### *Editor's Note . . .*

I believe this is **the most exciting thing** that has happened in the society in the 20 years that I have been a member! What a great opportunity ~ like a new start for CCGS! As well as expanding our library, members have the opportunity to think about what this move means to them and how they can serve the society in making this venture a successful one!

The Clark County Genealogical Society Library has been bursting at the seams for the past several years. Despite the hard work of the library staff to rearrange books and periodicals to make the best use of the space we currently have, it was obvious that we would soon run out of room for new acquisitions and donated books.

A building committee was formed with Lowell Norris as chair. The committee spent a great deal of time looking at options for relocating and weighing out the issues involved. When their proposal was presented to the Board in February, it was met with many questions and much discussion, and followed with a vote to accept the proposed plan to move to a new location!

The lease is signed! Our new address will be 717 Grand Avenue, Vancouver (one block south of Mill Plain). As renovations need to be made before we can move in, our "ready for occupancy" target date has been set for no later than June 1. **Watch the newsletter for more details.**

*What will (or could) this mean to society members and visitors?*

- ◆ More room for new acquisitions and donated publications.
- ◆ More room to work.
- ◆ New hours of operation that meet the needs of more members.
- ◆ Handicap accessible.
- ◆ Free parking.
- ◆ Place for interest groups to meet? Place for committee meetings?

*What can society members do to make this relocation a successful move for the society?*

### **Donate time, money, or materials!**

- ◆ Offer to help with the move. Packing, unpacking, shelving books. Many hands will make it go faster. (Contact Lowell.)

## HELPING YOU PLAN A FAMILY REUNION

Part of the fun in having a family reunion is seeing how many old and new relatives you can find to invite to your gathering. That's where your genealogy hobby will come to the rescue. If you have entered the street address for each person in your computerized genealogy program then you have a useful tool in helping get all these people together. Many computer programs will print an address list that is easy to convert to labels with many word processing programs.

Plan your activities and then secure the location where you want to have each event. If your group is large, in the 100 - 200 range, you will probably have to arrange for the place for your main event at an early date. If you're planning a picnic, the same thing will probably apply. Some parks in our area need your reservations nearly a year in advance.

When you have the dates and locations for your events, it's time to send a notice to everyone so they can begin planning to attend. As an annual affair, which you organize each summer on a specified date, you will need only send one notice out about 45 days in advance. If it's a one-time happening, plan on two mailings - one at least six months before the planned event and the final one four to six weeks before the date.

### Postcards still a bargain!

Using postcards that you make with your computer is the most economical way of doing a mailing to a large group of people. If you make your own cards, you can compose four of them on a regular 8 1/2" x 11" sheet of cover stock - or 110# bond. You must use something heavy enough to go through the U.S. Postal Service canceling and letter sorting machines. Your cards can measure up to 4" high by 6" wide and the amount of information you can get in this space - at only 20 cents each - is amazing. If you purchase ready-made postal cards from the U.S. Postal Service, the charge will be 21 cents each. When in doubt about the size of your card, contact your local Post Office before preparing them.

Use a return address label on your cards with an added line just below the return address: TEMP - RETURN SERVICE REQUESTED. If the person has moved, you will receive the card back with the new address information. If the person is gone on an extended vacation with their mail temporarily forwarded, the word TEMP will enable this item to be forwarded to them. Without TEMP as part of the request, the card will be returned to you as "Temporarily Away" which doesn't do a thing to help you with your plans.

One thing to include on the postcard is the fact that you can use donations of cash to help with the expenses such as printing and postage. A donation box or jar on a table at the reunion is another way to collect needed cash. Keep it on your sign-in table so someone can watch it. Remove any large bills as soon as possible to avoid losing them.

With many people now having computers and e-mail capabilities, you can save a lot of postage by sending their notice the easy way - by e-mail. If one of your relatives has Internet access, perhaps they can set up a family web page to announce the reunion. That same person could look for places to advertise your reunion on Internet - for free! If you notify the entire family by mail or e-mail then it won't be necessary to do any other advertising or announcing via any media.

### Activities can be varied

The activities you plan will depend on where you are holding the events and the ages of those attending. If you have many older folks attending, then have some quiet entertainment or games. A fun thing might be a crossword puzzle with family names, occupations, locations and so on. These are easily made with an inexpensive computer program. A prize could go to the one who gets the most right and/or gets done first. With a tie - you can always flip a coin!

We have an annual family picnic and many of the cousins attending enjoy playing a game of softball. The older folks enjoy sitting around and visiting with cousins whom they haven't seen since last year. There are books available at your public library about games

for crowds. You can always adapt games and activities for your reunion from books about games at bridal or baby showers and other events such as this - just change the format to use at your reunion.

At another of our family reunions we were entertained by watching a VCR tape of a cousin's trip to the ancestral home of our ancestors in England. This was a treat for all who will never be able to travel there.

### **Planning for a family book**

Part of the entertainment at our family reunion is enjoying the pictures, stories and other items in our family scrapbooks. These books begin with our Bauer family back in the early 1700s in Germany - with computer originated family sheets for the very first Bauer that we've found. We're also including copies of old documents copied from microfilm to add interest and information. From there we go to the next generation with more family sheets. Finally, we reach pages for the family in the 1800s where we have pictures of these people - along with their family sheets. Starting with the great grandfather's family, we have at least one page for each of his surviving children. We follow the descendants of each of these children before going on to the next child. After the first few generations, we have ended up with three major family groups in the books. There is a group for each of the three brothers who left Germany with one going to Canada and the other two to Clark County, Washington.

We have three full 3" binders now with only a few more families to fill in with pictures on their pages. Each family member will be represented in the book - most of them with pictures. If we've received nothing, the page will have their name and below the name will be the "Great Grandson of Charles Bauer." The page can be filled in later.

These scrapbooks will become a family genealogy book in another year or so. The pages must be numbered and an index made before the completed book can be printed. I've used my scanner to make black and white scanned halftones that print fairly well. Meanwhile - we enjoy the books at our annual reunions!

To get more information for your family book, bring along some family information sheets which can be

filled out and returned to you either that day or later. Include your name and address on each form because you will be surprised at how many people can't remember the marriage date - and sometimes the birth date for their own children!

### **Name tags**

Name tags for a reunion are essential - unless you want to go around introducing everyone. Some people object to wearing a name tag, but even cousins can be mistaken for each other! At one of our reunions two little boys came running up to my husband and called him Grandpa. He replied that he wasn't their grandpa which amazed them! It turned out he and his second cousin could almost pass for twins!

We have very simple tags but we make them so they can be read from at least 10 feet away. Our tags are completed with a small colored dot that identifies which part of the family the person is from, and there are "maps" to read these colored codes on each table. If your name tags are large enough, you can identify the person on the tag below his name as "Son of John Doe," etc. If you're having several events, you might need to make several name tags for each person because some of them will forget to wear them the second day - or even the same day if they change clothes between events. Plain paper name tags, quickly made on a computer and pinned on with a regular straight pin, are far more economical and satisfactory than those with "sticky" stuff to hold them on clothing.

### **Food**

If this is a catered affair - such as a large dinner - you won't have to worry about who is fixing the meal. For a picnic, a potluck always works out well, but have something planned which will keep the foods warm or cold. There are rental companies that probably have the appliances you will need. Assigning dishes to bring to a potluck can be accomplished several ways. In the case of a family reunion it might be hard to use the first letter of the last name - but check it out and see how many surnames are involved. You could assign those with the last name beginning with A to F as the ones who will bring a salad; those with G to M will bring desserts; from N to S please bring a main dish or casserole and from T through Z, bring rolls,

snack things, etc. Divide it up and work in your menu so it will all be covered.

When planning an annual reunion for a large group, appoint one family to be in charge of planning food (and perhaps preparing some of it); another family in charge of entertainment; another family in charge of name tags and so on. Spread the work out and it will be easier for everyone.

Have fun, enjoy yourself and keep lots of notes about what to do and not to do next time. After one or two family reunions, you'll become a real expert at doing it! I've tried to cover only a few of the details involved. You'll have to do many other things such as arranging for housing for a large group of people, but to include everything would mean I would have to write another book!

### **Lost someone during WWII time period?**

Members of the Army and Army Air Corps who died in the line-of-duty status during World War II can be found at the NARA (National Archives and Records Administration) web site. To access this information, go to the NARA NAIL search form at the following URL:

<http://www.nara.gov/cgi-bin/starfinder/0?path=standard.txt&id=demo&pass=&OK=OK>

Type in county name for the search keywords, such as Clark and County. Scroll down to the Media window and highlight Textual Records; then click Submit Search. When you get a display showing number of hits you have, click Display Results button.

Look under "Control No., Title, Dates, Creator" column for a title that reads: World War II Honor List of Dead and Missing Army and Army Air Forces Personnel from [your state]. To the right of the description, click on the Full Display button. On the next screen, you will get a full description. Click on the Links to Digital Copies link.

On your state page, click on the county of choice. (Be sure to read the two forward pages, as they will give an explanation of terms, abbreviations, and who is included on the lists.) The images of old documents are slow loading, but be patient - you may find that missing relative!

## **"DO YOU HAVE WITCHES, ALSO?"**

I'm chatting with a participant in the CCGS online CHAT ROOM on a Tuesday evening at 7pm. (Rosanne Simmons says I may quote her about an accused "witch" in her New England family from 1660). Our sentences are short, so we can type them easily into the window box of the Chat program. We adjust our eyes to the screen with questions and answers of the "one person at a time" responses, watching our typing appear after a few seconds of each "post."

Sharing some information about online web pages that helped with my genealogy research during the week, it's possible to describe a web page, adding the web address at the end of each entry. Web addresses display as "clickable" in the reading window. If we e-mail a participant the transcript of a whole "Chat" session, the web addresses show up as "clickable," making good references.

Entering the address for the web page: "New England History and Genealogy Free Books Online," the display says: <http://genweb.net/~books>

That online website is updated by David Blackwell, who chooses books that are out of copyright, or scanned with the permission of the compiler. For example, the title "North of Boston --Essex and Hamilton" by Joseph B. Felt, published 1834, has a linked page with "full text" online, see: <http://www.geocities.com/~jslaughter/HistoryOfIpswich.html>

The Ipswich text includes a discussion of dates titled "Chronology," explaining why there are often double dates such as 1620/21 in old documents, caused by a change in the calendar.

I type, "That explanation helped me read some of the "Witch" texts in my Kinney line," from the 1692 Witch trials in Salem Village, MA, where Henry and Ann Kinne resided.

"Hi Nancy", my Chat partner types. "I've bookmarked both of those. I don't know of any ancestors from Essex but I had quite a few in Middlesex in the 1600's. In fact one was a witch. No, actually she was accused as a witch but was acquitted."

So of course I ask, "Which witch was yours?"

She responds, "Do you have witches also?" And adds the fact that "her non-witch" is Winifred Holman of Cambridge in 1660. "After she was acquitted she sued her accusers (the Gibsons and their son-in-law, Stearns)."

"Yes," I type, "my mom found Kinney names in the Towne and Nurse families," and recently was told that a granddaughter of accused "Witch" Rebecca Towne Nurse of 1692 married a Kinney in our line. Good transcript documents for those trials are now online at University of Virginia, see:

Rosanne types: "Yours had been better publicized. I was lucky to be able to get a partial transcript of the court records for Winifred from the Massachusetts Archives. It was photocopied on huge sheets which made translating it from the middle English a 2-3 month task."

Now, University of Virginia has transcribed many texts, added online search capability, plus maps of Salem Village, with residence indexes for each family. Henry Kinne is on the map, also many of the Putnam family. With help from a cousin who has studied the family more thoroughly, we were able to conclude that Ann Putnam who was married to Henry Kinne, was not the accuser of Rebecca Towne Nurse. Another Ann, married to Thomas Putnam, along with a daughter Ann, did testify against Rebecca at the trial. Rebecca was hung in 1692.

### NEW RESOURCES AT FORT VANCOUVER REGIONAL LIBRARY

The Fort Vancouver Regional Library now has several computers (at different locations) that have Electronic Resources. Just a few of the websites that the library subscribes to that might be of interest to genealogists are the following:

Biography Resource Center ~ Full text biographical information of over 900,000 living and deceased people. Includes all *Who's Who* publications, and full-text magazines.

Ancestry.com ~ With this database, you have instant access to over 500 million names in which to try to locate your ancestors. If you have access to the internet, but do not currently subscribe to Ancestry.com, this is a great chance to go beyond the free databases offered and see what is available in the paid databases.

All Newspapers ~ Full text of the *Columbian*, *New York Times*, *Oregonian*, and other Washington Newspapers. These newspapers are current from 1998 to the present. Back files (1986-1997) are available for some of the newspapers in this database.

Telephone Directory ~ This directory, known as the Acxiom Info Base Phone Directory, contains more than 100 million current White and Yellow Page listings for residences and businesses in the U.S.

Not all of the library's computers have these databases, so be sure to ask which ones have the Electronic Resources.

## AN 1858 ADVENTURE ON THE STEAMER COLUMBIA

The following is an excerpt from MSS 2217, papers of Mrs. L. C. Lockwood, and is published with the permission of the Oregon Historical Society, Portland, Oregon.

In June 1858, I was a passenger on the Steamer Columbia with Capt. Dall as pilot. At that time Rogue River Chief John and his son were taken to California as prisoners in charge of Sergeant Davis from Vancouver. The Indian were in irons until after we crossed the Columbia River Bar. Then the irons were taken off and they were allowed some liberty; walked about on deck the same as other passengers. When we arrived at Humbolt Bay the ocean was very rough; too rough, the Capt. said to send the mail ashore, so the ship was anchored for the night or until there was a calm. The Indians seemed to know where they were; they looked across to the land and talked together for some time. Well, every one went to bed and slept soundly until late in the night when they were aroused by receiving heavy blows on the head. My first tho't was, that my head was mashed. Some of my teeth were split and had to be extracted the next day. The room was dark and I couldn't see what was going on; my husband received a blow on the head at the same time I did. The watch on the deck had heard the noise below and had cried fire. Every passenger that heard the cry rushed for the deck. When I got thoroughly awakened I arose and took a survey of my surroundings. I saw the dark figure of chief John striking at every one in his reach. He had, by this time, wrenched a piece of iron from one of the tables. The first blow I received was done with a stick of ash wood. I stooped down and picked up my baby, who was fourteen months old and small of his age, and that I would make my way to the steps along with the other passengers, but they were all so excited and pushing and rushing that my chances were rather slim; but I kept my face toward the indian and kept backing toward the steps. When I reached the foot of the stairs there was a very tall man (I think he must have been at

least six feet tall) who was just starting up the stairs. He stepped back and told me to go on up and that he would keep the Indian back until I got up; so he braced himself by holding to two posts with his hands and kicked the old chief in the stomach every time he advanced toward me. I received one blow from the iron bar which was aimed at my baby's head. I threw up my right arm to shield my baby and received the blow which broke my arm about half way between my elbow and wrist. By the time I reached the deck I was beginning to suffer a great deal of pain. My husband met me and took the babe; the steward opened a door and took us into a small room and gave me a pair of blankets to wrap around me for I was dressed only in my night clothes. The passengers were so excited that they didn't see me for some time. I could hear them talking all around me that the woman below was murdered. All this time young John, the old chief's son was trying to kill the sergeant who had charge of them. The officers made several attempts to go below to capture the indians but the old chief would break their lanterns as soon as they came in reach. They finally formed two companies; one went down the stairs and the other went down the hatchway. They shot at the young Indian and broke one of his legs; they shot at the old chief's head and the ball entered his right cheek and came out on the other side of his face. They then pounded him with the gun until they broke the stock of the gun. They finally overpowered them; tied them securely and put them below, keeping a guard over them until we reached San Francisco. From there they sent them to Beneica, a government fort.

Mary was born 17 September 1830 in Crawfordsville, Montgomery County, Indiana and died 5 March 1923 in Portland, Oregon. They were married in 1855 in Oregon and had children - Sumner Fremont (1857-1942) and Lillian (1862-1951). Lillian married Charles Henry Crawford 25 February 1880 in La Center, Clark County, Washington.



## PLANNING A RESEARCH TRIP? RESEARCH YOUR PLAN

If you are one of many genealogists who will be making a research trip this summer, it's not too soon to start planning. Many of you may be driving or flying to visit the areas where your ancestors came from and to gather as much family information as you can. Quite often your time is limited; but if you plan ahead, you can make the best use of your time. Don't waste time there - trying to figure out where you should go to research, locating what records are available where, and going over family group sheets trying to decide what you need to look up. Have a plan ready before you leave home!

### Where to research

What research repositories are available in the towns and counties where you are going? Compile a list of public libraries, genealogical society libraries, museums and historical society libraries, colleges or universities with genealogical collections, churches, cemeteries, newspaper offices, courthouses, and funeral homes? Will you be close to state libraries and archives, or church archives? Are there organizations there that your ancestors belonged to that are still in existence, which might have records of genealogical value? Much of this information can be found on the internet or in publications.

Write, e-mail, or call to verify what days and hours these facilities are open, any holiday closures, their street address, cost of copies, and whether parking is available. Be advised that not all county courthouses are open Monday through Friday and from 8:00-5:00. (I once had to rearrange my plans on a trip to Missouri when I found out the courthouse I had planned to research at was not open on the day I had planned to be there.) Some small churches don't have offices; find out where their records are kept and if they are accessible. Find out what kind of special collections are located at each library. Find out where the records are kept for cemeteries you will be visiting.

### Finding places once you get there

Write to each Chamber of Commerce in the localities you will be visiting. Inquire if they have city or county maps. Often they do for free or a small fee. Let them know what you will be doing there, as they may have brochures on research sites that you would be visiting. They can also provide information on places to stay and other sites to see. Your spouse may want to drop you off at the library, while he/she goes and does something to their liking. (Is there

possibly anything more interesting than looking at dusty old records in a courthouse basement [archives] in a small town in Kentucky?)

There are map programs, such as *Microsoft Expedia Streets and Trips 2000*, which allow you to pinpoint specific locations in a town and print a map. You might want to locate addresses where your family once lived.

#### Relatives to visit

You may be visiting an area for the first time. Possibly you have already been corresponding with relatives there. Drop them a line and let them know what days you will be in town, where you will be staying, that you "plan to do some research, but sure would like to get together." If they don't write to you before you leave home, they'll know where you are staying and when you'll be there. It is often hard to juggle research time and time with relatives. As many repositories are only open during the day, don't be shy about asking if you couldn't plan meeting for lunch or dinner (or even breakfast!) or possibly coming over in the evening.

Be sure to take their addresses and phone numbers along.

#### What to bring

- Camera with lots of film and/or camcorder.
- Soft brush for cleaning off headstones and an old pair of shoes.
- Paper and pencils and any other office supplies you deem necessary.
- One small newspaper office suggested I bring rubber gloves for handling their big volumes of bound newspapers. They failed to mention that half of them were on the top shelf of a storage rack, and that I would need to climb a ladder. They were dusty, heavy, full of wonderful obits

and articles, and worth every ounce of dust I wore on me when I left the office three hours later.

- Family group sheets (but only for the family line that lived in the states you will be visiting). No need to take more than you need to - unless there are relatives you are planning to visit that have expressed an interest in seeing everything you have!
- Blank family group sheets to leave with relatives (if they aren't filled out during your visit).
- Tape recorder, cassettes, and batteries.
- Coins for parking and photocopiers.
- Research lists.

#### Research Lists

Go through your family group sheets, making lists of any possible record that can be looked for in each county you plan to visit. Include any event that is blank or any event that you want to verify. For each county, you may want to create a list of -

- Individual cemeteries - include names of people who are known to be buried there, as well as names of people you are hoping to find there.
- Courthouse records to look up - probate, birth, marriage, death, probate, court, and land records.
- Obituaries - find out where newspaper collections are.
- Records for specific churches - baptisms, marriages, and burials.
- Funeral home records.
- Specific libraries or archives - if you know what records are available, make a list of the ones you want to check (such as city directories, published histories, and published genealogies) and the names you are looking for. When you arrive at a library or archives, ask for direction on whether certain things are available and where they can be found. Don't spend a lot of time browsing. They might even point out valuable collections or indexes for the county that you weren't aware of.
- On-site visits to family homesteads or property.

Make your lists as detailed as possible (including names and time ranges), so you don't waste time flipping through group sheets trying to find out what time span an event occurred.

When planning to research funeral homes and churches, it's definitely a plus for them to know you'll be coming. And remember that funeral homes do not

normally have time to accommodate researchers when they are working on a funeral.

With your lists all done, organize them in a 3-ring binder of a size that just fits. Include addresses, maps and directions. You may want to keep your family group sheets in a separate binder. If possible, make up a daily schedule of what facilities you would like to visit and when (by now you already know their days and hours of operation and hopefully will have heard from relatives you are planning to visit).

At this point, you might have the feeling that your trip will be too short to do all you would like to do. (This has happened to me every time.) If you can't add extra days to your trip, then prioritize your work. Leave the least important for "if time left." You may also decide to put some of the research for "if time" if the records are known to be available through film rental at your local Family History Center. Be sure to check out those original resources that are only available on site! Include those courthouse records that have not yet been microfilmed (which are often those from the 20<sup>th</sup> century).

While there - if you don't get finished before a courthouse or library closes, you might inquire about names of researchers in the area. Expect the unexpected! You might spend longer at one repository, as there is much more information than you expected and it just keeps falling into your lap. While another might have nothing more than you have already seen on microfilm in Salt Lake City.

On our trip to Ontario, Canada last summer, I tried to limit my research to just my Scott family line which I have been working on for the past four years (although I have five family lines that lived in

Ontario). We had spent an evening visiting a relative in a small town east of Toronto and were to head north in the morning to the area where we would be spending a week. The day was beautiful and on a whim, I asked my husband if we could make a 10-mile drive south just to see the area where my Payne and Chase family had lived. He agreed. On passing the Carrying Place Cemetery, I mentioned that I had Chase family buried there. My husband urged me to stop and check headstones. I had only brought one group sheet on the Chase family (that of my third great grandfather, Daniel Chase). We didn't find a headstone for him, but I made notes and my husband photographed every Chase headstone in that cemetery. Half way through our visit, the caretaker who was mowing the cemetery came and inquired what we were looking for. Just before we left, he came to tell us about Harry Chase, who lived down the road and had been on that property for as long as he could remember. I was anxious to head north, but my husband again urged me to stop and meet Harry Chase, as we might not ever get this way again. Harry, seeing us drive up and expecting us to be making a religious visit was much surprised when I said that I once had Chase family that lived in the area and wondered if he recognized any of the names on the only group sheet I had brought with. Well, yes, one of the children listed was his great grandfather, and the property we were now on was the original homestead. After showing us a family Bible with many names I then recognized, he showed us the house still on his property that had been built by his great grandfather circa 1840. I realized then that this was the house Daniel and his wife had lived in with their son and his family prior to their deaths. The house now deteriorating looked the same as it had when Harry's father built their new home in 1928. Again, expect the unexpected and have a great trip!

Col. A.G. Tripp, at his residence in this city, aged 64 years. Funeral at the Methodist Church tomorrow at half past two o'clock, P.M.

In the death of Col. Tripp, Vancouver has lost a good citizen and his family a kind and indulgent husband and father. His death, though expected for the past day or two, was sudden, he having been confined to his house for a little more than a week previous to yesterday, the date of his death. The death of Col. Tripp deserves more than a passing notice.

This distinguished citizen was born in the state of Rhode Island, in the year 1811. In the 24th year of his age he was married to Ruth Atwood, and emigrated to the Pacific Coast in 1849 and to Vancouver in 1851. He had been employed by the United States Government at the military posts at Benicia, California, Dalles, Oregon, Boise City, Idaho, Sitka, Alaska and at the post in Vancouver. He was chosen by the people of Clarke county to represent them in the Territorial Legislature, which he did ably and faithfully, and was re-elected for a second term, but did not serve, owing to absence from the territory in the Government employ.

He became a member of the Methodist Church seven years since and has remained a conscientious

and upright member of that body to the time of his death. The Colonel in his manner was 'quiet and unobtrusive, and carried with him everywhere a gentle, dignified and manly bearing which secured him respectful consideration from all whom he met and the love and esteem of many personal friends. Vancouver will miss **Col. Tripp**. The Church in whose house he was wont to be seen each Sabbath, will look with tearful eyes upon his vacant seat; and his family, in this the one great bereavement of their lives, have the deepest sympathy of the whole community. He was conscious to the last, and as the Death Angel drew near to summon him to appear up higher, a peaceful resignation stole over his face as he passed from earth into eternity calmly as an infant to sleep upon its mother's bosom. DUPUIS, Nicholas: listed in obit 3 Nov 1890 *Vancouver Independent* as "During the civil war...took part in most of the important Indian Engagements on the coast." He was an employee of Hudson's Bay Company and it was unclear if he fought as a soldier. He was born 15 Mar 1815, near Montreal, at St. James. In the winter of 1838 he married Julia Ann DeMerce, grandniece of Archbishop DeMerce of Victoria. In 1857 he immigrated to Illinois, in 1850 searched for gold in California, and then came to Oregon.

LYONS, Lawrence, b. about 1816, Carey County, Ireland, emigrated to American in 1849, d. Mar 1898, age 82 years. Came of Clarke County 1859. Entered military service from New York and served 10 years participating in Indian wars in Florida and later in Oregon. In 1849 he entered the service of the US in the quartermaster's department at Vancouver barracks and held this position until incapacitated by age. Glenn N. Ranck's column 3 July 1902, p2, *Vancouver Independent*: Gideon Gilliam, living Missouri in 1861, Myers served in Prussian Army in Danish war of 1848, to US 1851 and was with Sheridan's Co. when they were attacked by Indians at the Cascade block-house in 1856, served through the Rebellion and Nez Perce war of 1878; Mr. Teedie, our German friend was tied to his bed by escaped convicts, was in war against Austria in 1856, battle of Konnigratz under Crown Prince Wilhelm and has metal; many present also fought in the Spanish-American War.

There are expected to be many more added to this list as information keeps being discovered. Both the Post Cemetery listing and cemetery abstractions done by Clark County Genealogical Society have many burials which could be civil war service. Because there is not enough information to determine in which war they served, they have not been included.

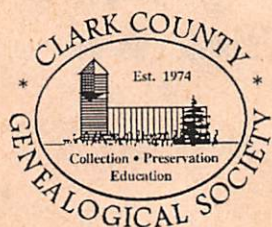
