CLARK COUNTY IN THE WASHINGTON TERRITORIAL CENSUSES

Territorial censuses were taken in Washington between 1857 and 1898. They have been microfilmed and are available at several locations. Clark County Genealogical Society has the 20-reel collection in their library. The collection is also in the holdings of the Washington State Library in Olympia.

The officials of each county decided how often they would take the census and what information would be recorded. Thus, the census years varied for each county. Clark County was recorded in the years 1857, 1860, 1871, 1883, 1885, and 1887.

Washington Territorial Census, Clark County - 1857 (FHL 1841781; CCGS Reel #1)

No names are listed on this census; only totals enumerated.

VANCOUVER POST OFFICE NEWS LETTER

From July 1944 through January 1946, the Vancouver Post Office published newsletters that were mailed to their employees who were serving in the armed forces. CCGS member Pat Bauer shares these newsletters from her collection.

Vol. 1 No. 3 September, 1944 Free to YOU

Ye olde editor (Pen name, Alcatraz, 319247)

It is time to tell you of the people that do the tedious chores for the "Letter." There were ninety copies made last issue, so you see it's quite a job. Bert Towle takes care of the Finances and Frank Laughrige is in charge of addressing. The rest of the work is one in the Pent House Print Shop. The P.O. uses two rooms on the top floor, you know. Henry Geraghty gets the material together, Marianna Goddard has been cutting the stencil and Goldie Strong does the mimeographing. They do it swell. (Thanks for them kind words, Leo)

Ralph Carson, Superintendent of Mails, has his office up there, too. We don't see him as much as we used to, but he knows what is going on. He greeted me the other day with "Hi! Skipper!" Now how did he know I didn't walk across the street with that CIRC?

TECH TIPS

GET READY, GET SET, GO - TO SALT LAKE CITY!

Cousin Barbara wants to meet me in Salt Lake City for a week in June. Daughter-in-law Pattie may be able to meet us there, too. Talk about being set up - they're both so much better at research than I am, and Barbara doesn't even have access to the Internet. I feel so unprepared! What to do about it?

Step 1) Select two to four problems to work on, and maybe a couple of no-brainers. Too few problems can lead to fatigue and frustration - I need to be able to distance myself from a problem sometimes and let it percolate below the surface awhile while I work on something entirely different. The no-brainers are to satisfy the need for some success, no matter how small.

Step 2) Analyze what I have already done trying to solve these problems. Compare research logs and documents and note what needn't be done again, and what might be re-examined.

Step 3) Open a new word processing document (w.p.).

Step 4) Log on and go to Ancestry.com, FamilyTree.com, etc., to see if anything new is available since my last search. Maybe one of them has added a helpful database. Enter relevant info into w.p.

Step 5) Go to FamilySearch.com, the LDS web site, and get to work.

When computers were first available at the Family History Library in Salt Lake City, I was delighted, but even if I had done some work at the local library before I left home, I spent entirely too much expensive time there searching the IGI and Library Catalog. Now I have unlimited Internet service, so I can search to my heart's content - or at least to the limit of time available - and use my time at the FHL more productively.

My first "problem," is my gggrandfather Stephen Wilder, who was supposedly born in Gloucester, Providence, Rhode Island, 21 March 1784, to Asaph Wilder and wife Olive (Wilkinson). He married 1) 8 Jan. 1809, Betsey Harris or Elizabeth Harris Smith.

He married 2) 1823, Cincinnati, Ohio, Elizabeth Mooney. His subsequent life in Cincinnati is fairly well documented, though it would benefit from more details. But his life from 1784 to 1823 - his first 39 years - is pretty much a mystery.

These are the steps I followed at FamilySearch.com:

1) Search for Stephen Wilder.

There were four entries in the IGI, all for his birth, all LDS rites. There was one entry in the Pedigree Resource file (Disk 19), for his marriage to Betsey Harris. Submitter was in Stephen's mother's line. I may contact him, but his interest in the Wilders seems minimal.

2) Search the Library Catalog for surname Wilder. There were 95 items. Copy and paste the list into the w.p. (Two of the items are Harris genealogies; maybe they'll tell where and when Betsey (Harris) Wilder died and is buried?) After sorting the list in the w.p. into items already searched and the most likely/unlikely items for searching, I'll return to FamilySearch.com and examine the details given about each item to further refine and 'prioritize' (hate that word) the list, and I'll copy needed bibliographic info into the w.p.

3) Search the Library Catalog for locations Gloucester, Providence, Rhode Island (RI is not accepted); Providence, Rhode Island; and Rhode Island. Under each location, examine the item details for relevance, such as the right dates. Copy bibliographical info for relevant items into the w.p.

Finally, I'll combine the results from these searches into a research log, listing those with the highest priority first and eliminating duplicates. I will generally list items that can be ordered here after those that can only be searched there, while recognizing that sometimes research is a back-and-forth process. Items already searched will be last on the list and so marked - I just might want to return to one of them. After all this, I should arrive at the FHL with call numbers and film numbers in hand, ready to go to work.

Next? Go back to the beginning with Problem #2 - gggrandmother Elizabeth (Mooney) Wilder!

The following library materials were received from the authors or publishers for reviews by CCGS. They are now in use at the CCGS library.

Personal History Workbook - Where Memories Begin by *Margaret L. Ingram*. The author is a life history speaker/instructor living in Albany, Oregon – just 11 miles from her birthplace in Corvallis, Oregon. If you need an incentive to begin writing the story of your life and you haven't had a chance to hear Margaret speak, then her booklet might be the tool you need. Although there are a number of typographical errors in the booklet, she does present many ideas for adding interest to our personal stories. Ideas in the chapter are presented line by line for you to follow with ease. Her booklet will be in the CCGS library as a reference item but you can order your own copy by sending a check for \$12.00 (this includes mailing costs) to Margaret L. Only a Few Bones - A True Account of the Rolling Fork Tragedy and Its Aftermath by *John Philip Colletta*. The author's interest in genealogy began when he was a youngster with the story his grandmother told him of the horrible death of his great great grandfather in 1873. Family lore about the death of Joe Ring, passed from one generation to another, was often changed and embellished upon. Dr. Colletta spent 30 years searching through old records and pictures to find the truth and bring this interesting "murder mystery" to you. After 30 years research and 127 years after the death, he has written the true and interesting story of the charred remains of Joe Ring of Vicksburg, Mississippi, which were only a few bones. In solving this mystery, Dr. Colletta has written this true story in the form of a novel and has discreet references to all the sources in note form. Sources are conveniently listed separately in 80 pages of notes. The list is by the chapter number with the numbered notes listed in numerical order. Index to the 1880 Census of Middle Tennessee by *Barbara, Byron and Samuel Sistler*. This book is the result of 20 years research by the Sistlers. The names on each page are arranged alphabetically by head of household. In general, it is just a head of household index, but also includes individuals whose surnames differ from that of the household head. Each entry includes name and age, plus a county symbol and page number from the original schedules. The person's sex is given in the case where the sex might be in question - such as with initials instead of a given name. A symbol also identifies black or mulatto residents. Thirty-eight Tennessee counties are included in this important book. With 553 pages, four columns on each page and 80 or so names per column, there's enough information in this book to keep you busy for a long time. The book is available for purchase from Byron Sistler & Associates, 1712 Natchez Trace, Nashville, TN 37212. CD - U.S. Federal Census Indexes - 1810 United States by Heritage Quest. It's such a pleasure to use this CD after spending too many hours searching through dim, difficult to read rolls of film for the information I needed and couldn't find! The easy to use Generations Archives Viewer Software is included on the disk and any data field can be searched easily with it. Only the heads of households are listed, as that was the only available information on the original documents. I tried searching just for a surname and found many entries, which included the given name, state, county and locality - along with film number and page reference. Then I narrowed down the search to the state - again all those with the surname and VA for Virginia were shown. Then I searched for a surname and given name - again the results were shown. You cannot save or print the actual information from the program but a convenient notepad will open and you can type your information on it and then either save or print it. This CD is a convenient, easy-to-use genealogical research tool. The CD is available from Heritage Quest by phoning

Grow A Family Tree - Seven Simple Steps by *William Dollarhide*. The author presents these seven steps to genealogy: How to Grow a Family Tree; Do Your Homework; Start Family Sheets; Locate More Relatives; Get the Vital Records; Search the Census Records; Search the Local and State Resources and Search the National Resources. He presents 72 possible sources for a person's birth! Mr. Dollarhide wrote this book especially for beginning genealogists, but it will be a wealth of information for anyone doing genealogy. The research examples are explained with many samples of how to use the resources and where to find them. There are numerous check-off lists for your use; relationship charts; blank forms with a filled-in sample for each and many other items for your use. If you're new to

genealogy, this book is a must; if you're an old-timer, there is information in this book on sources, locations and ideas which will probably benefit you, too. Also included is a free CD of the entire book text from which any page can be printed. This will be especially convenient to make copies the various forms and check-off lists. LAND OFFICE BUSINESS ... The Land Officers have been kept very busy during the past month attending to the wants of locators of land and answering the many inquiries from abroad. Twenty homestead applications had been made in the present month up to the 25th inst., 5 of this number are in this county, 4 in Klickitat and elsewhere east of the mountains, 2 in Skamania County, 5 in Pacific County and 3 in Cowlitz County. The entries in this and Skamania counties are mostly confined to the Washougal country. The Cowlitz County entries are in the region of Toutle Lake. Those in Pacific county are confined mostly to the Nasel River section where we are informed there is still a quantity of vacant land valuable for settlement. 12 Declaratory Statements under the pre-emption law have been also filed for tracks of in the various parts of the district. **CAPT.**

SMALLWOOD, the Register upon application to the Northern Pacific Railroad Company has received the Co's relinquishment to homestead and located subsequent to Aug. 13, 1870 and prior to the date of receipt of notice of withdrawal at this office Oct. 17, 1870. The author wrote this book in chronological order, which makes it an interesting tool - plus, it's indexed so perhaps you can find one of our brickwall ancestors here! It contains interesting history of the area in one convenient book. The table of contents shows the contents of each chapter. Cloth, 498pp, indexed, ©1972.

974.1 History of Thomaston, Rockland and
EATON South Thomaston, Maine - From Their

This volume contains 344 pages of genealogical information with names, dates, places, etc. There is a seven-page index for names other than those in the genealogical section which is alphabetized. The following four books are from a series, which was to cover every county in Colorado. They basically contain the same type of information so this description will fit each one of them: This inventory is one of a number of bibliographies of historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on the Historical Records Survey Program of the W.P.A. The Work Projects Administration provided jobs for people during the infamous depression, which began in 1929. Those of us studying genealogy now can be thankful for this work that was done then. The inventory programs attempted to sketch in the historical background of the county with the listings of material offered. The Historical Records Survey Program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers and research and clerical workers. The many records contained in the county archives are listed. The records give the titles of record; dates for which available; quantity; labeling of volumes or containers; variant titles; description of record contents; manner of arrangement; indexing; nature of recording, size and type of volume or containers and location. Instructions are included for ordering material listed.
