

HUFFMAN FAMILY HISTORY

as remembered and written by Nellie Huffman Hallman

The Huffman family settled in the outskirts of Clark County, Washington. As well as being the memories of one person's family, this family history also gives the reader a picture of what life was like for other families who settled in the small communities in Clark County near the turn of the century. Nellie Winnifred Huffman was born in Chelatchie Prairie, Washington on 2 April 1903 and died on 29 September 1995 in Glendale, Maricopa Co., Arizona. She was married on 10 December 1923 to Gust R. Hallman. Nellie wrote this history sometime after 1979. The words have been left exactly as she wrote them. This picture of the past was contributed by her niece, Cynthia Ann Hulman of Seattle, Washington.

This is the history of the Huffman family as far as I was able to find out.

Our father was the tenth child of James M. and Eliza A. Huffman. They named him Sylvester Sawyer and was known as Vess when he was grown. He was born March 30, 1866 in Iowa. When a baby, less than a year old, they moved to Stockton, Missouri that is in Cedar County. He went to school there. His oldest brother William was their teacher. I don't know how far he went in school. I do know he liked to read. He always read the newspaper, also western stories. The next record of what Dad did was working in Death Valley as a swapper on a 20 mule team there were hauling borax. I have heard him tell about that. He also worked in Butte, Montana as a cook. He had an older brother Charley who worked in the mines for fifty years. Don't know much about what he did. The next record of where he worked was in Baker City, Oregon in a mine. I think he was cooking there as he passed by where Mom lived on his way shopping for food. At first he stopped to talk to Grandpa Roth until he got acquainted with Mom (Lillie Jane Roth). Don't know how long he knew her before they were married. They were married at Baker City July 31, 1896.

This is the history of our mother as far as was able to find out from the family. Her father was John J. Roth. He came to this country from Prussia when a young man. I don't know how he came or where he entered this country. Some of this was from the 1880 census. It listed him as a farmer. Very little is known about her mother, Elizabeth Elmira Strauberry who was born in Norfolk, Virginia. Don't know where they met but were married Sept. 23, 1876.

There were four girls born to them.

Lillie Jane, our mother, was born in Boise, Idaho, Ada County, which was a territory at the time. They moved from there to Baker City, Oregon - I don't know just when. They lived in the mountains. Their mother died there Nov. 27, 1890 leaving four little girls. Aunt Mary the oldest was 13 and Aunt Winnie was 6 months. She died from typhoid fever. She was buried near to where they lived as Mom told of playing near her grave. At first they took Aunt Winnie to school with them. Then Grandpa hired a house-keeper. She had been married before and had children of her own. She and Grandpa married. She was a good mother to them.

When they lived in Idaho the census of 1880 listed Grandpa a farmer at the age of 29 and Grandma 20 years old.

While living in Baker City Grandpa hauled freight with a team of horses and wagon from Boise to Baker City. They lived in Baker City until Grandpa's death. He died Dec. 13, 1924.

Mom's stepmother went to Seattle to live with a daughter. She died there, I don't know the date. Before she and Grandpa were married she took in washing to make a living for her family as she had several children. Times were hard for a woman alone then. She came to Oregon in a covered wagon and had a baby die on the way and was buried in a trunk on the plains. She was a good woman and mom said she was good to them. She was the only mother they knew.

A lot of information that I have of the Huffman's was given me by a cousin who is Clara Powell. Clara is a daughter of Uncle Otto who was Dad's brother. She said Dad, Uncle Otto and Jimmie Christman who was a relative of Grandma Huffman. They drove a team of horses and a wagon up from Calif. Coming by the way of Baker City. This was in 1895 and they came to a place called Hayes, Washington in Clarke County. Jimmie Christman had some ground there and they raised onions. They shipped the onions by boat to Portland, Oregon to sell.

Dad went back to Baker City in the spring. He and Mom were married July 31, 1896. They lived for a time at the mines then moved to Hayes where Dad had been before. They lived at Hayes for several years.

I am not sure when Grandpa Huffman came out from Missouri. We believe he came when Uncle Mack and other uncles came. Grandpa and Uncle Otto lived with the folks for some time.

The first children born to them were twins May 3, 1897. They were some distance from a doctor so they had a midwife and one twin died at birth. Dad rode horse back to Woodland for a doctor which was some distance. The doctor gave them no hopes for the other twin to live as he was so small. Mom gave him the best of care and he started to grow. Mom being very young said she took him out in the sunshine and played with him. He was named James Harvey and all his life was known as Jim.

The second child was John J. born July 7, 1898. The next was Jessie May born Aug. 31, 1899. Before Jessie was born Dad and Uncle Otto built a house for Grandpa (James M.). Uncle Otto by then had married Dora Allen but they wouldn't take Grandpa. Mom by then had two small children and expecting another wasn't able to care for him. He had cancer on his face called a rosebud cancer. He died Oct. 11, 1899. He didn't live long after he moved. There was no funeral parlor nearer than 30 or 40 miles and the only transportation was horse and wagon, therefore the family seen about the funeral. Dad and Uncle Otto prepared him for burial. He was buried in a small cemetery at Hayes, Washington.

The next child was Lillie Jane named after Mom. The fall Lillie was a year old the folks moved to Chelatchie Prairie. They rented a farm there. Chelatchie Prairie is surrounded by hills that was covered with fir trees. One end of the valley has a hill called Tum Tum. Snow mountains could be seen from any place in the valley. This is a very pretty country with it's mountains. The mountains were Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Adams. There is snow on them all year.

There was a road running thru the valley with farms on both sides. This valley at one time had been occupied by Indians. When Dad plowed he used to find Indian arrow heads. There was a small creek running thru the place. We used to go down there and play in the summer.

The house was set quite a ways back from the road. Am not sure how many acres there was in the place.

There was a one room school located on the corner of the place where we lived. The school yard wasn't large only an acre of ground. It had a large pine tree in one corner. It was said the school yard had been an Indian burial ground. There were mounds that looked like graves. There was one teacher for all eight grades. That is where I started school.

While living on the farm there was five more children born who were -

I will write some things that happened.		

The only transportation we had then was horses and wagons. I can remember the time the folks bought the buggy with the covered top. The day they got it Mom hitched up a horse named Jane and took us for a ride up toward Tum Tum. We were so proud of the new buggy.

Mom made a couple trips to see her folks at Baker City while living at Chelatchie Prairie. One trip she took Jessie and Lillie and the other trip she took Annie who was a baby along with Bertha and Daisy. She had to take the train from Yacolt to Vancouver then transfer to the train that would take her to Baker City, Oregon. Dad took her by horse and wagon to Yacolt as that was the only way to go.

The folks raised cattle there can remember one time Lillie was carrying Annie from the barn when the bull got loose. She just made it to the house ahead of the bull. We were kept in the house till they could catch him. They always used pitch forks to corner them so they wouldn't get hurt. There was a ring in their nose and they used a chain and they were staked out. We were always taught to be afraid of them as they were dangerous. Am not sure what kind of cattle they were except they were large and red color. There was always pigs raised some were sold and some were used for the family. They made bacon and ham. There was also some chicken raised can remember when they had turkeys and sheep.

The folks worked hard to make a living for us but we always had plenty to eat along with clothes to wear. Mom made our clothes and we were as well dressed as any of the neighbors. There was always new clothes for starting school. Then Easter and we had new things also for Christmas.

When Christmas came always had a tree. We used to make trimming for the tree. We would string popcorn and also made things from paper. Mom made dolls for we girls. Sometime she would buy the heads made of glass with hair painted on. She then made the body and clothes for them. Can remember one year she got Frank a little red wheel-barrow and hid it under the bed. When she was gone we found it and took it out and played with it. Dad would buy a family gift. One year he bought a phonograph. It had a big silver horn and had to be would by hand. It was quite a think to own one as few people had them at that time. One year when the school had their picnic for the last day of school Mom took the phonograph and played it outside. The picnic was in a grove and of course the children enjoyed it.

Uncle Otto and Aunt Dora moved to Chelatchie Prairie the same time the folks did. They lived close as our house set back from the road while theirs set on the road. The Allens, Aunt Dora's folks, also lived close. We knew Aunt Dora and Uncle Otto nearly as well as our folks. We visited back and forth often. Aunt Dora could bake the best bread. Seems like every time we went to their place she would give us warm bread and butter can still remember how good it was.

They had six children - 2 girls and 4 boys. The girls were Clara and Mary - the boys Fred, Robert,

George and Charley. When Robert was small he was playing with matches and set the barn on fire. He was so scared at what he had done he ran and hid under the bed. The barn burned clear to the ground.

Dad had another brother living close his name was Uncle Jack. He died in about 1905 and was buried in a small cemetery at Chelatchie Prairie. He died of tuberculosis. I wasn't old enough to remember him so all that I know of him is what I've heard. Have been to his grave many times.

While we lived at Chelatchie Prairie Jessie had rheumatic fever and was in bed for some time. During her illness the house caught on fire. Frank and I were just coming home from school and the older boys from the school came running by us and went and put the fire out. It burned part of the kitchen roof off. Jessie was so scared she would burn up she kept calling Mom not to let her burn up.

While living there the folks took us on a trip to Lake Merril known then as Trout Lake. Jim and John stayed home to do the chores. There was live stock to be cared for. Lake Merril was near Mt. St. Helens. We had a large tent to camp in. It rained most of the time we were there. There was lava beds where the mountain had at one time erupted. We hiked out on the lava beds. Mom wouldn't let us go alone as she was afraid we might fall in the crevices. This is the area where they have looked for the abominable snow man. They never did find him.

Aunt Dora had an uncle living at the lake. We called him Uncle Jud. He had a cabin and we spent time with him. The way we got to the lake was with a team of horses a big wagon. The roads were bad and there was steep hills and we had to walk then. It took all day to make the trip there. Now as I think of it, I don't suppose it was more than 15 miles. It did seem like a long way then.

There was no modern conveniences at this time. The telephone came in while living there the folks got a phone then along with most all the people. At this time was no such thing as a private line. I think most were on the same line so if anything was private you don't tell it on the phone. Can remember my first time talking on it. Mom wanted me to call Aunt Dora about something and I talked so loud don't think the phone was needed to hear me.

The closest doctor was at Yacolt. He was the only one for miles around. There was a bank, also several stores. It was about seven miles from where we lived. We lived so far from the store and post office so when the folks went to the store they always seen if Uncle Otto needed anything. If it were some of Uncle Otto going they always checked on the folks to see if they needed something. Dad would usually send for chewing tobacco. He chewed star plug. There was a metal star on it. Dad usually sent Frank and me to go get it for him. We would chew the corners off on the way home. The ones that went also saw about the mail. The newspaper came by mail then. The name of the place with the store and post office was Amboy. The folks bought a farm there in about 1911. This was quite different as where we lived before was level country. While at Amboy was hilly. The house was on a hill. In front of the house was nine large chestnut trees. There was always lot of nuts on them. The nuts would drop off after a frost in the fall. We would roast them on the heater stove in the winter. Had to put a hole in them or they would blow up. They tasted some like sweet potatoes. They sold some of them. We would have to pick them up and they had to be dried. They shipped them to Portland to sell.

The water for the house came from a spring on the side of the hill. There was several trees growing by the spring. The spring was enclosed with wood. The water was real cool and tasted good. The water was pumped to the house with a ram. When the ram was working good it ran a steady stream of water. There was a trough where the horses could get water from the water running from the ram. At this time all the farm work was done with horses. There was always two work horses and some time a pony.

The folks had milk cows at this time and sold cream. They used a separator to get the cream from the milk. The skim milk was fed to either calves or pigs. They had Jersey cows then and did for as long as they kept cows.

There was an orchard with plenty of fruit. The apples were picked in the fall and stored in the cellar under the house. They would keep until spring. Most of you reading this can remember seeing Dad peel an apple and not break the peeling. They always butcher a beef in the fall. Some of the meat was canned and part made into corned beef. Always had a garden and

Mom canned both fruit and vegetables. Raised our own potatoes so with the pork which we had made plenty to eat. Most people prepared in the summer food for the winter.

When we moved to Amboy was quite a change for us. At Chelatchie Prairie we had the one room school house with all eight grades in one room with one teacher. Now the school where we were to go had two rooms so there were 4 grades in each room. The first year there for us we had Mr. Alexander and his daughter teaching the school. We lived about half mile from school.

This was our first opportunity to be where we could go to church. It was a United Brethren. It was a white building and the only church in the neighborhood. We hadn't been able to go to church or Sunday School before so was good to be able to learn of the Bible. Mrs. Ervin was one of our teachers also Mrs. Neal.

There was a blacksmith shop owned and operated by Mr. Lang. Another building was a two story one that had a store which was a country General Store handling every thing. The post office was also in the same building. The building was owned by the Odd Fellow Lodge. Dad belonged to the lodge for over 50 years. Mom belonged to the Rebecca Lodge which was the ladies part of the lodge. Mom used to go to the meetings and enjoyed the lodge.

This being the only place to get things for miles around. The mail came in from Vancouver to Yacolt by train. From Yacolt it was brought to Amboy by horse and buggy or by horse back. Yacolt was about 5 miles away. Hugh Bou (Ball) carried the mail at that time and many years more.

Dad and George White had a saw mill at one time in lower Amboy. There was a pond that the mill was built near and the logs were floated on it. There was also [illegible] anything else went in. Later there was a garage with a filling station owned by Albert Worthington and his sons. Then West's put in another store in lower Amboy. They operated it for many years. It did burn am not sure when. It never was rebuilt, also a tavern went in across the road from West's Store.

GETTING TO KNOW OUR THREE NEWEST LIFE MEMBERS

In order to get to know both Stan CLARKE and Ruth BISHOP, the subject of the next sketch, we need to spell out that GFO is an abbreviation for the Genealogical Forum of Oregon. Both of these distinguished members truly honor the rest of us by electing to become life members of our Clark County Genealogical Society (CCGS). They both joined during the CCGS Patricia Law HATCHER seminar last March, becoming life members at the same time. This nice picture of Stan was taken in his office by his good friend, Ruth BISHOP.

Stan was born in 1942 in Emanuel Hospital in Portland, Oregon. He has always resided in Portland within about a mile radius of where he now lives. In 1964, he received his B.S. degree from Lewis & Clark College. He has a number of hobbies besides genealogy primarily centered on piano, organ and choral music. Stan is the Director of an English Handbell Choir and works as a Librarian at Columbia Helicopters at the Aurora State Airport. He serves as the

Historian for the Tabor Heights United Methodist Church, where many of the GFO's seminars are held. In that connection, when he was President of the GFO in 1991, he turned in 78 queries to the GFO Bulletin Editor, Ruth BISHOP, looking for information to help compile a biographical history of all the ministers of that church. He is also a member of the Commission on Archives and History, Oregon-Idaho Conference, United Methodist Church

His interest in genealogy was kindled as a result of filling out the family records section of a Bible he was presented with when he was promoted from the 3rd to the 4th grade in his church school. Considering that he has been progressing in his genealogical research and knowledge for almost fifty years, it is no surprise to learn that he is the author of Multnomah County Burial Site Records and a contributor to the Oregon Burial Site Guide. His generosity in sharing his volunteer talents and vision within the GFO and others is truly awesome!! In 1991, he was the Host Society Chair for the National Genealogical Society Conference in the States in Portland, Oregon, and was presented with an Award of Merit. Stan was the force behind the cemetery conference tract during the convention. It is the writer's understanding that the 2300 officially registered attendance and the estimated 600 to 1000 non-registered attending the exhibit hall at that event has never been surpassed to date. He has variously served as GFO's Program Chair, Treasurer, Chairman of the Endowment Committee, Vice President and President for two years. During this later time, he wrote frequent articles for the GFO periodicals and has co-taught Tuesday evening genealogy classes with Ellen M. BENEDICT and Ruth BISHOP. He is also a member of the Metro Cemeteries Advisory Committee which includes Portland and Multnomah County. He has been a speaker at the NGS Conference and at various genealogical and historical societies in Oregon and Washington, including CCGS, where he has been our general meeting speaker at least twice: In February 1988, he spoke on "What is an Archive and How do you use it?" and in March 1994, his topic was "A Case Study Through the Use of Newspaper Research." Some of the topics he spoke on at GFO include: "Preparing yourself to attend the Conference in the States" and "Hidden Resources: College & University Libraries." In August of 1999, he gave two presentations at the Association for Gravestone Studies Western Conference in Portland, "Publishing Burial Site Records" and "Burial Sites Are Not Lost--"Just Misplaced!" With the tremendous investment of time, energy and talent that Stan has in GFO, it is not surprising that he is a life member of that organization as well. He is also a member of the Clackamas County Family History Society and a past member of the National Genealogical Society, The New England Historic Genealogical Society and the Chicago Genealogical Society.

Even before Stan became a life member of CCGS, he has been supporting us in another way by purchasing many of our publications and in fact has the complete set of marriage records. Getting the ten percent member discount on future publications weighed heavily in his decision to become a life member as well as his desire to support the work of CCGS.

Stan uses PAF to record all of his research which is exclusively in Devon and Cornwall, England (CLARKE, DUNN, BARTHOLOMEW, HOWARD AND BRIMACOMBE) and in Varmland, Sweden. We are proud that he is willing to support CCGS goals in such a committed way and look forward to using his phenomenal organizational and genealogical expertise.



Ruth Chauncey BISHOP

You've already been somewhat introduced to Ruth BISHOP through anecdotes in Stan CLARKE's thumbnail sketch. In one of those, we learned that Ruth was the Editor of the GFO Bulletin. Now you are in for a treat. To construct these sketches, life members are asked to complete a questionnaire. Ruth went beyond that and virtually wrote her own story, tailoring it to this side of the Columbia River. So because her story is so interesting, it has essentially been left intact with a few additions gleaned from her biographical sketch when she was inducted into the GFO Hall of Fame. Incidentally, this picture of Ruth is a copy of a large portrait of her hanging in the Ruth C. Bishop Reading Room of the New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) Library in Boston, Massachusetts.

When Ruth was born in Emanuel Hospital in Portland, Oregon in 1945, new mothers routinely spent about two weeks in the Hospital. Home was Washougal, Washington, where Ruth's Father, Charles K. BISHOP, had worked at Pendleton Woolen Mills since 1936. He eventually became General Manager at Washougal and then Vice President at the company headquarters in Portland. Ruth and her sister remember that St. Anne's Episcopal Church was founded in their family's living room around 1952. The Priest at St. Luke's in Vancouver, Fr. Fred AVERY, used to travel to Camas twice a month to have services at the Camas Hotel before an old building in Washougal could be purchased and remodeled. The first minister of St. Anne's was Fr. W. Gerald LONERGAN, the husband of current member, Gerry LONERGAN.

Her occupation never really fit with her education at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon. Ruth majored first in music education for 1½ years then switched to Sociology. After graduating, Ruth took a six months course in Computer Programming, then worked for two years for the Pendleton Woolen Mills, after which her back problems caused her to do other things, "Surgery and recuperating for several years."

Ruth's grandfather, Frank CONNER, was very interested in a small part of his family--not his direct line but the FAIRBANKS of Massachusetts. To find out how to do research, Ruth joined the GFO in 1975. From 1979 through June 1994, Ruth edited 64 issues of the GFO Bulletin (about 2,600 pages) and since then has continued to produce the "Family Reunions" section. "She has been very active as the Chairman of the cemetery committee over the years and assisted with the "Sleuthing the Burials" conferences. She has supported the Forum in many ways over the years, teaching classes, taking photos at many of our special functions and volunteering for many other things." She was also the GFO delegate to the Federation of Genealogical Societies for a number of years and attended most of their meetings and conferences. She also travels for pleasure, having been to Africa where she took a hot air balloon ride! Fun!

In 1978, Ruth joined the NEHGS and was honored in September 1990 when that Society's sixth floor reading room was named for her. In 1991, Ruth served as a member of the NEHGS board of trustees. She is also on the board of trustees for the International Society of British Genealogy and Family History.

Ruth joined the National Genealogical Society in 1990. She was the assistant program chairman for the 1991 NGS Conference in the States in Portland, Oregon and was also the official photographer for that

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function. What is even more significant is that she has agreed to be the co-chairman, with Connie LENZEN, of the 2001 NGS Conference in the States in Portland, Oregon.

Photography is her other major hobby. She belongs to a camera club and served them as a Newsletter Editor for twelve years. She has her own dark room and enjoys enlarging her own color prints.

She has a long time interest in Clark County, Washington, having lived in it on and off from 1945 to 1968. Her father was a resident here from 1936 to 1986 and her mother from 1940 to 1991. She still maintains connections with the woolen mill and St. Anne's church and is a faithful attendee at CCGS special functions. To keep learning, Ruth recommends going to classes and learning new methodology. Her life reflects her commitment to continue learning by her frequent travels to various conferences in areas where you have research and then taking advantage of the proximity and visiting the courthouses and libraries in the area. "You might find something not available anywhere else."

In preparing this article, I enjoyed reading her past "Letters from the Editor" in the GFO Bulletin and other articles she's written. We are honored that CCGS may now be numbered with Ruth's other lifetime memberships in the GFO, NEHGS and NGS and hope that post 2001 Conference that perhaps she will be contributing articles to the CCGS periodicals or sharing some of her wonderful expertise.





This newest life member is distinguished by being a CCGS charter member as well. This picture of her was taken at the CCGS Silver Anniversary Celebration in October 1997. These activities spurred her to reinstate her membership and now to become a life member. SOUTHWEST REGIONAL ARCHIVES

Where else can you search for those missing relatives who resided in Southwest Washington? Where do many of the original county books and files go after they are microfilmed? Where are the missing naturalization records that we have been told were burned in the courthouse fire of 1890 - when the documents were dated after 1890? Answer - the Southwest Regional Archives in Olympia, a branch of but separate from the Washington State Archives housed at the same location.

I can't remember when I first visited the Southwest Regional Archives or what it was I was looking for. It was likely on a research visit to the State Archives, only to find that something I was seeking would probably be found in the Southwest Regional Archives down one floor. Upon entering this archive with no windows and row upon row of tall shelves filled with original county books and boxes of files, I knew I had made a find! Numerous visits later, I have only touched on a small percentage of the primary source material available.

The archives contain records for the Southwest Washington counties of Clark, Cowlitz, Gays Harbor (previously Chehalis), Lewis, Mason, Pacific, Skamania, Thurston and Wahkiakum. The staff provides a service to county and city agencies in those nine counties by collecting and preserving their historical source documents. These records are available for public research.

The type of records that have been collected from the nine counties varies. The most common records found there are court records, naturalization records, and land records. Not all county and municipal offices have turned their records over to the archives. Other records available were created by the offices of assessor, auditor, clerk, community development, public works, sheriff, commissioners, coroner, treasurer and health districts. Documents covered might be anywhere between 1847 to the present. Some records were only maintained for a few years and are virtually unknown to exist. Some municipal records to be found come from the offices of city clerks, police departments, municipal courts, and fire departments. Some special districts that have turned over their records are educational service, diking, fire,

port, water, public utility, and school districts. These last are unlikely to be of much genealogical value; but then again no record should passed over too swiftly. A recently donated book to the CCGS library entitled Southwest Regional Branch Archives - Preliminary Inventory of Archival Holdings by Wayne Lawson and Lanny Weaver (published 1998) describes the records to be found there.

One record group that I was quite pleased to discover was the naturalization records for Clark County. Upon seeking information about these records at several offices at the county courthouse, I was told that these records were burned in the courthouse fire, were all in Portland, or no longer existed. Although the earlier naturalization records were burned in the courthouse fire, those created after 1890 still exist at the Southwest Regional Archives. Lesson learned: records not found at a county courthouse may have been turned over to a state or regional archives.

In counties where records have been microfilmed, it is quite possible that the original books or files will be found at the archives. While traveling and researching at another courthouse in Southwest Washington, I found a person I was seeking listed in an original court record book. The case files had been microfilmed. As I was unable to find the case file as listed, I scanned through several microfilms believing the case file number may have been entered incorrectly. Unable to find it there, I decided to check on my next visit to the Southwest Regional Archives. There I was able to find the original case file in a box of files that appeared to have been overlooked in the microfilming process. From this situation, I have learned that if a reference is found but the source document cannot be found on the microfilmed records, find out where the original records are!

Wayne Lawson, Regional Archivist, heads the staff of three who assists researchers looking for records in Southwest Washington. The archives are located on the second floor of the State Archives Building, 1120 Washington Street SE, Olympia. Research hours are Monday through Friday from 8:30 - 4:30 (except holidays). On rare occasions, the entire staff may be out of town on business. It is highly recommended to make an appointment in advance to visit their facility.

Lockers are available to store your personal items. Only a minimal amount of research papers and pencils are allowed. A copy machine is available to copy those original documents you find. There is not a lot of workspace for researchers, although the staff always finds a nook somewhere for you to work. Do not wear light colored clothes, as you will quite possibly be delving through dusty boxes or handling huge deteriorating books. (I made that mistake.)

If you are unable to visit the archives in Olympia, you may make research queries by phone, mail or fax. The archives do charge an hourly research fee.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 28 (Special) - Vancouver is distinguished! This oldest military outpost in the Oregon country is the home of the oldest living descendant, of the man who drew a widow's pension for being the husband of the woman who wore the pants in the Revolutionary war.

Her name is Mrs. Ida Harris of 312 West Thirty-first street, and she is the grandniece of the woman who received a soldier's pension.

Cartoon Revives Incident

Mrs. Harris, who is 80 years young and gay as a girl, saw the picture of Benjamin Gannett, who received a pension for being the husband of Deborah Sampson, the woman who wore the pants, in Ripley's Believe It or Not in The Oregonian.

Benjamin Gannett, the man who received a pension for his wife's services as a soldier in the Revolutionary war, was her great-uncle -- her mother's father's brother. And Deborah Sampson, the woman who went to war, was her grand-aunt -- her grandmother's sister-in-law.

"Mother used to tell us about 'Debbie,' as we called Aunt Deborah," explains Mrs. Harris. "She was a rugged, virile woman and a patriot. When the war broke out she wanted her husband, Great-Uncle Benjamin Gannett, to volunteer to fight the British.

"But he had other ideas. So, like the Amazons of old, she cut her hair, put on the family pants and went to war.

"For two years Great-Aunt Debbie marched in the ranks and fought with the rest of the men," Mrs. Harris recalls. "Then, although never wounded, she fell sick and in the hospital her disguise was discovered. She had no trouble getting a pension. And she got one for her stay-at-home husband, too -- a widow's pension!

"The rest of the Gannetts -grandmother's other brother, for
instance -- were a hardy lot. Grandmother's other brother was one of the
Boston tea party who helped to get
the war started, while Gannet hall in
Boston is named after the family. My
grandmother married Levi Mayhew,
whose father came over on the
Mayflower."

Clark County and the Civil War

(1861-1865; Union 2,213,000 with 365,000 deaths; Confederate with estimated 1,000,000 with 133,821 deaths; an estimated 28,000 Confederate personnel died in Union prisons)

Historical Information

Washington was a territory at the beginning of the war and became a state during the war. Both the Post Cemetery and Pompey's listing of Civil War Vets list burials associated with the Civil War during the war, but since dates are not included, further research is required to see if the deaths occurred during the war. As such, no names have been included on the new memorial. The Post Cemetery contains many names that could be associated with the Civil War but were not included in this listing unless it was noted in the records.

Fort Vancouver was the military headquarter for the whole northwestern United States. During the Civil War, the troops stationed here played an important role by protecting settlers from Indians and discouraging possible uprisings by southern sympathizers. The westward movement had been spurred by discovery of gold in 1849 and it continued despite the war. In 1862 the Salmon River Country of Idaho and eastern area of Oregon brought those in search of gold and silver into the northwest.

Ted Van Arsdol, in his "Heritage 1776-1976" section of The Columbian, Vancouver, Washington, writes about the influences of the war in Vancouver and the importance of the Fort and the officers there:

To [Lt. James Harrison Wilson, Engineer], Vancouver was a place of pleasant memories, although the scarcity of females "seriously limited social diversion."

On July 4, 1861, the first year of the war, two of Vancouver's companies were taken to Portland where they marched through the streets, "held parade on the public square, and passed. . in review with the band playing and the flag flying," Wilson recalled. "There was no doubt about the loyalty of that garrison!"

The war had an almost immediate effect on Vancouver's post. Vancouver and other Northwest posts were stripped of practically all their regular troops and a lot of equipment, and several forts were abandoned, on order of the commanding general of the Pacific, who was worried about rebel "scares" in Nevada and other Southwest locations. [The Columbian, July 4, 1976, Vancouver, Washington, page A9, column 1-2.]

Among the several units active in the Northwest during the war, the Oregon cavalry saw the most action, chasing and skirmishing with Indians east of the Cascades.

"In the years 1859, 1860 and 1861, the emigrants had met with serious disasters on the emigrant road on Snake River, attended in some cases with horrible atrocities at the hands of the Indians," Lt. Col. John M. Drake, a member of the unit recalled. "It became our duty to protect that travel. . . There was not much of that country (Idaho and eastern Oregon) over which the Oregon cavalry horse never tramped."

He stated the Oregon cavalry never mustered more than 600 men at any one time. The total number of other volunteers serving at the scattered posts of the Northwest during the time was only a few hundred; an insignificant number compared with the armies then struggling east of the Mississippi. [The Columbian, July 4, 1976, Vancouver, Washington, page A9, column 4.]

The Veteran's Administration Data shows that Albert Woolson was the last Union veteran to die on August 2, 1956 at the age of 112 years and John Sailing was the last Confederate veteran to die on March 16, 1958, at the age of 112 years. However, Clark County had some very old veterans. The most famous was Theodore A. Penland, the last commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, the organization of Union veterans of the Civil War. He died in Vancouver on September 13, 1950 at the age of 101 years. In 1910, thirty members

attended an encampment at Fourth Plain. In 1948 at Grand Rapids, Michigan, only 16 members were living and the six in attendance elected national commander. In 1949 the last meeting was held in Indianapolis at the place where the very first meeting had been held the years after the Civil War ended. [Columbian, Monday, Nov. 6, 1989, p A2] Another interesting name below is that of Melcine Arnold, a nurse sanitary commission during the Civil War.

Several sources were used in compiling the listing of Civil War connected names that follow. (1) Mrs. A.W. (Margaretta) Zimmerman extracted names from a microfilm of 1890 census. Gloria Cummings supplied a copy from her files; a copy of this document can be found at the Clark County Genealogical Society in their vertical files. Names were also divided by geographical location and this information has been added by the name then known. If a location was not mentioned, it was probably Vancouver. The census included those living in Clark County in 1890, and there are many who served from other states on this list. (2) The Washington National Guard Pamphlet, the official history of the Washington National Guard Vol. 3, Washington Territorial Militia in the Civil War lists men by companies, but does not indicate where they lived. (3) Obituaries indicating Civil War service. (4) Cemetery and funeral records using the resources published by the Clark County Genealogical Society, Vancouver, Washington. (5) Post Cemetery burials. Consider this list incomplete and only as an aid to researchers.

BOOK REVIEWS

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Pendleton County (West) Virginia, Probate Records; Wills, 1788-1866; Inventories, Sales Bills, Settlements, 1788-1846 by Rick Toothman. This is the second collection of diverse genealogical records for Pendleton County compiled by Rick Toothman. Most appraisals contain inventories of personal property including household items, utensils, slaves and more; books in particular have been identified wherever present. The names of purchasers on bills of sale have been alphabetized and, as in Pendleton County (West) Virginia Deedbooks Records, 1788-1813, any signatures originally appearing in German have been double-underlined. An attempt has been made to name every slave referenced in the documents and all transactions involving slaves are Mr. Toothman has also included a brief addendum containing new genealogical materials and errata concerning the essay on the European heritage of the pioneer families. It is always exciting to find one's own ancestors in a book you are reviewing. Wills, of G-Grandfather's, bills of sales of G-Uncles. etc. [SW]

Ohio County (WV) Index, Volume 3; by Kenneth Craft. Author Kenneth Craft, while searching for names and family relationships, has made this process much easier by the special "Personal Time Line" index in which every name, place or subject is sorted by year and then subject (more than 16,000 entries). Volume 3 continues the Ohio County Index series by publishing more records from the index of Ohio County (then Virginia), West Virginia, County Court Order Books from 1777 to 1881 as originally extracted during the 1930's. Easy to read.

Richmond: It's People and Its Story by Mary Newton Stanard. Another Heritage Classic. The author has compiled this work "to convey an impression (sketchy and untechnically, of course) upon a single canvas, of the whole kaleidoscopic scene - military, public, economic, home, hospital, social, literary, even the current jokes - with white persons and Negroes, grown persons and children, rich and poor, high and low in their relations to the place and one another." Many notable Virginians are examined in the text, including Thomas Jefferson, Col. Byrd, John Brown, Robert E. Lee, Jefferson Davis and Edgar Allen Poe.

United States Direct Tax of 1798: Tax Lists for the City of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Upper Delaware, Lower Delaware, High Street, Chestnut, Walnut and Dock Wards by Wilbur J. McElwain. The Direct Tax of 1798 was imposed by the United States government on dwellings, lands and slaves. This book is a compilation of these tax lists for six wards in the city of Philadelphia. Each ward appears in a separate table. The properties (which are listed alphabetically in the original rolls) are organized by street and in the order that they existed on the street. Information in the tax lists includes the property owner and occupant, a source reference, the type of property, the size and description of the buildings and lots, the assessed value, and the tax due. appendix includes the introduction to the microfilm edition of the Pennsylvania tax lists (published by the National Archives), a circular of the Secretary of the Treasury providing instructions to the assessors, and sample pages from the Philadelphia tax forms.

Monongalia County (West) Virginia: Records of the District, Superior, and County Courts by Melba Pender Zinn. Abstracts of the only surviving court records for the early years of Monongalia County derived from the District Court which served Monongalia, Harrison, Randolph and Ohio Counties, and the surrounding counties. The cases deal predominantly with civil matters such as bad debts,

slander, trespass, and disputes over land the settlement of estates.

A History of Pleasants County, West Virginia by Robert L. Pemberton. Evidence of ancient moundbuilding civilizations proves that this region along the banks of the Ohio River has been considered prime real estate for a long time. Celeron de Bienville led a military voyage down the Ohio River - known in New France as La Belle Riviere - in 1749, burying lead plates along the way and claiming the land for the King of France. In 1750, the Ohio Company employed frontiersman Christopher Gist to explore the area. But even before Celeron and Gist, hunters and fur trappers penetrated the region.

This book encompasses all aspects of the settlement of the area now known as Pleasants County, including geographical description, rival discoveries and claims between England and France, first settlers, the Revolution, the Civil War, early industries, schools, newspapers, railroads, the oil boom, religious activities and more. The book is brimming with names of Pleasants County citizens and includes 20 pages of biographical information about the oldest families in the area.

Missouri Birth And Death Records, Volume Two by Sherida K. Eddlemon. Registration of births and deaths began as early as 1863 in Missouri. From 1883 to 1893 county clerks were required by law to register all births and deaths in the state. Although registration was required, the law was not enforced and, as a result, some counties actually recorded very few births or deaths during this period. Since the state did not have complete compliance of birth and death registrations until 1911, other sources such as church, military, cemetery, tax and probate records and newspapers from the time period are the researcher's main tools in establishing dates of birth and death. These birth and death records are presented in alphabetical order and come from

sources in (68) sixty-eight counties. An index of hidden surnames is also included.

It gives many unknown facts and peculiarities about census records and includes 29 census extraction forms, 1790-1930. These forms enable you to copy and track your ancestor's information as you view these original documents. A CD-Rom of the entire Book is included for conveniently printing forms, searching the publication and quickly navigating to specific items of interest. Check out the 1930 Soundex and census forms; one of the questions is "So you have a Radio Set in your home?" Did you know that the repository holding the 1880 original census schedules for Arizona is the DAR Library, Washington, DC?

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
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
