My Grand Father Roderick Shelton was born in Patrick County Virginia he married Miss Usley Willard and unto them were born thirteen children to wit eight sons and five daughters.

My Grand Father moved to Buncombe County North Carolina in the year 1797 where he died in the year 1816.

My Father Lewis Shelton was born in Patrick County Virginia September the 15th 1785 and on the 28th day of January 1811 he was married to Miss Nancy Gladdin Daughter of Jared Gladdin of Green County Tennessee.

My Grand Father Jared Gladdin was born in Wales, England in the year 1760 and emigrated to the State of New York when he was a young man where he was married to Miss Mary Horton and unto them were born twelve children to wit nine boys and three girls

I was born in Buncombe County Northcarolina on the 15th day of September 1812 and my Father Lewis Shelton emigrated to the Territory now state of Missouri in the year 1819 and settled in that portion of the state now known as Saline County at that time being next to the uper settler on the Missouri River and as the state settled up he kept moving back as the state settled up and died in Andrew County on the 28th day of January 1847.

Frances Willson was born in Whitley County Kentucky on the 16th day of March 1817 and her Father David Willson died in Whitley County Kentucky on the 17th day of November 1829 and her mother moved with her children whose names are as follows to wit Frances Wilson Adaline Wilson Mary Wilson and John S.S. Wilson in to Madison County Kentucky and lived there until the year 1835 and then emigrated to Missouri and settled in Clinton County where David Shelton and Frances Wilson became acquainted and were joined in marriage on the 30th day of May 1837 and lived there until February 1838 when we moved into what was then known as the Platte purchase which was attached to the State of Missouri for civil and military purposes. and afterwards became a part of the State of Missouri we settled near St Joseph and lived not far from there until the 9th day of May 1847 when we crossed the River on our way to Oregon which proved to be a long and tedious journey being made with ox teams. from the time we crossed the Missouri we had to travel through an Indian Country to the Pacific Coast, the emigrants had considerable of trouble with the Indians that year we had a fight with the Pawnee Indians at the crossing of Plum Creek near the Platte River. Before the fight took place the Indians caught two of our men that was out a hunting and striped of everything they had with the exception of their boots and hats, Their names were Munsel Robinson and Thomas Hockel. They had a fashion of going out a hunting every day and I told them that they would come in some day

stript of everything they had. Hockel said that no one but a coward would suffer himself stript. I told him if they caught me and I got away by giving up everything I had I would consider that I had got off on good terms he said that no one but a coward would be stript. After those Indians stript those two men they came upon us where we were encamped and tried to stampeed our stock and then the fight commenced they failed to get our stock under way. They got hold of the ropes on some of our horses the horses being afraid of them and we being in pursuit of them they had to let them go and leave in a hurry There was two more of our men yet out hunting and the Indians went in the Direction of where the men went a portion of our men got their horses and followed after them and as they came in sight of our men the Indians came upon them the Indians seing our men on horseback they hurriedly took their guns and ammunition from them and being close to Plumb Creek they swam across and got away we thinking it the better part of valor to not follow them. in crossing water courses we often had a make rafts of our wagon boxes to ferry our families and goods across the the streams.

In our journeyings we helped quite a number of persons who had been robbed of everything they had with the exception of their waggons and teams even to ripping open their feather beds and the taken of the bed ticks. We traveled on until we came to the Umatilla River where we see Doctor Whitman a missionary who had resided at the Waiilatpu Mission on the Walla Walla River for quite a number of years he stoped with us all night and gave us a sketch of his life and adventures especially things that took place west of the Rocky Mountains. Our camp was alongside of a large village of the Cayuse Indians and they were vary impudent and angry at the emigrants on the account of the measles getting among them. The disease was brought amonst them by the emigrants and they did not know but what it was done on purpose. Dr Whitman told us that he had been doctoring some of the Indians for the measles and that some of them had died and their relatives had threatened to take his life on that account; he said he thought it would all pass by as threats of that kind had heretofore. Threats of that kind is a thing that is vary little understood by the people as to the reason why they should be made by the Indians. The reason is this it was a law among the Indians of that day on this coast if one of their doctors should doctor one of the tribe and the sick should die its relatives would

demand pay for it, if the doctor would not agree to pay for it its relatives would give the doctor what they considered a reasonable time to think the matter over and then if he did not pay for it they would kill him. And that would end the trouble. Also at this time their was quite a number of Catholic Priests who had lately arrived in the Country and some of them had located in the country where Whitman was opperating There is a great difference between the doctrines as taught by the Catholics and that taught by the Protestants. And religious zeal knows no mercy. And the Inquisition of Spain changes its form so as to suit the times and place. Catholic and Protestant are alike in one respect believing each other to be the emisary of Satan.

From the Umatilla we traveled on until we passed the Dalls and nine miles below the Dalls, we stoped and built a scow 48 ½ feet long and thirteen feet wide and 2 feet 6 inches deep to bring our families and wagons down to the Wallamette Valley.

We drove our stock down along the Columbia River by swimming them across the river twice, and when we got to Cascades the winter had set in it being about the 20th of November it was raining and snowing. And there was quite a number of the children down with the measles. We had only two children and they were both down with the measles the youngest was not expected to live. We had to turn our scow loose and have Indians catch her and bring her ashore about five hundred yards from the upper part of the rapids and then we had to carry all our goods that far to get them aboard and then we had to go nearly five miles farther before we were clear of the rapids. My children being sick I concluded I would not wait for the boat so I hired four Indians with a canoe and put my family and what goods I had in it and struck out for Fort Vancouver a Hudson Bay Company Trading post; at that time it was snowing vary fast but it did not take us many minutes to pass over the remainder of the rapids a distance of about five miles. When we got to the lower end of the Rapids the Indians set sail and sailed from there to a place called Cape Horn and the water being so rough they would not undertake to pass the cape we landed above the cape and stayed there two nights. The snow fell about one foot deep. The next day the weather cleared up and we got to Fort Vancouver a Hudson Bay Companys Post about nine oclock at night with one dollar in my pocket and the next morning when the gate was opened at the fort

I went into the store and gave one half of my money for flour and the other half for syrup, not knowing how or where I should be able to get anything to eat when that should give out. before night of that day an old friend of mine came along whose name was Joseph Caples and asked me where I was wanting to go. I told him I wanted to go to Alexander McQuins on Sauvies Island on the Columbia River. He told me he was traveling in a canoe he also told me to get to get my family and things into his canoe and he would take me there tonight and according to promise he landed us safe at Alexander McQuins on the head of Sauvies Island on the Columbia River on the 30th day of November 1847 about ten oclock at night. So ended a long and tedious journey never to be forgotten while I live.

Shortly after getting to our journeys end the news reached the Wallammette of the massacre of Doctor Whitman and family and quite a number of others which did not surprise me, then there had to be an army raised and the war carried into their own Country to keep them from coming into the valley. They pushed right into their own Country and stayed there until Spring and then succeeded in whipping and bringing about a peace. I took up a claim on the uper end of Sauvies Island and made a garden there and sold in the fall of 1848 and went to the gold mines in the spring of 1849. I went down in an old Spanish Bark in the spring of 1849. I was taken sick the day after I got to San Francisco which was on the 18th day March. Still I was able to travel on until I got to the place where the gold was discovered the place now known as Coloma, by that time I was not able to go any farther. I lay sick there until about the first of June and my friends was going to the north fork of the American fork of Sacramento, and my party concluded go home to Oregon the latter part of August. We went to San Francisco and from there went aboard of a Bark called the John W. Cater commanded by Captain Irving. We arrived at Portland the 13th day September 1849. my family being in Yamhill County I went after them and brought them to Portland. And we stoped there until February 1852 when there was five families of us to wit L. B. Hastings, F. W. Pettigrove, Thomas Talentine, Ross, and David Shelton come to the conclusion that we would get a small sailing vessel and come around to Puget Sound. We succeeded in procuring a seventy five ton schooner called the Mary Taylor. We had quite a pleasant voyage. When we got to where Port Townsend stands there was a man

by the name of Plumer who had taken up that place and built himself a log cabin. Hastings and Pettigrove with their families got of there. After that we came on to Steilacom and Talentine got of there. We then came on to Olympia and myself and family and Ross and his family got of there on the 29th day of February 1852 and stayed there until the 13th day of April 1853 when we moved into and settled on Hamersleys Inlet now known as Skookum Bay. At that time it belonged to Thurston. At that time the whole of Puget Sound belonged to Thurston County. At that time the County seat was at Olympia the County and Probate business was transacted by three County Judges. The three judges were Sidney S. Ford of Big Mound Prairie, Arthur A. Denny of Alki Point this side of where Seattle now stands and David Shelton of Skookum Bay. In the winter of 53 and 54 the Territory was organized. Previous this time the Oregon Legislature had met and organized four more Counties on Puget Sound to wit Pierce, King, Jefferson and Island. I was elected to the first Legislature of Washington Territory which was convened in Olympia in February 1854. during that session I introduced a bill to organize Sawamish County and which was passed and became a law in the year 1854. the name Sawamish County was changed to that of Mason County in honor of Charles H. Mason first Secretary of the Territory of Washington. Myself and family was the first white family that ever settled in that portion of the Territory now known as Mason County.

In the fall of 1855 White River massacre to place and then the war between the whites and Indians began and continued until the fall of 1856. during the time of the war the people of Mason constructed a fort on the Bay opposite Arcadia and lived there until war ended; there was a company of volunteers organized in Mason County with C.W. Swindall as Captain and David Shelton first Lieutenant. The Captain of the Company and half of the men were called to opperate on the east side of the Sound where the most of the fighting was done and I was left in command of the Fort. The Company was known as Company A Washington Territory Volunteers. After the war was over we all moved back on to our farms, and I have continued to live on my farm on Skookum Bay ever since. This being the 24th day of 1887. I have passed through a great many trials and troubles but the greatest trouble that ever befel me was the loss of my wife she died on the 15th day of April 1887 age 70

years. 29 days if she had lived until the 30th day of the next month it would have been fifty years for us together as man and wife. I will now give the names of my children and the name of the State and County were they were born.

I could relate many things that took place through my journeyings, through life which I may do at some future time.

I was a volunteer in 1832 in time of the Black War. I was in Captain Gilliams Company. We were placed on the line between the State of Missouri and Iowa for the purpose of keeping the Missouri Sacs from joining the Mississippi Sac Indians.

In the year 1838 my father, four brothers and myself helped to drive the Mormons from their(?) West in Caldwell County Missouri. I have always lived on the frontiers therefore I have never had a chance to get an education.

Did you make any resolutions on the eve of the new year 2000? Have you kept those resolutions or have they fallen by the wayside? It's a familiar scenario: as individuals, we make resolutions, promises, and to-do lists, then watch as those good intentions slip away unaccomplished. Just as we break resolutions in our personal lives, societies do the same in their organizational lives. Our societies identify goals, objectives, and projects to be accomplished over both the short term and the long term. These plans are usually more formal and more detailed than our personal resolutions, yet regrettably they often still meet the same fate.

How can we, both as individuals and organizations, break this cycle of broken resolutions? As we look to make substantial, meaningful contributions to our societies and the genealogical community, it is important that we consider the three steps to successful fulfillment of our goals and objectives: change, choice and progress.

Change is difficult. Human beings get set into one frame of reference, one method of operation so very easily. Old habits ("We've always done it that way") and fear of change ("We don't know what might happen") both conspire to keep many good projects on the drawing board and far from reality.

Societies, rather the group of individuals making up the society, must make a determined effort to accept change and indeed welcome change. Resolve that as we enter the new millennium your society will look for opportunities to do things differently from "the way we've always done it."

Successful change requires informed, focused, well-formulated choices. Gather the relevant facts, think clearly, and don't be afraid to be innovative. Don't overload your goals and objectives for the year with wishful thinking. Yes, it would be nice if you could do everything, but you can't. Be realistic and narrow

GETTING TO KNOW OUR TWO NEWEST LIFE MEMBERS

Lois (GUSTAVESON) (GASSAWAY) KULLBERG



Our latest life membership, Lois Kullberg, is a woman of many interests with a complex life history. Her decision to become a life member, although based on agreeing with the objectives and philosophy of the society and enjoying the fellowship of the members, was made possible through the inheritance from her mother, Audrey Muriel (Duce) Gustaveson, who passed on 10 Feb 2000 in Oregon City, Oregon. Her father, Clarence Albert Gustaveson, died on Valentines' Day 1989. Her most interesting ancestor is James Stephens Brown, who served in the Mormon Battalion and was present at and participated in the original discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill in California. He is her second great grandfather. In 1997 she had the opportunity to visit the site that has been re-created and made into a state park. One other benefit to her lineage was that she was able to qualify as a member of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers.

She was born in Ogden, Utah and moved with her parents to Portland, Oregon in 1944. She attended Portsmouth Grade School, the largest grade school in the Northwest. It was so big that school was organized into two daily shifts (7 am to noon, or noon to 5 pm). Then she attended Roosevelt High School. After her parents bought a berry farm near Oregon City, Oregon, she ultimately graduated from High School there in 1953. Two years later, she married Ben Gassaway Jr. and during the next sixteen years of the marriage, became the mother of six children, Ben III, Mark, Karen, Mike, David and Stephen. The family moved to Vancouver in 1964. In 1971, she married her current husband, Merle Kullberg, a native of Clark County. With his three children, they now have 22 grandchildren.

Ever since graduating from high school, Lois has worked at a variety of jobs, many of which were part time or temporary jobs so she could function as a full time mom also. Her longest full time employment was the five years at Clark College, where she earned her Associate of Arts & Sciences Degree in 1985. Her major emphasis was on Technical Writing and Computer Applications, but the courses she liked best were Graphic Arts, Northwest History and Pacific Northwest Wildflowers.

Lois became interested in genealogy when she lived near Boston, Massachusetts in the 1950s, and went with a group of friends to the New England Genealogical and Historical Society Library. About that same time she visited relatives in Utah, gathered whatever they had, and became acquainted with the Salt Lake Family History Library. In 1966, she took a course in genealogy and in the 1970s started teaching community education classes around Vancouver. Jennie Wood, who served as the Director of the first Family History Center in Vancouver, was a friend, advisor, mentor and teacher to Lois. About 1986, Lois read a book about using computers to do genealogy and decided she had to have one! It's been onward and upward ever since! She uses Ancestral Quest the most but also uses PAF 4.0, since downloading this free version from www.FamilySearch.org. She also owns Legacy and Ultimate Family Tree. She is currently learning Power Point and would like to develop some other ways to present classes.

In exchange for presenting a program to CCGS members, her first year's membership was an honorary one. She has been a paid member since 1978 with a few years off while she was earning her degree at Clark College. Her generous contributions to CCGS have been varied. She was elected twice as recording secretary, has served as a publicity chairman twice and as a genealogy instructor. Lois played a key role as Editor of the CCGS Newsletter Editor for over two years, including serving as guest editor this year and has been a volunteer librarian. She went on one CCGS research trip to Salt Lake City and enjoyed it. Lois was featured as a "Volunteer of Value" in the Summer 1998 CCGS Newsletter. That article contains many more details than allowed here about her and her husband's other contributions to CCGS. It covered some of her books but didn't include a more recent work, a history of Louisa Ann John Springer Ingram Bozarth Stuart. Lois has also written other materials for family history teachers and consultants and developed her own organizer system for family history notebooks.

Family activities, photography, gardening, arts and crafts, writing and genealogy are her favorite hobbies. Besides serving in many church callings, her volunteer work outside CCGS includes: PTA president, Little League mom, reading tutor, teaching genealogy classes, serving on the Clark Council on Aging and this past year Lois has been a member of the Marshallaires, a singing group that puts on concerts at area retirement and nursing homes every week.

Speaking of callings, Lois and her husband are going to serve on a Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints mission. They won't know until about mid-June where they will be going but are kind of hoping that it will be a family history mission, but that remains to be seen. They plan to leave about the end of September and will return about April 2002. When she comes back from this mission, she hopes to be able to get all the equipment she needs to capture her extensive genealogy on CD-ROMs, and to store her many family photos and histories. She has a huge clipping file she would like to put on CD-ROM.

This year she is working on her personal history and is especially interested in following a Scottish line she recently had a breakthrough on: McBRIDE, ANDREW, HARRIS, BALL, BOORAM, MORROW, PARKS. They came to Pennsylvania, then North Carolina and Tennessee, then moved to Ohio to live in a non-slave holding state after being burned out. Diana (EVANS) MANNING



On Leap Day this year, Diana Manning not only reinstated her membership but also simultaneously became a life member. She originally joined CCGS in 1997, in addition to a long and productive history with the Genealogical Forum of Oregon (GFO).

She was born in Corvallis, Oregon and moved with her parents and two brothers very early in life to the ill-fated Portland area known as Vanport, where Delta Park and the Portland International Raceway are located today. This city "was constructed in order to house the thousands of war-time shipbuilders that Henry Kaiser, of Henry Kaiser Industries, had recruited from New York to help with the war effort. Vanport, which was constructed in under a year, was deemed "The Miracle City." It had its own post office, nine schools, a fire station, a 400-seat cafeteria, a 785-seat theater, a library, a hospital, fourteen playgrounds, five commercial centers and a police station staffed by twenty-two officers. The problem with the second largest city in Oregon was that the quality of housing and building construction left much to be desired. On Sunday, May 30, 1948, just one day after the General Manager of Vanport announced that the city was "not in any foreseeable danger" from rising floodwaters, a segment of the ring-like dike surrounding the city collapsed. A twelve-foot wall of water rushed through the community, wiping out all of the poorly constructed houses. The residents were never officially notified that they were in danger."¹ Diana's family was renting in this area and lost all of their early photos as well as most of their other possessions.

Diana attended Salem schools mostly until her last 1 ½ years at West Linn High School in Portland, where she graduated. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Social Science from Portland State University. She has worked for 28 years in the social service field with seniors, children, developmentally disabled individuals. She is currently working in vocational rehabilitation, where they assist individuals with disabilities of all kinds to return to work when they are ready to do so, and expects to retire 31 July 2000. She is looking forward to some serious genealogical travels then.

As early as the 1960's, Diana began collecting more information of the family with the idea of doing more research later. She's been attending her family reunions off and on for the last twenty years in a continuation of this collection phase. In 1972, she married her husband, John Manning. In the 1980's, she became considerably more active in researching in libraries. In the early 1990's, Diana joined GFO, becoming a life member about five years ago. She has been an active volunteer, working as a receptionist in their last three locations. She also worked in their office briefly entering books and magazines into the computer catalog and preparing them for the shelves. Diana has also helped on a couple of extraction efforts for the library and is currently at work on a couple of indexing projects.

Preservation of all kinds of genealogical information is very important to Diana. When she is not in a genealogical library, she says she can be found in every used bookstore, antique shop, secondhand store, museum and community library, wherever she is. It is evident that Diana also believes that genealogists and family historians should become involved in their local genealogical societies for the purpose of learning a tremendous amount about the kind of information that is available to you in libraries, family history centers, historical societies and the "candy store" of them all—Salt Lake City Family History Library. Since learning that her third great grandfather, Francois Plourde, was an employee of Hudson Bay Company, Diana joined CCGS and is planning to become more actively involved after retirement.

Diana's most important research tip is to make sure that you write down not only the full citation of each book, periodical or other resource AND the library you found it in. You will want to find it again. Another tip is to learn to use the computer well and continuously backup the items you put into the computer. This tip came from actual experience. Diana has started putting her family information into the Family Tree Maker genealogy program for the second time after suffering a computer crash the first time. The good news was that she had maintained her complete paper copies.

She is currently researching the surnames of HOWARD, NEWBY, WARREN, PEER, WILLIAMS, EDWARDS, JONES, EVANS, BARKER, LaFLEUR, DUBOIS, PLOURDE (PLUARD, PLUEARD), WALTER and TREICHLER. To coordinate matching surnames and locations, contact Diana at dmann19165@aol.com.

In 1989, CCGS published *Clark County, Washington Cemetery Records, Vol. 5*, which included the Finn Hill Cemetery. It is important to remember when doing research to check all available sources, even in the case of two publications being compiled on the same source - such as in this case. Two different compilations can contain different material due to the date extraction was done, amount of information extracted, missing headstones or new headstones being erected (in the case of a cemetery reading), human error, and differences in deciphering information.

your focus onto one project at a time, then concentrate your resources until it is successfully completed.

That is progress. To be postured for progress means we are willing to change; we accept our roles as agents of change; and we place ourselves in the position of making good choices. We commit to solving, not shelving, the problems and challenges that are a part of our society's life; we resolve to make a difference, not just be different; and we do something practical and concrete to move our societies forward.

What works for societies works equally well for the individual family historian. Each one of us should choose at least one task, one project, and pursue it

until it is finished! We can not sit still and wait for someone else to do it, we must take charge of it and see it through.

Identify one thing your society needs to have done, choose one activity that would benefit the genealogy or local history collection of your library, decide what preservation activity you will financially support, and then do it.

There are over 50,000 family historians reading these words in the *Everton's Genealogical Helper* and thousands more in the societies who choose to reprint this in their newsletters. If each of us does just one positive, proactive deed this year, we will have indeed made tremendous progress.

Collectively, we can make a difference!

He was a laborer, itinerant man, home address not listed, died in a horse box stall at the Bud Smith Stable in Vancouver, Clark County, Washington attended by Coroner William J. Knapp of Vancouver. DETAILS: Body was found by A.F. Myers (Smith's night man at the stables). Man retired about 10 PM. Myers heard some groaning about 3 o'clock. Absolutely nothing was found on the body for identification. Reported by Police this man had been on the Denver Police Force and also Fire Department. The funeral was 8 Jul 1910 with no clergy. 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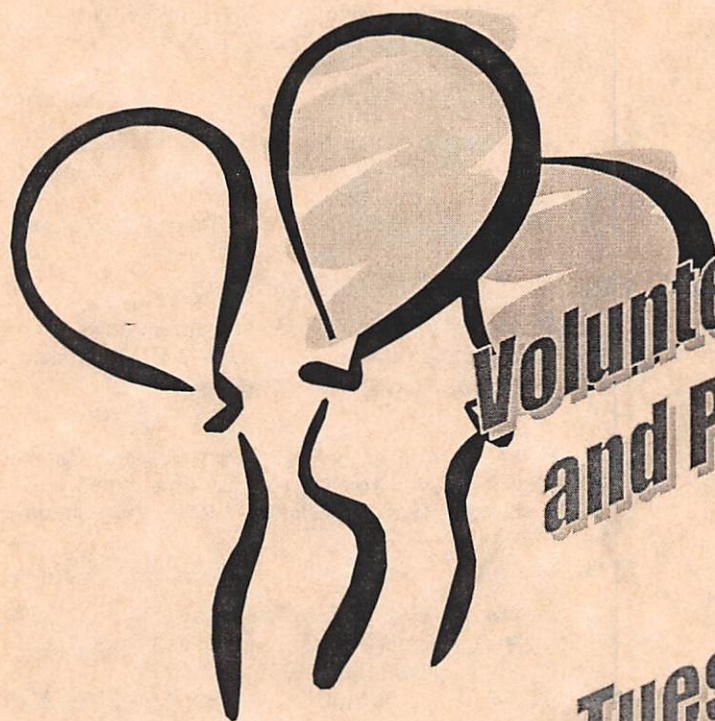
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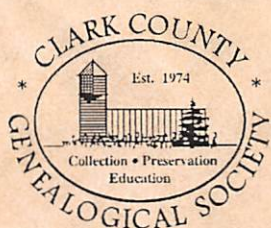
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
