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

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The Two Families of John Lyons, Jr.

Among the early Anglo Protestant families to settle in the south Louisiana area was that of John LYONS and his wife, Nancy (Anne) AHART. John, the son of Samuel LYONS of Germany, was born in about 1750. He is believed to have been from Georgia. Nancy AHART was born in about 1765. Several church documents list her as being from Georgia and at least one as being from Virginia. Some descendants believe that she was actually from North Carolina.

It is not known where John and Nancy were married; however, church records indicate that one of their children, John, Jr., was born in Georgia and another, Gabriel, was born in Pensacola. Upon their arrival in Louisiana, John and Nancy apparently first settled in the St. Martinville area where most of their children were baptized. By 1807, John LY ONS and at least two of his sons were settled on Bayou Queue de Tortue in St. Landry Parish.⁴

Nancy AHART LYONS died in St. Landry Parish in 1809. John LYONS died in St. Landry Parish in 1832. We know of the following children of this couple.

John LYONS, Jr., the second child of John LYONS and Nancy AHART was born in Georgia in about 1783. He was baptized in St. Martin Church on August 17, 1797, at age 14 years. He married twice, first on March 30, 1804 (SM Ch.), to (Mary) Rachael FORMAN, the daughter of Ephrem FORMAN and Elizabeth BROWN. Rachael was born in North Carolina in about 1787 and died sometime before May 2, 1840, when her succession was filed in St. Landry Parish. John and Mary settled in the Roberts Cove area of St. Landry Parish where they had the following children:

Apparently there were martial problems in the Lyons household as on April 26, 1824, John LYONS, Jr. filed the following petition in District Court in Opelousas:⁵

District Court - St. Landry Parish Louisiana

No. 878

Filed 26th April 1824

John Lyons Junior vs His Wife Mary Foreman

To the Honorable the Judge of the fifth Judicial District Court of the State of Louisiana sitting in and for the Parish of St. Landry.

The Petition of John Lyons Junior of the Parish of St. Landry with respect represents that some considerable time since he intermarried with Mary Foreman also of the Parish of St. Landry. That the said Mary Foreman wife of your Petitioner as aforesaid, forgetful of the solemn obligations of the marriage vows and lost to every idea of virtue and chastity has been guilty of repeated acts of adultery, and has quit the bed and board of your Petitioner, and is now living in open concumbage with another man.

Wherefore, the premises considered, your Petitioner prays that said Mary FOREMAN may be duly cited to appear before your Honorable Court, as the law directs, and that, by a decree of your Honorable Court, your petitioner may be separated from the bed and board of the said Mary, and that their property, also, be separated, and your Petitioner prays for such other and further relief, in the premises, or by Law and equity he may be entitled to demand and or duty bound he will ever pray.

A separate sheet included with the above document included a sworn statement:

Richard WEST being duly sworn says that he knows John LYONS Junior the plaintiff herein and that he also knows Mary FOREMAN his wife the defendant that said defendant now lives with one BIGGS down on the Placquimine having left her husband for six months or longer as well as recollected, the said BIGGS and defendant live together as man and wife.

Mary FOREMAN responded to the allegations by filing the following two documents:

Know all men by those present that Mary FOREMAN wife of John LYONS Jun do nominate constitute & appoint William PRATOR of the State of Louisiana & parish of St. Landry my & agent & attorney to act for me & in my name to attend manage & arrange a suit brought against me for a separation of bed & board by my husband John LYONS Jun in the District Court of the fifth District parish of St. Landry & in the ----- of a judgement of separation being rendered by the said court. I do hereby authorize my said attorney to make all arrangements in relation to the division of our property & to have the same fixed & made part of the decree of this court in testimony in the premises and finally I give to my said attorney full & complete power to give & grant good & sufficient receipts to acquittances in every thing in relation to the premises & to take & choose for me whatever property he may think proper in the division which may be made thereof -----whereof I have hereunto set hand this first day of May 1824.

The case of John LYONS, Jr. vs Mary FOREMAN was heard during the May term of the St. Landry Parish District Court with the following results:

And now today at the opening of this cause in presence of council as well as part of the plaintiff as of the defendant and after hearing the allegations and proofs addressed by the parties and reason of the law and evidence being in favor of the plaintiff. It is by reason thereof ordered adjudged and decreed that the said John LYONS Jr. the plaintiff be separated by bed and board from the said Mary FOREMAN the defendant and it is further ordered adjudged and decreed that the said Estate and property of the said Lyons Junior both movable and immovable consisting of the following articles, to wit, one negro woman named Flora aged about thirty years, one negro man named Jack aged about fifty years one negro girl named Phoebe aged about thirteen years one negro girl named Ann aged about thirteen years one negro girl named Luck aged about twelve years one negro girl Nelly aged about eight years one negro boy named Charles aged about thirteen years one negro boy named Jack aged about ten years one negro girl named Lucy aged about six years one negro girl named Jinny aged about six years one negro man named Oliver aged about fifty years and one negro man named George aged about thirty years one negro girl named Linda aged about three years and one negro child named Clarisse aged about six months----Together with all the cattle branded with _____ as well as the horse creatures together with the said brand and the gentle oxen horses mules & belonging to the said plantation on which the said John LYONS now resides and together the said plantation and all the holding and improvements thereon and all the house-hold and kitchen furniture and farming utensils now in the possession of said John LYONS Junior be separated from the estate and property of the said Mary FOREMAN wife of the said John LYONS Junior And it is further ordered adjudged and decreed that the property and estate of said Mary FOREMAN the defendant and, to wit, one negro man named Mike aged about twenty years one negro woman named Clarisse aged about thirty years one negro boy named Adam aged about ten years one negro girl named Rachael aged about ten years and one negro girl named Sally aged about six years All the horned cattle and horse creatures or mules branded with the brand _____ together with the said brand and all other cattle and horses now in the possession of the said Mary FOREMAN the

defendant and together with all the household and kitchen furniture and farming utensils now in the possession of the said Mary FOREMAN also the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars in cash which the said Mary acknowledged to have received which property it is ordered adjudged and decreed the said Mary shall hold enjoy and possess to her sole use and separate and apart from the said John LYONS her husband --- It is further ordered adjudged and decreed that any property belonging to the community of the said John LYONS Junior and the said Mary FOREMAN his wife which is not included or omitted in this decree shall be equally divided between the said parties litigant --- And it is further ordered adjudged and decreed that the said John LYONS Junior be bound and he is hereby adjudged to pay all the debts of the community legally contracted and it is further ordered that the said Mary pay the cost of the suit to be taxed --- The above decree is everything which relates to the division of property is made by consent the plaintiff being present and the defendant being represented by William PRATHER the agent and attorney in fact of the said defendant.

Two years after the divorce was granted John LYONS, Jr. married Rebecca (Becky) GILCHRIST in St. Landry Parish on June 19, 1826 (OCH). Rebecca was the daughter of William GILCHRIST and Susanna ROY. On several documents Rebecca's maiden name is listed as ANDRUS; however, because of a preponderance of evidence stating otherwise, there is little doubt that she was a GILCHRIST.

From a document filed by John LYONS on November 11, 1847, "Annuling of a Donation" it is evident that John and Rebecca had set up household sometime prior to their marriage in 1826. The document lists five children as being their "natural children," all born prior to June 3, 1826 while he was still married to Mary Rachael FOREMAN. On the document, the children are listed under their mother's maiden name, GILCHRIST. After their marriage John and Rebecca

had at least five additional children. The following are their children:

In 1844, eighteen years after John LYONS, Jr. married Rebecca GILCHRIST, John had an Act introduced and passed in the Louisiana Senate and House of Representatives. This Act declared their marriage of June 19, 1826 to be legal and valid and it legitimated their children born before and after that date. The Act reads as follows:

ACTS PASSED AT THE SECOND SESSION OF THE STATE OF
LOUISIANA BEGUN AND HELD IN THE CITY OF NEW ORLEANS
On the 1st day of January, 1844

No. 29 -- An Act for the relief of John Lyons, Sen'r.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representative of the State of (John

Lyons, Jr. con't.)

Louisiana in General Assembly convened: That in order to remove all doubts whatever, the marriage heretofore contracted and celebrated by the Judge of the parish of Saint Landry, on the nineteenth day of June in the year eighteen hundred and twenty-six, between John Lyons Sen'r and Rebecca Gilchrist, inhabitants of said parish, be and the same is hereby declared to be legal and valid to all intents and purposed, and to have the effect of legitimating their children, born both anterior and subsequent to the said nineteenth day of June eighteen hundred and twenty

six, and of entitling them to the same rights as if they were born during marriage.

(Signed) A. BOUDOUSQUIR, Speaker of the House of Representative(Signed) Felix GARCIA, President of the SenateApproved February 19th, 1845(Signed) A. MOUTON, Governor of the State of Louisiana

Evidently John LYONS, Jr. was fearful that his children with Rebecca GILCHRIST who were born prior to their marriage, would not share in his estate upon his demise. With that thought in mind, he had made provision for them as described in the following:

Annulling of a Donation - 11th November 1847

State of Louisiana - Parish of St. Landry

On the 3rd day of June 1826 as per act on that day passed before James Ray Notary Public for the Parish Judge of the Parish of St. Landry John RUTHERFORD of said State and Parish a donation of two certain promissory notes drawn by J. MIRAMOND & in favor of the said Rutherford for the sum jointly of eight hundred dollars in favor of Milly GILCHRIST, Alfred GILCHRIST, Zelian GILCHRIST, Milissi GILCHRIST, Hetty GILCHRIST minor children and heirs of Becky GILCHRIST which noted said Rutherford endorsed to and deposited it in the hands of John LYONS who was authorized to carry into effect said donation --- Now be it known that on this eleventh day of

November eighteen hundred and forty seven, personally came and appeared before me Edmund W. MARTIN, recorder in and for the Parish of St. Landry, John LYONS, Jr. of said state and Parish who declared that the donation above described was disguised, that the noted Miramond & Co. were his property and that the donation was made to the donees in consideration of their having been his natural children. He further declared that no part of said sum had been ever paid to donees nor does he intend to carry out said donation as much as said donees are now legitimated by an act of the Legislature and placed upon an equal footing with his other children, on the contrary he hereby annuls and cancels said act of donation as if it had never been made --- Likewise appeared before me, said Recorder, Isaac McCLELAND husband of Zelian LYONS, John D. MOORE husband of Hetty LYONS, William MCCLELAND husband of Milly LYONS, M. MALEY husband of Mellisse LYONS and Alfred LYONS who were called Gilchrist in the act of a donation who declared that they had received no part or portion of said donation either from John RUTHERFORD the nominal donor of John LYONS Jr. his agent and they further declared that they hereby renounced all rights under said act of donation and free said Rutherford & Lyons their heirs & legal Representatives from all responsibility growing out of said donation. It is to be remarked that William McCLELAND and Alfred LYONS both gave receipts to John LYONS Jr. for their share of the donation but in fact and in truth they had not received the amount specified in said receipts or any part thereof. John LYONS Jr. not knowing how to write signed this act by his ordinary mark --

John (X) LYONS Jr.

Wm. M. MALEY, Wm. McCLELAND, John D. MOORE, Alfred LYONS, Zelliann McCLELAND, Esther MOORE, Amelia McCLELAND, Melisse MALEY. Witnesses --- Francis D'AVY, Daniel LYONS --- E. W. MARTIN Recorder

The Act passed by the Senate and House of Representatives legitimated John's children born out of wedlock and made them equal heirs in his estate. Had the donation to his illegitimate children not been annulled they would have in effect received more than his legitimate children by virtue of also sharing in the two promissory notes which he had "disguised" in addition to his regular estate.

The final document presented here is an understanding between John's children with Mary FOREMAN and Rebecca GILCHRIST. In the agreement they "obligate and bind themselves to give in and render ... a true just and faithful account of all sums, accounts or property of any nature or description whatsoever which they may have received by gift or donations, whether disguised or otherwise from their said father John LYONS" This document precluded any child from receiving more than their just share in the estate.

LYONS & GILCHRIST with LYONS & GILCHRIST AGREEMENT

This act of compromise is made & entered into at Opelousas in the State and Parish first above written, on this 9th day of June A.D. 1853 between John LYONS Jr., Samuel LYONS and Joseph LYONS children of John LYONS Jun. State of this Parish decd. by Mary FOREMAN, on the one part, and Emilia GILCHRIST as dect. & assisted by her husband Wm. MCLELAND, Zeliann GILCHRIST wife of James W. HOPKINS authorized by the court to act in her own behalf. Alfred GILCHRIST. Melissa GILCHRIST ordered and assisted by her husband, Francis J. Bruner, Henrietta GILCHRIST aided & assisted by her husband John D. MOORE, David LYONS, Egbert HAYS (?), they being all the children of said John LYONS Senr. dect. by Rebecca GILCHRIST on the other part -- that in order to prevent any difficulty or sit which might spring up between the contracting parties as to the rights of the last named parties in & to the Succession of that said John LYONS Senr. decd. as legal heirs of the same: Now therefore with this view of preventing and putting a stop to any litigation which might arise from & out of the question above mentioned, the said contracting parties both on the first and second part agree as follows to wit, the parties contracting on the first part Viz the children of John LYONS decd. by Mary FOREMAN agree bind and obligate themselves, to consider & admit as legal heirs with themselves in the Estate of their said father John LYONS Sr. all the children of the said John LYONS Sr. by Rebecca GILCHRIST in consideration whereof the aforesaid children of Rebecca GILCHRIST by John LYONS Sr. obligate and bind themselves to give in & render upon oath before any officer

duly authorized to administer oath, a true just and faithful account of all sums, accounts of property of any nature or description whatsoever which they may have received by gift of donation, whether disguised or otherwise from their said father John LYONS Sen. which said amounts, are to be truly mentioned under oath, whether they were donated to the husband, the wife, or both conjointly which said amounts of sums are to be collated as the partition of the Estate of the said John LYONS Sr. & the heirs of John LYONS by Mary FOREMAN also obligate themselves on their part to give in under oath as above said all sums & property whatsoever which they may have received by donation whether disguised or otherwise from their father John LYONS the said amounts also to be collated as the partition of said Estate and the portion which all of the abovesaid children of John LYONS both by Mary FOREMAN & Rebecca GILCHRIST are to inherit in the estate of the John LYONS Sr. to be diminished in proportions to the amounts of values of the objects which they may have received by donations or gifts as abovesaid.

In testimony whereof the parties have hereunto signed at Opelousas on the day and year first above written in presence of its subscribing witnesses -- It is further agreed that this dec of compromise is to be considered in force & to have affect with regard to all or any of the parties herein named, only in case that the tutor of Littleton Lyons a minor and one of the children of John LYONS Sen. by Rebecca GILCHRIST and would after being duly authorized thereto by family meeting convoked for that effect signed this (dect?) of compromise for said minor Littleton LYONS, binding him in the same manner as all the parties herein mentioned are bound; and should the said family meeting not agree and sanction this compromise, in behalf of the said minor, then and in that case their decd of compromise to be null and void in all of each of its parts, and between all of each of the parties herein named. The above read and signed in presence of ----- J. B. McCLELAND and C. Craford LYONS.

Thee succession sale of the estate of John LYONS [Jr.], St. Landry Parish Court House, No. 1727, was conducted on July 26, 1853. Total value from the sale of the estate was \$75,253.90, a sizable amount for that day and time.

Southern Pacific RR and C. C. Duson Help In Birth Of Iota

[Editor's note: The following article appeared in the Crowley Daily Signal. Golden Anniversary Edition 1889 - 1949, page 68, and is reprinted here for it's historical as well as genealogical value.]

From Christmas Edition, 1902

"Come, come Curly!" said the president of the Southern Pacific Railroad to C. C. DUSON, when the latter was arguing with him as to the desirability of building the Eunice branch. "Cut it down. You're drawing it too strong. Make it a town or two less."

Not a town less; not one iota will I cut down my figures," was the emphatic response. A few months later, after the road had been built, the president of the road, accompanied by the two DUSONs and a dozen other prominent men inspected the branch line, riding in the president's luxurious private car. When they stopped at the little speck on the prairie called Cartville, the railroad magnate leaned out of the window and surveyed the scene with a smile. "Now I understand what Curly meant when he said he wouldn't cut down his figures one iota. This is it. This is the iota."

About 1900, when the Post Office Department asked for suggestions as to a name for the postoffice, this remark was recalled and the town was christened Iota. The postoffice had formerly been known as Cartville in honor of the numerous family of CARTS who had long been residents of the vicinity.

It was in 1893 when rumors began to be heard about constructing the railroad to Eunice and residents of Cartville began to look around for a site for a future town. The present site of Iota was practically the selection of two pioneers of that community, Adolph BAUMAN and H. I. DAUGHENBAUGH, recorded as prosperous merchants in 1902.

In 1893 also came Dr. L. [Leon] A. CLARK and Dr. T. E. BROOKS who were associated together in the drug business.

In 1902 Iota boasted a rice milling plant, of which Joseph SABATIER was secretary and general manager; a lumber yard, owned by Ben F. TOLER; a hotel of which W. J. YOUNG was proprietor an implement company, owned by J. H. NORDYKE; and merchants including BAUMAN, DAUGHENBAUGH, Alex AMY and Joseph AMY.

Among the men recorded as leading farmers in that year were H. J. DAIGLE and B. M. LAMBERT.

Construction in the community that year was said to have used about three-quarters of a million feet of rough lumber and 59 carloads of dressed lumber and shingles, with the services of about six builders and nearly three times as many carpenters. Citizens who were named as having constructed substantial homes were Malcom McMILLAN, Frank HAYES, NORDYDE, BAUMAN, Rodney R. DUSON, Wm. MILNER, Dr. BROOKS, Dr. CLARK, George D. WRIGHT, Louis ANDRUS, Mrs. Q. C. CARDWELL, W. S. ROBINSON, J. J. ROBINSON, DAUGHENBAUGH, Jules MENOU, S. B. ANDRUS [and] Eli LEDOUX.

Real estate was booming. City lots ranged from \$600 on the avenue down to \$75. Farm property near the town sold as high as \$100 an acre in small parcels. The Acadia Canal Company, in its second year, watered from 6000 to 8000 acres of rice.

(Birth of Iota con't.)

The Iota public school was opened in October, 1891, with 26 pupils and one teacher. In 1902 there were 115 pupils and three teachers. Prof. J. A. PATTON was the principal.

Iota that year had four church congregations, Catholic, Methodist, Lutheran and Baptist, but only one resident pastor, Rev. Father GASSLER of the Catholic Church, who constructed the church at a cost of \$8000.

Lumber used in that vicinity came from the four sawmills in the Pointe aux Loups region, which was rich in pine and oak.

Family of Hensgens Adds Germanic Touch To Life of Acadia

[Editor's note: The following is excerpted the <u>Crowley Daily Signal</u>, 50th Anniversary Edition 1899 - 1949, page 99.]

Dating from their arrival in Louisiana in 1881, the story of Mr. and Mrs. Christian Joseph HENSGENS of Roberts Cove is the beginning of a family saga which has added much to the colorful history of the entire area. They were natives of Langbroich, Rhineland, Germany and were among the very first German families to settle and prosper in "the Cove."

They landed in New Orleans with their five children after a long trip of six weeks on the ocean, the trip made in a sail boat! With them five other German families, also, all encouraged in their move by the Reverend Father Leonard THEVIS who built famous St. Roch Chapel in New Orleans. Through the agencies of Joseph FABACHER, prominent New Orleanian who added special chapters to the history of Acadia Parish, they settled with a colony of Germans in Robert's Cove.

Their children were: Catherine (Mrs. Joseph DISCHLER of the Cove), Gertrude (Mrs. Lorenz ZAUNBRECHER of Frey), Barbara (the late Mrs. Will HEINEN of Robert's Cove), Regina, (Mrs. Will BOLLICH of Mowata), Conrad of Mowata.

Three other children were born after the Hensgens settled in Acadia Parish. These Americanborn members of the family are: Annie (the late Mrs. Joseph KLAUSER of Mowata), Joseph of Lake Arthur, Nicholas W. of Crowley.

This pioneer took rice farming as his trade as did all of his children, and the great majority of his grand and great-grandchildren, most of whom still live in Acadia Parish.

Mrs. HENSGENS died in the Cove November 27, 1908. Mr. HENSGENS died June 6, 1919. There are 324 living descendants surviving, as follows; 66 grandchildren, 238 greatgrandchildern, 20 great-grandchildren.

Notes on the Calliham-Sandefur Connection

Submitted by Talmadge L. Buller

In the article, "John W. Calliham and His Proven Children," appearing in <u>La Voix des Prairies</u>, Vol. 14, No. 53, mention is made of Rebecca CALLIHAM's marriage to Nauflet SANDEFUR in 1829 in St. Landry Parish, with little other information given. After the publication of the article, Mrs. Gladys L. SANDEFUR of Fayetteville, Arkansas, in a letter to Talmadge L. BULLER, has provided additional information.

Sometime after 1830 Nauflet SANDEFUR (we assume Sandefur is the correct spelling), and his family moved to De Soto Parish, Louisiana. On November 26, 1845, Rebecca SANDEFUR, wife of Nauflet SANDEFUR, purchased some real estate in De Soto Parish from Aaron FERGU-SON (almost certainly her brother-in-law who had married Patsey CALLIHAM in Mississippi). [Conveyance Book 4, p. 111, De Soto Parish, Louisiana.]

Nauflet SANDERFUR died before October 3, 1848. On that date Rebecca SANDEFUR requested that an inventory of the estate be made and that a family meeting be held. The family meeting was held on November 4, 1848 and since there were no family relatives in the parish at that time, the meeting consisted of family friends. Rebecca SANDEFUR was named administratric of the estate and William ROGERS as under tutor. There were five sons who were minor tric of the estate and William ROGERS as under tutor. There were five sons who were minor heirs. A daughter, Lucintha SANDEFUR, had recently married William ROGERS. [Nauflet Sandefur, Succession Extract, Succession Book D, pages 474-482, De Soto Parish, Louisiana.]

Rebecca SANDEFUR, widow of Nauflet SANDEFUR, married on December 12, 1849 in De Soto Parish, Horatio CHAMBLISS. [Marriage Book A, p. 83, De Soto Parish, Louisiana.]

In 1870 Rebecca (CALLIHAM) SANDEFUR, CHAMBLISS, was living with her daughter, Lucintha, and her son-in-law, William ROGERS in Pennington, Trinity County, Texas. She was using the family name of her first husband and appears in the census of 1870 as "Rebecca SANDEFUR," age sixty. [1870 federal census, Trinity County, Texas, p. 115.]

It is believed that Rebecca SANDEFUR was buried in the Pennington Cemetery. According to Gladys SANDEFUR, the parents of Nauflet SANDEFUR were Robert SANDEFUR and Cynthia McGREGOR.

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

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The Moss Family: From Virginia to South Louisiana By Marilyn S. Dyer

The material presented here encompasses many years of research into the Moss family. It is presented with the hope that others with an interest in the family may fill in some of the missing pieces of our family and help me solve a mystery concerning "my" Moss line. In order to explain my "mystery" I think it would be best if I give some of the history that I have acquired first!

The progenitor of our Moss line was Samuel MOSS who was born about 1675. Samuel, who owned land in New Kent County, Virginia in the early 1700's, was English and was a member of the Church of England. Samuel MOSS married a woman named _____ALDRIDGE, the daughter of John ALDRIDGE. John ALDRIDGE died in New Kent County, Virginia on April 16, 1720.

Samuel MOSS and his wife had at least one son, John MOSS, born in New Kent County, Virginia in 1707 and died in Goochland County, Virginia in 1785. John MOSS married Elizabeth MASSIE, daughter of Charles MASSIE. Elizabeth was born on November 5, 1709, in St. Peter's Parish, New Kent County, Virginia. John and Elizabeth had nine children all of whom were born and married in Goochland County, Virginia:

The three youngest of the nine children, John, Alexander and Nathaniel MOSS left Virginia and went to Wilkes County and Oglethorpe County, Georgia. About 1800, Nathaniel MOSS and Levi CAMPBELL and several other relatives left Georgia and went west to Mississippi and Louisiana. Nathaniel MOSS, Sr. settled first in Wilkinson County, Mississippi where he purchased land.

Nathaniel MOSS and Joanna JOHNSON had eleven children, the first two born in

Goochland County, Virginia and the following nine born in Oglethorpe County, Georgia.

Additional information is provided on the families of the two children whose names are in bold print. The following are Nathaniel and Joanna's children:

Sometime after 1807, Nathaniel MOSS, Sr. removed his family from Mississippi to Lafayette Parish, Louisiana but left behind his four eldest children, George, Mary "Polly", Nathaniel, Jr., and Johnson MOSS plus two Negro slaves to run the plantation in Mississippi. About two years after his move to Lafayette Parish, Nathaniel requested that Nathaniel, Jr. and Johnson MOSS join him there to help out, leaving George and Polly in Wilkinson County, Mississippi.

Joanna JOHNSON MOSS died in Vermilionville, Lafayette Parish, LA in 1825 and Nathaniel MOSS, Sr. also died in Vermilionville on October 8, 1825. Their children, being unable to come to an amiable settlement over the estate, agreed to have the

estate settled by three arbitrators to "settle all the difficulties between them, arising from the settlement of their respective transaction with their aforesaid Father and Mother."

State of Louisiana - Parish of Lafayette

Be it remembered that this 24th day of September - anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six, Before me, Thomas B. Brashear, Judge of the Parish of Lafayette and Ex-officio Notary Public - within and for the same, personally came and appointed Nathaniel MOSS of the Parish of Lafayette, in his own right and right of Johnson MOSS and Anderson MOSS to whom he is Curator, ad hoc, they being absent from the State of Louisiana - aforesaid. Mary MOSS - Joseph MOSS and Alfred P. MOSS of the Parish of Lafayette aforesaid - also appeared Henry MOSS of the Parish of St. Landry and, also appeared Alfred MOSS, aforesaid - in right of George MOSS, to whom he is Curator, ad hoc, and absent from the State - also appeared Melissa MOSS, of the said Parish of Lafayette, aided and authorized by her husband Allen CAMPBELL - in those presents - all of full age - they being the legal heirs and representatives of Nathaniel MOSS Sr. and Joanna JOHNSON, his wife, both of the said Parish of Lafayette deceased - who have all of them entered into the following agreement by and between themselves - to wit - that whereas - that they and each of them did receive from their Father, in his lifetime, certain property - and for which they are unable to come to a settlement among themselves, disagreeing, as to the amount, quantity, quality and prices for which they were to pay or have paid for the same and wishing to come to a fair and speedy settlement and liquidation of accounts and contracts with the succession of their deceased Father and mother during their lifetime - hereby waiving all rights - of baring any accounts (whether for or against them), by prescription and wishing to avoid a long and tedious law suit - the said appeares aforesaid, have by these presents, unanimously chosen John BROWMAN, W. W. BOWEN, Esq. of the Parish of St. Martin and B. C. CROW, Esq. of the Parish of Lafayette, their arbitrators, to arbitrate and settle all the difficulties between them, arising from the settlement of their respective transactions, with their aforesaid Father and Mother thereby submitting all their difficulties to the aforesaid arbitrators - respecting their different transactions with the said deceased in their lifetimes, thereby binding themselves - they and each of the appears aforesaid - to the extent to the awards that may be made whether in their favor or against them, by the aforesaid arbitrators, chosen by them, and the aforesaid, do further bind themselves one to the other in the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, each to abide by the awards, hereby consenting that the same shall be final and waiving all rights of appeal - hereby agreeing and binding themselves as aforesaid - that said settlement shall be completed. In testimony whereof all of the aforesaid and agreeing parties have herewith set their hands at the late residence of the said deceased in the Parish aforesaid on the day and month and year first above written in the presence of John TAYLOR and James GREIG, witnesses, who have signed these presents, with the aforesaid parties and the said Judge and Notary aforesaid. after due reading the whole.

(signed) Nathaniel MOSS, Mary MOSS, Henry MOSS, Alfred P. MOSS, Allen CAMPBELL, Melissa H. MOSS Joseph H. MOSS

It is assumed that the arbitrators were able to work out an amiable agreement between the heirs as the matter does not again appear in court records.

George MOSS married Lucretia GLASS

George MOSS and Lucretia GLASS had seven children by the time the 1830 census was taken in Wilkinson County, Mississippi. Here is where my "Mystery" begins! In 1826, as seen in the following document, George's brother, Anderson MOSS, gave a slave by the name of NANN to William LINDSEY to hold in Trust for the sole use of Lucretia GLASS MOSS to show his "affection and love of Lucretia MOSS." Lucretia was the wife of Anderson's brother, George MOSS. He specified in the court document that if Lucretia died NANN and all of NANN's children were to be sold and the money was to be divided between all of Lucretia's children (completely leaving out his brother, George).

RE: Anderson MOSS & Lucretia MOSS

This Indenture made this seventh day of January Eighteen hundred and twenty-six, Between Anderson MOSS, of the County of Wilkinson and State of Mississippi of the one part and William LINDSEY of the same state and county of the other part. Witnesseth that the said party of the first part for and in consideration of the natural love and affection which he hath for Lucretia MOSS, wife of George MOSS of said County, as well as the sum of five dollars to him in hand paid the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged - Hath given, granted and conveyed unto the said party of the second part as Trustee for the said Lucretia MOSS and the heirs of her body as is hereinafter specified, a certain negro woman called NANN and the said Anderson MOSS doth hereby warrant unto the said party of the second part as Trustee and for the use and benefit of the said person hereinafter mentioned and in manner as hereinafter specified and against himself his heirs and executors and every other person whatsoever will ever defend by these presents and the said party of the second part doth hereby accept the said Trust and hereby covenants to hold the said negro woman NANN in trust and for the use of the said Lucretia MOSS during her natural life and to permit her to use the said negro woman slave for her own benefit, use and behoof and to have the possession of her during the said term of her natural life, and the said party of the first part that he at the death of the said Lucretia MOSS, will and he is hereby permitted by the said party of the second part to sell at public auction the said negro slave NANN and all of her children which she shall then have by giving ten days public notice and apply the proceeds thereof to the sole use, benefit and behoof of the heirs of the said Lucretia MOSS and pay the same over to the said heirs in equal proportion. In witness whereof the parties have hereunto set their hands and seal the day and year above written

Signed: Anderson MOSS (Seal)
William LINDSEY (Seal)

Signed, sealed and delivered in the presence of C. S. KELLOGG. The State of Mississippi, County of Wilkinson. Personally appeared before the undersigned Justice of the Peace in and for the said County, Anderson MOSS and William M. LINDSEY who severally acknowledged that they signed, sealed and delivered the foregoing instrument for the uses and purposes therein mentioned and on the day and year therein written. Acknowledged before me this 7the day of January 1826,

Apparently, over time, NANN became disenchanted in her duties in the George MOSS household. In 1833, seven years after the above document was filed, NANN poisoned the entire George MOSS family as shown in the following newspaper article which appeared in *The Woodville Republican*, (Vol. 1, December 18, 1823).

"7 Dec 1833 - NANN, a female slave, the property of Mr. George MOSS, was tried and found guilty at the last term of the Wilkinson County [MS] Court of Poisoning her Master's family (two of whom died) was in pursuance of the sentence of the court, hung in the vicinity of this town on Friday."

The article states that two members of the family died but does not state which two had died. In 1834 a notice in the *Woodville Republican* states that the estate of George MOSS is to be sold to pay for court costs. From this notice and the fact that Lucretia, widow of George MOSS, married a second time on March 14, 1844, to James M. MUMFORD [Bride's Book of Avoyelles Parish, Louisiana, p. 35] one assumes that George MOSS was one of the victims who died as a result of the deliberate poisoning by the slave NANN. The name of the other family member who died as a result of the poisoning is not known.

James M. MUMFORD, age 74, a doctor from South Carolina and his wife Lucretia (GLASS MOSS) are listed on the 1850 census of St. Landry Parish at household #17. No children are listed with the family, therefore, it is assumed that Lucretia's children by George MOSS were grown and married by that date.

George MOSS and Lucretia GLASS MOSS had seven children by 1830 as noted on the census taken that year in Wilkinson County, Mississippi. Unfortunately, the name of only one of the children has been found, that being George C. MOSS, born in 1815 in Wilkinson County. George C. MOSS married Nancy SHROPSHIRE on April 14, 1836, in Wilkinson County. George, his wife Nancy and several children migrated to the St. Landry Parish area sometime prior to 1850 where they are shown on the census taken there that year. On that census, George (household #19) is living two houses away

from his mother Lucretia and her second husband James M. MUMFORD who are listed at household # 17. George and his family are also listed on the 1860 census of St. Landry Parish at household #1785.

We can account for only two of the seven children of George MOSS and Lucretia GLASS MOSS. One was an unnamed child who died along with her father when poisoned by NANN. The other child is the above named George C. MOSS who married Nancy SHROPSHIRE and migrated to St. Landry Parish. Herein lies my "mystery." Who were the other five children in the family and what became of them after the death of their father and the marriage of their mother to James M. MUMFORD? Were the children possibly raised by Anderson MOSS, George's brother? Anderson MOSS is listed on the 1840 census of Wilkinson County, MS, with children that would be the correct age to have been the children of his brother George and wife Lucretia; however, I cannot find a marriage record for Anderson until 1864. This marriage of Anderson MOSS to Elizabeth "Betsy" HAYES on December 27, 1864, occured in St. Landry Parish when he was about 72 years of age.

Joseph H. MOSS married Marie Claire THIBODEAUX

Joseph H. MOSS, the tenth child of Nathaniel MOSS, Sr. and Joanna JOHNSON was born on September 16, 1805, in Oglethorpe County, Georgia. Joseph married Marie Claire THIBODEAUX in Lafayette Parish, Louisiana on August 2, 1824. Marie Claire was born on May 30, 1807, near Roysville (now Youngsville) Louisiana. Joseph died in Vermilion Parish in 1848 and Marie Claire in Esther, Vermilion Parish, Louisiana in 1889. Their marriage was recorded in Lafayette Parish as follows:

State of Louisiana, Parish of Lafayette

Be it remembered that on this Second day of August anno Domini One Thousand Eight hundred and Twenty-four, I, Thomas B. BRASHEAR judge of the Parish of Lafayette, have this day joined together in the Bonds of holy wedlock Joseph MOSS, (the son of Nathaniel MOSS Sr. and Joanna JOHNSON - his Mother) and Claire THIBODEAUX, the daughter of Jean THIBODEAUX and Marie Louise BROUSARD, her Mother, the said Claire being the the Granddaughter of Jean BROUSARD and Marie Louise BROUSARD, her Grandmother, by her mothers side, and the Granddaughter of Andrew THIBODEAUX and Margaret MELACOR, her Grandmother, by her fathers side, all of the Parish aforesaid, License having been first obtained to that effect, according to the Law. I, the Judge aforesaid, have celebrated said marriage, between the said Joseph MOSS and the said Claire THIBODEAUX, aforesaid, at my office in the Parish aforesaid, on the day and year first above written, and by and with the consent of all the parties, parents, relations, friends and together with the two subscribing witnesses -

- 4. Levi MOSS, b. 17 Mar 1831 (Lafayette Parish); d. 10 Sep 1863 (Richmond, VA). Died of wounds suffered at Chantilly, Virginia during the Civil War.
- 5. Calvin MOSS, b. 14 Dec 1833 (Lafayette Parish); m. 28 Jan 1863 (Youngsville Ch.), Helene LE BLANC, d/o Rosemond & Virginie LANGLINAIS.

Joseph MOSS was among the pioneer settlers of Vermilion Parish. He later moved to Latayette Parish where he became a prosperous planter. Joseph died in Vermilion Parish in 1848 at the relatively young age of 43 years. His wife, Marie Claire THIBODEAUX MOSS died in Esther, Louisiana in 1889 at 82 years of age.

At least four sons, Anderson Joseph, Alexander, Levi and Nathaniel MOSS served the Confederate cause during the Civil War. Two of the sons, Levi and Nathaniel, died while serving in the Confederate Army.

From a biography written by a daughter of Alexander MOSS and Martha RICE MOSS we gain a little insight into two of the children of Joseph MOSS and Clara THIBODEAUX MOSS. [Note: The biography was transcribed on 6 May 1994 by Marilyn Dyer as originally written by one of Alexander MOSS' daughters. The only changes made were to capitalize the last names of individuals. Only the portion of the biography dealing with the "MOSS" family is presented here. That portion dealing with the "RICE" family (siblings of Martha RICE) has been left out for brevity.]

"My Father, Alexander MOSS, was born in Lafayette Parish, Louisiana near Royville in 1827. He was the second of ten children whom Anderson Joseph MOSS is the oldest. Alexander MOSS worked on his father's plantation and attended school until he attained his majority; at his fathers death he removed to Vermilion Parish and assumed charge of the sugar plantation which his father possessed in the Parish.

"He located permanently in his present place of residence [?] in 1868 where they own two hundred and forty acres of land under the best of improvement, the principal product of the plantation being sugar cane and rice. Mr. MOSS also has a fine orange grove of from one thousand to twelve hundred trees with a variety of other fruits. He was a soldier in the late war, having enlisted in 1862, in Fournet's Yellow Jacket Battalion afterwards being transferred to the Eighteenth Louisiana. He participated in the battles at Bisland, Yellow Bayou and other minor engagements. At Bisland he was taken prisoner and detained a short while at New Orleans. Mr. MOSS was united in marriage in 1861 to Miss Martha RICE, daughter of Samuel R. RICE. They are the parents of eight living children, seven daughters and one son. The subject of this sketch is a member of the Farmer's Alliance, and is an ardent Democrat.

"Anderson Joseph "A. J." MOSS, of Lafayette, Louisiana, my Uncle, is a native of Lafayette Parish, born in 1825, a son of Joseph MOSS. A. J. MOSS received his preparatory education in the schools in Louisiana and later pursued a course at Center College, Danville, Kentucky. After leaving school he read law, but upon his Father's death he took the management of the plantation and gave up law studies. Early in life MOSS became identified with public affairs. He was a member of the Legislature and of the

Constitutional Convention of 1852. From 1853 to 1860 he was in the Custom House in New Orleans. In 1861 he enlisted in the Confederate States Army Company A, Twenty-sixth Louisiana Regiment. Shortly after entering the army he was appointed Assistant Commissary of Subsistence with the rank of Captain. In this capacity he served during the whole war. After the war he returned home completely broken up as regards finances. "During the existence of that office he was nine years Judge of Lafayette Parish. He also for a number of years served as Justice of Peace and Notary Public and is now a leading member of the City Council. He has been successfully engaged in the lumber trade in this Place. He married in 1856 to Miss Octavie CORNAY, who died March 1900, is of St. Mary's Parish. They were parents of six living children, four sons and two daughters - Dr. N. P. MOSS, C. P. MOSS merchant of New Iberia, F. E. MOSS merchant of Lafayette, James A. MOSS cadet at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point now First Lieutanant (sic) of the U. S. A. 24th [Infantry], Emily MOSS LE BLANC, and Ada MOSS PARKINSON."

A large number of descendants of these families still reside in Lafayette, St. Landry and Vermilion Parishes and elsewhere.

THE LONER

Jean Baptiste GARDES became a challenge when a friend sent me his name in 1979, and I could not find his name elsewhere. Since that year several publications have mentioned him but with minimal, and confusing, information.

A reference to a document dated September 19, 1767, was found in an old index of civil records at the Pointe Coupee Parish Courthouse: "Obligation du Sieur Jean Bapte LAPPEZE á Jean Bte. GARDES." The document was not found; the old index was said to have been lost when I inquired about it several years later.

Presented here is information that has been found on Jean Baptiste GARDES.

At New Orleans, before the notary GARIC,¹ on December 31, 1765. Jean GARDES signed the marriage certificate of Bertrand GUICHANDUC, widower of Michell VILLERAY, to Marie Jeanne DRAPEAU, widow of Jean Baptiste LEONARD dit FREDERIK, as a witness. On the same day he was present at the church ceremony uniting this couple. Since this is the earliest mention of him, it may be relative that GUICHANDUC was native of Proze, diocese of Lescar, in the provence of Bearn, France, and that other witnesses were [Pierre] COUTURIER,² surgeon; [Joseph Hiscler] MAISON of Rochefort, diocese of La Rochelle; Magnon (?) GAUVIN fils, surely a son of the merchant Jean Baptiste GAUVIN; DUBREUIL, probably Joseph Villars DUBREUIL, a milita captain (1762 record).

Jean Baptiste GARDES may have been the "GARDEL" living alone in the Fourth District of New Orleans, a member of BRAQUIER's company of militia in 1766.

It appears he spent sometime in Pointe Coupee in September 1767. The date of the "Obligation of Sieur Jean Bpte LAPPEZE to Jean Bte GARDES" was seen in an old index at the Pointe Coupee Parish Courthouse, LAPPEZE³ was a resident there. On September 19, two days after the "Obligation," GARDES witnessed the marriage of Pierre CLERMONT and Marie Anne TISSERAN de MONCHARVEAUX, sister-in-law of Jean Baptiste VEDRINES of Lapeze, France.

¹ Jean Baptiste Garic served as godfather of the LEONARD - DRAPEAU daughter baptized in 1847.

² Pierre Couturier was Surgeon Major of the Swiss troops in Louisiana. He married Marie Francoise Dupont bef. 1753.

³ His name is really Jean Baptise VEDRINES, native of Lapeze, hence the seed of my curiosity about Gardes. A retired ensign of the French troops of the Marine, Vedrines had left Illinois in June 1764, when the English took over Fort de Chartres.

(Jean Baptiste Gardes con't.)

The January 25, 1770, list of New Orleans Miliita has Jean GARDE, a merchant 34 years old, resident of Royal Street listed with the fuseliers. However, the February 12, 1770, list has Jean GARDE, resident of Royal Street, with the fuseliers of the First Company of Militia, age 62 years. Is one of these entries an error of the transcriber or perhaps the original scribe, or where they two different people, each listed alone, on dates of such proximity?

In that same year, on September 17, 1770, Madame GUICHANDUC filed suit against Jean GARDES to collect a debt of 366 livres.

No other mention of the GARDE - GARDEL - GARDES name has been found in any record.

33 Signed To Incorporate

In 1911 when the citizens of Basile applied for incorporation there were two hundred and sixty-seven inhabitants residing inside the proposed boundaries of the Village. Of these 267 inhabitants 33 signed the petition to incorporate Basile. The signers were: Dr. E. S. TAYLOR, R. B. CHACHERE, L. S. SCHAMBER, John WRIGHT, J. S. DARGONNE, Benjamin YOUNG, madison DUHON, Amos Fuselier, W. W. FUSSELL, C. C. FAUST and Elloie JAGUENEAUX. Also, Otto MAYER, Constant SONNIER, Benjamin JOHNSTON, Andrew LUSTMAN, A. J. SUDDUTH, Oniel RICHARD, J. A. CHAUMONT, L. H. CHERRY, M. B. DEAUMAN, J. C. GUILLORY, and C. FUSELIER. Also, Anatol LANDRY, Jr., Eugene JOUBERT, Howard CRUTCHER, William JORDAN, G. W. ROONEY, Paul MILLER, D. BREAUX, J. W. JORDAN, R. L. RICE and S. F. FUSELIER.

Pauline Miller, Her Possible Ancestry

In working on the Fontenot Book manuscript, which your society plans to have in print by early 1996, several very interesting genealogy puzzles have arisen. Among the questions that have come up is the following; who was Pauline MILLER who (married?) and had at least five children with Joseph Zincourt FONTENOT, Jr.?

Some background

Joseph Zincourt FONTENOT, Jr., the fourth of nine children born to the marriage of Joseph Francois Philippe Zincourt FONTENOT and Charlotte REED was born on June 5, 1838 (Opel. Ch.). No record of a marriage has been found for Joseph, Jr.; however, on July 7, 1867, a set of twins, Marguerite and Amelie (Melite) FONTENOT, were born to Joseph and Pauline MILLER. The twins were followed by three additional children: Therese, born January 9, 1870; Marie Irma, born February 9, 1872; and David FONTENOT, born January 24, 1874. All of the children were christened in Ville Platte.

An attempt is being made to identify as many of the parents of the spouses of persons who married into the Fontenot family as possible. In many cases this is impossible; however, many are being identified using Fr. Hebert's multi-volume set ¹ and various census and probate records of St. Landry Parish.

In an attempt to identify Pauline MILLER, Fr. Hebert's, editions covering the years 1831 through 1855 were checked for a possible baptism for a Pauline MILLER. Three were found:

Pauline MILLER, (Jean, fils & Marie Louise TELLER) b. 17 Apr 1838 (Opel. Ch.). Pauline MILLER, (Jean, fils & Marie Louise TELLER) b. 17 May 1840 (Opel. Ch.). Pauline MILLER, (Jean Frederick & Catherine READ) b. 29 Oct 1847 (GC Ch.).

The family of Jean MILLER, Jr. and his wife Marie are listed on the 1850 census at household # 1620. ² It is apparent that the scribe who entered the documentation regarding the baptismal of the second Pauline MILLER on May 17, 1840, erred. Among the several children listed in the household are Pauline, female, age 13 [b. 1837] and a Paulin, male, age 10 [b. 1840]. Obviously, these are the two children listed as having been born in 1838 and 1840 respectively.

Neither the family of Jean Frederick MILLER and Catherine REED nor their daughter Pauline are listed on the 1850 census.

Again from Hebert we find that Pauline MILLER, (Jean & Marie Louise TAILER), married Jean Nelson HIGGINBOTHAM on December 3, 1855 (Opel. Ch.).

From an article which appeared in *La Voix des Prairies* ³ we find that Jean Nelson HIGGINBOTHAM and Pauline MILLER had one child, Adam HIGGINBOTHAM, born about 1858. Soon after the birth of his son Adam, Jean Nelson disappeared from home never to be seen or heard from again.

Pauline Miller along with her son, Adam HIGGINBOTHAM, age 2, are listed on the 1860 census, living in her father's household (# 608). Neither the family of Jean Frederick MILLER and his wife Catherine REED, nor their daughter Pauline, who would have been about age 13, is listed on the 1860 census.

The 1870 St. Landry Parish Census lists Joseph Z. FONTENOT and Pauline along with four children; Alcee, age 6; Amelie, age 3 (a twin); Marguerite, age 3 (a twin) and Therese, age 4 months. ⁵ On that census, Joseph's age is listed as 60 and Pauline as 22. Pauline's age indicates that she was born in about 1848. It should be recalled that Pauline MILLER, the daughter of Jean Frederick MILLER and Catherine REED, was born on October 29, 1847.

A Pauline MILLER married Hypolite CARRIERE on July 5, 1867 (OCH).6 Hypolite was the son of Zenon Michel CARRIERE and Emelia MILLER. Emelia was a sister to Jean MILLER(m. Marie Louise TAYLOR), Pauline's father.

While none of this information "proves" anything, it does indicate the probability that the Pauline MILLER who had several children with Joseph Zincourt FONTENOT and is listed in his household on the 1870 census is most likely the daughter of Jean Frederick MILLER and Catherine REED.

If this assumption is correct, can we then also assume that Pauline MILLER, daughter of Jean MILLER and Marie Louise TAYLOR, married Hypolite CARRIERE? Anyone having knowledge of the ancestry of either Pauline MILLER is encouraged to send their information to *La Voix des Prairies*, c/o The Fontenot Project.

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

SUCCESSION OF PIERRE CLAVIS SAYDECK (SEIYETECK) dit FRANCOIS LE COMPTE - 1799

[Editors note: Mr. Buller's previously submitted material on the family of Pierre Clavis Sideck, "Notes on the Sideck Family of Colonial Louisiana, Colonial Texas and the Republic of Texas," appeared in *La Voix des Prairies*, Vol 12, Number 47, (Oct. 1991). Due to a lack of space it was not possible to publish the succession of Pierre Clavis Sideck at the time the article was published. It is presented here for its historical as well as genealogical value. The succession was translated from the French by Elizabeth Shown Mills on commission from Mr. Buller.]

Today, the 26th day of the month of June in the year 1799, I, Don Paul MARCOLLAY, first Lieutenant of the infantry militia of this post (commissioned by Monsieur Don Felix TRUDEAU, commandant of this post -- because of his sickness -- that is to say, commandant of this post of Natchitoches and its dependencies, who normally serves as notary and public scribe since there is no other in this place) have gone to the residence of Madame Widow François LECOMPTE, that is to say, to the residence of deceased SEIYETECK dit LECOMPTE situated at about three leagues from this post in descending Red River, on the opposite bank of the river, at the request of the widow Eursulle Cheletre, wife of the said decedent (by means of the long length of time, some eighteen months, since her husband Seyteck had his accident, in the view of the law he is dead; his horse having returned some three hundred days ago) and accompanied by the Sieurs Nicolas LAUVE and Marc MARCHAND, merchants residing at this post who are acting as assisting witnesses to the dame Eursulle CHELLETRE, widow of deceased Seiyeteck called Lecompte. Having instructed her to declare whether the deceased, her husband, had made his testament of act of Last Will, she replied that she did not know of any and declared that there did not exist any contradictory testimony, in faith of which she has placed her ordinary mark of the cross in presence of the previously named assisting witnesses and of myself, duly commissioned as already noted.

On the same day and year that is given in the previous document, I, the acting commissioner, in presence of the same assisting witnesses, proceeded to the inventory and estimation of the goods (movable and immovable) that belong to the succession of the deceased [illegible] dit François LECOMPTE, deceased [illegible] for the

consideration of the rights of the said widow and those of their children: Reine Barbe; Marie Louise, wife of [illegible] TIL; Marie Rose, wife of Jacque TIL, his son; Eleonore; Jean Baptiste; [and] Louis (?), of which three have already reached majority [illegible words]. I have, to this end, instructed the said dame to choose and name an appraiser, and she has chosen the Sieur André DAVID; I have appointed to this office the Sieurs DURCI and Jean HORNE as under-appraiser. All of the said Sieurs are citizens of this district whose probity and capacity are sufficiently known; therefore, I have accepted them and authorized them to duly appraise the goods according to their actual condition. This they have promised to do in good faith and conscience, in consequence of which they have taken the oath by God, our Lord, and by the sign of the cross, in faith of which I the above-said commissioner have signed with the said widow and with those below:

The Reed Cemetery at L'anse Megre

By John A. Young

The Reed Cemetery is located in the L'anse Megre community of Evangeline Parish. It should be noted that there are at least three Reed Cemeteries in the area. One is located south of Basile in Acadia Parish, one between Oberlin and Kinder and one south of Mamou in the L'anse Megre area. To locate the L'anse Megre Cemetery from Mamou, proceed south on La. Highway 13, for six miles. At Fenris, take La. 374, east for three miles. The cemetery is located in the L'anse Megre community. Recorded 22 - 26 April 1991. Inscriptions in the cemetery were read starting in the northeast end of the cemetery and finishing in the southeast end.

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

THE FAMILY OF ZEBULON ROBINETT

The family of Zebulon ROBINETT was among those Anglo-American families that moved into St. Landry Parish, Louisiana before 1813 and settled in that part of the parish that became Evangeline Parish many years later. At least four of his children (and possibly all of his children), eventually moved to Texas. The migration began during the 1820's when the wilds of Mexican Texas was opened for settlement by the empresario, Stephen F. AUSTIN. One daughter moved to Texas during the Mexican War. By the end of the Mexican War it appears that no member of Zebulon ROBINETT's family was living in Louisiana. However, for at least thirty-five years, there was at least some member of his family living in Louisiana.

There is some variety in spelling the family name but since Zebulon ROBINETT used "ROBINETT," that is how the name will be recorded in these notes. The family is almost certainly of English background, although there is likely an ancient French origin, as has been alleged. There was another Robinett family living in Rapides Parish before 1840 and while we suspect a close relationship to the family of Zebulon ROBINETT, the writer has not established such relationship. Therefore, all that follows will be confined to Zebulon's family.

The 1820 federal census of St. Landry Parish leads us to believe that Zebulon ROBINETT had three sons born before 1820. We are lacking the names of these three sons. It is hoped that this report will bring forth proof of the names of the three unknown sons.

Circumstantial evidence suggests that Zebulon ROBINETT was a possible descendant of Allen ROBINETT and his wife, Margaret SYMM, who arrived in William PENN's colony in Pennsylvania in 1682, coming from the township of Bunbury in the County of Chester in England. Seven volumes of Robinett genealogical records in the writer's possession, (all carefully documented), fails to establish our Zebulon ROBINETT as a descendant. One branch of the above mentioned Allen ROBINETT family is believed to have moved into North Carolina. A Zebulon ROBINETT from Mecklenburg County, North Carolina served with the American forces during the American Revolution. It is believed that he was not our Zebulon ROBINETT but was probably of an older generation.

Since our Zebulon ROBINETT's name is found on the tax rolls of Adams County, Mississippi Territory as early as 1805, it appears that he was born before 1785. His name is found on the tax rolls of that county for the years 1805, 1807 and 1808. It is

believed that he lived in that portion of Adams County that became Franklin County in 1810.

Sometime before 1810 Zebulon ROBINETT married Sarah CALLIHAM, daughter of John W. CALLIHAM. We have no marriage record. Prior to her marriage to Zebulon, Sarah had married William HENNESEY and given birth to a daughter, Mary Elizabeth HENNESEY. We assume that William HENNESEY had died shortly after the birth of his daughter, or even before her birth. Proof that Sarah CALLIHAM was a daughter of John W. CALLIHAM and that she was the wife of Zebulon ROBINETT is found in the marriage records of her daughters in St. Landry Parish. [I] Zebulon ROBINETT is not found in the 1810 federal census in Mississippi or Louisiana. By 1812 he had moved into Louisiana. In that year he bought 640 acres of land on the left bank of Bayou Chicot in the County of Opelousas. The land was bought from Agerton WILLIS, a son of Joseph WILLIS, a Baptist minister sometimes called "the Apostle of the Opelousas." [2]

Joseph WILLIS, by his own admission, stated that his mother was a Cherokee Indian and that his father was English. Willis was ordained to the ministry in Calvary Baptist Church at Bayou Chicot. [3] At least two of Zebulon ROBINETT's daughters were members of Calvary Baptist Church before 1850. We suspect that Zebulon ROBINETT was a member of the church before 1820.

In 1812 Zebulon ROBINETT sold to Joseph HOUSE the 640 acres on Bayou Chicot which he had purchased from Agerton WILLIS earlier in the year. [4] On 21 December 1813 Zebulon ROBINETT claimed 640 acres on the right bank of Bayou Boeuf in Rapides Parish. [5] On 30 December 1815 Zebulon ROBINETT and Joseph HOUSE sold 160 acres on the left bank of Bayou Chicot to Daniel FERGUSON. The land was bounded on the northwest by land formerly belonging to Christopher TEAL. The land had been held by Robinett and House by virtue of an improvement and the purchaser was to satisfy the claims of the United States against the land. [6] On 29 August 1818 the Notice of Preemption Right was filed for Zebulon ROBINETT's 640 acre claim on Bayou Boeuf in Rapides Parish, originally claimed in 1813. On 5 June 1819 Zebulon ROBINETT sold his half of performance on a tract of land on Bayou Boeuf (quantity not stated), to Denis McDANIEL. The land was located between Isaac BATSON and Denis McDANIEL but the conveyance record does not state the parish in which the land was located. Zebulon ROBINETT was recorded as being a resident of St. Landry Parish. [7]

Zebulon ROBINETT is found in the 1820 federal census of St. Landry Parish, being listed adjacent to the households of William BEASLEY and Joseph HOUSE. [8] Robinett had nine people in his household and no slaves. His neighbor, William BEASLEY, had married Rachel ROBINETT on 10 January 1791 in Greene County, Georgia. [9] William BEASLEY is found in the tax rolls of Greene County, Georgia in 1796 and 1797. Joseph HOUSE had married Mary ROBINETT in Georgia sometime

before 1800. It is believed that Rachel ROBINETT and Mary ROBINETT were sisters of Zebulon ROBINETT. The families of Zebulon ROBINETT, William BEASLEY and Joseph HOUSE are found in close association in Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas.

It is believed that Zebulon ROBINETT moved to Rapides Parish between 1820-1830 and that he likely died in Rapides Parish before 1830. His family is not found in the 1830 federal census of St. Landry Parish. A "Sarah ROBINETT" is found in the 1830 federal census of Rapides and it is believed that she was the widow of Zebulon ROBINETT. Sarah ROBINETT is not found in the 1840 federal census anywhere in Louisiana. We assume that she had died before 1840 or possibly had moved to Harris County, Texas where her oldest daughter was living in 1830.

We find no succession file for Zebulon ROBINETT in the parishes of St. Landry, Rapides or Avoyelles. This absence leaves us lacking the names of all of his children. The burning of the courthouse in Rapides Parish would explain why no record is found in that parish.

Listed below are the names of the proven children of Zebulon ROBINETT, together with the name of his step-daughter by his wife's prior marriage.

- (1) Mary Elizabeth HENNESEY
- (2) Mary ROBINETT
- (3) Cynthia (Cinthia, Sinthey) ROBINETT
- (4) Sarah Ann ROBINETT
- (5) Seborn James ROBINETT

(1) Mary Elizabeth HENNESEY, daughter of William HENNESEY and Sarah CALLIHAM, born before 1808 in Mississippi, married on 22 January 1822 in St. Landry Parish, Ezekiel THOMAS, native of South Carolina and son of Samuel THOMAS and Susanna McCARY. The marriage was performed by Isham NETTLES, a Baptist minister. Witnesses were Joseph T. CALLIHAM and Morris CALLIHAM. [10]

In 1822 Ezekiel THOMS sailed to Texas on the <u>Revenge</u> and obtained a league of land on the north bank of Buffalo Bayou in the wilds of Texas. The city of Galena Park and a large oil refinery is now located on Thomas's survey. [11]

Mary Elizabeth joined her husband in Texas and had six children. She died in 1833. Shortly thereafter Joseph T. CALLIHAM moved from the Bayou Chicot community of Louisiana to Texas and assisted Ezekiel THOMAS. Ezekiel died in 1834 leaving his six orphaned children under the care of Joseph T. CALLIHAM.

The Texas Revolution began in 1835, and we assume that Joseph T. CALLIHAM took the Thomas children eastward during the Runaway Scrape. The Texas Army camped on the Thomas land and crossed Buffalo Bayou on a raft a few days before the Battle of San Jacinto.

By 1837 Harris County (Harrisburg County) was organized and we find extensive probate records for the Ezekiel THOMAS Estate beginning in that year. The six THOMAS children were Fanny, Mary, Rebecca, William, Samuel and Lindsey. [121]

- (2) Mary ROBINETT, daughter of Zebulon ROBINETT and Sarah CALLIHAM, born about 1808 in Mississippi, married on 9 December 1826 in St. Landry Parish, Ransom G. REAMS, native of South Carolina and son of Sterling REAMS and Elizabeth RICHARDSON. [13] It is alleged that Mary died young. We assume that she had no children. Ransom G. REAMS, age fifty, is found in the 1850 federal census of Polk County, Texas living in the household of William POINDEXTER. [14]
- (3) **Cynthia (Cinthia, Sinthey) ROBINETT**, daughter of Zebulon ROBINETT and Sarah CALLIHAM, born about 1810 in Mississippi, married on 5 December 1831 in St. Landry Parish, Thomas MOORHEAD. John W. CALLIHAM, who wrote the letter of consent for the marriage, stated that "Sinthey ROBNET" was his grand-daughter. [15]

Thomas MOORHEAD moved to Texas and obtained a league of land and a headright. It appears that his wife joined him in Texas. She had four children but it is unknown if all of them were born in Texas. By 1846 Thomas MOORHEAD was dead. [16] Cynthia returned to Louisiana after the death of her husband and lived near Bayou. Chicot. On 9 August 1846 she was received into Calvary Baptist Church as a member, she having been previously baptised "in the pine woods." [17] On 11 November 1848 "Sarah BULLER" and "Cynthia MOORHEAD" were granted letters of dismission from Calvary Baptist Church. The church minutes state that they had moved from the neighborhood. Cynthia MOORHEAD may have returned to Texas in company with her sister, Sarah Ann (ROBINETT) BULLER.

On 8 August 1849 in Harris County, Texas Cynthia MOORHEAD married James RICHEY. [18] In the 1850 federal census the family of James RICHEY was listed adjacent to the household of Seaborn J. ROBINETT, Cynthia's brother, in the western part of the county. They were living on or near the John H. CALLIHAM League in an area that had become something of a little "Louisiana Colony," since a number of families from St. Landry Parish had moved into that area. Among those were the families of Beasley, House, Calliham, Mitchell, Simmons, Robinett, Dunham, Cole, Richey and Thomas. John H. CALLIHAM was a son of Joseph T. CALLIHAM as proven by deed records in DeWitt County, Texas.

On 29 August 1854 Cynthia RICHEY (maiden name ROBINETT and niece of Morris CALLIHAM), sold her right and title as an heir of Morris CALLIHAM, to one league of land on Buffalo Bayou in Harris County, (land granted Morris CALLIHAM and Allen VINCE), to Frances BROCK. On the same day Cynthia RICHEY bought 300 acres of land on the headwaters of Buffalo Bayou from Frances BROCK. Frances

BROCK was a daughter of Ezekiel THOMAS and Mary Elizabeth HENNESEY. She had married John BROCK. [19]

Cynthia ROBINETT had four children by her marriage to Thomas MOORHEAD: William, Sarah Jane, Susan and James Thomas.

- (4) Sarah Ann ROBINETT, daughter of Zebulon ROBINETT and Sarah CALIHAM, born 18 December 1818 in Louisiana, married on 21 December 1837 in St. Landry Parish, John Pierre BULLER, son of Joseph BULLER, Sr. and Eleanor SIDECK. She died 7 June 1882 in Polk County, Texas and was buried in an unmarked grave in the "Old" Bethel Baptist Church Cemetery of the Louisiana Settlement of Polk County. [20]
- (5) Seborn James ROBINETT, son of Zebulon ROBINETT and Sarah CALLIHAM, born about 1824 in Louisiana. He moved to Texas about 1847 and settled in Harris County. On 26 November 1849 in Harris County he married Susanna RICHEY, a sister of James RICHEY who was married to Cynthia ROBINETT. [21]

Susanna (Richey) ROBINETT died about May of 1856 in Harris County, being survived by her husband and two children, Mary Aurelia ROBINETT and Ezekiel Hiram ROBINETT. [22]

Seborn ROBINETT took his two children to live for a time with his sister, Sarah Ann (ROBINETT) BULLER, in Polk County, Texas. On 20 January 1857 in Polk County Seborn James ROBINETT married Elizabeth J. McCROREY. [23] By his second wife Seborn James ROBINETT had the following children: William, Pleasant H., Melinda. Thomas and Caroline.

The Probable Ancestry of Josephville Chapman

[Editors note: The name of the person who submitted the following manuscript was lost. If that person will send me his/her name I will include it in an up-coming issue of La Voix des Prairies]

In researching my Chapman line, I ran into a problem when I came to Josephville CHACKMAN. According to SWLR,¹ Josephville CHACKMAN, son of _____ ORTOLON & Marie CHACKMAN, married Celestine VESINA on October 18, 1847 (Opel. Ch.). Celestine was the daughter of Joseph VESINA & Celestine BASINE.

No birth or baptismal record has been found for Josephville CHACKMAN, or variations of the Chapman name. However, a baptism was found for Joseph Edville ORTOLON. Joseph Edville ORTOLON, the son of Jean ORTOLON, fils, and Marie Jacque JACQUEMON was born on January 31, 1829 (Opel. Ch.). I feel certain that this is Josephville CHACKMAN.

The 1860 St. Landry Parish Census³ lists Josephville CHAPMAN, age 30, his wife Celestine VISNA and four children. Josephville's age on the census indicates a birth about 1830 which corresponds to the birth of Joseph Edville ORTOLON.

Josephville CHAPMAN and Celestine had the following children:

- 1. Josephville CHAPMAN, Jr., b. 1847 (1860 census); m. Emilia SAUCIER.
- 2. Hildevert/Ulvert CHAPMAN, b. 27 May 1854; m. Adelaide BILLEAUDEAU.
- 3. Ozeme CHAPMAN, b. 1856 (1860 census).
- 4. Evelina CHAPMAN, b. 27 Oct 1859
- 5. Artelus CHAPMAN, b. 28 Jan 1865

It appears that the person baptized as Joseph Edville ORTOLON, for reasons unknown, changed his surname to Chapman, his mother's surname sometime prior to 1847.

Jean ORTOLON (I), of Bordeau, Parish of St. Pierre, resident of Opeolusas, was the son of Francois ORTOLON and Jeanne _____. Jean (I) married Marie Louise VIVARET, d/o Pierre VIVARET and Francoise DESNOIERS on May 8, 1773 at Pointe Coupee. They had the following children:

- 1. Silesia ORTOLON, b. 25 Nov 1775; 7 Jan 1781 "at age 4 yrs." (Opel. Ch.)
- 2. Zenon ORTELON, bt. 24 Jun 1779; d. 29 Oct 1801 "at age 22 yrs." (Opel. Ch.).
- 3. Jean (II) ORTELON, b. ____; m. 12 Feb 1799, Scholastique BROWN.

It is uncertain who the parents of Marie Jacque JACQUEMON (Chapman) were. It appears likely that she is the child listed as the "natural daughter of Juan KIAPMAN and Marie FAUVELLE" who was baptized on August 19, 1803 (Opel. Ch.). Marie FAUVELL was sometimes referred to as Marie CLUSOT. The Chapman name was sometimes listed as Jacquemon, Chackman, Kiapmon, etc.

Anyone with information which will corroborate or contradict the above information on the Ortolon or Chapman families are encouraged to submit their information for inclusion in future issues of *La Voix des Prairies*.

This is a continuation of the St. Landry Parish Coroner's Inquest Book which appeared in Vol. 15, No. 57 (April 1994) issue of *La Voix des Prairie*. The original article covered the period January 11, 1895 to May 11, 1901. Entries between May 11, 1901 to April 1903 will be published later as they become available.

A Coroner's Inquest was normally performed by the parish coroner when a death was suspected of being from other than natural causes. The following inquests were performed in St. Landry Parish which encompassed present day Evangeline Parish. Original grammar and spelling retained in transcription.

Only Eight Men Kept the Peace

(Editors note: The following appeared in a Special 75th Anniversary Edition and Supplement to *The Basile Weekly* on March 6, 1986.)

"In the 75 years that Basile has been incorporated only eight men have served as town marshal, otherwise known as Chief of Police.

The first marshal was Cyrus DARBONNE, who actually served before incorporation. Matt DUHON was probably the first to serve after incorporation. When Mr. Duhon resigned, Cyrus again assumed the responsibilities of the office of town marshal.

Cleve SCHAMBERS then ran for the office and was only defeated once, losing to Relise GUIDRY. Guidry did not serve out his term and thus Schambers finished the unexpired term. Schambers served a total of 43 years in Basile's law enforcement department, most of those years as chief.

In January of 1925 Mack ARDOIN replaced Schambers for one month while Chief Schambers recovered from a gun shot wound.

Dorcelin "Dutch" DOGA was elected to succeed Schambers in 1965 and served through 1981 when he retired. Herman DARBONNE completed Doga's unexpired term. Basile's present chief of police, Wilfred LaFLEUR has served since 1982."

Pauline Miller: Additional Information H. Gail Fusilier

(Editors note: The following information was received in response to an article, "Pauline Miller: Her Possible Ancestry" which appeared in *La Voix des Prairies*, Vol. 16, No. 61, page 38, April 1995 issue.)

I hope the following information helps in clearing up the Pauline MILLER mystery.

Pauline is almost certainly the daughter of Jean Frederick MILLER and Catherine REED. My reasons for stating this are as follows:

- Jean Frederick MILLER, the son of Frederick MILLER & Victorie MAYER, married first on 23 Aug 1814 (Opel. Ch.) to Louise FRUGE the daughter of of Augustin FRUGE & Louise MARCANTEL. ¹
- Jean Frederick MILLER married a second time on 20 Feb 1837 (Opel. Ct. Hse.) to Catherine REED. ²
- Jean Frederick MILLER married a third time in 1849 in Calcasieu Parish to Irma HEBERT, the daughter of Joseph HEBERT & Elizabeth FONTENOT.
- (I descend from Jean Frederick & Irma's last child Frederick MILLER.)
- Jean Frederick MILLER and his wife Uma [Irma HEBERT] are listed on the 1850 Calcasieu Parish census along with his children from his previous marriages.³ On that census Jean Frederick's age is listed as 55 years and Irma's as 18 years. Among the seven children listed is Pauline MILLER, age 2.
- Jean Frederick MILLER and family are listed on the 1860 Calcasieu Parish census. ⁴ On that census Pauline is listed as being 12 years of age.
- Pauline MILLER is believed to have married Joseph Zincourt FONTENOT in Calcasieu Parish in 1849. All parish records were destroyed in the 1810 fire.
