know who were coming or when we would arrive, and the first intimation

they had of or presence was when Charles Weaton, Fred Tempes, and a few of the other, spied us from the windows of the old Fontana warehouse. We could hear them shout to the others in the barrack-room: "There's Dutch Waite; there's Cochran", and so on. Then came a rush to the windows and a loud chorus of "hollos".

This was followed by a stampede down the stairs and a regular round of hand-shaking. Corporal Henrichsen was first in the race down stairs but he was closely followed by Arthur Fletcher, Nick Goeghegan, Spurgeon, Lawrence, and others.

"The rookies" who reached camp Thursday, were: J. Benham, Nicholas Clancy, Arthur Cochran, Comeford, Fleming, M.L. Kays, George and Mort Mills, O'Donnell, Powell, Glenn Ranchk, Ray, Strohm, Goerge Waite, Walker, Wilson and James Wolf. On Friday these were followed by four more, J.E. Goddard, J.W. Kays, Rigger and Trisler. These wer also joyously welcomed.

The boys are all well and happy now, though Private **Brown** is still quite weak form his recent severe illness. Under the able management of Captain **Ellrich**, lieutenant **Weigle** and 1<sup>st</sup> Sergeant Reid, the company has attained a commendable state of discipline. During the absence of the captain, on recruting service, the company is in charge of 2d Lieut. **Weigle** who maintains the spirit and discipline of the company. . . . Angel Island. The Washington boys should certainly be thankful that they are not stationed at Camp Merritt, where six death have occurred among the Kansas regiment alone. . . . Among these brave heroes, who so gallantly devour their share of government rations, may be mentioned Corporal Harry Moore and privates George Foster, Louis Brant, George Spurgeon and Roy Parcel. ... Private Brown is still in the post hospital here. ... Other patients from our company are privates Bush and Scribner, who ailments are very slight. . . . Sergeant Bundy did not participate in the swimming contest last Sunday. Instead of that he went to Oakland and called on a charming young Jewess. . . . [Six new corporals listed: Burke, Talkenbery, Comerford, Limbaker, Ranck, Ray.] Vancouver Independent, July 28, 1898, p3.

#### MILITARY MATTERS.

Eighteenth Infantry, who is reported to have died enroute to Manila, was the eldest son of Colonel H.G. Lazelle, retired who was major of the Fourteenth infantry some years ago, and while stationed here made a large number of friends in the town and post, who will regret his untimely death. Lieutenant Lazelle was a graduate of the military academy, and was appointed second lieutenant of the Eighteenth Infantry. Vancouver Independent, July 28, 1898, p3.

# FROM A VANCOUVER BOY AT SANTIAGO

The following letter has been received fro George Damphoffer by Mrs. A. Bateman, his mother, from Santiago De Cuba where Damphoffer is serving in Co. B, 16<sup>th</sup> U.S. Infantry. He was born in Vancouver and lived here until he enlisted in the 16<sup>th</sup> over two years ago.

Santiago De Cuba, July 7.

I guess you think I am dead, and it is a wonder I am not, for you can bet the old 16th Infantry go to smell powder all right for three days.

The battle started on July 1<sup>st</sup> just three miles form the city, and we fought all day the first and captured a big hill, which is called Fort Cinanon,

and have hold possession for seven days, and God knows how much longer we will hold it, but we have the --- Spaniards just where we want them. They have a white flag hoisted up for us not to fire on them, and our general has given them three days to surrender, and if they don't we will blow them to h---.

We lost lots of our men in the first day's fight. I remember how grandpa used to talk about the war, and how the bullets used to sing over his head, and I did not believe it, but I do now, for then this charge when we captured the big hill men dropped all around me and the bullets would sing past my head like hail stones, but I guess God will spare me to see dear mother again. I know you are worrying about me, but you must not for if I must dies on the battlefield I ca. I was brave for it is better to be a dead hero than a living coward.

We will commence to make a charge on the town if they don' surrender in a few days, and I think they will for we have got the town surrounded and can starve them out. Santiago is a pretty place. We can look right into it form where we are camped on the big hill and if they con't come to time we will blow them off the earth. Sampson can throw shells into the town, and we have big guns planted on this hill. I t is a sad sight to see the women and children running out on the hill for fear the town will be destroyed.

Don't worry if you don't hear form me often for we are allowed to write only two letters a month. Save all the paper about the war for I want to see them when I come home to the old United States.

# Library & Archival Research

### **Public Libraries**

Public Libraries located in the primary areas where your ancestors resided will be of particular importance. Many if not all of these libraries will have collections on the Pioneers of its geographic area. This means that valuable primary materials are just waiting for your inspection. If you are unable to travel to your library of choice, when you write your letter, you may wish to ask if they have a list of researcher's. Not all library research departments are set up to do long distance research for you. When writing do not forget your SASE

The Antioch/Central Library of the Johnson County Library System offers a special array of materials to the beginning and advanced genealogist alike. The collection, which offers researchers approximately 6,000 titles, is jointly owned by the Johnson County Genealogical Society and the County Library. The focus of research materials at this library covers the migratory pathways of immigrants starting out at the Atlantic coast to Kansas. Primary emphasis centers on the states of Kansas, Missouri, Illinois. Kentucky, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Virginia. The collection is added to on a regular basis by the Library and the Genealogical Society and is designated as reference material, which for us means (non-circulating), so ask for a researchers list and see if you can hire your research done at this library unless you can travel there yourself.

Johnson County Library provides an excellent selection of the standard titles for genealogical research along with federal and state census indexes, family histories, heraldry books and census microfilm for Johnson County, Kansas for the years 1855-1925. Also available are more than 70 state and general genealogy journals as well as the *PERSI* index (Periodical Source Index) of articles in over 2,000 genealogical journals. The library also stocks the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) applications on microfilm and offers researchers the opportunity to research obituaries of Johnson County, Kansas, dating from 1977 to the present. Those who are engaged in Civil War research will find the Roll of Honor lists which name the Union soldiers who died in battle. Also available are the Confederate Military History Volumes (17 volumes by state)

Johnson County Library offers a strong selection of local history materials of particular importance to anyone doing research for this area. Included are the Native Sons Collection of letters. diaries, and reports from the archives of the Native Sons of America of Kansas City, Missouri. This set is on 15 reels of microfilm and covers the years 1855-1950. The Jotham Meeker Papers (1825-1864) and the Isaac McCoy papers (1808-1874), both Indian missionaries are available. Of particular interest to historians and genealogists alike is the March of America Series. This series encompasses 101 volumes of diaries and journals of the people who partook in the western migration. A helpful brochure is available on the entire genealogy and local history collection.

Johnson County Library has a special

"KANSAS ROOM" in their new library.
Researchers using the materials will find plenty of assistance from a full-time specialist and multiple volunteers. Additionally the library has purchased CD-ROM products for genealogists.

The Porter County Public Library currently offers family historians nearly 9,000 books, 5,000 reels of census microfilm, and 10,000 microfiche including the I.G.I. in its *Special Collection of Genealogy and Local History*. This collection has a scope of all 50 states, Canada, and Europe with a special concentration on the Midwest, east, and southeast United States.

The Genealogy Department of Porter County Public is the third largest of its kind in Indiana with over 100,000 items used annually. Researchers will find an abundance of microfilmed records, books, and journals which are published by historical and genealogical societies. County and family histories are here along with indexes to

federal censuses; pension records; estate records; ships passenger lists; and vital records. Of notable interest are the cemetery records and inscriptions. The library also offers genealogists most of the Automated Archives CD-TOM products along with the American Genealogical Lending Library products. The collection, as a whole, has been designated as Reference. (Non-circulating).

Porter County Public is very strong in services to the genealogist. They emphasize that they will answer any queries received by mail or telephone. Queries must be <u>specific</u>. There is a service charge ranging from \$2.50 - \$5.00 for queries requiring an answer via mail and all written queries must be accompanied by an SASE. Inhouse assistance is provided to those visiting the library whether a beginner or a seasoned reacher. Additionally, the library cooperates with the Northwest Indiana Genealogical Society who hold their meetings at the library. The society also donates to the collection.

In addition to the numerous sources at this location, the library has plans to merge its Indiana collection (local history) into the genealogy materials. Also public service is strong in the arena of genealogical seminars and public service speakers. frequent programs are presented to children and adults, both off and on the premises. The Genealogy Department sponsors beginner's workshops, school trips and talks to local civic groups.

For those of you who subscribe to <u>"Everton's Genealogical Helper"</u>, don't forget to check your May-June issue each year. They list all the Genealogical Libraries by: Foreign Countries and in the United States. Note: Two infant daughters are buried in same plot (1) died 22 Jan 1906 and (2) died 29 Jan 1907. There must have been a Catholic picnic at Bachelor's Slough in Vancouver for Eva Trombley was also downed at the same time. He was attended to by the Clark County Coroner. He was married, Catholic, home address not listed. The funeral was 2 Aug 1911 at St. James Cathedral with Reverend Father Felix Verwilghen. Pall bearers were: James J. Waggoner, E.E. Bennett, Jacob Westhoff, George H. Farrah, Edward W. Opdyke and John McGurn. Charges were not listed. Parents were Ranee Thibodeau (b. Jan 1830 French Canada) and Marv Thibodeau (b. Jul 1841 French Canada). They were naturalized citizens in 1878. Ranee probably had a brother Alexander Thibodeau (1840-1878) who was priest at St. James Parish for he is buried in St. James Cemetery. Rance Thibodeau was a farmer and they had a daughter Louise (b. Jun 1883 in Missouri) and a married son, Alexander, (May 1861-1925) a logger who was married to Amanda who is Int. in NE 97-5 Line 16. Ref:#3, #4 & #6 (1900 Census).

#### THIBODEAU, INFANT (Female)

b. 22 Jan 1906 Vancouver, Clark County, Washington, d. 23 Jan 1906 died of ignition, age 1 day. Int. 23 Jan 1906 in NE 51 Line 3. (has maker " Just a ray of sunshine that drifted beyond the clouds to shine in Heaven." Parents were Mr. & Mrs. Frank Xavier Thibodeau. Ref. #3

#### THIBODEAU, INFANT (Female)

b. 29 Jan 1907 Vancouver, Clark County, Washington, d. 29
Jan 1907 died of ignition, age 00y. Int. 30 Jan 1907 in NE
51 Line 3 (has marker "Just a tiny flower that budded on

earth to bloom in Heaven". Parents were Mr. & Mrs. Frank Xavier Thibodeau. Ref: #3.

Parents were not listed, but John Freeberg maybe the son of Samuel S. Freeberg (born 22 May 1838-24 Sep 1912 in Sweden buried in Elim Cemetery 2/14). In the 1900 Samuel S. Freeberg was a widower (he was married when he died in 1912 and had a daughter (Mrs. H.A. Weist of 347 E. Glison St. Portland, Oregon), Samuel was a farmer who owned 116 acre farm; was a naturalized citizen of the US in 1867. b. Nov 1901 Washington, d. 18 Feb 1957 of a gunshot wound (? suicide), age 55y 9m. Int. 21 Feb 1957 in NE 54-4 Line 6. (SELF) [VANCOUVER FUNERAL CHAPEL]. Parents were John Freeborn (1865-1917) and Jenny () Freeborn (1870-1957). Ref: #3 & #5.

b. 1850 Wisconsin, d. 27 Dec 1906 of cancer of the stomach, age 56y. Int. 30 Dec 1906 in NE 55-2 Line 7. (DELILAH WILKINSON). Married to Delilah Wilkinson. Note: George Wilkeinson may be a brother of John Wilkeson; George was also born in Wisconsin and his parents were born in England). Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

#### **HULFORD, VIRGINIA**

b. (?), d. 30 Dec 30 1906 died of brain disease, age (?). Int. 31 Dec 1906 in <u>NE 55-3 Line 7</u> (JOHN R. HULFORD) Parents were not listed, but may be Mr. & Mrs. John R. Hulford, Ref: #3.

#### JAMES, ARTHUR

b. 1886, d. 18 Jan 1907 died of an abscess of the stomach, age 21y. Int. 19 Jan 1907 in <u>NE 55-4 Line 7.</u> Parents were *Mr. & Mrs. George James*. Ref: #3.

#### HANLY, MAUDE

b. Apr 1894 Nebraska, d. 1 Feb 1907 died of complication of an unknown disease, age 12y 11m. Int. 3 Feb 1907 in NE 55-5 Line 7. (H.C. HANLY) Parents were not listed, but may be H.C. Hanly (b. Aug 1867- in Illinois) lived the West Ward of Vancouver Precinct. [H.C. Hanly's father was born in Illinois and mother in Ireland - a second hand dealer in goods and rented his house] and Norah (b. Jul 1873 in Illinois). Her father and mother were born in New York]. Ref: #3 & #6 (1900 Census).

b. 1873, d. 19 Nov 1906 died of cancer, age 33y. Int. 21 Nov 1906 in NE 56-5 Line 8. (CHARLES S. SEITZ) Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

b. 4 Mar 1887, d. 3 Dec 1906 died in childbirth, age 19y 8m 29d. Int. 6 Dec 1906 in <u>NE 56-4 Line 8.</u> She was married (?) P.A. Helms. **Parents were not listed.** Ref: #3.

b. 1889, d, 12 Sep 1909, age 20y, died of TB of the bowels. Int. 13 Sep 1909 in <u>NE 57-4 Line 9</u>. Parents were not listed, but his father maybe Benjamin McFerrin. Ref: #3.

#### **COMFORT, RICHARD (Infant)**

b. (?), d. 24 Sep 1909, age (?), died of a cerebral hemorrhage. Int. 24 Sep 1909 in NE 57-5 Line 9. Parents were Richard Comfort b. 1845 New Hampshire) and Purnelelia (b. Apr 1847 Wyoming.) Ref: #3.

#### **EATON, FRANCIS LYNN**

b. 14 Dec 1889, d. 12 Feb 1912 typhoid fever, age 22y 1m 29d. Int. 14 Feb 1912 in NE 57-6 Row 9. Disinterred and reburied in Park Hill Lot #89-3 Sec A on 21 Feb 1918. Parents were Edwin Alonzo Eaton (b. 16 Apr 1846 Bradford, Merrimack County New Hampshire-18 Oct 1933 son of John Easton), a carpenter and Mary/Margaret A. ( ) Eaton ( Apr 1852 Pennsylvania-5 Apr 1940) who also had children William E. who married Elizabeth Dague (1870-1914), Frederick Eaton (b. Nov 1890 Washington) and Esther M. (b. Dec 1892 Washington). Ref: #3 & #4.

Hosford), home address not listed, died in the Columbia River near the Northern Pacific Dock in Vancouver, Clark County, Washington. There was no doctor listed. The funeral was 8 May 1911 with no clergy listed. Charged to P. P. Harter of Otsego County, New York and a certificate of burial was sent 8 May 1911 to him. Details: George Harter had on his body a watch a knife a purse with \$1.95 which were delivered to Capt. L.P. Hosford. Parents were not listed, but maybe Mr. & Mrs. P.P. Harter of Otsego County, New York. Ref: #3 & #4.

#### ARNESON CHRISTIANA (Mrs. W.C.)

b. 1858, d. 11 May 1911 died of acute brights disease and paralyses, age 53y. Int. 12 May 1911 in NE 58-2 Line 10. Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

#### **UPDYKE, JENNIE BURHL**

b. 15 Oct 1909, d. 26 Jul 1911 of infantile paralysis, age ly 9m 11d. Int. 27 Jul 1911 in NE 58-5 (NO MARKER - NO RECORD). Child lived at 1008 West 14th St. Vancouver, Clark County, Washington, died at home attended by Dr. C.C. McCown of Vancouver. The funeral was 27 Jul 1911 at home with Reverend J. H. Berrigen. Charged to Edward Opdyke at home. Parents were Mr. & Mrs. Edward Opdyke. Ref: #3.

#### PETERSON, RUBY (Infant)

b. 4 Oct 1921 Clark County, Washington, d. 4 Oct 1921 a premature baby, age 00y. Int. 4 Oct 1921 in NE 58-5 Line 10. Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

#### HATHAWAY, HENRY LEWIS

b. 3 Feb 1859 Washington, d. 26 Mar 1911 of uremic poisoning, age 52y 2m 23d. Int. 29 Apr 1911 in NE 59-1 Line 11. He was married to Frances B. ( ) Hathaway. He was a merchant, lived at 900 West 11th ST. Vancouver, Clark County, Washington, died at home attended by Dr. C.C. McCown. The funeral was 29 Apr 1911 at the I.O.O.F. Hall with Reverend H.S. Templeton. Charge to Mr. Henry L. Hathaway and brother-in-law Clinton C. Gridley (12 Oct 1857-13 Mar 1922 has marker married to Mattie Hathaway). The pall bearers were: James J. Waggoner, Scott Wood, R.H. Bock, A.D. Elwell, M.I. Bishop and C.F. Rossiter. Note: Henry Hathaway was a Washington State pioneer. Parents were Marshall Root Hathaway (1823-1896 Russia, Herckimer County New York) and Maria Smith (1830-1907 Parish Oswego County New York. She was the daughter of Shubel Smith. In 1851 Marshall Root Hathaway and his wife Maria and one daughter, Marie, also Marshall's brother, Jeremiah and his family, started from St. Louis,

Missouri on a wagon train over the Oregon Trail and settled in Portland, Oregon for a couple years; then they took up a Donation Claim on the Washington side of the Columbia River. Ref. #1, #3, #4, #6 (1871 & 1880 Census).

#### RUPE, WILLIAM

b. Sep 1873, d. 20 Aug 1925 died of septicemia, age 51y 11m. Int. 23 Aug 1925 in NE 59-5 Line 11. [FRANCES B. HATHAWAY]. Ref: #3.

b. 1866, d. 22 May 1910 of paralysis, age 44y. Int. 23 May 1910 in NE 60-5 Line 12. She was married to Andrew Nylander (1862-1943) and had children Alfred, Arthur and Edward and Elmer. Parents were not listed. Ref:#1 & #3.

#### **NYLANDER, ALFRED**

b. Sep 1885 Minnesota, d. 14 Dec 1947 no cause of death was listed, age 63y 3m. Int. 17 Dec 1947 in NE 60-3 Line
12. (ANDREW NYLANDER) [COLONIAL MORTUARY- Portland]. Parents were Andrew W. and Anna Nylander both born in Sweden. Ref: #2 & #3.

#### **NYLANDER, EDWARD**

b. 1888, d. Mar 1911, age 23y, no cause of death listed. Int. 4 Mar 1911 in NE 60-1 Line 12 (has marker-"BROTHER"). Parents were Andrew W. (1862-1943) and Annie (1866-1910) Nylander. Ref: #3.

Two Chinamen hired two white men named BROWN and CHARLEY to bring them here in a canoe for \$10, which was paid there. When they had arrived off Smith's Cove, five miles from here, they went ashore saying that they were cold and made a fire, the Chinamen staying with the canoe. The white men called them to come and warm. When they arrived at the place the white men demanded their money. One of them, MING, gave them \$45. The other, AH WUNG, attempted to resist, when the white men seized both and commenced stabbing them. One of the Chinamen cut his antagonist severely in the hand when he let go of him. The white man ran at the Chinaman and grabbed him by the cue, which was pulled out when he made good his escape in the woods. He then returned and found AH WUNG dead, with three stabs in the breast and several other cuts in different parts of the body. The body was brought here, and the Coroner has charge of the remains. Nothing has been heard of the murderers. [2/4]
