There will be a \$30 fee for enrolling in this class. You must be registered prior to taking the class.

Class includes internet, immigration and naturalization, military records, land records, church records, Germans from Russia and how to write your family history. Prerequisite: Beginning Genealogy

VANCOUVER POST OFFICE NEWS LETTER

From July 1944 through January 1946, the Vancouver Post Office published newsletters that were mailed to their employees who were serving in the armed forces. CCGS member Pat Bauer shares these newsletters from her collection.

Vol. 1, No. 1 July, 1944

GREETINGS

Like Topsy, this News Letter "just grewed." Blame the inception on the brainy ideas of Henry Geraghty and Leo Belisle, who called a meeting between representatives of the Carriers and Clerks when it was decided to try to get out a News Letter for all the people from the Vancouver Post Office who are serving our beloved country in the armed forces. The News Letter is to consist of news from the different departments and of persons who make up the personnel of the Vancouver Post Office and branches.

This is our first effort; we hope to continue to get one out every month. If you think it's OK, write and tell us so.

Jo Meridian and Lily Nonemaker are keeping the north end of the workroom in an uproar, as usual. Seems these people should grow up sometime, but we've given up on these two. (Besides it keeps the PM busy trying to restore order.) If anyone wants to know where all the noise comes from, it's not the canceling machine, it's Lily and Jo!

Special News Item - Selma (our postmaster's ex-secretary) and husband Pfc Ed Bunkley are leaving on a limited vacation to visit his folks in Brunswick, Georgia, Monday, July 17th was the day of departure, and as they go bag and baggage we bid them fond adieu, lots of fun and hurry back.

Marianna Goddard has recently had trouble with her nose, (no Hortense, she did not have it where she hadn't ORTER) it was sinus trouble, after a couple of days feeling pretty rotten, she is all right again.

Burt Tunison has been the Vanport Hospital where he underwent an operation for a hernia. He was in the hospital a couple of weeks and has now been removed to his home. During his absence his work is being taken care of by Mrs. (modesty) McCall; however,

Frank (Pat) Laughrige is doing the fingerprinting and giving the Civil Service Examinations. Henry Geraghty is as big a post as ever, still running down 1510s and Claims.

The supervisors (including the P.M.) congregated for the purpose of having their picture taken and the result was . . . Flash! It will appear soon in a national publication. (Three dozen were purchased by employees. Since the epidemic of prowlers began, one must have some means of protection - if only to intimidate the unwelcome visitor.)

Postmaster Blythe has shown no inclination to do anything about the delated action with which the door of his office closes. The disadvantage to employees is that the P.M. is far out on the workroom floor before they can hide the refreshments. (Well, the idea is WE ALWAYS HAVE TO DIVIDE WITH HIM!)

The Postmaster still checks daily on the first class cancellation which averages about 25,000 to 20,000 each day, running high on Monday and tapering off toward the end of the work. Air Mail runs 20 to 25 percent of the total.

Disposition of mailing clerks on days. Frank Laughrige and Martha Schweigert open incoming pouches and check registers; Frank works newspapers and magazines; Martha pick-up table and primary; Mrs. Alexander and Vella Strode on Air Mail case and pick-up table; Violet Schalt - box section, pick-up table, primary and distribution; M.P. Williams - R.P.O. when mail is heavy; Ed Belisle and Bert Towle on parcel post and men about.

D.J. Andrews, president of our clerks AFL Local, went to Chehalis as a delegate to the State Convention and reports that progress was made on legislation for the future benefit of postal employees.

BAGLEY DOWNS BRANCH

Remember the spot out east of Vancouver that was the Bagley downs race track? Well, even though Wilbur

R. Smith does race around on his bicycle delivering Specials, it's no longer a race track. Instead, Bagley Downs is a housing project and, right in the middle of everything, is the Post Office. It's quite a busy little place, but with Lloyd T. Kingen superintending our little group, everything rolls along fine.

Also, the Ogden Meadows mail is cased and delivered from our post office. Bagley Downs mail is distributed by the General Delivery system, so we have quite a time when Susie Brown gets angry because Pete Allen called for her mail and then read it!

The Ogden Meadows deal was fine until Mary Jo Gergen, our little jive clerk, returned a letter to the sender and checked "deceased" on the red-hand. A few days later the man to whom the letter was addressed stopped the substitute carrier and made it known that he was very much alive!

The clerks are all "foreigners." Mrs. Shirley Kirk and Mrs. Gladys Pearson handle the parcel post and stamps - they're both Okies. At the ABCDE window is Mary Jo Gergen from North Dakota. Minnesota is very well represented by Mrs. Vivian Bolt, Mrs. Wollenburg (our newest member) and Mrs. Mulvanny. Ruth Hunter is from Waco, Missouri, and Mrs. Gladys Adams hails from good ol' Texas - El Paso. Mrs. Ward Lowe is a Wisconsin Badger and darned proud of it. At the money order window are two Coloradans - Mrs. Beulah Taylor and Winona Reab. Carl Mudge delivers parcels to Ogden Meadows and the other carriers are Grace Lindsay, Zoe Colvin and J.D. Now when all of you come home on leave or furlough, come on out and visit the little madhouse (?) and remember if you want your letters to get there, don't forget the correct address. Bye now!

TECH TIPS

Courses

I have never attended a lecture or workshop on family history at which I couldn't learn something. Still, there is no substitute for a good, well-taught course in family research. Clark County Genealogical Society holds classes every year in Clark College's Community Education Program. The first course consists of two-hour sessions that cover almost everything you need to know to start doing family research. The second course goes into more-specific areas of research.

However, some people simply can't fit the CCGS classes into their schedules, while others need more advanced or specialized information. The solution? – The Internet! Here you can find free courses in family research, as well as credit and non-credit courses for a fee. There are also many sources of information that are not listed as courses, though they well could be. Below is a list of some of the best offerings available. 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DELAYED BIRTH REGISTRATION

If you are unable to find a birth record for your family member, have you remembered to check delayed birth records? In some locations they are known as "special" birth certificates. Most often applications for delayed birth records were filed because an individual now needed proof of his/her birth.

Possible reasons why not originally filed:

- For home births, parents didn't take care of registering birth.
- The doctor may have failed to register the birth.
- It may not have been required by the state at that time.

Possible reasons why proof of birth information was needed and an application for a delayed registration may have been filed:

- To collect Social Security benefits.
- To prove a family relationship in order to receive an estate settlement of a relative.
- Proof of age may have been required to enter elementary school.
- Proof of age was required to register for college.
- To provide information and prove U.S. citizenship in order to obtain a passport.
- In order to provide proof of birth, because of records destroyed (such as a courthouse fire).
- In order to receive military pension benefits due to minor children of father.

Various documents may have been provided by someone applying for a delayed registration:

- Baptismal certificate.
- Family Bible record.
- School record.
- Application for social security number.
- Affidavit of attending physician or midwife, or another person present at the birth or having full knowledge of the facts.

Delayed birth registrations are more commonly filed in the county in which the applicant applied for the delayed registration than in the county of birth. Thus, remember to check the county in which the applicant lived.

MICKEY, JOHN MURRAY

His parents moved in 1835 when he was one years old to settle at Morning Sun, Louisa County, Iowa. In 1854 when he was 20 years old, he and two friends went to California to try their luck at gold mining; he even went as far north as Jacksonville, Oregon before returning to Iowa in 1859. He met Susan Ashbaugh (1840-1930) and they were married 13 Feb 1862. They had eight children but most of them died young. In 1889 John

sold their farm in Iowa and with their surviving children they traveled by train to Clark County Washington Territory, and bought a "stump farm" (the trees had been chopped down and sold) in the Battle Ground area; these farms were advertised in all the papers in the east with the Railroad train fare paid. It was a backbreaking job to make a producing farm of it. **Parents were John Robert Mickey born in Ohio and died in 1849 and Sarah Wasson born in Pennsylvania**. Ref: #2, #3 & #6 (1900 Census).

World War I: The Great War

(1917-1918: 4,744,000 participants, 16,000 deaths)

WWI brought boom time to Vancouver. Many ships were launched from the shipyards here. Vancouver Barracks was expanded greatly and thousand of men were trained her, some even sent to fight in France. The biggest spruce mill in the world was manned by soldiers here and built as part of the Spruce Production Division, which turned out materials for airplanes. Pearson Air Museum shows some of this history. Flu claimed 2,926 lives in 1918; pneumonia claimed another 1,596. Some of the men buried at the Post cemetery fell because of the epidemics.

The Vancouver Independent of Vancouver, Washington Territory, was abstracted several years ago by CCGS members. Jane Germann is formatting it for the *Trail Breakers*. (The page and column number are in parenthesis.)

Saturday, Jan. 8, 1876, Vol 1 No 19

Near St. Helens, Dec 28th 1875, of congestion of the lungs, **Bernal Henry**, only son of **Maj. E. G. and Mary E. Adams**, aged 2 years, 6 months and 12 days. His death was very sudden, being apparently in perfect health only a short time before he died. He was a child of extraordinary intelligence and personal beauty, and he never had scarcely an hour's sickness since his birth. About six months before his death he himself assumed the name of "**John**". As he turned his dying eyes upon his father he stammered out-already in the death struggle--"Papa's little man John." His parents are stricken with the deepest anguish at the loss of their only son. (5/3)

Oregon. There is a grandmother in Pendleton who is only 32 years old. (1/4)

Mr. Z. Pollard, the father of **Mrs. D. Mansfield**, of this city, will be 76 years old on New Years day. He was born on the first day of the first week of the first month of the first year of the present century. *Democrat.* (1/4)

Painful accident - On Wed night a party of young men concluded to celebrate the event of the marriage of their friend, **Mr. Charles Zeek** by a Chivari at the residence of the bride's father, **Mr. Gillhan**, out on the Fourth Plain road. They had made night hideous with their nocturnalrev the object usually sought to be accomplished on such occasions, and were returning on their way home when the premature discharge of a pistol in the hands of one of the party, sent a wad, in which the weapon was loaded, into the hip of **Otto Proebstel** a young man 17 years old, son of **Mr. John Proebstel**, of this County, inflicting a severe and painful flesh wound, but not thought particularly dangerous by the physician in charge. **Dr. Flinn** was called to attend the young man and reports the patient doing well. He accounts for the wad doing such havoc in the following manner: The boys had been chewing the wads in which their guns and pistols were loaded, in order to make them hard, and he thinks this one was frozen in the pistol as it had remained there some time before the firing. The wad entered the hip just out side of the hip joint, passed clear through cutting holes in his cloak and other clothing on both sides of him. The young man had a narrow escape, and it is hoped the event will prove a lesson to those engaged in the ridiculous foolishness of the Chivari. (5/1)

Died - At his residence near Vancouver, Jan. 12th, 1874, of consumption, **Jeremiah S. Hathaway**, aged 52 years. **Mr. Hathaway** was born in Herkimer County, New York, Jan 11th, 1824, emigrated to Michigan when but 18 years old, where he resided until the fall of 1851. Crossed the plains in 1852, and following spring settled in this county, where he has since resided. He served one term as Probate Judge of this county, filling the office ably and faithfully, and declined a reelection in consequence of the illness which subsequently resulted in his death. **Mr. Hathaway** has had a long siege of sickness, but endured with patience to the end, yielding up his life in the full hope of a blessed immortality. He was a highly respected citizen, a good neighbor and a kind and indulgent father and will be sadly missed from the community. His family have the sympathy of their many friends in Vanc. and elsewhere. Funeral ceremonies from the Methodist church, on Saturday morning, at 11 o'clock, conducted by the Patrons of Husbandry. (5/3)

Saturday, Jan. 22, 1876, Vol. 1 No. 21

Died - In this city, Thurs. Jan 20th, 1876, after a lingering illness, **Harriet Newell Turner**, wife of **Dr. J. W. Turner**, of this place. Funeral at 10 1/2 o'clock, today, from the residence of **Dr. Turner**. All the friend are invited to attend.

This patient wife and tender mother has been upon a bed of pain for several months past, until nor death, a welcome messenger to her, has brought relief. Her husband and family are tricken with great grief. They have the deepest sympathy of many friends in their sore hour of trial. (5/3)

Died - In this city, at 6 o'clock p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 26, 1876, of consumption, **Hon. John C. Hileman**, Register U.S. Land Office.

Obituary - **Hon. John C. Hileman**, whose death we have the painful duty to chronicle - was born in

Huntington County (now Blair County), Pennsylvania, in the year 1829, and was therefore at the date of his death in the 47th year of his age. He emigrated from his native place when but 18 years old, his father's business misfortunes making it necessary for John to take care of himself before he had completed his education. At 21 years of age, he attended school at Springfield, Ohio, and from thence repaired to Pittsburg Pa., where he was for several years employed as a clerk. In the year 1855 he went to Omaha, Nebraska and was there engaged in the mercantile business for seven years. During which time he served in several important positions of public trust. Served as Sheriff of Omaha and Douglass County, and at the breaking out of the war, was commissioned by acting Gov. **Paddock**, Aid-de-Camp with rank of Lieut. Col. In 1862 he was recommended by Gov. **Saunders** and other prominent men of Nebraska for the position of Assessor of Internal Revenue for Omaha District. His commission was sent to him, but it came too late he having left the state for the wider more hazardous field of Idaho Territory. He went to the Salmon Creek mines, thence to Portland, Oregon, and the following spring into the Blue Mountains, where he remained a year and a half engaged in mining enterprises which turned out unsuccessful. From thence he came to Vancouver in the fall of 1864 and entered into the service of Commissary Department at this ___, in which service he remained for seven years, spending about two years of the time in Portland, Oregon. In the fall of 1871 he was appointed Register of the U.S. Land Office at this place which position he filled ably and faithfully until his death. He was re-appointed on the 16th inst., the dates of the expiration of his official term. Comment upon the life of **Mr. Hileman** is unnecessary. A career of honesty and uprightness like his does not need the encomiums of the press. Its history remains in the memories of the people, and its example a lesson to the young. **Mr. H.** was a man of good business qualifications, and a more faithful public servant than he never went into government employ. He was an exemplary member of the Methodist Church and expired happy in the belief of a blissful eternity. He goes to his grave mourned by a wife and two children and many personal friends. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to his bereaved family. Funeral services from the Methodist Church to-day, at one o'clock, the order of the Patrons Husbandry assisting, of which order **Mr. H.** was an honored member.

Saturday, Feb. 5, 1876, Vol. 1 No. 23

Wm T. Payton, a brother of the renowned **Kit Carson**, died at Baker City on the 27th ult. He was superintendent of schools in Baker at the time of his death. (8/1)

Capt. Hannah, an aged veteran, and one of the oldest of Douglas county now lies seriously ill, at the residence of his son, **Mr. Wm. K. Hannah**, of paralysis. Fears are entertained of his recovery, and soon it may our melancholy duty to chronicle the departure of the brave forerunner of civilization. He is now 87 years of age and native of South Carolina, having immigrated to Oregon in 1853, and has resided in Douglas county continuously ever since, and what is most noticeable, he has been a faithful, worthy member of the Baptist church during the past 40 years of his life.

Died - In this city, on Sat, Jan 29th, 1876, after a lingering illness, **Wm. McCarty**, son of **Edward McCarty**, in the 19th year of his age. The funeral rite were performed on Monday, the sorrowing parents console themselves in their grief that poor "Billy" who has suffered much is now forever at rest.

Married - At the Pacific Hotel, in this city, Feb. 17th 1876, by **S. P. McDonald**, City Recorder, **Mr. W. S. Hamer**, and **Mrs. Jane McCurdy**, both of Washington County, Oregon. (4/5)

James J. Robinson, an emigrant from Indiana, is lying dangerously ill at the residence of **Mr. George Durgin**. Fears are entertained that he will die. (5/1)

Died - In this city, Wednesday, Feb. 16th, 1876, **James J. Robinson**, aged 31 years. **Mr. Robinson** leaves an aged mother and three small children mourn his loss. He was a member of Liverpool Lodge I.O.O.F. of Washington, Indiana. He was buried by the Odd Fellows of Vancouver. (4/5)
