



SECOND PATRON COMPUTER ORDERED





CANON 990 MICROPRINTER ARRIVES!



Grant writer Mary Katschke shows off CCGS's new micro-printer to SWIFT representative Mary Clayton. This project was supported in part by a grant from Southwest Washington Independent Forward Thrust (SWIFT). Additional donations were received from the Betty Korff Memorial Fund, the J.C. Penney Golden Rule Award, the Soroptimist International of Vancouver, and the capital reserve fund of Clark County Genealogical Society. The ease of using

this machine was compared to a manual viewer. The new model will load microfilm and the patron can then make adjustments to increase or decrease the viewing image. Screen markers help the viewer select the area to be printed. Both microfilm and fiche can be used on this machine, but different ink cartridges are used in printing. Please check with the librarian to make sure the correct one is in the machine -- using the right one will help prolong the life of the machine. Time saved and the ability for the researcher to have an exact copy are great benefits of this equipment.

CLARK COUNTY SPANISH-AMERICAN SOLDIERS

PART 3 by Jane Germann

Part 3 continues with extracts from the *Vancouver Independent* concerning the Spanish American War. But first is additional information from member Richard Grafton who contributes to our quarterly.

In regards to George Damphoffer, author of one of the letters sent home and published in the newspaper:

Isabel, "Bella," A. Quigley
Damphoffer, the divorced wife of
Louise Damphoffer, married Albert
Bateman on December 8, 1883.
George Damphoffer, born ca 1879 in
Vancouver, WA, the son of Louis and
Isabel Damphoffer came with his
mother into their marriage to Albert
Bateman.

At age 19 years, George enlisted in the U.S. Army at Seattle, WA, April 1898, and was assigned to Company B, 16th Infantry, Fort Sherman, Idaho, before being sent as a musician, to Cuba with his regiment. He was present during the Battle of San Juan, allegedly being mentioned for bravery and promoted to Corporal. (note his letter from Santiago De Cuba dated July 7 1898).

Invalided home to Vancouver on a three month sick leave, then to the Philippine island of Luzon, where he participated with Co. B of the 16th Inf. During the so called Philippine Insurrection. In August 1899, Corporal George Damphoffer, now 20 years old, was arrested along with two companions for "having outraged" a Filipino woman near Manila. Found guilty of rape by a court martial, he was sentenced to be shot to death. After several intercessions by Senator A.G. Foster on behalf of the boy and

his mother, plus Bella Bateman's direct appeal for the life of her son to President William McKinley's wife, Ida Saxon McKinley, Secretary of War, Elihu Root, received these appeals, reviewed the case, and commuted the death sentence to twenty years imprisonment. Thus, George Damphoffer did not die during the Spanish American War [as listed in Part 1].

Private William Patton, Co. G. 14th Infantry, died in the hospital at Honolulu of Typhoid fever, on Aug. 8. Lieut. Hunt and several pirates, of the 14th, are sick at Honolulu, all suffering with typhoid fever.

... Corporal John Hasson has been transferred form Co. G Washington Volunteer to Company M. 14th Infantry, holding his rank of corporal, and will proceed to Manila to join his company.

... Thomas Geoghegan, a Vancouver boy, has been transferred form the Hospital Corp Volunteers, to the regular Hospital Corps, and has been order to proceed to Circle City, Alaska, as assistant Hospital Steward with a battery of the __d Artillery. Vancouver Independent, Aug. 12, 1898, p3.

FROM OLD MANILA.

B. C. Brown, a son of Andrew Brown, enlisted at the first call for volunteers in Co. K, Second Oregon Volunteers, and writes home from Manila as follows:

We landed at the town of Cavite on July 1st and went into quarters in the old Spanish military barracks.

There are situated on a small island together with the town and connected with the main land by a causeway. On the half of the island facing the open bay are the forts and barracks while behind lies the town.

There are thick high stone walls, many of them mounting cannon, but these were silenced by a few shots from Dewey. These walls are about twenty feet high and of equal thickness, and some at least are hollow and contain dungeons as indicated by skeletons, old irons, etc. The description of the prison as given in "Ben Hur" would apply very well to this one. Other parts were used as an arsenals as their contents indicated.

The barracks are long low buildings of stone, brick or concrete without ceilings and with thick tile and plaster roofs. The windows are large and open with hinges or slides to the sides. They are composed of small square of this translucent oyster shell. . . . [a description of the town, working conditions and food follow] . . .

This paper is from an old book of Spanish records which I picked up in the store room for such articles, which had been looted by the insurgents. It bore the dates between 1884 to 1840. I send my love to you and all the many friends.

Glenn Ranck begins his letter printed Sept 15, 1898 with a description of the visit to the San Francisco mint. He talks about himself, Weston, Plaice, Lawrence, Casey O'Donnell, and Corporals Fletcher and Henrichsen being tempted by "flesh pot of Egypt." The letter ended:

The Vancouver boys were deeply saddened to hear of the death of **Harry Huston**. He had many friends there, and we will sadly miss the hearty shake of his hand upon our return.

A VANCOUVER BOY: We take the following form the Chicago Times-Herald. The announcement of the death of Private John Bennett Blake has cast a shadow over more than one household in Hyde Park, where the young man lived with his mother. Blake succumbed to typhoid fever at Santiago, Sept. 19, after playing his part in the campaign and suffering for two weeks from the ravages of the disease. At the beginning of the war Blake five times attempted to enlist, but was dissuaded by his widowed mother, who could not see that she ought to sacrifice her son. Finally however, she consented and Blake enlisted in the 10th I infantry. Finding it impossible to get to Cuba with his regiment, he transferred to the Fifth infantry and went to Santiago. The unexpected news of his death has completely prostrated the mother, and has been received with sorrow by many Hyde Part friends of the young soldier. Private Blake was 20 years old, and was born at Fort Vancouver, Wash., white his father, the late Dr. Alden I. Bennett, of Beloit, Wis., and a nephew of Thomas and Phineas Bennett, both veterans of the civil war. Alden Blake, brother of the dead soldier, lives with the mother in Hyde Park. Vancouver Independent, Oct. 6, 1898, col. 3.

George Damphoffer arrived home last Sunday from Huntsville, Alabama, on a 60 day furlough, and is now with his mother, Mrs. A. Bateman. George enlisted in Co. B, 16th Infantry about tow years ago, and at the outbreak of the war his regiment went to Santiago, where it participated in the fierce fighting. He was with his company when

it charged again the Spaniards at El Caney. Vancouver Independent, Oct. 13, 1898, p. 3.

In another Ranck report:

We have already met two ex-Vancouverites, John Becker, who is here on the Bennington, and Mr. R.C. Geer, who is a resident of Honolulu. Mr. Geer ways that counting Co. G and the boys who went through with other companies – Ralph Wintler, Charles Brant, Calvin White, john Hasson and Tod Moore – it looked as though all the Vancouver boys of his acquaintance had gone to this front. Will Elwell is also here with the engineers. we have not seen him yet, but hear that he is well and hearty. ... Vancouver Independent, Dec 8, 1989 p3.

OUR SOLDIER BOYS AT MANILA.

The stern realities of war have been brought to the doors of Vancouver, and for the past few days every bit of news was eagerly sought, and every list of names of killed and wounded were scanned for names of Clarke county boys. And although the reports have been unsatisfactory, it is settled that several of our boys have stopped Philippine bullets. So far as be ascertained, Oliver J. Clancy, George M. Mills, William J. Kays of Co. G, 1st Washington are wounded, but how seriously is not known. These boys are well known, and further news of their condition is awaited, with interest.

Of the 14th Infantry, many of the boys are killed and wounded. Lieut. **James Mitchell**, 14th Infantry, is amount the killed He leaves a wife, who is prostrated over the sad affair, at the barracks. *Vancouver Independent*, Feb. 9, 1899, p. 3.

Feb. 23, 1899, an article under Military Matters gave a report of the war, but no names were listed with the reports of deaths.

Ranck's report of Mar 2, 1899, mentions sleepy heads like Joe Trisler, Leo Smith, Harry Fleming or The Marine. He continues with a description of the fighting: However, everything has quieted down wonderfully in the last two days.. which is very sad news for such brave warriors as Joe Goddard, Leo Smith, George Duncan and Nick Clancy, as they have been thirsting for a fight ever sin e we came. He continues: ... Yesterday we buried Private Carlisle of Co. I, who was the first one to die in the

Washington regiment in Manila . . . Carlisle was followed to his grave by the entire battalion and was buried with full military honors. ... "Dutch" Waite, who was guarding [the prisoners who refused to work], but when "Dutch" struck him a blow on the head with the butt of his gun, the prisoner concluded to go quietly on the "Noiseless tenor of his way." ... G. Troop has a new top sergeant in the person of Hank Riegle, who succeeded W.V. Cotchett. . . . Last week the Washington regiment celebrated its first pay day in Manila. The pay was for two months and it is needless to add that such fellows as Jim Wolfe. Chape Mills and Sam Lawrence had a high old time. . . As the mail leaves this morning at 9:30 o'clock, I will have to bring this letter to an abrupt close, by sending the compliments of Co. G. boys to Mr. and Mrs. Otis Smith.

FOR CHAPLAIN THOMPSON

Both houses of the legislature passed a joint resolution, presented by **Thacker**.

"Whereas, Rev. John R. Thompson, chaplain of the First regiment, Washington volunteers, is dead at Manila, Philippine Islands, where he was faithfully and heroically serving his country, and

"Whereas, Said decedent was and had been for many years useful and honored citizen of the state of Washington, having served as president of the last territorial council and filled other positions of public trust and honor; therefore, be it:

"Resolved, That he legislature, of the state of Washington regrets the death of Dr. **Thompson** and deplores the loss thus suffered by his regiment and by his state suffered by his regiment and by his state, and that the sincerest condolence is here by tendered to his family, relatives and friends.

"That this resolution be entered upon the house and senate journals and a copy thereof be forward to his regiment, his family and nearest relatives."

W. Byron Daniels of Clarke is the author of the resolution, he being a pioneer acquaintance of the deceased chaplain.

The last report cabled from Manila by General Otis, of the deaths, includes the name of **Henry**O'Flaherty, private in Company L, 2nd Oregon Vol. He was 22 years of age and enlisted in company L at The Dalles last spring. He was born here in

Clarke county, and was a son of **J.E. O'Flaherty**, who lives at Barberton. Henry was quite well known in Vancouver, having attended school in this city several terms. *Vancouver Independent*, Mar. 16, 1899, p. 3.

A Salmon Creek Boy Writes of the Battle of Manila on San Pedro

Macati, Feb 5th 1899

Dear Folks at Home. I have been through a fight and a hard one at that; came out without a scratch. The battle of the 5th of February will be long remembered by the Washington regiment. We lost quite heavily; being second on the list: the Fourteenth was first. We had three men wounded in our company, two of them shot I the arm and Sergt. Clancy shot in the neck, none of the serious. The fight really commenced the 4th about 10 p.m. It was started by the Nebraska regiment, and heavy firing was kept up two hours, then stopped, commencing again about three a.m. along the whole line. Our regiment began firing at blockhouse 11, but our battalion did not commence firing till 6 a.m. We were under heavy fire for about three hours, when a charge was ordered along the whole line. We charged and carried everything before us, and had to wade through a ditch where the mud and water was up to our arm pits, be we got through all right and made the natives get, and I guess some of them are not through running yet. The Idaho regiment was in the charge with us, and also the California regiment.

We are now out to this place about four miles from our quarters. I would have written sooner, but did not have the material to write with. As soon as we get back to quarter I will write all about the battle, which will take several pages. Our battalion charged, and took a hill where there were about 200 natives. We took 88 prisoners, killed 74 and wounded several; we lost four men in that charge. They shot two of our men down under a flag of truce; that is the reason we slaughtered them so.

When we took Santa Anna we were about 2000 strong and the natives between ten and fifteen thousand.

Ralph Wilson and Joe Goddard are all right, so is Jim Wolfe and Mort and Chape Mills. My health keeps good, never felt better. Good-bye

1920 census facts

Enumeration of the census began January 2, 1920 and statistics were to reflect an individual's status on that date even if circumstances changed between that date and the actual date the enumerator took the data. Thus a birth occurring during this space of time should not be recorded and a person who died likewise should be recorded as a part of the census. Enumeration in rural areas was to be done in 30 days and areas of 2,500 population or more were allowed two weeks. However, influenza epidemics and severe winter weather caused delays.

The 1910 census included information on unemployment, Union or Confederate military service, number of children, duration of marriage which is not on the 1920 form. But 1920 included the year of naturalization and native tongue. It also asked arrival and naturalization status of each foreign-born person and

asked about the year of naturalization for those who became citizens: NA = naturalized, PA = declaration filed, AL = alien, NR = not reported. The year of naturalization will be a welcome clue in searching for those records. Prior to 1906, most naturalizations were conducted in local and state (nonfederal) courts. Check first with the county clerk where your ancestor resided. Federal court records are generally kept by region. This was also the first time Guam, American Samoa, and the Panama Canal Zone had been enumerated.

Because the 1920 census was taken soon after WWI. boundary modifications in Europe left individuals uncertain about how to identify their national origin. Enumerators were instructed to spell out the names of the city, state, province, or region of any declaring they or their parents had been born in Germany, Austria-Hungary, Russia, or

Turkey. Servicemen were treated as residents of their duty posts and schedules and a Soundex index for overseas military and naval forces is available. All states have a Soundex index, which makes this census a valuable research tool.

Separate Indian population schedules were not taken and natives were enumerated with the general population schedules. Congress authorized all non-population schedules destroyed, but agricultural schedules for Puerto Rico, HI, Guam, McLean (IL), Jackson (MI), Carbon (MT), Santa Fe (NM) and Wilson (TN) survived. abstracted any mention of a death or implied death. Due to

the severity of poor roads and insufficient rail and telegraph connections in Texas and across the antebellum South, it became paramount for the diffusion and assimilation of news that a reliable means of communication be established. Communication of news was primarily carried out by the mails, stages, steamboats and most importantly the newspaper. The common practice was for editors to place their newspapers on what was called an "exchange list" with other leading newspapers within their region or state. Once an editor received an "exchange" he merely gleaned form its pages political or social items that he found of interest or believed worthy of printing in his local newspaper. Reference is made to fifty-six newspapers published outside of the state of Texas. The book also contains a surname index for the ease of researchers. (Also look for Deaths Volume 2)

She was born in Pontefract, Yorkshire West Riding, England, the daughter of William BARBER or BARBOUR and Betsey or Bessie BUCHLER. The family Bible lists 10 March 1852 as birthday, but it could be christening date.

WILLIAM HARGREAVES:

Born 31 Mar 1849 in Jacksonville, Morgan County, Illinois, the obituaries in the *Oregonian* and *Journal* say he died Monday, 14 September 1931. His parents were Samuel HARGREAVES and Sarah BARBOUR (above).

MARY ELIZABETH
HARGREAVES: Born 27 Aug
1858 near Springfield, Greene
County, Missouri, her parents were
Edward ADAMS, b. Tennessee,
and Fanny Jane McVAY b.
Indiana. Mary and her husband
have six children.

PETER EDWIN (not EDWARD) BUFFAM: Born in Dalhousie Township, Lanark County, Ontario, Canada (although he probably always said he was born in the United States), he came to the US as a very young child. Pat has a copy of his Canadian birth certificate.

LAURA BUFFAM: Born 25 May 1883 in Proebstal, Clark County, WA, she was the daughter of William HARGREAVES and Mary E. ADAMS.

Public Libraries

William Dollarhide and Ronald Bremer will soon have a book on the shelf entitled America's Best Genealogy Resource Center, which will cover in depth Libraries and Archives across the nation. The book will also have chapters on Regional Archives, Vital Statistics Offices, Ethnic Genealogy Resource Centers, Religious and Church Archives, State Land Offices, Secretaries of State and State Adjutant General Offices. It will be published by Heritage Quest and have approx. 1,000 resource centers. Look for it this summer. SW

Supporting the Family and Regional History program at Wallace State College is their library of diverse genealogical materials. Researchers and potential students of the college's family history program have much to gain on the local level by accessing the holdings at this facility.

The notoriety of Wallace State's genealogy courses led the institution's library to make the decision to devote an entire floor to a large genealogy collection of books, periodicals, and microfilmed primary records. Currently, Wallace State's Family and Regional History Program has the only entire set of genealogical CD-ROM's in the Southern U.S.

Family historians will be delighted to learn that a very large periodical collection devoted entirely to genealogy and local history is waiting to be used. The collection, a gift of the North Central Alabama Genealogical Society, has been indexed in the Periodical Source Index (PERSI). Also available is the microfiche to the worldwide

microfilmed family history collection of the LDS Library. Wallace also participates in the American Genealogical Lending Library program in which hundreds of thousands of reels of microfilm can be borrowed for the researcher.

A marvelous array of materials awaits those who visit Wallace State's Library. Included are some fabulous Alabama sources that include censuses, city directories. Cherokee removal troop records and Confederate censuses from 1907. 1921. And 1927. Convict Death Records. from 1884-1952 can be found along with records of the Creek War Troops from the 1830's. Land Office Records and maps round out many of the Alabama sources. Library users will also find Naturalization records, voter lists, obituaries (1950-1979) and a variety of other censuses outside of the standard Federal materials. Among some of the more interesting matter are the Wills. Although incomplete, genealogists will find an index for Wills for the years 1808-1870 for Alabama.

Revolutionary compiled service records and an index to the naval records of the American Revolution are but a sampling of the materials available for this period of history. Wallace State describes the Civil War holdings as AVast@. They have approximately 9,000 regimental and general histories for the North and South and also have the indices to the Federal (Union) Civil War pensions and the index to correspondence of the Federal Pension Office.

Wallace State College Library also offers family historians excellent collections of materials for the following states: Arkansas, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, New York, North Carolina. Much can also be found on the states of Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, The Virginias and Wisconsin.

Material of note at Lawton is the Dr. Melton P. Meek Collection of Southern Genealogy. The set is large, consisting of over 500 albums of documented research on a multitude of primary surnames. Genealogists will be please to learn that this 96- roll collection of microfilm has a 6volume index which may be studied to ease the use of the film. The library also offers the Federal Tract Books of Oklahoma Territory. This material names people who applied for homesteads or Indian Allotments in Oklahoma Territory, but they do not include allotments of the Five Civilized Tribes nor the Osage Indians. Researchers must keep in mind that the set of microfilm does not necessarily follow county lines within the state. The Federal Tract Books are indexed

Lawton Public Library works closely with the Southwest Oklahoma Genealogical Society (SWOGS). The Lawton Chapter of the DAR, the Lawton Chapter of the Daughters of 1812, and the Southwest Oklahoma Historical Society. Services to genealogists include the sale of special SWOGS publications and forms. Because the library's collection is not available through interlibrary loan, researcher may submit their inquiries and the questions will be handled by the Southwest Oklahoma Genealogical Society. The library staff will however copy newspaper obituaries when a death date is supplied.

The Lawton Public Library Family History Room is currently offering researchers a substantial collection consisting of over 6,000 books, and 3,000 rolls of microfilm. It is the second largest genealogical in the state of Oklahoma. This collection primarily deals with Oklahoma and the Southern migration routes; however, the library does offer materials from other states as well.

Lawton Public Library offers all Federal censuses and their indices for the entire state of Oklahoma, the state Tract Books with surname index and the *Indian-Pioneer History Collection* (oral histories collected by the W.P.A.). In addition to the standard fare of family, county, and town histories the library specializes in the records of the Kiowas, Comanches, and Apaches. The Family History Collection of those Indian tribes consists of the 1901 Family Record Book kept by the Kiowa Agency, all Census rolls which form the onset of the reservation period, agency vital records, agency estate records, and a compilation of land records. All these materials have been designated as reference.

Lawton Public Library also offers a superb grouping of census indices for states outside of Oklahoma and many rolls of census film, although the collection is deemed incomplete. They do have the 1860 Agricultural Schedules for Texas and Tennessee, and the index to the War of 1812 Service Records. Researchers will also find the Texas Birth Index (1903-1909) and the Texas Death Index (1903-1940) here as well.

Don't forget to check our Library for a copy of the Genealogy Bulletin, number 42, November/December 1997 issue, "America's Best Genealogy Resource Center", by William Dollarhide and Ronald Bremer, for a sample of their up-coming publication.

Funeral 4 Nov 1915 at 2 PM at KNAPP CHAPEL with Reverend E.L. Benedict. Charged to father Edward D. Alderman (1885-1920) Parents were Edward D. Alderman (1885-1920 born in Minnesota) and Etta Smith. Ref: #3 & #4.

TROMBLEY, EVA

b. 26 Apr 1893, d. 30 Jul 1911 of an accidental drowning, age 18y 3m 4d. Int. 2 Aug 1911 (1) in NE 51 Line 16 and (2) in NE 65 Line 16 with the other Trombley Family. Eva Tromley was single, a musician, her home address not listed. She died in Bachelor's Slough in Vancouver, Clark County, Washington attended by the Clark County Coroner. Funeral 2 Aug 1911 at St. James Cathedral with Reverend Father Felix Verwilghen. Pall bearers were Ray Watson, Joseph Nugent, Ray Fletcher, Ray Brace, John McCarty and William Bates. Charged to F. Trombley of Raymond, Washington. Parents were Mr. & Mrs. F/A. Trombley. Ref: #3 & #4.

TROMBLEY, CHILDREN & MISS EVA TROMBLEY

10 Jul 1912 disinterred the bodies of the Trombley Children: Elnor M. (1891-1892), Edna M. (1895-1898), Edmond Trombly (1897-1898) and Miss Eva J. Trombley b. (1893-1911) buried 2 Aug 1911. Charged to Mrs. Ann Louise Quarnberg & her husband Elbirt Sinclair Biersecker. Int. in NE 65 Line 16 (all have markers). Parents were not listed, but probably the father was Alexander Trombley (1861-1925 has marker).

TROMBLEY, ALEXANDER/ (?) ENZOR

b. 1861 (?) Canada French, d. 1925, age 64y. Int. 1925 in NE 65 Line 16. NO RECORD of an Alexander Trombley, but Enzor Trombley was born in Feb 1861 in French Canada (as were the older members of the Trombley Family). He was a farmer and was a boarder with Oliver J.

Geoghegan who ran a Boarding house and was a farmer in the Manor District (Ref:1900 Census). NOTE: Alexander/Enzor plus the Trombley Children Edmond, Edna, Elnor and Eva who were first buried elsewhere and they were all reburied 2 Jul 1912 in NE 65 Line 16 and charged to Mrs. E.S. Biesecker. Parents were Eugene Trombley and Dirima Lormer born in French Canada. Ref: #3, #6 (1900 Census).

TROMBLEY, EDMOND

b. 1897 (?) Washington, d. 1898, Child. Int. in 1898 an unknown grave and reburied 2 Jul 1912 in <u>NE 65 Line 16</u>. Parents were not listed. Ref. #3.

TROMBLEY, EDNA M.

b. 1895, d. 1898, age 3y. Int. 1898 in an unnamed grave and moved 2 Jul 1912 to <u>NE 65 Line 16.</u> (NO RECORD), probably a sister to Edmond Trombley (1897-1898) and Elnor M. Trombley (1891-1892). **Parents were not listed.** Ref: #3.

TROMBLEY, ELNOR M.

b. 1891, d. 1892, age ca ly, Child, (NO RECORD). Int. in 1892 in an unknown grave and on 2 Jul 1912 reburied in <u>NE 65 Line 16.</u> Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

TROMBLEY, EVA

b. 26 Apr 1893, d. 30 Jul 1911 accidental drowning, age 18y 3m 4d. Int. in 1911 in an unknown grave and on 2 Jul 1912 reburied in NE 65 Line 16. Parents were not listed. Ref: #3 & #4.

YOUNG, JULIA M.

b. Mar 1859 (? 1879), d. 29 Apr 1925 died of heart failure, age (?). Int. 29 Apr 1925 in NE 65 -3 Line 16. (Julia M. Young would have been nearly 75 at the time (1859-1925.) She was married to Ernest Young (1877-1961 who is buried at Park Hill Cemetery in Vancouver who's parents were John Antone Young and Elizabeth Ludwig). Parents were not listed. but in 1900 Clark County Census "Dollie Young's" mother was born in French Canada therefore the mother could be a "Trombley" or related to them; the

<u>Trombleys are also in NE 65.</u> Ref: #1 p. 175, #3 & #6 (1900 Census).

NE 66

NE 66 All bought 4/27/1908 by Mrs. Malinda James

JAMES, FRANCIS A. *

b. 1844 Indiana, d. 8 Oct 1909 died of arteriosclerosis, age 65y. Int. 10 Oct 1909 in NE 66 Line 15. (NO RECORD). He was in the Civil War - Co. A 135 Indiana Infantry. His wife may be Mrs. Malinda James - no record of her, Note: Francis A. James may have had a brother "Paul James" b. 1840 in Indiana listed in 1860 in Clark County Washington Territory also; in the 1870 Census Francis W. James is listed (born 1825 in Virginia, a Tet. Mrch Gen Mds. listed with Celia (an Indian born in 1845 - listed as a housekeeperand her 3 year old daughter, Caroline (a 1/2 breed) also an Indian "house servant", named Charles Henny all born in Washington Territory. Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

TAYLOR, GEORGE G.

b. 12 Oct 1851, d. 28 Sep 1908 died of dropsy of the heart, age 56y 11m 14d. Int. 29 Sep 1908 in <u>NE 66 Line 15.</u> (MELINDA JAMES). He was probably had been married to "Hattie" Taylor, Oregon. **Parents were not listed.** Ref: #3.

RANDOLPH, HATTIE TAYLOR

b. 6 Apr 1881, d. 12 Mar 1913 of TB of the lungs, age 31y 11m 6d. Int. 14 Mar 1913 in NE 66-2 Line 15 [KNAPP MORTUARY]. She was married, a housewife, Christian, lived at 3100 K St, Vancouver, Clark County, Washington attended by Dr. Charles E. B. Flagg of Vancouver. The funeral was 14 Mar 1913 2 PM at KNAPP CHAPEL with Reverend Mumford. Charged to Owen Taylor 3100 K St. Vancouver, Washington. Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

FRAVEIR, JAMEA A.

b. (?), d. Oct 1909, age (?), Int. 8 Oct 1909 in NE 66 Line 15.

[NO RECORD] Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

NE 67 All bought 5/15/1908 by George H. Hill

HILL, GEORGE H.

b. Oct 1860 San Francisco, San Francisco County, California, d. 6 Nov 1936 died of heart failure, age 71y 1m. Int. Nov 1936 in NE 67 N/2 Line 14. (SELF) [VANCOUVER FUNERAL CHAPEL]. He was married twice: (1) 12 Nov 1889 in Vancouver, Washington to Annie E. Gunning born Mar 1870 in Missouri, her parents were born in Ohio; they had a daughter Georgia Hill who married Clarence Desler; George Hill married (2) 5 Nov 1905 in Vancouver to Myrtle Featherstone Dixon; she had daughters Ruth Dixon who married Clarence Krenik and Gae Dixon who married a man named "Addleman". George

H. Hill was a furniture dealer in Vancouver and rented his home in 1900. George and Myrtle Hill were members of the First Methodist Church in Vancouver. He belonged to the Woodmen of The World. At the time of Georges's death they lived on 17th St. in Vancouver. He was ill for several months Parents were Charles E. Hill and Sarah White both born in Maine. Ref: #2, #3, #5 and #6 (1900 Census).

HILL, MYRTLE M.

Hill (1860-1936). She was active in the Ladies Aide and Missionary Society of the First Methodist Church of Vancouver, and the Women's Temperance Union. She had a sister Mrs. Cora Wampler who lived in Portland, and another sister Mrs. William Grady in Sherwood Oregon. The body sent to Vancouver Funeral Chapel for burial along beside her husband George H. Hill. Parents were J. B. Featherstone and Sarah Cross. Ref: #2, #3, #5.

b. Feb 1878 Iowa, d. 13 Jul 1935 died of cancer and heart failure, age 57y 5m.Int. 16 Jul 1930 in NE 68-5 Line 13. (DAVID BEAMS) [HAMILTON FUNERAL HOME]. He was married to Adda Beams (1876-1910). Parents were David Beams (1839-1930) and Clementine () Beams (1839-1920). Ref: #3.

BEAMS, ADDA

b. 1876, d. 3 Feb 1910, age 44y. Int. 3 Feb 1910 in NE 68 Line 13. Married to Arthur E. Beams (1878-1935). Parents were not listed. Ref: #3.

TOENJES, ELLA BEAMS

b. 1866 Pennsylvania, d. 17 Jan 1944 died of heart failure, age 77y 9m. Int. 19 Jan 1944 in <u>NE 68-1 Line 13</u> (DAVID BEAMS) [VANCOUVER FUNERAL CHAPEL]. Parents were not listed but were probably David M. Beams (1839-1930) and Clementine Beams (1839-1920).. Ref: #3 & #5.

DALE, JUANA/JOCENA

b. Sep 1862, d. 6 Nov 1922 died of cancer and pneumonia, age 60y 2m. Int. 8 Nov 1922 in <u>NE 68-3 Line 13.</u> (DAVID BEAMS). Parents were probably David and Clemetine Beams, Ref: #3.

Child lived at 407 West 10th St. Vancouver, Clark County, Washington died at home attended by Dr. Robert Grant Black of Vancouver. The funeral was 16 Mar 1909 at KNAPP CHAPEL with Reverend H. L. Templeton. Also buried in plot SE 68 [no records - are a Dalton Baby - Int. 17 Feb 1912 and Luis L. Dalton (1883-1937) born in Oregon died of meningitis. Charged to father Frank Dalton. Note: In the 1900 Census there is listed an "Ernest Dalton" married to Belle Gerlinger (b.1873 Illinois) living with her parents Louis and Sophia Gerlinger in the West Ward of Vancouver. At that time the Dalton's had a baby Louis G. Dalton (b.Dec 1899 in Washington). Parents were Mr. & Mrs. Frank Dalton. Ref: #3 & #4.

b. Apr 1896 Nebraska, d. 3 May 1912 of TB, age 16y. Int. 4 May 1912 in NE 69-2 Line 12 reburied in Park Hill Cemetery. Parents were James Divine (Mar 1868 Illinois - a plumber in 1900) and Matilda () Divine (Feb 1871 born in Iowa.) She had three brothers: William, Earl and George all born in Nebraska and her paternal grand parents were Patrick Divine and Anna Wells. He came west by 1871 as a government clerk, lived at Mrs. Mary Turnbull's rooming house in the 1880 Census and was then listed as a census enumerator; in 1883 he started the Vancouver Hoop Factory along the Washougal River where now stands a paper mill. The company specialized in wooden hoops that hold barrels together. He was a big man, hot tempered, well groomed, with bushy hair with a drooping handle-bar mustache, and was a "penny pincher". He loved bird hunting and had two purebred hounds named Pat and Mike. He left Vancouver for several years around 1900 for he was not listed in the census of that year. He said in his will "my funeral is to be the cheapest of kind, and I don't want my body to be transported but buried near the place where I may die. As I have lived an infidel, I want to be buried as such without any monkey business. I wish to be hauled to my grave by a team of matched white horses. I wish to be directed at a smart pace. I wish to have a band follow, running if they must, and playing lively tunes." The Vancouver Mortician who handled the burial said he followed those instruction to a "T", and the community was so outraged that he subsequently went out of business. Authur Haine's tombstone reads "Haine Haint." Parents were not listed but they were both born in Belgium. Ref: #3,& #6 (1871 & 1880 Census).

CARLSON, CHARLES

The Ancestral Lines of - BROWNE-BROWN and

Allied Families, Compiled by Betty Brown Sheeran, (Two-Volume Set) 1997, 972 pp., two-volume edition, indexed archival paper, \$125.00 + \$6.50 s/h. Sheeran of Stonegate Press - P.O. 1119, Fall City, Washington 98204

This exceedingly well-done work contains the ancestral lines of Brown-Brown and Allied Families and is based on data collected by Betty Brown Sheeran and assisted by Arthur Fiske, a renowned Northwest Genealogist. The Books are the result of eighteen years of research and authoritatively cover the entire known agnate progeny of an early and prolific settler of Lynn, Massachusetts.

Ms. Sheeran secured a 1915 publication on her Browne-Brown genealogy, but it did not extend to the female members of these families. She felt that for too long wives and mothers were sadly neglected or deemed irrelevant. Once married, a woman's identity was merged with that of her husband's and her ancestry was forgotten. As Ms. Sheeran continued with this major undertaking, she was led to the discovery of some very important ancestors.

The two volumes are documented by footnoted references to the specific town or state and its vital records, cemetery, probate, deed or census records. References to published genealogies have been included for completeness and are almost never the sole source. The two-volume set includes an every name index. Also included is a fan chart, beautifully created in calligraphy with 128 names.

The two BROWNE-BROWN volumes. Of over 972 pages, contain biographies and historical facts of the period in which the ancestor lived. An unusual feature in a Honor Roll, with categories of titles, such as the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, Colonial Wars, Revolutionary War, early Colonial Physicians, Colonial Clergy, Presidents of the United States and Witches. Under each title will be found a list of the ancestors that served in that particular classification along with their brief biographical sketch.

Thomas Browne was born in 1628 in England and immigrated to Lynn, Massachusetts. His descendants went to Stonington, CT, Westerly and Hpkinton, RI, Ellisburg, NY and then to Rochester and Waseca, MI, and journieys beyond. Thirteen generations of Browne-Brown men and their wives' lineage are recorded for posterity!

This is a very prestigious addition to our Library, Mrs. Sheran should be highly commended for her preserverence in the completion of this project.

Getting to know our Life Members

Frances Helen (THOMPSON) EDDY and James Albert EDDY



To have both the President and Recording Secretary of the Willamette Valley Genealogy Society (WVGS) in Salem, Oregon, elect to become life members of CCGS is a distinct honor for this Society.

Frances, who is the President of WVGS, joined CCGS in June 1995. Her husband, Jim, is the Recording Secretary and

Newsletter Editor of WVGS. When she decided to make sure her dues were paid and to support CCGS, she added her husband and they both became life members on 22 January 1998. Frances is the primary researcher in their family and they both work on the WVGS quarterly bulletin, Beaver Briefs. [Through our exchange program, we have all of these wonderful quarterlies since 1977 filed with the Oregon periodicals under Salem. This publication is indexed in PERSI and has 462 citations to a wide variety of articles]. Frances is working on a couple of projects for publication and volunteers at the State Library two days a week and a Family History Center one-day a week. Frances and Jim live in Salem, Oregon so their membership is extra special. They enjoy reading the CCGS Newsletters and our Trail Breakers and are looking forward to our next volume of Clark County Marriage Records. They both put down that our CCGS publications are the best thing about CCGS for them. In order to prepare this article, they responded to a set of questions but then went beyond the call of duty to write several paragraphs about their interest in genealogy, which is quoted at the end of this write-up.

Frances was born in 1932 in Lafayette, Boulder Co., Colorado but her father was a coal miner, who lived and worked in West Virginia. She graduated from Commerce High School in Portland and has taken numerous classes through her local college. Although she "retired" after 37 ½ years with the Welfare/Senior Services Division of the State of Oregon, the amount of volunteer work she does for the WVGS, the State Library, the local Family History Center and in the local and State Rebekah Lodge is equivalent to being a full-time job! How generous!

When she does get a chance to research, she uses both the PAF and FTM genealogy programs and is currently researching the THOMPSON, ROBBINS, COLLAR, WARNER, UPSON, LEYTON, CAHOON, VERVACKE and SCHEPENS surnames. (These last two are Belgian). Her best tip for genealogists was to <u>not</u> believe everything in print.

Jim was born in 1931 in Albany, Linn Co., Oregon and is a retired Data Processing Manager for Human Resources Division for the State of Oregon. He worked

for the State over 35 years and has a number of interesting hobbies. One is model railroading and another is collecting 78 rpm records dated prior to 1940. He has been supporting his wife's genealogy research since 1995. His surnames are:

In answer to the question on "When and how did you get started in genealogy?" Frances wrote:

"I started working on genealogy in 1994. I was feeling very alone because of not having any family left and decided to find out more about my father's ancestors. Since starting my research, I have found several living cousins in Oklahoma, California and Michigan. Jim and I have spent the last three Christmases with my family in Oklahoma. What a joy it has been for me to find these folks."

"In addition to learning about my ancestors, I have learned a great deal about the states of Oklahoma, Michigan and Illinois. My mother was born in Belgium and my research on her lines has given me the opportunity to read the records in the languages of Flemish, French and Latin. I am not fluent, but can certainly understand what is written."

"My research on Jim's family has uncovered much information about his family that he didn't know. His 3rd great grandfather came from The Netherlands in 1847 and settled in Ottawa Co., Michigan. Several generations lived there, however, I haven't been able to find any living cousins yet. Another 2nd great grandfather, William EDDY, was a member of the DONNER party and was one of those who went ahead for help. Although Jim does little research himself, he is very supporting of my efforts."

"To sum up my experience with genealogy, getting acquainted with living family, learning about those who have lived before us, learning about history and getting acquainted with other who have like interests is what it is all about."

Ruth. She graduated from
Fort Vancouver High School,
where she is now employed
as a staff assistant to 16
different teachers in 5

separate departments. In her spare time at work, she helps out in the Library and the Office. Since retirement is still 14 or 15 years in the future, she uses most school vacations to travel and see family or to do genealogy. During this past Spring Break, she was off to Montana and Yakima, Washington on genealogy research. After High School, Ruth took two years of business education at Clark College.

Healthy skepticism was the genesis of Ruth's interest in Genealogy. During the Christmas season of 1984, Ruth and her family listened to a audio tape of an elderly cousin telling stories about the first Baptist Missionary to Oregon Territory crossing on the Oregon Trail. This was Ruth's husband's Great, Great, Great Grandfather FISHER and his family. The storyteller was just speaking extemporaneously and someone fortuitously captured the dozens of names, dates and places the storyteller mentioned on the tape. Ruth could not believe that anyone could know that many names and dates off the top of her head and decided to investigate for herself. Right after then, she joined CCGS as a part year member. Remarkably, Ruth admits that despite considerable research to catch any errors in the "story," each fact on the audio tape has been proved accurate.

When she learned that joint memberships were eligible to have twelve surnames published in the annual directory, she signed her late husband, Bob, up at renewal time. She has faithfully renewed as a joint membership every year since, but with the combination of his passing on 30 December 97, exactly 56 years after his birth and Ruth's receipt of an income tax refund, she decided to go for this life membership. Ruth was the family researcher as Bob basically just tolerated the hobby. She learned after about eleven years research that she was a tenth cousin once removed to her husband. Ruth has been very lucky in some of her research often finding family in areas where they were not expected to be. The best example of this was her research into the four founding families of Horton, Bremer County, Iowa. Ruth is descended from three of them and was pleasantly surprised that a "lost" great aunt on Bob's side was part of the fourth.

Ruth has served CCGS faithfully since about 1986 as a volunteer librarian. She indicated that she learned something every time someone new comes into our library and asks a question. She recently volunteered to help in the key-wording project for lowa books after successfully searching for a particular surname keyword and finding her family in a family history she never would have looked into on her own. As an extension of her library expertise, she has often volunteered to staff the library sales table at Seminars if she is not otherwise involved on the sandwich assembly line. With grateful appreciation of each President for the previous five years, Ruth has served as the Nominating Committee Chairman. She was given this year off this very important yet sometimes difficult position in appreciation for past services rendered.

Both the Marathon County [WI] Genealogical Society and the Bremer County [IA] Genealogical Society have had Ruth as a speaker at their meetings. She is a

member of each and has attended the Wisconsin State Gene-a-rama three times.

The best thing about CCGS for Ruth is the access to the genealogy books and she enthusiastically invites all members to take advantage of the growing resources there. Her other genealogy tip is to definitely do research on allied and collateral lines.

Ruth has donated uncounted hours to preparing index cards to a 1902 edition of a "National Register of the Sons of the American Revolution" and personally compiled an every name Index to the "History of Bremer County, lowa" which she donated to our library along with some other books and vertical files.

In closing the interview, Ruth said: "I've learned more history than I ever wanted to know, but it's been fun"

Elizabeth May (HOWE) BROOKS



Liz, as she prefers to be called, is a native Oregonian living in Oregon City today. She was born in Portland, Multnomah County, Oregon on 3 JUL 1930. After high school, she took courses in criminal justice, medical certification and genealogy.

Her education paid off in many commendations from her personal work history in

the medical insurance field and as a Clackamas County Reserve Deputy. She is retired from both fields now. She serves on the Clackamas County College Foundation and received a citation from the National Guard for superb volunteer work in catching up personnel and training records while the incumbent was incapacitated.

She got started in genealogy in 1967, when her son, Rob, said he needed to do a family history for school. That was her push for doing what had been on her mind for many years. She said the pages in the telephone directory fairly flew until she finally came upon someone that was able to discuss genealogy with her and get her started. That start has paid big dividends to the genealogy community. Throughout it all, her husband and family have supported her research and donated to the cause. Liz was a cofounder of the Clackamas County Family History Society with Norma Jean Drebin HERZMAN. Today it is called the Clackamas County Genealogical Society [Through our exchange program, we have the Clackamas Legacy periodical since 1988 filed with the Oregon periodicals under Oregon City. This publication is indexed in PERSI and has 142 citations to a wide variety of articles] a past Vice President of the Clackamas County Historical Society. So with

those credentials, we are honored that she has become a life member of CCGS. In response to the question of why she did become a life member, she said: "I'm impressed with the organization. The people I've met, your outstanding quarterly and terrific publications." [Thank you, Liz]. She also lauded the library volunteers and the way that CCGS broadens her research base. She just came back from an eventful Salt Lake City Research Trip marred by the fact that her suitcase and research notes didn't arrive on the plane with her.
